I now have underway that portion of the ICAC long-term trends study which deals with the effect of textile machinery capacity on consumption of fibers. I find your country-by-country data on per caput fiber consumption levels of much value for the paper. However, I wonder if you would be good enough to help me on the following questions:

- 1. Are data for 1958 now available? If so, could I get a copy? They need not be in finished form. A photostat of a worksheet would suffice.

This is a preliminary note on the two subjects in the FAO Conference which interest us. I will write at greater length when all the papers, which were not ready when I left, get to me.

1) Freedom from Hunger

The debate on this must have been a great disappointment to Sen. Nobody, of course, was prepared to come out in favour of hunger but speaker after speaker, while "welcoming the Director General's imaginative proposals", thought that the campaign should be part of FAO's regular programme and, more particularly, should not require any additional funds. (The US and UK were naturally very outspoken on this point).

Sen, reasonably enough from his point of view, observed that if the campaign could be carried out successfully from FAO's normal budget there would have been no need for such elaborate preparations.

As debate went on and on and each of the more garrulous and hungry nations had its lengthy say, another day had to be allotted to it. I had gone before that day arrived.

2) The Mediterranean Development Project

The reception for this item was very different - quite surprisingly warm. The US sounded a note of warning - but mostly about starting without adequate preparation. But all the non-Mediterranean Europeans were welcoming and some even enthusiastic. The UK for instance offered an amendment to

the resolution calling for something to be done which recommended all and sundry to rush to the help of such a fine scheme.

Again more time had to be found and I left before any conclusion.

It is not easy to see quite what happens next. I have not ventured into the country studies but I think it is fairly certain that not enough work has been done anywhere to form the basis of a programme - let alone a series of coordinated programmes.

Meanwhile, I am told, each of the experts is becoming the advocate or even field commander for projects he has recommended in the region or country he studied and is trying to get a head start by putting pressure on the local government. (E.g. Baade persuaded the Turks to get started on one of his pet schemes which was not far from a project of the European Productivity Agency. Thank you for your two letters from Rome about Enrique's trip and Toynbee's speech. We have had cordial letters back from the heads of the U.N. agencies in Europe welcoming Enrique's trip and I think it is likely to do a lot to improve the atmosphere.

I took the liberty of quoting what you had to say about the Toynbee lecture to Gene and the Vice Presidents. All the straws seem to indicate an attempt on the part of the Vatican to change its policy in regard to birth control if only some formula can be found to do it unobtrusively. It would certainly be a wonderful thing if introduction of the "pill", which I am told may not be too far off, could be accompanied by a papal blessing.

The IDA negotiations are proceeding quite rapidly and, on the whole, satisfactorily. The U.S. is really taking a pretty bad licking on most of the issues and it is not doing so entirely gracefully, but the end result will be a better charter, more rapidly consummated, than I had thought possible.



My dear Minister,

You may recall that the Twenty-Ninth Session of the FAO Council, held in October last year, welcomed the basic objectives of my tentative proposals for a world-wide campaign designed to focus public attention on the continuing problem of hunger and to mobilize national and international efforts towards its solution. Despite the increasing efforts of national governments and international organizations, the spectre of near-famine and undernourishment still continues to haunt many parts of the world. One reason for this is the increase in world population, which is now growing at a rate faster than ever before. From 1650 it took 200 years for the world population to be doubled and from 1850 a hundred years. During the first half of this century, in spite of the two devastating wars, the rise was 60 per cent. At the present rate of growth, the world population will double itself during the second half of this century. How precarious is the balance between the rise of income and productivity on the one hand and the mounting needs of fast growing populations in the relatively less developed countries on the other, becomes evident if one analyses the trends in levels of living of their rural populations. Although post-war gross production of food has increased, per caput consumption in several underdeveloped countries has not reached pre-war levels; in other words, levels of income and food supply are hardly keeping pace with population growth. And yet it is technically possible for the underdeveloped countries to double or treble their agricultural production. Japan, for instance, produces four to five times more rice from the same type of land than most of the South East Asian countries. This Japan does by better irrigation and drainage, by propagating better seeds, by using fertilizers in a scientific way, by systematic control of pests and diseases and by better marketing arrangements. memorals veh sasdT

2. It is clear that nothing less than heroic efforts will be needed if all the people of the world are to be provided with food adequate in quality and have quantity for a healthy and vigorous life. Such efforts will be needed not only in the direction of increasing agricultural production and income, but also in that of securing better distribution of food and general purchasing power, especially in underdeveloped countries. These will call for a wider use of scientific methods, more purposeful reorientation of investment resources, and better adaptation of the institutional factors which now stand in the way of progress. The problem of hunger provides a focus to all such efforts and, since it lies at the heart of FAO's work, the basic purpose of the Freedom-From-Hunger Campaign was enunciated as the fulfilment of the task set out in FAO's Constitution. There was, however, no illusion about such a task being either simple in character or easy to accomplish. The very dimension and complexity of the problem of hunger prompted me, from the very outset, to seek the cooperation of governments, the United Nations and the Specialized Agencies, non-governmental organizations and humanitarian foundations in articulating the campaign.

- The Council, in 1958, welcomed the proposal for such a campaign as an appropriate opportunity for a rededication of the Organization to the objectives which inspired its establishment. The Council appointed an Ad Hoc Committee of nine Member Nations to work with me in preparing more detailed proposals for the consideration of the June 1959 Session of the Council. The Ad Hoc Committee made a valuable contribution towards sharpening the outlines of my original proposals. It suggested that the campaign should be spread over a period of time, rather than be tied up with the concept of a "Year", so that remedial action initiated during the campaign could be assured of continuity, and that information and educational activities should be supplemented by action programs. The Committee felt that the campaign should consist essentially of an intensification of effort in those fields of work where FAO has the responsibility for providing guidance at the international level. Leadership would, therefore, rest with FAO, and the overall control of campaign policies and operation, in respect of activities undertaken by FAO, must rest with the FAO Conference. The Committee supported the proposal for a World Food Congress in 1963, but felt that the Congress need not in itself be an inter-governmental conference, but should be held in close association with the 1963 session of the FAO Conference which should, as originally suggested, also be specially dedicated to the commemoration of the Hot Springs anniversary. The Committee suggested that the campaign should also receive special attention at the 1961 and 1965 sessions of the Conference, the latter being the twentieth anniversary of the founding of FAO and therefore a specially appropriate occasion for reviewing the progress made towards achieving the overall objectives of the campaign. has notinging restleted yet asob magsl and by came fertilizers in a scientific way,
- 4. These developments were reported to the Administrative Committee on Coordination (ACC) at Geneva in April this year. The tentative list of basic studies to be prepared was discussed, and the Secretary-General of the United Nations, and the executive heads of ILO, UNESCO, WHO, IAEA and WMO expressed their willingness to cooperate fully, within their resources, subject to

approval of their governing bodies. It was agreed that the campaign was to be regarded as a cooperative effort, under the general leadership of FAO.

- 5. The Economic and Social Council, at its Twenty-Eighth Session held at Geneva in July this year, adopted a resolution endorsing the general plan of the campaign, and inviting the United Nations and the Specialized Agencies to continue to cooperate in the project to ensure its success and effective execution. It also recommended that member governments of the cooperating agencies, and non-governmental organizations accredited to them, should participate in the project in an appropriate manner.
- 6. The FAO Council, at its June 1959 Session, gave unanimous support to the main lines for conducting the campaign as recommended by its own Ad Hoc Committee on the basis of my suggestions. The Council also asked for a definite plan to be prepared taking into account the Council and Committee recommendations for submission to the Conference. The plan prepared in pursuance of this Council directive is now being circulated to member governments as a Conference document.
- In view of the general consensus of opinion that the campaign should consist essentially of an intensification of effort in those fields of work where FAO has the responsibility for providing guidance at the international level, it was essential to see to what extent the FAO regular program could be readjusted to support the campaign. This needed a thorough review of FAO's existing lines of work. The drawing up of the Forward Appraisal in terms of the ECOSOC Resolution 665 C of July 1957, provided an opportunity to make just this kind of review and the opportunity was fully utilized. The needs of the campaign and FAO's regular activities over the next five years (Forward Appraisal period) were brought into a common focus, and the question resolved itself into this: given a minimal rate of expansion over the next five years, how should the additional resources be used in the different spheres of FAO activities in order to deal with the basic problem of our time - the problem of food supply for the rapidly growing world population? It would be evident therefore that the Forward Appraisal and planning for the Freedom-From-Hunger Campaign have both been guided by the same objectives and have influenced each other. In drawing up the campaign plans, we have specially taken note of the suggestions and recommendations made by the Ad Hoc Committee, the Council, the ECOSOC and the ACC.
- 8. It would be appropriate to give you at this stage a brief summary of the various aspects of the campaign plan as it has now emerged. We considered several titles for the campaign, and it became clear that no one title would be

equally expressive in all languages. I therefore recommended "Freedom-From-Hunger Campaign" as the English title, since it best satisfied the various criteria suggested and yet retained the emotional appeal necessary to attract enthusiasm and active support. "Hunger" in this title stands for real hunger as well as chronic malnutrition and dietary deficiencies.

To achieve the objectives of the campaign, three broad categories of activities are contemplated: (1) information and educational; (2) research, and (3) national action programs. The information and educational programs would include studies and investigations directed towards securing and disseminating better information regarding (i) what needs to be done to combat hunger and malnutrition; (ii) what are the technical and economic possibilities of increasing production and improving distribution; and (iii) how can the problems of hunger and malnutrition actually be tackled by the utilization of technical and economic knowledge and resources now available. The ultimate aim of such studies would be to fill gaps in knowledge and provide a necessary basis for action programs. These studies will be prepared, individually or cooperatively, by the international agencies competent in each sector of the field and will be supplemented by national studies prepared by individual governments and national organizations. Such information will help the world-wide effort to awaken interest in the various approaches to the solution of the problem. Under this activity, FAO will publish the Third World Food Survey and will have responsibility for preparing other background studies on (1) Possibilities of increasing agricultural production; (2) National and international arrangements for food distribution; (3) Status and intensity of national efforts to improve and increase food production; (4) Training in nutrition; (5) Nutrition and working efficiency (jointly with WHO and ILO); and (6) Animal disease and human health (jointly with WHO). UNESCO will contribute background studies on 1) Needs of less developed countries for trained manpower in their economic development (jointly with U.N., ILO and FAO); 2) Magnitude of national educational and training efforts (jointly with ILO and FAO); and 3) Discussion guides for the campaign at adult and school levels. United Nations publications will deal with 1) Population and food supplies (jointly with FAO and possibly ILO); 2) Raising the buying power for food by economic development; and 3) Status of national efforts to speed economic development and thus raise food buying power. ILO will prepare studies on 1) Hunger in relation to purchasing power of workers; and 2) Action of organized groups of people, such as cooperative and welfare societies, in promoting freedom from hunger. WHO will contribute a paper on 'Nutrition and Health' in cooperation with FAO, and the World Meteorological Organization will produce a study on 'Weather and Food', also in cooperation with FAO. The foregoing list of studies represents what has so far been

tentatively agreed between FAO and the other cooperating international organizations. These studies will be most valuable to the National Campaign Committees in developing programs highlighting the special deficiencies and requirements of their respective countries. They will also serve as guides to those who mould public opinion through mass communication media.

- The Research Program will largely be on applied and problemoriented projects. It will be concerned with economic, social and technical problems of agricultural development, with special emphasis on increased and efficient production in agriculture, forestry, and fisheries. The wide scope of the research program will provide opportunities for participation of governments, public and private research agencies and universities, in both economically developed and underdeveloped countries. Undoubtedly most of the research work under the campaign will be conducted by member governments and directed to the solution of local problems. It will range from research on fertilizer use, crop improvement, irrigation and drainage practices, livestock and poultry nutrition and management, and village fuel supply, to farm planning, production credit, food technology, marketing, and the more effective utilization of surplus crops for economic development. Regional problems that may be studied under the research program include control of plant and animal diseases and insects, crop improvement, the improved utilization of range lands, the evaluation and development of fishing resources, and several nutrition problems, including the further development of indices of food consumption. Effective research on these and similar problems often requires a regional approach. Diseases, insects, and soil and climatic conditions do not recognize national boundaries. Other problems are often common to several countries in a region, and collaboration, rather than duplication of research and facilities, yields greater returns. FAO working parties can be useful in the development and execution of such projects. Some types of research will require extensive international collaboration. A thorough study of the causes for the very wide difference in the rate of increase in agricultural production as between countries will only be possible by the cooperation of a number of countries. Likewise, a study of technical assistance in agriculture, with a view to ascertaining the most effective methods, will require the collaboration of host countries and the nations and agencies, both multilateral and bilateral, providing technical assistance.
- 11. National Action Programs will be the heart of the campaign. Only the action programs will provide increased production, improved distribution, and the other things necessary to free the world from hunger. Such programs will, in general, be either of a pilot or demonstration type, or will be devoted to bringing about improvements with respect to a selected problem or an associated group of

problems affecting food supplies and nutrition. Most of the projects will be on some aspect of food production, improvements in nutritive quality, prevention of losses, increased effectiveness in distribution or in stimulating more nutritive food habits and consumption. Projects may, however, be developed on associated social, economic or institutional questions that have a direct bearing on food and nutrition. Where appropriate, under FAO guidance, projects may be developed for two or more countries or even on a wider geographic base. Instances of specific projects contemplated under this category are: (1) national food reserve stocks and facilities; (2) fertilizer pool for demonstration purposes; and (3) the World Seed Campaign 1960/61, etc. Countries are expected to launch action projects as, with the progress of the campaign, ideas crystallize and specific needs are seen more clearly. It is to be remembered that the object of the campaign is to accelerate and improve the efforts of governments and peoples so that in the next 15 to 20 years the problem of hunger will have been brought substantially under control if not effectively eliminated. The individual countries must, therefore, be free to decide which schemes to take up under the campaign. Big schemes such as flood control through better watershed management, river valley development, large-scale drainage and desalinization of land, reforestation and afforestation for soil conservation, to which some countries may give high priority but which they are unable to implement for lack of funds, could be taken up under this campaign if the prospects of finding the necessary resources under the impetus of the campaign appear to be assured.

12. In regard to organizational arrangements, it is proposed that the major responsibility for leading and planning the campaign would be carried by the Director-General of FAO under the overall guidance of the Conference and Council. The Director-General would be assisted by a Special Campaign Committee consisting of representatives of member governments. In addition, an Advisory Committee of representatives of major cooperating international nongovernmental organizations would be set up to help the Director-General in the development of the campaign and to coordinate their activities under the campaign. Each country is expected to establish a Freedom-From-Hunger Campaign Committee of its own. This Committee would help plan and stimulate national and local campaign activities, and coordinate activities started by other domestic agencies or organizations. In 1963 national meetings should be held by spring or summer so that their conclusions and recommendations might be ready for the World Food Congress to be held at FAO Headquarters later that year, and for the FAO Conference immediately following. The national meetings and the World Food Congress are viewed primarily as meetings where representatives of nongovernmental organizations and interested scientific bodies would discuss their own ideas, conclusions and recommendations with the public officials, both

national or international, assisting as a Secretariat. In the FAO Conference, in ECOSOC, and in other governmental or inter-governmental legislative bodies or meetings, these recommendations would be re-examined with a view to judging how best the lessons learned could be put into practice.

- 13. Considerable thought was given to my proposals for the financing of the campaign by the FAO Council as well as the Program and Finance Committees. It was agreed that although FAO's Regular Program of Work would play an important part in the campaign, it would be necessary, in order to give the campaign the desired breadth, to establish a Special Campaign Fund to which various organizations, foundations, private individuals and governments would be invited to subscribe. The costs of the campaign will fall into two broad heads: (1) staff both at Headquarters and in the Regions, and (2) technical assistance to countries in their research and action programs as well as research undertaken at FAO's request on an international basis. Any estimates of cost at this stage must necessarily be very tentative, but just to give a rough idea I have suggested the figure of \$750,000 a year as an average for five to six years to cover costs under (1) above, and that of \$1 to 1.5 million a year to cover costs under (2). As regards financing these costs, I felt that governments, through voluntary contributions, should bear the cost of the staffing needed for the general organization and running of the campaign, including the overall direction of the educational and information effort; while non-governmental organizations, religious groups, foundations, private individuals and others should be invited to undertake the responsibility for technical assistance. This division of responsibility is logical, though it need not be rigid. To private groups direct assistance to people will have greater appeal, while governments with their experience of the working of FAO will appreciate the extent to which a campaign on this world-wide scale needs to be supported by additional staff.
- As regards securing outside financing, I have not explored the matter in any detail pending formal Conference approval of the campaign. Some tentative consultations, however, have been held, with encouraging results. A number of foundations have expressed their interest in the campaign and their readiness to consider formal requests as soon as they can be submitted. Several non-governmental organizations have indicated that they could raise considerable sums from their members and from the general public. What proportion of such funds they would be willing to turn over to FAO for its central activities has not been discussed. The appeal of the Bishops of West Germany, who had been supplied with my address on the Freedom-From-Hunger Campaign in Rome and other relevant FAO literature, yielded contributions on a single day amounting to nearly eight million dollars. The organization set up to utilize this fund is in contact with FAO. The significance of this German effort is perhaps not so much in

the amount of the contribution raised, which is in itself spectacular, as in the indication of an eager desire on the part of vast masses of people to help their less fortunate brethren transcending all obstacles of race, colour or creed.

- how best the lessons learned could be put into pr In carrying out their research and action projects under the campaign, less developed countries will need external assistance both in technical advisers and in funds for imports of equipment in connection with such projects. Part of this help may be obtained from the technical assistance programs of international organizations, from the United Nations Special Fund, and from international financing institutions. Bilateral aid to individual governments also could be concentrated and oriented to give strength and purpose to the campaign, and could be expanded where needed and possible. The campaign might also provide a stimulus to some donor countries to concentrate their bilateral aid along lines which they are particularly well qualified to furnish and which are at the same time specially appropriate to the purposes of the campaign. Financing for economic development projects is also being provided, in substantial volume, by the use of agricultural surpluses. The quantities supplied may be considerably expanded under the "Food for Peace" plan, which owes its inception to the leadership of President Eisenhower. The Wheat Utilization Committee, set up by the "Food for Peace" conference would, as indicated in its first communiqué, study three types of additional uses: (1) projects to raise consumption among specially deficient groups in the population; (2) projects to aid economic development from national currency funds accruing from surplus sales; and (3) projects to establish food reserves utilizing idle storage facilities or newly constructed ones. The United States has indicated that it proposes to extend this plan to other commodities such as dairy products, and to set up special committees to deal with each of them. It is also hoped that President de Gaulle's interest in a concerted attack on the problem of hunger as a key to world peace, which has found expression on several occasions, will exercise a powerful impact over the whole range of the campaign.
- As stated already, this general plan of the campaign is not a blueprint and has many gaps, many points not defined with precision. This is in the
 very nature of a campaign which has just got beyond the germinating stage. The
 success of a campaign like this, involving governments and peoples, needs above
 all a widely spread feeling of participation, not only in carrying it out but also
 in the formulation of it. During the last few months I have received offers of
 cooperation and participation from a wide variety of organizations, government
 officials and influential organs of public opinion. Such offers will multiply once
 we launch the campaign with the full support of the Conference. As the head of

this world organization, I myself feel convinced that such a campaign is necessary if we are to awaken the world to the perils that beset humanity should the problems of widespread hunger and want remain unsolved in this otherwise triumphant age brought about by the spectacular advance of science and technology.

Dear Norman:

I am writing in response to your letter of August 4 with further reference to your proposed fertilizer survey.

I am embarrassed to say that the memorandum by A. K. Sen, entitled "Agricultural Investments: Irrigational Projects versus Fertilizer Factories," of which Dr. Parker was kind enough to give me a copy, has been mislaid and we seem unable to put our hands on another copy of it here. Before giving you a definitive answer on the study you suggest we might make, our Economic Staff would like to look at the Sen memorandum. Would you be good enough, therefore, to have another copy sent to us, addressed to Dr. Maurice Perkins.

I should add that our preliminary reaction towards the suggested study is not altogether affirmative. As FAO itself would certainly be the first to point out, the relative priority of an investment in an irrigation project and an investment in a fertilizer factory depends upon the specific circumstances of the country concerned, particularly the character of its resources; indeed, water and fertilizer are frequently so interrelated as factors of production that it is difficult to give one priority over the other. This makes us fearful that any meaningful study of the subject might involve a tremendous amount of research which we would probably not be in a position to undertake.

However, I think the best course would be to let our Economic Staff take a look at the Sen memorandum and for Dr. Perkins then to talk the whole project over with your people when he comes to join the briefing sessions for the fertilizer team in the middle of September.

Dear Karl:

Thank you for your letter of August 6 with the welcome news that David Owen has made a Contingency Fund allocation to cover the 1959 costs of Kenneth Jones.

My news is not quite so encouraging. We received yesterday a message from Australia to the effect that the Department of Agriculture there would not release McKay. In view of the time factor, we feel that we now have no alternative but to go ahead with Guy Miller, despite your quite understandable reservations. In his favor, are very strong recommendations from a number of people and the fact that he does know Pakistan. We have been in touch with him and he is to come to Washington in another 10 days or two weeks for interviews and, if all goes well, will be on duty in Karachi by October 1.

One other news note on this project. We have been searching for a public administration expert to do a three- to four-month stint in Pakistan on administrative and organizational problems for the Commission. We have now interested a man who is reputed to be very good in his field, Fordyce Luikhart, who is now Director of Administration for the Federal Aviation Agency and who has had wide experience in public administration posts, including one spell with ECA in Greece. Luikhart would like to go but he has not yet received clearance from his boss, General Quesada. We may be able to arrange to have the Ford Foundation spensor Luikhart's visit but, failing that, we will do so ourselves.

Assuming all goes well with both Miller and Luikhart, I think all loose ends of the project have been tied up for the time being. We certainly appreciate all the help that you and your

associates in FAO have given us.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE TENTH SESSION OF THE CONFERENCE (Proposals drawn up by the Council at its Thirty-First Session, Rome, 15-24 June 1959)

Date of Session

1. The Council decided that the Tenth Session of the Conference should open on Saturday 31 October 1959. In accordance with the precedent set at the Eighth Session of the Conference (1955) and at the Winth Session of the Conference (1957), a Saturday has been selected in order to enable the Conference to dispose of opening procedures before the end of the week.

McDougall Memorial Lecture

- 2. In accordance with a decision made by the Council in October 1958 establishing a Memorial Lecture for the purpose of honouring the memory of the late Frank McDougall (Report of the Twenty-Ninth Council Session, paragraphs 4 to 8), the Director-General reported that, in consultation with the special committee appointed by the Council, he had selected Professor ARNOLD J. TOYNBERT to deliver the first McDougall Memorial Lecture.
- 3. The Council approved this choice.

Provisional Agenda for the Session

- 4. The Provisional Agenda as approved by the Council has been circulated (C 59/1-FIRST DRAFT).
- In this connection the Council would wish to recall that the Conference in 1957 had before it a report from the Ad Hoc Committee on the Structure of the Organization pointing out that the Conference, as the supreme body of the Organization which meets for three weeks only at biennial intervals, should be able to devote full attention to major issues of policy, and should not therefore deal with matters of secondary importance whenever this can be avoided. The Ad Hoc Committee accordingly suggested that the agenda for Conference sessions should be made as specific as possible. The Council had this object in mind when drawing up the provisional agenda and has sought to focus policy issues under its relevant sections, while at the same time keeping it within manageable proportions.
- 6. It may be appropriate to remind Member Governments of the fact that, in accordance with Rulo II-5 of the Rules Adopted by the Conference, they may, not less than 30 days before the opening of the Session (i.e. 1 October 1959), request the Director-General to include specific items on the Conference Agenda. Any such proposals will be circulated by the Director-General not less than 20 days prior to the opening of the Session.

Guiding Lines for Planning the Session

- 7. The Council, having carefully considered proposals for the organization of future Sessions submitted in particular by the Austrian Minister of Agriculture, concluded that no major change should be introduced into the arrangements for the Session. It was, however, desirable that the Program of Work and the level of the Budget for the ensuing biennium be adopted at an earlier date than in the past. For that purpose the Council agreed that the usual Technical Committees should begin their meetings earlier than in the past, and in fact as early as the beginning of the first week, in order to permit Commission II to complete its work by the end of the second week. In this way time will be left during the remainder of the third week to complete the work of the Conference, and in particular to reconcile insofar as necessary the Program of Work with the Budget level adopted.
- 8. On the basis of the foregoing, the Council proposed the following general plan:

Saturday 31 October

- Plenary meetings: opening of the Session, appointment of officers, adoption of Agenda, etc.

Monday 2 to Thursday 5 November

- Plenaries for general statements by Heads of Delegations

- Meetings of Commission III

- Organizational Meeting of Commission II (Monday 2 November)
- Meetings of Technical Committees (from Tuesday 3 November)

Friday 6 and Monday 9 November

- Meetings of Commissions I and III - Meetings of Technical Committees

Tuesday 10 to Saturday 14 November

- Meetings of Commissions I, II and III, with priority consideration for matters having, or which might possibly have, budgetary implications for 1960/61.

Monday 16 November

- Plenaries; determination of Budget level and adoption of Program of Work

Tuesday 17 to Friday 20 or Saturday 21 November

- Further meetings of the Commissions, plenaries for Council elections and for adoption of Conference Reports, Closing of Session.
- 9. Under the above plan the schedule for the first two weeks, is very tight, bearing in mind that it is not physically possible to hold more than five simultaneous meetings of Commissions and/or Technical Committees.
- 10. At previous Sessions, the Conference used to appoint a Commission-of-the-Whole for the determination of the Budget level. However, this device now seems unnecessary since the above plan would vest all responsibility for reporting on the Program of Work and Budget with Commission II. Policy decisions on the budget level and on the broad Program of Work would be made on 16 November, by the Conference itself in plenary, on the report of Commission II. If subsequent program readjustment appeared necessary in the light of the Conference policy decisions, these could be made by Commission II. A period of three to four days would be available, i.e. from 17 to 19 or 20 November, for any such reconcilation between the level of the 1960/61 Budget and the Program of Work.

- 3. The Council approved this choice.

Provisional Agenda for the Session

- 4. The Provisional Agenda as approved by the Council has been circulated (C 59/1-FIRST DRAFT).
- In this connection the Council would wish to recall that the Conference in 1957 had before it a report from the Ad Hoc Committee on the Structure of the Organization pointing out that the Conference, as the supreme body of the Organization which meets for three weeks only at biennial intervals, should be able to devote full attention to major issues of policy, and should not therefore deal with matters of secondary importance whenever this can be avoided. The Ad Hoc Committee accordingly suggested that the agenda for Conference sessions should be made as specific as possible. The Council had this object in mind when drawing up the provisional agenda and has sought to focus policy issues under its relevant sections, while at the same time keeping it within manageable proportions.
- 6. It may be appropriate to remind Member Governments of the fact that, in accordance with Rulo II-5 of the Rules Adopted by the Conference, they may, not less than 30 days before the opening of the Session (i.e. 1 October 1959), request the Director-General to include specific items on the Conference Agenda. Any such proposals will be circulated by the Director-General not less than 20 days prior to the opening of the Session.

11. Attention is drawn to the fact that, as the Technical Committees will commence their work on Tuesday 3 November, the delegation's technical advisers should be available as from that date.

CONSIDERATION OF DETAILED ARRANGEMENTS

General Discussion in Plenary

- 12. In conformity with the pattern established in 1957, four days of the first week have been allowed for general statements by Heads of Delegations. In 1957 this proved to be sufficient. However, it had then been agreed that delegates wishing to take part in this general discussion should give in their names to the Secretary-General of the Conference prior to 18.00 hours on the Monday of the first week, by which time the list of speakers was considered as closed.
- 13. The Council recommends that this deadline should again apply.
- 14. It is planned that the McDougall Memorial Lecture referred to in paragraph 2 above would be given in Plenary during this period.
- 15. In addition, if applications for membership are received, the Conference could deal with them during these four days.
- 16. The Council requested the Director-General to make his general statement to Plenary on the morning of Monday 2 November, so as to set the note for the Conference discussion. The Director-General could, at the same time, make general reference to his proposed Program of Work and Budget for the biennium 1960/61.

Commission I

17. The first Commission would, according to precedent, be assigned responsibility for all items listed under Part I of the Agenda "Program Frends and Policy Questions in Food and Agriculture". It would begin consideration of such matters on the morning of Thursday 5 November, and while its work was quite heavy, it should complete its work by Friday 13 November, adopting its Report during the following week.

Commission II and Technical Committees.

- 18. Part II of the Agenda would again be assigned to the Second Commission (Activities and Program of the Organization). As indicated in paragraph 6 above, Commission II would hold an organizational meeting on Monday 2 November at which time the Chairmen of the Program and Finance Committees would report on matters considered by those Committees which had reference to the work of Commission II and of its Technical Committees, and particularly on the Program of Work and Budget for 1960/61. Commission II would then establish its Technical Committees which would meet during the following days.
- 19. The Director-General had suggested that there should now be eleven Technical Committees, each having responsibility for one of the seven technical divisions, the three economics divisions and the Department of Public Relations and Legal Affairs. The Council, however, came to the conclusion that while the

ma 4 mm internal reorganization would justify certain changes and improvements in the work schedule of the Committees, there were strong practical reasons for retaining the former pattern which included the following six Technical Committees: Agriculture Economics Fisheries Forestry Nutrition Information and Publications Services The Technical Committees would consider the following aspects of the technical work of the Organization: Past and Current Activities Proposed Program of Work for 1960/61, including budgetary implications (c) Proposed technical publications for the biennium 1960/61 Long-term trends It is anticipated that twelve half-day meetings of the Technical Committee on Agriculture could be held and between three and five meetings of each of the other Technical Committees. The timetable will be arranged so as to avoid, as far as possible, any concurrent discussion of matters of joint interest in the Committees. A joint meeting of the Technical Committees on Agriculture and Forestry would be held to discuss matters of joint interest to those Committees. One further point must be made in connection with the 1960 World Census of Agriculture. The Conference at its Ninth Session requested the Director-General to report to its Tenth Session on the progress of preparatory work for this Census (Resolution 13/57). The Council did not deem it necessary to insert a special item in the provisional agenda in relation to this report but thought that the Technical Committee on Economics, when considering the work of FAO's Statistical Division, would be the appropriate forum for reviewing work carried out so far in preparing the 1960 World Census. The Technical Committees would report back to Commission II which should, in the Council's view, consider only policy issues raised by the Technical Committees, and should not enter into detailed consideration of technical matters. If this were adhered to it should be possible to adopt all the Technical Committees' Reports in the course of one meeting only. Commission II would also have to consider separately Items 11-14 of the Conference provisional Agenda, appropriate plans being made for it to adopt its report to Plenary on the Program of Work and Budget not later than the morning ; of Saturday 14 November, so that on Monday 16 November the Conference Plenary could determine the level of the budget for 1960/61 and, it is hoped, also reach final decisions regarding the Program of Work. However, as has been pointed out above, if the decisions then reached 25. involved readjustments in the scope of the Program, there would still remain time for Commission II to attend to this problem. In the light of the considerations set out above the tentative time-table of the meetings to be held is appended (Appendix I). Meeting of observers from non-governmental organizations The Council decided that the observers from non-governmental organizations attending the Tenth Conference Session should be invited to attend an informal meeting on the afternoon of Saturday 31 October to comment upon the draft Program of Work for 1960/61. A further meeting of observers from non-governmental organizations will be held during the Conference Session to discuss their participation in the Freedom-from-Hunger Campaign. FAO/59/6/4967

CONCLUSIONS

- 28. To sum up, the Council therefore suggests:
 - that the Tenth Session of the Conference should meet at 10.30 hours on 31 October 1959 and come to an end on or about 21 November;
 - that the Provisional Agenda for the Session, as circulated (C 59/1-FIRST DRAFT) be adopted by the Conference as the Agenda for the Session, taking into consideration any amendments which the Council at its Thirty-Second (October 1959) may find it necessary to make;
 - that the first four days of the Session be reserved for the "General discussion", to provide an opportunity for heads of delegations to make known their views on the policy issues listed in the Provisional Agenda;
 - that the usual three Commissions be established:
 - (i) The Commission on the World Food and Agriculture Situation (Commission I), to consider and report upon all items listed in Part I of the Provisional Agenda, "Program Trends and Policy Questions in Food and Agriculture".
 - (ii) The Commission on the Current and Prospective Activities of the Organization (Commission II), with the task of taking up all Agenda items listed in Part II of the Provisional Agenda, "Activities and Programs of the Organization".
 - (iii) The Commission on Constitutional and Administrative Matters (Commission III), to take up all the constitutional, administrative and financial questions listed in Part III of the Agenda;
 - that the following six Technical Committees be established by the Conference to meet between 3 and 9 November, and to report to Commission II:-

Fisheries
Forestry
Nutrition
Information and Publications Services

AGENDA NOTES AND PROPOSED TIMETABLE ARRANGEMENTS

A. AGENDA NOTES

Item I. Adoption of Provisional Agenda

The items included in the Provisional Agenda are those agreed upon by the Thirty-First Session of the CCP.

Item II. Adoption of Summary Record of Thirty-First Session

The Provisional Summary Record of the Thirty-First Session will be circulated as CCP.59/26. Amendments to the Summary Record received prior to the Thirty-Second Session will be circulated as an Addendum.

Item III. Report of the Thirty-First Session of the Council

An extract from the Report of the Thirty-First Session of the Council, dealing with commodity problems and organizational matters of interest to CCP, is circulated under CCP 59/28.

Item IV. Highlights of the World Agricultural Commodity Situation

An up-to-date summary statement on the World Agricultural Commodity Situation will be prepared for the Conference. Copies will be tabled on the opening of the CCP Session, as requested by the Committee. Copies of the Report on the State of Food and Agriculture will have been circulated some time before the Session.

Item V. Agricultural Surpluses

(a) Ninth Report of the Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus
Disposal

The Committee will have before it the Ninth Report of the Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus Disposal.

(b) Other Intergovernmental Consultations or Actions on Surplus Disposal

Any major developments in work done on surplus disposal and utilization under other intergovernmental auspices, such as the Wheat Utilization Committee recently established in Washington, will be considered under this Item.

Item VI. Dairy Products

The CCP, in considering arrangements for discussions on Dairy Products at its Thirty-Second Session, decided that the Dairy Panel should not be convened in the course of that Session but that instead Dairy Products should be placed on the Committee's Agenda as a main item, with special attention being given to the following subjects:-

(a) National Dairy Policies

Further consideration will be given to the FAO Report on National Dairy Policies (CCP 59/6), as amended in the light of replies from governments. It is hoped to circulate the amended version of the Report some weeks in advance of the Session.

(b) Butter: Possibilities of Future Action

Further consideration will be given to Chapter V of document CCP 59/17 (The Butter Situation). Chapter V deals with "Possibilities of Future Action".

Document CCP 59/17 was before the Committee at its Thirty-First Session and will not be given any further general circulation. Copies can be obtained from the Secretariat on request.

(c) Stimulation of Milk Consumption

Under this heading, the Committee intends to consider the stimulation of milk consumption, especially in areas of low consumption, with special reference to the future of international cooperative action (see also CCP 59/25, Report of Thirty-First Session, June 1959, Section 8, Dairy Products, sub-section (d): International Cooperative Action: Dried Skin Milk).

(d) Review of the Work of the Dairy Panel and Future Arrangements

The Committee agreed when it set up the Dairy Panel in March 1957 that it would be necessary to "review its methods of handling problems relating to dairy products in the light of experience".

Under existing arrangements the Dairy Panel meets during CCP Sessions but not simultaneously with its plenary meetings. This is in part because some delegations are represented by only one individual which makes it impossible or inadvisable to have simultaneous meetings of the Panel and the Plenary. Moreover, under present arrangements the time of dairy experts brought by some delegations especially for the Dairy Panel could not be effectively utilized while the CCP was in session. Largely because of these factors, there was general agreement that existing arrangements had proved unsatisfactory.

The Committee decided that at its Thirty-Second Session consideration should be given to the work of the Dairy Panel during the past two years and to future arrangements for dealing with dairy products.

Item VII. FAO Group on Citrus Fruit - Determination of Terms of Reference

After having given consideration to problems of citrus fruit on previous occasions, the Committee concluded, at its Thirty-First Session, that the problem facing the citrus industry was serious enough to call for action by the CCP. The Committee, therefore, decided to establish an FAO Group on Citrus Fruit, it being understood that the arrangements and terms of reference for the Group would be considered at the Thirty-Second Session of the CCP.

A note setting out draft terms of reference for the consideration of the Committee will be circulated in advance of the Session.

Item VIII. Hard Fibers - Further Consideration of Possible Future Action

After having heard, at its Thirty-First Session, a statement by the Representative of the Republic of the Philippines, drawing attention to the economic importance of abaca (Manila hemp) to his country and the disadvantages of widely fluctuating prices, and reiterating his Government's request for the establishment of a Group for Hard Fibers, the Committee decided that this request should be considered again at its next session when the particular problems attaching to these commodities could be reviewed more thoroughly in the light of the criteria to be followed in the establishment of groups (see also Item X of the Provisional Agenda).

The Committee decided that no new documentation on hard fibers was required for the Thirty-Second Session. A note giving references to earlier CCP documents on hard fibers will be circulated shortly.

Item IX. Other Individual Commodity Problems

(a) Spices - Outline for an FAO Study

The Committee, having noted at its Thirty-First Session that the economic problems of spices had been raised by the chief producing countries on a number of occasions in recent times in various international fora, concluded that lack of information on production, consumption and current price movements for these commodities could at times contribute to excessive price fluctuations and to other manifestations of market instability. It was noted further that although world production of spices was small in volume, it was high in value, and income from exports of spices was of importance in the balance of payments of producing countries.

In view of these factors, the Committee recommended that a comprehensive study be undertaken, within the limits of the financial resources of the Organization, on trends in production, consumption and trade of the major spices, and that consideration should be given to ways for providing more adequate current information in these fields.

An outline for a possible FAO Study on Spices will be presented to the Thirty-Second Session of the Committee.

(b) Any Other Matters

Because of the short time available for discussions during the Thirty-Second Session, no particular provision has been made on the Agenda for reports on any other individual commodity problems. Any urgent matters not otherwise provided for in the Agenda can, however, be raised under this Item.

Item X. Criteria for the Establishment, Supervision and Duration of Subsidiary Bodies of the CCP

The Committee decided to review, in the light of experience and current prospective problems, the existing procedures for the establishment, supervision and duration of subsidiary bodies, with a view to developing some criteria.

At the Committee's request, the Director-General is preparing a working paper setting out the considerations that might be taken into account in this context. The paper will be circulated in advance of the Session.

Item XI. Terms of Reference and Rules of Procedure of Subsidiary Bodies of the CCP

(a) Terms of Reference

The Committee drew up revised Terms of Reference for its subsidiary bodies in the light of the principles laid down and rules adopted at the Ninth Session of the FAO Conference. The revised Terms of Reference.were attached as Annex B to the Report of the Thirty-First Session (CCP 59/25 - CL 31/9). Although no changes of substance have been made in the Terms of Reference as originally laid down by the Committee, it was agreed that delegates might raise any further points their governments wished to make on this matter at the Thirty-Second Session.

(b) Rules of Procedure

The Committee had insufficient time to review the revised rules of procedure provisionally adopted by its subsidiary bodies. To carry out this task, it was agreed that the CCP Working Party on Procedural Matters would remain in existence until the next Session. The Working Party will re-assemble on 21 October, i.e. on the day before the opening of the Thirty-Second Session, to complete their report.

Item XII. Date, Place and Agenda of Thirty-Third Session

In considering future arrangements, the Committee noted that whilst its pre-Conference session in October would inevitably have to concentrate on items requiring immediate attention at that time, the first session in 1960 (Thirty-Third Session) presumably should be held not before late May or June 1960 so as to give sufficient time for work to be undertaken by the Secretariat in the light of decisions taken by the Conference and for the circulation of documents well in advance of the Thirty-Third Session.

As to the Agenda of the Thirty-Third Session, the Committee noted that the further consideration of questions relating to the international coordination of national policies, including the formulation of a set of Principles of Agricultural Price Stabilization and Support Policies, and the status and possible further review of the Principles of Surplus Disposal, might be among the main items of general importance for consideration at that time.

The Committee recognized the problems involved in combining, within the limited time available during any one session, the mandate of carrying out work in many different specific fields, at times on matters of immediate importance, and the need to concentrate and deepen discussion on a few selected topics of outstanding importance. The Committee suggested that, with a view to its consideration of these problems, a working paper outlining the main organizational questions at issue might be prepared for its Thirty-Third Session.

Item XIII. Other Business

In view of the heavy Agenda for its Thirty-Second Session, the Committee decided not to include the special item on Major Developments in Intergovernmental Commodity Consultations and Arrangements since the Thirty-First Session. At the same time it requested a brief paper to be prepared on these matters (see Annex D of the Report of the Thirty-First Session of the CCP). Accordingly, such a paper will be circulated in advance of the Session.

PROPOSED TIMETABLE ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE THIRTY-SECOND SESSION B.

The CCP, at its last Session, decided that its Thirty-Second Session should be convened for a period of approximately five working days immediately prior to the Thirty-Second Session of the FAO Council. With the opening date of the Council Session having since been set for 29 October, the Thirty-Second Session of the CCP will open on 22 October 1959.

FAC says that the only information now available about fertilizer in the Asian area consists of animal statistics of production and consumption. They feel that it would be very useful to make a real study of the fertilizer needs of the countries of the area over the next several years and of the probable increases of fertilizer production resulting from projects now under way or in contemplation. They also want to study the effects of increased fertilizer application upon agricultural production in the various countries.
- FAO's plan is to organize a field team consisting of an economist, a merketing expert, an agronomist and a fertilizer specialist. This team is to gather in Rome early in September for a week or ten days of briefing and then it will make field studies for 22 months in 6 or 7 countries. The whole team will go to Pakistan, India, Ceylon, Malaya, Indonesia, Thailand and possibly the Philippines, and the economist on the team will also go to Japan.
- I expressed some doubt to the FAO representatives that much could be accomplished by an effort of the kind described, since the team would not have much more than a week or so in each of the countries. I felt that this was not the kind of investigation with which the Bank would wish to be directly associated. 

Antecedentes

La FAO está organizando el Segundo Seminario Latinoamericano sobre Problemas de la Tierra, como continuación del primero de tales seminarios que tuvo lugar en Campinas (Brasil), en 1953. La celebración de un segundo seminario regional fué recomendada por la IV Conferencia Regional de la FAO para la América Latina (Santiago, Chile, 1956) y más tarde ratificada por las Recomendaciones de la V Conferencia Regional de la FAO para la América Latina (San José, Costa Rica, 1958).

El Seminario ofrecerá a los altos funcionarios técnicos de los gobiernos o de organismos autónomos o semi-autónomos y a los miembros del personal docente de las universidades, la oportunidad de discutir los problemas mencionados e intercambiar las experiencias realizadas en este campo.

Los objetivos principales del Seminario son: 1) Aclarar los problemas que surgen en la creación de nuevas unidades agrícolas; 2) Aumentar los conocimientos mediante las experiencias realizadas en los distintos países, y 3) Proporcionar una orientación general para la formulación y ejecución de programas futuros.

Durante el Seminario se insistirá especialmente en la evaluación práctica de los programas anteriores, a fin de determinar qué medidas o aspectos podrían tener aplicación en los programas futuros de los países de la región.

Patrocinio

Patrocinan el Seminario la Organización de las Naciones Unidas para la Agricultura y la Alimentación (FAO) y el Gobierno del Uruguay. El Instituto Interamericano de Ciencias Agrícolas (OEA), la Comisión Económica para la América Latina (CEPAL) y la Oficina Internacional del Trabajo (OIT) cooperarán con la FAO en los aspectos profesionales de las reuniones. Además, se invitará a otros organismos internacionales, tales como la Organización de las Naciones Unidas para la Educación, la Ciencia y la Cultura (UNESCO) y el Banco Internacional de Reconstrucción y Fomento (BIRF) para que envíen representantes a los debates.

Participación

El Seminario se organiza en beneficio de todas las Repúblicas de la región latinoamericana miembros de la FAO. Se invita a cada uno de los gobiernos a enviar dos participantes, los cuales deberán ser funcionarios de organismos para colonización o reforma agraria, de departamentos oficiales encargados de la política agraria, o personas pertenecientes a instituciones académicas dedicadas a los problemas agrarios.

Es importante destacar el hecho de que se espera que los participantes, aunque nombrados por sus respectivos gobiernos, tomen parte en los debates del Seminario en su calidad de técnicos individuales y que sus aportaciones respondan a sus experiencias profesionales y a un criterio independiente.

Idioma

El idioma de trabajo del Seminario será el español. Los gobiernos garantizarán que sus participantes están en condiciones de trabajar en este idioma.

Disposiciones Administrativas

La FAO pagará el viaje de vuelta a la terminación del Seminario, en clase turista, a los participantes designados oficialmento. Los Gobiernos que hayan nombrado participantes oficiales en el Seminario pagarán la otra mitad del viaje (es decir, el viaje de ida al lugar de celebración del seminario). La FAO pagará también un subsidio para contribuir a los gastos de subsistencia de los participantes, por el tiempo que dure su estadía en el Seminario y cuya cuantía será fijada de acuerdo con las normas de la Junta de Asistencia Técnica de las Naciones Unidas. Los participantes que residan en zonas cercanas a Montevideo tendrán derecho a percibir este subsidio solamente durante el tiempo en que efectúen excursiones incluídas en el Programa del Seminario. Es necesario mencionar el hecho de que el subsidio que la FAO está autorizada a conceder, no suele ser generalmente suficiente para sufragar los gastos de los participantes y que, por lo tanto, los gobiernos deberán tomar las medidas oportunas para facilitarles fondos adicionales que cumplan este fin.

Documentación

La FAO ha solicitado ya a cada uno de los gobiernos de la región que nombren un reducido Grupo Nacional de Trabajo, encargado de la preparación del material informativo del país. Como guía para esta documentación se procederá a la publicación de unas instrucciones específicas. El material informativo por país que se solicita es de tres clases:

- 1. Antecedentes generales acerca de los problemas de tenencia de la tierra y estructura agraria;
- Información específica sobre programas de colonización y distribación de tierras;
- 3. Estudios de evaluación de uno o dos proyectos de colonización y reforma agraria.

El primer tipo de documentación comprende informaciones sobre tenencia de la tierra, uso de la tierra, población y demás aspectos generales que permitan a los participantes adquirir una perspectiva futura de los programas de reforma agraria y colonización, dentro de la situación general de cada país.

La segunda clase de información será empleada principalmente para preparar los debates de los Grupos de trabajo. Los directores de debate de cada grupo recibirán el material informativo de cada país con anticipación al comienzo del Seminario; se procederá al análisis de las informaciones, seleccionando los puntos que resulten más importantes, para su presentación y debate en los grupos de trabajo.

El tercer tipo de documentación deberá componerse de, al menos, un estudio detallado en el terreno de un proyecto de reforma agraria o de colonización, basado en entrevistas directas o en otras informaciones obtenidas en el campo. Algunos índices referentes a los ingresos agrícolas, a la productividad y a otros factores, serán solicitados para asegurar que los estudios de los distintos países puedan ser comparados.

Organización

El Seminario durará 15 días aproximadamente y se dedicarán probablemente cuatro o cinco días más a excursiones, es decir que la duración total del Seminario será de unas tres semanas. El Programa de trabajo incluirá las actividades siguientes:

- 1. Conferencias. El personal del Seminario dictará un número limitado de conferencias sobre temas básicos y teóricos durante las sesiones plenarias, que tendrán lugar por la mañana. Cada conferencia será de una duración aproximada de 45 a 50 minutos y será seguida de un período de discusión.
- 2. Presentación de Experiencias y Estudios Locales. La Directiva invitará con anticipación a algunos participantes para presentar análisis y estudios de programas o situaciones de particular interés para el Seminario. Dispondrán de un tiempo aproximado de 45 a 50 minutos para hacer sus exposiciones, siguiendo a continuación un período de tiempo dedicado a la discusión.
- 3. Grupos de Trabajo. La labor principal del Seminario será realizada mediante seis grupos de trabajo, que se reunirán durante diversas tardes consecutivas. Simultáneamente serán organizados tres grupos de participación limitada, a fin de que el grupo pueda tener ocasión de efectuar discusiones espentáneas. Cada grupo actuará bajo la dirección de dos directores de debate, los cuales presentarán los temas que habrán de discutirse y prepararán un informe al final de cada reunión.

Además, según lo permitan la marcha del programa y la disponibilidad de tiempo, podrán organizarse etras actividades, incluyendo discusiones de mesa redonda y etros actos que tengan lugar durante las excursiones.

Las excursiones serán establecidas en manera de proporcionar a los participantes la oportunidad de observar los proyectos de colonización del Uruguay y, tal vez, de alguna de los países vecinos.

Temario Provisional

El programa detallado se dará a conocer más adelante. Los temas principales del Seminario serán:

- 1. Explicación de los conceptos básicos tales como Reforma Agraria, Colonización, Tenencia de la Tierra, Estructura Agraria, etc.

- 3. Organización administrativa en los diferentes países: organismos, presupuestos y recursos empleados para la reforma agraria y la colonización.
- 4. Problemas financieros, incluyendo la adquisición de tierras, obras de desarrollo y pago de la tierra por los nuevos propietarios.
- 5. Reconocimientos básicos (por ejemplo, edafológicos, hidrológicos, catastrales) con anterioridad a la distribución de la tierra.
- 6. Problemas que se presentan en la selección de nuevos propietarios.
- 7. Métodos de determinación del tamaño y disposición de las nuevas unidades agrícolas.
- 8. Planeamiento de la organización socio-económica de las nuevas unidades, así como su forma de tenencia y estructuración.
- 9. Relación existente entre la colonización, la reforma agraria y el crédito agrícola.
- 10. Utilidad de la organización de cooperativas para los nuevos adjudicatarios.

I PRIMERA PARTE

Documentación Básica General

En esta parte se solicita información sobre la situación general relativa a tenencia, propiedad y uso de tierra en el país, así como sobre población y otros factores sociales. Esta parte del informe debe constituir el conjunto antecedente que sirva a los participantes para comprender mejor la documentación más específica que figura en la Segunda Parte.

Las fuentes posibles de esta información son los datos del último censo, las estadísticas disponibles y los estudios especiales de carácter local, regional o nacional.

- A. Información censal y de otras fuentes sobre propiedad según su tamaño y forma de tenencia. Superficie de las tierras del dominio del Estado y privadas.
- B. Información censal y de otras fuentes sobre número y tipo de explotaciones agrícolas.
- C. Uso de la tierra según el tamaño de explotaciones y por regiones agrícolas. Si posible, establecer relaciones entre tenencia de la tierra (punto A.), tipo de explotaciones (punto B.) y uso de la tierra (punto C.).
- D. Número de habitantes que forman la población rural y urbana, económicamente activa, dedicada a la agricultura. Tasa de crecimiento y migración. Densidad de población en las regiones agrícolas.
- E. División de la población rural en categorías determinadas por el sistema de tenencia de la tierra (propietarios, administradores, arrendatarios, aparceros, trabajadores agrícolas de varias categorías, ocupantes sin derechos de propiedad, etc.

F. Estudios económicos y sociales sobre condiciones de tenencia de la tierra, colonización, administración rural, sociología rural, etc. Es suficiente dar referencias bibliográficas exactas y adjuntar dos copias de estos estudios.

II SEGUNDA PARTE

Documentación sobre Aspectos Específicos de los Programas Nacionales con Enfasis Especial en la Creación de Nuevas Unidades

Esta parte de la documentación servirá principalmente como una base para las discusiones de los Grupos de Trabajo. Se solicitan informaciones sobre los aspectos específicos de los programas de distribución y redistribución de la tierra ya llevados a cabo o en realización. Se espera que estos datos sean exactos y completos, en el sentido de que den cuenta tanto de los elementos de éxito como de los que han constituído un fracaso, tratando de explicar las razones de los resultados adversos o favorables.

I am sorry I have been so long in acknowledging the kind advice you gave me in your letter of 29 May. The information you sent me is very helpful and will be followed up.

I have now been home in FAO for nearly two weeks and look back with the greatest pleasure on the time we spent together in New York. I have seldom worked in a more friendly group where it was hardly necessary to dicuss matters because everyone knew and respected what everybody else was doing.

My talk to the group in Washington went quite well, I believe. There was a good attendance from all the interested agencies, and a great number of questions were asked, and, I hope, satisfactorily answered.

Dear Mr. Demuth,

The Fourth FAO Regional Conference for Asia and the Far East suggested that:

"FAO and Member Governments investigate the possibility of developing an international fertiliser pool which might include provision for easier purchase of fertilisers."

We have given considerable thought to the ways and means by which this recommendation should be implemented, and feel that, before the fertiliser exporting countries are approached by FAO concerning the possibility of facilitating purchase of fertiliser by countries of Asia and the Far East Region, accurate country information should be assembled and thoroughly analysed and the possibilities of increasing the fertiliser supplies and use within the Region thoroughly explored.

This information and analysis would probably need to include consideration not only of present and potential fertiliser production, consumption and distribution, including domestic and foreign trade, but also the various factors, economic, industrial and social, impeding the greater use of fertilisers.

We are giving consideration to requesting Member Governments of the Region to cooperate in this study by designating small liaison groups, which would correspond with FAO headquarters, and would provide the information required. The attached tentative outline gives an indication of the kind of information that would be needed. Such liaison groups might have representation not only from Ministries of Agriculture, but also from Ministries of Industry, Trade and Commerce, as well as from the fertiliser industry and fertiliser trade. In the meantime, members of the FAO staff at headquarters would assemble the information available here.

After this preliminary stage is complete, we are thinking of sending a team of specialists to visit a number of countries in the Region to discuss the information assembled in the countries and at FAO headquarters. Tentatively, the team might include an agronomist specialising in fertiliser use, a fertiliser economist, a chemical engineer (fertiliser manufacture) and a fertiliser distribution and trade specialist. The information from countries which will not be visited will be gathered by correspondence.

Tentative Outline of a Study on the Fertilizer Economy in Asia and the Far East

The study would cover Asia and the Far East, with special reference to the densely populated areas. Mainland China would be covered as far as possible in view of its importance as an importer of fertilizers. The time period would be from 1950 onwards, with references to the pre-war situation. The following are some of the main points which would be covered:

I. CURRENT SITUATION

Descriptive account based on data of individual countries:

- (a) Production of Fertilizers, i.e. annual production in countries by type of fertilizers (the different kinds of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizer); availability of raw material; capacity of plants and their utilization; technical and financial assistance received in the establishment of plants; technical personnel; production costs.
- (b) Consumption of Fertilizers, i.e. annual consumption of various types of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizers; average nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium requirements of various crops on different soils, based on results of experiment stations and on cultivators' fields; economic returns for nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizer application used separately and in combination on selected crops; the use of fertilizers and manures on different food and cash crops; economic organizational and other factors limiting consumption such as research, extension, services rendered to farmers, e.g. soil testing land tenure systems, purchasing power, etc.
- (c) Choices of Fertilizer Materials and Sources of Supplies, i.e. choice of nitrogen fertilizer to produce: (i) cost, (ii) properties, (iii) efficiency for crops; economics of phosphorous fertilizer production and imports of high analysis phosphorous fertilizer; requirements for mixed or balanced fertilizers.
- (d) Foreign Trade, i.e. annual data of various types of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizers by origin and destination; gross value of foreign trade; export and import unit values; foreign aid; type of payments; credits.
- (e) Pricing Systems, i.e. relationship between import prices and prices of domestically produced nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizers; wholesale and retail prices; government subsidies and credit policies.
- (f) Marketing Systems and their development by: (i) governments, (ii) producers, importers, cooperatives and others.
- (g) National Fertilizer Policies, i.e. legislation and controls; experimental stations; services; other methods in promotion of production and consumption.

II. PROBLEMS OF SUPPLY AND DEMAND

This section would attempt to throw light on the following problems:

- 1. Increased Yields through Fertilizer Application (Technical Aspects)
 - a. Comparisons of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizer usage per unit of agricultural land with more developed countries;
 - b. Comparison of crop yields with more developed countries;
 - c. Technical estimates of potential nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium requirements for selected crops related to certain targets of agricultural production.
- 2. Trends in Fertilizer Production and Consumption and Trade (Economic Factors)
 - a. Possibilities and limitations of increasing nitrogen and phosphorous fertilizer production, (raw materials; capital investments; evaluation of national planning for fertilizer industry).
 - b. Estimates of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizer consumption for a medium-term period (1965 or 1970) under different assumptions (e.g. based on the rate of growth of fertilizer consumption in post-war years; increased rate of fertilizer consumption for selected crops guaranteeing economic returns; consumption targets correlated with population growth, etc.).
 - c. Alternative estimates of production and consumption by countries and in the region as a basis for estimating export availabilities and import requirements;
 - d. Potential export possibilities for non-Asian producers;
 - e. Economic obstacles to larger imports (e.g. low purchasing power; price levels of fertilizers; transport costs; lack of foreign exchange).

III. METHODS FOR ALLEVIATING DIFFICULTIES IN FERTILIZER SUPPLY

- a. Increase of domestic production (capital investments; investigation of resources; technical personnel).
- b. Increase of imports (bilateral agreements; lower import prices; special credit arrangements; local currency purchases; national distribution agencies; selection of areas and crops for distribution of fertilizers on special terms; etc.).
- c. Increase of consumption (extension services, distribution systems to villages, long-term credits to farmers, subsidies on fertilizers, land tenure systems, etc.).
- d. Possibilities of international action.

At the 31st meeting of the Film Board in New York, 9-13 March 1959, the subject of co-production of filmstrip kits on specific subjects was not considered in detail since the entire question of visual aids in education was to be discussed at the CCPI. Speaking for FAO, I outlined the plan and said that I had every reason to believe that in one country at least - Australia - we could expect considerable cooperation from the Ministry of Education in the distribution of these kits. I also mentioned that it was the intention of FAO to take advantage of this situation and I was asked whether I would be prepared to include with the FAO material existing filmstrips from other agencies. The resulting collection of strips could then, it was suggested, be regarded as a 'pilot project' the results of which would, in due course, be submitted to the Film Board.

Although at the time I agreed to do this, it later occurred to me that it would prove nothing at all, since FAO's suggestion related to kits specially designed to deal with specific themes or subjects, whereas the proposed collection would not, in fact, be an example of such a kit. However, I felt that the Australian offer of cooperation might be extended to agencies other than FAO. I, therefore, wrote to the Commonwealth National Library, Film Division asking whether materials from other agencies would be welcomed. I have now received an answer which reads as follows:-

"We are most appreciative of your help in mentioning our activities during the UN Film Board meeting. Being interested in spreading information by any means, we would gladly cooperate in any way within our power with any of the Specialized Agencies. I do hope, however that our role is clear in regard to strips and other visual material (except 16mm films). We will be very glad indeed to distribute these materials but are not well set up to cuse anything but film negatives (35mm or 16mm). We are frankly worried about strip commentaries particularly after our experience with the material you kindly sent. I think that it might be better for us to buy quantities of strip commentaries from you or the Agencies, say,

I have also forwarded with the draft two documents on Dairy Products prepared for the recent CCP session, which you may care to look at in connection with paragraphs 34-51 of the study. ANNEX. Agenda Notes

AGENDA NOTES

The Second Session of the Working Party on Copra Quality and Grading will be held in Colombo, in the Planters Association Meeting Hall, 17-25 August 1959. After election of officers and adoption of the agenda, it is suggested that the business of the session might proceed as follows:

Item III. Arrangements for Further Work on Coconut under the FAO Regular Program

Having regard to the emphasis in the Report of the Second Session of the Group and also in the previous Report of the Working Party on the need for greater attention to technical improvement in processing, the Working Party will wish to be informed of proposals by the Director-General to establish a Technical Working Party to carry out complementary activities to those of the Group on economic aspects. The Working Party may wish to review its own activities in the light of these proposals, and examine means of coordinating programs.

Item IV. Proposals for Research and Training under the Expanded Technical Assistance Program

In paras 8-10 of the report of its First Session, the Working Party recommended the inclusion of a regional project on copra quality research and training under the Expanded Technical Assistance Program. As requested, a report on progress made on this proposal will be prepared for the information of the Working Party.

Item V. Quality Standards for Producing Countries

The Working Party recommended at its First Session that efforts in copra producing countries should be directed towards achieving moisture content standards specified in its report, since it considered moisture content the most important single factor affecting the quality of copra. The Ceylon delegation undertook to arrange for the preparation of a paper on this subject, which will be circulated to Members and Observers in due course.

Item VI. Establishment of Copra Quality Standards by Processors

In accordance with its terms of reference to facilitate the exchange of information on quality characteristics and grades desired by processors for the main edible and industrial uses, the Working Party at its First Session studied recommendations on these matters made by the International Association of Seed Crushers (IASC). It felt that the implications for trading methods in exporting countries were difficult to assess without further study at the Second Session. The IASC was requested to make available further information for this purpose, as follows:

(i) Methods of Copra Sampling and Analysis by the IASC

In response to the Working Party's request, the IASC has agreed to make available information on the sampling and analysis of copra in importing countries. It is expected that this material will be available for study before the Session.

(ii) Information provided by the IASC on characteristics of copra shipments from the Philippines

The Working Party also recommended, at the request of the Philippines delegation, and as regards the actual standards proposed by the IASC, that more information should be made available on the average oil, f.f.a., and moisture content of copra reaching Europe and the USA. The IASC has agreed to furnish to the Working Party the results of its analyses of copra shipments, and this information will be circulated in due course to Members and Observers.

Item VII. Provision of Economic Incontives to the Producer for Better Quality Copra

Under its terms of reference, the Working Party should study and promote the rationalization of marketing measures to ensure that monetary incentives which the user is willing to pay will benefit the copra producer and coconut grower. In consequence, the Working Party recommended at its previous session that the subject of domestic marketing should form the main topic of discussion at the Second Session. The FAO Conference in 1957 also gave special emphasis to the importance of achieving marketing improvement, and referred to the economic losses to producers and consumers due to impaired quality from marketing deficiencies, and to the need for an effective approach to marketing difficulties interrelated at all stages of processing and distribution. The newly-appointed Regional Marketing Specialist for Asia and the Far East will now be able to assist the Working Party in its discussions and activities. A paper is being prepared by the secretariat on internal marketing problems with special reference to quality improvement, and the Ceylon and Indonesian delegations agreed to make available information giving details of copra marketing methods and the organization and working of coconut cooperatives in their countries. Other governments may also wish to submit individual papers on this item of the agenda. Attention is also drawn to the FAO Marketing Guide No.1, Marketing Problems and Improvement Programs, (Rome 1958), which has been distributed to governments, which the Working Party may wish to use as a guide to possible lines of action on copra quality problems,

(i) Causes of Lack of Incentives

The Working Party may first wish to examine the causes of lack of incentives in domestic marketing stages, and the difficulties found in transmitting to the producer incentives offered in international trade. Some aspects

of the problem to which attention has been drawn in previous discussions include imperfections in marketing which do not allow world market prices to be reflected in producer prices, indebtedness, lack of credit, deterioration in storage and transport, and producers' lack of information on standards required.

(ii) Marketing Organizations to Implement Incentive Programs

(a) Role of Cooperative Organizations of Coconut Producers

The Working Party suggested that special attention be given to this aspect of marketing at the Second Session. In view of the importance attached to the general development of cooperation in the main producer member countries of the Group, the Working Party may wish to allocate sufficient time for a full examination of the feasibility and possible advantages of cooperative marketing, in the coconut field, as regards the particular aspects of quality improvement.

(b) Other Integrated Marketing Systems

Under this item, consideration could be given to other types of marketing systems than cooperatives and to adjustment in existing systems which would permit the maintenance of an effective relationship between financing and marketing of the product, which would encourage the repayment of commodity loans and the best selection of outlets, and would lead to improvement in processing, storage and transport.

(iii) Central Selling Organizations

The Working Party wished to discuss the part that centralised organization of selling, such as through Marketing Boards or at central auctions, could play in raising the level of copra quality. Attention is drawn to the information on sales organizations contained in document CCP/Coconut/SCQ/Ltd 1-4 issued for the First Session and to the appendix in the Summary Record of the First Session of the Group (CCP/Coconut/57/10) on the Ceylon Coconut Board Copra Sales Room.

Item VIII. Discussion of Visits and Field Trips Organised by the Ceylon Government

The Working Party suggested Ceylon as the site for the Second Session in order to have an opportunity of seeing the Central Sales Room for Ceylon, which began operation in 1957, and the functioning of coconut cooperatives in that country. The Ceylon Government has kindly offered to arrange such facilities, and the Working Party may wish to take the opportunity of setting aside part of its time after such visits for an exchange of views on the study of processing and marketing in Ceylon, and for any further information which may be requested.

AGENDA NOTES

The CCP, at its last Session, decided that its Thirty-First Session should be convened for a period of two weeks immediately prior to the Thirtieth Session of the FAO Council. With the opening data of the Council Session having since been set for 15 June 1959, the Thirty-First Session of the CCP will open on 1 June 1959.

Item I. Adoption of Agenda

The agenda items are those included in the Provisional Agenda agreed upon by the Thirtieth Session of the CCP, with the addition of the following items which have been added as a result of developments since the Thirtieth Session of the CCP, as described in more detail in the Agenda Notes for those items:-

Item VI(g): Hard Fibers

Item VI(j): Other Special Commodity Questions
(i) Tobacco; (ii) Spices

Item XI: Admission of Czechoslovakia to Membership of the FAO Cocoa Study Group

Item XII : Organizational Matters: (a) Press Releases (b) Classification of Documents

In deciding upon the <u>order</u> in which the various items should be taken, the Committee will wish to bear in mind the following points which had been noted at its last Session:-

Item VI(h): It was agreed that the reports on <u>Dairy Products</u> provided for in Resolution No. 1/58 should be considered on specified days in plenary meetings of the Committee, and that, after such discussion, these reports should be passed to the Panel on Dairy Products for consideration along with other items of the attached Provisional Agenda.

Item IX: The Director-General was requested to arrange, as far as possible, for a specified day during the first week of the Committee's deliberations to be set aside for the consideration of the item on the Report of the Panel on Agricultural Support Measures. Suggestions concerning these dates will follow later.

Item II. Adoption of Summary Record of Thirtieth Session

The Provisional Summary Record of the Thirtieth Session has been circulated as CCP 58/19. Amendments to the Summary Record received prior to the Thirty-First Session will be circulated as an Addendum.

Item III. Report of the Twenty-Ninth Session of the Council

An extract from the Report of the Twenty-Ninth Session of the Council, dealing with commodity matters is circulated as GCP 59/2.

Item IV. Rules of Procedure

The Committee, at its Thirtieth Session, adopted provisionally Rules of Procedure which had been revised to bring them into line with the new provisions agreed upon by the Ninth Session of the Conference, and decided to place the matter of final review and adoption of its Rules of Procedure as one of the first items on the Agenda of its Thirty-First Session. Pending the final review and adoption of its Rules of Procedure the Committee requested the Director-General to circulate the Provisional Rules of Procedure to all CCP Member Governments and ask them to submit any comments they might have, in writing to him, not later than 1 January 1959. Copies should also be sent to other FAO Member Governments for

their information, on the understanding that they could send in comments if they so desired. These Rules have now been circulated as requested, and Member Governments! comments will be circulated as early as possible in 1959.

The Committee will also be called upon to approve the revised Rules of Procedure which will have been adopted, in accordance with the new provisions, by the CCP Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus Disposal and by the CCP Commodity Groups.

The Committee also decided to place the matter of the revision of the Terms of Reference of its subsidiary bodies consequent of the provisions adopted by the Ninth Session of the Conference, on the Agenda of its Thirty-First Session. The Committee may wish to take up this matter under the present item or under Item VI below. In the meantime, as requested by the Committee, the various subsidiary bodies have been presented with papers, for their guidance in drawing up their revised Rules of Procedure, on modifications in their Terms of Reference which will be required by the provisions referred to above.

Item V. Major Developments in the World Agricultural Commodity Situation since the Thirtieth Session of the CCP

(a) Review of Current Developments

Under this Item, the customary review of developments in the world agricultural commodity situation will be presented for the Committee's consideration.

(b) Long-range Projections

At its Thirtieth Session, the Committee noted the Director-General's intention to develop the work being undertaken on long-range prospects for the demand for, and supply of agricultural commodities, and asked to be kept informed of these activities, on which a statement will be presented to the Session. The Committee may also, under this heading, wish to take note of the work of the inter-agency meeting, held on the request of the Sub-Committee on Commodity Problems of the United Nations Administrative Coordinating Committee, which is referred to under Item X below.

(c) European Common Market

At its Thirtieth Session, the Committee expressed the wish to be kept informed of developments in the European Economic Community. It noted that these developments would be regularly covered in the Secretariat document on Major Developments in Inter-Governmental Commodity Consultations and Arrangements (see Item X below) and asked that the commodity notes on current developments (Item, V(a) above) should also take account of significant developments affecting individual commodities.

The Committee may therefore wish to take up this matter, both generally, as regards the section in the paper to be presented under Item X below, and for individual commodities, under the present Item, as one single Agenda Item.

Item VI. Reports of CCP Commodity Groups and Special Commodity Questions

It will be recalled that at the Thirtieth Session doubts were expressed as to the appropriateness of the title hitherto used for this Item "Reports of CCP Commodity Groups and Related Matters". No alternative wording was adopted by the Committee, but the Director-General proposes that in future the title given above might serve.

(a) Report of Fourth Session of FAO Group on Grains

As indicated in the introduction to these Agenda Notes, the Fourth Session of the FAO Group on Grains will be held in Rome immediately prior to the Thirty-First CCP Session and its Report tabled at that Session.

(b) Report of Third Session of Consultative Sub-Committee on the Economic Aspects of Rice

The Third Session of the Consultative Sub-Committee on the Economic Aspects of Rice will be held in Ceylon on 16 - 24 February 1959, preceded by the Fourth Session of the Group of Experts on Rice Grading and Standardization from 12 - 16 February. Its Report will be circulated as soon as possible thereafter.

(c) Report of Second Session of FAO Group on Coconut and Coconut Products

The Second Session of the FAO Group on Coconut and Coconut Products was held in Manila on 20 - 29 October 1958, preceded by a meeting of the Sub-Committee on Copra Quality from 15 - 19 October. Its Report is circulated as CCP 58/23.

(d) FAO Cocoa Study Group

This Group, not having determined the date of its Fourth Session, authorized its Executive Committee for the period until its Fourth Session, to present, on its behalf, such reports as might be required to keep the CCP informed of developments affecting the commodity. It is expected that the Executive Committee will hold its next meeting at Rome in May 1959. The Group's Statistical Committee met in Rome, in October 1958, and again in January 1959. A Report will be circulated to the CCP as indicated above.

(e) Citrus Fruit

After considering, at its Thirtieth Session, a suggestion by the Ninth Session of the Conference that more detailed attention should be given to analysing problems affecting the production and consumption of, and international trade in, citrus fruit with a view to the possible establishment of a study group on these products at a later stage, and a formal request that this matter should be considered at the Committee's Thirtieth Session presented by the Government of Israel, the Committee decided that the problems attaching to this group of commodities were not of a nature that required the immediate establishment of a study group. It agreed, however, that citrus fruit should be considered again at its next Session. It was also agreed that the Secretariat, in its preparation for the next Session of the CCP, should request governments to furnish additional material along the lines suggested by the observer for Israel on the problems of the citrus industry.

This request of the CCP is now being pursued and further documentation on citrus fruit will be circulated before the Thirty-First CCP Session.

(f) Dried Fruit

The Committee at its Thirtieth Session had before it a request of the Ninth Session of the Conference and of the Twenty-Eighth Session of the Council to consider the desirability of establishing a group on dates and other dried fruit. The Committee considered that the problems attaching to this group of commodities were not of a nature that required the immediate establishment of a study group. It was, however, agreed that the proposal should be reconsidered by the Committee and that the item should be retained on its Agenda for consideration at the Thirty-First Session.

The study on dried fruit (CCP 58/12) which was presented to the Thirtieth CCP Session will be brought up to date for circulation for the Thirty-First Session.

(g) Hard Fibers

The Director-General has received a letter from the Abaca Corporation of the Philippines informing him that the Philippine Republic wishes to renew the request made by them at the 1955 FAO Conference for the establishment of a CCP study group on hard fibers.

It will be recalled that at its Twenty-Ninth Session, the CCP, in view of the fact that there had been no indication that the governments originally sponsoring the Conference Resolution (No. 10/55) which had asked the CCP to look into the matter, wished to pursue the question (which had been on its Agenda both at its Twenty-Seventh and Twenty-Eighth Sessions), agreed to remove this item from its Agenda unless governments interested in the commodity group should again request its consideration.

On the matter being taken up by the Government of the Philippines at the Thirtieth Session of the Council, the Council, as recorded in the extract from its Report circulated as CCP 59/2, agreed that the matter should be considered by the CCP. The Philippines' letter, with a background note by the Secretariat, is being circulated as CCP 59/3.

(h) Dairy Products

During its Thirtieth Session, the Committee held the Second Session of the Panel on Dairy Products and agreed to reconvene the Panel during its Thirty-First Session. The Provisional Agenda and Agenda Notes for the Panel are attached and form part of the Agenda of the CCP. As indicated in the Note under Item I, the reports on national dairy policies and on the butter situation and the progress report on the study of the effects on dairy markets of the substitution of vegetable fats for animal fats in milk and milk products will be presented to the Committee before being passed on to the Panel. In connection with the report on dairy policies, a meeting of experts from a representative sample of importing and exporting countries (Denmark, New Zealand, Sweden, the United Kingdom and the United States of America) with an observer from the OEEC was held in Rome 15 - 18 September, its object being, as suggested by the CCP, to assist the Director-General in the preparation of this report.

Under this item, the Committee will no doubt wish, as in the past, to take up matters concerned with dairy policies reported by the Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus Disposal (see Item VII below).

(i) Coffee

At its Thirtieth Session, the Committee decided that in view of international action on coffee currently proceeding elsewhere, it was preferable not to convene and hoc FAO meeting on coffee as had been decided at previous Sessions. It requested the Director-General, however, to report to future Sessions of the CCP on activities in the field of cooperation on international consultations and action concerning coffee. On 5 November 1958, the Director-General received a letter from the International Coffee Study Group in Washington requesting FAO collaboration in the work of the Group. As a result, discussions have been held between the FAO Secretariat and the Group on practical ways of achieving this collaboration. A note on the results of these discussions will be circulated.

(j) Other Special Commodity Questions

(i) Tobacco

In February 1958, the Government of the Philippines asked the Secretary-General of the United Nations to convene conferences for the purpose of concluding a series of international agreements for various commodities, among these being tobacco. The Secretary-General brought the matter to the attention of FAO, ICCICA and the U.N. Commission on International Commodity Trade. In his reply the Director-General of FAO pointed out that FAO had not received any request for a special study of fluctuations in the prices of tobacco in an FAO commodity group or otherwise, but that in FAO commodities work tobacco was regularly covered. ICCICA was of the opinion that there were special problems in regard to the Philippines proposal which required further elucidation, and suggested that the Secretary-General write to the principal importing and exporting countries to see if there was any interest in inter-governmental action. The U.N. Commission on International Commodity Trade noted that tobacco was "included within the responsibility of FAO". Comments were subsequently submitted to the Secretary-General on the Philippines proposal, and, since some governments also indicated the usefulness of a preliminary consideration within the CCP, their comments will be brought to the attention of the Session.

(ii) Spices

At the FAO Fourth Regional Conference for Asia and the Far East, the Indian delegation raised the question of the extension of FAO commodity work to cover the field of spices, (particularly pepper). The matter is therefore being brought to the attention of the CCP. A note examining to what extent and by what methods such work could be undertaken, and what it would involve, will be circulated to the Session. The note will also take account of work already undertaken in ECAFE.

Item VII. Surplus Disposal

(a) Eighth Report of the Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus Disposal

The Committee will have before it the Eighth Report of the Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus Disposal. As indicated above, it is anticipated that some of the subjects in this Report will link up with Item VI(h) "Dairy Products".

(b) Report on the Operation and Adequacy of FAO Principles of Surplus Disposal

At its Thirtieth Session, the CCP was presented by the Sub-Committee with a Report on Consultative Machinery and Procedures (CCP 58/7 Addendum 1), on which certain comments were made. Subsequently, the Sub-Committee has discussed how best to deal with the recommendations in this Report, and the CCP comments thereon, and has agreed that its Eighth Report should contain a section devoted to an appraisal of how far FAO Member Governments have been able to implement these recommendations.

The Sub-Committee has also set up an <u>ad hoc</u> group to study the operation and adequacy of the FAO Principles and will report on this subject to the Thirty-First Session.

Item VIII, National Food Reserves

The Committee was presented, at its Thirtieth Session, with a Report on National Food Reserves in Underdeveloped Countries (CCP 58/14). Since this Report was shortly to be considered by the Economic and Social Council, and since many CCP Member Governments had not yet had time to consider it in detail, the Committee decided to place the matter on the Agenda for its next Session, meanwhile requesting its consideration by the Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus Disposal.

The Economic and Social Council discussed the Report at its Twenty-Sixth Session (July 1958) and an account of its findings will be given in the paper to be circulated for Item X "Major Developments in Intergovernmental Commodity Consultations and Arrangements since the Thirtieth Session of the CCP". The Committee will also wish to consider under this Item the comments which it is anticipated will be presented by the Consultative Sub-Committee on Surplus Disposal (see Item VII).

Item IX. Report of the Panel on Agricultural Support Measures

The Committee was informed at its Thirtieth Session that a special panel of experts from interested countries would be convened in Rome in April 1959 to pursue the study of agricultural support measures in accordance with Resolution No. 8/57 of the Ninth Session of the Conference. The Report of this Panel will be circulated to the CCP for its comments.

Item X. Major Developments in Inter-Governmental Commodity Consultations and Arrangements since the Thirtieth Session of the CCP

A review of major developments in inter-governmental commodity consultations and arrangements will be circulated in advance of the Thirty-First Session for the Committee's consideration under this Item or other Agenda Items where appropriate.

The review will be divided into three main sections:-

- (1) Activities in the United Nations Organizations, including:-
 - (a) United Nations Commission on International Commodity Trade
 - the review will cover the results of the Commission's Seventh Session to be held in May 1959;
 - (b) Interim Coordinating Committee on International Commodity Arrangements (ICCICA);
 - (c) General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT)
 - including reference to the Report by a Panel of Experts on "Trends in International Trade" which has been prepared at the request of the Contracting Parties and deals, inter alia, with the problem of the stabilization of particular commodity markets;
 - (d) United Nations Administrative Coordinating Committee: Sub-Committee on Commodity Problems
 - including the work of an inter-agency meeting on long-range supply and demand projections which was held, following a decision of the Sub-Committee, in September/October 1958. This meeting was attended by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the International Monetary Fund, the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, the Economic Commission for Europe, the Organization for European Economic Cooperation, and FAO itself. The object of the meeting was to promote a closer collaboration in long-term projections work between the international agencies concerned. Since the meeting's discussions are closely linked with the CCP work on long-term trends in commodities, it is felt that the Committee will wish to be informed of their results, and, as mentioned above, may wish to consider these with Item V(b) of its Agenda
- (2) Activities in inter-governmental commodity councils and groups, including:-
 - (a) the International Wheat Council and the International Sugar Council, with particular reference to the results of negotiating conferences on the International Wheat Agreement and the International Sugar Agreement held in the period between the Thirtieth and Thirty-First CCP Sessions;
 - (b) negotiations on an International Olive Oil Agreement, which, as agreed at the Thirtieth Session, will be considered under this Agenda Item instead of, as at previous sessions, under Item VI;

- (c) developments in the European Economic Community (see Item V(c) above);
- (d) other inter-governmental commodity bodies.
- (3) Any other inter-governmental commodity consultations and arrangements.

Item XI. Admission of Czechoslovakia to Membership of the FAO Cocoa Study Group

On 22 September 1958 the Director-General received a letter from the Government of Czechoslovakia requesting membership of the FAO Cocoa Study Group. Under the rules of the Organization adopted by the Ninth Session of the Conference, Governments not members of FAO but who are members of the United Nations may, on request and with the approval of the parent body (in this case the CCP) be admitted to membership of FAO Commodity Study Groups.

The request by the Government of Czechoslovakia is therefore being circulated as CCP 59/4 for the Committee's consideration.

Item XII. Organizational Matters

(a) Press Releases

The wish has been expressed by some members of the Committee that the subject of the procedures for the preparation and issuance of Press Releases concerning the Committee's activities be taken up at the Thirty-First Session.

(b) Classification of Documents

Since various matters concerned with procedures for the CCP and its subsidiary bodies will be discussed at the Thirty-First Session, it is felt that the Committee might wish to take the opportunity of discussing at this Session the question of the classification of documents of the Committee itself and of its subsidiary bodies.

At present, Sessions of the CCP are held in public, unless otherwise decided by the Committee; Sessions of its subsidiary bodies are normally held in private. However, up to the present, no definitive system of classification has yet been adopted for documentation, that is to say, for the restriction of CCP papers or the working papers of subsidiary bodies which it is desired not to make generally available, nor has the question of the definition of "restricted" been gone into by the Committee. The Committee may, therefore, wish to decide, for the future, which documents should be restricted, and what such restriction would entail.

The Committee may also wish to discuss the two above questions in a small working party meeting during the Session, which would also deal with Rules of Procedure and Terms of Reference (see. Item IV above).

AGENDA NOTES

Items 2 and 3. National Dairy Policies and the Butter Situation

At its last Session, the CCP requested the Director-General (CCP Resolution No. 1/58) to prepare, with the assistance of experts of interested governments, a special report on national dairy policies. Experts from five countries met in Rome in September and discussed with the Secretariat the main problems involved and suitable methods of approach. A draft report prepared by the Secretariat will be circulated in advance of the meeting. The Director-General was also asked to review the butter situation in late 1958 including an assessment of the effectiveness of actions taken by Member Governments in accordance with the recommendations made in paragraph 47 of the CCP's Report of its Thirtieth Session. A report will be distributed in advance of the meeting.

Item 4. Substitution

Following the request of the CCP at its last Session, the Secretariat has commenced a study of the effects on dairy markets of the substitution of vegetable fats for animal fats in milk and milk products. As a first step, the Director-General has sent a questionnaire on "filled milk" to Member Governments. The replies will be analyzed in a progress report which will be circulated in advance of the meeting.

Item 5. Stimulation of Milk Consumption

The CCP, when deciding on a Dairy Panel, emphasized that the Panel should give special attention to the stimulation of milk consumption especially in areas of low consumption. The two points under this item of the Agenda deal with this aspect. Item 5(a) will in part be dealt with in the Report of the Washington Consultative Sub-Committee. The Secretariat at the Panel Meeting will bring the Sub-Committee's review up to date. Under 5(b), the Panel may wish to consider recommendations of recent FAO Milk Surveys.

Item 6. Production, Trade and Prices of Dairy Products: Specific Problems

Notice of any specific problem which a Member Government wishes the Panel to consider should be sent to the Secretariat in writing well in advance of the opening of the CCP Session so that interested Governments can be informed and send appropriate representatives to the Session. AGENDA NOTES

The Fourth Session of the FAO Group on Grains will open at FAO Headquarters, Rome, at 10.30 a.m. on 18 May, 1959, and is expected to last for approximately two weeks.

Item I - Election of Chairman and Vice-Chairmen

The Rules of Procedure (Art. Ia) establish that the FAO Group on Grains shall elect a Chairman and two Vice-Chairmen for such period as the Group may decide.

Item III - Adoption of Provisional Summary Record of Third Session

The Provisional Summary Record of the Third Session has been distributed as document CCP/Grains/58/10. Representatives of Members and Observers who participated in the Third Session are requested to examine the Record and to send in comments and amendments, if any, in time to be received at FAO Headquarters at least two weeks before the Fourth Session of the Group.

Item IV - Review of the Grain Situation and Short-Term Outlook

A review of the grain situation is a regular item in the Agenda of the Group. A paper on the current situation and short-term outlook for grains is in preparation and will be submitted to the Fourth Session of the Group. The Director-General would welcome any supplementary information which Delegations may wish to present at the time of the Session.

Item V - Developments in World Cereal Production 1951-57 and Medium-Term Outlook

The consideration of trends is intended to help to clarify and measure the factors which shape the current position and to facilitate the appraisal of the outlook. The Secretariat is preparing a document (CCP/Grains/59/4) which will survey the main developments in world cereal production by types of cereal and by regions.

Item VI - National Grain Policies.

Country statements on national policies and measures affecting grains were presented to the Group at the Third Session in draft form. These and some additional ones have subsequently been checked by the countries concerned and sent to the printers by FAO in book-form. The English text is ready, but is not being distributed - except to the International Wheat Conference - until the French and Spanish editions are also printed.

(a) Developments since the Third Session. At the Third Session the Group decided that "the opportunity should be afforded for the periodic review of national policies affecting grains on the basis of the material contained in the statements of policies in individual countries, and maintaining this information in up-to-date form" (paragraph 48 CCP/16). To facilitate this review the Director-General would welcome country statements setting out any changes in national policy subsequent to the account countries have already checked for the printed collection (see above). To facilitate comparison, these statements should keep to the lay-out of the earlier statements.

(b) Exports under Bilateral Arrangements and Special Programs. In accordance with a decision of the Group at its Third Session (paragraph 46) a questionnaire on Exports under Bilateral Arrangements and Special Programs (CCP/Grains/58/9) was circulated to governments of 12 exporting countries. It is hoped to present a document collating and analysing the data received. However, by 1 February, 1959, only 2 replies had reached the Secretariat.

Item VII - Coarse Grain Studies

At the Third Session, the Group requested that the Secretariat should give special attention to coarse grains and the relationships between coarse grain and livestock products.

- (a) <u>Utilization</u>. In October, 1958, the Secretariat circulated to 58 countries a questionnaire (CCP/Grains/58/11) on the Supply and Utilization of Coarse Grains. For the Fourth Session of the Group a document will be prepared analysing the replies. By 1 February, 1959, only 22 replies had been received.
- (b) Price Relationships. The Secretariat is studying the price relationships between coarse grains and livestock products. It is hoped to present an outline of this study to the Group at its Fourth Session.

Item VIII - Statistics

This item will afford Delegates an opportunity to bring forward any points they wish to raise on statistics of grains.

Item IX - Intergovernmental Consultations and Agreements on Grains

At the time when this Agenda was drafted, the International Wheat Conference was still negotiating a new International Wheat Agreement. The Group will wish to be informed of the outcome of this Conference as well as of any other intergovernmental consultations that may have taken place by the time the Group meets.

Item X - Revision of Rules of Procedure

The CCP at its Thirtieth Session asked its subsidiary bodies to adopt Rules of Procedure consistent with the provisions adopted by the Conference at its Ninth Session and the new Rules of Procedure adopted provisionally by the CCP. The Group is asked to submit its revised Rules to the CCP for approval at the earliest possible date. A Secretariat paper, including suggested new Rules of Procedure for consideration by the Group is circulated herewith (CCP/Grains/59/1).

Dear Mr. Hill,

When you were recently in Rome, we discussed the review of ACC mathinery and procedures, and I would like to confirm in . writing the views I expressed during our meeting.

First of all, I should like to express my appreciation of the work done by Mr. Maheu in assembling and analysing the material contained in his preliminary report (CO-ORDINATION/R.278). I have found this report extremely useful in providing a background for reviewing the past development and present position of the ACC machinery. The bringing together of the views of the members of ACC enables one to see the extent of agreement which existed at the time Mr. Maheu made his survey and should facilitate reaching agreement on these points where divergent views were expressed.

Thus the report provides a basis for the progress report which ACC has been requested (resolution 694 A (XXVI) to make to the twenty-eighth session of ECOSOC.

In general, I am in agreement with what is said in Part I of the report.

In Part II of Mr. Maheu's report, several references are made to my views. As these are necessarily condensed, they do not always express accurately what I had in mind and I shall therefore take this opportunity to offer some clarification and elaboration. Incidentally, the views attributed to Sir Herbert Broadley, at the bottom of page 17, might give the wrong impression that Sir Herbert's views could have been different from mine. The fact is that these views were expressed in my memorandum to you of 1 February 1958, entitled

There seems to be some slight confusion between the views attributed to me in paragraph 20 and in paragraph 26. In order to eliminate any possible misunderstanding, I should like to make it clear that, in my view, these Committees (or Sub-Committees or Working Parties) dealing on a continuing basis with important matters of policy should be kept as standing ACC Sub-Committees. This would not rule out the establishment of ad hoc sub-committees, also reporting to ACC, whenever these are needed to deal with important policy matters. Thus the criterion to be used in determining whether a particular committee should report to ACC should be whether it deals with policy questions and not whether it is a standing committee or an ad hoc body.

It seems to me that Mr. Maheu's suggestion for suppressing the Preparatory Committee and entrusting the preparatory work for ACC to a permanent secretariat is hardly compatible with the concept of ACC as an inter-agency body. However, rather than go into details of what I regard as the disadvantages of such a departure, I shall instead set forth my views on the manner in which the present machinery can be modified in order to produce the desired results.

l. To make the Preparatory Committee more effective: as its name implies, the Preparatory Committee should, insofar as possible, prepare the work of ACC. ACC should continue the practice of devoting whatever time is necessary to private, informal meetings which afford opportunity for free exchange of views. However, except for such decisions as may be reached at these private meetings, the draft decisions and reports of ACC may be prepared by the Preparatory Committee. Some members of the ACC have criticised the Preparatory Committee because (1) it does not consist of sufficiently senior officers; (2) its reports are available to ACC only on the day when the latter convenes; and (3) since it is not a continuing body, it is unable to take up problems from time to time as they arise.

As to the seniority of members of the Preparatory Committee, it seems to me that the actual grade of the officers concerned is of less importance than their ability to speak on behalf of their principals. It is true that they are not all "deputies" in one sonse of the word. In fact this would hardly be possible as there is no "deputy" Secretary-General of the United Nations, and many of the Specialized Agencies do not have "deputy" chief executive officers. In another sense, however, they may

be considered as deputies for this particular purpose, always assuming, of course, that they are adequately briefed and instructed.

As to the timing of the reports of the Preparatory Committee, I see no reason why the sessions of the Preparatory Committee could not be held sufficiently in advance of sessions of ACC so that the Preparatory Committee's reports (including draft reports of ACC) could be in the hands of ACC members some time before ACC convenes, thus affording the ACC members an opportunity to acquaint themselves with the reports and, if necessary, consult members of their staffs, before having to take action on them.

As to the ability of the Preparatory Committee to take up problems as they arise, I would point out that four of the Specialized Agencies most concerned, as well as the IAEA, maintain permanent liaison offices in New York, in charge of officers at the director level. officers, by the very nature of their assignments, are currently informed on the activities and policies of their Organizations. The records will no doubt show that they frequently represent their Directors-General at Preparatory Committee sessions held in New York. They would be available to attend meetings on short notice and would have every opportunity of obtaining the views of their Directors-General on any questions which might arise; in addition, the Bank and the Fund, and perhaps even ICAO, are close enough to New York so that attendance at emergency meetings of the Preparatory Committee could be arranged with little inconvenience or expense. In fact, quite apart from formal sessions of the Preparatory Committee, I have sometimes wondered why greater advantage has not been taken of the presence of these officers at United Nations headquarters, to confer informally with them on matters of mutual concern.

Mr. Maheu's suggestion of replacing the Preparatory Committee by a permanent secretariat of ACC made up of officials with a specialized knowledge of the questions of co-ordination, seconded for varying periods from those Organizations, seems to me also impracticable. So far as I know, the personnel entrusted with co-ordination with the United Nations within the different Specialized Agencies at present is rather small, and it would seem absolutely impossible to second one of the members and transfer him to New York.

2. Subsidiary organisation: the organisation of ACC's sub-committees should, in my view, be kept somewhat flexible as circumstances may indicate the need for new ones, either on a permanent or ad hoc basis and the suppression of those which are no longer required.

I entirely agree with Mr. Maheu's suggestion that it is absolutely essential that the ACC should undertake as soon as possible an appraisal of each separate subsidiary body of the ACC to determine which of them should be kept in being, which should be transformed, which abolished and what new bodies should be set As a matter of fact, these were my own suggestions in the above-mentioned memorandum of 1 February 1958 in which I suggested that "The existing machinery of co-ordination at the secretariat level should be overhauled and co-ordination achieved" in accordance with the basis indicated in my memorandum. In that memorandum I also pointed out that "The present system of collaboration at the individual level between individual officers of the different Organisections should be continued, and be further encouraged. The importance of this form of collaboration is often under-estimated. covers a great deal of the work of the different Agencies in fields of common interest without any formal machinery or committees, either as part of ACC or as separate technical committees. It is conducted by correspondence or by visits of the staff of one Agency to a sister Agency when convenient, without the time and cost involved in organising meetings and working parties".

In summary, my recommendations for increasing the effectiveness of the ACC machinery are:-

- l. Maintain the semi-annual sessions of ACC, alternating between New York and Europe, with adequate provisions for informal, private meetings.
- 2. Afford the Preparatory Committee an opportunity to be of greater service to the ACC by (a) arranging for its regular sessions to precede those of ACC by sufficient time and (b) calling special sessions when necessary.
- 3. Reports of inter-agency technical committees and ad hoc interagency meetings on specific technical problems should be transmitted to the Preparatory Committee for its consideration. They would not ordinarily be referred to ACC except when in the view of the Preparatory Committee, policy issues requiring a decision of ACC are involved.

In reply to your letter of February 2, I am enclosing three copies of our responses to Part A of your questionnaire. I hope you will find them useful in your study.

After a careful review of Part B of the questionnaire, we have come to the conclusion that its completion by the Bank would make no useful contribution to the background material you are assembling. In the cases of most of the management functions and services listed in Part B there is no prescribed frequency in the Bank and the responsibility usually is assigned to, or assumed by, those staff members who are most directly concerned and best qualified to look into the matter at hand.

In some instances these responsibilities are assigned to an ad hoc committee convened formally by the management, sometimes with one of the vice presidents as chairman; on other occasions the matter may be referred to an informal working party to ensure that the views of all interested departments are represented; and in other instances, certain of these functions are undertaken entirely within the organizational unit directly concerned. Frequently the role of the Administrative Planning Section of this Department is to assist in obtaining opinions, clearances and approvals from those concerned and to see that any necessary follow-up instructions are issued.

- 1. You will recall that at the last session of the CCAQ, FAO was asked to take on responsibility for an inter-agency study dealing with the question of the organization and functions of "Management Services (O and M)". I have been requested to draw together the information required for this study and therefore I am sending you several copies of the questionnaire which is designed to provide enough background so that some useful conclusions may be derived.
- 2. Each of the agencies has its own particular organizational approach and methods of work in the field of management services. I believe that given the objectives of the survey the questionnaire will serve as a helpful device in the compilation and analysis of the relevant facts and background.
- 3. The questionnaire is not quite as imposing as it looks at first glance since much of the information is quite readily available within each agency, and probably a large number of the items are not specifically applicable in every agency. In any event from the replies received, assuming that the material will be received by 1 March 1959, I believe we can have some interesting conclusions available in advance of the coming CCAQ session.
- 4. As the CCAQ itself found, it is not easy to define just what is meant by the "Management Services" concept. There is a decided difference in terminology and fields of activity among the various agencies (and their legislative bodies) as well as in the general world of public and private administration in considering the problem of what constitutes this specific area of administrative practice.

CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATIVE QUESTIONS

STUDY OF ORGANIZATION AND FUNCTIONS OF MANAGEMENT SERVICES IN INTERNATIONAL AGENCIES

NOTE BY FAO

- 1. At its April 1958 meeting the CCAQ requested FAO to assume leadership for an inter-agency study dealing with "the question of the organization and functions of 'management services' (O and M)". This was in further implementation of the agreement at the March 1957 session that CCAQ should devote its attention to specific management problems of common interest.
- The objective of the survey has been interpreted as a descriptive analysis covering (i) the types of management advisory services already existing in international agencies, and their organizational location; (ii) the determination of whether such services also include responsibilities for line functions of a day-to-day administrative or executive type and the nature of such functions; (iii) the experience already derived from such services; (iv) the action contemplated to establish such services where non-existent or to modify existing management services; and (v) the formulation, on the basis of these factors, of some useful conclusions as to the possibilities which might well be pursued in connection with the further development of the concept of management services in international agencies.
- ... 3. The attached questionnaire has been devised, on the basis of preliminary discussions, to facilitate the compilation of the required information.
 - 4. The term "management services" is not easy to define precisely since there is such variety in its terminology and in the fields encompassed. This is partially illustrated by the many terms in common usage which have comparable and overlapping meanings in this respect, such as:

Management services
Management planning
Management consultancy
Management research
Management analysis
Administrative management
Administrative services
Administrative planning
Administrative research
Administrative analysis

Organization and methods (0 + M)
Procedures analysis
Scientific management
Business management
Office services administration
Methods improvement
Methods and system analysis
Work simplification
Operations research

5. Certain areas seem, however, to be universally or most frequently regarded as falling within the general concept of management services, such as development of effective long-range program planning and review procedures; intallation

of improved administrative practices; development of sound and adequate organizational plans; preparation of operating instructions and procedural manuals; development of improved methods and operating relations in the fields of general administration, accounting and finance; comparative study of the cost and effectiveness of machines and equipment; installation of automatic data processing systems and related training programs; development of methods of work simplification; preparation of space allocation programs; continuing and systematic analysis and improvement of form utilization; analysis of various phases of personnel and wage and salary administration; determination of specific staffing and budgetary needs; development of budgetary execution and control systems; comparative studies of administrative and management practices and policies in other agencies; and execution of special studies as requested by key administrative officials or legislative bodies.

- "management services" are provided by the highly specialized staff who, on an advisory basis, are dedicated to helping top-management and administrators do a better, more efficient job with the resources available, by undertaking systematic and comprehensive analyses of organization and management problems, for which administrators rarely have the time, the overall view (since usually more than one administrator is concerned), or the specialized professional knowledge, analytical experience and skill required to attain effective and economical solutions.
- 7. While there is general agreement that "management services" are in essence of a purely advisory nature, experience has shown that there is often a tendency for top-management also to assign "line" duties to its management advisory staff; or, conversely, to assign management investigations to "line" officers responsible for the daily execution of a specific part of the Organization's program inevitably, but by no means exclusively, in those Organizations where internal management advisory services do not exist. It is proposed to review the extent to which these differing approaches prevail in international agencies and, if possible, their reason and the action contemplated to modify them, if any.
- 8. A review of the various functions or tasks which administrators and legislative bodies tend to ascribe to "management services" (whatever the organization term actually used) makes it possible to group these various aspects under thirteen or fourteen different general headings convenient for this study, i.e.

A. Advisory Services

- 1. Organization analysis
- 2. Work simplification, measurement and improvement
- 3. Use of machines and equipment
- 4. Space and lay-out analysis
- 5. Form analysis and control
 - 6. Standardization of records, reports, and communications
- 7. Effective utilization of resources
- 8. Field operations
 - 9. Administrative research
- 10. Other

B. Line or Executive Functions

- 1. Staffing authorizations and manning tables
- 2. Development of policy and procedure Manuals and related materials
- 3. Classification and grading of posts
- 4. Establishment of general remuneration standards
- 5. Other

Each of these groups covers two to eight specific types of functions or assignments as shown in part B of the attached questionnaire. This grouping provides a means of surveying the ways in which the various international agencies approach the specific aspects listed, or of indicating where such aspects have not yet been dealt with.

- 9. You are asked, therefore, to specify in the format shown, which organizational unit in your agency, if any, is systematically concerned with or would be concerned with each management function or task listed, illustrating your responses, as appropriate, with specific examples of surveys or activities carried out in that field.
- 10. It should be emphasized that even though an agency may not have a formally designated management service, as such, it is still confronted with the types of functions and problems listed, and would necessarily, therefore, assign the responsibility to one or more organizational units, or else the functions and problems listed might be spread among several officers or units.
- 11. There are undoubtedly some overlappings among the various items listed, through the very nature of the management process; this fact will reveal itself, of course, in the analysis of the information provided.
- 12. If there are other types of functions or projects which are not listed but which you consider to fall within the scope of management services for purposes of this review, please so indicate on the questionnaire.
- 13. Any other related comments or information you can provide on the review as a whole or on specific aspects will be most welcome and helpful.
- 14. In order to have the preliminary results of the review ready for circulation well in advance of the forthcoming CCAQ session in Rome, would you be good enough to ensure that, if at all possible, the completed questionnaire is submitted, in triplicate, by 27 February 1959.

- (1) Do you have staff engaged full time on providing management advisory services to your organization's top management and administrators?
- (2) If <u>yes</u>, provide the official statement of its functions. How is the service organized? To whom does it report: (a) Structurally or organizationally, and (b) functionally? To whom, and through what channels does it submit its recommendations?
- (3) Indicate the number, type, and grading of staff in the service. Enclose a detailed organization and staffing chart indicating the relationship of the service to other parts of the organization; also copies of post descriptions at different levels, if available, of the staff in the service.
