ENERGY DEVELOPMENT AND THE WORLD BANK

Statement by the World Bank Observer, July 1976

Energy Development and The World Bank

Statement of World Bank observer before the Energy Commission, fifth session, Conference on International Cooperation and Development, Paris, July 12-16, 1976.

Mr. Chairman,

- 1. The World Bank is grateful for the invitation from this Commission to participate in its work as observer. In response to your and your colleague's request for information, I am glad to offer the following remarks. I understand that two questions have been raised in the June session which concern the World Bank: first, information on the Bank's project lending and other activities in the energy field; and second, the capital requirements of energy development in oil-importing developing countries. As the latter is a complex matter, I am making available some background papers prepared by the staff members of the World Bank on investment estimates for energy development and on prospects for international energy and petroleum. In addition, I am circulating another paper on financing of energy in developing countries prepared by a staff member of the Bank in his personal capacity. I trust that this background information will be of some help to the Energy Commission in its current deliberations.
- 2. World Bank operations in energy are part of the Bank's general lending activities for economic development. Therefore, energy lending is influenced by the policies and priorities which the Bank has for all individual sectors and countries.

- Lending for energy projects is an important part of all Bank operations. Since its creation, the World Bank has lent a total of \$8.8 billion for energy projects, particularly in electric power, but also coal mining, and oil and gas transportation and processing. Energy development represents one-fifth of all Bank financing.
- 4. In the power sector the Bank has made 297 loans and is by far the major source of financial support, accounting for more than the combined lending of all other official multilateral and bilateral banks. In the fossil fuel sector the Bank has been involved in 14 projects for oil and natural gas (mostly consisting of pipeline projects) and 4 for coal development. Lending for energy development projects other than electric power totals \$600 million.
- Bank for energy projects and 25 of them have borrowed at least \$100 million. The three major recipients are Brazil (over \$1 billion), India (over \$750 million), and Mexico (over \$700 million). In line with its general policies, the World Bank Group has increasingly shifted its assistance to the lower-income developing countries, and to the low-income groups in the middle-income developing nations. Its power projects are now allocating larger investments for rapid expansion of energy supply to the rural and urban poor.
- 6. Besides project finance, the World Bank has provided technical assistance in the energy sector. In-depth energy sector studies have been carried out since 1974 in six countries with complex energy patterns.

Studies have been commissioned with consultants to update information on the petroleum, coal and geothermal potential of LDCs: Desk reviews of technological developments have been undertaken (e.g., bio-gas, solar heaters, solar cells, windmills). Feasibility studies regarding the use of these technologies under specific conditions are planned.

- 7. The Bank staff analyzes and projects the probable behavior of energy consumption, production and trade. (This analytical work is embodied in annual papers which are distributed to the World Bank's Executive Directors and hence are available to the member governments). Within its regular program of country-economic reports, the Bank also analyzes increasingly the role of energy in individual economies, particularly in those countries which are substantial oil-importers or exporters.
- 8. As a provider of scarce multilateral development capital, the World Bank has to concentrate its resources on those projects for which alternative financial sources are inadequate. It is its responsibility to devote special attention to those sectors which have comparative difficulty in mobilizing sufficient development capital. Thus, the World Bank has increasingly emphasized agriculture, rural development, and projects for alleviation of poverty among the poorest elements of society. The Bank's operation in the energy sector should be viewed in this context.
- 9. Within the energy sector, the Bank has concentrated its assistance for energy development on power projects. This concentration

reflects the fact that power expansion takes up more than half (usually two-thirds) of all capital investments in energy production.

- 10. The Bank has not assisted petroleum production in the past for two main reasons: the economic justification for petroleum investments in most developing countries was marginal at a time when international prices were low and supplies increasingly abundant; and where the economic justification was not in doubt, finance was available from other sources. In view of the change in the oil situation in recent years, the Bank is trying to help developing countries make the structural adjustments necessitated by increased energy costs. The Bank is not opposed in principle to financing oil and gas production and is ready to consider project proposals on their merits and in accordance with its customary criteria.
- 11. The Bank recognizes the need for increasing exploration in developing countries. However, exploration involves high financial risks. The problem of financing exploration will no doubt receive considerable attention in your deliberations. There are many ways of resolving it, and different solutions are needed to allow for the physical character and political preferences of each nation.
- 12. The Bank is also paying increasing attention to alternative energy sources which may play a significant role in oil-importing developing nations. These include fuels which have not hitherto been commercially exploited, as well as new technologies like solar energy. The Bank is engaged in several small research projects in cooperation with interested developing nations.

advice to developing nations, an increasing number of energy sector studies will be carried out. They will provide guidance on energy planning, institutions, pricing, project selection, and other matters of importance to the needs of especially the oil-importing developing nations.

BELOW IS TEXT OF REPORT FROM BANK'S DELEGATION TO 6TH SESSION OF CIEC.

- I. POLITICAL ASSESSMENT
- THE CIEC TALKS RESUMED ON SEPT 14. THAT THIS HAPPENED AT ALL AFTER THE DEADLOCK AT THE 5TH SESSION IN JULY AND TWO MONTHS OF UNOFFICIAL DISCUSSIONS REFLECTS THE WILL ON BOTH SIDES TO AVOID A

FINAL BREAKDOWN, IRRESPECTIVE OF THE REAL SIGNIFICANCE OF THE

AGREEMENT ON THE WORK PROGRAM WHICH OPENED THE WAY FOR THE RENEWAL OF THE WORK OF CIEC. TO BE SURE, THE INTEREST SHOWED BY THE GROUP OF 8 IN RESUMING TALKS WAS NO SURPRISE TO ANYONE, SINCE ALTHOUGH THE G-8 IS NOT SO WARM ABOUT MAKING SUBSTANTIAL CONCESSIONS, THEY HAVE ALWAYS DECLARED THAT THEY WOULD BE GLAD TO PURSUE THE DIALOGUE WITHOUT PRE-CONDITIONS. FOR THE GROUP OF 19, HOWEVER, THE COMMITMENT TO RESUMING THE DIALOGUE WAS MUCH WEAKER SEMI COLON EVERYONE KNOWS THAT SOME OF THE GROUP OF 77 (AND EVEN A NUMBER OF THE COUNTRIES REPRESENTED IN THE CIEC) WERE FOR AN IMMEDIATE BREAKING OFF OF NEGOTIATIONS. THE FACT THAT THEIR VIEWS WAS NOT ADOPTED SHOWS THAT AMONG THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES, THOSE IN FAVOUR OF CONTINUING THE NEGOTIATIONS AND WHO STILL HARBOR HOPES OF OBTAINING SOME CONCESSIONS FROM THE INDUSTRIAL WORLD ARE IN A MAJORITY.

2. THE DIALOGUE ALSO WENT MORE SMOOTHLY THANKS TO A GREATER

HOMOGENEITY OF VIEWS WITHIN THE TWO GROUPS. AS IN THE PAST, THE

19 CONTINUED TO SPEAK, WITH A SINGLE VOICE, ALTHOUGH OF COURSE ON THE DEBT PROBLEM A NUMBER OF INDIVIDUAL STATEMENTS WERE MADE, NOTABLY BY MEXICO. THESE STATEMENTS PROVOKED SOME CONFUSION, BUT LATER MEXICO FORCEFULLY UNDERLINED THAT, ALTHOUGH ITS OWN INTERESTS WERE SOMEWHAT DIFFERENT, IT NONETHELESS STOOD FIRMLY IN FAVOUR OF THE G-19 COMMON POSITION.

FOR THE G-8, THE SESSION WAS HIGHLIGHTED BY A JOINT EEC-U.S.

PROPOSAL, WHICH COMING FROM THE TWO MOST IMPORTANT DELEGATIONS OF

THE GROUP, ALLOWED THEM TO REGAIN THE INITIATIVE. OF COURSE, THE

G-8 IS STILL FAR FROM PRESENTING A UNITED FRONT, BUT THE JOINT EEC/

U.S. PROPOSAL COULD BE A SIGN THAT COORDINATION IS NOW RUNNING

DEEPER AMONG THE INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES. PERHAPS THE DIALOGUE WILL

BEGIN TO SOUND LIKE A REAL DIALOGUE.

3. THE DIALOGUE IS RESUMING IN A RELAXED AND CONSTRUCTIVE ATMOSPHERE

ALTHOUGH ON NUMEROUS SUBJECTS DISCUSSIONS AND PROPOSALS HAVE REMAINED VAGUE AND UNSPECIFIED, ON THE INDEBTEDNESS ISSUE THE DIALOGUE FOCUSED FOR THE FIRST TIME ON TWO CONCRETE PROPOSALS. THIS CLEARED THE AIR, SINCE EVEN IF, IN REALITY, THE PROPOSALS WERE VERY FAR APART, DELEGATIONS AT LAST HAD THE SENSATION OF COMING TO GRIPS WITH A SPECIFIC PROBLEM.

4. ALL OF THIS ENCOURAGES A MODERATE DEGREE OF OPTIMISM WHICH WAS

IN FACT SHARED BY A NUMBER OF DELEGATES AND JOURNALISTS AT THE CONCLUSION OF THE SESSION. THIS MODERATE OPTIMISM IS HOWEVER QUITE FRAGILE FOR, ALTHOUGH THE INTERMINABLE AND USELESS DEBATES ON PROCEDURE ARE NOW HOPEFULLY OVER, AND THE CIEC IS ENTERING AN "ACTION-ORIENTED PHASE", THE LEVEL OF CONCESSIONS WHICH THE INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES ARE PREPARED TO MAKE (ESPECIALLY ON DEBT) WILL NOT MEET THE EXPECTATIONS OF THE GROUP OF 77. THE G-8 IS OBVIOUSLY OPPOSED TO ANY MEASURES LEADING TO A GENERAL RESCHEDULING OF DEBTS SINCE THEY FEAR THAT THIS WOULD UNDERMINE ORDERLY INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL RELATIONS. BEYOND THAT, GIVEN THAT ON THE OTHER VITAL AGENDA ITEM -- THE STABILIZATION OF RAW MATERIALS PRICES THROUGH A COMMON FUND -- THE INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES ONLY RELUCTANTLY ACCEPTED THE NAIROBI RESOLUTION, ONE MUST WONDER WHAT THE PROSPECTS OF THE DIALOGUE REALLY ARE.

5. MY IMPRESSION IS THAT EVEN IF THE INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES WANT TO SIGNIFICANTLY CHANGE THE QUALITY OF THEIR RELATIONS WITH THE THIRD WORLD THROUGH A CONSTRUCTIVE DIALOGUE, UNHAPPILY IT HAS NOW

CRYSTALIZED AROUND TWO QUESTIONS WHERE THERE IS LITTLE PROMISE OF

PROGRESS. BUT IT IS PRECISELY ON THESE TWO ISSUES THAT THE

DEVELOPING COUNTRIES HAVE SET THEIR HEART, AND IT WILL TAKE TIME (AND PERHAPS SOME CONFRONTATION) BEFORE THE DIALOGUE TURNS TO OTHER MORE PROMISING AGENDA ITEMS LIKE DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE, INDUSTRIALIZATION, TRANSFER OF TECHNOLOGY, DEVELOPMENT OF AGRICULTURE, ETC.

OBJECTIVELY EXPECT MAJOR RESULTS BEFORE THE END OF THE YEAR, WHICH IN EFFECT MEANS THAT THE CONFERENCE COULD PROLONG ITS WORK INTO THE FIRST MONTHS OF 1977. IN ANY CASE WHETHER CIEC IS CONSIDERED A

FAILURE OR A SUCCESS LARGELY DEPENDS ON THE G-19'S POLITICAL EVALUA-

TION OF THE RESULTS. IF THEY DECIDE TO CALL IT A FAILURE, THEY WILL

HAVE EVERY REASON FOR DOING SO SINCE THE ACHIEVEMENTS ARE BOUND TO
BE VERY FEW RELATIVE TO THE REAL NEEDS OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES.
BUT THEY COULD ALSO CALL IT A SUCCESS IF THEY THINK THAT, HOWEVER
LIMITED THE RICH COUNTRIES' CONCESSIONS, THEY ARE EVIDENCE OF A WILL
FOR CHANGE IN A NEGOTIATION PROCESS WHICH WILL SPREAD OVER SOME YEARS.

II. TECHNICAL ANNEX ON INDEBTEDNESS

THE PROBLEM OF INDEBTEDNESS WAS DISCUSSED IN BOTH DEVELOPMENT AND FINANCE COMMISSIONS AND TOOK UP MOST OF THE TIME OF THESE COMMISSIONS.

THE EEC AND U.S. DELEGATION TABLED A JOINT PROPOSAL BASED ON

"STRUCTURAL" PROBLEMS REGARDING FOREIGN DEBT. ACCORDING TO THE EEC/U.S. PROPOSAL, ACUTE DEBT CRISES WOULD BE TREATED, ON A CASE BY CASE BASIS, IN CREDITOR CLUBS, AT THE REQUEST OF THE DEBTOR CONCERNED. THE PROPOSAL MADE TO THE FINANCE COMMISSION IS IN FACT NO MORE THAN A SYSTEMATIZATION OF THE PROCEDURES AND GUIDELINES ALREADY IN OPERATION IN THE CLUB OF PARIS, OR IN THE CONSORTIA DEALING WITH DEBT RESCHEDULING OPERATIONS.

AS REGARDS STRUCTURAL PROBLEMS, THE EEC/U.S. PROPOSAL SUGGESTS
REMEDIAL MEASURES TO DEAL WITH SITUATIONS OF A LONGER-TERM NATURE
IN THE CASE OF DEVELOPING NATIONS DEPENDING LARGELY ON AID. THE
PROPOSAL SUGGESTS A SCREENING PROCESS THROUGH WHICH A COUNTRY HAVING
SUCH PROBLEMS WOULD REQUEST AN EXAMINATION OF ITS SITUATION BY THE
WORLD BANK OR ANOTHER APPROPRIATE MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT FINANCE
INSTITUTION. IF THE ANALYSIS REVEALED THAT THE DEVELOPMENT
PROSPECTS OF THE COUNTRY WERE SERIOUSLY HAMPERED, THE EXAMINING
INSTITUTION WOULD CONTACT AID DONORS TO DISCUSS, IN MUTUAL AGREEMENT,
THE NEEDS OF THE DEVELOPING COUNTRY. IF NEED BE, THE DONOR
COUNTRIES WOULD ENHANCE ASSISTANCE EFFORTS, GENERALLY BY INCREASING
THE QUANTITY, AND IMPROVING THE QUALITY, OF THEIR AID. AS FAR AS
MULTILATERAL INSTITUTIONS ARE CONCERNED, THEY WOULD BE ASKED TO

"CONSIDER COMMITTING NEW RESOURCES IN AN APPROPRIATE FORM WITHIN
THEIR LENDING POLICIES AND PRACTICES".

SWEDEN WAS THE ONLY OTHER MEMBER OF THE G-8 TO MAKE A FORMAL

PROPOSAL ON INDEBTEDNESS. THE SWEDISH PROPOSAL RECOMMENDS TO CREDITOR COUNTRIES THAT THEY SHOULD PROVIDE ADDITIONAL ODA TO LLDCS AND MSAS EITHER BY GRANTING DIRECT ODA DEBT RELIEF OR BY TAKING EQUIVALENT MEARXLHNBL (E.G. UNITED PROGRAM AID). THE IMPLEMENTATION WOULD BE LEFT TO EACH DEVELOPED COUNTRY ON A BILATERAL BASIS.

THE G-19 MADE TWO PROPOSALS FOR THE TREATMENT OF DEBT PROBLEMS:

⁽A) AN IMMEDIATE, ONE-SHOT, GENERALIZED DEBT RELIEF OPERATION FOR

"INTERESTED" DEVELOPING COUNTRIES, PRIMARILY LLDCS AND

MSAS SEMI COLON

⁽B) THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A PROCEDURAL FRAMEWORK TO EXAMINE, AND IN CASE OF NEED, REORGANIZE DEBT PROBLEMS, WHETHER ACUTE OR STRUCTURAL.

ALTHOUGH DISCUSSIONS ON THE TWO PROPOSALS WERE CLEAR AND CONSTRUCTIVE, THE POSITIONS OF EACH GROUP REMAIN WIDE APART. THE G-8 SAID THAT THE G-19 PROPOSALS WERE AT VARIANCE WITH THE NAIROBI RESOLUTION SINCE IT DEPARTED FROM THE CASE BY CASE APPROACH, AGREED UPON IN UNCTAD 4. THEY ALSO POINTED OUT THAT GOVERNMENTS IN THE INDUSTRIALIZED COUNTRIES HAD LITTLE LEVERAGE ON THEIR BANKING SYSTEM TO HAVE IT COMPLY WITH THE MEASURES PROPOSED BY G-19. FINALLY, THEY STRESSED THAT WIDESPREAD RENEGOTIATION OF DEBT WOULD UNDERMINE THE SYSTEM OF FINANCIAL INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS AND EVENTUALLY REDUCE FUTURE FLOWS OF CAPITAL TO LDCS.

THE G-19 CRITICIZED THE EEC/U.S. PROPOSAL FROM SEVERAL ANGLES:
THESE PROPOSALS DREW TOO MUCH ON THE EXPERIENCE OF THE PAST AND DID
NOT SUGGEST MEASURES ATTUNED TO THE FUTURE SEMI COLON THEY DID NOT
TAKE INTO ACCOUNT THE CASE OF COUNTRIES WHICH WOULD HAVE AVOIDED
AN ACUTE DEBT CRISIS AT THE EXPENSE OF THEIR GROWTH PROSPECTS.
G-19 SAID THAT THE EEC/U.S. PROPOSAL DID SUGGEST A MECHANISM WHICH
ALREADY EXISTS AND HAS NOT ANSWERED THE IMMEDIATE NEED FOR GENERAL
RELIEF EXPERIENCED BY A NUMBER OF MSAS, LLDCS AND OTHER COUNTRIES.
IN THIS RESPECT, THEY SAID THAT A CASE BY CASE APPROACH WOULD BE
TOO TIME CONSUMING. FINALLY, G-19 DEMANDED THAT THERE SHOULD BE NO
TRADE-OFF BETWEEN AID AND DEBT RELIEF, AND THEY QUESTIONED THE
SUITABILITY OF WORLD BANK AS CENTRAL AGENT FOR DEBT STUDIES AND
RELIEF ACTION.

IN THE COURSE OF THE DISCUSSIONS, BRAZIL AND MEXICO EXPRESSED THE VIEW THAT FOR COUNTRIES RELYING PRIMARILY ON WORLD FINANCIAL MARKETS, SOLUTIONS TO THE PROBLEMS WHICH MAY ARISE IN CONNECTION WITH INDEBTEDNESS ARE TO BE FOUND IN THE NORMAL WORKING OF THOSE MARKETS.

THESE STATEMENTS -- ESPECIALLY MEXICO'S -- CAST SOME DOUBT AS
TO THE APPARENT UNANIMITY OF G-19 ON THE DEBT ISSUE. HOWEVER,
MEXICO LATER IN THE SESSION, STATED THAT IT HAD IN NO WAY INTENDED
TO DISCRIMINATE ITSELF FROM THE G-19 PROPOSALS.

THE OCTOBER SESSION OF THE CIEC WILL HAVE TO FIND SOME AGREEMENT ON THE DEBT PROBLEM, WHICH HAS BECOME THE MOST CRITICAL ISSUE
OF THE CONFERENCE. IN PREPARATION FOR THAT SESSION, AN INFORMAL
GROUP (EEC, U.S., PAKISTAN, INDIA) WILL MEET ON OCT 15 AND SEEK A
COMPROMISE, POSSIBLY ON THE BASIS OF THE SWEDISH PROPOSAL VIS A VIS
THE MSAS AND LLDCS, AND ON THE G-8 PROPOSAL FOR THE SCREENING
PROCESS APPLICABLE TO "STRUCTURAL" DEBT PROBLEMS. BUT THERE STILL
IS A VERY LARGE GAP BETWEEN THE PRESENT POSITION OF EACH SIDE.

III. TECHNICAL ANNEX ON COMMISSION ON DEVELOPMENT
(EXCEPT DEBT PROBLEMS)

LITTLE TIME WAS LEFT IN THE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION FOR DISCUSS-IONS ON ISSUES OTHER THAN INDEBTEDNESS. ON THE RESOURCE TRANSFER

ISSUE, THE G-19 MADE A NEW CALL ON G-8 FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF THE O.7 PERCENT TARGET.

ON FOOD AND AGRICULTURE, ONE PROPOSAL WAS SUBMITTED BY CANADA,

EEC AND USA (CCEI-DE-34), ANOTHER ONE BY THE G-19 (CCEI-DE-33),
BOTH DEALING EXTENSIVELY WITH EACH OF THE FOUR SUB-ITEMS: INCREASED
PRODUCTION, FERTILIZERS, FOOD AID AND FOOD SECURITY. THE G-19
PAPER IS QUITE SPECIFIC IN ITS DEMANDS, INTER ALIA TO IMPROVE AND
INCREASE AID TO AGRICULTURE TO REACH A 75 PERCENT GRANT ELEMENT BY
1980 SEMI COLON TO COVER MINIMUM FERTILIZER NEEDS OF MSAS OF
ONE MILLION TONS OF NUTRIENTS IN 1976/77 SEMI COLON TO CREATE A
FOOD SECURITY RESERVE OF 17 TO 18 PERCENT OF ANNUAL WORLD FOOD GRAINS
CONSUMPTION, PLUS NATIONAL EMERGENCY STOCKS BY DEVELOPED COUNTRIES
OF NOT LESS THAN 25 PERCENT OF THAT COUNTRY'S FOOD AID, PLUS AN
INTERNATIONAL RESERVE FOR EMERGENCIES OF 500,000 TONS SEMI COLON
TO MAKE AVAILABLE 10 MILLION TONS OF GRAINS PER ANNUM AS FOOD AID
PLUS ADDITIONAL AMOUNTS FOR FOOD OTHER THAN GRAIN. THE EEC/CANADA/
U.S. PAPER, WHILE COVERING THE SAME GROUND, WAS KEPT IN MUCH MORE
CONDITIONAL AND GENERAL TERMS.

IN THE ENSUING DEBATE, MUCH STRESS WAS LAID ON THE DEGREE OF CONVERGENCE BETWEEN THE TWO PROPOSALS AND THE CHAIRMAN WAS GLAD TO NOTE THAT IN THIS FIELD THE COMMISSION HAD ALREADY STARTED WORKING ON CONCRETE TEXTS WHICH WILL FORM PART OF THE FINAL CIEC DOCUMENT. NONETHELESS, A NUMBER OF DIVERGENCIES REMAINED. THE DEVELOPED COUNTRIES WOULD HAVE LIKED MORE EMPHASIS ON SELF-HELP POLICIES, BY THE LDCS BOTH IN FOOD PRODUCTION AND IN THE SUPPLY OF FERTILIZERS. THEY FOUND MANY OF THE TARGETS FOR AID AND CONTRIBUTIONS TO FOOD RESERVES AS QUANTIFIED IN THE G-19 PAPER BOTH TOO SPECIFIC AND TOO AMBITIOUS.

THE G-19 ON THE OTHER HAND, WHILE ACKNOWLEDGING THE GENERAL READINESS OF THE DEVELOPED COUNTRIES TO UNDERTAKE CONSIDERABLE OBLIGATIONS, COMPLAINED ABOUT THE VAGUENESS OF THE EEC/CANADA/U.S. PROPOSAL WHENEVER IT CAME TO SPECIFIC PLEDGES.

BEFORE ADJOURNING THE MEETING UNTIL OCTOBER 20, THE CHAIRMAN SAID THE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION SHOULD NOT DUPLICATE EFFORTS THAT WERE GOING ON ELSEWHERE E.G. IN THE FAO AND IN THE WORLD FOOD COUNCIL, BUT SHOULD TRY TO ENERGIZE THEM. HE SAID IN THE MEANTIME THE CHAIRMEN WOULD CONTINUE THEIR PERSONAL EFFORTS TO PROMOTE IFAD. IN OCTOBER, INDUSTRIALIZATION WILL BE THE NEXT ITEM ON THE AGENDA.

IV. TECHNICAL ANNEX ON COMMISSION ON FINANCIAL AFFAIRS
(EXCEPT DEBT)

LIKE THE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION, THE FINANCE COMMISSION HAD NO TIME TO REALLY DISCUSS ISSUES OTHER THAN DEBT. INCONCLUSIVE AND ACADEMIC DISCUSSIONS TOOK PLACE ON WORLD INFLATION. G-19 BLAMED KEYNESIAN BUDGET POLICIES OF THE G-8 FOR WORLD INFLATION SEMI COLON THEY SAID THAT THE OECD COUNTRIES HAD RECEIVED A TRANSFER OF RESOURCES OF ONE TRILLION DOLLARS FROM OPEC BECAUSE OF UNDERPRICING OF OIL. G-19 STILL REGARD THE CURRENT OIL PRICE AS WELL BELOW THE PRICE OF ALTERNATIVE SOURCES, EQUIVALENT TO 18-20 DOLLARS PERBARREL.

ON THE ISSUE OF PROTECTION OF FOREIGN FINANCIAL ASSETS OF OIL

EXPORTERS, THE G-8 REJECTED ONCE AGAIN ANY PROPOSALS FOR SPECIAL AND DISCRIMINATORY PROTECTION FOR OPEC'S ASSETS, WHICH HAD BEEN EMPHATICALLY CALLED FOR BY SAUDI ARABIA.

THE ENERGY COMMISSION RECONVENED ON SEPTEMBER 14 AS A RESULT OF THE COMPROMISE ON THE PRESERVATION OF PURCHASING POWER OF EXPORT "EARNINGS. THE G-8 AND G-19 HAD AGREED WITH THE PROPOSAL BY CIEC CO-CHAIRMEN TO TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION UNDER THE WORK PROGRAM PROPOSALS ON THE SUBJECT OF PRESERVATION OF PURCHASING POWER OF ENERGY EXPORT EARNINGS.

THE COMMISSION STARTED ITS DISCUSSIONS FOR THE SO-CALLED OPERATIONAL PHASE OF CIEC ON SEPTEMBER 15. ITS PROGRAM FOR THIS PERIOD INCLUDES 1) RESOURCE AVAILABILITY SUPPLY AND DEVELOPMENT 2) ENERGY PRICES AND THE PURCHASING POWER OF ENERGY EXPORT EARNINGS 3) TECHNICAL SCIENTIFIC AND FINANCIAL COOPERATION. AS THE RESUMPTION OF THE CIEC COMMISSION MEETING IN SEPTEMBER HAD TAKEN MOST DELEGATIONS BY SURPRISE. NONE HAD PREPARED PAPERS FOR DISCUSSION UNDER THE WORK PROGRAM. HOWEVER. THE COMMISSION STARTED WORK ON AGENDA ITEM ONE BY REOPENING ITS CONSIDERATION OF THE AMERICAN PROPOSALS FOR AN INTERNATIONAL RESOURCES BANK AND AN INTERNATIONAL ENERGY INSTITUTE. THESE PROPOSALS WERE IDENTICAL TO THE VERSIONS SUBMITTED IN JUNE AND JULY. IN REPLY TO PRELIMINARY QUESTIONS BY THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES. THE US STATED THAT THE INTERNATIONAL ENERGY INSTITUTE WOULD AT THIS TIME NOT BE LIMITED. TO DEVELOPMENT OF ENERGY RESOURCES ONLY BUT ALSO INCLUDE NOW FUEL MINERALS. JAMAICA HAD ASKED THE US WHETHER A RESTRICTION OF IRB ENERGY MATTERS WOULD BE POSSIBLE. SEVERAL G-19 DELEGATES PERCEIVED A CONFLICT BETWEEN IRB AND THE UNCTAD PROPOSAL FOR A COMMON FUND FOR COMMODITIES. THE US REPEATED THAT IRB WAS IN NO WAY A COUNTER PROPOSAL AGAINST THE COMMON FUND AND THAT A PERCEIVED CONFLICT WOULD NOT APPLY ANYWAY TO THE ENERGY SECTOR. BECAUSE THIS IS NOT COVERED BY THE COMMON FUND.

THE IRB WOULD CONCENTRATE ITS ACTIVITIES ON ENERGY DEFICIENT DEVELOPING COUNTRIES, BUT THE US DID NOT WANT TO RULE OUT ACTIVITIES IN FAVOR OF INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES. THE IRB WOULD NOT HAVE A GENERAL FORMULA FOR GUARANTEEING FOREIGN INVESTMENTS AGAINST NON COMMERCIAL RISKS. THESE GUARANTEES AND RECOURSE FOR FOREIGNCOMPANIES AND HOST GOVERNMENTS IN CASE OF DEFAULT OR NATIONALIZATION WOULD BE NEGOTIATED CASE BY CASE.

IRB WOULD NOT ACT AS A BANK, NOTWITHSTANDING ITS NAME. IT WOULD BE A PROMOTER OF FOREIGN INVESTMENT BECAUSE OF ITS ROLE AS MEDIATOR BETWEEN HOST GOVERNMENTS AND FOREIGN COMPANIES, BRING THE TWO TOGETHER IN TRILATERAL AGREEMENTS AT WHICH IRB WOULD BE A PARTY.

IRB WOULD ALSO FUNCTION AS GUARANTOR FOR FAITHFUL EXECUTION OF THE OBLIGATIONS OF THE AGREEMENTS BY BOTH SIDES. MOREOVER IRB WOULD ACT AS SALES AGENT FOR COMMODITY BONDS.

PROMOTE DEVELOPMENT OF OTHER ENERGY SOURCES. THE US EXCLUDED,
HOWEVER, THERMAL ENERGY AND THOSE ALTERNATIVE ENERGY FORMS THAT ARE
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ACHIEVE A BLUE PRINT OF AN INSTITUTION THAT WILL SATISFY ALL SIDES.

THE COMMISSION DID NOT ARRIVE AT ANY SPECIFIC CONCLUSION ON THE IRB AND MOVED ONTO DISCUSSIONS ON THE INTERNATIONAL ENERGY INSTITUTE. SEVERAL DELEGATIONS RAISED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE LIMITED TASKS, SMALL STAFF AND EMPHASIS ON ENERGY PLANNING AND TRAINING IN THE AMERICAN PROPOSAL. G-19 DEEMED THE TRANSFER OF ENERGY TECHNOLOGY THE MOST IMPORTANT TASK OF ANY NEW INSTITUTION.

IT RAISED QUESTIONS ON HOW IEI WOULD BE ABLE TO TRANSFER A
TECHNOLOGY WHICH IS MAINLY IN THE PRIVATE HANDS IN THE WESTERN OIL
COMPANIES. SAUDI ARABIA, ALGERIA, IRAN AND
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SHIFTED TO OCTOBER. BOTH THE DISCUSSIONS ON THE IRB AND ON THE IEI
WERE MORE POSITIVE THAN IN JUNE AND JULY. NEITHER OF THE PROPOSALS
WERE REJECTED BY MEMBERS OF G-19.

IN A COMPREHENSIVE BUT GENERAL PAPER ON ENERGY COOPERATION,
THE EEC PROPOSED A FLEXIBLE MACHINERY FOR ON-GOING INTERNATIONAL
ENERGY CONSULTATIONS AFTER CIEC IS FINISHED. IT WOULD FOCUS ON
PRICES, SUPPLIES, DEMAND, INVESTMENT, AND DIVERSIFICATION. THIS
BODY WOULD HAVE LIMITED BUT REPRESENTATIVE MEMBERSHIP, MEETING
AT LEAST ANNUALLY.

THE EEC PAPER STATED: QUOTE THE ENERGY COMMISSION SHOULD EXAMINE THE ROLE OF THE WORLD BANK, AND THE NEED FOR A BODY TO PERFORM FUNCTIONS OF THE KIND SUGGESTED FOR AN INTERNATIONAL RESOURCES BANK. UNQUOTE THIS EXAMINATION MIGHT TAKE PLACE IN OCTOBER. G-19 REACTED POSITIVELY TO EEC PAPER BUT DISCUSSION WAS POSTPONED TILL OCTOBER.

THE RAW MATERAIL COMMISSION DID NOT PRODUCE ANYTHING OF SIGNIFICANCE DURING THE SEPTEMBER MEETING. ALL DELEGATION HAD COME UNPREPARED. AFTER A SHORT DISCUSSION ON MINOR PROCEDURAL MATTERS, NIGERIA PRESENTED ON BEHALF OF G-19 A HASTILY DRAFTED NOTE ON TRANSPORT MARKETING AND DISTRIBUTION OF RAW MATERIALS. G-8 RAISED POLITELY SOME QUESTIONS ABOUT IT BUT THE PAPER WAS NOT SERIOUSLY DISCUSSED. WHEN PRESSED BY G-19 ALL MEMBERS OF G-8 HAD TO ADMIT THEY TOO, HAD NO PAPERS OR ORAL STATEMENTS TO MAKE. THEREFORE THE COMMISSION DECIDED TO ADJOURN UNTIL OCTOBER.

THE OCTOBER SESSION MAY BE THE FIRST TIME THAT THE RAW MATERIALS

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CONSISTING OF THREE GROUPS OF AGENDA ITEMS: 1) ALL STRUCTURAL IMPROVE—

MENT OF COMMODITY MARKETS 2) IMPROVEMENT IN EXPORT EARNINGS,

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COUNTRIES IN GENERAL, AND 3) IMPROVEMENT IN COMMODITY TRADE,

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TIME THE COMMISSION URGED ALL DELEGATIONS TO SUBMIT PAPERS PRIOR TO

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BE EXTENDED BY A FEW DAYS. AT THE END OF THE SEPTEMBER SESSION THERE

WERE STILL NO INDICATIONS OF THE RESULTS OF WHAT THE RAW MATERIALS

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PRODUCTIVE COMMISSION WITH NO CLEARLY DEFINED TASK.

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BOTH THE DISCUSSIONS ON THE IRB AND ON THE IEI WERE MORE

POSITIVE THAN IN JUNE AND JULY. NEITHER OF THE PROPOSALS WERE

REJECTED BY MEMBERS OF G-19.

PLEASE ADD THE SUMMARIES OF THE COMMISSIONS DISCUSSIONS ON SEPTEMBER 16 AND 17 AS REPORTED IN THE CABLES TO HEADQUARTERS.

DISCUSSIONS IN THE RAW MATERIALS COMMISSION.

THE RAW MATERIALS COMMISSION DID NOT PRODUCE ANYTHING OF

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SIGNIFICANCE DURING THE SEPTEMBER MEETING. ALL DELEGATIONS HAD COME UNPREPARED. AFTER A SHORT DISCUSSION ON MINOR PROCEDURAL MATTERS, NIGERIA PRESENTED ON BEHALF OF G-19 A HASTILY DRAFTED NOTE ON TRANSPORT MARKETING AND DISTRIBUTION OF RAW MATERIALS.

G-8 RAISED POLITELY SOME QUESTIONS ABOUT IT BUT THE PAPER WAS NOT SERIOUSLY DISCUSSED. WHEN PRESSED BY G-19 ALL MEMBERS OF G-8 HAD TO ADMIT THAT THEY TOO HAD NO PAPERS OR ORAL STATEMENTS TO MAKE. THEREFORE THE COMMISSION DECIDED TO ADJOURN UNTIL OCTOBER.

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OCTOBER SESSION. IF DELEGATIONS WISH, THE OCTOBER SESSION
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WHAT THE RAW MATERIALS COMMISSION MIGHT PRODUCE BEFORE
DECEMBER. IT REMAINS THE LEAST PRODUCTIVE COMMISSION WITH
NO CLEARLY DEFINED TASK.

DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION - SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 18

JAMAICA MADE BITTER INTERVENTION ON INDEBTEDNESS, EXPRESSING ON BEHALF OF G-19 KEEN DISAPPOINTMENT WITH THE EEC/US POSITION AS CABLED EARLIER. EEC/US WOULD HAVE TO QUOTE MAKE A SUBSTANTIAL CHANGE BEFORE CIEC DIALOGUE COULD BECOME FRUITFUL UNQUOTE. G-8 WILL HAVE TO ABANDON CASE-BY-CASE APPROACH FOR ACUTE CRISES, AND PROPOSE SPECIFIC MEASURES FOR RELIEF OF BOTH OFFICIAL AND COMMERCIAL DEBTS OF MSAS, LLDCS, AND GEOGRAPHICALLY DISADVANTAGES STATES. JAMAICA DID NOT ADDRESS MULTILATERAL DEBT QUESTIONS. ITS INTERVENTION SHOWED ONCE AGAIN THAT BOTH SIDES ARE STILL FAR APART ON DEBT RELIEF. G-8 DID NOT RESPOND AND COMMISSION MOVED ON TO ODA.

SWEDEN PROPOSED THAT ALL DONORS SHOULD REACH 0.7 PERCENT OF GNP BY 1980, RAISE GRANT ELEMENT TO 90 PERCENT, MAKE ODA TO LLDCS AVAILABLE AS GRANT ONLY, AND UNTIE ALL AID THROUGH MULTILATERAL ARRANGEMENTS. CANADA URGED ACHIEVEMENT OF 0.7 PERCENT AS SOON AS POSSIBLE AND SPOKE IN FAVOR OF A SPEEDY AND SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE IN IDA RESOURCES. (SWEDEN DID NOT MENTION IDA.) US, EEC, AND JAPAN DID NOT PRESENT PAPERS ON ODA. US REJECTED 0.7 PERCENT AS TARGET BUT CALLED FOR A GENERAL INCREASE OF ODA. JAPAN AND EEC EXPRESSED AGAIN SUPPORT FOR 0.7 PERCENT BUT WITHOUT A DATE.

SPEAKING FOR G-19. PAKISTAN MAINTAINED THAT 1980 WAS THE ULTIMATE YEAR FOR ACHIEVEMENT OF ODA TARGET. DONORS SHOULD LEVY A DEVELOP-MENT TAX. ESTABLISH INTEREST SUBSIDY FUNDS. RAISE ODA BUDGETS ANNUALLY BY 25 PERCENT IN REAL TERMS TILL 0.7 PERCENT HAD BEEN ACHIEVED. SET ASIDE AN UNSPECIFIED PERCENTAGE OF ANNUAL GNP INCREASE FOR ODA. AND REALLOCATE AID TO MSAS, LLDCS, AND GEOGRAPHICALLY DISADVANTAGED STATES. PAKISTAN DEMANDED FURTHER THAT THE QUALITY OF ODA SHOULD BE IMPROVED BY RAISING GRANT ELEMENT, DEDUCTING INTEREST PAYMENTS. EXCLUDING LOANS WITH GRANT ELEMENT BELOW 50 PER-CENT. EXCLUDING ODA TO DEPENDENT TERRITORIES. AND INCREASING NON-PROJECT AND PROGRAM ASSISTANCE. IDA SHOULD BE REPLENISHED AT DOLLAR NINE BILLION AND IDA MIGHT IMMEDIATELY START TO BORROW ON CAPITAL MARKET TO EXPAND ITS RESOURCES WHICH SHOULD THEN RECEIVE INTEREST SUBSIDY FROM PART I COUNTRIES. THIRD WINDOW SHOULD BE RAISE TO ONE BILLION DOLLARS AND BECOME PERMANENT. WORLD BANK'S GENERAL CAPITAL INCREASE SHOULD BE APPROVED. INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS SHOULD SOFTEN THEIR ASSISTANCE TERMS AND ADJUST LOANS FOR PROJECT INFLATION. THESE G-19 DEMANDS WERE BY AND LARGE SUPPORTED BY SWEDEN.

ALL MEMBERS OF G-8 STATED THAT CIEC SHOULD REFRAIN FROM SETTING
A SPECIFIC LEVEL FOR IDA REPLENISHMENT AND NOT INTERFERE WITH
NEGOTIATIONS.

PROVISION OF ONLY GRANTS TO THE LLDCS. US VIEWS ONE PERCENT OF GNP AS TARGET FOR TOTAL FLOWS AS THE ONLY VALID MEASURE. INDIA REACTED VERY CRITICALLY TO US, EEC, AND JAPANESE POSITIONS.

DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION CONCLUDED ITS DISCUSSION OF ODA FOR TIME BEING AND WILL DISCUSS AGRICULTURE AND FOOD ON MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 20.

IN A COMPREHENSIVE BUT GENERAL PAPER ON ENERGY COOPERATION,
THE EEC PROPOSED A FLEXIBLE MACHINERY FOR ON-GOING INTERNATIONAL
ENERGY CONSULTATIONS AFTER CIEC IS FINISHED. IT WOULD FOCUS ON
PRICES, SUPPLIES, DEMAND, INVESTMENT, AND DIVERSIFICATION. THIS
BODY WOULD HAVE LIMITED BUT REPRESENTATIVE MEMBERSHIP, MEETING

THE ROLE OF THE WORLD BANK, AND THE NEED FOR A BODY TO PERFORM
FUNCTIONS OF THE KIND SUGGESTED FOR AN INTERNATIONAL RESOURCES
BANK UNQUOTE. THIS EXAMINATION MIGHT TAKE PLACE IN OCTOBER.
G-19 REACTED POSITIVELY TO EEC PAPER BUT DISCUSSION WAS POSTPONED
TILL OCTOBER. THE COMMISSION THEN ADJOURNED.

SWEDEN GAVE A SYMPATHETIC . BUT VAGUE RESPONSE TO G-19 PROPOSAL, 'SPECIFICALLY ON PARAGRAPH QUOTE MULTILATERAL DEBTS UNQUOTE. SWEDEN SAID THAT MULTILATERAL INSTITUTIONS WOULD PROBABLY HAVE TO PLAY AN INCREA-SINGLY IMPORTANT ROLE IN DEBT PROBLEMS, 7BUT IT DID NOT SEE WHAT EXACTLY THESE INSTITUTIONS SHOULD DO. G-19 THEN COMMENTED UPON EEC/US PROPOSAL. PAKISTAN POINTED OUT THAT EEC/US HAD PROPOSED A MECHANISM WHICH ALREADY EXISTS, AND DOES NOT THUS REPOND TO NEEDS FOR GENERALIZED RELIEF. PAKISTAN FURTHER SAID THAT PROPOSAL OVERLOOKED THE FACT THAT MSAS HAD SEEN THEIR GROWTH PROSPECTS JEOR-PARDIZED BY THE CRISIS, INDIA REPEATED THE STATEMENT IT HAD ALREADY MADE IN THE FINANCE COMMISSION ON SEPT. 14 (SEE MYTEL NUMBER 11). INDIA STRESSED THE NEED FOR A ONE-SHOT, GENERALIZED OPERATION, TO DEAL WITH AN EXTRAORDINACY SITUATION. A CASE BY CASE APPROACH WOUL EVNOFEROBETELYS TIME CONSUMING. THERE AGL ALREADY RECOGNIZED BY UN. WHICH COULD PROVIDE BASIS FOR A GENERA-LIZED APPROACH OF THE DEBT PROBLEM.

EEC REPLIED BY REITERATING PREFERENCE OF THE G-8 FOR THE CASE BY CASE APPROACH. EEC FURTHER STRESSED THAT EEC/US PROPOSAL WAS PROVIDING GUIDELINES NOT ONLY FOR PROBLEMS OF TODAY, BUT ALSO FOR FUTURE OPERATIONS.

FINANCIAL COMMISSION INTERRUPTED ITS DISCUSSION OF DEBT RELIEF MEASURES FOR CONSIDERATION OF PAPERS ON WOLKLD INFLATION AND THE PROTECTION OF FOREIGN FINANCIAL ASSETS OF OIL EXPORTERS. THE US AND THE EEC REJECTED ONCE AGAIN ANY PROPOSALS FOR SPECIAL PROTECTION OF OPECS FOREIGN INVESTMENTS WITH THE PRINCIPLE OF NON-DISCRIMINATORY TREATMENT OF ALL INVESTORS. SAUDI-ARABIA REJECTED THIS G-8 POSITION FLATLY AND REPEATED OPEC DEMANDS WITHOUT PROPOSING SPECIFIC MECHANISMS. AFTER SHARP BUT INCON-:CLUSIVE POLEMICS, THE COMMISSION MOVED ON TO MEASURES TO COMBAT INFLATION. ON BEHALF OF G-19, IRAN BLAMED THE KEYNESIAN BUDGET POLICIES OF THE G-8 FOR WORLD INFLATION. IRAN CALCULATED THAT INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES HAD RECEIVED A HUGE TRANSFER OF RESOURCES FROM OPEC BECAUSE OF UNDERPRICING OF OIL AMOUNTING TO ONE TRILLION DOLLARS IN TOTAL. IRAN REGARDS THE CURRENT OIL PRICE STILL BELOW ALTERNATIVE SOURCES. CORRESPONDING TO 18-20 DOLLARS PER BARREL. IRANIAN PROPOSALS FOR CURBING WORLD INFLATION WERE NON-SPECIFIC. TO WIT CONTROL OF INTERNATIONAL LIQUIDITY CREATION, RETURN TO STABLE CURRENCIES, DECREASED ROLE OF GOLD, STRENGTHENING OF IMF SUPERVISION AND INCREASE IN VOTES OF LDCS IN INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS. PAKISTAN EMPHASIZED MEED FOR TRADE LIBERALIZATION AS MEANS TO COMBAT INFLATION. IN GENERAL, DISCUSSIONS WERE ACADEMIC AND DID NOT DIFFER FROM THOSE IN THE FIRST, ANALYTICAL, PHASE OF CIEC.

1. ENERGY COMMISSION MET TO HEAR U.S. INTRODUCE INTERNATIONAL

RESOURCES BANK. THE PROPOSAL IS IDENTICAL TO THE VERSION REPORTED IN JUNE WHICH IS ON FILE IN THE POLICY PLANNING DIVISION. IN REPLY TO G-19 QUESTIONS, U.S. STATED THAT THE PROPOSAL WOULD, AT THIS TIME, NOT BE LIMITED TO DEVELOPMENT OF ENERGY RESOURCES BUT ALSO INCLUDE NON-FUEL MINERALS. IRB WOULD CONCENTRATE ON LDCS BUT LENDING TO INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES COULD NOT BE RULED OUT. IRB IS NO COUNTER PROPOSAL AGAINST COMMON FUND. U.S. HAS NO GENERAL FORMULA FOR IRB GUARANTEE POWERS. THE NATURE OF GUARANTEES AND RECOURSE OF FOREIGN COMPANIES IN CASE OF EXPROPRIATION OR DEFAULT SHOULD BE NEGOTIATED CASE BY CASE. IRB WOULD NOT BE LIMITED TO GIL AND GAS BUT DEVELOP ALL ENERGY SOURCES. U.S. EXCLUDED HOWEVER THERMAL ELECTRICITY AND NOT COMMERCIALLY VIABLE ALTERNATIVE ENERGY. U.S. MAY SUBMIT MORE SPECIFIC PROPOSALS IN OCTOBER.

2. RAW MATERIALS COMMISSION DECIDED TO ADJOURN BECAUSE OF LACK

OF PREPARATION BY ALL DELEGATIONS. PARTICIPANTS WERE URGED TO SUBMIT ANY PAPERS ON ITEMS COVERED IN THE WORK PROGRAM TO THE SECRETARIAT BEFORE OCTOBER 20, FOR DISTRIBUTION PRIOR TO THE NEXT MEETING.

PRESENTED THEIR PROPOSAL ON PROBLEMS OF INDEBTEDNESS OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES - THE TEXT OF WHICH WAS RELAYED TO YOU EARLIER TODAY IN MYTEL NO. 9. ONLY EEC GAVE A SIGNIFICANT FIRST REACTION TO THE G-19 PROPOSAL. EEC SAID THAT PROPOSAL WAS AT VARIANCE WITH THE NAIROBI RESOLUTION SINCE IT DEPARTED FROM THE CASE BY CASE APPROACH AGREED UPON IN UNCTAD 4. EEC FURTHER SAID THAT THE G-19 WAS NOT REALLY AIMING AT DETERMINING WHAT FEATURES COULD PROVIDE GUIDANCE IN FUTURE OPERATIONS, AS REQUESTED BY UNCTAD RESOLUTION.

FINALLY, THE EEC SAID THAT GOVERNMENTS IN INDUSTRIALIZED COUNTRIES HAD LITTLE LEVERAGE ON THE BANKING SYSTEM TO HAVE IT COMPLY WITH THE MEASURES PROPOSED BY G-19 FOR THE TREATMENT OF COMMERCIAL DEBTS.

CRITICIZED PROPOSAL MADE BY EEC AND U.S. FOR THE TREATMENT OF ACUTE DEBT CRISIS SITUATIONS. INDIA CONTENDED THAT THIS PROPOSAL DID NOT FOLLOW THE DIVISION OF LABOR AGREED UPON BY THE CO-CHAIRMEN'S WORK PROGRAM. INDIA FURTHER SAID THAT THE EEC/U.S. PROPOSAL DREW TOO MUCH ON THE EXPERIENCE OF THE PAST AND DID NOT SUGGEST MEASURES ATTUNED TO THE FUTURE. THE INDIAN DELEGATE SAID THAT THE DIAGNOSIS FOR DEBT CRISES HAD TO BE MADE IN REFERENCE TO THE NATURE OF THE ILLNESS RATHER THAN TO ITS SERIOUSNESS. HE ALSO POINTED OUT THAT THE EEC/U.S. PROPOSAL DID NOT TAKE INTO ACCOUNT THE CASE OF COUNTRIES WHICH WOULD HAVE AVOIDED ACUTE DEBT CRISES AT THE EXPENSE OF THEIR GROWTH PROSPECTS. HE FURTHER QUESTIONED THE ROLE ASSIGNED IN THE PROPOSAL TO MULTILATERAL INSTITUTIONS WHICH QUOTE GIVE SOMETIMES INADEQUATE RESPONSE TO THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE LDCS OR GIVE THEIR ASSISTANCE UNDER CONDITIONS WHICH ARE DETRIMENTAL TO THEIR ECONOMIC GROWTH. UNQUOTE INDIA'S DECLARATION WAS NOT COMMENTED UPON BY THE G-8.

THE G-19 THEN TABLED A PROPOSAL FOR 'FUTURE DEBT RENEGOTIATIONS FOR INTERESTED DEVELOPING COUNTRIES'. THIS PAPER DEFINES
THE GENERAL OBJECTIVES OF DEBT REORGANIZATION, SUGGESTS A
PROCEDURE FOR THE INITIATION OF INTERNATIONAL ACTION, RECOMMENDS
A PROCEDURE FOR ANALYSIS OF A COUNTRY'S LONG TERM ECONOMIC
SITUATION. THE PAPER FURTHER DEFINES GUIDELINES FOR FINANCIAL
RENEGOTIATION AND RAISES THE PROBLEM OF INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS
FOR FINANCIAL RENEGOTIATIONS. THE PAPER DOES NOT ASSIGN ANY
PARTICULAR ROLE TO THE BANK AND TO MULTILATERAL INSTITUTIONS IN
GENERAL.

REACTIONS FROM THE G-8 WERE ONLY OF PROCEDURAL NATURE. G-8
GENERALLY THOUGHT THAT THE G-19 PROPOSALS WENT FAR BEYOND THE MERE
ACUTE DEBT CRISIS SITUATIONS WHICH THE FINANCIAL COMMISSION HAS TO
DEAL WITH, AND THAT THIS WOULD ENTAIL DUPLICATION OF WORK WITH
THE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION. BUT IT WAS AGREED THAT G-8 WOULD
GIVE A MORE DETAILED ANSWER TO G-19 PROPOSAL NEXT FRIDAY.

THE COMMISSION THEN TOOK UP SUBJECT OF "MEASURES AGAINST INFLATION" AND HEARD TWO PRESENTATIONS BY THE U.S. AND EEC, BOTH UNDERLYING THE NEED FOR A COMMON FIGHT AGAINST INFLATION AND ASKING THE LDCS AS WELL AS THE DEVELOPED COUNTRIES TO TAKE THEIR SHARE IN THIS FIGHT.

THE COMMISSION HAD NO TIME TO REALLY DISCUSS THE ISSUE, WHICH WILL BE TAKEN UP AGAIN LATER IN THE WEEK. REGARDS

SECOND PHASE OF THE CONFERENCE WITH A VIEW TO FACILITATING AGREEMENT ON CONCRETE PROPOSALS TO BE SUBMITTED FOR APPROVAL TO THE
MINISTERIAL CONFERENCE.

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THE COMMISSION ON FINANCIAL AFFAIRS WILL FORMULATE PROPOSALS FOR PRINCIPLES OR FEATURES FOR DEBT REORGANIZATION OPERATIONS. THE COMMISSION ON DEVELOPMENT WILL CONSIDER OTHER ASPECTS OF OR PROPOSALS ON INDEBTEDNESS OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES TAKING INTO ACCOUNT THEIR DEVELOPMENT NEEDS AND EXTERNAL PAYMENTS PROBLEMS. THE COMMISSION ON DEVELOPMENT AGREES:

I REMEDIAL MEASURES TO DEAL WITH SITUATIONS OF A LONGER-TERM NATHRE

IN THE CASE OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES DEPENDING LARGELY ON AID. FINANCIAL SITUATIONS OF A LONGER-TERM NATURE WHERE AN ADVERSE STRUCTURE OF THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS CAN HAMPER DEVELOPMENT WOULD BE CONSIDERED ON AN INDIVIDUAL BASIS WITH A VIEW TO PROVIDING AID INF FORMS BETTER ADAPTED TO THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS NEEDS OF THE RECIPIENT IN THE PERIOJ OF DIFFICHLTY FORESEEN. IF IN THE LIGHT OF THESE ELEMENTS ANY FURTHER STEPS SEEMED NECEFSARY THE RELEVANT INSTITUTION WOULD THEN ANALYZE THE GENERAL ECONOMIC SITUATION OF THE COUNTRY INCORPORATING THE FUND'S ASSESSMENT OF ITS BALANCE OF PAYMENTS AND EXCHANGE RATE POLICIES AND PROSPECTS, INCLUDING DEBT SERVICING. THIS ANALYSIS WOULD

ALSO MAKE AN APPRECIATION OF THE LEVEL OF ODA WHICH IS AVAILABLE
IN APPROPRIATE FRRMS. THE ANALYSIS WOULD, FURTHERMORE, ESTABLISH
THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE CUNTRY'S USE OF BOTH DOMESTIC AND EXTERNAL
RESOURCES FOR SAFEGUARDING ITS DEVELOPMENT PROCESS, SUCH AS
MOBILIZATION OF DOMESTIC SAVINGS, PRIORITIES FOR NEW INVESTMENT,
AND EXPORT PROMOTION POLICIES, AND ITS MEASURES FOR MONITORING
EXTERNAL CREDITS AND OTHER MEASURES TO AVOID DEBT- SERVICING
DIFFICULTIES.

- THAT, IN THE CONTEXT OF DEVELOPMENT POLICY, THE PROSPECTS OF THE COUNTRY IN QUESTION ARE SERIOUSLY HAMPERED, CONTACT THE AID DONORS IN ORDER TO DISCUSS, BY MUTUAL AGREEMENT, THE NEEDS OF THE DEVELOPING COUNTRY. THIS COULD BE DONE WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK OF CONSORTIA AND CONSULTATIVE GROUPS. OTHERWISE, THE RELEVANT INSTITUTION N COULD ORGANIZE AD HOC MEETINGS OF DONORS OR CONTACT DONORS INDIVIDUALLY IN CASES WHERE THIS IS APPROPRIATE. THE APPROPRIATE INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTION WOULD SUBMIT A REPORT TO THE DONOR COMMUNITY AND THE RECIPIENT COUNTRY ON MEASURES WHICH THEY MIGHT TAKE, TAKING INTO ACCOUNT THE USE OF IMF FACILITIES BY THE RECIPIENT COUNTRIES AND INVITE ALL CONCERNED TO EXAMINE THIS REPORT SYMPATHATICALLY.
- 5. IN THE EVENT THE DONOR COUNTRIES FIND THE DEVELOPING
 COUNTRY WHICH HAS MADE A REQUEST IS ENCOUNTERING LONG-TERM FINANCIAL
 DIFFICULTIES IMPINGING UNDULY ON ITS DEVELOPMENT PROGRESS, THEY
 WOULD, TO THE BEST OF THEIR ABILITIES, ENHANCE ASSISTANCE EFFORTS
 IN RESPONSE TO A DEVELOPING COUNTRY DEMONSTRATING ITS WILLINGNESS
 TO TAKE CORRECTIVE MEASURES ON ITS OWN BEHALF INSOFAR AS IT IS
 ABLE. SUCH AN EFFORT SHOULD GENERALLY BE DIRECTED TOWARDS
 INCREASING THE QUANTITY OF AID IN APPROPRIATE FORMS AND IMPROVING

THE QUALITY SO THAT TERMS ARE APPROPRIATE TO THE ECONOMIC SITUATION AND THE DEVELOPMENT PROSPECTS OF THE RECSPIENT COUNTRY.

6. AMONG THE VARIOUS MEASURES WHICH MIGT BE TAKEN BY A DONOR CLUNTRY FOR THIS PURPOSE, PROGRAM AID AND ANY FLEXIBLE FORMS OF WUICKLY DISBURSABLE AID WOULD BE CONSIDERED PREFERABLE TO ODA DEBT REORGANIZATION. HOWEVER, IN EXCEPTIONAL CASES, A DONOR COUNTRY MIGHT CHOOSE TO USE ODA DEBT REORGANIZATION, ALONG THE FOLLOWING LINES (SELON LES ORIENTATIONS SULVANTES):

THE CONCESSIONAL ELEMENT OF REORGANIZED CREDITS WOULD BE AS GREAT AS THE AVERAGE CONCESSIONAL ELEMENT OF COMPARABLE NEW CREDITS PROVIDED BY THE DONORS CONCERNED.

- 7. AS TO MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT FINANCE INSTITUTIONS, THEY WOULD CONSIDER COMMITTING NEW RESOURCES IN AN APPRVVCUWZS FORM WITHIN THEIR LENDING POLICIES AND PRACTICES.
- 8. THE DEBTOR WOULD TRY TO MAKE EQUIVALENT ARRANGEMENTS WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES NOT TAKING PART IN THE OPERATION SO THAT THE INCREASED BALANCE OF PAYMENTS FLEXIBILITY PROVIDED WAS NOT INDIRECTLY USED TO REPAY THESE OTHER COUNTRIES.

WHEN PRESSED BY G-19, THE G G-8 ADMITTED IT DID NOT HAVE ANY



SUBJECT: CIEC September Session

- Mr. McNamara called to give his reaction and instructions on the proposals in Mrs. Boskey's memorandum on the subject dated September 9, 1976.
- He sees no advantage in making a statement summarizing the relevant points in the Manila speech. On the other hand, he approves Mrs. Boskey's proposal in paragraph 8 of her paper to the effect that the Bank Delegation should make positive noises, if asked to speak on the contents of the document which was telexed from Paris by Carriere, along the lines indicated in paragraph 8.
- Concerning the fact that the Bank is not mentioned in that part of the OECD document relating to the rescheduling of debts, Mr. McNamara indicates that if we are asked to speak on that subject we should state simply the following: the fact that international organizations (do not say World Bank) are not mentioned in connection with debt rescheduling is presumed to mean that the present practice continues, i.e., that the Bank remains outside rescheduling exercises.

CIEC, September Session; Instructions to the Bank Delegation

- 1. The OECD document on indebtedness of LDCs (CES 76-80) mentioned in Carriere's earlier cable, which you asked to see, is no longer operative (and in any case we have not yet received it). It has been replaced by a working paper prepared by the (Belgian) Chairman of an OECD working group. The texts of the new paper (see telex 2160) and of Carriere's comments on it (his telex 2164) are attached.
- Carriere has told us that the Bank delegation to the CIEC might be asked, even as early as Monday afternoon, to comment on those proposals of the paper which contemplate Bank involvement.
- 3. In summary, the new OECD paper distinguishes between acute debt crises situations and situations of a longer term nature. As regards the treatment of the former, the proposal approved by the working party does not seem to call for any additional responsibilities on the part of the Bank. As regards longer term situations, on the other hand, the proposals (none of which was adopted by the working party and which therefore represent only the views of individual delegations) do call for the Bank to take on a new role.
- 4. In the case of longer term problems, the U.S. has proposed a "screening process" in which a developing country which considered that it had such a problem would submit its case "to the IBRD or another appropriate multilateral development finance institution mutually agreed upon." The institution would examine the data and, if appropriate, would contact the aid donors to discuss the needs of that developing country within the framework of consortia, existing consultative groups or ad hoc group meetings.
- 5. Canada has proposed another method: "systematic evaluation". It is suggested that the Bank, with the assistance of IMF, would undertake country-by-country studies starting with the poorest (unless a country indicated it did not wish to be considered). The completed studies might be referred to the Boards of the Bank and Fund which might jointly determine whether debt relief action is to be recommended in each case.
- 6. The working paper also contains proposals made separately by the U.S., the EEC, Canada and Sweden on action to be taken in identified cases, following the screening of systematic evaluation, on measures to prevent the reemergency of debt servicing problems (Canada) and on the need of a general political commitment to provide additional resources (Sweden).

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- 7. We seek your approval for the following. The Bank delegation would take the opportunity to present a summary of the position you are taking in the Manila speech and of your views as reflected in the speech. This statement could use the poorest nations-middle income countries dichotomy developed in the speech. This should help focus the dialogue on more substantive aspects of the problem. If you agree, a statement will be prepared for your approval.
- 8. In addition, if the delegation is pressed to comment on the proposals made in the OECD paper described above, it will indicate that the Bank's staff would be ready to examine with care, and then to make its views known on, any proposal which gathers general acceptance by both sides in the Commission. Within its means and, where appropriate with the approval of its Board, the Bank staff will be willing to assist in the implementation of arrangements agreed in the Conference. The Bank delegation will be careful to present this view in a positive manner. It will make clear that it cannot pronounce on schemes submitted by individual delegations or by groups of delegations before there is consensus, and that, in any case, the Bank staff has not had time to consider adequately the contents of the OECD paper.

 SEVERAL DELEGATIONS, PRIMARILY U.S., EEC AND CANADA. THEREFORE
 YOU CAN EAFELY CONSIDER CES 78-80 AS VOID.
- SO-CALLES ACUTE DEST CRISES SITUATIONS. SUCH SITUATIONS

 VOULD CONTINUE TO BE TREATED ON A CASE BY CASE BASIS, IN CREDITOR

 CLUBS, AT THE PEQUEST OF THE DEBTOR CONCERNED. AMONG THE

 FEATURES CHARACTERIZING DEST REORGANIZATION, ONE CAN FIND THE

 PRINCIPLE OF EQUALITY AND HOR DISCRIMINATION AMONG ALL CREDITS,

 CREDITORS, INCLUDING THOSE BOT PARTICIPATING IN THE CREDITOR CLUB.

THE CHAIRMAN'S WORKING PAPER HOWEVER DOES NOT SPECIFY THAT
INTERNATIONAL LENDING INSTITUTIONS SHOULD BE EXOMERATED FROM
THE DEST REDOGANIZATION. I DO NOT THINK THAT THIS OMISSION WAS
MADE DELIBERATELY. BUT WE MUST TRY TO MAVE THE PRINCIPLE OF
EXOMERATION, WITH RESPECT TO THE BANK, EXPLICITLY BEAFFIRMED
IN THE COURSE OF THE DISCUSSIONS IN THE CIEC.

I. THE OECD AD HOC MEETING OF GOVERNMENTAL REPRESENTATIVES IN THE FINANCIAL AND DEVELOPMENT FIELDS, UNDER THE AUSPICES OF THE COUNCIL, MET IN PARIS SEPT 7-8. AFTER THE MEETING THE CHAIRMAN CIRCULATED A WORKING PAPER SUMMARIZING THE DISCUSSIONS. BELOW IS TEXT OF THIS CONFIDENTIAL PAPER.

2. QUOTE

INDEBTEDNESS OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

IT WAS RECOGNISED AT THE OUTSET THAT INDEBTEDNESS PER SE IS

NOT NECESSARILY AN INDICATION OF FINANCIAL OR ECONOMIC WEAKNESS ON THE PART OF THE DEBTOR COUNTRY, AND THAT EXTERNALLY-BORROWED FUNDS CAN BE PARTICULARLY USEFUL TO DEVELOPING COUNTRIES AS A SUPPLEMENTAL SOURCE OF FINANCING FOR ECONOMIC GROWTH.

IN CONSIDERING THIS QUESTION, IT IS USEFUL TO DISTINGUISH BETWEEN TWO DIFFERENT TYPES OF SITUATION.

THE FIRST IS AN ACUTE DEBT CRISIS, INVOLVING DEFAULT OR IMMINENT DEFAULT ON DEBT SERVICING, AS WELL AS SERIOUS BALANCE-OF-PAYMENTS DIFFICULTIES IN WHICH DEBT SERVICING PAYMENTS PLAY A MAJOR ROLE. THIS SITUATION IS CHARACTERISED BY THE FACT THAT IT CANNOT BE REMEDIED, IN THE SHORT-TERM, BY APPROPRIATE INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL ADJUSTMENT MEASURES WHICH THE DEBTOR COUNTRY CAN REALISTICALLY BE EXPECTED TO TAKE. CONSEQUENTLY, THERE IS A NEED FOR RECOURSE TO

DEBT RE-ORGANISATION AS A LAST RESORT.

THE SECOND TYPE OF SITUATION IS OF A LONGER-TERM NATURE,
INVOLVING STRUCTURAL, FINANCIAL AND TRANSFER OF RESOURCES PROBLEMS
WHICH CONSTRAIN THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS AND HAMPER DEVELOPMENT SEMI
COLON IN WHICH SITUATION THE COUNTRY CONCERNED IS NOT FACING DEFAULT,
OR IMMINENT DEFAULT, ON EXTERNAL DEBT SERVICING. IN THIS SITUATION
THERE WOULD BE MORE SCOPE FOR TIMELY AND APPROPRIATE INTERNAL AND
EXTERNAL ADJUSTMENT MEASURES INCLUDING ALL THOSE AFFECTING THE
QUANTITY, QUALITY AND USE OF EXTERNAL RESOURCE TRANSFERS.

THE STRUCTURE AND PROSPECTS OF ALL ITEMS OF THE BALANCE-OF PAYMENTS HAVE TO BE TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT IN EXAMINING BOTH TYPES OF SITUATION.

I. ACUTE DEBT CRISIS SITUATIONS

BASIS, IN CREDITOR CLUBS, AT THE REQUEST OF THE DEBTOR CONCERNED.
WITHIN THESE CLUBS THE PROBLEMS OF THE DEBTOR CONCERNED WOULD BE
DISCUSSED IN A SPIRIT OF CO-OPERATION.

TO PROVIDE GUIDANCE FOR DEBT REORGANISATION IN ACUTE DEBT CRISIS SITUATIONS, SOME OF THE FEATURES WHICH COULD CHARACTERIZE DEBT REORGANISATION IN SUCH CIRCUMSTANCES ARE SET OUT BELOW:

- THE DEBTOR COUNTRY WOULD UNDERTAKE A COMPREHENSIVE ECONOMIC

 PROGRAMME DESIGNED TO STRENGTHEN ITS UNDERLYING BALANCE OF

 PAYMENTS SITUATION. THIS PROGRAMME WOULD, AS A GENERAL RULE,

 BE WORKED OUT WITH, AND MONITORED BY, THE IMF.
- DEBT REORGANISATION AND THE PROGRAMME OF ECONOMIC MEASURES SHOULD TAKE INTO ACCOUNT THE DEVELOPMENT PROSPECTS OF THE DEBTOR COUNTRY, THEREBY ENABLING IT TO CONTINUE DEBT

SERVICING PAYMENTS AND RESTORE ITS CREDIT WORTHINESS.

- THE MODALITIES OF DEBT REORGANISATION WOULD BE DETERMINED FLEXIBLY, ON A CASE BY CASE BASIS, TAKING INTO ACCOUNT, ON THE ONE HAND, THE ECONOMIC SITUATION AND PROSPECTS OF THE DEBTOR COUNTRY, THE DEVELOPMENT PROSPECTS AND THE FACTORS CAUSING THE DEBT SERVICE DIFFICULTIES AND, ON THE OTHER HAND, THE LEGITIMATE INTERESTS OF THE CREDITORS.
- DEBT REORGANISATION WOULD COVER OFFICIAL AND OFFICIALLY GUARANTEED DEBT WITH A MATURITY OF OVER ONE YEAR.
- CONSOLIDATION PERIODS WOULD NORMALLY BE KEPT RELATIVELY SHORT,
 AND GENERALLY WOULD NOT EXTEND, AS TO FUTURE MATURITIES,
 BEYOND THE YEAR IN WHICH THE REORGANISATION IS UNDERTAKEN.
- EQUALITY AND NON-DISCRIMINATION AMONG ALL CREDITORS,

 INCLUDING THOSE NOT PARTICIPATING IN THE CREDITOR CLUB, IS

 AN ESSENTIAL PRINCIPLE UNDEPLYING THE OPERATION OF DEBT

 RENEGOTIATIONS. CREDITOR COUNTRIES WITH MINOR DEBTS DUE,

 WHICH FREQUENTLY INCLUDE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES, WOULD

 GENERALLY, HOWEVER, BE EXCLUDED FROM THE MULTILATERAL DEBT

 RENEGOTIATION.
- IN RESPECT OF ITS PRIVATE NON-OFFICIALLY GUARANTEED DEBT, THE DEBTOR COUNTRY WOULD BE EXPECTED TO NEGOTIATE DEBT REORGANISATION WITH PRIVATE CREDITORS ON TERMS SIMILAR TO THOSE AGREED IN THE "CREDITOR CLUB" FOR ITS OFFICIAL AND OFFICIALLY GUARANTEED DEBT.
- DEBT REORGANISATION ARRANGEMENTS WOULD PROVIDE FOR FLEXIBILITY
 TO REVIEW THE SITUATION AT THE END OF THE CONSOLIDATION
 PERIOD IN THE LIGHT OF UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES. THEY SHOULD
 ALSO PROVIDE FOR ACCELERATED REPAYMENTS IN AN AGREED MANNER
 IF THE DEBTOR'S ECONOMIC SITUATION IMPROVES MORE RAPIDLY THAN
 ANTICIPATED.

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IN THE CASE OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES DEPENDING LARGELY ON AID,
STRUCTURAL PROBLEMS CAN HAMPER THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT.

IN THE PRESENT WORLD ECONOMIC SITUATION, THERE ARE CASES AMONG MSA
AND LEAST DEVELOPED COUNTRIES WHERE DEVELOPMENT PROSPECTS HAVE BEEN
SERIOUSLY REDUCED BY SUCH STRUCTURAL PROBLEMS. THESE PROBLEMS,
WHICH MAY LEAD TO DIFFICULTIES IN IMPLEMENTING DEBT FINANCING,
CONSTITUTE GENERAL PROBLEMS OF TRANSFER OF RESOURCES.

THESE PROBLEMS ON AN INDIVIDUAL BASIS, BILATERALLY OR IN AN APPROPRIATE MULTILATERAL FRAMEWORK, SUCH AS CONSORTIA AND CONSULTATIVE OR AD HOC AID GROUPS, WITH A VIEW TO PROVIDING AID IN FORMS BETTER ADAPTED TO THE BALANCE-OF-PAYMENTS NEEDS OF THE RECIPIENT IN THE PERIOD OF DIFFICULTY PORESEEN AND THAT FURTHER CONSIDERATION OF THIS ISSUE IS NECESSARY.

IT IS DESIRABLE THAT INTERNATIONAL FINANCING INSTITUTIONS, DONOR COUNTRIES AND DEVELOPING COUNTRIES SHOULD CONTINUE TO CO-OPERATE THAT LONGER-TERM STRUCTURAL FINANCIAL PROBLEMS CAN BE AVOIDED BY TIMELY AND EFFICIENT MANAGEMENT OF LONG-TERM PESOURCES.

TO THIS END, INTER ALIA:

- (A) DEVELOPING COUNTRIES SHOULD MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO:
 - (1) TAKE ON DEBT OBLIGATIONS ONLY TO THE EXTENT THAT THE MARGINAL MARGINAL BENEFITS OF THESE FUNDS EXCEED THE MARGINAL COSTS SEMI COLON
 - (2) UNDERTAKE TO BORROW FUNDS ONLY FOR PURPOSES OF A HIGH PRIORITY IN THE CONTEXT OF THEIR DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES SEMI COLON

- (B) DONOR COUNTRIES SHOULD MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO ASSIST THE
 DEVELOPING COUNTRIES IN COPING WITH THEIR EXTERNAL FINANCIAL
 PROBLEMS, BY SUCH MEASURES AS:
 - AND ENSURING THAT TERMS ARE COMPATIBLE WITH THE
 RECIPIENT'S DEVELOPMENT STATUS SEMI COLON
 - (2) OFFERING TECHNICAL ADVICE AND ASSISTANCE ON DEBT

 MANAGEMENT TECHNIQUES, INCLUDING ADVICE ON THE USE OF

 COMMERCIALLY-BORROVED FUNDS SEMI COLON AND
 - (3) MAKING AN EFFORT TO MAXIMIZE ASSISTANCE TO THOSE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES WHOSE FINANCIAL SITAUTION MAY CONSTRAIN GROWTH UNDULY.

NEVERTHELESS, IT IS RECOUNISED THAT, DESPITE SUCH PREVENTATIVE ACTION, DIFFICULT STRUCTURAL FINANCIAL PROBLEMS MAY ARISE, WHICH MAY UNDULY IMPEDE A COUNTRY'S DEVELOPMENT, AND THAT SPECIFIC REMEDIAL MEASURES WOULD THEN BE CALLED FOR.

MECHANISM TO IDENTIFY AND AID COUNTRIES WITH SERIOUS STRUCTURAL FINANCIAL PROBLEMS

NOT ALL OF THE POOREST COUNTRIES ARE EXPERIENCING SERIOUS
STRUCTURAL FINANCIAL PROBLEMS. IT IS IMPORTANT, THEREFORE, TO HAVE
SOME MECHANISM FOR IDENTIFYING COUNTRIES IN THESE SITUATIONS AND
INSURING THAT APPROPRIATE ACTION TO ASSIST THEM IS TAKEN. IT WAS
NOTED THAT THERE APPEARED TO BE AT LEAST TWO APPROACHES WHICH

PROCESS IN WHICH COUNTRIES WHICH FELT THEY HAD SUCH A PROBLEM WOULD SUBMIT THEIR CASE TO AN APPROPRIATE INTERNATIONAL BODY, PROBABLY THE IBRD, AND HAVE THEIR CASE EXAMINED. THE SECOND IS A SYSTEMATIC EXAMINATION OF ALL OF THE POOREST COUNTRIES TO DETERMINE WHICH ARE IN NEED. FURTHER DETAILS ON THE TWO APPROACHES ARE GIVEN BELOW.

A. SCREENING PROCESS

ONE POSSIBLE METHOD OF CARRYING OUT A SCREENING PROCESS, WHICH WAS NOTED, IS SET OUT BELOW:

- THE DEVELOPING COUNTRY CONCERNED WOULD MAKE A REQUEST TO
 THE IBRD OR ANOTHER APPROPRIATE MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT
 FINANCE INSTITUTION MUTUALLY AGREED UPON. THESE REQUESTS
 SHOULD GIVE REASONS AND CONTAIN ALL OTHER RELEVANT DATA.
- (2) THE APPROPRIATE INSTITUTION WOULD THEN EXAMINE THE REQUEST,
 PAYING PARTICULAR ATTENTION TO THE FOLLOWING ELEMENTS:
 - (A) THE RELATIVE POVERTY OF THE DEVELOPING COUNTRY CONCERNED SEMI COLON
 - ODA SEMI COLON
 - CO DEVELOPMENTS IN AND PROSPECTS FOR EXPORT RECEIPTS AND

 FOR THE CAPACITY OF ENSURING IMPORTS ESSENTIAL TO THE

 DEVELOPMENT PROCESS, SUCH AS FERTILIZER AND OTHER

 ASPICULTURAL INPUTS, FOODSTUFFS, ENERGY, CAPITAL GOODS

 (AND SPARE PARTS) AND INDUSTRIAL NAW MATERIALS SEMICOLON
 - AND ITS CAPACITY FOR ANY FURTHER DORROWING UPON NONCONCESSIONAL TERMS SEMI COLON
 - (E) THE IMPACT WHICH THE SITUATION HAS ALREADY HAD UPON

ESSENTIAL IMPORTS SEMI COLOR

- (F) WHETHER THE DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR THE RELEVANT PERIOD IS
 APPROPRIATE SEMI COLON
- GO THE EXTENT TO WHICH IME DEVELOPING COUNTRY HAS MADE USE OF IMF FACILITIES.
- THE APPROPRIATE INSTITUTION WOULD INCORPORATE THE FUND'S
 ASSESSMENT OF ITS BALANCE OF PAYMENTS AND EXCHANGE RATE
 POLICIES AND PROSPECTS, INCLUDING DEBT SERVICING. THIS
 ANALYSIS WOULD ALSO MAKE AN APPRECIATION OF THE LEVEL
 OF ODA WHICH IS AVAILABLE IN APPROPRIATE FORMS. THE
 ANALYSIS WOULD, FURTHERMORE, ESTABLISH THE EFFECTIVENESS
 OF THE COUNTRY'S USE OF BOTH DOMESTIC AND EXTERNAL RESOURCES
 FOR SAPEGUARDING ITS DEVELOPMENT PROCESS, SUCH AS
 MOBILISATION OF DOMESTIC SAVINGS, PRIORITIES FOR NEW
 INVESTMENT, AND EXPORT PROMOTION POLICIES, AND ITS MEASURES
 FOR MONITORING EXTERNAL CREDITS AND OTHER MEASURES TO
 AVOID DEBT-SERVICING DIFFICULTIES AS OUTLINED IN THE REPORT
 OF THE UNCTAD AD HOC GROUP OF GOVERNMENTAL EXPERTS ON
 DEBT PROBLEMS OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES.
- THAT, IN THE CONTEXT OF DEVELOPMENT POLICY, THE PROSPECTS

 OF THE COUNTRY IN QUESTION ARE SERIOUSLY AFFECTED, CONTACT

 THE AID DONORS IN ORDER TO DISCUSS, BY MUTUAL AGREEMENT,

 THE WEEDS OF THE DEVELOPING COUNTRY WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK

 OF CONSORTIA, EXISTING CONSULTATIVE GROUPS OR AD NOC GROUP
 MEETINGS.

ONE POSSIBLE METHOD OF CAPRYING OUT SUCH A SYSTEMATIC EVALUATION WHICH WAS NOTED, IS SET OUT BELOW.

THE WORLD BANK (WITH THE ASSISTANCE OF THE IMF) SHOULD BE REQUESTED TO UNDERTAKE SUCH STUDIES ON A COUNTRY-BY-COUNTRY BASIS WITH PRIORITY TO THE LEAST DEVELOPED AND POOREST MSA DEVELOPING COUNTRIES. THE STUDIES SHOULD BE UNDERTAKEN UNLESS PRIVATE CONSULTAT IONS INDICATE THE DEBTOR COUNTRY DOES NOT WISH TO BE CONSIDERED.

(A FIRM TIME-TABLE FOR THE COMPLETION OF THE STUDIES MIGHT BE ESTABLISHED). THE COMPLETED STUDIES MIGHT BE REFERRED TO THE EXECUTIVE BOARDS OF THE IBRD AND IMF WHICH MIGHT JOINTLY UNDERTAKEN THE PROCESS OF DETERMINING WHETHER (SPECIFIC) ACTION (IN THE FORM OF DEBT RELIEF) IS RECOMMENDED IN EACH CASE.

ACTION IN IDENTIFIED CASES

AS REGARDS THE TYPE OF ACTION WHICH COULD BE TAKEN, ON A CASE BY CASE BASIS, FOLLOWING THE SCREENING OR SYSTEMATIC EVALUATION PROCESS, THE FOLLOWING TWO TYPES OF SOLUTION WERE MOTED:

(A) THE DELEGATION WHICH PROPOSED THE SCREENING PROCESS SET OUT ABOVE, HAS ALSO PROPOSED THE FOLLOWING SUBSEQUENT ACTION:

- (1) THE APPROPRIATE INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTION WOULD SUBMIT ITS REPORT ON MEASURES WHICH MIGHT BE TAKEN BY THE RECIPIENT COUNTRY, TAKING INTO ACCOUNT THE USE OF IMP FACILITIES, AND BY THE DONOR COUNTRIES AND INVITE ALL CONCERNED TO EXAMINE THESE RECOMMENDATIONS FAVOURABLY.
- PROGRAMME AID AND ANY FLEXIBLE FORMS OF QUICK DISBURSING AID WOULD BE CONSIDERED AS PREFERABLE TO ODA DEBT REORGANISATION.

- (3) HOWEVER, IN EXCEPTIONAL DASES, A DOMOR COUNTRY WIGHT USE ODA DEBT REORGANISATION.
 - (4) AS TO MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT FINANCE INSTITUTIONS,
 THEY WOULD CONSIDER COMMITTING NEW PESOUPCES IN AN
 APPROPRIATE FORM WITHIN THEIR LENDING POLICIES AND
 PRACTICES.
 - (5) THE DEBTOR WOULD TRY TO MAKE EQUIVALENT ARRANGEMENTS WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES NOT TAKING PART IN THE OPERATION SO THAT THE INCREASED BALANCE OF PAYMENTS FLEXIBILITY PROVIDED WAS NOT INDIRECTLY USED TO REPAY THESE OTHER COUNTRIES.
 - (6) AID PROVIDED WOULD BE ON TERMS APPROPRIATE TO THE ECONOMIC SITUATION AND THE DEVELOPMENT PROSPECTS OF THE RECIPIENT COUNTRY.
- (B) ANOTHER DELEGATION HAS PROPOSED THE FOLLOWING TYPE OF ACTION:
 - FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES IMPINGING UNDULY ON ITS

 DEVELOPMENT PROSBESS, AND IN THE EVENT THAT THE DEVELOPING

 COUNTRY DEMONSTRATES A WILLINGNESS TO TAKE CORRECTIVE

 MEASURES ON ITS OWN BEHALF INSOFAR AS IT IS ABLE, DONOR

 COUNTRIES SHOULD, TO THE BEST OF THEIR ABILITIES,

 MAXIMIZE ASSISTANCE EFFORTS. SUCH AN EFFORT SHOULD

 GENERALLY BE DIRECTED TOWARDS INCREASING THE QUANTITY

 AND IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF AID TO THIS COUNTRY.
 - (2) AMONG THE VARIOUS MEASURES WHICH MIGHT BE TAKEN BY A DONOR COUNTRY FOR THIS PURPOSE, PROGRAMME AID AND ANY FLEXIBLE FORMS OF GUICKLY DISBURSABLE AID WOULD BE CONSIDERED PREFERABLE TO DEST REORGANISATION.
 - CONTRY HIGHT CHOOSE TO USE DEST REGRESSION. IN THIS EVENT, IT IS DESIRABLE THAT THE REGRESSION SHOULD COVER CREDITS

WHICH CARRY THE MARDEST TERMS AND SHOULD INVOLVE A CONCESSIONAL ELEMENT AT LEAST AS GREAT AS THAT OF COMPAR-ABLE NEW CREDITS.

MEASURES TO PREVENT THE RE-EMERSENCE OF BEST-SERVICING PROBLEMS

THE FOLLOWING SUBSESTIONS SUBMITTED BY ONE DELEGATION WERE MOTES:

TO PREVERT A RE-EMERGENCE OF DEST GERVICING DIFFICULTIES, COMMITMENTS WOULD BE REQUIRED FROM BOTH CREDITORS AND THE RECIPIEST DESTOR:

- (1) COUNTRIES BENEFITING FROM THE PROVISION OF DEET RELIEF WOULD BE REQUIRED TO GIVE ECONOMIC UNDERTAKINGS SIMILAR TO THOSE PROVIDED BY THE IMP FOR STANDBY ARRANGEMENTS OF THE *CREDIOT CLUBS* WHEN COMMERCIAL DEBT RESCHEDULINGS ARE PROVIDED.
- (2) THE CREDITOR COUNTRIES ON THE OTHER HAND WOULD BE REQUIRED TO SIVE FIRM UNDERTAKINGS AS TO THE FORM, CONCESSIONALITY AND DURATION OF THE DEST BELIEF TO BE PROVIDED.
- (3) CREDITORS NIGHT ALSO BE REQUIRED TO UNDERTAKE TO ENSURE THAT FUTURE ODA TRANSFERS TO RECIPIENTS OF DEBT RELIEF BE MADE ON TERMS AT LEAST AS CONCESSIONAL AS THOSE PROVIDED BY IDA.
- (4) IT WOULD ALSO BE USEFUL IF THE IBRD/IMF COULD BECOME FURTHER INVOLVED BY ASSUMING THE RESPONSIBILITY TO MONITOR THE PROGRESS OF THE ECONOMIC RECOVERY PROGRAMME IN EACH RECIPIERT COUNTRY, AND TO RECOMMEND MEASURES TO SOTH THE CREDITORS AND THE DEDTOR THAT COULD ASSIST IN THE AVOIDANCE OF A RE-EMERGENCE OF DEST SERVICING PROBLEMS.

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IN ADDITION TO THE TASK OF ELABORATIMS CRITERIA OR FEATURES TO CHIDE THE WANDLING OF DEST PROSLEMS IN A LONGER-TERM PERSPECTIVE SOME SELEGATIONS STRESSED THE WEED FOR A CONCRETE RESPONSE TO THE DEMANDS OF THE GID FOR IMMEDIATE DEST RELIEF. IN THIS CONTEXT, THE FOLLOWING SHORESTIONS BY OME DELEGATION WERE NOTED. SHOW A RESPONSE COULD TAKE THE FORM OF A GENERAL POLITICAL COMMITMENT OF GE MEMBERS TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL RESOURCES IN THE FORM OF DIRECT ODA DEST RELIEF AND MOR EDUTVALENT MEASURES TO THE LEAST DEVELOPED AND MOST SERIOUSLY AFFECTED DEVELOPING COUNTRIES. THE TERMS, CONDITIONS AND MODALITIES OF SUCH ACTIONS COULD VARY FROM CASE TO CASE. CREDITOR/OOSOR COUNTRIES NOT BEING IN A POSITION TO SHANT DIRECT OBA DEET RELIEF -DUE TO TECHNICAL OR CONSTITUTIONAL PROBLEMS - COULD RESORT TO EQUIVALENT MEASURES (ADDITIONAL ODA, E.G. IN THE FORM OF UNTIED PROGRAMME AID OF IMPORT SUPPORT). THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS GENERAL POLITICAL COMMITMENT COULD BE LEFT TO EACH CREDITOR MOROR COUNTRY OR A BILATERAL BASIS (OF. THE GSP SYSTEM). HOWEVER, A REVIEW MECHANISM SHOULD BE ESTABLISHED SO THAT IMPLEMENTATION CAN BE PONITORED. E.O. WITHIN A YEAR AFTER THE COMMITMENT WAS MADE.

- 1. TO START WITH, THE PAPER UNDERLINES THE MOST IMPORTANT FEATURES IN THE DEBT SITUATION OF LDCS. IN THIS RESPECT, THE DOCUMENT NOTES THAT
 - THE BULK OF TOTAL EXTERNAL DEBT OUTSTANDING IN LDCS EVEN IN POORER COUNTRIES IS COMMERCIAL DEBT
 - THIS IS EVEN MORE TRUE IN THE CASE OF DEBT SERVICE THAN IN THE CASE OF DEBT ITSELF
 - DEBT IS HEAVILY CONCENTRATED IN THE MORE ADVANCED DEVELOPING COUNTRIES.
- 2. REFERRING TO THE DISCUSSIONS HELD IN THE CIEC LAST SPRING, THE OECD PAPER STATES THAT THE DISTINCTION INTRODUCED BY THE EEC AND THE U.S. BETWEEN ACUTE DEBT CRISIS AND PROBLEMS OF A LONGER TERM NATURE IS VALID. BUT THE DOCUMENT STRESSES THE NEED FOR FURTHER DIFFERENTATION BETWEEN:

REMEDIAL MEASURES: THE OECD SECRETARIAT DOES NOT DEPART FROM THE
TRADITIONAL CASE BY CASE APPROACH FOR ACUTE DEBT CRISES. BUT IT
RECOGNIZES THAT THERE MAY BE A CASE FOR DRAWING UP SPECIAL GUIDELINES
FOR COUNTRY AND DEBT SITUATIONS OTHER THAN ACUTE CRISES SITUATIONS.

- 4. THE PAPER THEN DEALS WITH ELIGIBILITY FOR ACTION AND MODALITIES OF ACTION. TO MAKE THE GUIDELINES SIGNIFICANT WHILE AVOIDING ANY ELEMENT OF AUTOMATICITY, THE OECD SECRETARIAT SUGGESTS THAT DAC MEMBERS QUOTE EXAMINE THE POSSIBILITY OF EXPRESSING THEIR READINESS TO GIVE FAVOURABLE CONSIDERATION, ON A CASE BY CASE BASIS, TO REQUESTS FROM POORER COUNTRIES FOR SPECIAL ACTION IF THEY FACE A SITUATION WHERE, AFTER THE APPROPRIATE ADJUSTMENTS IN THEIR INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL PAYMENTS SITUATION HAVE BEEN MADE, CONTINUED DEBT SERVICING PAYMENTS MUST BE REGARDED AS INCOMPATIBLE WITH THEIR EXTERNAL VIABILITY OR THE ACHIEVEMENT OF MINIMUM DEVELOPMENT OBJECTIVES . UNQUOTE
- FINALLY, THE OECD DOCUMENT DRAWS SUGGESTIONS AS TO THE INSTITUTIONAL LOCUS FOR CONSIDERING SPECIAL ACTION ON DEBT. ACUTE PROBLEMS SHOULD CONTINUE TO BE DEALT WITH IN CREDITOR CLUBS. BUT OTHER DEBT CASES OF POORER COUNTRIES, ESSENTIALLY DESIGNED TO FORESTALL FUTURE DEBT SERVICING DIFFICULTIES MAY BEST, SAYS THE PAPER, BE NEGOTIATED IN CONSORTIA, CONSULTATIVE GROUPS AND SIMILAR AID GROUPS.

AS INDICATED EARLIER, THE G-8 IS PRESENTLY CONSIDERING CES
76-80 IN FRAMEWORK OF OECD. I SHALL REPORT ON OUTCOME OF
DISCUSSIONS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. REGARDS

THE G-19 WILL MEET IN PARIS ON SEPTEMBER 10-11 TO CONSIDER
THE MAGEACHEN-GUERRERO PROPOSAL. ON THIS SIDE, THE OUTCOME IS
MORE DOUBTFUL. THE G-19 HAD TAKEN THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE DEADLOCK IN LAST JULY, AND THE DECISION TO RESUME THE DIALOGUE WILL

On the kind invitation of the Algerian authorities, the International Ocean Institute is organizing Pacem in Maribus VII in Algeria from October 25 to 28, 1976 on "The new international economic order and the law of the sea." The meeting will be held partly concurrently, partly jointly, with a Special Meeting of the Club of Rome on the New International Order. The main background paper for the joint conference will be the RIO (reshaping the international order) Report, drafted under the chairmanship of Professor Jan Tinbergen. The main background paper for Pacem in Maribus will be a study, The new international economic order and the law of the sea, revised edition, by Arvid Pardo and Elisabeth Mann Borgese.

The reasons for holding Pacem in Maribus VII in conjunction with the Special Meeting of the Club of Rome and the RIO project are twofold. On the one hand, the study on the new international economic order and the law of the sea developed out of the RIO project and is an integral part of it, applying many of the RIO proposals in the specific area of ocean management. On the other hand, the results of the last session of the U.N. Law of the Sea Conference must now be further developed and inserted in the general attempt to build a new international economic order. The Algerian conference on the RIO project offers a first, and exemplary, opportunity to demonstrate this juncture.

The meetings will consist of eight sessions. The first three will be held jointly with the Club of Rome. They will be devoted to the general topic: "Concepts and finalities of the new international order." On the afternoon of October 26th, Pacem in Maribus will go into special sessions. One further joint working session with the Club of Rome will take place on the afternoon of the 27th, when an attempt will be made to consider the problems of ocean management in the broader context. On the morning of October 28th, Pacem in Maribus will divide into working groups, responsible for drafting reports. The afternoon of the 28th will be dedicated to the closing of International Ocean Institute

discussions and a press conference. A detailed agenda and flow chart are enclosed.

The meeting will convene in the beautiful Club des Pins, about twenty kilometers from Algiers, which offers an ideal setting for such an event. Participants will be lodged in the nearby hotel which can accommodate all of them. Buses will shuttle participants to and from the meeting place.

Whatever their official positions, all participants will attend the meeting in a personal capacity. The meeting will be informal, both in spirit and organization and with respect to attire. It is aimed at fostering personal acquaintance, constructive exchanges of views, mutual understanding, as well as at indicating some feasible steps along a possible road to a more satisfactory world order, including the oceans.

Simultaneous translation will be available from English, French, Spanish and Arabic into French and English through the meetings (except the working group sessions on the morning of the 28th).

It would be a great pleasure to see you in Algiers. I look forward to hearing from you.

Power Investments Figures - CIEC Memo to Mr. Haq, July 8, 1976

- 1. I would like to call your attention to an error of fact which appears on para. 3 of the above mentioned memorandum. The investment figures given in Working Paper 229 as they refer to the Power Sector include not only the cost of generation expansion but also those of transmission and distribution. I know this well as I gave Lambertini the basic information.
- 2. I realize that as written Paper 229 is not sufficiently explicit on this matter. Only one specialist could have seen that the figure of about \$1,000 1973 dollar per kW installed, implicit in Table 7 was much too high to refer to generation only. To avoid misunderstandings, I suggest that in the future Power staff of this Department be consulted when dealing with these matters. I understand that you tried to see me, unfortunately I was on leave, but we have other staff in the Department and in the operating Power divisions which can be reached should I be unavailable.

Information for Board on Documentation Supplied to International Meetings

This mess will provide the information you asked me to supply for purposes of your statement to the Board tomorrow.

A. ILO World Employment Conference

- 1. Mr. McNamara did not make a statement to the Conference.
- 2. Toward the end of 1975, ILO asked for an article, to be signed by Mr. McHamara, in support of the World Employment Conference, which it would publish in "ILO Information", a periodic information bulletin. The Bank's Information and Public Affairs Department put together a brief article from previously published sources, principally the 1975 Annual Meeting speech; a paper entitled "A Progress Report on the World Bank's Rural Development Program", and the 1975 Annual Report on Bank Research. The article deals with rural poverty, urban employment, etc. It ends with a wish for the success of the Conference. Mr. McJamara read the draft, made some modifications and approved it. The issue of "ILO Information" in which the article, among others, appeared was supplied to all delegations at the Conference.
- 3. I spoke to Mr. Drake after Thursday's Board meeting: he concluded that it was no doubt a reference to the article which he had seen and described as a "statement" by Mr. McMamara. A copy of the "HLO Information" issue has been supplied to him, through Mr. Damry, and Mr. Damry has told me that Mr. Drake is satisfied that there is nothing in it which should have been taken up in the Board.
- 4. The Bank was represented at the Conference by Mark Leiserson, Chief of the Employment and Rural Development Division of the Development Economics Department. Mr. Leiserson did not make a statement in the planary sessions nor did he find it necessary to intervene in Committee discussions.
- 5. Hr. Leiserson is preparing a report to the Board on the Conference, in accordance with the usual practice under which an oral or written report is made on all major international conferences.

B. Conference on International Economic Cooperation (CIEC)

1. The work of the CIEC is conducted in four commissions: Development: Financial Affairs; Rew Daterials; and Energy. Each Commission has two

co-chairmen, one tepresenting the 14 developing country participants (G-10) and one representing the industrialized countries (G-8, one of the eightbeing the EEC).

- 2. The Bank is now a permanent observer in the Development, Financial Affairs and Raw Materials Commissions, each of which has held four sessions thus far, in February (mainly an organizational session), March, April and June. It has just been invited by the co-chairmen of the Energy Commission to be an observer at the next session of that Commission, July 12-16.
- 3. The Bank's delegation to the GIEC has been headed by Jean Carriere. He and Martin Koelle, Deputy Director of the European Office, supplemented from time to time by headquarters staff of the Policy Planning and Program Review Department, have covered the sessions of the Commissions.
- 4. With Mr. McNamara's approval, the position adopted for staff guidance with respect to supplying information to the CIEC has been that the staff would do its best to meet formal requests for assistance, within the limits of budgetary and other resources and on matters within the mank's fields of interest. Any additional work which might be requested would be undertaken only if it was determined that it would be in the Bank's interest to do so and if the necessary staff and other resources were available.
- 5. The only document which has been supplied to the CIEC by the Bank's delegation is "A Review of the Capital Requirements of Developing Countries, 1986-1980", which was Annex II to a document presented to the January 1976 meeting of the Development Committee in Jamaica. It was submitted to the first session of the Commission on Pinancial Affairs, and to the third session of the Development Commission. Brief commentaries on the paper were made by a member of the Bank's delegation in both Commissions.
- 6. In addition, members of the Bank's delegation have made statements in all three commissions on the following subjects: agricultural development (Development Commission); current account deficit of non-oil developing countries in 1975 (Finance Commission); industrialization of developing countries: international debt situation (Finance Commission); Bank's commodity policy (Raw Materials Commission); and export earnings (Naw Materials Commission). Only two of these statements (on agricultural and industrial lending) were volunteered; other interventions were made only at the request of the chairman. Most of the statements were made on the basis of briefings prepared in Mashington and these in turn were based on existing documents or papers with which the board is familiar. The statements provided factual information generated in the normal course of Bank staff work. The statement

on LOC current account deficit, for example, made plain that the estimate was that of the Bank staff. To the extent that a statement dealt with Bank policy, it did not go beyond the policy already laid down by the Board. We have been acrupulous in not appearing to be a spokesman for or partisan of either the G-E or the G-19. We have played the role of technician, and both sides have appreciated that. It should be kept in mind that the GREC has no Secretariat of its own. The G-8 have to some extent relied on the OECD Secretarist and the G-19 on UNCTAD.

- 7. We understand that at the June session of the Energy Commission, there were indications that the Bank would not only be invited to the July session, but would be asked to make a statement on LDC energy development investment needs and Bank policy in this respect. A statement is being prepared in the Policy Planning and Program Review Department, in consultation with Tims' and Roveni's staff, for appropriate clearance within the Eank (which wight weam Board clearance, depending on what we want to say about policy respecting financing of oil exploration). In response to a request made to Mr. McMamara by the co-chairmen of the Commission, whether the Bank has any information on past, present and projected future energy consumption patterns of the LECs which it could make available to the Commission, we have responded that we could make available Staff Working Paper 229, "Inergy and Petroleum in Non-OPEC Developing Countries 1974-1960". It will be delivered to the Countsion for the July session, and Jean Carriere will call attention to the nature of the paper, i.e., that it is a staff working paper.
- 8. With the June session the Commissions considered themselves to have completed the "initial, snalytical phase" of their work. Senior officials of the CLEC are to meet on July 3-10 to consider what the ment phase might cover.

SUBJECT: The New International Economic Order -- A Non-Polemical View

- 1. At a recent meeting, you repeated your request for a non-polemical statement on the elements which comprise the New International Economic Order (NIEO).
- 2. As I understand it, the NIEO is an umbrella title for a wide variety of ideas, most of which are not new but have a long ancestry to Bretton Woods and before. There are, however, three elements which underlie the NIEO title:
 - (i) Timeliness a belief that the shape of the world over the next decade or so is sufficiently different from the past that the time is now ripe for a number of ideas that have been rejected in the past;
 - (ii) Shift in Bargaining Power a belief that relative bargaining power between the traditional centers of power in the world economy -- the industrialized members of OECD -- and the developing countries has shifted in favor of developing countries. This in turn makes it possible for LDCs to insist on some of those ideas for which the time has now come;
 - (iii) Interrelatedness of the Demands a belief that the NIEO demands of developing countries should be treated as interrelated. Thus, commodity problems should be treated in 'integrated' proposals and trade/aid/monetary demands be seen as part of the 'broad question' of resource transfers. This insistence itself partly reflects the perception that bargaining power has shifted and that gains on any one front should be paralleled on other matters.
- These three key elements should not be taken at face value. For example, while the financial strength of OPEC countries does increase the voice of LDCs in international debates (as long as OPEC is aligned with the Group of 77), the financial management of those OPEC countries with chronic surpluses may well turn out to be highly conservative and de facto be aligned with the existing major financial powers. The larger the accumulated financial surpluses of OPEC countries, the greater their interest in not rocking the boat.
- 4. Because of general scepticism about the claims of NIEO, as well as the heavy overlay of rhetoric, it is easy for the Bank to take the position that it should go about its business in the usual way and focus on the needs of the poorest countries, rural development and other nuts and bolts of development lending.

- Nevertheless, despite the division between reality and the rhetoric of NIEO, there are promising areas where in fact there is validity in the claim that the time is ripe for new initiatives. The Bank's view of some of the major dimensions of the future environment for development is becoming clearer. It does indeed look as though the outlook for development will be different in a number of ways from the pattern that has hitherto been prevailing:
 - the flow of private loan capital is likely to be much more important in future relative to the flow of official capital.
 - a world dependent on a larger and more volatile capital flows will pay greater attention to mechanisms to meet short-run liquidity crises (enlarged IMF facilities, compensatory financing, etc.).
 - both developed and developing countries are likely to pay greater attention to international trade arrangements (both primary commodities and manufactures) rather than focus on the past dialogue on official capital flows:
 - Wh
- : LDCs because export growth will be crucial in attracting private capital and managing debt;
- 000
- : OECD because of increased awareness that growth patterns in OECD area can have repercusions on the global economy that in turn destabilize OECD economies.
- the changed external environment in turn has a number of implications for development strategy within developing countries:
 - : greater emphasis on self-sufficiency for example in food production where deficits have been traditionally met by officially financed imports;
 - changes in industrialization strategy in response to changing trade patterns, changes in centers of industrial growth, the need to attract private capital, including multinationals.
- 6. This sort of view of the world is in some respects quite sharply different from some of the components of NIEO (particularly NIEO hostility to private capital and reliance on continued official flow targets). In other areas, particularly trade and liquidity questions, the perceptions have much in common.
- 7. Since there are clearly areas of promise in NIEO, it would be a mistake for the Bank to ignore it. Moreover, disdain on the part of the Bank will be misintepreted as defensiveness since, in fact, the Bank may be on weak grounds in certain key areas of legitimate concern.

- 8. Among the areas where the Bank may need to consider new departures both in terms of analysis and policy are the following:
 - food output much has to be done to relate the Bank's rural development objectives to food output objectives, particularly in the main food deficit areas.
 - industry does the Bank have a clear sense of direction in its lending in this sector?
 - relations with private capital markets the Bank's traditional posture has been that it can best assist developing countries by borrowing on its own credit standing and lending directly. Could a wider range of functions be developed?
 - trade questions the Bank has far to go both in analysis and in relating its lending to questions which arise in the context of promoting trade in manufactures; with respect to primary commodities, the Bank is only now taking the first steps to meet commodity financing needs.
 - stabilization assistance could the Bank be more forthcoming and, for example, envisage STABEX-type schemes for the poorest countries in conjunction with IDA V; could compensatory financing assistance be established in a way which relates logically to buffer stock financing schemes.
- 9. Attached is a listing of NIEO demands; with annotations on the realism or not of the demands; and the promising areas which lie beneath the rhetoric. A number of these areas are under discussion for papers to be prepared in the future policy work program in the Bank. These proposals include papers on food output operations; buffer stock financing; issues in trade in manufactures and on the Bank's role vis-a-vis private capital flows. We are in the midst of discussions with interested departments to formulate the work program more precisely. We will be sending you a separate memorandum on the policy work program towards the end of June when these discussions are complete.
- 10. As you requested, PPD members are holding a watching brief on NIEO questions. In this connection, we are arranging for a series of eminent speakers to give small seminars on selected topics of interest and hopefully these will get under way in the near future. In addition, a number of speakers may be persuaded to make a contribution in the form of a paper on a specific topic under consultancy arrangements.

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

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CONFERENCE ON INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC CO-OPERATION

Report by the Secretary-General

- 1. In General Assembly Resolution 3515 (XXX), adopted on 15 December 1975, the General Assembly, in operative paragraph 4, requested "the Secretary-General of the United Nations, the Secretary-General of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, the Executive Director of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization, the Director-General of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations, and all other executive heads of competent organs and organizations of the United Nations system actively to assist the participants in the Conference on International Economic Co-operation". In operative paragraph 3, the General Assembly requested "the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly, through the Economic and Social Council, a report on his participation in the Conference". This report, prepared in compliance with this request, covers the period up to the end of April 1976.
- 2. General Assembly Resolution 3515 (XXX) in its operative paragraph 2 invited the Conference on International Economic Co-operation "to report on its conclusions to the General Assembly at its thirty-first session". The Conference met in Paris, at the ministerial level, from 16 to 19 December 1975 and in paragraph 14 of its final communiqué "took note of the resolution" and "agreed to make reports available to the thirty-first session of the United Nations General Assembly".
- 3. At the same meeting in Paris, to which the Secretary-General of the United Nations had been invited, the Conference decided to establish four commissions on: Energy, Raw Materials, Development and Financial Affairs. The Conference also decided that these Commissions will meet periodically during the whole of 1976. At a meeting in Paris in January, the co-Chairmen of the Conference and of the four Commissions, established the work schedule of the Commissions for the first six months of the year. This schedule included five meetings, at the following dates:

11 - 20 February 1976 18/19 - 26 March 1976 21 - 28 April 1976 8 - 15 June 1976 12 - 17 July 1976

4. The Ministerial Conference, at its December 1975 meeting, decided that a number of "Intergovernmental functional organizations", directly concerned with the problems to be considered would be able to make a useful contribution to their consideration. It therefore invited these organizations to be represented as permanent observers (with the right to speak but not the right to vote) in the relevant Commissions. The Conference also decided that each Commission might invite appropriate inter-governmental organizations to participate as ad hoc observers in the discussion of specific questions. The United Nations Secretariat was given the status of permanent observer at all of the Commissions. The participation of the various organs of the United Nations system was established as follows:

- 5. All organs and organizations of the United Nations system which were granted observer status sent delegations to each session of the Commissions. The UN Secretariat outposted In paris a small secretariat to maintain permanent contact with the Conference as well as to serve as liaison between the various parts of the UN family participating in the four Commissions.
- 6. At the request of the Commissions, the organs and organizations of the UN system submitted a number of background documents already available or especially prepared for the benefit of the Commissions. The list of the documents circulated is given in the Annex.
- 7. The UN observers made a number of interventions in the course of the discussion, at their own initiative or at the request of the Chairmen of the Commissions or of the delegates.
- 8. On a very informal but daily basis, the observers received many requests for information and documentation on various issues which have been or are now under consideration in the UN system.

9. The Commission on Development requested the Secretary-General of the United Nations to urge potential contributors to inform him of the amount of their initial contribution to the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) before the set deadline, so as to permit the promot establishment of the Fund. The plea was brought by the Secretary-General to the immediate notice of possible donors.

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

- 2. You will find, in Carriere's report on the April session, the agenda for each of the four commissions. Mr. Burki is preparing the necessary briefing for the Bank's delegation. Final instructions will have to await the return of the Bank's UNCTAD delegation. IRD will want to take part actively in the decision concerning the general attitude which the Bank is to adopt in Paris in June.
- 3. There are, on this point, two possible stands. One is to say that the Bank, as a technical observer, should not go beyond its role as a supplier of information on financial and developmental issues. This is basically the attitude adopted to-date. It can be argued that the closer CIEC comes to the time when compromise will be sought, the more the Bank should maintain its low-key profile. It must not become involved, or even appear to be involved, in battles which are bound to become "political". The future of IDA could be in the balance in Helsinki in June. It would be wrong, so goes this argument, for the Bank to risk the wrath of one party or the other by taking part in the search for a compromise which cannot possibly please everyone.
- 4. The contrary argument is to the effect that the CIEC cannot be allowed to fail. The Bank has an obligation to do its utmost to help establish bridges between North and South proposals. The South has no technical support comparable to the North's OECD. UNCTAD, on its side, is considered partisan. If the South is to move towards compromise, it needs assistance from technical staffs such as the Bank's which are not committed to one side or another.
- 5. The definition of the Bank's position must await the conclusion of the Nairobi session. Mr. McNamara has indicated he would want to clear any change in the Bank's attitude in Paris, as compared to what it has been to-date. From the External Relations standpoint it would seem important to maintain this line: the Bank could help in "building bridges" in CIEC only if both North and South so requested. Even then, the degree of Bank participation should be carefully limited to technical assistance. As a maximum, the Bank might be willing to analyze compromise solutions offered by others, within its sphere of competence. Under no circumstances should the Bank take the initiative of offering solutions at this stage.

6. The Bank "observes all Commissions, except the Energy Commission whose co-chairmen have asked the Bank for data only. We have offered them staff working paper 229. No reply has come yet. The question whether the Bank should also "observe" that commission cannot be handled unless an invitation comes. Since the Energy Commission is dealing essentially with the issue of prices, the Bank is in no way seeking an invitation.

- In view of Mr. McMassara's interest in the definition of Bank positions for the CIBC sessions ahead. I suggest that the necessary briefing of the delegation should be taken in hand without too such delay.
- 2.) The difficulty clearly is that the conclusions of UNCTAD IV will be a major determinant in the developments in CIEC in June. But if one waited until the very last days of May to prepare the brief for the June 10 session in Peris, there might be too little time adequately to get the necessary clearances.
- 3.) I would suggest, if you agree, that work on the brief should be started in good time during May on the basis of the following expectations. First, that on the integrated program of commodities and its common fund, no agreement will emerge in Mairobi. Secondly, that on debt rescheduling, the large majority of the OECD group will not budge from its present position of refusing an overall approach. Thirdly, on Emergy, that CIEC will continue to debate oil prices, a subject from which the Bank should stay clear.
- 4.) In brief, the basic assumption would be, for the purposes of the preliminary briefing, that on all major issues CIEC will essemble in Paris in June without any significant change in the picture painted by Carriere and Burki in their recent reports. The brief would attempt to define bank positions as if, in spite of the lack of success in Hairobi, the Bank's role in Paris, whather in June or later in the year, was to become more visible.

Dear Jean:

With all that seems to be happening here, I did not acknowledge receipt of your excellent report of April 5 on the second session of the CIEC Commissions.

The report was, of course, circulated to the PC list. We have all taken note of the conclusion which you put forward in the last paragraph about the need for the Bank's presence and participation to be seen as positive.

This is to let you know that William Clark very much agrees with you on this and that we have been trying to make sure that your briefing for the April session is as "positive" as can be.

I realize however that on an item such as debt rescheduling and debt cancellation, it is going to be terribly difficult for the Bank to be "forthcoming". Our position is clear and quite negative as far as the Bank's own affairs are concerned. In any event, you will have a statement prepared with the help of those here concerned with this particular issue.

As to the Energy Commission, we are still completely in the dark. There has been no message, even indirectly, from the co-chairmen jointly or from the U.S. co-chairmen. After consultation with CPS and DPS, the position we adopted was not to seek information from the State Department and certainly not an invitation.

The more I look at CIEC affairs, the more I feel how deeply the Conference is suffering, among other ills, from the absence of a substantive secretariat of its own. It therefore turns to others such as the Bank not only as purveyors of data but also as technical assistants. The Bank, of course, is not organized to play such a role. Aside from the fact that so many divisions are now up to their necks in work because of the "bunching" season, we find it difficult all of a sudden to alter the schedule of report writing, for example on prospects or on commodities, to meet the CIEC deadlines. Furthermore, as you know, much of the Bank's data is confidential and simply not to be provided to an open forum such as CIEC.

All this to say, in sum, that William and I and others who are back-stopping your delegation understand the difficulties of your position at the Conference and hope you are equally aware of the limitations which exist here and which make it so difficult to turn the Bank into what it is not: a part-time secretariat for the Conference.

Visit to the Bank of the Venezuelan Minister of International Economic Affairs, Mr. Manuel Perez Guerraro

- During Mr. Perez Guerrero's visit to the Bank on Friday, April 16, you may wish to raise with him some issues of interest to the Bank in which Mr. Perez Guerrero may exercise some influence, both as a close advisor of the Venezuelan President, Mr. Carlos Andres Perez, and as Co-Chairman of the Paris Conference on International Economic Cooperation.
- Mr. Perez Guerrero is a Minister without Portfolio, and his main current functions are of a diplomatic character, particularly concerning the United Nations, some special meetings of OFEC, and the Paris Conterence. His considerable influence within the Venezuelan Government is thus based more on his status within the Accion Democratica Party and on his personal relationship with President Perez, than on his limited executive responsibilities as a Minister. It seems, therefore, more convenient to focus his attention in those issues of strategy, in which high-level decisions (by President Perez himself) are likely to be required, and where his role in the Paris Conference, as Co-Chairman and as top representative of the developing countries may be most useful. Among those issues, you may wish to stress the importance of IDA-5 and of the Bank's Capital Replenishment.

IDA-5

As you know, the Planning Minister, Mr. Gumersindo Rodriguez, informed us last year that he was going to handle IDA matters within the Venezuelan Government, He said initially that Venezuela would soon become a member of IDA, and designated a deputy, Mr. Ildegar Perez Segnini, to attend IDA-5 meetings. Afterwards, no decision was made on membership in IDA; and Mr. Perez Segmini did not attend the meetings. Although we have brought up this matter on several occasions to Mr. Addriguez's attention, he has not been able or willing to give us a clear indication of what the Government will decide in this respect. In view of this situation, I talked about it with the Finance Minister, Mr. Hector Hurtado, during my last visit to Venezuela. Mr. Hurtado was displeased by the way this matter had been handled by hir. Rodriguek, and promised to take a personal interest in it in the future. He also said that, in his opinion, the OPEC countries should be able to make contributions to IDA through the new OFEC Special Fund.

While Mr. Hurtado is likely to be the key cabinet member for deciding on the amount, form and opportunity of a future Venezuelan contribution to IMA. I believe that Mr. Ferez Guerrero will also play an important role in this respect. Venezuela's position concerning IDA is likely to be decided by President Perez himself, and for this he most probably will seek Er. Perez Guerrere's advice. You may, therefore, wish to request Mr. Perez Guerrero's support concerning Venezuela's membership, attendance to IDA-5 meetings, and eventual contributions. You may point out to him the political importance of OPEC's position on IDA, in view of the vested interest of most developing countries in this matter. In this connection, Mr. Peres Guerrero, -- both as a Venezuelam official and as a Co-Chairman of the Paris Conference -might well become personally interested. You may also wish to indicate that the higher income developing countries (including most of Latin America) would be likely to benefit from increased IDA resources, since the availability of those resources for poorer countries would liberate Bank funds for lending to medium- and high-income countries.

Capital Replenishment

5. Likewise, you may also wish to stress the world-wide political importance for OPEC countries of supporting the proposed capital increase of the Bank. Venezuela's support of the Bank in this respect could be an important contribution, both within OPEC and in the broader context of the Paris Conference. Mr. Perez Guerrero's current positions may well permit him to play a key leadership role in this respect.

Other Issues

- 6. Since Mr. Perez Guerrero cooperated with Mr. Hurtado in finding a way to make possible Venezuela's \$10 million contribution to the Mird Window, you may wish to thank him for this.
- 7. Since the current discussions of a new borrowing are being held with Ministers Hurtado and Quero, I would not recommend discussing in specific terms that prospective borrowing with Mr. Perez Guerrero. You may wish, however, to inform Mr. Perez Guerrero of the current Bank policy of offering OPEC countries market terms for their investments in Bank bonds, and to indicate to him the Bank interest in continuing our borrowing relationship with Venezuela and other CPTC countries.

Dr. Hanuel Perez Guerrero - Minister for International Leonomic Affairs

Dr. Persz Guerrero, aged 55, studied at the University of Paris where he obtained a degree in Law and Economics. Dr. Perez Guerrero is a long-standing member of the Accion Democratica Party and one of the most influential members of the Cabinet in accommic affairs. Dr. Perez Querrero has had a long career in public office both in Venezuela and abroad. From 1937 to 1940 he worked in the Bepartment of Economics of the League of Mations, and later in the Department of Economics in the International Labor Organization. After returning to Venezuela in 1943 for a brief period to become a member of the Post-War Planning Commission, he went abroad again in 1945 to work as Director of Coordination of the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs. He again returned to Venezuela in 1947 as Minister of Finance under the administration of the first AD President, Romulo Gallegos. Under the Government of Perez Jimenez and the military Government that preceded it (1948-1958) he left Venezuela and worked with the United Nations Technical Assistance Board. He returned to Venezuela in 1958 after the overthrow of Perez Jimenez holding ministerial posts under AD Presidents Betancourt and Leoni. He was Chief of the Planning Office with ministerial rank between 1960 and 1963, and Minister of Mines and Hydrocarbons from 1963 to 1967. In 1968 he returned to the UN to head the UN Iconomic and Social Council. In 1969 he was elected Secretary General of UNCTAD for four years. Under the present administration, Dr. Perez Guerrero acts as Presidential trouble shooter on international economic matters.

SUBJECT: Fifth Replenishment of IDA: CIEC and IDA

I briefed you yesterday on one aspect of your luncheon meeting with Mr. Perez Guerrero: Venezuela's possible contribution to IDA. This memorandum concerns another aspect.

The question of IDA Replenishment is arising in connection with CIEC's work on financial aspects of the North-South dialogue. In your discussion with Mr. Perez Guerrero you may wish to ascertain his views on how far he thinks discussion in CIEC would be useful for the Replenishment negotiations.

In the second session of the Commission of Financial Affairs, $\frac{1}{2}$ / Pakistan called for a substantial increase in real terms in IDA-5. Such pressure in the Commission, and in CIEC generally, in favor of IDA should, in principle, be helpful for the IDA negotiations in indicating the concern of developing countries for the Fifth Replenishment. However, CIEC also has limitations as a forum since the Bank has a role only as Observer and Part I countries are unlikely (and rightly so) to discuss the substance of the negotiations in a forum other than the Deputies. Our approach, therefore, has been to encourage developing countries to use all fora, including CIEC, to indicate their concern about IDA, but at the same time we cannot look to CIEC as a means of making progress on the real issues concerning the Replenishment. Although the outlook for the North-South dialogue is rather uncertain at the moment, we keep in touch through Jean Carriere and others so that opportunities on behalf of IDA are not missed.

Carriere Statement to Financial Affairs Commission of CIEC

The attached message went to Carriere at about 7:20 p.m. Thursday, March 25, after Messrs. Tims and Holsen, and I, discussed it with Hollis. Paragraph 2, which deals with the IMF, was agreed with the IMF staff. Carriere felt very strongly that he must make some statement before the end of the current session of the Financial Affairs Commission. As that session closes today, something had to go to him by last night.

By mid-day yesterday, agreement had been reached at the Bank and IMF staff level on a figure which took account of the differences in the country coverage, elements, and timing of the Bank and the IMF calculations. However, when clearance was sought from the IMF management, it was found that the management was unwilling to agree to a public statement associating the IMF with anything other than the \$35 billion estimate now. There will be a revision of the estimate in May.

We agreed that Tims would try to reach Carriere early today to explain what had happened, since all prior indications, with which I had acquainted Carriere, were that Carriere would be able to say that the Bank and the IMF had come to agreement on an estimate.

THESE TRENDS IN TRADE ARE ALMOST IDENTICAL WITH THE CAPT ESTIMATES RECENTLY RELEASED (ALTHOUGH LATTER SHOW IMPORTS ON A CIF RATHER THAN FOR BASIS).

 - (b) The Development Commission is asking the Bank immediately to take part in its current debate on the UNCTAD submission.
- 2. I sent Carriere by telex a summary of Mr. Tims' memorandum of March 19 on the UNCTAD paper, for use in the discussions on Monday. On Tuesday, Mr. Burki is asked to go straight to the office from the airport and Carriere will accompany him to the Conference. Carriere will telex him the questions he may have to answer Tuesday.
- 3. Carriere reported that the Conference was tense. In the Development Commission, the delegations were counting on the international organizations to participate actively in the debate and to supply an agreed basis for the discussions. The Bank had no choice, said Jean, but to do its utmost. It would be a real blow to the Bank's image if it were seen as less than forthcoming. I told Jean that the Bank's staff was up to its neck in work and could not but give priority to the production of certain studies, such as the new Prospects paper. We would indeed do our best but there were certain items, such as Prospects, on which the Bank was simply not ready to pronounce beyond its own submission to the February session.

Thank you very much for your memorandum of March 4 on the first session of the CIEC commissions. Copies have been circulated to the full CIEC list and I included the confidential annex on the Bank's role. The annexes on each of the four commissions are very useful working papers and much appreciated for their concision and completeness.

You will have received my telex - which refers to some of the points raised in your telex 490. We are glad Mr. Burki is able to take part in the March session. I understand he may know Mr. Barghava, the head of the secretariat established by the 19 for the Conference. I am sure Burki will be able to open up lines of communications with several of those delegations. We all agree with you that, at this stage of the proceedings, those contacts will be important.

From my telex, you will have noted that Burki will be particularly interested in the debate on Agriculture and Food in the commission on Development. We felt, from your reports, that there were no good reasons to send someone specializing on the Raw Materials side because that commission will open its session with a debate on the agenda and not on substance. If the Bank is invited to the Raw Materials commission as an ad hoc observer, Martin Koelle could perhaps keep an eye on its procedural discussions while Burki attends the meetings of the Development commission.

My telex will also have given you an idea of the views held in DPS concerning documentation for the Financial Affairs commission. The basic point is that the Bank simply has no better data to offer than what is shown in the Bank document already circulated. That information provides, in our view, as good a basis of discussion as anything else we could put forward to-day. In addition, DPS feel very strongly that the Bank cannot agree with the data and conclusions submitted by UNCTAD. They are unrealistic. A document will be prepared in the days ahead indicating, for your information and for use in private conversations, why the Bank holds that view.

The Bank must not get into an argument with UNCTAD, at this stage in CIEC, on these issues. As you point out, we must proceed with great caution whilst trying of course to make the best possible impression. DPS is strong in the opinion that the Bank's best attitude is to stick to our figures because they are correct. We should not appear to be willing to shift positions as if anxious to get into the good graces of one side or

the other. Rather, we should indicate that, if and when the Bank has new data to submit, it would not hesitate to do so. But, for the moment, we stand by our recent contribution and have nothing to add. As I say, DPS will put together a paper which will be, in effect, a review of some of the contents of the UNCTAD document and a brief to you explaining why we stand by our own figures and do not accept UNCTAD's.

I should add that, from this side of the Bank, we well understand that your position would be easier if you could offer additional data to the commission. But we have concluded from your reporting that, with the Nairobi deadline in mind, the March session of CIEC may be critical and that tensions may rise quickly, to use your words. The Bank must not be seen as lacking horns with UNCTAD in Paris or taking sides, even by implication, with the 19 or with the 8. In the circumstances, and I hope you agree, the best attitude is to lay low. Having been, at times, on the receiving end of instructions of this sort, I know how uncomfortable that position can be. But it is our judgment that any other course would lead us into dangerous waters.

William will be back on Monday and will see this letter. I am sure he will be in touch with you during the week to give you his impressions of the above. If you have qualms about the Bank's inability to submit new information on capital requirements, do call Wouter Tims directly. You will not change his mind, I fear, but you may feel comforted if you get his views straight.

- 1. Mr. McNamara has approved the conclusions reached in the course of the meeting held on January 19 on the subject, as shown in my memorandum of January 27.
- 2. The European Office will therefore cover the early meetings of the Financial Affairs and Development commissions and will report on the manner and on the timing of future debates in those bodies.
- 3. You already have received, in Carriere's telex No. 199 of January 28, the list of items which the two commissions would consider if the agenda proposed by the 19 (i.e. the delegations from the Group of 77 side) were adopted. This is still, possibly, too large a basis for real negotiations. The commissions may be able to shorten their agenda, in the days ahead.
- 4. In the meantime, it might be useful to supply the European Office with a list of Bank documents which, in your opinion, would be relevant to debates in CIEC, assuming the most crucial items of the proposed agenda are discussed. I would be grateful if your department could give me its list, even in a preliminary and tentative way, for transmittal to the European Office.

Fifth IDA Replenishment: CIEC Commissions

Mr. McNamara asked, on Monday, that consideration be given to assuring that the question of the Fifth IDA Replenishment be brought to the attention of the relevant Commissions established by CIEC.

In principle, it is highly desirable to assure that the Fifth Replenishment gets support in fora and institutions in which both South and North are represented, and that countries of the South raise the subject in those places. They did so with good results, for instance, in the Special Session of the U.N. General Assembly last. September. Such initiatives from the South are bound to have some effect on the views of the North.

Nevertheless, I think it is risky to insert the question of the Fifth Replenishment into fora where we cannot control (and possibly little influence) the outcome of discussion. We had an example of that kind of situation in the discussion of the Development Committee's communique in Jamaica, and we will probably have much less influence on the CIEC Commissions than we had on the Development Committee. I presume it was this risk and problem that Mr. McNamara had in mind when, in his staff meeting in Kingston on the morning of January 10, he spoke of the possibility of "twinning" the Development Committee with the Fund Council. He suggested that, while the Fund Council would focus on Fund affairs, the Development Committee might concern itself exclusively with the affairs of the Bank Group which require political direction (such as IDA Replenishments). General aid matters (i.e., not directly involving the Bank) might be dealt with in the Commissions of the CIEC. I understand he suggested that Mr. Stern consider this subject, and present a proposal, on his return to Washington early February.

Having noted the risk, and without prejudice to the outcome of the examination which Mr. McNamara's discussion might stimulate, I think it would nevertheless be helpful to encourage key Southern members of the CIEC Development and Finance Commissions to refer, where possible, to the special role of IDA and to the importance of a substantial and timely Replenishment. In the Development Commission this would call for interventions by Cameroon, India, Jamaica, Pakistan, Peru, Yugoslavia, and Zaire. In the Finance Commission it would mean Brazil, Egypt, India, Mexico, Pakistan and Zambia. (In both cases, I have eliminated oil-exporting countries as well as

Northern countries.) I doubt that we should devote any effort to the Latin American countries involved. But I do recommend that Mr. McNamara esk the African and Asian Regional Vice Presidents to ask their constituents to press for a timely and substantial IDA Replenishment in their Commissions. And you should ask Mr. Kochman to add Zaire and Egypt, and possibly Zambia, to his itinerary. (A decision on this latter is required by Wednesday or Thursday latest.)

Meeting on the CIEC, January 19, 1976

- 1. The meeting chaired by William Clark was attended by Mrs. Boskey, Messrs. Burki, Carriere, E. Friedmann, Hattori, Koelle, Merriam, Rovani, Saxe, Takeuchi, Tims and Chatenay. The purpose of the meeting was to consider what should be the Bank's relations to the CIEC in order for Mr. Clark to present recommendations to the President's Council. Participants had Jean Carriere's memorandum of December 24, 1975 which gave the background on the preparations for the meetings of the Conference's four commissions.
- 2. In his oral presentation, Jean Carriere commented on the memorandum and indicated that decisions on the agenda and the timetable of the commissions were still to be made. On the basis of this information and in the light of the discussion which followed, the following conclusions emerged.
- 3. The Director of the European Office will head the Bank delegation to the CIEC. The European Office will be responsible for covering the first meetings of the commissions until such time as a clearer picture develops about the work of the Conference when it will become possible to decide about participation by Headquarters staff. The European Office will advise Headquarters about the desirable composition of the delegation and the contributions of the Bank to the Conference as it progresses. It will also be responsible for the administrative support for the delegation, including the documentation service and for the establishment and conduct of the Bank's liaison with the UN Office at the Conference.
- 4. In Washington, External Relations will orchestrate the Bank's general stand at the Conference and be responsible for communications between the European Office and the Bank departments concerned with the substantive work of the Conference and also the Office of the Special Representative in New York. As a first step, a list of existing Bank documents of possible interest to the Conference will be drawn up for transmittal through the European Office to the UN Office at the Conference.
- 5. As soon as possible after the opening of the commissions' meetings, the European Office will report on the list of agenda items selected by the Conference. This will facilitate decisions concerning the desirable degree of substantive involvement of the Bank, the commissions which the Bank should attend and the Bank documents to be made available to the Conference, the allocation of responsibilities among Headquarters departments, including their participation on the Bank's delegation, and the way in which cooperation with the UN can best be arranged.
- 6. The Bank's general policy vis-a-vis the CIEC will be to do its best to meet formal requests for assistance from the Conference, within the limits of its budgetary and other resources and on items within its field of interest.

Should the Conference ask for support beyond those limits, the Bank would respond affirmatively only after it was determined that it would be in the Bank's interest to carry out the additional work and that additional resources would be forthcoming. It was highly probable that existing Bank documents or papers under preparation would be of value to the Conference. Subject to the necessary clearance and using UN channels as appropriate, the Bank will be ready to make this material available to the Conference.

Aux termes du paragraphe 9 du Communiqué final, la Conférence Ministérielle a invité certaines organisations intergouvernementales fonctionnelles directement intéressées par les problèmes qui doivent être examinés à se faire représenter en permanence au sein des Commissions correspondantes. Elle a décidé que les Commissions pourraient également inviter certaines organisations intergouvernementales fonctionnelles compétentes en la matière à participer en tant qu'observateurs ad hoc à l'examen de questions déterminées.

Les co-Présidents de la Conférence et des Commissions ont conclu qu'il serait utile de formuler un certain nombre de suggestions concernant la participation des observateurs aux réunions des Commissions tout en reconnaissant que chacune des Commissions prendrait elle-même les décisions requises. Sans vouloir préjuger de ces décisions, ils ont estimé que les organisations intergouvernementales suivantes, mentionnées au paragraphe 9 du Communiqué Final, pourraient en tout cas apporter en permanence une contribution utile aux diverses Commissions:

Le Secrétariat de l'ONU aux quatre Commissions; L'OPEP et l'AIE à la Commission pour l'Energie; la CNUCED, l'OCDE et le SELA aux Commissions pour les Matières Premières, le Développement et les Affaires financières; la FAO et le GATT aux Commissions pour les Matières Premières et le Développement;

le PNUD et l'ONUDI à la Commission pour le Développement le FMI à la Commission pour les Affaires Financières; la BIRD aux Commissions pour le Développement et les Affaires Financières.

Ces suggestions ne sauraient être considérées comme nécessairement complètes.

Aux cours des travaux, il se peut que l'une des Commissions vienne à examiner une question intéressant une organisation intergouvernementale mentionnée au paragraphe 9 du Communiqué final n'ayant pas d'observateus permant au sonnable de Commission. Dans ces conditions, il semblerait raisonnable de

permettre à cette organisation de participer en tant qu'observateur à l'examen de telles questions sur une base ad hoc.

CIEC; Notes on the Meeting of January 19, 1976

- 1. Many thanks for the comments in your memorandum of January 26. As you certainly noted, the intention was only to summarize the conclusions.
- 2. Please find herewith the revised and final version of the memorandum on the meeting. It takes all comments received into account. Allow me to make the following points in the light of your comments, in order.
- 3. Firm decisions about Bank participation in the individual commissions must await the commissions' approval of their agenda. In the case of the Financial Affairs commission, External Relations will contact VPF as soon as the order of business is known, to consider all aspects of the Bank's coverage of that commission.
- 4. The reference to budgetary implications is in paragraph 6 which now mentions "budgetary" resources specifically.
- 5. Jean Carriere is designated as head of the Bank's delegation to the CIEC. As to the central role of External Relations, you will note the word "orchestrate", instead of "direct", in paragraph 4. I hope it meets your point.
- 6. The European Office will handle the Bank's coverage of the Conference until such time as the assistance required from Washington can be determined.
- 7. Clearance of documents, as you point out, may become a delicate issue. The last sentence of paragraph 6 makes it clear that the "necessary" clearance will be required before Bank documents are put to the Conference. There is nothing more to say on that, at this stage. If and when requests come in, we will have to consider the issue in detail.

January 19 Meeting on CIEC: Your Draft Minutes

1. It should be made clear in the minutes that no decision was made on World Bank representation on all of the four commissions. Mr. Carriere himself said that he didn't know whether we should be represented on the commissions on energy (DPS and CPS indicated strong reservations) or that on raw materials. He said he thought we should be represented on the commission on development (no objections) and that on financial affairs. You will recall that I made strong reservations about World Bank representation on the financial affairs commission, since if the Conference were to follow the ideas of Mr. Giscard d'Estaing the initiator of the Conference, that commission would deal principally with exchange rate stability and related themes.

Note: Giscard d'Estaing's address of 10-28-75 on the new economic order, delivered at the Ecole Polytechnique, says "Finally as regards the financial and monetary aspects, the themes will center around the search for a more stable system and at the same time on ways to ensure some degree of security for the capital and earnings that the countries exporting raw materials and energy currently get for their exports".

I concluded by saying that prima facie there was no case for World Bank representation on the financial affairs commission; however the Conference or the Commission may decide to take up matters that were of direct interest to the World Bank; in that event the Vice President Finance would provide the representative to the commission and the necessary documentation.

- 2. No mention is made of the budgetary implications of World Bank participation in CIEC, although both CPS and DPS had grave concerns about it. As I recall it Mr. Clark said it was necessary to mention it to P&B and VPF.
- 3. The first sentence of paragraph 3 and the first sentence of paragraph 4 are at variance with what Messrs. Clark and Carriere said at the meeting. The word used to explain External Relations role was "coordination" and the word "direction" was consistently avoided.
- 4. The second sentence of paragraph 3 is ambiguous, and read in the context of the first sentence could convey the impression that the European Office will represent the Bank on the first meetings of the four commissions which is not what was decided.
- 5. Concern was expressed by DPS about the procedural aspects, especially whether the Executive Directors should be informed, and whether the documents

should be approved by them. No conclusion came out and I would think that a statement should be included in the minutes that this question would be studied separately.

6. A minor point is that the word "committee" is used where "commission" seems to be indicated.

1. CIEC CONCLUDED DURING THE NIGHT OF WEDNESDAY THE ROUND OF GENERAL STATEMENTS BY HEADS OF DELEGATIONS.

MOST OF THE SPEAKERS FROM THE BOW-OIL LDGS EXPRESSED THE HOPE THAT THE OEGO COUNTRIES WOULD ENTER THE NEGOTIATIONS WITH A SPIRIT OF COOPERATION AND THE WILLINGNESS TO CORRECT THE BASIC IMPALANCES AND INJUSTICES OF THE PRESENT INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC DROER. THEY LISTED THE PROBLEMS TO BE DEALT WITH, BUT GENERALLY DID NOT GO VERY FAR IN DESCRIBING THE WAYS AND MEANS TO SOLVE THEM.

THE SPEAKERS FROM OIL PRODUCING COUNTRIES REACTED SOMEWHAT TO SECRETARY KISSINGER'S STATEMENT THAT THE WORLD ECONOMIC RECESSION HAD BEEN BROUGHT ON BY OIL PRICE INCREASES. MR. BOUTEFLIKA FROM ALBERIA SAID IT WAS UNFAIR TO BRING UP OBVIOUS FALSEWOODS CONCERNING OIL PRICES. MR. HAMMADI FROM IRAG CRITICIZED THE DECD INTERNATIONAL ENERGY AGENCY'S ACTIVITY AND SAID THAT THE EXPLOITATION EXERCIZED BY IMPERIALIST POWERS AND THE INFLATION IN CAPITALIST COUNTRIES WERE THE TRUE CAUSES FOR THE WORLD ECONOMIC CRISIS. MR. AMOUZEGAR FROM IRAN SAID THAT TO ATTRIBUTE RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE CRISIS TO OPEC WOULD OMLY HAVE A REGATIVE INFLUENCE ON THE DIALOGUE. BUT HE ASSURED THAT "UNTIL NEW BALANCES ARE FOUND IN ENERGY PRODUCTION AND CONSUPT -ION. THE EXPORTING COUNTRIES ARE PREPARED TO GUARANTEE ADEQUATE SUPPLIES ON THE CONDITION THAT CONSUMERS DO NOT POT UP ARTIFICIAL FRONTIERS TO CREATE DISTURTIONS IN THE WORLD OIL MARKETS".

- WERE SEEN AS A REACTION AGAINST WHAT THEY CONSIDERED AR ATTEMPT BY ME KISSINGER TO BREAK THE SOLIDARITY BETWEEN OIL AND NOB-OIL LDCS. BUT COMPARED TO THE SHARP TORS OF CONFRONTATION WHICH HAS PREVAILED SO FAR, THE RHETORIC IN PARIS APPEARED TO MOST OBSERVERS AS CONCILIATORY. THIS EXPLAINS THE RELAXED ATMOSPHERE PREVAILING IN THE CONFERENCE AND THE ALMOST UNANIMOUS PREDICTION FOR A FULL SUCCESS OF THE MINISTERIAL MEETING.
- ALMOST RESOLVED, AFTER A NUMBER OF UNOFFICIAL TALKS BETWEEN THE TWO GROUPS. FIRSTLY, THE LDCS HAVE REPORTEDLY GIVEN UP THEIR REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL SEATS IN THE CIEC. SECONDLY, ALGERIA'S REQUEST AT THE END OF WEDNESDAY'S SESSION THAT THE CONFERENCE DRAW UP PRECISE MANDATES FOR THE COMMISSIONS, INCLUDING IN PARTICULAR THE NOTIONS OF INCOME GUARANTEES AND INDEXATION, HAS BEEN DROPPED: ON THURSDAY MORNING, THE 77 WERE SAID TO BE READY TO ACCEPT RATHER LOOSE TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR THE FOUR COMMISSIONS.
- FORMALLY THESE AGREEMENTS AS WELL AS ALL UNDERSTANDINGS ON PROCEDURAL MATTERS REACHED BY THE PREPARATORY MEETING OF LAST OCTOBER. UNLESS LAST MINUTE DIFFICULTIES, THE MEETING SHOULD DISPOSE OF ITS AGENDA BY THURSDAY NIGHT.
 - 5. FORMAL AGREEMENT HAS ALREADY BEEN REACHED ON THE CHAIRMAN-SHIP OF THE FOUR COMMISSIONS. THE CHAIRMEN WILL BE:

- FURTHER TO MY 2776, CIEC CO-CHAIRMAN MANUEL PEREZ- GUERRERG 1 . SAID IN HIS OPENING STATEMENT THAT SUCCESS OF CONFERENCE WOULD BE DIFFICULT BUT NOT IMPOSSIBLE. HE SAID THAT CIEC WAS AN ADEQUATE FORUM, SINCE IT WILL COVER ALL MATTERS OF VITAL INTEREST TO ALL MATIONS. BUT QUOTE ONE CANNOT ADVANCE ON ANY OF THESE MATTERS INDEPENDENTLY UNGHOTE, SAID HE, THUS BEAFFIRMING THE BASIC RECHEST FROM THE SOUTH FOR HARMONIOUS PROGRESS IN EACH AND EVERY ONE OF THE COMMISSIONS. PEREZ-BUZRBERO'S SPEECH HAD A TORE OF PRODERT OPTIMISM ABOUT THE FUTURE OF THE CIEC.
- ON THE SDAY 16TH AFTERNOON, CIEC LISTENED TO THE FIRST GENERAL STATEMENTS TO BE MADE BY THE ET DELEGATIONS. MOST OF THE SPEAKERS ON THE TOP OF THE LIST WERE FROM THE OECD GROUP, NORE OF THEM BROUGHT UP MEW IDEAS, ALL EXPRESSED THE HOPE THAT THE CIEC WOULD BE SUCCESS-FUL. GENERALLY SPEAKING. THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NORTH PUT. EXPLICITLY OR IMPLICITLY, SPECIAL EMPHASIS ON THE EMERGY PROSLEMS. AND ESPECIALLY THE PRICE OF OIL. BUT THEY SO DID IN MARKEDLY MODERATE TONE.

THE SECRETARY OF STATE SAID THAT WHAT WAS BESDED WAS QUOTE A DISCUSSION ON THE EFFECTS OF ENERGY PRICES OF THE WORLD ECONOMY UNQUOTE. AMONG THE PROBLEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST TO THE U.S., HE MENTIONED: PRICE OF PETROLEUM, SECURITY OF SUPPLY, BLANCE OF PAYMENTS OF THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES, CONDITIONS FOR INTERNATIONAL INVESTMENT, KEY RAW MATERIALS (PARTICULARLY FOOD), TRADE PROBLEMS AND OPERAT PROBLEMS OF THE POOREST COUNTRIES.

OF THE FORTHCOMING DISCUSSIONS. HIS STATEMENT WAS A REPETITION OF MIS ADDRESS TO THE TIM SPECIAL SESSION OF UNGA. HE RENEWED HIS PLEAFOR A MAJOR EXPANSION OF THE RESOURCES OF IFC AND REAFFIRMED HIS GOVERNMENT'S PLEDGE TO SUPPORT THE 5TH IDA REPLENISHMENT.

IN HIS SPEECH HE SAID THAT THIS UNPRECEDENTED MEETING WILL HAVE TO EXAMINE ALL ECONOMIC PROBLEMS ON A WORLD-WICE DASIS AND THAT THE OBJECTIVE OF THE CONFERENCE WAS "TO PROMOTE RATIONALITY AND JUSTICE IN THE FUNCTIONING OF THE WORLD ECONOMY ". HE FURTHER SAID THAT WHAT MUST BE SOUGHT IS: IMPROVED STABILITY OF MONETORY RELATIONS, MORE CRIMELY EVOLUTION OF PRICES OF WIDELY-TRADED PRODUCTS, P ANY ARD MANUFACTURED AS WELL SENICOLON SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE OF DEVELOPMENT AID. ITS WIDENING AND DIVERSIFICATION (PREFERENCES. INCREASED SUPPORT FOR AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT, INDUSTRIALIZATION, TRANSFER OF TECHNOLOGY.) IN EVERY RESPECT, DEVELOPING COUNTRIES BUST FEEL THAT THEY ARE TREATED AS PARTNERS RATHER THAN "'ASSISTED COUNTRIES".

MR GISCARD D'ESTAING THEN PAID TRIBUNE TO EXISTING INTER-WATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS, NAMELY U.N., UNCTAD AND IMF. BUT RE SAID THAT IT WAS NOW UP TO THE CIEC TO " MAKE A DECISIVE STEP" ".

I THINK THAT WE SHOULD NOT ATTACH TOO BUCH IMPORTANCE TO THE FACT THAT MR GISCARD D'ESTAING OMITTED THE NAME OF THE BANK AMONG THE ""INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS CONCERNED"". THE SHORT LIST OF ORGANIZATIONS HE NAMED OBVIOUSLY WAS NOT LIMITATIVE.

2. AFTER MR GISCARD D'ESTAING 'S ADDRESS, THE TWO CO-CHAIRMEN OF CIEC MADE THEIR OPENING STATEMENTS. MR ALLAN J. MACEACHEN, SECRETARY OF STATE FOR EXTERNAL AFFAIRS OF CANADA, SAID THAT, THANKS TO A GOOD ORGANIZATION AND PREPARATION, THE CIEC WOULD BE ADLE TO MAINTAIN THE MOMENTUM GENERATED AT THE 7TH SPECIAL SESSION OF THE U.N. "WE SHALL NOT CREATE A UNIVERSAL UTOPIA, HE SAID, BUT WE MUST SEE TO IT THAT EACH COUNTRY'S HOPES CAN BE RECONCILED WITH A QUEST FOR PROGRESS BY THE WORLD COMMUNITY".

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- 3. OR PEREZ-GUERRERO'S STATEMENT HAS BOT BEEN CIRCULATED VET.

 I WILL COMMENT ON IT IN MY NEXT TELEX.
- A. THE ONLY OBSERVER TO THE CIEC, UN SECRETARY KURT WALDHEIM, STRESSED THE "REQUIREMENTS OF CONTINUITY AND THE NEED FOR CONERENCE IN A MULTIPLE HEGOTIATION". HE SAID THAT "A NUMBER OF ASPECTS OF THE NEW INTERWATIONAL ECONOMIC ORDER ARE ALREADY THE OBJECT OF WIDE AGREEMENT" SEMICOLON HE FINALLY EXPLICITLY MENTIONED THAT "THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY HAS CREATED AN ATMOSPHERE CONDUCTVE TO GENUINE ACCORD AND THE SENSE OF URGENCY THAT THE PRESENT SITUATION DEMANDS".

DEALT WITH BY THE CIEC SENICOLON ENERGY, FOOD, INTERNATIONAL AID, COMMODITY ARRANGEMENTS, TRANSFER OF TECHNOLOGY. ON INTERNATIONAL AID, HE SAID THAT "ONE OF THE FIRST TESTS OF A NEW VILLINGNESS TO PERFORM AN ESSENTIAL DUTY OF SOLIDARITY WILL TAKE PLACE IN A FEW WEEKS TIME AT THE JAMAICA MEETING TO BE HELD UNDER THE AUSPICES OF THE 1MF AND WORLD BANK".

1. THE CONFERENCE ON INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC GOOPERATION WILL OPEN ITS FIRST MINISTERIAL MEETING IN PARIS ON DEC. 16.

PRESIDENT GISCARD D'ESTAING, WHO TOOK THE INITIATIVE OF THE GATHERING, WILL MAKE THE OPENING STATEMENT.

2. THE COMPOSITION OF THE CONFERENCE IS THE ONE WHICH WAS AGREED UPON AT THE PREPARATORY MEETING OF OCT 13-15, SINCE BOTH PARTIES HAVE RESOLVED THEIR INTERNAL DISPUTES FOR AN ENLARGEMENT OF THEIR REPRESENTATION.

FROM THE SOUTH WILL REPORTEDLY REQUEST THE MINISTERIAL MEETING TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF THEIR SEATS: THEY ARE UNDER SEVERE PRESSURE FROM MANY APPLICANTS, ESPECIALLY IVORY COAST. ON THE NORTH SIDE, THE OECD COUNTRIES HAVE BEEN UNABLE SO FAR TO SUBSTANTIATE THE IDEA OF AN 'OIL FLOOR PRICE', AGREED UPON BY

THE EUROPEAN SUMMIT IN ROME ON DEC 3. THUS, THE PROBLEM OF THE COMPOSITION OF THE NORTH SOUTH CONFERENCE IS LIKELY TO BE DISCUSSED AGAIN AT THE MINISTERIAL MEETING.

- PREPARATION OF THE TALKS. BOTH SIDES HAVE HELD MEETINGS OVER THE WEEK-END TO PUT A FINAL TOUCH TO THEIR POSITIONS. North-South

The 77 " met informally in New York on December 4 and 5, under the chairmanship of Minister M. Perez Guerrero (Venezuela) mainly to settle the question of representation in the commissions.

As of now the composition looks as follows:

Energy: Iran, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Algeria, Venezuela,

India, Egypt, Brazil, Cameroon, Mexico, Zaire

(total 11).

Raw Material: Indonesia, Nigeria, Venezuela, Peru, Zambia,

Zaire, Argentina, Mexico, Yugoslavia, Cameroon

(total 10).

Development: Algeria, Nigeria, Jamaica, India, Pakistan,

Mexico, Peru, Argentina, Yugoslavia (total 9).

Financial Affairs: Saudi Arabia, Iran, Iraq, Egypt, Indonesia,

Pakistan, Brazil (total 7).

Another preparatory meeting will be held in Paris on December 15 (Monday) to finalize the selection of 10 countries in each of the four Commissions, for OPEC and other developing countries.

Minister Perez Guerrero will be the co-chairman of the three-day ministerial conference; Canada, as you know, is the other co-chairman.

In addition the "77" have agreed to have a small (4-5 persons) secretariat for the Ministerial Meeting, and the work of the commissions. This will only be a technical secretariat (precis writer etc.) and not a professional secretariat. The need for a permanent professional secretariat for the "77" has been recognized and will be given further thought in the light of Paris meetings, but the concept, although important, is full of political considerations and will take time to germinate. In the meantime, as far as Paris is concerned, countries selected for commissions will be responsible for research and position papers required for negotiations in the commissions during the coming year.

On the basis of conversation with a few delegations from the "77", it is clear that not much is expected from Paris on raw material, and the monetary reforms, if no understanding is reached on energy. The extent of OPEC support for the "77" on non-energy matters will naturally depend on how well they do on energy, the prime concern of the industrialized countries.

Statement by Mr. Giscard d'Estaing on ODA

- 1. Newspapers have reported the general themes of Giscard d'Estaing's lecture at his old school (Ecole Polytechnique) on October 28 on the subject of the New International Economic Order.
- 2. You may like to note his reference to ODA which the papers, I believe, did not mention. This is the first time, to my knowledge, that a French spokesman has referred to a time frame for reaching the 0.7% target.
- 3. The French President, explaining a slide which showed the level of aid as a percentage of GEP for several countries, said:

"...You will see that, between 1963 and 1973, U.S. aid, which in the absolute was the world's largest, has gone down by more than half, Japan's aid has not fluctuated greatly, German aid has diminished and so has French aid, albeit somewhat less. The same goes for the U.K. All these countries had jointly agreed to reach a certain level, as a percentage of their GNP. We note that today none of them has reached it.

"At this time, France has pledged to bring its percentage of GMP allocated to aid back up to 0.7% and this is a target we will reach starting next year, not in 1976 but in 1977."

Way Stations on the Road to a New International Economic Order (?)

1. As of early this year, there appeared to be three main sets of fora in which endeavors to convert confrontation to consultation and negotiation as a means of dealing with political and economic issues between developing countries, as a whole, and the OECD countries, might move forward. There were the Bretton Woods institutions and their committees of governors. There was the United Nations, and specifically the already scheduled Seventh Special Session of the General Assembly on Development and International Economic Cooperation. And there was the proposed Paris forum originally intended by its sponsors to deal with "energy." During the Spring, a fourth rather more limited but not insignificant forum developed in the Commonwealth. An interesting feature of the scene is that a relatively small core of individuals tend to turn up in nearly all these various meetings, particularly those in the UN forum. (A glossary of various groupings of countries currently active on the international scene is attached.)

Bretton Woods

2. Only three things need to be noted in this memorandum about the Bretton Woods forum, which in this context means mainly the Interim Committee of the IMF. First, its failure to advance very far toward its major objectives has been due primarily to disagreements among the developed countries (notably between France and the U.S.) not to North-South differences. Secondly, although serious North-South differences are reflected in the discussions in the Bretton Woods forum, there has not developed at atmosphere of outright confrontation such as to impede seriously the effective operation of the Bank and the Fund. Thirdly, items central to the Interim Committee's agenda, for example Monetary Reform or the Link, have also become major issues in other fora. But whatever happens in New York or Paris, the Bretton Woods forum remains the most likely venue for the resolution of the main international financial problems.

The United Nations

The scenario for the UN was, roughly, that an Intergovernmental Preparatory Committee, open to all UN members, would begin work in March on an agenda for the Special Session of the General Assembly, and that within the framework of the Preparatory Committee negotiations would take place leading to some consensus on appropriate resolutions. Papers would then be firmed up in the Summer Session of the Economic and Social Council and passed to the Special Session for final adoption, hopefully with little or no dissent. Nothing of the sort has occurred. Although the Preparatory Committee held two one-week meetings, in March and June, it failed to have anything ready for ECOSOC. Within the Preparatory Committee, neither the Group of 77 nor Group B (the OECD countries) were able to agree among themselves on either an agenda or draft resolutions. ECOSOC itself was totally unable to advance matters although the entire four weeks of the Session were spent mainly in informal meetings and corridor consultations among and between the various "groups" (the OECD countries, the 77, the Socialist Countries of Eastern Europe, and China). The objective of these consultations was for 77 to hear the comments of other groups on a provisional list of areas and concrete questions that they wanted discussed at the Special Session.

- 4. At the end of the Session, the President of the Council said that "we conclude our meetings without having been able to agree on specific recommendations of a substantive nature for the consideration of the Special Session, or define more precisely the common ground among states." It is important to remember that in the UN, while the North-South issues have become dominant, the old East-West conflict is still present and the Eastern bloc can, whenever it chooses, use its weight to exacerbate North-South tensions even on issues on which it has little or no direct concern. This does not mean that the Eastern bloc always sides with the 77. But the absence from the other three fora of the Eastern bloc (and China), as potential destabilizing forces makes them all significantly different from the UN in the dynamics of their functioning.
- 5. On the concluding day at the ECOSOC session in Geneval the Council decided that the provisional agenda of the Special Session should be simply stated as "Development and International Economic Cooperation" with an explanation that the issues to be considered would be essentially international trade, international monetary reform and transfer of real resources for development financing, science and technology, industrialization, food and agriculture, and restructuring of the UN system. The Council further recommended that the Special Session should adopt, on a priority basis, concrete and positive decisions on all these issues.
- 6. The OECD, as part of its preparation for the Special Session, held a meeting immediately prior to ECOSOC. It had assigned to a subcommittee of the whole on relations with developing countries the task of coordinating positions on the kinds of issues expected to come before the Special Session. This group was unable to come up with any common positions on specific issues such as commodity price stabilization, aid, or trade matters.
- 7. From Geneva, the main UN forum moved back to New York and the third session of the Preparatory Committee, which was to meet from August 18 to 22. However, there was a two-week meeting of the UNCTAD Trade and Development Board in Geneva immediately following ECOSOC, which deserves mention because of the remarkable absence of confrontation and the support and freedom of action given the Secretary-General, Mr. Gamani Corea, to negotiate directly with governments in an endeavor to get support for the integrated program for commodities.
- 8. When the Preparatory Committee met, the 77 said that they would produce a draft document, based on their own earlier list of areas of discussion but taking into account the views of the other groups expressed to them in the Geneva consultations. This document would then be handed over to

a negotiating group to be appointed by the Preparatory Committee which would prepare a final document for presentation to the Special Session for discussion and approval. After forty-eight hours of drafting, the 77 had to admit that they had failed to produce such a document. They therefore suggested that their original paper be once more used as a basis for consultations with the other groups, which meant extending the Preparatory Committee's work into a second week. The reaction of the industrialized countries was predictable. They said they had already said in Geneva everything they had to say about the 77's original paper and that it was far too late to start another round of group-by-group discussions. Surely it would be better to take the issues listed in the 77's paper one by one, starting with those on which agreements might be most easily reached, and start immediate informal multilateral negotiations. However, the Chairman ruled that group-by-group informal negotiations should begin without delay and that they should be concluded by Wednesday, August 27. The Preparatory Committee would then draw up a synthesis of the discussions and produce a "final document" by the end of that week.

- 9. In the meantime, of course, the meeting of the non-aligned nations would be taking place in Lima, a meeting which many of the Third World delegation leaders at the Preparatory Committee were going to attend. Whether the informal negotiations and document drafting in New York could eventually be reconciled with whatever decisions were to be taken at Lima was a question that remains unanswered.
- 10. At the time of writing, not much has emerged from Lima to indicate what positions, new or reinforced, are being taken up by this important group of countries on the issues simultaneously under discussion in New York. Much of the early attention of the meeting was focussed on the admission of North Korea, North Vietnam, Panama and the PLO to the group of non-aligned nations; on the arrival a day late (because of sickness) of the meeting's chairman, Algerian Foreign Minister Abdel Boutefika, who will also be presiding over the Special Session; and on the apparent split in Arab ranks on the question of whether or not to seek Israel's expulsion from the General Assembly. Scheduled for discussion was the proposed establishment of a \$1 billion non-aligned fund for development and, of course, all the issues to be raised in the Special Session.

North-South

- 11. What has come to be known as the "North-South" forum has grown out of a proposal by French President Giscard d'Estaing early in 1975 for a restricted international conference of industrialized and oil producing countries, to deal with all aspects of the energy problem. The scope of the meeting was later widened to cover raw materials in general and to include non-oil producing developing countries. To set up this conference, France called a preparatory meeting on April 7, composed of 10 members: three from the developed world (U.S., EEC, Japan), and seven from the developing countries (Algeria, Brazil, India, Iran, Saudi Arabia, Venezuela, Zaire). Badly prepared, the preparatory meeting broke down on April 17.
- 12. Soon after, France undertook preparations for a new meeting. But, to avoid another failure, France endeavoured to seek the consensus of the 10 members before issuing formal invitations to the meeting. To that end, the French authorities drafted a "consensus document" covering all organizational and procedural aspects of an eventual resumption of the talks. The document was finalized at the end of July and was cleared with the three industrial and the seven LDC governments. The French then sent formal invitations to the 10 members for a preparatory meeting to be held in Paris on DOctober 10.
- 13. The preparatory meeting will be asked to endorse the following proposals:
 - (a) The plenary conference, which the seven would like to call "Conference of International Cooperation," would take place in early December 1975. The conference would be held at ministerial level.
 - (b) The conference would be comprised of 27 members. Nine would be drawn from the OECD area, selected by the three OECD members of the preparatory meeting. The 18 other members, the oil and non-oil producing developing countries, would be named by the seven developing countries represented at the preparatory meeting.
 - (c) The conference would establish four committees of 15 members each dealing with:

Energy Commodities Development Financial matters

14. Some observers would be allowed to attend the meetings, especially at the Committee level, where OECD, U.N. and specialized agency representatives would be expected to play an active role. The conclusions, proposals,

and suggestions made by the committees would have to be ratified by the Plenary Conference, But the Conference's role would be confined to making recommendations, which would be transmitted for action either to governments or to international organizations, according to the nature of the recommendations. The seven attach a very high importance to the issue of the "linkage" between all aspects of the negotiations. To reinforce this idea, they would like to have a second ministerial conference convened as early as six months after the first one. They also wish to have plenary conferences convened at expert level as often as necessary.

15. Although there are still divergences of opinion, especially on the two last points, the French are confident that the preparatory meeting will come to an agreement, and they consider that the Plenary Conference is virtually set. There are a number of indications that the French, the U.S. and to some extent other governments of the OECD group now regard this North-South forum as the one most likely to provide a forum for real negotiations.

Commonwealth

- 16. The Commonwealth preparations for the Special Session were launched at a meeting of heads of governments in Kingston, Jamaica, during the first week of May 1975. At this meeting, Prime Minister Harold Wilson delivered a widely noted speech on commodity problems, calling for a "general agreement on commodities", to lay down principles for consumer and producer commodity agreements, and an expansion of the European Communities Stabex scheme for stabilization of export earnings to all developing countries, with participation by non-Community developed countries. The Kingston conference assigned the task of developing a Commonwealth position paper for the Special Session to a group of 10 experts, who worked throughout the Summer, and presented their report entitled "Towards a New International Economic Order" to a meeting of Finance Ministers held in Georgetown, Guyana this week.
- 17. It had been hoped that, because of its composition, the Commonwealth might be able to produce a consensus document capable of winning support from both the 77 and the OECD governments. From what we have been able to learn, however, the experts' report, which seems likely to be adopted by the Finance Ministers as a Commonwealth position paper, is almost indistinguishable from the various papers produced by the 77. For instance, although Wilson expressed great doubts about the practicability of "indexation" of commodity prices, the experts' report unreservedly supports indexation. It also supports without reservation UNCTAD's "integrated commodities program," whereas Wilson had stressed the need for dealing with each commodity separately. The sequence of events in the Commonwealth forum may therefore mean that the U.K., Australia, Canada, and New Zealand will either support or acquiesce in resolutions in the Special Session proposed by the 77.

Attachment

Glossary of Country Groupings

This note includes major country groupings (and their memberships). which have evolved over the years, primarily to safeguard special political, social and economic interests. They might complement each other, but more often than not they are competitive. All of them, in varying degrees, influence international cooperation in the socio-economic field. Although voluntary and often self-designated, membership is not automatic. a member the country must identify itself closely with special interests of a particular group. The core membership is usually stable; however, overall numbers change. Many countries are members of more than one group. but there is a division between the rich and the poor. Internally the groups try to operate on the basis of consensus but there are obvious divisions within groups and the practice of working through sub-groups and informal groups is not uncommon. This note does not cover various formal groups constituted within or outside the UN system and which deal with Some of these forums are, the ECOSOC, the Interim Committee and the Development Committee. It is not suggested that these bodies are free of influences by special groups, but only that they are not strictly divided on rigid group lines. This note is prepared on information available as of August 1975.

Group of "77"

This group of developing countries has grown to 105. It includes the OPEC countries but not the Eastern Bloc or China. Most of the "77" are also members of the non-aligned group. The members are:
