SUBJECT: Briefing for meeting with Dr. Vranitzky - Former Chancellor of Austria and OSCE - Special Envoy for Albania (meeting November 25, 1997)

- 1. Purpose of the Visit: Dr. Vranitzky is in Washington in his capacity as OSCE envoyee to Albania for a debriefing at the U.S. State Department. Dr. Vranitzky may want to brief you on his assignment in Albania. As his OSCE mandate in Albania expired in October 1997, he may also want to explore options for a new international role possibly in international finance or in an international peace keeping mandate, similar to the one assumed in Albania.
- 2. <u>Background</u>: Dr. Vranitzky was appointed OSCE Special Envoy for Albania in March 1997 to assist the country to return to normalcy after the collapse of the pyramid scheme had resulted in massive civil unrest. Dr. Vranitzky played this role most effectively. He visited Albania between March and July numerous times, managed consensus building among the country's warring political factions, and pushed for new free and fair elections. He also obtained a commitment from former President Berisha to resign if his Democratic party were to loose in the elections; he offered help to Albania's Interim Government (of national Reconciliation) for democracy building.
- 3. Dr. Vranitzky was also instrumental in supporting the deployment of the Italian led Multinational Protection Forces (MPF), which helped to restore minimum security in parts of the country in early 1997. Dr. Vranitzky strongly supported the post-crisis role of IFIs. One can argue, that the very effective role played by Dr. Vranitzky in Albania was crucial for the agreement reached between the then President Berisha and the opposition, which paved the way for elections in June 1997. Without his interventions, general elections may not have been held.

SUGGESTED TOPICS OF DISCUSSION

- 4. I suggest, you congratulate Dr. Vranitzky on his outstanding achievements in Albania.
- 5. You may ask Dr. Vranitzky about the prospects of the new Government, the chances of advancing on key economic adjustment issues in the present political environment. You might ask him for specific suggestions for the Bank's post-crisis strategy in Albania.

6. You may inquire from Dr. Vranitzky about his personal plans for the future and ask about his interest in an international assignment or in the financial sector. He has professional experiences in the banking/financial sector, but they date back to the period prior to his appointment as Chancellor of the Federal Republic of Austria (1986). Dr. Vranitzky is particularly interested in EU issues and economic and political issues related to Central and Eastern Europe.

Franz Vranitzky

Franz Vranitzky was born in Vienna on 4 October, 1937. He graduated from the Economic University of Vienna in 1960 and received a doctorate in 1969.

In 1961 he joined the National Bank of Austria, originally in the economic research department. In 1970 Mr. Vranitzky was appointed an advisor on economic an fiscal policy to the Austrian Federal Minister of Finance.

In 1976 Vranitzky was appointed deputy chairman of the Board of Directors of the Creditanstalt Bankversin and five years later took on the same post at the Osterreichische Länderbank. In April 1981 he became chairman of the Länderbank Board of Directors. Mr. Vranitzky joined the Government in 1984 as Pederal Minister for Finance, a post which he held until 16 June, 1986, when he was sworn in as Federal Chancellor of the Republic of Austria.

Mr. Vranitzky served as Federal Chancellor for more than ten years. He resigned from this office on 18 January, 1997. In March 1997 he was appointed Special Representative to Albania by the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe.

Mr. Vranitzky also served as chairman of the Social Democratic Party for almost a decade. He has published several books. He received an honorary doctorate from Hebrew University in Jerusalem, the "Karlspreis" of the City of Aachen and the Fulbright Prize. Mr. Vranitzky is married and has two children.
