Remarks to the Australian-American Leadership Dialogue June 8, 1996

Introduction

- Good morning, an honor to be asked to talk to you.
- Your meeting comes at a time of considerable change around the world [e.g., the \$170 billion in private capital flows in 1995].
- There is also considerable change in Australia's neighborhood, and I understand that East Asia is the focus of your meetings.

East Asia and the World Bank

- In fact, I was just on a visit to East Asia, which has experienced phenomenal growth. [Sixty percent of the \$170 billion in private capital flows worldwide is in fact concentrated on East Asia.]
- I was in Vietnam, Singapore and Indonesia representing the span of levels of development in East Asia.
- I addressed a meeting in Singapore where the issue was the economic transformation of the region, and what the World Bank can do to ensure its success.
- It is a region that is undergoing immense change, including an increasing integration into the global market economy. Where the region needs help is in:
 - ⇒ Upgrading the quality of worker skills and increasing the overall quality of education and training systems.
 - ⇒ Improving conditions for private investment through regulatory and financial sector reform. A critical area for improvement are the region's bond markets.
 - ⇒ Investing in high quality infrastructure, and advanced information technology and telecommunications. [\$1.5 trillion dollars needed over the next decade].
 - ⇒ Ensuring that rapid development does not increase the gaps between rich and poor, and that remote or disadvantaged populations are not left behind.
 - ⇒ And making sure that economic success does not come at the cost of a ruined environment..
