MEMORANDUM TO THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS

Subject: Lending Rates Applicable January 1, 1992

- 1. The New Variable Lending Rate (VLR-1989, as described in R89-39 of March 16, 1989), to be in effect from January 1, 1992 to June 30, 1992 is 7.73 percent, based on the average cost of qualified borrowings allocated to loans of 7.23 percent, during the period from July 1, 1991 to December 31, 1991.
- 2. The Old Variable Lending Rate (VLR-1982), to be in effect from January 1, through June 30, 1992 is 7.72 percent, based on the average cost of qualified borrowings of 7.22 percent, during the period from July 1, 1991 to December 31, 1991.
- 3. The Bank is notifying all current borrowers of the rates applicable for interest periods beginning after December 31, 1991.

SUBJECT:

Management of Externally Funded Programs

- 1. A substantial and increasing share of our total activities is being funded by outside sources, for the most part through trust funds established by donors. I expect these activities to be programmed, approved, supervised, and monitored with the same care and attention with which we monitor our regular programs. Before the Bank accepts donor funds in trust, you need to determine whether the activity to be supported is of high priority and of direct relevance to your approved program strategy. Such funds also should be administered in a cost-effective manner and we must be able to account for their use in a transparent fashion. The vast majority of trust funds accepted to date meet these criteria and most task managers are doing an excellent job in administering such funds. We have recently strengthened the policy framework for these activities and it is important that you ensure compliance with it in your area of responsibility.
- 2. The special features of some of these trust fund activities require that sometimes we must exercise our fiduciary responsibilities in ways different from our normal practices. When terms and conditions for the use of the funds differ from our standard policies and practices and the trust fund conditions must be fully complied with when carrying out the funded activities. In addition, trust funds established by Board Resolutions such as the Global Environmental Facility and the Technical Cooperation Trust Fund for the USSR, are governed by specific terms and conditions, as set out in the respective Resolutions.
- 3. To the extent possible, business planning should include the planned use of externally funded programs. However, because the amounts and uses of these funds may not always be known when the business plan is prepared, it is necessary to track new commitments in the course of the year. Managerial and staff resources available must be able to cope with the additional burden we are assuming when we accept new trust funds, and you must make a judgement in this regard before soliciting or accepting new trust fund responsibilities. To assist with this, I have asked the Resource Mobilization Department to prepare a quarterly report for each Vice Presidency indicating new trust funds established and disbursements on existing trust funds.
- 4. Trust funds vary in character. While some fund activities are similar to those in the Bank's budget, others are closer to technical assistance loans or credits under which the responsibility for implementation rests with the recipient country. For these reasons, the standard monitoring reports may not give the information you need to assess whether these programs meet the criteria of priority and efficiency. I, therefore, suggest that each of you institute an annual review with your Department Directors to assess whether the objectives are adequate, and whether the recipient country(ies) continues to assign priority to the activity.

See in particular Mr. Kavalsky's memo of June 5, 1991 to Directors and Division Chiefs on Changes in Management of Reimbursable Programs.

This review may yield specific guidelines within your Vice Presidency for accepting and managing external funds.

5. I have asked Mr. Kavalsky, Director, FRM, to convene a new Bank-wide oversight group on externally funded programs to replace the former Funding Coordinators. Please designate a representative to participate in that group and advise Mr. Kavalsky.

Subject: Portfolio Management

The Bank and IDA have currently under implementation USD 138 billion in lending commitments, representing about USD 360 billion in projects/programs. The effective implementation of this portfolio is vital to the growth prospects of our member countries. The advice the Bank provides through its supervision of these operations is one of the most important forms of development assistance we provide. Successful implementation of approved operations outweighs new annual commitments as an indicator of the Bank's development effectiveness. It, therefore, deserves commensurate management attention.

The Bank's ability to provide effective assistance in the course of supervision depends on its capacity to draw timely lessons from on-going and completed lending operations and to disseminate this information expeditiously. The learning cycle starts with the negotiation for a project/program and continues through the PCR to OED impact studies. Its major components are the regular supervision missions, Country Implementation Reviews, the regional management of supervision follow-up, the Annual Report on Implementation and Supervision, OSP analysis on development effectiveness, and the PCRs. The OED project evaluations, sectoral reviews and impact studies complete the cycle.

It is timely for us to review the management of this cycle; the respective responsibilities of the owner, the guarantor and the lender, and the role assigned to the various unit in the Bank; the methodologies employed to assess success and failure; and the system for extracting and disseminating implementation experience. Our implementation and evaluation systems should enable us to have a regular and realistic assessment of the development impact of the Bank's lending activities and serve as a basis for practical recommendations to improve operating policies and practices.

To conduct the review of, and to make recommendations for improving, the Bank's basic portfolio management and evaluation process, I have asked Mr. Wapenhans to chair a Task Force staffed from the Regions, OSP and OED. The areas to be included in the review are described in the attachment. The recommendations of the Task Force will, of course, take fully into account OED's current mandate and its special reporting relationship to the Executive Directors. In addition to being supported by OSP and OED, Mr. Wapenhans will consult closely with Messrs. Rovani and Picciotto, the current and the prospective Director-General for Operations Evaluation, and with Mr. Rajagopalan, VP, Sector and Operations Policy.

Once the Task Force has been organized, Mr. Wapenhans will advise me of its work program. The complexity and scope of the subject requires that we devote adequate time and resources to it. The work will be facilitated by the considerable amount of prior analysis in the Bank, by work now in progress on some elements of portfolio management, by the experience of other organizations, and by the extensive literature on evaluation and assessment of development effectiveness. I expect that the Task Force should be able to report by July 1, 1992.

Mr Preston's speech to the Japanese Economic and Investment Study Mission to Latin America, HQ, February 19, 1992

- 1. Good morning. Welcome to the World Bank. Meetings between the Bank and representatives from Japan's business community are now a strong tradition. I am pleased to see some old friends here. It is good to meet as well many others who have known the Bank for a long time.
- 2. I know you are here to find out what we can tell you about Latin America. My colleagues will discuss the region's opportunities and challenges with you in detail. I would like to talk about Latin America's leadership in reform, particularly the fresh emphasis on the private sector. I also want to place the region's transformation in the broader context of development in the 1990s.
- 3. We are living through extraordinary times. The Cold War is over. Ideological competition has been replaced by a broad convergence on the need to strike a new balance between the state and market. The private sector is now seen as the main source of employment and growth.

- 4. The trend is toward liberalization of economic and political life. Economies are opening up to international and domestic competition. Never have the potential gains from closer international integration and cooperation been so great.
- 5. Many governments are now ready to concentrate on what they can do best. They are providing education, health services, infrastructure and environmental protection, and maintaining a "market-friendly" climate. In addition, billions of dollars now spent on unproductive military spending can be committed to development.
- 6. In political life, the trend is towards accountable and responsible government. All around the world, people are becoming increasingly involved in the decisions which affect their lives. Hence, issues such as the quality of government, the environment and levels of defense expenditures are more prominent in the development debate.
- 7. Nowhere are these global trends more evident than in Latin America. The region is undergoing a remarkable transformation. Indeed, Latin America is now in the vanguard of difficult but essential reforms.
- 8. Today Latin America looks vastly different from the way it appeared only ten years ago. Latin American countries are

largely abandoning the inward-looking, self-sufficient approach to development. They have adopted in its place an outward-looking approach. Barriers to trade, investment and technology transfer are being lowered all over the region. The economies of Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Mexico and Venezuela are now among the most open in the developing world.

- 9. Governments are reducing their direct involvement in the production and distribution of goods. They are extensively privatizing and otherwise disposing of public enterprises. Mexico has now sold, liquidated, merged or transferred more than 80 percent of its state enterprises.
- 10. At the same time, governments are trying to improve the climate for enterprise. They are tightening up economic management and re-assessing budget priorities. They are investing more in people through health and education program and social safety nets. They are overhauling tax regimes. They are recasting rules and regulations to form the framework for free and fair markets. They are improving policies and regulations governing foreign investment. They are relaxing trade regimes and currency controls.
- 11. All this is a decisive break with the past. Moreover, these sweeping reforms are usually the initiative of broad-based

popularly elected governments. Economic and political liberalization march side by side.

- 12. Economic growth is recovering. The problem of external debt has eased in several of Latin America's leading economies. The majority of the region's countries have orderly relations with their creditors. Inflation has fallen far further and faster than seemed possible only a few years ago. Budget deficits are shrinking. Stock markets have been buoyant. Publics are more aware of the importance of environmental protection. External payments balances are stronger. Foreign exchange reserves have risen.
- 13. Above all, confidence is reviving. There can be no clearer evidence of this new mood than the recent return of huge amounts of flight capital. Some \$15 billion has flowed back to Mexico in the last two years. Around \$5 billion returned to Argentina in the second half of 1991.
- 14. I do not want to give you the impression that future progress in Latin America is inevitable. It is not. Reform is tough. Some countries in the region have made more progress than others. But domestic reform requires a growing world economy and an increased openness of the trading system.

- 15. The World Bank Group is supporting Latin American reform vigorously. The key is to build on the long history of the region's sophisticated private sector. We are helping almost every country in the region to improve the climate for private enterprise. We are assisting in reshaping the private sector, partly through privatization. About one in three of our lending operations in the region helps the private sector. We are supporting investment in infrastructure. We are investing in people through education, health, family planning and nutrition programs.
- 16. The World Bank and the International Finance Corporation are developing capital markets to help make good use of private savings. IFC's rapidly growing loan and equity investments in Latin America currently total \$2 billion in over 160 companies in 23 countries. MIGA, the newest member of the Bank Group, has already provided political risk guarantees to many investors in the region.
- 17. The biggest influence on Latin America's prosperity will be the private sector. The days of huge public sector borrowing are over. Latin America will need foreign capital for direct investment and private sector borrowing. Japanese companies have been instrumental in the rapid growth of many Asian countries. Latin America offers similar opportunities today.

- 18. The countries you will visit have received, over the last five years, about 80 percent of foreign direct investment flows to Latin America. Trade between Japan and Latin America today is small, less than 4 percent of Japan's external trade. But Latin America is home to about 13 percent of the book value of Japan's foreign direct investment. Around 16 percent of Latin America's commercial bank debt is owed to Japanese banks, second only to United States banks.
- 19. Capital is not the whole story by any means. Foreign expertise and know-how are also essential. Efficiency will be crucial to the region's competitiveness. Your companies are well placed to work with Latin America's private sector in providing technology, skills and management as well as capital.
- 20. Gentlemen, you are going to visit Latin America at an exciting time. The region is in the mainstream of the great changes we are witnessing the world over. Not for many years has the climate for private enterprise and investment in Latin America been so promising. You and your country can bolster reform in Latin America: by investment, technology transfer, training and management -- as well as trade. In the process you will help strengthen the international trend towards liberalization. I wish your mission every success.

Thank you very much for your letter of January 24. I am well aware of the significant efforts that Bulgaria is making in its transition toward a market economy and am delighted to receive your expression of commitment to a comprehensive program of deep structural reforms. As you know, the implementation of such a program is crucial to establishing the foundation for Bulgaria's economic growth and recovery as well as to the willingness of the creditors to reach a suitable debt agreement.

For the World Bank's part, we are prepared to give early and favorable consideration to supporting, along with the International Monetary Fund, such an agreement. Bank staff have already begun preparation of the background analysis and documentation for such an operation. Our ability to seek our Board's approval for such support will, of course, depend on continued progress in your negotiations with the banks. In addition, as indicated in Mr. Wiehen's letter to Minister Kostov of January 21, we would require substantial compliance with the mutually agreed conditions for second tranche release under our Structural Adjustment Loan (SAL), as well as an agreement with the IMF on a second program. I understand that a Bank mission will visit Bulgaria in February to assess progress under the SAL, and that a Fund team will also be there to begin discussions toward a new arrangement. I look forward to receiving their reports.

In closing, I want to reiterate the high regard in which we hold Bulgaria's reform efforts thus far, and our desire to work closely with you in the future to assist your country to achieve its development objectives.

Thank you for your letter of December 30, and for your commendations on the Bank's new environmental policies, particularly those on Environmental Assessment and on Forests.

Now that we have adopted a number of important environmental policies, I agree with you that the next phase is to foster more effective implementation of those policies. I have made this clear in the Bank, and believe that results will be forthcoming in due course. As you know, changes in a large and complex organization such as the World Bank are not realized overnight. The policies are being phased in with due deliberative speed however.

This brings me to my second response. I am aware that the Unvironmental Assessment summaries your colleagues have reviewed are not ideal. That is to be expected. They are the first to be released under the old (1989) Environmental Assessment policy, and will improve over time. This trend will accelerate as the provisions of the new (1991) EA policy are phased in.

With regard to your query on energy efficiency, the Bank in fact devotes more attention to end-use efficiency and conservation than the two percent of energy lending quoted in your letter. Most Bank energy projects contain various components to this end, many of which involve relatively small investments. The Bank also finances substantial amounts of technical assistance for end-use efficiency. In addition, the Bank exerts considerable pressure to improve end-use efficiency through policy conditions for our loans. In particular, virtually all energy loans entry conditions for energy pricing in order to improve end-use efficiency. End-use efficiency is addressed in the Power Sector Policy Paper and is the specific subject of a complementary paper being prepared on "Energy Efficiency and Conservation in the Developing World."

With regard to your comments on involuntary resettlement, I am pleased to see you and the other signatory organizations appreciate and support the Bank's policies regarding relocation, when it is unavoidable and fully justifiable. We share your concern regarding implementation. We are making major efforts to strengthen supervision and technical assistance to projects with resettlement components, to ensure consistency between policy and project execution. In this regard, you will have heard that we have suspended disbursements and delayed projects recently in order to foster improvements in their resettlement components. You will be pleased to know that, as a result of Bank initiatives, supported strongly by ODA (UK) and by Oxfam, the DAC/OECD have adopted formal guidelines for all bilateral development agencies for resettlement in development projects.

These guidelines are quite consistent with the Bank's policies, which were used as the model for their preparation, and will allow all donors to speak with one voice on these matters. I attach a copy of this document for your information.

Finally, with regard to sustainability, the Bank is moving beyond the project approach to environmental management by integrating environmental concerns in its economic and sector work. Country economic strategies and National Environmental Action Plans are two important tools for bringing about such integration. In addition, it is contemplated that beyond the pilot phase, a stronger linkage between the Global Environment Facility's operations, and country priorities and strategies would be developed. In that way, national efforts towards environmentally sound and sustainable development would simultaneously contribute to regional and global environmental improvements.

Thank you again for raising your concerns with me. I value the constructive inputs that you and your colleagues make to the discussion of these environmental matters of importance to us all.



Thank you for your letter of December 30, and for your commendations on the Bank's new environmental policies, particularly those on Environmental Assessment and on Forests.

Now that we have adopted a number of important environmental policies, I agree with you that the next phase is to foster more effective implementation of those policies. I have made this clear in the Bank, and believe that results will be forthcoming in due course. As you know, changes in a large and complex organization such as the World Bank are not realized overnight. The policies are being phased in with due deliberative speed however.

This brings me to my second response. I am aware that the Environmental Assessment summaries your colleagues have reviewed are not ideal. That is to be expected. They are the first to be released under the old (1989) Environmental Assessment policy, and will improve over time. This trend will accelerate as the provisions of the new (1991) EA policy are phased in.

With regard to your query on energy efficiency, the Bank in fact devotes more attention to end-use efficiency and conservation than the two percent of energy lending quoted in your letter. Most Bank energy projects contain various components to this end, many of which involve relatively small investments. The Bank also finances substantial amounts of technical assistance for end-use efficiency. In addition, the Bank exerts considerable pressure to improve end-use efficiency through policy conditions for our loans. In particular, virtually all energy loans carry conditions for energy pricing in order to improve end-use efficiency. End-use efficiency is addressed in the Power Sector Policy Paper and is the specific subject of a complementary paper being prepared on "Energy Efficiency and Conservation in the Developing World."

With regard to your comments on involuntary resettlement, I am pleased to see you and the other signatory organizations appreciate and support the Bank's policies regarding relocation, when it is unavoidable and fully justifiable. We share your concern regarding implementation. We are making major efforts to strengthen supervision and technical assistance to projects with resettlement components, to ensure consistency between policy and project execution. In this regard, you will have heard that we have suspended disbursements and delayed projects recently in order to foster improvements in their resettlement components. You will be pleased to know that, as a result of Bank initiatives, supported strongly by ODA (UK) and by Oxfam, the DAC/OECD have adopted formal guidelines for all bilateral development agencies for resettlement in development projects.

These guidelines are quite consistent with the Bank's policies, which were used as the model for their preparation, and will allow all donors to speak with one voice on these matters. I attach a copy of this document for your information.

Finally, with regard to sustainability, the Bank is moving beyond the project approach to environmental management by integrating environmental concerns in its economic and sector work. Country economic strategies and National Environmental Action Plans are two important tools for bringing about such integration. In addition, it is contemplated that beyond the pilot phase, a stronger linkage between the Global Environment Facility's operations, and country priorities and strategies would be developed. In that way, national efforts towards environmentally sound and sustainable development would simultaneously contribute to regional and global environmental improvements.

Thank you again for raising your concerns with me. I value the constructive inputs that you and your colleagues make to the discussion of these environmental matters of importance to us all.

LENDING ALLOCATION REVIEW

Objectives

The purpose of the Lending Allocation Review (LAR) is to ensure that the medium-term IBRD and IDA lending programs, for individual countries and in the aggregate, reflect approved country assistance strategies, including risk management concerns. The LAR is conducted annually and covers four years: the current fiscal year and the next three years.

The LAR draws on approved country strategies, the annual risk management and portfolio review, and the lending scenarios for the current and next year in the current business plans. In turn, the LAR will be the basis for preparing business plans for the next year, including a new three-year lending perspective, and for the Bank's borrowing program.

Process Sequence and Responsibilities

The Vice President, Financial Policy (FPRVP), under the overall guidance of the responsible Managing Director (Mr. Sandstrom), manages the annual Lending Allocation Review. The LAR follows the Annual Portfolio and Risk Management Review so that country notes, performance assessments and other material prepared for the Portfolio Review can also be used for the LAR. The Annual Portfolio and Risk Management Review is normally done before the Annual Meetings while the LAR is normally done afterwards so that discussions held during the Meetings can be reflected in the allocations. FPR, in consultation with PBD, issues a detailed schedule and guidelines for the annual LAR.

The LAR is based on, inter alia, assessments of country performance and risk for all active IDA and IBRD borrowers. On the basis of the current assessments for each country, the RVP sends a memorandum to FPRVP (with copies to DECVP, OSPVP and PBD for their review and comments). This memorandum should validate or update the IBRD and/or IDA lending level in the current Business Plan, or, if more recent, the latest CSP or country strategy updating note. The memorandum also should identify those countries for which economic performance or external circumstances have "triggered" lending significantly above or below the approved base case lending program, but still within the approved lending range. On an exceptional basis, Regions may also identify cases which warrant lending outside the approved range; such proposals require revisiting the approved country assistance strategy and should be accompanied by an updating note.

In the case of IDA countries, DEC determines the country performance ratings, taking into account both economic management and poverty reduction performance. After consulting with the Regions and OSP, DEC

recommends performance ratings to FPR, with a copy to the RVPs, OSP and PBD. After resolving any remaining differences of views, in consultation with the Office of the President if necessary, FPR uses the country performance ratings, together with other allocation criteria (population, per capita income, etc.) to compute the normative IDA allocation (the "norm") for each IDA borrower.

For all active borrowers, FPR, in consultation with DEC, also reviews the regional submissions for their consistency with the approved CSPs, concentrating on the justification provided for activating "triggers".

FPRVP summarizes the updated lending estimates for the current fiscal year and prepares a recommendation for the three-year lending allocation for each IBRD and IDA borrower, by Region. The proposed allocation is sent to the RVPs, OSP, DEC, PBD, and CFS for comment. After taking account of comments received, FPR sends the recommendation to the Office of the President under cover of a brief memorandum indicating major changes from previous lending programs and any issues to be decided. After consulting within the Office of the President, the responsible Managing Director convenes any meeting necessary to discuss outstanding issues and distributes a memorandum with the final lending allocations.

The lending allocations are to be decided by end-October, so that they can be taken into account in the guidelines for the preparation of next year's business plans.

During the course of the year, RVPs have authority to adjust country lending programs, up or down, within the limits established in approved country strategies, as amended by any updating notes (see the President's circular of December 2, 1991 regarding the procedure for preparation and review of country strategy papers). For IDA borrowers, any changes in a country's lending program which involve a significant departure from the established country allocation should be discussed with FPR and the Office of the President before such changes are discussed with the country.

Thank you for your kind letter of December 6, 1991. I appreciate your good wishes and look forward to continued productive collaboration between our two institutions.

I agree that population assistance must increase to meet the unmet demand for family planning, and to meet the needs of the increasing numbers of young people entering their childbearing years. Bank lending for human resource development is the fastest growing component of its lending program, increasing from about 3 to 17 percent of total commitments over the past five years to a level of \$3.8 billion in FY91. The FY91 lending figure of \$351 million for family planning assistance alone is the highest since the Bank began lending for population, but perhaps even more importantly, the number of projects with a population component has increased substantially. We fully expect these trends to continue over the next decade.

We have also embarked on an effort within the Bank to provide information and training to senior management and economists on population issues, to keep them up to date and to better equip them for the important process of dialogue with governments. As you note in your letter, there is much that needs to be done. I am hopeful that together our institutions can accomplish even more in realizing our shared objectives.

Thanks for your recent letter about the Bank's work on poverty. I know you both are very knowledgeable about the subject and so I am especially appreciative of your comments.

You are correct that I believe that the path the Bank has been following, with your encouragement, is correct. Poverty reduction is the Bank's overarching objective, and I am anxious that we assure that our words are matched by our deeds. The Bank has a long and productive record in this area, but we all know that the problem of absolute poverty has become worse, not better, in many areas of the world in the last decade. We are determined to make the 1990s a major period for poverty reduction, difficult as that will be.

As you noted, I have placed major emphasis on effective implementation, based on the accumulated wisdom of Bank staff and our many colleagues in both developing countries and the industrialized nations. The Executive Board recently gave strong support to two additional draft documents which reflect this broad experience and build on the 1990 World Development Report and the strategy paper that followed, i.e., the Poverty Handbook and the Operational Directive on Poverty.

These documents will guide staff and our partners in the operational work that must be at the heart of our poverty reduction program. The new structure introduced December 1 - including the elimination of a layer of bureaucracy and the creation of two new regional vice-presidencies - is designed to assure that effective implementation occurs. The new Sector and Operational Policy vice-presidency will provide technical help to the regions and monitor developments on the many cross-cutting issues which comprise the poverty reduction strategy, including the all-important effort to strengthen participation by the poor in decision making about development activities that affect them. We will be reporting regularly to the Board and, as requested, to the Development Committee, on the results of our poverty reduction program.

Country poverty assessments are an important base point of the strategy. Sixteen have been completed already, one-third will be finished by next July, and nearly all will be done in the next 2 1/2 years. These assessments will form the basis for recommended country actions, including consideration of

We shall be pleased to participate in the January 22/23 conference on assistance to the former Soviet Republics. Our Managing Director, responsible for Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Republics, Mr. Ernest Stern, will head our delegation since I, to my regret, have a prior commitment in Europe on these dates. He will be joined by Mr. Wilfried Thalwitz, Vice President in charge of operations in this region, and Mr. Russell Cheetham, Director of the Department concerned.

As you know, we started a technical assistance program to the Soviet Union, funded by a \$30 million allocation from World Bank resources. One of the major activities is a study of food production and distribution, conducted jointly with other international organizations and a group of counterparts from various republics. The objective is to define the steps necessary to increase marketable production in the next harvest season, including the distribution system. We have briefed the G-7 on the work at their recent meeting in London. We believe that a summary of the work to date will be of interest to the working group on food, even though the focus of this group will be on the immediate requirements for this winter, including imports. Mr. Michael Gould, who is managing the food sector study for us, would participate for us in the working group on food.

We also are well advanced in work on the energy and housing sector, focused principally on the Russian Federation. We would be pleased to share our information with the working groups on these subjects. Mr. Charles McPherson, who is in charge of the energy study and Mr. Bertrand Renaud, who is in charge of the work on the housing sector, would represent us in these two groups.

Having been engaged in the systematic planning of, and providing technical assistance to the former Soviet Republics for several months, and with a functioning office in Moscow, there is a good deal of information to share with the conference participants as they plan their future assistance. A working group on this topic will be very useful to develop a better understanding of what is required and how it might best be delivered. Our own experience suggests that any analogy to technical assistance to lower-income developing countries would be misleading, particularly for the larger western republics. There is a large body of technically capable staff. They need, of course, to learn to operate in a market-oriented system which emphasizes efficiency and accountability. The absence of the framework for such a system, including the legal, regulatory and administrative framework, and the lack of managerial experience in a market-oriented system at the enterprise, local administration and republic level, define the type of assistance needed most urgently.

In addition, there is at this stage, limited patience with large numbers of foreign advisors, particularly if they cannot provide very practical and directly useful assistance in creating and strengthening local institutions, including those coordinating technical assistance. While technical assistance should be coordinated carefully to avoid duplication and conflicting advice, the requirements for more than 15 new countries will be very large. Reliance on local institutions and emphasis on effective coordination within individual republics will, in our view, be more useful than trying to define comparative advantage in the abstract for the many bilateral donors and international organizations interested in, and able to provide the required personnel. I have asked Mr. Russell Cheetham, who has managed our technical assistance program from its inception to represent us in the working group on technical assistance.

We will do everything we can to help assure a successful meeting. The political and economic transformation of the former Soviet Republics is of immense scope and depth. It requires a common effort to help assure that this transition -- difficult though it will be -- will also be as smooth and peaceful as possible.

Thanks for your recent letter about the Bank's work on poverty. I know you both are very knowledgeable about the subject and so I am especially appreciative of your comments.

You are correct that I believe that the path the Bank has been following, with your encouragement, is correct. Poverty reduction is the Bank's overarching objective, and I am anxious that we assure that our words are matched by our deeds. The Bank has a long and productive record in this area, but we all know that the problem of absolute poverty has become worse, not better, in many areas of the world in the last decade. We are determined to make the 1990s a major period for poverty reduction, difficult as that will be.

As you noted, I have placed major emphasis on effective implementation, based on the accumulated wisdom of Bank staff and our many colleagues in both developing countries and the industrialized nations. The Executive Board recently gave strong support to two additional draft documents which reflect this broad experience and build on the 1990 World Development Report and the strategy paper that followed, i.e., the Poverty Handbook and the Operational Directive on Poverty.

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Country poverty assessments are an important base point of the strategy. Sixteen have been completed already, one-third will be finished by next July, and nearly all will be done in the next 2 1/2 years. These assessments will form the basis for recommended country actions, including consideration of

targets for key social indicators and a phased program of policy reforms, public expenditures and institutional development. Lending decisions will reflect the strength of government commitment to and implementation of poverty reduction policies and programs, and adjustment lending will be made a more active part of the overall strategy.

Each of these areas of special interest to you are addressed in the various recent core documents on poverty reduction. I believe we are on the right track, and I hope that Bread for the World and other knowledgeable groups will continue to help us do a better job. There can be no more important objective. We know that the citizens of our member governments and the Bank itself need all the help we can get to overcome the problems poverty brings. I hope we can continue to count on Bread for the World to help push the effort closer to success.

We deeply appreciate your strong reaffirmation of poverty reduction as the World Bank's "overarching objective." We also applaud your intention to focus on implementation in order to bring the Bank's operational work more into line with stated policies.

Bread for the World includes 44,000 U.S. citizens who lobby their representatives in Congress on issues that are important to hungry people. Both of us joined Bread for the World this fall. One of us, David Beckmann, was on the World Bank's staff for 15 years. The other, Nancy Alexander, has been chairing a coalition of NGOs that monitor the Bank's impact. This coalition is now working to influence congressional oversight hearings and the U.S. position in IDA-10 negotiations.

We believe that you, personally, need to oversee two lines of action to make the Bank more effective in reducing poverty.

The first is follow-up to The World Development Report 1990. Shortly after its publication, the board decided that the Bank should do in-depth poverty assessments in all active borrowing countries at least once every three years. The board also committed the Bank to shift lending from governments with inadequate policies to governments that pursue policies along the lines which the WDR 1990 recommended.

How many poverty assessments have been done since the board adopted this policy? What evidence is there that lending has indeed

shifted from governments that are less pro-poor to governments that are more pro-poor? Your streamlining of the Bank's bureaucracy has weakened key units that were centers of work on poverty issues; will these centers be reinvigorated?

Second, we urge you to encourage efforts toward increased <u>public</u> accountability for the Bank and Bank-supported activities.

The democratic revolution that has swept the world demonstrates the power of citizen concern about governments that are ineffective or captive to small elites. If the Bank encourages popular participation in decisions about Bank-financed projects, developing-country citizens will help make its projects effective. Such mechanisms can be designed specifically to allow low-income people to have their say.

Increased public access to information about the Bank in the industrial countries will also tend to tone up the Bank's effectiveness. What public support there is in the industrial countries for foreign aid is motivated by concern about poverty and environmental problems. Given today's budget constraints and growing concern about domestic problems, citizens in the industrial countries will insist that Bank-financed activities indeed reduce poverty. The Bank is subject to many competing pressures, and increased public accountability will strengthen incentives for the Bank to remain focused on its basic purpose.

In our former capacities, we were both involved in the Bank's program to encourage popular participation. Messrs. Qureshi and Thalwitz were the patrons of this effort. Who in the Bank's top management is now responsible for it? It will need active support from top management.

Since an Operational Directive on Poverty will be finalized in the next few weeks, we are attaching some suggestions for it.

We would appreciate an opportunity to meet with you briefly to discuss these concerns in person.

Suggestions for the World Bank's Operational Directive on Poverty

from Bread for the World

First, we recommend that borrowing countries should be asked to develop poverty reduction strategies and action plans. Such strategies and plans, developed with input from the nongovernmental sector, would identify those specific goals for poverty reduction which the country seeks to attain with internal as well as external resources. Such plans would also specify strategies and timetables for the achievement of these goals. Such action was suggested by the autumn 1990 Development Committee communique: "The objective of poverty reduction would be most effectively achieved through the adoption of national development strategies." The communique also "encouraged all parties concerned to discuss their poverty reduction approaches, programs and goals in the framework of their policy dialogue."

The board paper, <u>Assistance Strategies to Reduce Poverty</u>, recommends that "periodic assessments of the consistency between government policy and the reduction of poverty should be prepared and presented in country economic reports or similar documents." Our concern is that the Bank urge borrowing governments themselves to develop poverty reduction plans or to include explicit anti-poverty plans in more wide-ranging statements of development policy. Policy dialogue between borrowers and the Bank will be more fruitful if it is based on the borrower's own anti-poverty plans, not just the Bank's assessment.

Second, we are concerned that there be sufficient guidelines in the OD on popular participation. The WDR 1990 recognized that popular participation contributes significantly to the prospects for project success. In line with this, the Poverty Handbook offers a salient recommendation to "involve beneficiary groups in project/program design and implementation." We stress four points. (a) We urge that the OD specify the need for beneficiary involvement in the design stage. (b) We think the issue of popular participation and public accountability should be addressed in the appraisal reports for all lending operations. (c) We hope that the OD recognizes that it is a significant departure for the Bank to involve beneficiaries in planning and carrying out not just projects, but programs. We applaud this step and hope that the OD gives sufficient guidance to task managers as to how this can be done. (d) The OD could draw

from Chapter 7 of the Environmental Impact Assessment Sourcebook and from initial results of the Bank's popular participation learning process for advice on how to promote popular participation.

Third, we suggest that reducing costs and increasing eventual benefits to poor people be an important criterion in designing adjustment policies. We welcome the guidance to task managers to insure that structural adjustment does not hurt the poor. But the Bank's own studies have shown that little has so far been done to reduce the social cost of adjustment beyond add-on, temporary social funds. The OD should include specific, recommended methodologies by which the task managers would ascertain the projected impact of alternative adjustment policies.

Fourth, we urge you to include male/female literacy among the "priority poverty indicators." (Poverty Handbook, p. 110) As Mr. Preston said in Bangkok, "Nations thrive only with a healthy, literate, well-trained population. Efficient investment in education, especially for females, and health care systems must have the highest priority."
