## III. QUALITATIVE EVALUATIONS

A) Poverty. The Republic of Chad is a very poor landlocked country in the very heart of Africa. Its people are peasant shifting cultivators in the south and nomads in the desert in the north. It has no known minerals of much economic significance. Transportation problems, internal as well as external, are significant.

## B) Performance

- (a) Chad's debt record is believed to be good but Very short.
- (b) The only export crop is cotton, the production of which has increased rapidly both before and since independence. Chad is gradually losing the benefit of price support on the French market and the country is faced with a particularly acute problem of adjustment to world market prices. Cattle breeding, the second most important potential of the country, is poorly organized and insufficiently developed and does not make a very substantial contribution to export earnings and government revenues. Successful efforts have been made to balance the current budget. However, Chad relies heavily on foreign assistance for investment financing. The natural environment is not favorable for rapid economic growth. On the whole, the government's economic and financial policies are reasonably good.
- C) <u>Creditworthiness</u>. Debt payments are very low but there is little margin left for any additional foreign debt in view of the country's poor economic prospects.

D) Recommendation. In view of the uncertainties in the country's economic growth, the period of adjustment it has to live through and the impressive number of development problems it has to cope with, Chad should be classified as a wholly IDA aid recipient.
