Dear Jan:

Stuart Taylor is kind enough to take this note to you. I believe his visit here has been successful and while we are not yet decided on the economist from the Bank who will participate in Taylor's mission, we hope to be able to do so in the next couple of days. You may recall that when I was in Rome I left with you a memorandum from George Papadopoulos to Mike Ruddy dated October 31, 1973, regarding the biennium work sheet. I told you at the same time that I thought I should not complete such a work sheet in isolation. Even while I could get some information from the Regional Agriculture Division Chiefs, I felt that you should certainly have an opportunity to indicate how you saw your manpower utilized during the next biennium. Have you been able to assemble any of this information or do you feel after all that I should make an attempt and pass it on to P&B after discussions with our Division Chiefs; here?

I also left a copy of a memorandum, although we did not discuss it, from Bob Jones with Nantu Chatterjie which is self-explanatory. I have also not received a reply as yet. I think that John Clark's visit went well although I believe he thought it was a bit shorter than he would have liked. I did discuss with him how helpful it would be if we can reinstate the monthly timetables for all preparation work because this is a very important piece of information necessary for our timetable system. Could you please let me know by cable whether you will be able to give me the information on the work program for the next biennium as requested by P&B and also what you can do on the Jones' memo.

I have enclosed a copy of both memoranda mentioned in the letter.

FAO/IBRD Co-operative Programme 197h Requirements

It is difficult for me at this time to make a definitive statement as to Division III's need for Co-operative Programme assistance during calendar year 1974. However, the following summarizes my views at the present moment.

Malawi: Vipya Project

The FAO is to be Executing Agency for the UNDP for industrial studies, as well as certain other studies, for the Vipya project. The Bank under a proposed technical assistance credit expects to carry out transportation studies and contribute to the project development office. Because of the parallel involvement of FAO and the Bank, presumably the Co-operative Programme will wish to keep informed, but no substantive work by the Co-operative Programme should be involved unless they provide personnel to the FAO (such as Spears or MacFarlane).

Turkey: Antalya - Marmara Regional Studies

The package of Marmara Regional Studies are expected to be carried out with financing from UNDP, EIB and the Bank; FAO will be Executing Agency for the UNDP studies. The Bank's financial contribution will be the smallest but will permit our involvement in these important studies. The Turks want one administrative unit to handle all studies. No agreement has been reached on how this can be worked out but obviously a good deal of coordination and co-operation will be necessary to make the various studies contemplated a consistent package leading to possible investments. Because of the FAO and Bank involvement the Co-operative Programme may be called upon both for personnel and to participate in the coordinating aspects of the studies. Discussion on the studies with the Turks and the interested parties should take place in January and the studies should commence during the second quarter of calendar year 1974.

Ecuador: Cayapas Project

The Co-operative Programme has played a continuing role in the development to date of the Cayapas Project, including the selection of the consultants who are now in the field. We anticipate that they will continue to be involved in the future development of this project and participate as follows. In January, 1974 there is expected to be a review of alternatives suggested by the consultants. This review session should be attended by the Bank, the Government of Ecuador, Simons (consultants) and members of the Co-operative Programme. This meeting probably would most effectively take place in Ecuador. In April, 1974 there should be a review of the final draft of the consultants' study, probably in Washington, the same four parties

with the possible exception of the Government of Ecuador should attend this meeting. As soon as they are available the supporting papers of the consultants should be circulated so that the parties attending the review meetings can perform the appropriate desk preparation.

Indonesia: Forest Industries Projects

The FAO is the Executing Agency for a US\$1 million UMDP financed study of the forest area of east Kalimantan. Joseph Swiderski of FAO has offered to keep the Bank informed as the study work is carried out and completed. It is possible that pulp and paper will not be included under the present studies and, if not, pulp and paper studies should be the next step in this regional study. Because of the coordination and co-operation aspect between FAO and the Bank, perhaps the Co-operative Programme would like to follow this matter.

Romania: Pulp and Paper Project

Mr. Fuchs has indicated orally to me that the Bank should anticipate considering a Romanian pulp and paper project for possible Board Presentation in December 197h. I have no details whatsoever on this project. I anticipate, however, that we shall need forestry studies for the project and it may well be that one of the forestry specialists in the Co-operative Programme or FAO is familiar with the Romanian forestry sector and can give us forestry support. We would have to inform them of possible timing when more information on the project is known.

Madagascar: Forest Industries Project

At present there is an ongoing appraisal mission of a forest industries project aimed at the eventual establishment of a pulp and paper plant, possibly sconer than later. A member of the Co-operative Programme is presently on this mission as a pulp and paper expert. We would anticipate becoming involved in this project during calendar 197h, although the project is being handled by the Program Projects Department people. Presumably the Co-operative Programme will continue to play an active role. Their involvement, however, I assume will be charged to the Regional Agricultural Division.

Other Projects

Although FAO and the Co-operative Programme have been involved at one time or another with the Mexico Proformex Project and the Peru Pulp and Paper Project, I do not see any further involvement on their parts at the present time.

With regard to the possibility of a Nigerian pulp and paper project and the work of the consultant in this area contemplated by Mr. Moore, I do not see Co-operative Programme involvement, but in the absence of Mr. Moore I cannot rule their involvement out.

There is talk of a Liberian forest industries and forest management project, and, although timing is uncertain, there may be some project preparation work to be done by the Co-operative Programme in Liberia during 197h.

Sector Work

During calendar 197h I anticipate that the amount of work in forest industries will fully utilize and most likely exceed the capacities of Mr. Oberdorfer and Mr. Tarnawiecki. I therefore do not anticipate that Mr. Oberdorfer will be available to Division I for any work during calendar 197h and Mr. Tarnawiecki will have only limited availability. Consequently, to the degree Division I does not hire its own consultants, I believe they will have to turn largely to the Co-operative Programme for assistance on sector and project identification missions where timber industries expertise is involved.

Visit to Rome November 11-16, 1973

- While in Rome I attended the first week of the FAO conference.
 In addition:
- (a) I pressed the FAO to clarify their thoughts on a suitable agenda for the February meeting between Mr. McNamara and Mr. Boerma. A draft agenda will be carried over by Mr. Bishop of the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Program who I invited to participate in the seminar on the Puebla experience on December 12.
- (b) I met with the FAO statistical group under the direction of Mr. Bachman to discuss the availability of data on "small farms". There are fragmentary returns from the 1970 census and, given special effort it may be possible to generate substantial and useful information on 10 to 15 major countries by the end of 1974. I suggested that a joint FAO/IBRD working party be established to examine data problems related to the small farm sector. I suggested that the first meeting be January 12 Bachman agreed but asked us to finance two out of four FAO participants.
- (c) I had a meeting with FAO officials and the Ethiopian delegation to FAO to discuss the Bank participation in the forthcoming mission to Ethiopia regarding food reserves. It was agreed that Mr. Taylor, the chief of this mission would visit Washington on December 7-9, the mission would be in Ethiopia in February or March.
- (d) I discussed the question of data requirements for the CGIAR with Mr. Oram. We agreed that the best approach to obtaining better data on resource flows into research in LDC's would be to use the CARIS information system. The TAC would be discussing the CARIS system in February with a view to subsequent CGIAR financing. We agreed that we should help the USDA (Dalrymple) update his information on the spread of the new varieties. We agreed that we should ask the economists at the research centers to think about ways and means of analysing costs and benefits of the work undertaken at each center this would be preferable to attempting further global analysis. I will raise this with the Center Directors when I discuss our operations with them at the Directors meeting in Colombia.
- (e) I met Dr. Cabral, Head of EMBRAPA the Brazilian Research organization and discussed his concerns vis-a-vis Bank support for agriresearch in Brazil. I invited him to visit the Bank on his way back to Brazil; he subsequently visited the Bank and I agreed that we would try and find someone to help him set up his research operations in the North East.

- (g) I attended as many sessions of the FAO conference plenary sessions and working committees as possible.
- The FAO conference provided a forum for the Director-General to spell out his ideas on major issues regarding food and agriculture in the world and what he proposed FAO should do about these issues. Mr. Boerma repeated his view that we were at a turning point in recent history because, for the first time, North American surpluses were no longer available to meet scarcities in other parts of the world. The U.S. and Canada were no longer a secure source of surpluses and the disappearance of these surpluses meant that we were entering an era of global scarcity. Consequently it behooved the FAO conference to endorse his concept of national food reserves to safeguard against mankind becoming the victim of the caprice of nature.
- 3. The Director-General went on to say that FAO was dealing with food problems on a three-stage basis:
- (a) short term operational programs such as the coordination of aid and drought relief in the Sahelian zone;
- (b) medium term: efforts leading to conceptualise and develop national food reserves;
- (c) longer term: studies working toward an international strategy for agricultural adjustment.
- 4. Mr. Boerma also seemed to be asserting that FAO should be the "natural institution" for taking global leadership in the area of food and agriculture. He referred to Mr. McNamara's speech in Nairobi and gave it his fullest support but pointed out that raising the productivity of small scale farmers was only one part of the overall problem. FAO was concerned with many other facets: trade, aid etc. In the same vein the Director-General pressed very hard that FAO should be the venue of the proposed UN conference on Food. (Apparently there are some interagency problems on this score).
- 5. The Director-General touched on two points related to field programs which are of general interest:
- (a) he mentioned that despite the stress being laid on agriculture there was a decline in the share of agricultural projects to be financed by UNDP. This somewhat puzzling phenomenon was attributed largely to the slowness in preparation of projects and he urged governments to "push" for a more rapid preparation and delivery of agricultural projects for UNDP; (later in committee the LDC's complained that it was UNDP/FAO bureaucracy that led to a slowdown in projects coming forward).

- (b) there was mention of the role of FAO in promoting international agricultural research, and national research. In one of the committees there was a concerted effort by CGIAR governments and individual TAC members (Swaminathan) to push FAO to undertake a much greater effort on outreach station work linked to the international centers. It was agreed that FAO should undertake a special study on research and "report back" in two years.
- Finally the Director-General of FAO emphasized that FAO's budgeting resources were simply inadequate for the organization to fulfill its responsibilities.
- The subsequent speeches and discussions ranged over a wide spread of topics. In general there seemed to be genuine confusion about the current world situation vis-a-vis food. The U.S. and the spokesman for the Common Market gave warnings about possible global shortages but both predicted record or near record harvests this crop year. At the same time there was confirmation that a shortage of inputs (notably fertilizer) might slow down food production in a number of countries. There were also reports of potential shortages from many parts of Africa and Asia and it was very difficult to get a feel whether there was a 'critical' situation or just a tight one. One thing does seem fairly certain: it will take at least one more year of good crops to begin to have a surplus enough to start building up stocks again.

Minutes of Meeting with Mr. McNamara regarding discussion with Mr. Boerma

The meeting was attended by Mr. McNamara, Mr. Baum and myself.

Four major items were considered for further discussion with the Director General of FAO.

- 1) It was agreed that the Bank would be prepared to finance ten additional staff members for the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Program. (This would include the five to be financed in the forthcoming biennium). However the Bank would not finance additional overhead nor would it finance staff from policy and programming. The financing of additional staff members was to strengthen the Cooperative Program and the assistance it could render in project preparation. (FAO will probably not be able to meet their responsibilities so that it is likely that only five additional posts will be financed).
- 2) It was agreed that there would be some merit in a Bank/FAO round-table early in 1974. This would probably be held in January and Mr. McNamara will arrange a date with Mr. Boerma, that date to cover a Thursday and Friday, and the meeting to be held in the environs of Rome.
- 3) It was agreed that the Bank would be associated with the World Conference on Agricultural Credit. However, Mr. McNamara would not be available to give the keynote address as requested.
- 4) Mr. McNamara would press Mr. Boerma to see that a technical study is undertaken on the whole question of food reserves, their management, costs etc. etc. The Bank is prepared to cooperate in the Ethiopian study. We would provide \$25,000 towards the study, to come out of contingency funds. We would also provide one staff member for the mission.

Cost-Sharing Arrangements under FAO and UNIDO Cooperative Program Agreements

You recently sent Mr. Hoffman a note saying that Boerma had remarked to you that we had given UNIDO a better deal under its cooperative program agreement than we had given FAO. You asked whether that was true and, if it were, what it would cost to apply the same formula to FAO.

The short answer is that no difference in treatment is intended.

By a call to FAO, Mike learned that FAO had focussed on a difference in the language of the two agreements. While both require the partner agency to meet "indirect" costs of the program, the UNIDO agreement (but not the FAO agreement) provides that we will share what are categorized as "directly identifiable additional administrative costs". FAO says that its costs in this category would amount to \$100,000 over two years; the Bank would thus be contributing another \$75,000 by application of the 75/25% cost-sharing formula.

It does look as though we had been more generous to UNIDO. But in fact we have not been and do not intend to be. We started out in our negotiations with UNIDO with a draft agreement in which the cost-sharing language was the same as that of the other cooperative program agreements: we would share "direct" costs and UNIDO would meet "invisible and indirect overhead costs". We sent up to you for approval, prior to submission to the Executive Directors, an agreement which incorporated that provision. You may remember, however, that we had to hold up submission to the Board. because we learned that UNIDO was proposing changes in what we had thought was an agreed text. These changes included addition of the reference to "directly identifiable additional administrative costs". We did not see any need to refer specifically to these costs, since the text had included a general provision that "direct" costs would be shared. Moreover, we were reluctant to depart from language for which there were precedents. But because Abdel-Rahman had already put the redraft before his Executive Board, we accepted the change. However, we did so on the express understanding that the Bank and UNIDO would reach agreement on the specific items of cost to be shared under the provision, and that this agreement would be "based on arrangements worked out under other cooperative programs". UNIDO accepted that condition.

So far, UNIDO has proposed the sharing of two items of cost under the provision in question: the costs of long distance cables and phone calls originating with UNIDO, and the costs of interview travel of candidates for posts under the program. Our position has been that both of these

items fall into the category of "indirect overhead costs" which, under the other programs, are borne by the partner agency and are not subject to sharing. UNIDO has accepted the decision as to cables and phone calls; it has not yet acquiesced in the second.

We do not, at the moment, know what costs went into FAO's \$100,000 calculation. That figure might include some items which, were they claimed by UNIDO, we would have to conclude should be shared as "directly identifiable additional administrative costs". But it is unlikely that they could amount to very much; certainly they would not be of the order of \$100,000. Moreover, if we did conclude that the costs had to be shared with UNIDO, we would not take a different position if a similar claim were advanced by FAO.

Enclosed please find copies of a memorandum on soybean production in Sri Lanks. The memorandum was prepared in the Sri Lanks Program Division and recommends that the Bank express "special interest" in the ongoing UNDP Substitution Crops project and that an identification mission be sent to Sri Lanks during 1974 after the results of the seed production athene are known (Memorandum, Page 6).

We support the suggestion that we express "special interest" in the UNDF project and we intend to do so. We understand that FAO is preparing a project proposal for a UADF study to be incorporated in the next Country Program. However, in view of your already overloaded work program, we feel that it is premature to think in terms of an identification mission until the results of the seed production scheme are available for analysis as well as the USDP study. We also have a number of quastions related to costs of production, pricing, as well as the sectoral priority of such a project given the experimental nature of the crop in Sri Lanks.

We would welcome your views on the memorandum and we would appreciate your keeping as posted on FAO's role in the coybean field.

Subject: Report on the Vth World Congress on Agricultural Credit

1. In accordance with terms of reference dated 12 September, 1973, I visited Milan from 17 to 20 September to attend the Vth World Congress on Agricultural Credit. The Conference was organized by the International Confederation for Agricultural Credit (CICA) with the assistance of the Cassa di Risparmio delle Provincie Lombarde. It was attended by more than 500 participants from 60 countries in Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, North America and Oceania, including a few participants from international agencies, FAO 1/OECD and ICA.

Conference Programme

- 2. The Conference Agenda included discussion of the following topics:
 - a) Financing of Agriculture in Developing Countries (Professor G. Dell'Amore, Chairman, Caisse d'Epargne des Provinces Lombardes);
 - b) Mobilization of Savings Funds to finance Rural Development in Africa (Mr. A. Daubrey, General Manager, Banque Nationale pour le Développement Agricole, Abidjan, Ivory Coast);
 - c) Reflections on the Opportunity of Cheap Credit available to Agriculture (Mr. A. Costabel, General Secretary, Fédération Nationale du Crédit Agricole, Paris, France);
 - d) Financing a changing US Agriculture (Mr. E.A. Jaenke, Governor, Farm Credit Administration, Washington, USA);

Discussions

3. During the discussions, I had occasion to speak on the FAO/IBRD CP and the problem of interest rates and to reply to critical remarks about external financial assistance (copy of my address attached).

Conference Conclusions

- 4. At the end of the Congress, a paper was presented with the main conclusions of the Congress which are summarized as follows:
 - a) Agricultural credit should be distributed by specialized institutions. Specialization can be achieved either by establishing agricultural banking institutions or by setting up special departments in institutions which operate in a broader field;
 - Expansion of medium and long-term financing of agriculture in developing countries requires wider access to international financial markets as well as increasing efforts for mobilizing rural savings;
 - c) Governments should adopt a policy of low interest rates, particularly as a means to improve farm structures or to provide incentives for selective purposes;
 - d) Agricultural banks should evolve towards universal (or "full services") banks. In this respect marketing is an important aspect of bank management and operations;
 - e) Agricultural credit should not be affected by measures for restricting credits taken by monetary authorities in the frame of anti-inflationary policy.

Conference Assessment

The Conference was very well organized. In general, the presentation of the subjects was good. However, very little time was available for discussions in depth, and the absence of restricted working groups made such discussions difficult. Some of the conclusions are more related to problems and situations prevailing in developed countries and should be considered cautiously in the context of developing countries. However, the Conference was useful since it played an important "forum" function and gave an opportunity of reviewing the broad trends of agricultural credit institutions in various countries.

Texte de l'intervention de M. Marcel HASSID, Spécialiste du Crédit Agricole Programme Conjoint FAO/Banque Mondiale

Monsieur le Président, Mesdames, Messieurs,

Je suis heureux de l'occasion qui m'est offerte, dans le cadre du 5ème Congrès Mondial de la CICA, de discuter le problème des taux d'intérêt: sur lequel Monsieur Costabel vient de présenter un rapport fort intéressant. Il s'agit en effet d'un problème avec lequel se trouve confronté dans les pays en voie de développement le Programme FAO/Banque Mondiale auquel j'appartiens.

Le Programme FAO/Banque Mondiale

Ce Programme, permettez moi de le rappeler, résulte d'un accord conclu il y a une dizaine d'années entre la FAO et la Banque. A la suite de cet accord, il a été constitué, au sein de la FAO, une équipe chargée plus spécialement de l'identification et de la préparation de projets d'investissement agricole en vue de leur financement par la Banque. A l'origine, cette cellule comptait une dizaine de personnes. Depuis, elle s'est agrandie en raison en particulier de l'impulsion vigoureuse donnée par la Banque au financement de l'agriculture sous la présidence de M. MacNamara dont l'objectif actuel est de prêter un milliard de dollars par an à ce secteur.

Le Programme compte aujourd'hui près de 70 professionnels. Il est financé, en partie par la FAO, en partie par la Banque. Cette double dépendance risque sans doute d'amener ses membres à ne se considérer ni entièrement FAO, ni entièrement Banque. C'est donc à titre personnel que je présenterai quelques réflexions sur le problème des taux d'intérêts. Je dirai également quelques mots sur l'aide internationale évoquée par certains des rapporteurs.

Taux d'Intérêts

Il s'agit à la vérité d'une question particulièrement émotionnelle. Il est en effet curieux de constater que dans les pays en voie de développement où la pratique de taux usuraires de l'ordre de 50 et même 100% n'est pas rare, les instituts officiels de crédit agricole pratiquent des taux inférieurs au loyer ordinaire de l'argent. Ces taux sont d'ailleurs fixés plutôt par les pouvoirs politiques que par les autorités monétaires et bancaires. L'expérience démontre pourtant que les agriculteurs se préoccupent moins du niveau des taux que de la disponibilité du capital et de la simplicité des procédures.

A cet égard, la Banque insiste en général pour que le taux ordinaire se rapproche autant que possible du coût d'opportunité du capital. En effet, particulièrement dans les pays où l'argent est rare, l'intérêt a une fonction allocative et permet de sélectionner les projets en fonction de leur rentabilité. Il faut donc étudier l'incidence des taux d'intérêt sur les emprunteurs potentiels à la lumière de budgets et de plans de développement agricoles d'exploitations types ainsi que de leurs flux de trésorerie prévisionnels. Il est aussi souhaitable que les taux d'intérêt soient établis à un niveau suffisant pour couvrir les charges financières et les frais de gestion des institutions sans oublier la constitution de réserves appropriées. Pour cela, il convient de se baser sur les comptes d'exploitation et flux de trésorerie passés et prévisionnels des organismes appelés à participer aux opérations du projet. Enfin il faut tenir compte du rythme d'inflation qui aboutit si souvent à des intérêts négatifs pour les établissements de crédit et essayer d'obtenir une indexation des prêts éventuellement.

Bien entendu, il ne s'agit pas là de principes dogmatiques mais d'un cadre général d'une application nuancée. La Banque admet des taux préférentiels en faveur des petits agriculteurs. La subvention des coûts administratifs qu'impliquent les programmes en faveur des petits exploitants peut également être prise en considération.

En tout état de cause, le problème du crédit à taux réduit est examiné dans le cadre général de la politique de développement de l'agriculture et la subvention doit être justifiée. Des facteurs politiques peuvent empêcher un relèvement des taux 1/. La Banque s'efforcera de tenir compte de ces diverses considérations dans ses décisions.

L'Assistance Financière de la Banque

Je voudrais à présent discuter les problèmes de l'aide internationale évoqués par certains des rapporteurs. Cette aide est diverse et multiple. Je me limiterai à la Banque Mondiale.

Les critiques exprimés visaient les coûts de l'assistance, son inadaptation aux besoins et l'attribution de responsabilités à des étrangers.

Coût de l'Assistance

La Banque Mondiale octroie des prêts au taux actuel de 7.25% l'an. Ce taux ne me parait pas excessif dans la conjoncture actuelle, compte-tenu du coût des capitaux sur les grands centres financiers. Au surplus, par l'intermédiaire de sa filiale, l'AID, la Banque octroie à un certain nombre de pays des crédits à des taux extrêmement favorables (une commission de service de 0.75% par an) remboursables après 10 ans de grâce en 40 ans. L'octroi de prêts mixtes Banque/AID permet d'obtenir en moyenne des taux intermédiaires.

^{1/} A la Conférence de Washington de l'USAID (Juillet 1973), le Professeur Adams a exprimé le souhait que les gouvernements se préoccupent moins de la clientèle électorale des emprunteurs et plus de celle des déposants.

Cependant le Gouvernement seulement bénéficie du taux de l'AID. Les fonds AID reprêtés par le Gouvernement aux institutions le sont à des conditions autant que possible en rapport avec celles du marché monétaire.

Inadaptation de l'Aide

La Banque est, je crois, consciente de certaines insuffisances. Elle s'efforce d'accélérer ses procédures et d'adapter ses financements aux besoins des pays. A cet égard, je signalerai, par exemple, l'admission partielle de coûts en monnaie locale, le financement des crédits à court terme dans la mesure où ils sont additionnels. La réorganisation de la Banque intervenue il y a un an et sa division en départements régionaux témoigne du souci d'avoir une meilleure connaissance des pays. Enfin, le souci de financer non plus seulement des programmes de crédit agricole en faveur d'exploitations commerciales mais des actions de développement rural intégré dont bénéficient les groupes disposant des revenus les plus bas témoigne d'une nouvelle stratégie tenant compte des intérêts des pays les plus pauvres et des classes les plus déshéritées.

Attribution des Responsabilités

L'attribution de responsabilités aux nationaux est, je puis le dire, un souci constant du Programme et de la Banque. Au stade de la préparation, par exemple, nous avons comme règle d'agir en étroite liaison avec les membres du Gouvernement et les fonctionnaires locaux non seulement pour connaître les décisions d'ordre politique mais aussi pour que les nationaux soient associés au travail technique de formulation des projets.

Lors de l'évaluation du projet, la Banque s'attache à examiner la possibilité d'en confier l'exécution à des nationaux. L'assistance technique n'est que temporaire et doit s'appuyer sur des fonctionnaires de contrepartie dont la formation est prévue sur place ou à l'extérieur. Dans certains cas, en Haute-Volta en particulier, c'est un Fond de Développement local qui a été chargé de décider du financement des sous-projets à exécuter dans le cadre d'un prêt global sur la base de critères pré-établis.

En définitive, je crois que les conditions apportées par la Banque à ses prêts ne sont pas imposées mais négociées. En tout état de cause, les gouvernements peuvent faire entendre leur voix dans différentes instances. Certes les procédures et politiques du Programme et de la Banque peuvent encore susciter des critiques. Mais je voudrais souligner leurs évolutions constantes. Au surplus, je crois que c'est le sort des banquiers d'être critiqués par leurs clients. A l'époque où j'exerçais des responsabilités, il m'a été donné d'entendre reprocher à la banque à la direction de laquelle je participais de pratiquer des taux élevés, de mettre en oeuvre des procédures inadaptées et d'avoir un personnel étranger, je veux dire étranger à l'agriculture parce que composé de citadins. De telles critiques sont toujours utiles car elles établissent un dialogue qui est un facteur de progrès.

FAO/IBRD Cooperative Program - Plan of Work

- Following up on the latest meeting with Mr. Yudelman I have prepared a breakdown of the four fiscal years 1975-78 of the agricultural projects in your Division. This information has been taken from the P&B Table IVa print-out dated August 28, 1973. The information contained in these tables is derived from the fiscal year 1975 Timetables and the agricultural programs described in the CPPs. Clearly some CPPs are out-dated and a number of important ones will be revised between now and the end of the year. You may want to up-date the individual country tables as they are attached to this memorandum on the basis of a draft CPP or whatever other information you may have, realising, however, that in the aggregate such up-dating will not make a significant difference. For certain countries you will not find a lending sheet because there is no agricultural lending program at this stage. If you have any indication that some of the countries not included should be included for later years, please do so and for that purpose a few blank sheets have been attached. Also for some countries the 1978 program has not yet been determined and again if you have any further information please add to the country program as presented.
- You will note that the information requested follows FAO's biennium since the budget for the CP is established on that basis. You could, however, easily add a few lines on the tables to make the calendar years into Bank fiscal years since the table is made up by calendar year quarters. The most difficult part, of course, of this exercise is to determine coefficients for identification/preparation work. Some work on this is being done and I will inform you of the outcome as soon as possible. FAO CP will start time recording system on October 1st which will fit into the Bank's time recording system. However, for the time being it seems reasonable to assume that total man-weeks required for an identification mission would be two men for two weeks in the field plus 4 weeks report writing for a total of 14 weeks. A preparation mission on average should be 3-1/2 men in the field for 4 weeks in field plus 6 weeks report writing for a total of 35 weeks. I have not much of a feeling for the number of missions per project since there is great variance. I would therefore appreciate your best estimate of the difficulty of the job and the amount of work to be done and then determine how many missions you think it will require to finish the job in such a way that it will be ready for appraisal. I realise that all this is necessarily vague and that the end result will be no more than approximation but I believe that this may well be an appropriate first step in a long and more sophisticated process. The tables only address themselves to identification and preparation and I think

September 10, 1973 Division Chiefs, Agr. that at this stage we should add to the total of identification and preparation a percentage for appraisal, supervision, economic work and for overhead to arrive at a total capacity figure. Also attached is a table for your region covering 1974-78 Five-Year period by type of project, by country. I may have misinterpreted some of the descriptions of the projects as they appeared in the IVa sheets dated June 1973 but again I believe it gives a reasonable picture in the aggregate. I have not done an up-date of this aggregate sheet because the differences between July and August are so small in both the total numbers of projects and in terms of dollars that it did not seem worth the effort. I would appreciate it if you could prepare this information by indicating, for those projects on which FAO CP will be working, the number of manweeks by quarter. In the column "Prepared By" please indicate "other" if no CP involvement is foreseen. Hopefully you will be able to return them to me by about Monday, September 17th. Attachments MVeraart: fh

- Neither our discussion of August 8, 1973 nor the note attached to your memorandum of August 29 have done much to lift the fog about what recommendations should be made to management with regard to the FAO/IBRD CP budget for the next biennium. It is not very useful to argue that CP should be abolished, or moved to Washington or split up emong Regional Offices or turned into a technical assistance exercise since we all know these recommendations cannot be endorsed by FAO and, hence, are likely to be seen as running counter to the President's policy of increased cooperation within the UN family. To discuss these unrealistic options is to divert attention away from practical suggestions to improve the workings of the CP and from a businesslike approach to the CP budget process. The fact is that the FAO/IBRD CP has become a very valuable institutional resource. Its "equity" is substantial: it consists of a core of highly experienced professional staff. This "equity" should not be dissipated. Rather, the Bank Group should help ensure that it is well managed and efficiently used to further Bank Group objectives and to meet the needs of our Borrowers.
- I am sure you will agree that a budget of US\$6-9 million should not be approved by the Bank without a clear picture of CP resources, objectives and programs. Nor is it possible to conceive of these objectives and programs as evolving in isolation from those of the Bank Group. To Regionalize the agriculture operations of the Bank without concurrently strengthening Bank monitoring of the CP seems unwise and, in the long run, dangerous. Asia accounts for 35-10% of CP business. Agriculture and rural development operations in the Asia Region are highly dependent on CP performance. If only for these reasons, I would recommend that the impending budget review of the CP be linked to: (a) specific operational targets based on well established manpower norms and derived from Regional work programs; (b) suitable changes in CP work procedures; (c) improved operational relationships with the Bank Group and, in particular, better organization of the semi-annual operations review; (d) stepped-up technical scrutiny of FAO/IBED reports.
- New budget requests cannot be assessed without objective evaluations of past performance. Mr. McIvor's note and Mr. Veraart's minutes of the last Division Chiefs meeting are useful but they do not fill that bill. I understand that one of the responsibilities of your Department is to provide top management in CPS and the Regions with periodic budget performance reviews of the CP. Obviously, if the raw data is not readily available in Washington for such an exercise it should be requested immediately from Rome. If it is not available in Rome, this would cast doubt on the CP's ability to manage its budget and we should assist them

in setting up the needed administrative capacity for budget control. In any case, Asia stands ready to assist you in any way you wish, e.g. for defining the necessary information requirements or in evaluating the raw data sent by the CP.

- Review of past performance should help determine standard manpower norms required (on average) for project identification and preparation. These yardsticks should be suitably adjusted to reflect (1) new procedures under which Borrowers would do more to identify and prepare projects: (ii) improved coordination with the Bank: (iii) more "difficult" projects, particularly in the field of rural development. It is conceivable that the FAO CP could use substantially less manpower than in the past per project prepared if such manpower can be spread over longer time periods, more trips per project are made and if the CP (with Bank Group support) can obtain substantially stepped up support from the Alternatively, for a given manpower outlay by Governments concerned. the CP, project preparation quality should improve by focussing CP resources more on actual project design issues than on cosmetics. In other words. I believe that the time has come for the CP to "leverage" its staff equity with more resources from Borrowers, thus improving project preparation performance, in quantity as well as quality.
- Before going much further in the budget process, there should be a Region-by-Region "demand" exercise—to illuminate the specialties likely to be required over the next two-three years, to estimate staffing needs, likely travel costs, identify special Regional requirements, etc. Budget guidelines (taking account of recent experience and of alternative arrangements for project preappraisal work, e.g. in Africa) should be provided to the Regions at the outset. While this may be more cumbersome than the current pragmatic, "hit or miss", short-run planning approach it has become necessary in view of the Regionalization of Bank Group agriculture operations. In any case, I wish to stress that we will need to know what we can realistically expect from Rome before we prepare our FT75 budget in January/February 1974.
- 6. While many views about the CP work style have been expressed, I believe there is a general consensus emerging in Washington as well as in Rome that serious consideration should be given to setting up in virtually all cases, Inter-Agency Government Units (IGUs) in charge of project preparation. Indeed this should become a major institution building objective of CP activity. Once this is established, report writing will naturally take on a different character. It will gradually move to the field—where it ultimately belongs. Report writing in Rome has advantages—but it should never supplant report writing and data gathering in the field. To repeat, the current CP report writing technology should be transferred to Borrowers—as an investment for the longer run, and also to improve project quality by avoiding "headquarters fantasizing" and clever writing (or computing) "around" difficult project issues. To move in the direction suggested here will require a strong

Bank push on the occasion of the CP budget review. Initially, this may lead to some increase in travel costs but such increase might be limited by clever scheduling and would, in any case, constitute a productive investment if IGUs become effective. It might lead over the long run to some decentralization of CP staff in Regional Resident Offices, e.g. in India.

- 7. One of the "raisons d'etre" of the CP is its function as a channel of FAO data and experience for Bank activities. Cynicism about the value of FAO activities is misplaced and unfortunately widespread so that the CP has been allowed to neglect very seriously this side of its activities. We should insist on being kept better informed about the work of FAO (including UNDP-financed operations) both Region-by-Region and overall-through the CP.
- 8. The budget should allocate significant FAO CP participation to appraisal, sector work, and other Bank Group operations. At the same time, Regional and CPS budgets should make adequate allowance for Bank Group staff support for preappraisal activities, particularly for identification. This is the best way of getting the CP to get to know the Bank's Regional Offices better and to keep abreast of evolving Bank policies and changing personnel. Joint professional seminars on important Regional problems might also be arranged.
- The operating relationships between the Bank and the CP need strengthening and related internal procedures need revemping. While a central point in CPS is useful to keep CPS informed and to avoid wasteful competition among Regions, direct Regional contacts with the CP should also be encouraged. Technical reviews of FAO CP Reports is the responsibility of the Regions and these reviews might therefore be sent to CP directly by the Region-with a copy to CPS. Similarly FAO should send all of its reports directly to the Regional Projects Sections and a copy should go to CFS. This would easily save two-three valuable days each way in useless routings. Similarly, I would see great merit in sharing with the CP a wider range of Bank documents-including Bank supervision reports and the agriculture sections of CPPs. Provided confidentiality is ensured, the Bank should be prepared to route copies of such documents directly to the Regional Chiefs in the Program, as a matter of course.
- 10. The current format of the semi-ammal operational discussions is not satisfactory. It is mostly a fishing expedition allowing Rome to "pick and choose" and leaving the Regional Projects Divisions with an inadequate picture of what they can expect, when. For the next session, I would suggest that we send our requirements to Rome in advance and that the Washington discussions end up with a firm six-month staffing program for the CP operations. This would have the added advantage of giving the CP an overview of the Bank's agriculture program before they arrive in Washington. We informally explored this possibility

with Messrs. Huyser and Clark during the latest round of discussions and they readily agreed to such an approach.

- Il. The CP recently volunteered the notion that, in the wake of the reorganisation, CP work is no longer subject to suitable technical scrutiny within the Bank. Whether this is true or not, it is the view of the CP. We should therefore establish procedures which make this concern visibly baseless. The Asia Region is gradually strengthening its technical reviews of CP reports. A more systematic input from CPS in this process would be appreciated.
- Region agriculture operations program. We believe that the CP should be treated as a partner not as a subordinate. The relationship needs to be improved in the framework of a closely monitored program by making more explicit Regional requirements and by setting specific CP goals in relation to these requirements. This is likely to require an improved administrative system in Rome and more direct operational contacts between the Region and the CP. The style of CP work needs to change to give more emphasis to Government (interagency) participation in project preparation. This is likely to lead to improved performance—in terms of quantity as well as quality. In the long run, this will involve some decentralization of CP staff into the field.

The Director-General is writing to your President on the recruitment situation of the Cooperative Programme and has also referred in general terms to the CP budget for 1974/75.

As you will see from the attached photocopy of our budget document (it is still not available for general distribution) of the total proposed budget of \$9,100,000 for the biennium only 1 million constitutes the net Programme increase. Of this a sum of \$332,625 goes for a proposed staff increase of five additional professional posts while \$200,000 and \$462,375 go towards increased provisions for consultants and travel (there is also a \$5,000 increase in the Miscellaneous chapter). The so-called mandatory increases of FAO only apply to fixed costs including salary increases and consultants and travel are not considered as such. The increase in budget provision for consultants may therefore well disappear into increased fees. Similarly I would estimate that about 10% of the increase in travel provision would go to increased costs (fares and per diem).

Altogether I would estimate that in terms of real increased work capacity we are left with about an extra 5-6 man years over 1972/73. Against this we find that increased costs of CP missions both in duration and composition. This last point is due to the welcome and increasing attention to more integrated agricultural projects (small farmers; area and integrated rural development).

We now estimate a preparation mission on average to last 3 months, or 12 weeks (including report writing), and involve at least 5 persons. This brings us to 60 man weeks per preparation mission. Identification missions take about half the number of man weeks.

A rough guess would give that for "CP responsibility" missions 40% are identification and 60% are preparation missions. A total of 10% of available staff resources is expected to go to Bank led missions (appraisal, economic and sector surveys, etc.).

Programme Objective 3.3: Investment Centre (DDC)

- 1. (a) Medium-Term Objective: To expand the flow of investment in agriculture, forestry and fisheries, including agro-industries, in developing countries through the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme, cooperative arrangements with Area Banks and regional funds, cooperation with commercial, development and other banking institutions, international and national, and liaison with other sources of multi- and bilateral aid, including WFP.
 - (b) Objectives for 1974-75: To increase the flow of investment projects for agricultural and rural development, identified and prepared under the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme, in line with the projected growth of IBRD/IDA loans/credit for such projects; to expand the level of cooperative activities with the African Development Bank and the just-established African Development Fund; to increase the programme level and improve working arrangements for cooperation with the Inter-American Development Bank; to offer increased cooperation to the Asian Development Bank; and, subject to extra-budgetary funds, to expand the FAO/Bankers Programme.

2. Relationship to 1972-73 Programme: No change.

Medium-Term Outlook: The World Bank and nearly all the Area Banks have been progressively increasing their lending to agriculture. Multilateral sources are expected to provide the major part of the external capital resources for agricultural development in the developing countries. However, such acceleration of lending cannot be attained without much greater efforts in the identification, preparation and appraisal of viable agricultural investment projects, the shortage of which continues to remain a critical bottleneck. Therefore, FAO's investment assistance activities will continue to be of high priority in the medium term.

The activities of the programme will increase considerably in line with the projected volume of lending by the multilateral financial institutions. However, special efforts will also be made to steer such assistance into critical areas of agricultural development strategy such as development of small farms, integrated rural development, institutional reforms and nutrition. FAO's Regular Programme activities in these fields will provide useful support to the Investment Centre's work in the medium term.

Within the programme the relative importance of the different cooperative programmes and activities is not expected to change in spite of an expected large build-up of cooperation with Area Banks and the FAO/Bankers Programme. Thus, the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme will remain the largest component of the Investment Centre's activities, and will maintain its separate identity in line with the agreement with IBRD.

This programme is of high priority in the medium term and will need a continuing increase in resources over the period to achieve its objectives.

This high priority derives from the much larger volume of external aid for investment in agriculture that will be required for attaining the targets of the UN Second Development Decade (DD2).

The achieve the agricultural goals (4 percent annual rate of growth) in DD2, the developing countries will have to continue to bear the main responsibility for mobilizing and allocating the increasing levels of investment resources. However their trade prospects and debt-servicing burden do not include any narrowing of the foreign exchange gap. Hence, they will need a larger net flow of foreign financial resources through development assistance and private investment. FAO should also focus on these problems through other efforts such as greater orientation to pre-investment projects, and in the field of commodities and trade, particularly in any scheme for international agricultural adjustment.

4. Progress in 1972-73: IBRD/IDA lending for agriculture has maintained its growth in line with the Bank's five-year plan. The resources of IDA in September 1972 have been replenished at double the previous level. In preparation for the continued growth of the Bank Group's financing of agriculture, IBRD underwent a major structural reorganization in October 1972. These developments resulted in more requests for FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme services, often beyond its immediate capacity to meet them. On the other hand, in order to contain cost increases, recruitment was slowed down in 1972, with the intention of reaching full staffing in 1973.

Despite these economies, the volume of work is expected to reach the level foreseen for the biennium. The number of missions is expected to have increased from 242 in 1970-71 by about 10 percent. Over two thirds of these missions are for identification and preparation projects, mostly mounted by FAO. The number and amount of IBRD loans and IDA credits approved for projects assisted by the Cooperative Programme are also expected to increase similarly. Fifty Cooperative Programme-assisted projects were approved for loans/credits of US \$ 688m. in 1970-71. Thirty-five such projects were approved for loans/credits totalling US \$ 504 m. in 1972 and the first five months of 1973. The Cooperative Programme has also been spearheading the identification and preparation of investment projects in many relatively new fields. Besides irrigation and drainage, land development and settlement, credit, livestock and fisheries, special attention has been given to seed production and distribution, integrated rural development, small farms, forest industries and agricultural education. A field survey was started in Malaysia to assess the effects of a Bank project on the development of small farms in respect of income, employment, consumption and investment. The aim of this survey, which will be completed in 1974, is to derive guidelines for evaluating the benefits of small farm projects. Possible Bank operations are also under consideration in the field of nutrition.

Cooperation with the African Development Bank (AFDB) has been further strengthened especially from 1973. With the establishment of the African Development Fund at AFDB, the volume of lending to agriculture is expected to increase substantially from mid-1973, despite a temporary slow-down in 1972 due to shortage of resources. The present AFDB/FAO Agreement will be suitably extended to cover FAO activities for the Fund. The FAO Desk at AFDB in Abidjan has worked on about 20 projects, besides participating in the Bank's other agricultural activities including project appraisal and supervision. Since its establishment, AFDB has approved nine agricultural projects for a total loan of US \$ 11.180 seven of which were prepared with the assistance of the AFDB/FAO Cooperative Programme.

Under the leadership of the new President, the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) too is placing a high priority on accelerated lending to agriculture and is seeking closer cooperation with FAO for this purpose. Discussions are in progress between FAO and IDB on a revision of the existing Memorandum of Understanding with a view to establishing improved arrangements for programming, increasing the level of activities and providing for direct support of this Cooperative Programme to IDB's lending operations. The impact of these changes is expected to occur from mid-1973. Meanwhile, two areas of joint activity foreseen in these changes have been initiated: agricultural sector review in selected countries with special emphasis on project identification; and detailed preparation of agricultural investment programmes and projects in selected countries financed with reimbursable IDB loans. The subsectors receiving priority are fisheries, marketing, agrarian reform and forestry. Since 1968, IDB's total loan commitment to agriculture has been US\$ 651 m. of which US\$ 93 million has been for four projects prepared with the assistance of this Programme. Nearly twelve projects are in the pipeline, while a few have been financed domestically.

Cooperative activities with the <u>Asian Development Bank</u> (ASDB) did not increase during the biennium, nor did the Bank's lending to agriculture. However, consultations were held regularly between the two organizations. ASDB's support to agriculture is expected to increase following the activation of the Asian Development Fund, which the ASDB Board of Governors, at its meeting in April 1973, resolved to establish.

The central office of the Investment Centre (IC) assisted or carried out joint activities with other financing agencies including the International Coffee Organization's Diversification Fund (ICO), regional bodies such as the Kuwait and the Abu Dhabi Funds for Arab Economic Development, sub-regional banks such as the Central American Bank for Economic Integration (CABEI) and the Caribbean Development Bank, and the FAO/Bankers' Programme.

Requests from ICO for assistance in project identification, preparation and appraisal were more numerous than could be handled by the limited IC resources. Cooperation with the Kuwait and the Abu Dhabi Funds was generally limited to exchange of ideas and information on project possibilities. The Caribbean Bank was assisted in building up its agricultural staff. These cooperative activities have thus continued to be of an ad hoc nature, except for a regional UNDP project for CABEI. On the other hand, investment follow-up of UNDP projects is steadily expanding. The central office is building up a core staff with UNDP support (see section 6).

was started on an experimental basis in 1970 and reviewed in mid-1972. A symposium was held with representatives of selected banks from developed and developing countries. The objectives were then reformulated. The need was emphasized for a forum of bankers from developed and developing countries interested in the development of agriculture, forestry and fishery including agro-industry. Projects should be developed which require a package of short-term and investment funds for financing by such banks in combination, if possible, with multilateral agencies. Efforts are being made to enlarge the membership to include commercial or development banks, private or public, in developed as well as developing countries. The number of member banks has already increased from 7 to 14. Close cooperation is being maintained with the International Finance Corporation and regional private investment companies, as well as with the Industry Cooperative Programme.

With a view to building up a pipeline of projects for initial consideration by regional and sub-regional banks, members of the FAO/Bankers' Programme and other financing institutions, IC has launched a few identification missions in selected countries at the request of their governments. In most cases, such missions have proved useful, and this type of work is expected to increase, depending on available resources. More than a dozen projects have thus been identified and are of interest to one or more of these institutions. The cost of preparation of these projects is being arranged through extrabudgetary resources, including funds-in-trust.

5. Priorities for 1974-75: The main priorities for the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme are:
(a) to increase the volume of work between 5 and 10 percent over 1972-73; to develop further new lines of work initiated in the current biennium, especially formulation of investment projects involving integrated rural development, small farmers, agro-industries, nutrition and non-formal education; and (c) to undertake special studies on the methodology of project formulation and appraisal in some of these fields. Budgetary provisions have accordingly been increased by 6 percent.

Further expansion in the Area Bank Programmes with AFDB and IDB can reasonably be envisaged. AFDB has already indicated its desire for such an expansion linked to the expected increase in lending to agriculture by the African Development Fund. Pending the formulation of a definitive programme of work, a small increase is provided for the FAC/AFDB Programme. As regards the FAC/IDB Programme, the activity and budget levels being tentatively considered by IDB might be much higher. No specific increase is provided at this stage. FAC might be approached at a later date by IDB and also AFDB for increased budget levels for the respective Programmes.

The priorities for the IC Central Office include expansion of the FAO/Bankers' Programme, investment follow-up of UNDP projects and strengthening of assistance to regional and sub-regional financing institutions.

6. Field Programme: The Investment Centre is operating the UNDP Regional Project to help CABEI set up its Agriculture Department and develop a pipeline of projects for investment in the subregion, particularly for developing seed production, marketing and storage.

The Investment Centre is also cooperating with IBRD and ADB in the implementation of the UNDP Regional Project for the preparation of pioneer projects in the Lower Mekong Basin. Six projects have been identified in Khmer Republic, Laos and North-East Thailand. Assistance has also been provided in topographic and soil surveys in Khmer Republic and Viet-Nam.

CP would like to send an FAO staffmember on either the Ecuador or Salvador missions. Bogdan Sestan, Agricultural Educator from Human Resources Division speaks Spanish and is proposed for one of those missions. He has been cleared by IBRD.

This schedule takes up most of the remaining available time during the year of the four agricultural educators. In future, the CP plans to also utilize the agricultural educators on Rural Development and other projects that have a significant training element.

Mr. J. P. Huyser, Mr. Casati and Mr. Clark, accomapnied by Mr. M. Veraart from the Bank's CPS Agriculture, visited Industrial Projects Department today, and met with Mr. Dewey and myself to review problems and programs of common interest. Mr. Dewey is recording a note of that meeting.

Later, in the afternoon, Mr. Clark and Mr. Casati met again with me and Mr. Ragetly to discuss the operations in which we have common interest, which are briefly noted below:

- Mr. Clark drew attention to his Division's plan to send missions to Korea and Thailand in September and October-November 1973 respectively. I indicated our willingness to review terms of reference for the missions, to ensure maximum coordination of objectives; and he agreed to send them to us.
- The report of a mission to Burma has been completed and sent to 2. the Agriculture Projects Division of the Region.
- I mentioned that Mr. Moore's presently in Indonesia and on his return, we would advise what further action is deemed necessary in that country. He said he would be willing to make man-power available in line with his earlier commitment (Mr. Swiderski/Mr. Zurbrugg). (Action - Mr. Moore.)
- Madagascar The C.P. Report has been submitted. 4.
- Tanzania Mr. Clark will await our request for timing of assistance already promised. (Action - Carmignani/Moore)
- Ecuador Mr. Casati mentioned that he has delayed the work scheduled originally for August to October in view of lack of sufficient data at present. He offered to make Mr. Spear available for mid-term review of the work of the consultant to be appointed, if this should be deemed necessary by us. (Action - Tarnawiecki/Dewey)
- Peru The desk review planned for August can be postponed to October, in view of lack of any fresh data for the proposed review at this stage. We have to let him know about this. (Action - Brown/Dewey)
- Mr. Ragetly indicated to Messrs. Clark and Casati that he would 8. be in a position to discuss his draft of the pulp and paper sector study in September, when he expects to be in Rome, which was welcomed by both.

Prospective Needs for Aid from FAO Under Cooperative Program

In response to your request, I am summarizing below Division B's prospective needs for aid from FAO under the cooperative program during FY75 and FY76 (excluding economic and sector work). Note that many of the projects described below and potential new projects will depend upon the results of the IDB/Bank regional agricultural sector survey mission, planned for the latter part of this year.

<u>CABEI</u> - FAO might assist CABEI in carrying out a study of fats and oils in the region under the Bank's technical assistance program for CABEI;

Costa Rica - The Bank has scheduled two agricultural credit operations in FY75 and FY76. FAO's assistance in preparing these projects might be desirable;

El Salvador - The Government has informed the Bank that no assistance for agriculture is required from the Bank Group, since IDB and USAID are likely to cover all the needs of this sector;

Guatemala The Bank has scheduled an integrated rural development project for FY76 (\$10 million loan) and we might participate in the country's rural development program which aims at raising productivity of subsistence agriculture in the highlands by improving cultivation and marketing of grains. FAO's help in preparing this project might be sought.

Honduras - FAO has already agreed to provide staff for preparing the Comayagua Valley integrated rural development project.

The Government has requested the Bank for assistance in reorganizing the National Agrarian Institute. FAO's help might be useful in supporting the Bank's efforts in the fields of the agrarian reform.

The Government is also preparing for FY76 a land colonization - rural development project in the north-east region of the country. FAO's assistance would be desirable in the preparation of a feasibility study for this project.

Nicaragua - FAO's assistance might be useful in the preparation of a second agricultural credit loan which is scheduled for FY76 and which would include, among others, tubewell development for irrigation. In this context you will recall that a team of Israeli experts (Tahal) has recently completed a general irrigation survey and a UNDP/UN mission is presently studying Nicaragua's groundwater resources.

FAO's help might also be sought for the preparation of an integrated rural development project scheduled for 1976. The content of this project will depend upon the results of a USAID study and the joint Bank/IDB sector survey review.

We have considered carefully the points you make in the letter. The view here in the Bank is that under the Memorandum of Understanding the expense of the typewriters could not be chargeable to the CP budget. If the costs were to be shared, therefore, we would have to arrange for an amendment to the Memorandum. I have thought about this a good deal and discussed it with most people concerned in the Bank and I have come to the conclusion that I could not recommend an amendment to the Memorandum of Understanding for this purpose. Budgets are tight not only in your Organization but also in the Bank and I just do not feel justified in proposing and arguing for an amendment which would take from FAO an expense which is, as we see it, clearly FAO's responsibility. Dear Noel,

This refers to your letter No. 53 of 2 May regarding the automatic typewriters which we plan to introduce in the CP in order to speed up and make more efficient our report preparation. Your letter was held up by the Italian postal strike and we have already had an opportunity to discuss this matter briefly.

As you know, I did question the point made by the Bank that the charges for renting and eventually purchasing the machines are not specifically covered in our Memorandum of Understanding. While I could not give a legal opinion, the following points should have a bearing on a decision whether or not we have to go through the formal procedure of an Amendment to the Memorandum of Understanding.

Article 4(c) only speaks of FAO's responsibility for paying for "invisible overhead costs" and "identifiable indirect costs". I have always considered identifiable indirect costs to mean furniture and equipment, communications, stationery and other operating expenses. The renting and purchase of machines are direct identifiable costs. The Memorandum of Understanding does not exclude direct costs to be met from the CP budget. This view is strengthened by the practice which has developed over the years, mainly that translation for project reports or special design work costs have been borne by the CP budget when, because of particular circumstances, it was impossible to have them done within FAO. The argument there has no doubt been that translation of and designs for reports are direct costs related to project work.

Could the Bank therefore not accept the point that the automatic typewriters, which are only needed for project reports, are directly related to project operations and their costs chargeable to the CP budget? Moreover, they will allow us to reduce the number of typists in the Programme, whose salaries are paid by the CP budget.

Mr. A.G. Friedrich, Executive Secretary of the ICP, called on me this morning accompanied by Mr. Howard Cottam of FAO. He informed me about the establishment of an ICP liaison office in New York, which he expects to be finally approved by his Executive Committee on July 3. The head of the office would be Mr. W.W. Simons, who is at present the Deputy Executive Secretary of ICP.

I mentioned to Mr. Friedrich that we were beginning to pick up traces of country missions sent out by ICP headquarters and suggested that it might be useful if we could know in advance about such missions. He said they were sending about three a year. The missions are designed to explore the prospects of foreign investments in agro-industry but do not endeavour to carry out anything so precise as project identification. The mission to Brazil has just returned and is now writing a report. During the rest of 1973 they will send missions to Cameroon, Pakistan and Cyprus (see separate memorandum to files of today's date, distributed to regions). We agreed that we would send Friedrich directly the forecast of Bank Economic and Sector Missions and that he would send us their mission schedule and the reports of their missions.

Mr. Friedrich urged me to attend the Annual General Meeting of the ICP which is held in February or March. He expressed entire satisfaction with IFC's participation but said that he thought a more direct link with the Bank is desirable in view of the developments in the Bank, on the one hand, and ICP on the other. I said that I would try to arrange to attend the next meeting in Rome.

Incidentally, Mr. Cottam told me that Boerma's term runs for two years from this November, not one, as I had thought.

- 1. As of May 14, the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Program has been reorganized in two Groups. A list of the staff assigned to each Group is attached.
- 2. Mr. Huyser's memorandum of May 11, which sets out operating procedures in some detail, is available in our divisional file. Of general interest are the instructions on telephone calls to Washington:

"Telephone calls to Washington will be subject to approval by the Group Chief and, to the extent possible, the same call should be used for all queries arising on the same day.

The substance of outgoing and incoming phone calls should always be recorded on a note to the file with copies to the Director and the Group Chiefs and should subsequently be confirmed by cable if there are operational implications."

3. The Cooperative Program Coordinator (Mr. McIvor) is preparing corresponding Guidelines on our procedures for communicating and working with the FAO/IBRD CP. Until these are issued, Mr. McIvor requests that telephone calls should only be made when a telex message is unsuitable and that he should be informed before calls are placed.

OPERATIONAL PROCEDURES

Programme of Work

Subject to policy directives by the Director, each Group Chief will maintain a work plan of projects and missions covering a period of roughly twelve months. In order to refine and up-date this work plan regular visits will be made to the IBRD, preferably on a quarterly basis.

The Group Chief will issue on the first working day of each month a schedule of missions for the ensuing six months. This schedule will be issued in two parts (one for each Group) and both will be issued to all members of the CP and to the IBRD.

In addition, each Group Chief will maintain a travel and work schedule for each member of his Group showing also non-mission work assignments and leave periods. This will be furnished to the Director on a monthly basis, but not given further distribution.

Status of Operations Report

A report will be issued monthly by each Group to all CP Staff showing the "status of operations" of all projects under identification/preparation by the CP. This report will show the progress of each project through to loan negotiation when the project will be dropped from the schedule.

Mission Composition

The Group Chief will appoint mission leaders and agree with the mission leaders on the composition of the mission. Members of one Group will participate in missions of the other Group only after agreement of the Group Chiefs (if necessary on the Director's instructions) and when the distribution of the workload favours such a course. Consultants will be engaged only when CP staff of both Groups with the required expertise are fully employed on other assignments.

Mission Terms of Reference

Terms of reference will be drafted by mission leaders and cleared by the Group Chief. They will then be sent to Washington for approval under cover of a letter signed by the Director. After approval by the Bank the TOR will be issued to the mission by the Group Chief.

When cendensed terms of reference or excerpts are cabled to Washington, such cables will be signed by the Director.

Mission leaders will prepare the necessary cables to the Regional or Country FAO offices and these will be signed by the Group Chief.

Mission Progress Reports

Mission leaders will send weekly progress reports from the field to Group Chiefs who will keep the Director informed.

Back-to-Office Reports

The Mission Leader will submit his Back to Office Report to the Group Chief. After clearance, such Reports will be distributed to all CP staff (regardless of grouping) and to the IBRD.

Full Reports

Group Chiefs will be responsible for review and clearance of reports. In undertaking this responsibility a Reports Review Committee procedure will be followed. As necessary, the services of the Senior Technical Advisers may be utilized on such Committees as well as technical expertise from the opposite Group with the agreement of the Group Chief concerned.

Letters of Transmittal

Letters of transmittal to the IBRD and the Government concerned will be drafted by the mission leader, cleared by the Group Chief and signed by the Director.

Meetings

Meetings of the full CP Staff will continue to be held at regular intervals to discuss matters of general interest and to hear reports on particularly significant missions.

Group Chiefs will arrange more routine de-briefing meetings to which staff of the opposite Group may be invited.

Weekly management meetings will be convened by the Director to discuss the programme of work, general policy issues and administrative matters etc.

COMMUNICATIONS AND DISTRIBUTION OF MAIL

Cables from IBRD

Action copy in triplicate to Group Chief who will distribute as necessary within his Group.

One additional copy for joint use by the Director and Messrs. Bhattacharjee, de Brichambaut and Bishop and another for Mr Chatterjie.

Cables to IBPD

As necessary, each Group Chief will prepare a daily composite cable for signature by the Director.

Distribution within each Group will be indicated on the cable and will include one joint copy for the Director, Deputy Director, Senior Advisers and one for Mr Chatterjie.

Letters from IBRD

Three copies to Group Chief for distribution as required.

One additional copy for joint use by the Director, Deputy Director and Segier Advisers.

Correspondence related to general matters without specific area connotations will be distributed to Director/Deputy Director (Action copy). One information copy will be sent to Senior Advisers and when required an additional copy to Mr Chatterjie.

Letters to IBRD

All correspondence to IBRD originating in a Group will be cleared by the Group Chief. Such correspondence will be prepared in final form within the Group for the Director's signature. Individual staff members will communicate directly with the Bank only in exceptional cases (e.g. direct communication with a mission leader when a staff member has participated in a mission under IBRD responsibility).

One joint copy of such outgoing correspondence will go to the Director, Deputy Director and Senior Advisers.

Telephone Communications with IBRD

Telephone calls to Washington will be subject to approval by the Group Chief and, to the extent possible, the same call should be used for all queries arising on the same day.

The substance of outgoing and incoming phone calls should always be recorded on a note to the file with copies to the Director and the Group Chiefs and should subsequently be confirmed by cable if there are operational implications.

Requests for Services of FAO Personnel

Requests for the services of staff of other FAO Divisions will be drafted by Mission Leaders and signed by the Group Chief for the Director. One copy to Mr Chatterjie.

Cables to UNDP Resident Representatives and FAO Country Representatives

Cables requesting mission clearance and announcing arrival dates, etc., will be prepared by the Mission Leader and signed by the Group Chief.

Distribution of copies will include Mr Chatterjie.

Reports

Incoming IBRD reports will be sent to the Documents Unit which, after registration, will immediately pass on one copy to the interested Group Chief. The existing distribution system within FAO will continue.

The Documents Unit will circulate a monthly list of accessions to all CP Members.

General

Letters to Government Officials at Ministerial level will be signed by the Director.

The Group Chief will sign letters to UNDP Resident Representatives.

This is to confirm operational follow-up resulting from discussions recently held with Mr. D. ffrench-Mullen in Rome on 14-15 May:

ALGERIA

Rainfed Agriculture - CP's participation in the WFP mission currently in the field is geared towards preliminary identification of a rainfed agriculture development project. Subject to the findings of this mission, Bank's interest and staff availability, a full identification mission might be mounted around October 1973.

EGYPT

Soil Amelioration Project - The IBRD Nile Delta Supervision Mission planned for mid-July will endeavour to obtain Government's reaction to the Soil Amelioration Project. CP will take no follow-up action pending advice from the Bank.

ICELAND

Fisheries - At IBRD's request we are arranging for Mr. W. Guckian to participate in the appraisal mission. He would be available from 15 June for five weeks.

IRAQ

Livestock - As the Government is still evolving its strategy for livestock development, a CP mission is premature at this stage. CP will raise possibility again with the Bank later this year in light of CP staff availability, Government's position and also role of livestock development in the Ranya and Sharazoor projects in Northern Iraq to be prepared by consultants.

JORDAN

Irrigation and Rural Development, Jordan Valley - In view of expected delays in completing CP report and the unlikelihood of Bank appraisal before September, it was agreed that CP would forward the preparation report by end June instead of end May, as earlier indicated. CP will also make Mr. Casati available for one week during appraisal.

MOROCCO

Souss Project - CP is assisting Government in preparation of this project and a mission is in the field. The mission's TOR cover the technical points raised with the Government by the previous IBRD mission.

Meknes Region Integrated Agricultural Development Project - Final preparation is scheduled for May and the report should be available by end July.

Livestock Development - Morocco has requested a project and CP is to undertake a desk study based upon consultants' reports to define the scope of a possible project. Thereupon an identification mission would be mounted around September, depending upon Bank's interest and CP staff availability.

OMAN

Technical Assistance - The FAO mission report is ready except for the volume on groundwater. CP will forward two copies to IBRD as soon as the full report becomes available. CP will also try to arrange for Mr. E. Greenshields of FAO Development Department, who led the FAO mission, to participate in the technical assistance mission planned by IBRD towards end July. If Mr. Greenshields is not available, CP will be unable to participate.

P.D.R.Y.

Wadi Hadramaut - CP intends to review proposals before mounting the mission. For this purpose, it will be necessary for CP to have the Dar-el-Handasah report and any other information available in IBRD. Staff constraints make it unlikely to mount a mission before November/December 1973. It is understood that the object of the CP mission would be to establish TOR for a feasibility study to be carried out by consultants financed under the Fisheries Project.

SYRIA

Livestock - The Balikh appraisal mission will cover also livestock development aspects, and it may be advisable to have their preliminary findings before CP makes definite proposals for a reconnaissance mission. In any case, should CP staff availabilities allow undertaking a mission in the autumn, CP will check with IBRD again before mounting the mission.

Lower Euphrates Drainage - Follow-up will depend on findings of the current mission in the field. Should consultants be required, this may entail including their cost as a piggy-back operation with Balikh, assuming appraisal of the latter is favourable.

TUNISIA

Central Tunisia - CP's supervision mission of Government's preparation is scheduled for end June and will take into account IBRD's comments on the CP report.

Basse Medjerda - Due to flooding, CP preparation mission has been delayed and is now tentatively planned around mid-June.

TURKEY

Rural Development, Anatolia - The Bank mission of Messrs. Hussain and Niaz will be postponed to mid-July as recommended by CP. Mr. Bishop will be made available to join the July mission.

YEMEN ARAB REPUBLIC

UNDP - We have requested Mr. Abu Sharr to undertake preparatory assistance in relation to formulation of a UNDP project for support to the Ministry of Agriculture. Mr. Altaf Hussain will join him around 25 May and will be responsible for administrative, personnel, financial and economic aspects of such support whereas Mr. Abu Sharr will be responsible for technical aspects, particularly research and extension. Mr. Abu Sharr's report incorporating Mr. Hussain's contribution will be forwarded to IBRD by end June.

Midlands/Highlands - The additional workload involved in the preparatory assistance for the UNDP project formulation above will entail a delay in preparation of the Midlands/Highlands projects. By end June a summary BTO will be forwarded to IBRD. By 25 August, projectproposals, as envisaged by CP at that stage, will be forwarded for IBRD comments prior to preparation.

Dear Noel,

You imight recall that in October 1970 about the time of the initiation of the International Scheme for Coordination of Dairy Development, we wrote to you briefly outlining the proposed activities to be carried out through this scheme and the opportunities for investment in dairy production which might arise.

Since that time the scheme has sent missions to Sri Lanka, Bolivia, Malawi, Pakistan and Indonesia. Already pledges of assistance from donor countries have been offered as a consequence of the findings of these missions.

You will remember also that in September of last year an attempt was made to have a Cooperative Programme livestock specialist assist the ISCDD mission while in Indonesia. Due to inability to coordinate mission dates, no such assistance was finally given. We have, however, assisted the Animal Production and Health Division by providing information for use in the preparation of desk studies prior to ISCDD identification missions. The steering committee of the ISCDD is anxious that the level of cooperative Programme members on ISCDD missions. They realize however, that such cooperation would not be possible unless circumstances permitted that a CP or IBRD mission should be visiting the same country at the same time and for a closely related purpose. Even then assistance rather than participation would better describe the level of cooperation possible.

Dear Jan:

I am sorry that we have taken so long to reply to your letter reference BK/1/10 of April 11 about the introduction of automatic type-writers for use in the work of the Cooperative Program. We are, of course, very much in favor of speeding up and improving the reproduction of reports and we are also in favor of saving both secretarial and professional time which you indicate would follow from installing the automatic typewriters.

As you point out, the financing arrangements between FAO and IBRD do not provide for IBRD sharing the cost for administrative overheads such as new automatic typewriters. However, in the light of the savings which should follow and the improvement to the efficiency of the CP I think your request, that we consider sharing the cost for the first year, is a reasonable one. I had hoped that we could handle this by a simple administrative arrangement but because these charges are not specifically covered in our Memorandum of Understanding, I find that we would have to cover such a charge by what would be, in effect, an amendment to the Memorandum of Understanding. On checking with our Controller's Department, our Internal Auditor and our Legal Department I find that there may be some reluctance to agree to such an amendment of the Memorandum, and I wonder whether you would wish us to pursue this further. The type of amendment could be handled by an exchange of letters signed by the persons in FAO and the Bank authorized to enter into such agreements. This could be done and I would be prepared to pursue this further if you felt that we should do so. While I think that we would probably get agreement within the Bank to share this charge with you, I could not guarantee it without taking the matter right through to the exchange of letters stage signed by the properly authorized people in our two institutions.

Thank you very much for your letter of March 23, 1973, reference BK 3/2/6/ PERU, and the attachments which I found on my desk after arriving from a USAID/IBRD education sector assessment mission in Jamaica. I will review your curriculum proposals for Home Economics and Agriculture of the Peru ESEPs and should I have any comments on these, I will communicate with you again.

The materials you sent me in December were very useful for finalizing the "yellow cover report" which is now under discussion in the Bank. Due to some unresolved policy issues (the university involvement in the reform, the size of the project, the nature of the curriculum), no copies of such a report are being distributed outside the Bank. On the basis of a couple of decisions concerning the size of the project that will probably be taken this week, we will review the present "yellow cover report" and send you a copy of the reviewed version for your comments before the "green cover" is produced.

Although I do not want to pile up your desk with all the memos we have produced in our internal discussion of the Peru education project, I am sending you a copy of my memo to Mr. Bruce M. Cheek of March 28, 1973. I should mention the fact that Messrs. Jallade and Vergara were very helpful in the overall discussion and analysis that went into the aforementioned memo. We have received some feedback on the proposed alternatives. Messrs. Lari and Schloss favor what was proposed in the "yellow cover"; Mr. Calika seems to favor alternative No. 2; and Mr. Ballantine, of course, maintains his original position which is more or less what you saw during the discussions of the Issues Paper.

I would appreciate receiving your comments on the attached memo if you could spare some time after your mission to Zaire.

Forest Industries Projects

This is in reply to your letter No. 00047 of March 1.

Central America

The Bank's Industrial Projects Department has undertaken to review the status of projects and the prospects for the future in a number of industries in Central America. The pulp and paper industries are high on this list. We would like to accept the offer for the assignment of Mr. Easton for this work. It is now planned to make a field survey of pulp and paper during the month of May. Mr. Antonio Tarnawiecki will join Mr. Easton for the visits to each of the countries. It is expected that the visit could begin during the first week of May and Mr. Easton could either join Mr. Tarnawiecki in Central America or could come to Washington on his way there. Either course of action is agreeable to us. In any case, we will cable the exact date that the visits are to commence. For several reasons it is desirable that the visit begin at the Central American Bank for Economic Integration (CABEI) because our Latin American Region wants to concentrate much of the Bank activity in cooperation with this institution. They would then go on to visit each of the countries in turn.

Indonesia

A great deal has been occurring in Indonesia, notably the seminar in Djakarta which was attended by Mr. Tarnawiecki and Mr. Rowe. Our Industrial Projects Department are particularly gratified that you have proposed that approximately US\$1 million of UNDP funds be earmarked for industrial feasibility studies with special reference to the wood products complex on Kalimantan. We are glad to accept your suggestion that Mr. Swiderski visit Washington following his trip to Indonesia. It would also seem appropriate to have Mr. Zurbrugg review the status of forestry with Mr. Rowe. However, this is subject to Mr. Rowe's other commitments and we shall have to review later the timing of the visit.

Brazil

For various reasons the Latin American Region has decided not to request further work on pulp and paper projects in Brazil. Thus this project is, at least for the time being, dormant.

Peru

Proposed work in Peru is, according to our request, not to be carried out until about mid-1973. The Latin American Region is now reviewing the economic situation in the country and will reach some decision as to scope and extent of activities within the month. Since we have several months before any projected work can be started, we will confirm at a later date the exact timing and extent of the work to be undertaken. The proposal for Messrs. McFarlane and Gunkle to undertake this work in the early fall will be confirmed if the Latin American Region decides to proceed in these industrial sectors.

East Africa

Work in this area is some months off and it has not yet been decided which country might receive initial attention, though it may be Tanzania. The proposal to make Mr. Spears and possibly Mr. R. Meyer available is very much appreciated. We will confirm the exact assignment and the timing of it in a few months.

Other Projects

Your proposals regarding Thailand, Korea, Madagascar, Burma and India refer to activities handled by the Agriculture Departments in the Regions concerned and we shall be replying to your proposals separately in each case as it arises. I will ask that you take particular care in all these cases to let us have terms of reference for our clearance before missions are sent from Rome. In the case of India, for instance, you mention you are planning a mission to review other pulp and paper projects of possible Bank interest. We have recently written to you about the Uttar Pradesh project and would not wish you to take any new initiatives with other projects without our first confirming that the Bank is agreeable.

Malawi: UNDP

An interim meeting with the consultants for the Vipya project is scheduled in Helsinki on March 26 and 27. Peter Vakomies has agreed to attend this meeting. The final review meeting is scheduled for the last week in April, but the exact timing and location still has not been confirmed. We note that Messrs. Vakomies and Spears will be available for the final review meeting.

Ecuador: UNDP

The consultant short list has been approved by the Bank Selection Committee and the Government of Ecuador. This list includes the following:

(1) Centre Technique Forestier Tropical (France)

(2) Jaakko Poyry and Co. (Finland)

(3) Reid Collins and Associates Ltd. (Canada) in association with H.A. Simons Limited (Canada)

(4) The Tuolumne Corporation (U.S.)

(5) Wescan International Forestry Services Ltd. (Canada)

We would appreciate the assistance of the CP in reviewing the consultants' proposals which we anticipate receiving at the end of April. The interim review of the consultants' findings and the selection of alternatives should take place in August/September in Ecuador and we would welcome the presence of Messrs. McFarlane and Spears in these discussions. The exact schedule of course will only be worked out after a particular consulting firm has been selected.

Pulp and Paper Sub-Sector Study

Because of the press of other projects Mr. Ragetly has not had much time to devote to the pulp and paper subsector study but we are expecting to complete this work in the very near future.

FAO Study of Market Prospects for Short-Fibered Pulp

On your proposal to finance some study of market prospects for short-fibered pulp from CP funds we do not regard this as an appropriate charge against the CP budget and would not wish it to go ahead on that basis. The study should not treat short-fibered pulp as a single market but should consider, within that market, variations apparent in the prices of the different type of short-fibered pulp. It appears that such a study may be part of FAO's overall objective of evaluating and quantifying paper supply and demand. Like other commodity studies it would have a wider interest than any special project is particular of the Bank and is thus not the sort of activity that the budget of the CP should be financing.

Assistance from FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme to the Industrial Projects Department: Comments on Mr. J.P. Huyser's letter No. 00047 of March 1, 1973.

Mr. Huyser's detailed and explicit response to our request for assistance on pulp and paper projects is very much appreciated. Our own response to his letter has been delayed because some of the country plans have changed, but we would now like to set forth the status of each of the requests that we made and that are documented in his letter.

Central America

The Industrial Projects Department has undertaken to review the status of projects and the prospects for the future in a number of industries in Central America. The pulp and paper industries are high on this list. We would like to accept the offer for the assignment of Mr. Easton for this work. It is now planned to make a field survey of pulp and paper during the month of May. Mr. Antonio Tarnawiecki of this department will join Mr. Easton for the visits to each of the countries. It seems obvious from Mr. uyser's description that the assistance of Mr. Easton will greatly facilitate the completion of this evaluation since he has been working on several of the projects that we probably want to review. It is expected that the visit could begin during the first week of May and Mr. Easton could either join Mr. Tarnawiecki in Central America or could come to Washington on his way there. Either course of action is agreeable to us. In any case we will cable the exact date that the visits are to commence. For several reasons it is desirable that the visit begin at the Central American Bank for Economic Integration (CABEI) because the Latin American Region wants to concentrate much of the Bank activity in cooperation with this institution. They would then go on to visit each of the countries in turn.

Indonesia

A great deal has been occurring in Indonesia, notably the seminar in Djakarta which was attended by Mr. Tarnawiecki and Mr. Rowe. We are particularly gratified that Mr. Huyser is proposing to earmark approximately \$1 million for industrial feasibility studies with special reference to the wood products complex on Kalimantan. McFarlane and Gunkke to undertake this work in the early fall will be confirmed if the Latin American Region decides to proceed in these industrial sectors.

Bast Africa

Work in this area is some months off and it has not yet been decided which country might receive initial attention, though it may be Tanzania. The proposal to make Mr. Spears and possibly Mr. R. Meyer available is very much appreciated. We will confirm the exact assignment and the timing of it in a very few months.

Other Matters

We also appreciated the information provided on the work that the Cooperative Program has undertaken in other countries and we may want to avail ourselves of the opportunity to review some of this work at a later time. In fact, although some of the specific country requests may be cancelled (as seems likely in Brazil), we would like very much to maintain the aggregate level of the programmed help for Industrial Projects at about the 60 manweeks per year that has now been agreed to. We recently cabled a request for assistance on a mission to the Philippines and we hope that Mr. Ewing will be available. Consequently, this request might be considered as a substitute for Brazil. Other cases may arise where work now programmed for one country may have to be substituted for work in another. We know this may cause some difficulty since experts on one country may not easily transfer to another country. We will do everything we can to minimize the dislocations because of such changes in programs and we will keep Mr. Huyser fully informed of any change.

Because of the press of other projects Mr. Ragetly has not had much time to devote to the pulp and paper subsector study but we are expecting to complete this work in the very near future.

You will remember that we discussed late last year the possible budget level of the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme for the biennium 1974-75. I am writing to confirm that I am proposing an increase of \$1 million in order to provide for a minimum expansion in consultants, staff and travel. To maintain the current programme at its present level a further addition, estimated at \$1.1 million, will be required to take account of adjustments made to the dollar/lira exchange rate between late 1971 and the recent lira float, and to allow for projected increases in the cost-of-living and wage indices. The total budget for the biennium would thus amount to \$9.1 million. On the FAO side, these proposals are subject to the approval of our Conference in November.

I trust that the proposed budget level is satisfactory to you, and I am also assuming continuation of the present financing arrangements under which FAO will contribute 25% of the budget and IBRD 75%.

On this occasion I would like to reiterate my strong support for the Programme, and my desire to see it play an increasing role in the activities of our two organizations. I believe that the expansion proposed for 1974-75, though modest, will go some way towards enabling the Programme to meet the demands that are being placed upon it. The general views of FAO on agricultural priorities, in particular on the importance of integrated rural development and of assistance to small farmers, are I believe fully shared by IBRD. The Cooperative Programme can therefore be a useful instrument for both organizations to achieve their common objectives.



Assistance from FAO/IRED Cooperative Programme (CP) to the Industrial Projects Department - Comments on Mr. J.P. Huyser's letter No. 000h7 of March 1, 1973

Below appear my comments on the sections of referenced letter which directly pertain to Division III or upon which I have any observations. These sections occur under the heading used in the letter of other projects of possible interest to the Industries Department. In the earlier section, I only query how the proposed FAO assistance in a review of pulp and paper projects in Brazil can be worked into the present apparent attitude of senior management of projects of this sort in Brazil.

1. Thailand

There appear to be several pulp projects in Thailand, one or more of which may be known to IFC and especially to Mr. Oberdorfer. The pulp projects listed look pretty small to be economic but I would not want to make any serious comment on this point. However, if it is intended that these projects at some point be thought of for Bank consideration, then it might be useful to have the opportunity for us to comment on the scheduled mission's Terms of Reference.

2. Korea

Here again, if the Cooperative Programs is planning to review a large "?" pulp and paper plantation program with the Bank in mind for eventual financial assistance, having a look at the scheduled mission's Terms of Reference might be halpful.

3. Madagascar

This appears to be purely a forestry proposition at this stage of the game.

h. Burma

The scheduled Burmese mission has a pulp and paper engineer with it, but it is not clear to me why, as the initial project is a logging project. My usual comment, however, applies, i.e., if they are embarking on studying pulp and paper projects for hypothetical Bank involvement, then we could usefully see the mission's Terms of Reference.

5. India

A memorandum on a Cooperative Programme study proposed dissolving pulp projects based on eucalyptus plantations (part of the project) was prepared by us on January 17, 1973. This memorandum was sent to Mr. Spall but rather informally the matter was discussed with the CP while Mr. Tarnawiecki was in Rome discussing the forthcoming CP's forest industry mission to Indonesia. In general, there is no indication that the proposed project has the Indian Covernment's support, nor that there is a market for the dissolving pulp output and there is no feasibility study of the pulp will as such. We have now received a letter of rebuttal from Mr. Huyser's group on the points raised by Mr. Tarnawiecki. We have never given more than slight informal assistance to Mr. Spall on this project and, as this project does not have the support of the Regional Program people we do not intend to go deeper into this matter. In any event we never intended Tarnawiecki's memo to go outside the Bank. The other letter about a separate CP mission to be sent to India later this year for review of other projects, which is referred to in Mr. Huyser's letter, has not been seen by us. I wonder who is instigating and guiding the CP with regard to its activities in the pulp and paper sector in India? From Mr. Kraske. I gather what has transpired so far has been rather embarassing to the Bank.

6. Malawi

An interim meeting with the consultants for the Vipya project is scheduled in Helsinki on March 26 and 27. Peter Vakomies has agreed to attend this meeting. The final review meeting is scheduled for the last week in April, but the exact timing and location still has not been confirmed. I am pleased that Messrs. Vakomies and Spears will be available for the final review meeting. It is not clear at this moment how the date of the meeting will be meshed into Peter Glenshaw's full schedule.

7. Ecuador

The understanding of Mr. Huyser with regard to the Ecuador Forestry project (Capayas) is correct. The consultant short list has been approved by the Bank Selection Committee and the Government of Ecuador. This list includes the following:

1. Centre Technique Forestier Tropical (France)

2. Jaakko Poyry and Co. (Finland)

3. Reid Collins and Associates Ltd. (Canada) in association with H.A. Simons Limited (Canada)

4. The Tuolumne Corporation (U.S.)

5. Wescan International Forestry Services Ltd. (Canada)

We would appreciate the assistance of the CP in reviewing the consultants proposals which we anticipate receiving at the end of April. The interim review of the consultants' findings and the selection of alternatives should take place in August/September in Ecuador and we would welcome the

presence of Messrs. McFarlane and Spears in these discussions. The exact schedule of course will only be worked out after a particular consulting firm has been selected.

Other Matters

On the subject of an FAO study of future world market prospects for short fibred pulp, such a study would be welcomed by us because of the number of pulp and paper projects before the Bank which concern short fibred pulp. The study in fact should not treat short fibred pulp as a single market, but should consider within that market the variations apparent in the prices of the different types of short fibred pulp. I believe, however, that such a study should be part of FAO's overall objective of evaluating and quantifying pulp and paper supply and demand and should not be linked to any special project or particular interest of the World Bank. This is true even though the need for such a study became particularly apparent at the time of the abortive Incel operation. I might mention in passing, at the time Mr. El Darwish was drawing up the Terms of Reference for the Industries Department's pulp and paper subsector study, I stressed that because the problems with Incel were already apparent, the sub-sector study should analyze the different markets and economics related to pulp and eventually paper produced from different wood species and different geological areas of supply. I still think this should be done if the pulp and paper sub-sector study is going to have operational value for this Department.



Assistance from FAO/IHRD Cooperative Programme (CP) to the Industrial Projects Department - Comments on Mr. J.P. Huyser's letter No. 00047 of March 1, 1973

1. Central America

FAO will assist IERD in a review of the timber industries in the Central American Common Market. This work will apparently be carried out by CPS (not Industrial Projects). This study should be tied to the proposed project identification and/or sector mission to Central America.

2. Indonesia

This country is discussed under a separate memorandum.

3. Brazil

The CP suggests that the draft of the pulp and paper annex to be produced on the Brazil Project Identification Mission could be reviewed by Mr. Raisanen of FAO's Forest Industries Divison. Apparently, Mr. McIvor has asked for FAO assistance to review a number of pulp and paper projects of possible Bank interest. Since this is at variance with the position paper produced on the project identification mission's issues paper, I think this point should be clarified before any more time is spent by the Bank and/or FAO staff on these potential projects.

4. Peru

The Bank has also asked for FAO assistance in possible pulp and paper projects in this country. The CP proposes to carry out desk reviews of existing material during September 1973. Results of Donald Brown's preliminary appraisal of the sugar-came bagasse based projects studied by the 1972 sector mission could be made available.

5. East Africa

The Bank has requested FAO participation in an industrial recommaissance mission. I have no comments on this.

6. Other Projects

The CP has already started or plans to work on a number of other forest projects involving the manufacture of pulp and paper. The CP seems to be under the impression these projects will be considered by the respective Project Departments of the various Regional Project (sic) Departments of the Bank. I think that prompt inclusion of the Industrial Projects Department for early comments on projects being identified would avoid wasting time and disappointing prospective project sponsors.

7. Thailand

Apparently there are several pulp projects in this country. A mission headed by Mr. McFarlane will travel to Thailand in October/November 1973. We should have the opportunity to comment on their Terms of Reference.

8. Korea

A CP mission will be sent this year to review a plantation project for a "large" (how large?) pulp and paper will. I have no comments.

9. India

A memorandum on a dissolving pulp project based on eucalyptus plantations was prepared on January 17, 1973. An answer from the CP had apparently been mailed by March 1, but it has not yet arrived in the Department. Another letter about a separate mission to be sent later this year to India to review other projects has also not yet reached the Department.

10. Malawi and Ecuador

We are keeping the CP informed of all the steps taken in these studies and are grateful to the CP for their cooperation.

11. Madagascar and Burma

The CP preparation missions to these countries seem to be mainly concerned with the forestry and logging aspects. We should, however, receive copies of these reports.

Assistance from FAO/Cooperative Programme to the Industrial Projects Department

We refer to your letter of 21 January. We have discussed the contents of this letter with the Forest Industries Division, Forest Resources Division and UNDP/FAO project staff and would like to make the following tentative proposals:

CENTRAL AMERICA

You requested FAO assistance in a review of the status of timber and wood products industries in five countries of the Central American Common Market. We could make available for this purpose Mr. Jack Easton, who is an industrial economist attached to the Forest Industries Division Prior to joining FAO in 1970 Mr. Easton had seven years with Sandwell and has a very wide experience of industrial feasibility study work.

During the latter half of 1972 he was involved in preparation of a CAFICA study which reviewed forest industrial projects in the Central The report on this project is still being finalized. American region. In the course of carrying out this work, Mr. Easton has made a fairly thorough review of the information available on the region. recently reviewed and revised FAO reports on the Honduras, Olancho pulp project and on a proposed UNDP forest industries project in Nicaragua both of which are relevant to your proposed Central American study. Mr. Easton could be made available from the beginning of May for a period of two months. If this is acceptable to you, we would like further details as to how you consider the work should be organized. The two obvious alternatives appear to be either to send the Bank's material to Rome for preliminary review by Mr. Easton, after which he could visit the Bank for discussion, or alternatively, you may wish him to carry out most of the study in Washington.

2. INDONESIA

As Mr. Tarnawiecki is already aware, Mr. Swiderski, who is Chief of FAO's Forest Industries Division Mechanical Wood Products Branch, has been nominated to join a forthcoming UNDP/FAO mission to Indonesia in March to review projects which are suitable for FAO assistance. Within the UNDP country programme a sum of up to US\$ 4 million could be available for preinvestment and other studies of the forestry sector. We have already had discussions with the key members of the proposed UNDP/FAO mission to ensure that they are fully aware of the findings of the recent Bank sector review chapter on the Indonesia forestry industries and we have also familiarized them with the outcome of the Seminar which was attended by Mr. Tarnawiecki and Mr. Rowe during which various projects of interest to the Government of Indonesia in the forestry sector were Within the framework of the US\$ 4 million available for UNDP activity we have proposed that approximately US\$ 1 million should be earmarked for industrial feasibility studies (with special reference to the wood products complex on Kalimantan mentioned in your letter of January 31). marketing studies, etc., of relevance to industrial and forestry projects of possible interest to the Bank.

We would propose that following Mr. Swiderski's mission he should visit Washington and discuss with you the formulation of terms of reference for specific projects in which the Bank might be interested, also a choice of consulting firm for implementation of these studies.

We would propose this visit takes place in about late April or early May. Mr. Swiderski would be able to remain in Washington for approximately 2-3 weeks to carry out this review.

In view of the fact that the viability of most of the forest industry projects under consideration in Indonesia depends on a thorough analysis of the forest inventory and logging cost aspects of the projects, we would propose that this aspect of the studies be reviewed by Mr. Zurbrugg, the forestry and tropical logging expert of the Cooperative Programme.

Mr. Zurbrugg could accompany Mr. Swiderski on his visit to Washington and could review with Mr. Rowe or whoever the Bank appoints for this purpose, the various forestry studies which will be required. As you know,

Mr. Zurbrugg has had 15 years of tropical logging experience of which eight were spent in South East Asia and he has a very clear understanding of the economic aspects of tropical logging operations.

3. BRAZIL

You requested FAO assistance in a review of a number of pulp and paper projects of possible Bank interest.

When Mr. Tarnawiecki visited Rome recently we discussed the possibility that we might be able to assist in adding more material to the first draft report which he and Mr. Carmignani prepared on pulp and paper projects in Brazil. We could make available for this Mr. Raisanen who is a member of FAO's Forest Industries Division and who is an experienced pulp and paper engineer. Mr. Raisanen worked for 10 years in Brazil and is well informed on the pulp and paper situation. In 1971 he carried out a review of projects of possible interest to Finnish investors and has also participated in reviews of specific projects both for FAO and the Government.

He will be assisted in carrying out this review by Mr. McFarlane, our Cooperative Programme pulp and paper engineer. Mr. McFarlane would be available for follow up work on the feasibility studies of individual projects in Brazil as necessary.

Since many of the proposed pulp and paper projects in Brazil depend on completion of forest plantation programmes, a review of projects in Brazil will have to include an assessment of the forest areas and of the plantation FAO has for the last two years had a UNDP programmes being proposed. forestry project operating in Brazil, some of the staff of which have been directly concerned with the evaluation of eucalyptus plantation projects. The project staff have been working in association with a German bilateral aid expert on an economic study which aims to concentrate plantations within an economic radius of suitable pulp mill studies. We suggest that the desk review work on projects of possible Bank interest which is carried out in Rome in March includes an analysis of the forestry situation. The UNDP forestry project operations officer, Mr. Hollis Murray, will assist in this We could also make available an experienced plantation forester from FAO to assist in follow-up work in the field on a later date if this proves necessary.

We propose that following a review by Messrs. Raisanen and McFarlane of Mr. Tarnawiecki's report in Rome, they visit Washington in late May to carry out a joint review with Bank staff of their findings and to assist in pre-appraisal of projects and in formulating terms of reference for feasibility studies of specific projects of possible Bank interest.

4. PERU

You requested FAO assistance in reviewing possible pulp and paper projects in Peru and in evaluation of prefeasibility studies being prepared.

Mr. McFarlane could assist in a desk review of material on Peru during September 1973 prior to a planned Thailand mission. We would also propose, subject to your agreement, that we engage as a consultant for the period of the desk study review in Rome, Mr. Gunkle who is a senior Sandwell employee who has worked for 10 years in Peru and has a good understanding of project possibilities. If you are agreeable with this suggestion, we would propose that any material you have on Peru is sent to Rome in mid-1973, that a review of project possibilities be carried out in Rome in September and that following that Messrs. McFarlane and Gunkle should pay a visit to Washington to report on their findings in early October. Mr. McFarlane would be available for approximately two weeks, following which he would

proceed to Thailand. Mr. Gunkle, subject to further negotiation with Sandwell, would be able to stay a further four weeks to complete a desk review in Washington and assist in follow-up studies as necessary.

5. EAST AFRICA

You have requested FAO participation in an industrial reconnaissance mission to evaluate prospects for wood products development and identify specific projects for further investigations. We could make available John Spears for this mission. He spent 12 years in Kenya working in the forest industries field and in the latter half of 1972 prepared the forestry and forest industries chapter for a Bank Agricultural Survey sector review report on Kenya. He is familiar with the main project possibilities in Tanzania and Uganda. We would propose that Mr. R. Meyer, who is the Chief of FAO/ECA Forest Industries Advisory Group for Africa in Addis Ababa, be brought in to assist in the review for a period of two weeks in Rome prior to the mission's departure to the field. He would also be able to join the mission in the field for approximately one week should this be necessary.

OTHER PROJECTS OF POSSIBLE INTEREST TO THE INDUSTRIES DEPARTMENT

In addition to the above we should mention that the Cooperative Programme has already started or plans work on a number of other forestry projects which involve a pulp and paper component. These are being identified or prepared for the respective Project Departments of the various Regional Project Departments of the Bank.

We should be grateful for your clarification as to whether we should send enough copies of the reports on these projects for circulation to both the Project Department of the Area concerned and the Industries Department.

The projects concerned are:

1. THAILAND

We have been asked by the Asia Region Project Department to carry out a forestry project identification mission to Thailand in the latter half of 1973. A preliminary review by Mr. McFarlane of FAO material already available, and in particular of the forestry chapter prepared by Ken King of the Thailand Sector Review Mission, indicates that there are several pulp project possibilities in Thailand which should be reviewed by the mission. They are as under:

- A 60,000 ton newsprint mill
- A 75,000 ton market pulp mill based on bamboo and bagasse
- A 45,000 ton kenaf pulp mill
- A 25,000 ton groundwood pulp mill
- A pulp or integrated pulp and paper mill based on pine resources in the North.

The mission will include a study of the possibility of establishing industrial plantations with particular reference to pulpwood requirements.

We are scheduling a mission to study these projects for October/November 1973 which will be led by Mr. McFarlane and assisted by Mr. Malenas who is stationed in Bangkok as Chief of FAO/Forest Industries Advisory Group for Asia and Far East.

2. KOREA

Arising partly out of a Bank Agricultural Sector Review mission in 1972, we have been requested to send a CP mission to Korea, sometime during 1973, to review possible forestry projects.

The Government is currently planning a large pulp and paper plantation programme and has requested FAO assistance in formulating this programme. We are planning a mission to review this project in mid-1973, consisting of a Forest Economist (Mr. S. Draper) and a pulp and paper engineer (probably Mr. Wood who is currently carrying out a similar assignment for FAO in India). This mission could result in the identification of pulp and paper projects of longer term Bank interest.

3. MADAGASCAR

We are currently finalizing a preparation report on the Madagascar pulpwood plantation project, and this should be ready for transmission to the Bank about mid-April. The project is the first five-year phase of a ten-year planting programme. The economic justification of the project would be the setting up of an export-oriented pulp industry in the early 1980s.

4. BURMA

A CP preparation mission is about to depart for Burma to carry out detailed preparation of a logging project of possible interest to the Asian Projects Department. Included in this mission's terms of reference are identification of forest industrial projects of possible Bank interest and formulation of the terms of reference for studies of these projects.

The mission will include both a sawmilling expert, Mr. Melhuish, and a pulp and paper engineer, Mr. McFarlane. Mr. Malenas is also expected to be in Burma at the time of the mission and will assist as needed.

5. INDIA

An FAO/CP team recently completed a loan request report to the Bank for financing of a pulpwood plantation project in Uttar Pradesh which would provide raw material for a dissolving pulp mill to be situated at Lalkua.

We had an opportunity to discuss the project with Tarnawiecki in Rome recently and have written under separate cover to the Bank outlining our proposals for the next phase of development of this project.

We are planning a mission to India in the latter half of 1973 to review other pulp and paper projects of possible Bank interest and have also written separately to the Bank about this planned mission.

In addition to the above projects we have also been working jointly with the Industries Department during 1972 in formulating terms of reference and reviewing the progress of two UNDP pulp and paper feasibility studies for which the Bank is acting as executing agency. They are:

1. MALAWI

A Bank/FAO/CP mission drafted terms of reference for a study of the Malawi Vipya Plateau project now being carried out by Jaakko Poyry and Co. Messrs. Vakomies, Spears and Meyer participated in an interim review of the consultants' findings in Malawi in January 1973. Peter Vakomies will be available for a further interim report of the consultants' findings in Helsinki around about the middle of March. Both Messrs. Vakomies and Spears will be available for a review of the final report in Helsinki in the latter part of April and we await your advice on the date of that mission.

2. ECUADOR

An FAO/CP mission drafted preliminary terms of reference for a feasibility study of forest industrial projects in the Esmeraldas region of North West Ecuador. As we understand the latest situation, the terms of reference for this have now been finalized in the Bank and proposals are being requested from consulting firms. We would be able to assist in a review of these consultants' proposals which we anticipate would be necessary in mid-April. We have programmed a short period in Rome for both McFarlane and Spears to carry out this review. We could also make Messrs. McFarlane and Spears available for an interim review of the consultants' findings in Ecuador in mid-1973, as originally allowed for in the proposed project terms of reference.

Finally we should mention two other CP ongoing activities in the pulp and paper field which may involve a manpower planning commitment. They are:

1. THE INDUSTRIES DEPARTMENT PULP AND PAPER SUB-SECTOR STUDY

During 1972 we assisted the Industries Department in preparing a first draft of a proposed pulp and paper sub-sector study. A copy of this was left with the Bank in December (with Mr. Ragetley). We understood that the Bank staff would be working on this study in the first half of 1973 and that later in the year you might wish further FAO assistance in a final review of this study.

We have programmed a one-month consultancy assignment by Mr. Ewing for this purpose. Mr. Ewing prepared and collated much of the material that went into the first draft report and worked in conjunction with other members of the CP and Forest Industries Department in carrying out the exercise. If further work by FAO is requested we could propose that Mr. Ewing spend two weeks in Rome in mid-1973, reviewing the final draft of the study with other relevant FAO staff followed by two weeks in Washington reviewing the final draft with Bank staff.

FAO STUDY OF FUTURE WORLD MARKET PROSPECTS FOR SHORT-FIBRED PULP

Arising out of the problems that we experienced in relation to the market prospects for the INCEL project in Yugoslavia you are aware that we have been working in close cooperation with the staff of the Forest Industries Division and Forest Resources Division of FAO in a study of future world market prospects for short-fibred pulp. The Forest Industries Division has organized a series of comparative tests of various short-fibred pulp raw material. Resources Bivision has been collecting data on the viability of eucalyptus The Cooperative Programme has been working with Sandwell in plantation wood. trying to determine more accurately the probable import requirements of shortfibred pulp in Western Europe until 1980. We had proposed last year that. subject to Bank expressing interest in this study, we would engage Mr. Harper from Sandwell as a consultant to further develop the material he has already submitted.

Clarification of the market prospects for short-fibred pulp is likely to be of critical importance to other pulp projects which the Bank is currently studying. We noted from Fuchs' letter to Dr. Bhattacharjee of 10 January that you would welcome further work by FAO in this field. We would propose that this two man-month consultancy be financed from CP resources since the Forest Industries Division has not been able to secure financing for this

Following is some background information for your visit to FAO.

Budget

Budgeted and actual expenditures of the Cooperative Program (CP) have been as follows:

The figure of US\$3.5 million for actual expenditures in Cal. 72 is the most recent estimate from FAO. Bank reimbursement of FAO is always some months behind FAO's expenditure so that I would expect the Bank's actual expenditures for FY73 to be lower than the Bank's share of budgeted expenditures. The Bank meets 75% of CP expenditures except in cases where CP staff are on Bank missions (e.g. appraisal, economic and sector missions) in which case the Bank pays 100% of travel and subsistence expenditures.

Mr. McNamara has already had some discussion with Dr. Boerma about the CP budget for biennium 1974/75. FAO are suggesting a budget of US\$8 million, an increase of US\$1 million for the bieanium, exclusive of what FAO call "mandatory" increases, that is, increases due to rises in cost of living or exchange rate changes. Allowing for these mandatory increases, it is likely that the total budget for biennium 1974/75 would be US\$9.5 to 10 million if the "real" increase of US\$1 million is accepted. I understand that while Mr. McNamara expressed sympathy with Dr. Boerma's proposal to raise the CP budget, he has said that he would not wish to agree until the CP had recruited up to their full authorized strength. (see below)

Staffing

The CP has an authorized professional staff of 70 positions under the present budget and an increase of US\$1 million would allow for 8 to 10 more positions for the biennium 1974/75. At present the professional strength is 61 (including 3 in Bank overseas missions - Edwards -

Pakistan, Ellinger and Quicke - PMEA), plus 4 semi-permanent consultants who may take up staff positions soon. Recruitment processes in FAO are very cumbersome and slow and although we have been told at various times during the past three years that CP would soon reach its full strength of 70 it never does so. There is provision in the current budget also for consultant services; it was intended to cover 18 man-years when agreed upon in 1971; but rising costs since then have reduced the man-year equivalent to 14 or 15.

Organization

Under the Director and Deputy Director there are two advisers (Bishop and de Brichambaut) and four "Area Chiefs", Brochu, Clark, Miss Eid and Reymans for Africa, Asia, Middle East and Latin America. These "Area Chiefs", however, have no line control over any staff. The rest of the staff is allocated to the various projects in the work program by mission leaders as the need arises, without any particular form of organization. In the past, the result has been a very loose control sometimes giving the impression that a staff member can more or less arrange his own comings or goings as he wishes. There are nominally functional groups - agriculturists, economists, educators, engineers, livestock, forestry, fishery, etc. but there is no effective line control over them. To divide the staff into five self-contained regional groups would hardly be practicable as it would greatly hamper flexibility of staff use; but an improvement in the organization is called for. The main characteristic of the present lack of organization has been the lack of control over the staff. It would at least be an improvement if there were a strong senior program coordinator and controller who would have the authority, under the Director, to schedule the staff's activities and to see that they carry out their work according to schedule. It might be still better to try two regional groups for a start, which would provide about 30 men in each - comparable with some of our regional agricultural divisions. A grouping into "Asia" and "everywhere else" might almost be workable and I believe Huyser has this in mind. It appears likely that the discussions we have had recently on the next year's work program, resulting in a full work program for the CP, may have the effect of tightening up the organization since it is now possible to schedule activities 12 months' ahead and all the staff should know what is expected of them. One aspect of this shows up in the education group within the CP. This group of four or five education specialists has tended to run itself without much regard to the rest of the Program and Huyser himself has said that he has never been very clear on what they do or should do. Huyser is now bringing the education group within the total work program and already seems to have it more under control than in the past.

Work Program

- During January and February we had discussions in the Bank with Huyser and his so-called "Area Chiefs" over the whole of their activities and at the same time the Bank regional offices submitted requests for CP services over the next 12 months. It became apparent early in our discussions that the total requests from the regions would exceed the CP's capacity and Huyser undertook to examine all the requests in Rome with his Advisers and Area Chiefs and to tell us what he felt he could and could not do. We now have a work program composed of some 70 agricultural projects for identification and preparation and the regional offices have been notified of the projects that the CP has accepted and those which it could not accept. In addition to the 70 agricultural projects the Program will be handling five projects for the Industries Projects Department and about 20 education projects, making a total of 95 projects.
- 6. Of the requests from the regional offices the CP has told us that it could not undertake about 12 agricultural projects during the coming year. Because its capacity is now almost completely scheduled with identification and preparation it cannot undertake, as in the past, to assist on Bank missions such as appraisals, economic and sector missions and occasional supervision. Thus, the CP will be concentrating on its main role of project identification and preparation. Huyser seems to be quite happy with this pattern of activities and it seems a sensible arrangement since CP staff are often at a disadvantage on Bank-led missions. They often do not wish to spend enough time in Washington in writing and discussing their reports and they are not available in the way Bank staff members are over the period that follows a mission during which a series of discussions and reviews proceeds in the Bank.
- 7. On the whole, the agricultural projects that the CP has not found possible to undertake have generally been projects that the regional offices either do not regard as an immediate priority or regard as suitable for consultants or Bank staff or Governments themselves to undertake, failing CP participation. We do not therefore have any outstanding conflicts at present with the Regions to be resolved in the Bank at a higher level. It could happen from time to time that conflicts might still emerge and if they cannot be resolved by discussions among the Regions and the FAO Coordinator we may have to submit them to Mr. Knapp; but for the present we have been able to resolve conflicts that have arisen without appeal to the Senior Vice-President.

Staff Exchanges

- It has been customary in the past to exchange one or two Bank staff with one or two CP staff for a period of two years or so. Tibor, a Bank irrigation engineer, has just completed about two years with the CP and has been transferred back to Asia Region. He had wished to join FAO but they have not been able to offer him a permanent position. Veraart has been acting as program coordinator for the past 18 months and he will be returning to the Bank in June this year to handle coordination at this end. A subject to be explored further is the possibility of continuing staff exchanges. Stevenin, an irrigation engineer in EMENA, wishes to go to Rome for personal family reasons and EMENA would release him if they received an acceptable replacement from the CP. So far it has not been possible to arrange this exchange.
- 9. A perennial subject for discussion is that of seconding CP staff to Washington without exchanging Bank staff. We have made little progress with this, partly because of the wish of FAO to exchange and of the difficulty of releasing Bank staff to Rome under the ruling conditions of work pressure in the Bank. There is also some reluctance of CP staff to move to Washington when they are firmly settled in Rome. However, I believe that a number of people in the Program would like to work in the Bank for a period and we should therefore continue to pursue the possibility of transferring CP staff to Washington since there is no question that they could be used much more effectively if they were stationed in Washington alongside Bank staff.

They comment that the most recent outlines they have seen do not seem to deal as fully with the training element as earlier documents did. The "Guidelines for the Preparation of Feasibility Studies: Agricultural Credit Projects" (October, 1972) does not seem to mention training anywhere.

Other similar documents with which it was compared - "Directives pour la Presentation des Etudes de Justification Relatives aux Projets d'Elevage" (March 71), "Guideline for the Preparation of Feasibility Studies for Irrigation and Drainage Projects" (Dec. 70), and "Outlines for Projects to be Presented for Financing" (Sept. 67) - deal with training more fully.

I am sure we all agree that training is the most important aspect of institution-building and one of the keys in many cases to achieving the full potential of a development project. Perhaps when the current "Outlines" are being looked at again in the CP for revision it would be useful if a draft training section could be sent to us for review and comment by the training advisers in our Central Projects Staff.

I am replying to your letter of January 30, in which you put to me two questions having to do with Bank, instead of FAO, execution of UNDP-financed forest industries projects.

First, you ask whether you have correctly interpreted the position of the Industrial Projects Department. I gather from Hans Fuchs that, when you and he met last January, it was agreed that the Bank would not seek, and would normally not accept, designation as Executing Agency for pre-investment studies in the forest industries field, on the ground that these are appropriately the province of FAO. This position, I am told, was reiterated at your recent meeting in George Kalmanoff's office. However, as was then explained to you and subsequently to Sergije Makiedo of the UNDP, on occasion the UNDP is asked to finance a feasibility study of a project on which the Bank has already done some work and as to which the government concerned has expressed a preference for the Bank as Executing Agency. These cases would be exceptions to the normal practice. As I think you will agree, when they do arise there may well be, prima facie, good reason for the Bank to act as Executing Agency, although each such case would still be considered on its merits.

You also say that you have been given to understand that there has been pressure, from outside the Industrial Projects Department, for the Bank to act as Executing Agency in the forest industries field and you ask where that pressure originates. To the extent

that it exists at all, it comes from the country concerned. On occasion, factors other than project considerations, for example, the existence of some problem between the government and FAO, may lead the government to express a preference for the Bank as Executing Agency.

I think you may be assured, however, that it is our position that FAO and the Cooperative Programme should normally act as Executing Agency for pre-investment projects in the forest industries field, with the Bank simply expressing special interest in these cases.

In line with your response (see attached), I think the only comment (not going into too much detail) that might be useful for future work in Rome would be along the following lines.

Those in the Bank concerned with the training element as a means of institution-building through our loans have noticed with some apprehension that the most recent document they have seen seems to have declined from the level of earlier documents in its handling of the training element. The "Guideline for the Preparation of Feasibility Studies: Agricultural Credit Projects" (Oct. 72) apparently does not mention training anywhere. The other three similar documents with which it was compared - "Directives pour la Presentation des Etudes de Justification Relatives aux Projets d'Elevage" (March 71), "Guideline for the Preparation of Feasibility Studies for Irrigation and Drainage Projects" (Dec. 70), and "Outlines for Projects to be Presented for Financing" (Sept. 67) - do mention training. They would be even happier if possible training were treated as at least a partial remedy for staff deficiencies in borrowing entities.

While reviewing the Minutes of discussions held in Washington, 17-22 January 1973 with EMENA, we noticed a few points of detail to which we would like to draw your attention:

1. ARAB REPUBLIC OF EGYPT - Soil Amelioration

During the discussions held in Washington, it became obvious that for the FAO/IBRD Cooperative Programme to submit a final report by the end of February would not be meaningful until agreement on the technical basis of the project and on its organizational aspects was reached with the Government and the Bank. It was agreed that CP would prepare economic comparisons of various combinations of soil improvement/drainage treatments, keeping the time horizon factor in view, and would put on paper the organizational proposals made by the Government for the project and any comments or counter-proposals CP could make. This would be ready for Mr. Ffrench-Mullen before his forthcoming visit to Egypt. The background agro-economic and technical material for the project has been put together but will not be processed or summarized for report-writing until the concept of the project is agreed upon.

2. ROMANIA - Inland Fisheries

A short technical note on the fisheries situation in Romania was handed over to you by Miss Eid for onforwarding during the Washington discussions.

3. IRELAND - Fisheries

CP already handed over a note on proposed fisheries development. We could up-date this note if required.

4. GREECE - Irrigation III

It will be up to IBRD to check on whether the TOR of the consultants of the Bank-financed project "Groundwater Development in Thessaly" include assistance in preparation of groundwater studies <u>outside Thessaly</u>. FAO/CP has never been given a copy of the contract and we have no means of checking on the matter in Rome. We understand that Mr. Peperzak discussed this question in Greece during appraisal of Irrigation II. This should be done prior to CP getting involved in follow-up of consultants studies now in course for groundwater development outside Thessaly which is being considered for inclusion in a future irrigation project to be submitted for IBRD financing.

5. CYPRUS - Paphos Irrigation

FAO/CP has made comments on the consultants' report which were already incorporated in their final draft. FAO Land & Water Division, as executing agency for the UNDP project, is now reviewing the draft final report and will forward comments to the consultants who have one month to process the report in its final form. It appears now that it would be more realistic to expect the final report by end of March instead of end of February as both FAO and the consultants are awaiting Government comments on some parts of the draft report.

As agreed at our January 23 meeting, following are our requests, in addition to ongoing work, which Mr. Huyser indicated he already knows about and would take into account. Dates are tentative and refer to calendar years. Essentially the same kind of professional qualification is required for each, since these are all sub-sector reviews cum project identification and prefeasibility analyses: namely, wood products expert broadly experienced in technology and economics of production and sale of mechanical wood products (i.e. sawn timber, plywood, parquet flooring, etc.) and in pulp and paper manufacture. Experience with appraisal of projects and/or enterprises in these products.

- 1) Nigeria. Review of present status of mechanical wood products industry and identification of products and geographic areas for new development. Review of status of pulp and paper study. Mr. E.A. To help the GOI formulate specific projects and steps for implementation for next plan period. Time: About eight weeks in Second and/or Third Quarter, 1973.
- 4) Brazil. To review a number of project proposals for pulp and paper production and to suggest others that might also be considered. To begin appraisal (or preappraisal) of these projects as necessary so that some priority among them can be established. Time: About eight weeks in Second and/or Third Quarter, 1973.
- 5) Peru. To assist in project review of pulp and paper projects and evaluation of prefeasibility studies being prepared. To recommend actions necessary prior to or during appraisal of the projects. Time: About eight weeks in Fourth Quarter, 1973.
- 6) East Africa. To participate in industrial reconnaissance mission to evaluate prospects for wood products development and to identify specific projects for fuller investigation. To recommend on policy measures needed and implementation plan for projects. Time: About eight weeks in Fourth Quarter, 1973 and/or First Quarter, 1974.

In addition, as Mr. Huyser mentioned, the Cooperative Program people generally like to follow up on and continue to be a ssociated with projects which are an outgrowth of their initial involvement. This is desirable and entirely acceptable to us; therefore, the Cooperative Program itself may wish to allocate time in addition to the above, say 20 per cent, for the purpose of follow-up.

The sum total of these requests is, thus, about 56 man-weeks through the first quarter of 1974.

Dear Dick:

Once again many thanks for the pleasant lunch you gave me which, in itself however was insufficient to make up for the bad news you gave me regarding your own personal plans. I shall certainly miss you in future.

Before you go, however, there is one point on which you can perhaps still give me some advice. The Industrial Department of the Bank is increasingly undertaking the executing responsibility for UNDP pre-investment studies for forest industries. In several of these cases they have come back to FAO through the CP to help draft terms of reference for the consultants to undertake the work and after that the supervision in the field. When I raised this question during my last visit in Kalmanoff's office, I was given to understand that the Industrial Department itself was not too happy with this situation and that they would agree to revert to the more normal procedure whereby FAO becomes executing agency for pre-investment projects, the Bank expressing special interest when required which will then be the sign for the CP to keep a watching brief over the implementation of the project including clearance of terms of reference for consulting firms, field supervision, etc. I was given to understand that the insistence for the Bank to be executing agency for these projects was coming from quarters other than Industrial Department in IBRD.

My question now is two-fold. In the first place, have I correctly interpreted the position of the Industrial Department and if so, from where does the pressure arise to make the Bank UNDP executing agency for forest industries projects?

Thank you for Mr. R.A. Bishop's Back-to-Office report of December 14, 1972 on the Central Anatolia Integrated Rural Development Project forwarded with Mr. Chatterjie's letter No. 00418 of December 18, 1972, reference BK3/2.4 TUR. We cabled you on January 5 stating that we would discuss with you our comments on Bishop's report when you visit Washington later this month. These are attached.

Our immediate reaction to the report is one of disappointment in that project preparation appears to be not as advanced as we expected and that the report will be delayed until the end of February. There also appear to be several outstanding issues which have not been cleared up by the mission, in particular project costs, organization and credit.

We appreciate the diverse nature of the project and that the state of preparation of project components would vary because of the various Turkish organizations involved. However, we had hoped that the special group set up in Turkey to prepare the project, with the frequent assistance of your organization, would have been further advanced than appears to have been the case. We are anxious to know whether the end of February is now a realistic date for completion of the project report bearing in mind the work remaining to be done by Government and listed in the Back-to-Office report and the fact that cost estimates by DSI, Topraksu et al have apparently not yet been prepared. Assuming that the report is completed at the end of February and submitted to the Government, at least a month would be needed for review by the organizations involved. The idea of a discussion with Government following its review is agreed and, staff time permitting, we would be represented at these discussions.

Dear Jan:

I understand that subsequent to our discussions in Rome, Noel McIvor has sent you the draft terms of reference of the livestock study team. You will see from these, firstly, that the study team intends to draw heavily on work already done by FAO and Iranian consultant teams. Secondly, that the Task Force will work with the Government in program implementation and the definition of the relevant policy framework to help reach the objectives for agricultural and rural development stated in the Fifth Plan with a view to defining Bankable projects. As you are well aware, the Bank and the Program have already prepared projects for rural development. This is not new. Nevertheless, the Bank regards this exercise in Iran as an opportunity to work closely with the Iranian Government on rural development in order to see whether it might evolve further, techniques for project preparation and appraisal in this area. As you will see the liwestock projects under consideration have this aspect in mind.

Our discussions and Jim Evan's letter of December 14 on the same subject have obviously crossed. I should like to emphasize once more that we would very much welcome an FAO/CP participation in the task force. As I explained in Rome, it remains to be seen how much project preparation work the team will be able to do itself. But it is obviously expected to point out the general direction in which preparatory work should proceed.

We are planning a substantial backstopping from our Agriculture Projects Division and I am very much hoping that it will be possible for the Cooperative Program to also give some priority to the follow-on activities. Their precise nature will only become known as the work of the task force unfolds. However, I believe we would be well advised if we were to set aside some resources for such work in the forthcoming program review.
