

The findings of the report and its recommendations as to the improvements which could be made in order to enhance the value and effect of the Co-operative Programme in the pursuit of development in our common Member States, now call for careful examination by the managements of our two Organizations.

I should therefore be very pleased to meet you in this connection at a suitable date.

With a view to preparing this meeting, I should like to suggest that Mr Jean Knapp, Deputy Director-General of Unesco, discuss with your senior staff, on my behalf, the issues and prospects which the Joint Review has raised. The periods during which Mr Knapp could travel to Washington for such talks, lasting approximately two days, would be either between 18 and 28 March or the last two weeks in April.

Dear Mr. M'Bow:

My colleagues and I have now reviewed the report of the Joint Review of the Unesco/World Bank Cooperative Program. We find it thorough and reasonable. The Unesco and Bank participants in the Task Force and Steering Committee should be commended for a difficult job well done.

The World Bank values its collaboration with Unesco over the past two decades. Since 1964 the Cooperative Program has provided important help to the educational development of our member countries and to the educational operations of our institution. In view of the changing needs of our member countries and the financial constraints they face, however, the Bank has become increasingly concerned about the efficient use of Cooperative Program resources and the quality of its services. I am sure you will agree with me that the Program needs to be adapted to the changing circumstances and strengthened to meet the present needs of our common developing member countries. The Joint Review gives us an opportunity to accomplish these changes.

I give below our reaction to the principal recommendations of the Review, namely, the role of the Cooperative Program, its organization and management, programming and budgeting, expanded areas of cooperation, and the Memorandum of Understanding.

We welcome the central recommendation of the Review, that the primary role of the Cooperative Program should be to provide advice and assistance to countries on the actions required to obtain World Bank financing for education projects. We believe that this sharper focus for the Program will enhance the effectiveness of its work. We also support the recommendation that the Cooperative Program emphasize assistance to the least developed member states. To underline the importance of this task, I suggest further that we set for ourselves the goal of directing at least 75 percent of all Program activities toward the least developed countries by the year ending in June 1989.

Noting that organizational arrangements have not kept pace with changes elsewhere, the Joint Review recommended a new internal management structure of the Education Financing Division "...designed to further improve the quality and efficiency of Cooperative Program services provided to member states." We view this recommendation as essential to the future success of the Program, and we assign utmost importance to its execution. We look forward to a full discussion of the steps Unesco intends to take regarding the organization and management of the Education Financing Division which our two organizations jointly finance.

We accept the recommendation that joint Bank/Unesco programming of Cooperative Program work, over a three-year rolling period, be substituted for unilateral programming by the Bank, which has been the practice in the past. The programming exercise which was conducted by our staffs in January of last year demonstrated the feasibility and usefulness of this approach. The continued practice of joint programming promises to make our cooperation more efficient. We propose that joint programming start in early 1985. One essential aspect of this new system, in our view, is the opportunity it will afford us to evaluate work and assess accountability for results during annual meetings. We would hope that this first joint review meeting will take place this September.

We also agree that there are a number of new areas in which cooperation could be introduced gradually for the benefit of our members and for the benefit of both institutions. However, we suggest that exploration of these possibilities be deferred until action is taken to strengthen the Program.

Finally, we should, I believe, make an early start on revising the 1964 Memorandum of Understanding also recommended by the Joint Review. I am prepared to name Bank staff to participate in the proposed joint working group, and I propose that we set a target of 18 months from now for completion of a new text for submission to our governing bodies for their approval. Early agreement on its terms would give evidence of the determination of our organizations to place the Cooperative Program on a new footing.

We would like to reaffirm our support for a strong Cooperative Program. At the same time, the financial difficulties and development needs of our members compel us to link the amount of our support for the Program with actions taken further to improve its quality and efficiency. We believe that effective implementation of the recommendations made in the Joint Review will help to bring this about.

I am designating Messrs. S. Shahid Husain, Vice President, Operations Policy, and Aklilu Habte, Director, Education and Training Department, to be in touch with appropriate Unesco officials and staff in regard to these and the several other recommendations of the Review. I have further asked Mr. Husain to inform you of our reaction to the report of the Joint Study of Technical Assistance as soon as we complete our internal review.

SUBJECT: Review of the Bank/Unesco Cooperative Program

- 1. I attach a letter for your signature to Mr. Amadou Mahtar M'Bow, Director General of Unesco. The letter conveys the reactions of Bank management to the recommendations that emerged from a joint staff Review of the Bank/Unesco Cooperative Program. The Review was completed last year.
- 2. The Bank signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Unesco to establish a Cooperative Program in 1964, shortly after the Bank's first entry into education lending. The original purpose of the Program was to give the Bank access to Unesco's professional expertise in education at a time when the Bank had little of its own. A separate Unit, the Education Financing Division (EFD), was set up with Unesco Secretariat to give assistance to member states and Bank missions. Under the original agreement between the two institutions, the functions of project identification, preparation, and impact evaluation were assigned primarily to Unesco; appraisal and supervision were allocated to the Bank. The Bank finances 75 percent of the direct costs of the Program, which amount to an allocation of \$2.5 million in our FY85 budget.
- 3. Developments over the last twenty years have made our original agreement with Unesco obsolete. The Bank has become increasingly involved in all stages of the education project cycle, particularly in sector work and policy advice. This development alarms some Unesco officials, who contend that Unesco is the only organization within the UN family with a mandate to give policy advice on education. Moreover, the Bank's experience gained through two decades of education lending and its much larger sector staff, which now outnumbers Cooperative Program staff by six to one, mean that the Bank is no longer heavily dependent on Unesco professional advice and assistance. The main issues, however, have been the uneven quality and high cost of services delivered under the Cooperative Program. These weaknesses can be traced directly to the organization and management of the Program. The organization of the EFD remains the same as in 1964, and there is evidence of weak management over the past several years.
- 4. Several attempts have been made to improve the Program. A major review was conducted in 1977, but Unesco never responded formally to the recommendations and no improvements resulted in structure or quality. The present Review was initiated in FY83, after two years of delay in agreeing

on terms of reference. The final report concludes that the Cooperative Program continues to provide a valuable service to our members, but recommends important changes in the role and scope of the Program, in the internal structure of the EFD, in programming and budgeting, and an amendment of the Memorandum of Understanding. These recommendations were discussed and approved by the Operational Vice Presidents on January 9, 1985. The only recommendation not accepted was to divorce Unesco budget resources from our regional education budgets. It was felt such a move could erode cost control and might lead to outright grant financing. The consensus of operational management was that the Bank should focus its attention on the organization and management issues and link the level of our future support for the Program to improvements in the quality and efficiency of its services.

As you know, Unesco is under pressure from its Western membership to make fundamental changes in its policy orientation and use of resources. At the moment, it is difficult to gauge the chances of achieving better management of the Program. The process of amending the Memorandum of Understanding, in particular, could become lengthy and time-consuming. I plan to follow up the letter proposed for your signature with direct discussions with Unesco officials in Paris. I plan to convey two messages in these meetings: (i) that the Bank intends to give increasing emphasis to dialogue and advice with our members in education as in other sectors, and (ii) that the Bank would need to reconsider the level of its involvement in the Cooperative Program if more effective management of EFD is not achieved in the next two years.

It was a great pleasure to meet you in March. Thank you again for making the time available.

Recently it was informally indicated to us that the World Bank is going to reduce its budget for the Unesco/World Bank Co-operative Programme, the implementation of which is one of the main tasks of our Division. Dear Mr. M'Bow:

After receiving your further letter on the Cooperative Program, I asked Mr. Ernest Stern, our Senior Vice President, Operations, to call on you during his recent visit to Paris, since the cooperative programs are part of the operational work program and budget. I do agree that it is not very satisfactory or easy to deal by correspondence with the complex and sensitive issues raised by the regrettable necessity imposed on the Bank of reducing CP budgets. That is why Mr. Warren Baum, Vice President, Operations Policy, tried to meet with you last May when he was in Paris. Mr. Stern was disappointed to find that you were not in Paris but, as you will have learned, he had an opportunity to meet with Mr. Tanguiane and they were able to discuss the matter thoroughly.

We regret, of course, that we have to reduce our contributions to the cooperative programs. But, as you know, the World Bank lending program has had to be reduced below previously planned levels as a result, primarily, of a substantial shortfall in IDA resources. And finally, we have had to help meet the urgent requirements of our members in reducing their dependence on imported energy and in adjusting their economies to the changed economic circumstances of the 1980s. This has

meant that energy lending and non-project lending have risen to 35% of the total, compared with an average of 23% for the period FY77-81. Inevitably the shares of other sectors declined.

The result of these factors has led to changes in the composition of our operational staff and its size. It is not possible to accommodate these shifts without also affecting the cooperative programs. As I said in my earlier letter, all the cooperative programs have been cut, some more severely than others; the program with Unesco is neither the most nor the least adversely affected. In addition to the reduction of loanable funds below planned levels we have had to absorb programs for new borrowers, some very substantial, without additional resources. This has meant a reduction in planned programs for established borrowers. These reductions, in turn, have caused a re-examination of priorities by our borrowers.

Of course we recognize that any reduction in the work programs must have unwelcome consequences for staffing of the cooperative programs. However, in the case of Unesco, we felt that these were to some extent offset by the fact that, coincidentally, the number of positions by which the size of the Educational Financing Division would have to be reduced -- five -- corresponds to the number of positions which have been unfilled for many months.

We would like to be able to agree to your suggestion that the staffing of the Division be kept at its present level until the review of the Cooperative Program has been completed, thus enabling any or all of the existing vacancies to be filled. But as Mr. Stern said to Mr. Tanguiane, that would not be practicable. As you know, the review has not yet been launched. Unesco's revision of the draft terms of reference which the Bank submitted at the end of February was received here on August 2. We have not yet been able to review it carefully. A quick reading makes plain that there are several significant new aspects which we shall need to consider and react to. While we expect to do so promptly, it will no doubt take some time before the work can actually be started, and perhaps 5-6 months will be required to complete it. Moreover, when the technical review is completed both of us, and our senior colleagues, will need to take some time to consider the conclusions and agree on future courses of action. The budgetary savings contemplated for our FY83, which

began on July 1, are essential, and the longer reductions are delayed, the larger the cuts will have to be. We therefore cannot agree to an increase in staff beyond a total of 24 for the present.

I am sorry that before you and I have had the opportunity to become acquainted we have had to correspond in so negative a vein, and that financial realities prevent the Bank's being as accommodating as it would wish. We certainly share your conviction that human resource development is the foundation of economic and social progress and requires increasing efforts and the highest priority. We hope not only that the review will place the Program on a sound and satisfactory footing, and that the close collaboration between our institutions will become even more productive, but also that the difficulties we currently face will be temporary.

Dear Mr Clausen,

Thank you for your letter of 7 June 1982, concerning the Unesco/World Bank Co-operative Programme. I am pleased to note that we have similar views about the need for a careful review of this programme in present circumstances. I naturally appreciate the difficulties stemming from the reducation of IDA funds.

You will nevertheless allow me to come back to the question of your planned reduction in the Co-operative Programme budget for FY83. The Bank's decision in such an important matter as staffing would affect the very nature of the activities carried out under the Co-operative Programme, and it should therefore be the subject of mutual consultation in keeping with the spirit and the letter of the Memorandum of Understanding between our two Organizations. Any unilateral decision on this matter would be contrary to the Memorandum which stipulates clearly in its paragraph 3: "Unesco and the Bank will agree from time to time on the appropriate size of the Educational Financing Division and on the types and classifications of positions to be included within the Division". You will therefore understand, I am sure, that it would be difficult for me to accept such a decision and I would welcome an early opportunity for a full discussion of this matter.

I trust that you will understand my insistence that the present level of co-operation between our two Organizations be maintained until we have reviewed the programme. I take note of your indication to the effect that the educational staff in the World Bank has not been increased.

The Educational Financing Division is transmitting to your Education Department Unesco's proposals as regards the terms of reference for the review. I consider this review to be important to both our Organizations, as well as to the Countries we serve. After eighteen years of close collaboration, I am confident that the outcome of the review cannot but strengthen our co-operation with a view to meeting the pressing educational needs of so many of our Member States.



Dear Mr. M'Bow:

Thank you for your letter about the Cooperative Program, written in response to mine.

I think we must make a distinction between the nature of the activities carried out by the Cooperative Program and the volume of work to be done. I entirely agree that any proposed development or change in the Program should be carefully considered and thoroughly discussed by Unesco and the Bank, together, before decisions are taken. That would be done through the review which our organizations last year agreed to undertake, and for which proposed terms of reference and a suggested timetable were submitted to Unesco at the end of February '82. We hope to have Unesco's reaction soon, so that the review can be launched.

As for the volume of work under the Program, we very much regret the circumstances, primarily the cutback in IDA funding, which have led to a reduction in the number of staff years of Cooperative Program support foreseen to be required during FT83, as the Director of our Education Department has informed Mr. Kobayashi. These circumstances have had similar consequences for the other CPs. all of which are being reduced. Staffing for the CP is of course a reflection of the work program. The lower level of support implies fewer CP staff than were authorized in the light of earlier work level requirements or expectations. Fortunately, since five of these positions have been vacant and for some months, there is no question of actual reduction of staff in charge of implementation of the CP. The Bank has not, by the way, increased its own education staff. have been some shifts as a result of organizational changes in other parts of the Bank, but that is all. Overall, the staff in the operations complex is being reduced.

It is too bad that it did not prove feasible for you and Mr. Baum, the Bank's Vice President, Operations Policy, to meet last month. He would have sought to reassure you, as I do now, of our wish, within the constraints to which I have alluded, to continue our useful collaboration in the interests of our common members.

I too look forward to an occasion for the two of us to meet.

Dear Mr. Clausen,

Thank you for your letter of 30 April 1982 concerning the Unesco/World Bank Co-operative Programme. I consider that the co-operation between Unesco and the World Bank has been fruitful during the past eighteen years and has certainly benefited Member States. The distinctive character of the Co-operative Programme is that it is based on the principle of equal partnership. This, in my view, and I hope very much in yours too, implies that any new development or change in the Co-operative Programme should be very carefully discussed by both parties before any decision is taken, and certainly no decision can be taken by one party without the agreement of the other.

In considering any changes, I think that due attention should be given to past experience and to the respective competence of both Organizations and, most important of all, to the interests of the Member States that we are called upon to serve. In this connection it seems to be essential that the appropriate balance between staff resources in our two Organizations involved in the implementation of the Co-operative Programme should be ensured, bearing in mind that, within the United Nations system, Unesco is the competent Agency which has the constitutional responsibility for the field of education. It would seem to me difficult to justify reduction of the Unesco staff in charge of the implementation of the Co-operative Programme, while the Bank's staff dealing with education remains of the same size or even increases.

Taking into account the evolution observed in Member States, in particular in their needs and also their increased capacity in the field of education, I have agreed to a joint review being undertaken of the Unesco/World Bank Co-operative Programme. On the basis of the discussions between the competent services of our two Organizations, the terms of reference and a calendar of the review will shortly be drawn up. I think that only when this review is completed can the question of the staffing of the Educational Financing Division be examined. In this connection I wish to

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

Dear Mr. M'Bow:

I am pleased to know of the valuable cooperative relationship our agencies have had for more than a decade. The Bank/UNESCO Cooperative Program has been a useful vehicle for enabling its parent agencies to work together in helping define countries' education priorities and helping design projects responsive to them.

As you know, our IDA funds in Fiscal Year 1983 will be less than previously anticipated and our administrative budget will be tighter than in prior years. Within the Bank, as you may also know, we have been reviewing our procedures, practices and internal budgets, as well as all the cooperative programs, with a view to achieving greater efficiency. Concurrently, I understand that our Education Department and your Educational Financing Division have been considering a special joint review of the role of The World Bank/UNESCO Cooperative Program in view of current priorities and funding realities, with vacant positions in the program likely to remain unfilled until the uncertainties have been resolved. We doubtless will have to make some difficult choices in the next few months but I wish to assure you that they reflect no diminution whatever in the importance we in the Bank attach to education as a sector vital to economic development.

I hope we shall meet in person some time in the future to discuss these and other concerns of mutual interest. Meanwhile, I am pleased to learn that you and Warren Baum, Vice President, Operations Policy, will meet on May 27 to discuss these and related matters. Both our organizations have a clear interest in continuing the Cooperative Program as an efficient and effective means of collaboration in our efforts to help our client countries develop their education sectors.

Dear Mr. Clausen,

Experience over the last few years has clearly shown that the cultural values of communities and individuals must be carefully considered in formulating and implementing development programmes and projects. Preservation and promotion of cultural identity and the need to give an authentic cultural dimension to the development process are thus ideas which are being promoted vigorously in a great many different places.

It is for these reasons that the Administrative Council of the International Fund for the Promotion of Culture, over which I have the honour to preside, and the Centre for European and Intercontinental Cultural Cooperation of the European Cultural Foundation, which has entrusted me with the coordination of its programme of activities, wish to organize an INTERNATIONAL SEMINAR ON THE FINANCING OF CULTURE in Madrid, Spain, from 22 to 24 March 1982.

This seminar will examine the relationships which exist between culture and development, and identify methods and mechanisms which could be used at the international, regional and sub-regional level to ensure more adequate multilateral financing for the promotion of cultural values and the establishment of a real dialogue of cultures in the contemporary world.

Participants could examine, among other things, the following activities: the setting-up or strengthening of institutions, structures and mechanisms to assist cultural action and artistic creation; the training of technicians and specialists; the improvement of production and distribution of cultural goods and services; the organization of exchanges and encounters; and theoretical and practical research on cultural development.

The seminar will bring together representatives and observers from multilateral institutions providing aid for development in Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, Asia, the Arab countries and Europe. It is also directly related to the preparatory work of the Second World Conference on Cultural Policies which is being organized by Unesco and scheduled to take place in July 1982, an event whose importance needs no underlining.

I am convinced that the wide exchange of viewpoints and experiences which will result from the seminar - the first of its kind at the multilateral and interregional level - will enable us to add to our knowledge of various problems and to identify measures and criteria which will help all of us to respond to the real "cultural challenge" arising from the evolution of contemporary societies.

I should be pleased to learn if your Institution would be interested in participating in the seminar in question. In the event of a positive reply, I will send you full details regarding the organization of this event.

I hope that we may count upon having the privilege of the participation of your Institution.
