Dear Mr. Chatenay,

Thank you for your letter of 10 January 1977 with regard to the possible extension of the World Bank's Landsat Index Atlas.

There is no doubt that the data that will be sensed and transmitted by the Landsat C will be of great interest to both developing and developed countries. Therefore, your suggestion of an eventual world-wide geographical coverage of the new version of the World Bank's Landsat Index Atlas seems completely logical. However, we have not yet received the copy of the Atlas that you mentioned in your letter, and I do not know what additional information it contains as compared with the Landsat Standard Catalogue, distributed by the NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center.

Nevertheless I have to tell you that to my regret I do not see any possibility for Unesco to take part in financing the preparation and publication of the Atlas. Our interests with regard to space remote sensing are mainly connected with methodological and training aspects of the utilization of remotely sensed data for environment and natural resources surveys and studies, and our operational activities in this field are too limited to justify any additional expense.

You will, I assume, approach other UN organs such as FAO, UNEP, UNDP as well as CNRET, and perhaps it would be worthwhile to try and raise the interest for this project among developed countries themselves, through the Scientific and Technical Sub-Committee of the UN Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space.

Dear Yvette:

How very helpful of you to respond so swiftly to my appeal. I was very happy to receive the two copies of the Research documents because it is a preoccupation at the moment - which is why I wanted a second copy - and it seems to me that the paper give a very good resumé of what the pundits were - and hopefully are - thinking. Thank you and also for putting me back on the mailing list.

I am happy to receive your VTR reports because they help to build up a background of action information which is exactly what countries are asking for. I found the report from PHI particularly helpful because it talked about the snages in maintenance and repairs.

Certainly I want to take you up on your suggestion that I should visit Stitching Videcheads when I am in Paris. I talked to Sony and they suggested Tokyo which would have been okay except that the Korea mission was postponed. We are using a very nice young commerical group here for a VTR in-house program but they have built their equipment up bit by bit and it works beautifully but no one knows why. So it would suit me very well to stop over in Paris on March 28-29 if this would suit you and them? I would be on my way back from Bangladesh so might not arrive until late morning on the 28th. Coul you make a date with them for that P.M. with a possibility of a return the next day? I would of course confirm this nearer the date but at the moment it looks firm enough. What I want to see primarily is the latest editing machinery in action and then all other VTR portapak - or whatever is latest - equipment and check it for feasibility. When countries start talking about ordering 360 VTR sets one should have a very practical idea of what they are letting themselves in for particularly from the point of view of training.

As you know, the Bank has for a long time felt the need to develop education indicators to evaluate and monitor in a more systematic and sustained manner the "software" aspects of Bank-financed education projects. Messrs. Maas and Wodajo of this Department have been working on this for some time and the attached draft discusses the use of such indicators during supervision and completion of education projects.

We are, of course, fully aware that no set of indicators can cover every project to a desirable and appropriate extent. The draft, nonetheless, provides a fairly large inventory of indicators measuring education performance and covers inputs, throughputs, outputs, distribution of educational resources, benefits and efficiency as well as institution building. The indicators are meant to be used selectively, and you will note that only a limited number are recommended for most projects (they are indicated by an asterisk).

The draft has been circulated to our colleagues in the Regional Education Divisions for their comments and suggestions, and we would certainly welcome comments also from staff in the Cooperative Program.

As you are aware, the Inter-Parliamentary Council, at its 116th session in Colombo in April 1975, unanimously decided to accept the Australian Group's invitation to hold the 1977 spring meetings in Canberra from April 10 to 16.

Below will be found the programme and timetable of the session, as well as indications regarding the general organization of the latter. Once certain other details concerning the organization of the session have been finalized with the authorities of the Australian Group, they will be communicated to you in the convocations of the various bodies that will meet in Canberra.

The official invitation from the Australian Group will be sent to you in January 1977.

I. WORK PROGRAMMES OF THE STUDY COMMITTEES

At its 173rd session, held in Madrid on October 2 last, the Executive Committee selected the subjects to be considered by the Study Committees in 1977.

At that time, the Executive Committee took into account, as far as possible, the wishes expressed by the National Groups and the Study Committees.

You will find attached (Annex I) the substantive items placed on the agenda of the Study Committees.

The convocations for the Committees will be sent to you at the beginning of 1977. They will meet in Canberra.

II. TIMETABLE

A detailed programme and timetable of the session are attached (Annexes II and III).

As will be seen, there are never more than two Committee meetings taking place simultaneously.

Each National Group may be represented in a Committee by a member and a substitute, either of whom has the right to speak, but only one of whom may vote.

As customary, simultaneous interpretation will be provided for Study Committee debates.

The equipment for simultaneous interpretation comprises <u>four</u> interpretation channels. Two channels will be used for the official languages, English and French; the two other channels have been reserved by the Soviet and Japanese Groups.

III. WORKING PAPERS

The National Groups are called upon to contribute to the preparation of the work of the Study Committees by submitting memoranda or draft resolutions on one or another of the questions included in the agenda.

Memoranda should not exceed four or five double-spaced typewritten pages (1,500 to 2,000 words).

National Groups are requested to send their memoranda in only one of the two working languages of the Union, English and French. The Secretariat will henceforth undertake to translate the memoranda so as to facilitate the task of the National Groups.

In order to carry out this translation work satisfactorily, the Secretariat is counting on the National Groups to send in their memoranda as soon as possible after January 15, 1977.

Memoranda which reach Geneva after March 11 cannot be distributed in advance to the National Groups. They will be distributed - after having been translated, as far as this is possible - at the opening of the Canberra session.

No memorandum brought by a delegation to Canberra will be translated or reproduced on the spot by the Secretariat.

On some questions, the Secretariat will prepare general information documents for the Study Committees or will supply them with documents prepared by the United Nations or Specialized Agencies.

IV. WORK OF THE COUNCIL

As customary, the Inter-Parliamentary Council will meet at the end of the spring meetings and its 120th session will be held on April 15 and 16 next, at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

You will receive at the beginning of 1977 the convocation for this body containing the provisional agenda of the session.

Each National Group shall be represented on the Council by two members. A member of the Council who is unable to attend may be represented by another member of his Group, duly authorized to that effect.

V. PLACE OF MEETING

The meetings will be held in Australian Parliament House, Canberra.

VI. ACCOMMODATION

Accommodation for delegates will be arranged under the responsibility of the Australian Group, which will send you a list of hotels and prices, together with a supply of hotel reservation forms.

No correspondence with regard to accommodation should be addressed to the Secretariat of the Inter-Parliamentary Union in Geneva.

VII. LIST OF DELEGATES

Secretaries of National Groups are requested to return, <u>as soon as possible</u>, to the address indicated in the Australian Group's invitation, the registration form listing the members of their delegation, together with the names of accompanying persons. A copy of the list should be sent separately to the Secretariat of the Inter-Parliamentary Union, Place du Petit-Saconnex, 1209 Geneva.

VIII. INAUGURAL CEREMONY

The Inaugural Ceremony will be held in Canberra Theatre on Monday, April 11, at 10 a.m. Further details concerning this Ceremony will be communicated to you in the convocations of the various bodies.

IX. RECEPTIONS

Delegates will be informed by the Australian Group of the official receptions to be arranged.

X. INFORMATION SERVICE

Upon their arrival in Canberra, delegates are requested to register with the Information Service which will function during the session. Mail and invitations may be collected at this bureau.

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Further copies of this circular and its annexes are available, if required.

CONSIDERATION OF AN INTERNATIONAL YEAR FOR SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Report by the Director-General and Report by the Di

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The Director-General presents for the consideration of the General Conference a proposal for a Unesco-sponsored International Year for Science and Technology.

Point for decision: paragraph 19.

INTRODUCTION

- 1. In the Introduction to the Draft Programme and Budget for 1977-1978, paragraph 55 (19 C/5), the Director-General stated that he was examining the possible designation of an International Year for Science and Technology (YST) to be held during one of the coming biennia.
- 2. The growing significance of science and technology in all cultures and societies would be reason enough to promote reflection and public attention thereto and the sharing of international experiences. Moreover, the last fifteen years have seen a remarkable increase in the forms and programmes for international co-operation in science and technology. A review of progress achieved would be useful.
- 3. Now, however, attention is focused on the establishment of a new international economic order. In that context, the Panel of Counsellors on Major World Problems and Unesco's contribution to Solving Them(1), made the following observation, "What is needed is a new concept and long-range international strategy for the development of science and technology /reflecting/ overall global social needs a concept and strategy that would not and must not, in their rational advance, become detached from the basic human orientation and fundamental values ...".
- 4. The attention of governments and of the world's scientific and technological communities will soon be focused on preparations for the Second United Nations Conference on the application of science and technology to development. Following on the recommendation of

the ECOSOC Committee on Science and Technology for Development, the Council has sent its recommendation to the United Nations General Assembly which is expected shortly to approve the holding of the Conference, probably in 1979.

- 5. It is the view of the Director-General that there is a need to organize action which will reach a broader public than the United Nations Conference and its preparatory phases and could, in fact, constitute an important factor in follow-up. The aim would be to heighten the consciousness of various communities around the planet concerning the significance of science and technology to the satisfaction of human needs and concerning the ways and means of cooperating so as to reflect the inter-dependence of peoples as they face the challenges of human survival and of harmonious global development.
- 6. For this broader purpose, the Director-General considers that the proclamation of an International Year and the activities which it would stimulate could have considerable value. Moreover, he believes that Unesco has a responsibility to take the lead in proposing such a Year and organizing the co-operation which would be necessary for its success.

GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS AND OBJECTIVES

- 7. Unesco could build on its experience with previous World Years (on Education and Books, for example). The aim would be to emphasize significant policy decisions, reforms and other events occurring within Member States in order to highlight the impact of science and technology on the improvement of the human condition, on new opportunities for international co-operation in research, on mutual progress in the development of global resources, and on the intellectual and social enterprise that science and technology represent. Using diverse media and techniques, the message would be carried not only to academic, research and development, planning and production communities but also to the broad general public with a view to enhancing understanding of science and technology in regard to (i) their nature and growing capabilities, and (ii) the need for their wise use for constructive purposes, harmonious with environmental and cultural needs.
- 8. One specific purpose of the YST would be to stimulate new global and regional co-operation in scientific research and technical development to bring about a more effective utilization of resources than in the past, and to encourage collective definition of priorities. Special attention will have to be paid to the development of new mechanisms to facilitate the access of developing countries particularly those suffering from critical shortages of human and material resources to relevant knowledge and know-how. Access followed by adaptation and utilization requires the development of local infrastructures capable of determining lines of research and paths of technical application. Young people especially, will have to be reached (in industrialized as well as in developing nations) in order to overcome their ignorance of, or alienation from, science and engineering as honourable pursuits and careers worthy of their energy and idealism.
- 9. Other United Nations agencies, most of which have interests in science and technology, would need to be brought into close association with the planning and organization of the YST. Celebration during a year will thus offer the United Nations system as a whole another opportunity to collaborate in a common enterprise.
- 10. Specific objectives would be established, to include:
 - (a) communication of the nature of the research enterprise, especially to young people in developing countries, and of its accomplishments and potential for the future;
 - (b) promotion of the public's understanding of the scientific method and enterprise, of new opportunities and challenges provided by scientific-technical development, and thereby an amelioration of the dialogue between science and society;
 - (c) help the world's technical-scientific community to dedicate itself thoroughly to international co-operation, to an efficient delineation of priorities for research and development, and to increasingly effective use of resources and facilities;
 - (d) aid in the better understanding by all concerned of the complex relationships linking scientific research with technical progress and economic development;
 - (e) bring about a new understanding of the significance of the history of science and engineering and its close interconnexion with the growth of civilization and the flowering of culture;

- (f) exchange of information on and comparative studies of the processes involved in the training of scientists, engineers, technicians and practical economists, especially in developing countries.
- 11. In the design of activities to serve these objectives, provisions should be built in, wherever possible, for quantified targets and evaluation procedures. The scope and depth of the activities envisaged should be defined in advance by international and national committees working in collaboration. Stress should be placed on reaching maximal audiences with appropriate materials, designed for their attractiveness in helping everyone comprehend basic issues. In many cases, a by-product of the YST could and should be expansion of the scientific components of National Commissions for Unesco.

PROPOSED ACTIONS

- 12. Activities should be developed, first, at the national level by governments, National Commissions and scientific and technical communities. Projects should underline the rôle of science, technology, experimental development and research and their daily applications. Opportunities should be afforded to examine real or imagined consequences of scientific and technological advance and to discuss control and evaluation thereof.
- 13. Member States should be encouraged to include the results of these activities in the periodic "Additional Special Reports" on the action they have taken to give effect to the principles and norms spelled out in the General Conference's "Recommendation to Member States on the Status of Scientific Researchers", adopted by the General Conference on 20 November 1974.
- 14. The international programme, established in co-ordination with all United Nations agencies, the International Council of Scientific Unions, the World Federation of Scientific Workers and other NGOs, could include:

comparative studies of problems related to scientific progress and its impact on society;

public information through mass and specialized media;

itinerant exhibitions, scientific fairs and contests;

extensive public dialogue on the development of science and technology including scientific and technological policy.

15. Culmination of the International Year for Science and Technology could take the form of a high-level international forum on "Science in our World", or "Science, mankind and tomorrow", leading to a book or similar permanent record capable of widespread distribution and possibly to a film production in various languages.

PROCEDURE

- 16. If the General Conference agrees in principle with the idea of designation of an International Year for Science and Technology, the procedures agreed by it in resolution 48.1 of its eighteenth session would apply. That resolution accepted the proposals of the Economic and Social Council (resolution 1800 (LV)) that notification to the Council be given at least two years before a final decision is taken on designation.
- 17. Under this procedure, notification of interest would be made to ECOSOC immediately upon adoption of the General Conference acceptance in principle. It is not likely, however, that the Council could take cognizance of the idea until its Spring session, 1977. Strict application of the procedure would mean that it would only be at the twenty-first session of the General Conference (1982) that the final decision for the Year could be taken. One alternative would be for the General Conference, at its twentieth session (1978) to receive a report on reactions of the Council and to authorize the Executive Board, under certain conditions, to take the final decision concerning the Year. This would permit, if the decision were affirmative, that preparations could begin in the middle of 1979 for the celebration of a Year which would take place in 1981.
- 18. It would be necessary for the Draft Programme and Budget for 1979-1980 to include tentative provisions strengthening the Secretariat's capacity (Science Sector and Public Information) to co-ordinate preparatory activities.

In reply to your letter of 28 December which I found at my return from holidays, I am forwarding you under separate cover a document on the assessment of IERS.

I would be most obliged if you could let Mr. L. Sommerlad know about this communication. Landsat C, according to our information, is scheduled to be launched in late 1977. It will supply additional data; besides the multi-spectral scanner (MSS). it will carry two other sensors, a return beam vidicon (RBV) and a thermal scanner. This information would be of even greater benefit to the developing countries than that supplied by Landsat 1 and 2. The World Bank is therefore considering whether to plan to undertake the publication of a new version of its Landsat Index Atlas, perhaps in the third or fourth quarter of 1978, once the new data becomes available. One of the issues under preliminary discussion, even now, is the geographical coverage for this new edition. Specifically, should it be limited to the developing member countries of the Bank, as in the current Atlas, or should it be worldwide? To help us on this issue, we would like to have your advice and would be grateful if you could tell us on which side you come down and what would be the main considerations to be taken into account, in your opinion, in this matter. Also, if you believe worldwide coverage is preferable, we would appreciate your suggestions on the question of meeting the additional costs which this would entail. The World Bank, I assume at this time, would be willing to meet the full costs of publishing another edition limited to the coverage of its developing member countries. It most probably could not go beyond that. Do you believe that your agency would consider financing all or part of the costs of expanded coverage? What other sources of funds could you recommend? As a very rough estimate, we would guess that the additional costs for worldwide coverage might abount to \$50,000.

I am not asking, as I hope to have made clear, for an official and definite reply but only for an indication of your views, including the possible or probable financial participation by your agency and the conditions, if any, you may wish to stipulate for that support if your agency participated in the Bank's project to produce a new worldwide edition. Since the World Bank would be primarily responsible for the project we would, in the interest also of speedy implementation, expect to have broad authority in determining the textual and mapping content of the Atlas. We would appreciate your letting us know if you foresee any problem with this. I would be most obliged if you could give us your views not later than March 1, 1977.

I am sending you by separate mail a copy of the Atlas, for ease of reference.

SUBJECT: UNESCO Meeting - Back-to-office Report

1. In accordance with my terms of reference dated November 23, 1976, I attended the UNESCO meeting of experts on the methodology of curriculum reform in Paris from the 5th to the 12th December 1976.

UNESCO Meeting

- 2. The meeting discussed broadly the components of curriculum development (Annex 1) in different countries in a round table fashion. In addition to a working paper submitted by the UNESCO division of curriculum, the following papers were put in the hands of participants:
 - a) "Methodology of Curriculum Reform in Iraq" by Abdul-Jabbar Towfiq Al-Biati.
 - b) "Modernization of Secondary School Curriculum: USSR's Experience" by M.I. Kondakov.
 - c) "The Methodology Used in Japan for Reform in Curricula" by Shigeo Masui.
 - d). "La Methodologie de la Reforme des Programmes Scolaires en Republique de Guinee"

par Amara Fofana.

- e) "Curriculum in the Peruvian Education Reform" by Jose Carlos Fajardo.
- f) "Curriculum Development: Some Experiences for Educational Reforms in Sweden"

by Sixten Marklund.

In the preparatory phase of a curriculum reform the meeting recognized the importance of evaluation of existing curricula in terms of set criteria that will help in the formulation of global objectives. It was pointed out that these objectives are very much related to the economic, social and cultural objectives from which they are derived. This implies bringing education closer to life, to the natural and human environment and to the world of work. It was also emphasized that in the formulation of objectives there is the possibility of conflicting aspirations of different groups of society that may seem to be irreconcilable at times. To avoid an impasse it was suggested to carry out surveys and consultations to determine the needs and aspirations of various groups and enter them in a double entry table showing such aspirations on one side and the national objectives on the other. Weighting the different combinations becomes a policy decision.

- 4. The meeting recognized the complexity and subtlety of the translation of overall objectives into content specification. Although this phase is technical, where the prime responsibility falls on education specialists, a wide participation at the grass-root level, locally, regionally and nationally, is recommended. It was also suggested to consider not only content but methods of instruction as means to achieve certain objectives.
- 5. Vertical and horizontal coherence of content was stressed. Vertical coherence provides a means to prepare the learner for a life-long education and horizontal coherence achieves a balanced distribution between in-school and out-of-school education.
- 6. An experimentation stage in a curriculum reform was recommended where the objectives and contents are tested, although not all such components can be experimentally verified. It was pointed out that methods other than experimentation and experimental schools need to be employed such as consultation of the general public, mobile teams of assessors, and committees. In addition, a strategy of introduction of the reform should be worked out to include a briefing of teachers, parents and students, development of instructional materials, introduction of new methods of teaching, and revision of the examination system.
- 7. The meeting was strong on the democratization of educational reform, in the sense that the definition of content and methods of an education is a responsibility of all groups of society, although with varying degrees. The fundamental national decisions are the responsibility of political authorities, while the identification of needs involves all occupational categories and age groups. The translation of objectives into content specification is primarily the responsibility of specialists, but "it cannot be left to them, since the compartmentalization of disciplines, is not consonant either with contemporary epistomological reality or the requirements of an interdisciplinary or problem focused approach." At the same time the difficulty of the collaboration of various groups was admitted.
- 8. It was recommended that "Unesco would render service to many countries by conducting a survey designed to establish the methodological element for curriculum reform:
 - conceptual and fundamental aspects;
 - range and interdependence of subjects taught at primary school;
 - proportion of the time-table assigned to educational work; artistic expression, physical exercise and games."
- 9. A draft final report was discussed the last day of the conference and a revised one will be issued at a later date incorporating the remarks and suggestions made.
- 10. As an observer in the meeting I do not share all the assumptions made or recommendations arrived at. The meeting reinforced the need for an academic study of curriculum reform "modelling" with practical and heuristic implications.

Other meetings

- 11. On the side of the conference I had meetings with a number of people at UNESCO headquarters including Mr. Kaddoura, Assistant Director-General for Science, and Ms. Heggis, Acting Director of the Division of Science and Technology Education.
- 12. I had a long meeting with Mr. Carceles, Director of the Education Statistics Division, and discussed ways by which the statistical data collected by UNESCO can be utilized. Mr. Carceles explained that in addition to the official data, UNESCO has provisional data on the different member states which can be made available to researchers. He also pointed out that if the Bank requires certain statistical data not collected presently by UNESCO, they can be incorporated into the annual questionnaire if they are communicated to UNESCO in time.

UNESCO Visit - Back-to-Office Report

- 1. In accordance with my terms of reference dated September 23, 1976, I was in Paris November 3-5, 1976 to discuss with appropriate staff members of UNESCO curriculum development activities in relation to Bank work.
- 2. I had a lengthy discussion with Mr. Ochs, Head of the Curriculum Division, on the work of UNESCO in the field of curriculum development.
 - a) Conceptually, UNESCO is presently concentrating on curriculum work that reflects the life-long education concept in terms of time and space. Operationally work is done on the evolution of the concept of basic education into a curriculum of defined components and diversified methods of attainment derived from target objectives, as opposed to a "second-class" type of education parallel to formal education and meant only for the poorer sector of the population.
 - b) No attempts have been made to develop models of curriculum development that can be used by member countries. However a closely related meeting of experts on the methodology of curriculum reform is planned for December 6-11, 1976.
 - c) There are plans to increase the practical component of the training programs of education personnel involved in curriculum development.
- 3. I met with Miss Whitings from the Education Materials Division and acquainted myself with the multi-media training packages developed by this division.
- 4. I had brief meetings with Mr. Moller, and Mr. Bukhari from the Education Finance Division and Mr. Younis from the Environmental Education Division.
- 5. In light of my visit I suggest:
 - a) that the Education Department participate in the forthcoming UNESCO meeting on the methodology of curriculum reform.
 - b) that the Education Department embark on a project that aims to develop a position paper on the financing of components of curriculum reform and extensive guidelines in the form of model(s) of curriculum development with strategies, techniques, types of inputs, and financial considerations.
 - c) that the Bank, through EDI, develop an extensive and highly structured course for the training of curriculum development personnel utilizing modern techniques of multi-media instruction and case-study simulation.

9.4 - Application of the People's Republic of Angola for membership of Unesco (100 EX/51)

The Executive Board,

- Considering that the People's Republic of Angola, on 14 September 1976, applied for membership to Unesco,
- 2. Considering further that this Republic, in formulating its application, proclaimed its willingness to abide by Unesco's Constitution, to accept the obligations contained therein and to contribute to the expenses of the Organization,
- 3. Recalling the inalienable right of peoples to self-determination and independence in accordance with the principles of the Charter of the United Nations and the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples,
- 4. Considering that the independence of Angola was proclaimed on 11 November 1975,
- 5. Decides, pursuant to Article II, paragraph 2, of the Unesco Constitution, to recommend that the General Conference, at its nineteenth session, accept the application of the People's Republic of Angola for membership;
- 6. Recommends that the General Conference include in the agenda of its nineteenth session the item: "Application of the People's Republic of Angola for member-ship of Unesco";
- 7. Recommends further that the General Conference adopt the following resolution:
 "The General Conference,
 - 1. Considering that the People's Republic of Angola, on 14 September 1976, applied for membership of Unesco,
 - Considering likewise that this Republic, in formulating its application, proclaimed its willingness to abide by Unesco's Constitution, to accept the obligations contained therein, and to contribute to the expenses of the Organization,
 - 3. Having noted that the Executive Board, at its 100th session, recommended that the People's Republic of Angola should be admitted as a Member State of Unesco,
 - 4. Decides to admit the People's Republic of Angola as a Member State of Unesco".

Terms of Reference - Statistical Liaison Mission to Europe, India and Thailand

- 1. On October 23, 1976, you will proceed to India where you will attend for one week the 19th Session of the United Nations Statistical Commission meeting in New Delhi, November 8-19.
- On your way out to New Delhi you will stop for approximately three days each in Paris, Geneva, and Rome for discussions with statistical officials of international agencies headquartered in those cities, including OECD, Unesco, ECE, UNCTAD, UNICC, ILO, WHO, UNRISD, and FAO. Prior to the opening of the meetings of the Statistical Commission, you will attend the meeting of heads of statistical offices of the specialized agencies scheduled by the UN Statistical Office in New Delhi on November 5.
- 3. On your return trip you will stop for three days in Bangkok for discussions with statistical officials of the UN ESCAP, and for a brief review of the progress of the Bank/ESCAP project on household survey data for income distribution statistics in the Asian region.
- 4. After returning to headquarters you will prepare a brief backto-office report covering the findings of the mission, and prepare relevant material for inclusion in the report which you are drafting on the Bank's long-range data requirements.

Mission to Paris, Rome and Geneva

- 1. On the 23rd of October you will proceed to Paris to visit the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) and the International Energy Agency where you will review arrangements for obtaining machine readable information on capital flows, trade, energy and national accounts. During these discussions you will review computer file structures, update processing, future plans and the current status of the OECD systems. You also will visit the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco) to make arrangements to obtain data on education in machine readable form.
- 2. During October 27 through the 30th you will proceed to Geneva to visit the United Mations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), the International Computer Center (ICC), the World Health Organization (WHO), the International Labour Organization (ILO) and the United Nations Research Institute (UNRISD), the European Economic Commission for Europe (EEC), and General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) to review the systems work being done in these organizations to produce machine readable data and collect documentation and possibly tapes which are available.
- 3. During October 31 through November 4 you will visit the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) in Rome where you will review the data processing systems used to produce machine readable data on commodity production and trade.
- 4. On your return to headquarters you will prepare a back-to-office report describing the meetings and material you encounter.

Dear Werner:

May I begin by expressing sincere appreciation of your recent visit, which I think everyone here found useful and constructive. Certainly the interchange on general questions which we had (and which was reminiscent of our earlier "periodic reviews") was valuable.

As one Bank staff member remarked, once we have jointly taken decisions with respect to the report of the Task Force and the future shape of the Cooperative Program, there will be many matters of procedure which will require discussion and further definition. Pending that time, however, there did appear to be some points on which we could proceed, and this letter is intended to flag a few of the more obvious ones.

First, we did hear a number of complaints from the Regional Division Chiefs regarding the implementation by Unesco of technical assistance items within Bank financed projects, and we both agreed that an early discussion of these problems, looking to improving the procedures, is desirable. I suggest, therefore, that we might meet in Washington at a time you may agree and that the discussion might include, beside yourself, Mr. Bellahsene and Mr. Najman, or someone representing him.

I agreed on our side to explore within the Bank problems with respect to payment for travel and subsistence which have apparently arisen as the result of restructuring of the Bank's budgeting and accounting procedures. We will take this up with the appropriate people within the Bank and advise you of the outcome. We also agreed upon a resumption of the weekly telephone calls — ordinarily between Messrs. Van Wagenen and Argyropoulos — as a means of keeping abreast of operational developments.

Other visits that we foresaw were by Mr. Argyropoulos and Ms. Felendler in January/February at the Bank's budget time. This had proved very worth-while earlier this year. It was also agreed that Mr. Van Wagenen would make a stop of a day and a half in Paris in November en route to India, and that he would make a longer "get acquainted" visit as soon as possible, early in the new year.

We also recognized, as suggested above, that following upon joint decisions with respect to the future of the Cooperative Program there would be need for extensive follow-up discussion of procedure. Hopefully, this might take place early in the new year.

We also agreed, in principle, that more extensive briefing within the Bank for your missions would be desirable. This is something on which we have agreed many times in the past but which we have not been able to put into effect as much as we wished for one reason or another. We will make another try.

Finally, we agreed that we should have a series of seminar discussions on policy matters which are of mutual and operational concern. For this Department at least I can pledge that senior members would try to schedule a day or two with you in Paris when they are passing through Europe.

Before closing may I also express in writing, as I did in conversation, appreciation of the excellent work and fine cooperation which we have received from Mr. Carceles and his colleagues in Unesco's Statistical Office. Their work is of course essential to the furthering of many activities.

Once again thank you for your visit and the valuable discussions which took place.

MEETING WITH THE ARCHIVISTS OF THE UNITED NATIONS SYSTEM, TO DISCUSS THE PRELIMINARY REPORT ON THE ORGANIZATION AND DESCRIPTION OF ARCHIVES TO BE INCLUDED IN THE GUIDE TO THE ARCHIVES OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Paris, 14-16 September 1976

FINAL REPORT

1. Opening of the meeting

The Director of the Division of documentation, libraries, archives and book promotion, Mrs. C. Zaher, welcomed the participants and summarized briefly the background of this meeting. The Secretariat of Unesco had concluded a contract with the International Council on Archives (ICA) to make a preliminary study on the preparation of a guide to the archives of the organizations in the United Nations system and other international organizations. This study, issued as a Unesco document (COM.75/WS/28), had been distributed to the participants as a working document for this meeting.

The meeting was chaired by Mrs. C. Zaher, and in her absence by Mr. Frank B. Evans. The list of participants is given in an annex. Messrs. Evans, Welander and Järvinen were selected to serve as a drafting group for the final report.

After the full discussion of the background paper, the scope of the total project, and the current contract with ICA, the meeting reached unanimous agreement on the following points on the annotated agenda:

2. Determination of project scope

- It was agreed that the project should consist of three successive phases. The first would be devoted to the preparation and publication of a Guide to the archival materials in the organizations of the United Nations system. The second would involve the preparation of a Guide to the archives of other international organizations, and the third would be the creation of a Guide to archives, including private papers, in other repositories relating to international organizations.
- 2.2 It was considered that the first part should be issued in provisional form, in anticipation of a more extended and definitive version at a later date. In this respect the preliminary edition would serve as a testing device and example for the two following stages of the total project.

2.3 The scope of the initial guide, in terms of inclusion of particular institutions or secretariats (i.e. records-creating and records-keeping bodies), would be determined by the working party with due regard to the relationship existing between these organizations included within the Guide.

Working definition of archives

3.1 For the purposes of this project, it was agreed to accept the definition provided in the annex 2 of the Communication from the ICA working party:

"archives' includes all items (current, semi-active and inactive files, "printed Archives", etc.) destined for preservation for information or for purposes of proof by the administration which produced or received them.

By "printed archives" is meant an accumulation of publication and documents, printed or reproduced by other means, issued by the organization and preserved for the purposes indicated in the preceding paragraph.

- 3.2 It was recommended to the working party that it substitute another term for the word "item" in order to avoid possible confusion.
- 3.3 It was also emphasized that only current records of obvious archival value should be included in the Guide.
- 4. Order and unit of entry for the Guide
- 4.1 It was recommended to the working party that any of several orders of entry be considered, with some preference being expressed for strictly alphabetical order.
- 4.2 Each institution would be the subject of a major entry.
- Where the archives are no longer in the custody of a records creating institution a system of cross references would indicate the repository where the archives are currently located.

5. Basic information to be included in each entry

It was agreed that each entry should include the following data: the name of the institution as above defined; any earlier names, with indications of dates when those names were used; mailing and street address and telephone number; days and hours open; working languages of the Secretariat; names of the administrative units with archival material in their custody; a statement of policy concerning the division, if any, of custody of the records; a statement of procedures and policies concerning access to archives material by outside persons; a statement concerning literary property and copyright; and material facilities for access, reproduction of documents, and equipment for the consultation of non-textual records.

- 5.2 It was recommended to the working party that as much as possible of the above information should be included in the Guide and that the form soliciting this information should contain whatever explanatory notes are felt to be useful.
- 6. Administrative history
- 6.1 After general information, each entry should include a brief administrative history emphasizing origin, structure, organization, functions, activities and significant transactions of the institution.
- 6.2 Particular attention should be paid to major reorganizations, to re-assignments of functions, to inherited functions, to predecessor-agencies; note should also be made of basic record-keeping practices and of the degree of centralisation or decentralisation of files.
- 6.3 The administrative history should include a list of chief executives, with the dates they held office, and should conclude with a bibliography of the most important books and articles on the history, functions and the records of the institution.
- 6.4 Indication should be made of major subject content of the records where this is not evident from the statement of the organization and functions of the institution.
- 6.5 Attention should particularly be drawn to records containing information on the prehistory or history of other international organizations.
- 7. Description of archival materials
- 7.1 It was agreed that each contributing institution should apply the above working definition of archives to its holdings and provide a collective description at whatever level is possible in term of its current intellectual controls or arrangement or classification of the material.
- 7.2 It was agreed that the description should include the total volume expressed in terms of linear metres of shelving occupied, that microforms be identified by number of rolls, size and number of fiche, and that the volume of audio-visual materials should be expressed in terms of approximate number of items.
- 7.3 Inclusive dates of the records should also be given with an indication of earlier and later dated materials; notable gaps should be recorded with an explanation if possible a listing of published and unpublished finding aids, including institution-created classification schemes or any other aids useful for understanding and for consultation of records, should also be provided.
- 7.4 As much as possible of the above information should be provided about materials of archival value that are not at present in archival custody.
- 7.5 Particular attention should be paid to information that may not be expected to be found in the records from the description of the organization and functions of the institution, and conversely to information that may be expected but that is missing.

8. Inherited, deposited and otherwise acquired archives

8.1 The above information regarding administrative history and descriptive elements should be furnished for all archival materials that are in the custody of the institution but that did not originate in the institution.

9. Alienated archives

9.1 It was agreed that in those cases where parts of an institution's archives are now located elsewhere, the name and the address of the holding repository should be given.

10. Related research materials

10.1 It was agreed that mention should be made of any special libraries, audio-visual reference collections, etc..., located in the institution, the use of which would complement and facilitate archival research.

11. Work schedule

- 11.1 It was decided that a time-table could not redistically be projected at this time for the total three-phase project.
- Instead, it was agreed that the working party would submit to representatives of the institutions to be included in the first-phase Guide, a draft data sheet with explanatory notes for their review and comment. This would be submitted by 15 December 1976, and would be included in the progress report to be submitted by that date to Unesco in accordance with the terms of its contract with ICA.
- 11.3 Comments on the draft entry form would be due back to the working party by 1st February 1977, and the final entry forms would be mailed to designated international organizations during March 1977. Reminders would be sent to institutions that have not responded by September 1977.
- 11.4 It is understood that Unesco will provide assistance, to the extent possible, in the compilation, editing, and other necessary preparation of the final manuscript.
- Unesco will also assume responsibility for publication and wide dissemination, in an appropriate form, of the final manuscript.

12. Other business

- 12.1 The meeting concluded with a lively and important discussion of problems common to all international archival institutions. This included the basic and pressing need for adequate and appropriately furnished space for both staff and researchers, and an appropriate organizational location for the archival programme.
- The meeting requested Unesco to study ways and means of making possible in 1977 the convening of a working group of archivists and records managers in the United Nations system to study common problems and ways of providing better administrative services to the secretariats of which they are a part.

- The meeting wishes to call to the attention of the administration of international agencies the need to provide adequate staff and budget for archives and registries. It also endorsed the desirability of a combined-records management and archives service in order to achieve the economies and efficiencies that will result from such a service, and to make the information contained in records more accessible and more timely for decision-makers and programme-managers.
- 12.4 The meeting called upon Unesco to promote the acceptance by international organizations of the fact that the administration of archives constitute a profession discipline which requires its own education and training
- 12.5 The meeting called upon Unesco to study the possibility of developing training courses for records managers and archivists in international organizations, to enable them to deal more effectively with the unique characteristics of their records and archival systems.
- 12.6 Unesco should also study with UNITAR and similar agencies the organization of specialized in-service inter-agency courses necessary and appropriate for the staff involved in records management and archives administration.
- 12.7 It was recommended that Unesco should arrange for preparation of a leaflet on the rôle of archives as an information source and support for decision-makers and administrations.

I hope those manpower utilization results for FY76 (called "Summary of Staff Time" here), for which you cabled urgently, arrived today in your office. The ESP part of it was that one hour before your cable arrived they appeared on my desk. I made a quickie analysis of two features of what might be called "operational time": (i) its allocation among Regional Divisions here, and (ii) its allocation between sector work and all other work. Briefly put, of the 900 m/w of operational time, Eastern Africa used 43%, Western Africa and Asia 15% each, LAC 19%, and EMENA 8% (including TA). Over-all, 55% was sector work and 45% non-sector work, but of course the definitions are not sharp as between those two. You will probably want to make your own analysis and I would be interested in the results. A more detailed one will be made here also.

Comments on the "Tentative Assignment Schedule for FY77" have now been received from EMENA, Asia, and LAC Divisions.

EMENA mentions only the Tunisia appraisal mission of May 77 where (tentatively) an agricultural educator will be needed.

Asia mentions the following:

- a) Bangladesh "may be later" than February?
- b) Korea appraisal is Sept. 27 Oct. 15 in the field.
- c) Malaysia completion would start in March 77 instead of Feb. 77.
- d) Thailand appraisal is expected to be 4 weeks in Nov. rather than in Oct.

As you already know from a letter, there is on the horizon some sector work to be done toward a fifth Malaysia project that might require 3 EFD staff (general, technical, and economist) early in 1977. Finally, Richard Johanson suggested that it would be helpful to identify projects on these sheets, like "Malaysia IV" or even better by project number, like "Rwanda 567". Would that be convenient for you?

LAC has many additions, which you can make from the far-reaching Travel Schedule I sent you with the Sept. 17 letter, and only one deletion - Ecuador. One potential problem is Jamaica for Mr. Chesswas and Mr. Taylor. The latest from-here is Oct. 25 - Nov. 12, not "Nov. (3 weeks)" as shown in the Travel Schedule mentioned above; I trust that this conforms to your understanding also.

Looking at the 5 assignment schedules myself, I wonder whether the technical educators may become over-committed in March: Upper Volta, Malaysia, Pakistan, Uruguay, and possibly Malaysia again.

The newest Asia "Mission Schedule" is enclosed.

Thank you for the copies of Prospects, just received.

Mr. Wadi Haddad, a leading Lebanese educator who joined our staff in August as "General Educator", plans to stop at Unesco on his way back from a mission to Indonesia for discussions on curriculum development activities. This would be in the Division of Structure, Contents, Methods and Techniques of Education, but we assume that Mr. Ochs will be in Nairobi. Could you please let me know whom he should see in the curriculum development field? He would devote Nov. 4 and the early part of Nov. 5 to these discussions If it can be arranged at your end. Naturally, he would like to call upon Mr. Moller also. He also knows Mr. Al-Bukhari. If you will let me know by letter, I'll cable Mr. Haddad wherever he is, preferably early in October.

I just had lunch and said farewell to Klaus Bahr, whom I remainder from his service here and who told me his visit in the Bank had been extremely useful. It was for us, too, judging from the length of some of his conversations with those in high position who know the evaluation field and the organization and program control fields. To me he was helpful also, as he is so perceptive about problems of relationship, to mention only one thing.

We await with great interest the reaction from Mr. Moller which we expected about September 20 (phone conversation of September 10 with Mr. Ballantine) and hope nothing went wrong at the meeting which we assume took place the preceding week to discuss the Task Force report. No doubt Mats Hultin will have some information when he rturns to the office September 27; he may have been Mr. Moller's chosen vehicle.

Thanks for the letters of September 1 and 7. I have enjoyed knowing Ron Harris and Bill Taylor here briefly.

The "Tentative Assignment Schedule" for FY77 as at September 1, 1976 was distributed and I have one set of reactions already: Western Africa.

- a) Ivory Coast SWR. Apparently the EFD economist will be on mission for the month of January but the Bank people will be on mission the following month rather than together with EFD.
- b) Mali should be December 1-10, rather than November, as far as we know.
- c) Nigeria SPN is omitted from your table. This is a Bank mission which presumably includes an EFD architect for October 25 November 30. Tony Cole says it has already been arranged with you.

The I haven't heard from the others this early, I wonder what happened to Tunisia, which was added to the previous edition I sent to you as an appraisal with an EFD agricultural educator requested for some time in May 1977. Has that been arranged at your end?

Para. 4 of your September 1 letter I would interpret as meaning that copies of correspondence from you to Division Chiefs is sent to me. Am I correct that so far there have been only cables? Believe I have not received any letter copies. I presume this will apply to the remarks you are sending "directly to Donna Dowsett" mentioned in para. 2.

Enclosed are EMENA and LAC current tentative travel schedules for your information.

Re the Sudan mission: Mr. Ballantine expects to be there Oct. 16-22. Apparently Mr. Herve and Mrs. Vaugrante will not be there because (your letter of September 10) they must be in Senegal.

You will recall that I raised the question of keeping an account of the terms of (time) trade between EFD and the rest of Unesco, and your reply (letter of Aug. 30) was that, given the records that you already send us, "it should therefore be easy for you to trace the type of costs you mention." In discussion at this end, it seems to some of us that the statement should preferably come from your end. It would not only be more accurate presumably, but certainly more official. Could this be put into your system, please?

We have made a little progress on fuller distribution of documents to you, but are about to try out on the Division Chiefs a systematic approach to see if we can't improve the communication substantially. Incidentally, the 14 copies of the Mauritius PIM which Mr. Moller notified in his letter of August 16 have not yet arrived, as far as I know. If surface mail is customarily used, they are not yet due, but I had thought air freight was the usual.

I still have no plan to go to Paris before my India mission (mid-Nov. to mid-Dec.). This depends partly upon the nature of Mr. Moller's visit here October 11-14 and the Task Force situation he will be transmitting to us about September 20, as he mentioned to Duncan on the phone last Friday. If my visit is not made before India it will not be sooner than late January, partly because of deferred vacation plans. Naturally, I am anxious to meet the group and see your headquarters and learn more about how it operates.

No special news about Gabrielle; Mickey says things are on schedule there. I hope you are reconciled by now to your return from vacation.

Dear Werner:

As you know, in extending aid to developing member countries the World Bank is called upon to consider equipment needs for a wide variety of educational and training programs. The present basic equipment lists prepared by the Bank refer particularly to programs at the upper secondary level and it is now proposed to extend their range to include all levels from that of the upper primary school (both rural and urban) to that of the technical institute offering higher technician courses at post-secondary level. At the same time existing lists are to be modified to meet current changes in course content and cost.

I have asked Mr. J.C. Jones to undertake overall responsibility for this work and it would be much appreciated if he could be given the opportunity to meet you and interested colleagues in order to discuss the amendments and additions necessary to meet the objectives outlined above. We would be very interested to benefit from your own experience in this direction and to know whom we might approach to undertake the preparation of subject lists not already available to our several organizations in this field.

Should you kindly agree to this request, Mr. Jones would be able to come to Paris on October 11 and 12 and I would greatly appreciate your early confirmation of these dates so that Mr. Jones' travel program could be arranged. In the meantime, I am enclosing under separate cover: (a) the existing lists prepared by the Bank, (b) a provisional list of "excended" subjects (to follow).

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

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UNESCO MEETING ON STATISTICS FOR LITERACY PROGRAMMES

(Tehran, 17-21 October 1976)

Purpose, Working Procedures and Practical Information

Introduction

- 1. In pursuance of Resolution 1.252 adopted by the Unesco General Conference at its eighteenth session, a meeting on the collection, analysis and presentation of literacy programme statistics will be held in Tehran at the International Institute for Adult Literacy Methods. The meeting is being sponsored by Unesco with the cooperation of the Imperial Government of Iran.
- 2. In recent years, the Unesco Office of Statistics has designed an International Standard Classification of Education (ISCED) for assembling, analyzing and presenting educational statistics. ISCED is intended as a guide to the collection of national educational statistics and as a means for promoting the international comparability of statistical measures. Adult education as well as regular school and university education is covered by ISCED. A manual* for the collection of national educational statistics has been published by the Unesco Office of Statistics. Although this manual applies to literacy programmes as well as other types of adult education, the emphasis is on elements common to all adult education programmes and not upon those uniquely applicable to literacy programmes.
- 3. The General Conference, therefore, considered it desirable that a second, more detailed, manual treating literacy statistics be prepared. This manual will set forth the statistical requirements at the project level as well as at the national and international levels. The manual will emphasize statistical requirements of particular relevance to literacy and is intended to supplement Unesco's more general Manual for the Collection of Adult Education Statistics.
- 4. In April 1976, a contract for the preparation of a Manual on Statistics for Literacy Programmes was awarded by Unesco to the Director of the Madras Institute of Development Studies. A preliminary draft of the Manual was received in June and following a review by the Office of Statistics and the Literacy Division, has been returned to the consultant with comments and suggestions.
- 5. The purpose of the Tehran meeting will be to examine the revised draft of the Manual with a view to making additional comments and suggestions of a general and/or specific character. On the basis of the comments and suggestions received, the Manual will be further revised and prepared for publication and pilot-testing.

Agenda and Working Methods

6. After considering the purpose, scope, content and organization of the Manual in its entirety, the meeting will systematically review the Manual chapter by chapter.

7. Copies of the Manual, incorporating the alterations proposed in Unesco's review, will be sent to participants at least one month prior to the meeting. Participants are requested to bring with them to Tehran typed comments on each of the chapters in a form suitable for photocopying. To facilitate discussion, the comments prepared by participants should clearly indicate the pages in the manual to which they refer. These comments will be exchanged among participants at the opening session on Sunday 17 October 1976 and will constitute the basis for discussion at ensuing sessions.

8. Dr. Ekambaram of the University of Madras will serve as rapporteur for the meeting. Each participant will, however, be assigned responsibility for summarizing the discussion on particular topics. Starting on the second day of the meeting, at the beginning of each morning session, it is proposed that a summary of the previous day's discussions and recommendations be presented. Participants will divide the responsibility for preparing such summaries among themselves.

Place and Date

9. The meeting will take place at the International Institute for Adult Literacy Methods (IIALM), 52 Zartosht Avenue, Tehran, Iran. The meeting will begin on the morning of Sunday 17 October and conclude on Thursday 21 October 1976. Participants are kindly requested to arrive in Tehran on Saturday 16 October. They are requested to inform the Director of the IIALM of the flight number and time of their arrival (see paragraph 17 for postal and cable addresses). IIALM staff will endeavour to meet participants at the airport and convey them to their hotel. If for any reason participants fail to contact the Institute's staff, they should proceed directly to the Keyan Hotel, 77 Zartosht Avenue, Tehran, telephone 65-02-35/36/37. Official airport taxis are available and should be used. The Keyan Hotel is directly across the street from the IIALM. The cost of a room (including breakfast and service charge) is Rls. 1,775.

Reservations have been made at the Keyan Hotel from the 16th through the 21st, inclusive. Because of the demand for hotel space and airline seats, it is suggested that participants make return reservations before departure from Tehran. Should rooms be required before the 16th or after the 21st, the IIAIM should be informed as promptly as possible of this need.

11. The inaugural meeting will take place at the International Institute for Adult Literacy Methods on Sunday 17 October 1976 at 10.00 o'clock.

Working Language

12. The working language of the Meeting will be English.

Financial and Travel Arrangements

13. Air tickets will be cabled to participants in advance of the meeting.

Per Diem at the established U.N. rate for Tehran (currently 3,130 Rls.)

will be paid to participants following the inaugural session. Expenses of observers will be borne by their respective organizations.

Passport and Visa Requirements

14. All participants should have a valid passport and Iranian visa, unless exempted from the visa requirement. A valid International Health Certificate (cholera, smallpox, yellow fever vaccinations, according to country of origin) is also required.

Currency Regulations

15. There are no limitations on the amount of foreign currency and travellers cheques taken into and out of Iran. Iranian Rials can be freely converted into U.S. dollars and other currencies. The official rate of exchange is approximately 70 Rials to U.S.S 1. Money can be changed at banks, hotels and private exchange offices.

Climate

16. The climate in Tehran during October is usually pleasant. Days are bright and warm with temperatures in the 70's to 80's Fahrenheit (20 to 30 degrees Centigrade). Evenings are crisp: 50's to 60's Fahrenheit (10 to 15 Centigrade) and a warm jacket or light coat will be required.


Responding to all this will need more analysis than I can provide this afternoon, but one or two items need answers to you right away.

Finding that I for once had a couple of hours between looking after the communication elements in various projects I went through the files to tidy them up for my successor. During this fascinating job I seem to have invented a new filing system and cannot remember what it was. I suggest that, if your patience will survive, you send me all the reports so that David Radel may have them to hand. As far as VTR is concerned I am sure that when a country embarks on it seriously as a technique in communications over a reasonable period there will be a breakthrough but I have not yet succeeded in selling the idea except for one or two portapaks here and there. Maybe the Governments realize the socio-political dangers or maybe they are just scared of having more equipment which could lie around unused. (Tknow three countries where they have VTR equipment - admittedly the old fashioned heavy type - and only ever use it for covering a seminar or an occasion as though it were TV equipment). I think I would aim basically at ten teams in a pilot area - five doing the awareness of self approach and five doing softening up PR work for Population. I would hope at the same time to send for say three months someone like the Heyn couple to adapt their views on its use to the country's needs. It will come. I have just heard from Peter Lewis who is doing a study for UNESCO on the use of VTR in non-formal education and this could be most important because so many countries are struggling to find an approach to the non-formal field and not finding it easy. How do you formalize the non-formal? IAVRS seems to be surviving although I wish I could persuade whoever writes the project outlines that the UN and the Bank do not have projects in countries but support the projects of Governments. I spent two days in London recently hammering this point home in which endeavor I was supported by WHO and ILO but without effect. The enclosed "Lending for Education in FY76 & Current Trends", the document requested in your letter of August 9, is so fresh that it came out even after your letter was written. (One error is corrected in ink.) I trust this is the one you had in mind. Any comments on, or extensions to, the analysis which you or others in EFD may have would be most welcome.

Also enclosed are some items for Dimitri when he returns:

- a) An up-to-date "List of Missions" for Eastern Africa Division. I shall send others as they appear.
- b) A set of heavily annotated and updated "Tentative Assignment Schedules" for FY77 created and sent by Dimitri to show the situation as of June 30, 1976. My notations, coming from the Divisions, bring them to July 31. Perhaps a good procedure would be for him to make such a set of tables every two months, with the intervening month being simply an updated version such as the enclosed. What do you and he think? They need to be deciphered: the pencil notes are mine to the Division Chiefs, and the red or blue are their responses; where no response to the pencil is made, the pencil date or note is the latest. Incidentally, what does "CP" mean in connection with Jamaica only?

Two questions for Dimitri:

a) Do you have a system for keeping track of the cost of non-CP Unesco staff who contribute to IBRD work and CP staff who contribute to Unesco non-IBRD work? Of course this will be needed if the 10%-20% formula proposed in the Task Force study is put into effect, and it should start from July 1, 1976 if not already in effect.

Mr. W. Moller August 17, 1976 b) Could you please let me know Mr. Gannicott's date of arrival in the Sudan, with any revisions that may occur from time to time? Mr. Ballantine's visit to Khartoum is related to that date, as I understand it. I am glad you mentioned the addressograph's firm attachment to Mr. van Vliet, as I was able to renew Gabrielle's long-standing effort to deparate them. The voice speaking for the computer or its equivalent assured me that he would go through the plates personally. At the same time, I cautioned him to be sure that whenever a "van Vliet" plate was pulled there was a "Moller" plate intact. I certainly hope this effort succeeds. PORTABLE VIDEO AND LOCAL DIFFUSION IN NON-FORMAL EDUCATION

I have been commissioned by UNESCO's Division for Methods, Materials and Techniques to write a bibliographical survey of studies undertaken throughout the world in the use of portable video in non-formal education, and its diffusion through such means as cassette distribution, mobile units, resource centres, cable systems or local broadcasting. Although broadcasting thus connects with the study, the emphasis is on video and only secondarily on the means of distribution.

Dear Mr. McNamara,

I have the honour to refer to the Convention concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage adopted by the General Conference of Unesco at its seventeenth session, on 16 November 1972.

Article 33 of the Convention provides that it "shall enter into force three months after the date of the deposit of the twentieth instrument of ratification, acceptance or accession, but only with respect to those States which have deposited their respective instruments of ratification, acceptance or accession on or before that date". I have pleasure in informing you that the twentieth instrument was deposited on 17 September 1975. Annexed to this letter is a list of all the States which have deposited instruments of ratification or acceptance of this Convention with the Director-General.

Accordingly, in conformity with Article 8, paragraph 1, of the said instrument, a General Assembly of States Parties to the Convention will meet during the next ordinary session of the General Conference of Unesco, to be held in Nairobi, Kenya, from 26 October to 30 November 1976. Subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, I invite your Organization to send an observer to this Assembly which will take place on 26 November 1976. You will find attached hereto copies of the Provisional Agenda and Provisional Rules of Procedure which have been prepared for this meeting.

As stipulated in the same Article 8, the General Assembly of States Parties to the Convention will elect an Intergovernmental Committee for the Protection of the Cultural and Natural Heritage of Outstanding Universal Value, called "the World Heritage Committee". This Committee will be composed of fifteen States Parties to the Convention, if the number of States for which the Convention has entered into force is less than forty. In the event this figure is attained, the number of members of the Committee would be increased to twenty-one.

According to the terms of the Convention, election of members of the World Heritage Committee "shall ensure an equitable representation of the different regions and cultures of the world". In this regard, I also wish to point out that the Convention covers the fields of both cultural and natural heritage.

Article 15 of the Convention establishes a Fund for the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage of Outstanding Universal Value, called the "World Heritage Fund", to which States Parties to the Convention will make compulsory and voluntary contributions. For those States which have not made the declaration referred to in paragraph 2 of Article 16, the General Assembly will be called upon to determine the amount of their contributions, in the form of a uniform percentage. This decision shall require a majority vote of the States Parties present and voting which have not made the declaration referred to above. This Fund shall constitute a trust fund, in conformity with the provisions of the Financial Regulations of the Organization. Accordingly, I intend to submit to the General Assembly, for its information and comments, special Financial Regulations for the Fund on which, in accordance with Article 6, paragraphs 6 and 7 of Unesco's Financial Regulations, I shall report to the Executive Board of the Organization.

Being aware of your Organization's interest in Unesco's work relating to the protection of the cultural and natural heritage of mankind, I hope that it will be possible for you to send an observer to this first General Assembly of States.

This is in reply to your letter of June 8, 1976 (OPE/55/A-81) concerning the Unesco coupons program in which you ask whether the World Bank might be able to participate. Although we fully appreciate the objectives of the program, i.e. to facilitate the flow of educational, scientific and cultural materials to the developing countries, we regret that the answer to your inquiry, after careful consideration, has to be negative for the following three reasons.

Firstly, in financing its projects the Bank concentrates on their foreign exchange component. This requirement means that World Bank payments are mostly in currencies of countries exporting capital goods. Practically none of the countries listed on page 2 of your letter, two of which, Bulgaria and Mongolia, are not members of the World Bank, would fall into this category. Secondly, as a matter of operational policy, the Bank never converts currencies for its own account. It cannot take a position in any currency, even temporarily, without also absorbing the foreign exchange risk involved. For various reasons, the Bank has not done this in the past nor can it afford to take this risk in the future. Thirdly, in World Bank practice, the foreign exchange risk of any conversion is immediately passed on to the borrower for whose account the conversion is made and who has to bear the foreign exchange risk. Under our general conditions, we charge the borrower the market exchange rate applicable at the time of actual payment.

As you can see from the above, the World Bank is unable to assist in carrying out the Unesco coupon scheme. Should you have any further

specific questions concerning our policies as applicable to disbursements and cash management we would, of course, be glad to provide any further explanation you may wish to obtain.

Dear Werner:

This is in response to your letter of July 5 regarding the Madagascar education sector survey. You refer first to a suggested mission to Madagascar next September to review with Unesco the terms of reference of an education sector survey and indicate that Christiane Vaugrante would be joined by Dimitri Argyopoulos for three days at the end of that visit. You then refer to a possible Unesco/IBRD mission in November or December and ask whether I would like to participate in that mission together with persons from the East Africa Division. This introduces two confusions in my mind, at least in relation to what I thought we were talking about during our meeting in Paris on Monday, June 21.

First, I had understood from Christiane that the government had indicated a preference for a sector study to be conducted by them, with inputs of technical assistance from Unesco and/or the Bank. The way you refer to a "Unesco/IBRD mission in November or December" sounds more like the conventional parachute type mission with report writing by Unesco/IBRD. I wonder what the understanding is.

Second, I had thought the suggestion of my participation, if possible, was to be in the September visit setting up the operation and helping with the terms of reference rather than with the execution of the survey itself. I am referring to these particular cases since participation by people from the Education Department in your missions would in principle be very welcome.

In any case, as things appear to be shaping up at the moment, I could not participate in any Madagascar mission in November or December since my travel during those months is preempted by the IIEP Board Meeting in Bangkok and some other events. During the early fall (September/October) I will be in Aspen, Colorado, September 6-10 and, as it now looks, would be spending some time in both Khartoum and Nairobi in October in connection with their sector studies. Having already got involved in these I feel I should give them priority before adding additional jobs, much as I would like to participate in Madagascar. Visiting there in September is out of the question and even in October becomes increasingly conjectural.

Incidentally, I did not see Christiane Vaugrante or anybody in Dimitri's tentative travel schedule of July 5 listed for a visit to Sudan in October, which was the time we had expected them to be ready for another visit. Is this purely by accident?

I trust you will have received the copy of the translated Working Group No. 1 draft report for Sudan.

On the occasion of debates held at meetings of the Inter-Parliamentary Union, as well as in talks at Secretariat level between the United Nations and the Inter-Parliamentary Union, it was felt to be of the greatest interest both to the international organizations and to Parliaments for the activities of the United Nations and its Specialized Agencies to be better known and better understood by members of Parliament in the various countries of the world.

Dear Werner:

Yesterday I had the first meeting with the Division Chiefs since my return and I think it might be useful to pass on to you and Dimitri the outcome of our discussion on several points which he discussed with the Division Chiefs during his visit here.

First, on the question of how to meet the expenses of your staff when participating in Bank missions, I believe Dimitri and Pennisi had discussed this with possible reference to a forthcoming mission to Mauritius. This is a very complicated problem but we are all aware of the difficulties, particularly for hotels and subsistence, which are raised by joint missions. The point I would make, however, is that whatever changes we may agree to make cannot be made between EFD and one Regional Office alone, since they must be agreed with our Controller's office etc. It is understood here therefore that we will study the question and make some suggestions to you to improve the situation but that until then no changes will be made in particular cases.

Second, it appears that the impression Dimitri gained of Division Chiefs having no reservations about the completely free flow of supervision and completion reports to Unesco was not entirely correct. Their reactions are quite varied on the two types of documents. Most of the Divisions would not object to our sending the completion reports on a confidential basis. Some of the Divisions would not object to selective sending of supervision reports, while others feel that the reports tend to give a very partial and sometimes misleading picture when taken out of context of the whole project file. All of the Divisions agreed that your staff should be able to study the project file when they are here.

I am now looking ahead and trying to plan my activities for September and October, which promise to be busy months. I want especially to provide for your visit here, and therefore would like to know With cordial regards,

Participation

Article 9, paragraph 1, of the Statutes of the Union states:

"Conferences shall be composed of delegates nominated by the Groups. Each Group shall nominate a number of delegates equal to the number of votes to which it is entitled under Article 12."

The full text of Article 12 is annexed to this convocation.

Furthermore, various international organizations of an intergovernmental or inter-parliamentary nature, as well as the Palestine National Council, have been invited by the Inter-Parliamentary Council (117th session, London) to be represented at the Conference by observers.

Table of Allocation of Votes

A provisional table of allocation of votes is annexed to this convocation.

National Groups wishing to request a modification of the figures concerning them should so inform the Inter-Parliamentary Bureau in Geneva. The final table for the allocation of votes at the 63rd Inter-Parliamentary Conference will be distributed at the opening of the session.

Organization of the Debates

Steering Committee (cf. Conferences, Rule 8). — A Steering Committee will be set up, for the duration of the session, composed of the President of the Conference, the President of the Inter-Parliamentary Council and his substitute appointed in conformity with Rule 6 (2) of the Rules of the Executive Committee. This Steering Committee, which will be assisted by the Secretary General of the Union, will take all appropriate measures to ensure the effective organization and smooth functioning of the Conference proceedings.

Speaking-Time in Plenary Sessions (cf. Conferences, Rule 22). — For debates in plenary, no more than two representatives from each delegation may speak on the same item of the agenda, with a maximum speaking-time of 15 minutes if there are two speakers from the same Group, and 10 minutes if there is only one. The maximum time allowed for any speaker may not exceed 10 minutes. A delegation which submits one or more amendments to the draft resolutions under discussion will not be entitled to register an additional speaker or to exceed the above time-limits.

Amendments (cf. Conferences, Rules 16, 17 and 18). — Amendments to draft resolutions before the Conference must be submitted in writing and deposited with the Conference Secretariat twenty-four hours before the opening of the plenary session during which the relevant draft resolution is to be debated.

The Steering Committee shall determine whether or not amendments are in order. To be admissible, amendments must relate

directly to the text in question; they may only envisage an addition, a deletion or an alteration to the initial draft, without having the effect of changing its scope or nature.

In order to allow for a full discussion of those amendments recognized as admissible, the latter, after being introduced by their authors in plenary, will be referred to the competent Study Committee; the text of the draft resolution resulting from the deliberations of the Committee will be submitted to the Conference for decision.

Time-limits for the tabling of amendments to the draft resolutions submitted to the 63rd Conference by the Study Committees are as follows:

- (a) The setting up of a new international economic order: Friday, September 24, at 10 a.m.
- (b) The urgency of reducing tension in the world and of establishing international regulations on the trade in conventional weapons: Saturday, September 25, at 10 a.m.

No amendment may be tabled to the text of the draft resolution on item 7 of the agenda "Co-operation in the fields of education, science and culture, and further improvement of international relations", this item having been placed on the agenda of the Conference for vote without debate, in conformity with Conference Rule 14.

Moreover, since the item "The situation in southern Africa, with particular reference to Rhodesia" was included in the Conference agenda by the Council without prior consideration by a Study Committee, the Conference will have to decide on the procedure to be applied for the submission of draft resolutions and possible amendments.

Supplementary Draft Resolutions (cf. Conferences, Rule 12). — Paragraph 1 of Rule 12 lays down the conditions in which requests for the insertion of supplementary items in the agenda may be submitted to the Conference.

It would be desirable for any such requests to be communicated to the Conference Secretariat as soon as possible after the opening of the session, together with the relevant draft resolution.

Study Committees

All five Study Committees will meet in Madrid. Wednesday, September 29, and Thursday, September 30, have been set aside for this purpose.

Languages

There will be simultaneous interpretation, under the responsibility of the Inter-Parliamentary Bureau, into and from the two official languages of the Union, French and English, at the plenary Conference, as well as at the Council and Committee meetings. However, a delegate may, exceptionally, use another language provided he ensures the services of an interpreter capable of summarizing his speech in one or other of the above two languages.

Four other interpretation channels have been installed in the plenary chamber and have already been reserved by the Japanese and Soviet Groups, as well as by the Arabic and Spanish speaking Groups.

Place of Meeting

The Inaugural Ceremony will take place in the Cortes.

Plenary Conference sessions, as well as the meetings of the Inter-Parliamentary Council and the Study Committees, will be held in the *Palacio de Congresos y Exposiciones*.

Inter-Parliamentary Council

A special circular will be sent out convening the 119th session of the Inter-Parliamentary Council in Madrid. Meetings are scheduled for Wednesday, September 22, at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., and Friday, October 1, at 10 a.m., and will take place, as mentioned above, in the *Palacio de Congresos y Exposiciones*.

In accordance with Article 15 of the Statutes, each National Group shall designate, at least one month before the opening of the session, two of its members to sit on the Council, and shall make known their names to the Inter-Parliamentary Bureau which will communicate them to the Conference.

These designations are valid from the end of one Conference to the end of the next.

Executive Committee

The Executive Committee will meet in Madrid, before the opening of the Conference, on Tuesday, September 21, at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., in the *Palacio de Congresos y Exposiciones*. A further session of the Executive Committee is scheduled to take place, after the closure of the Conference, on Saturday, October 2, in the same place.

Association of Secretaries General of Parliaments

The Association will meet in Madrid, during the 63rd Conference, in the *Palacio de Congresos y Exposiciones*. It will be convened by its President, Mr. S. L. Shakdher.

Registration of Delegates

At the request of the Spanish Group, it has been decided to fix June 21 as the deadline for registration of delegates to the 63rd Inter-Parliamentary Conference.

It would be appreciated if all Groups could adhere strictly to this date and return to the Spanish Group, at the address given below, the registration form for delegates annexed to its invitation, indicating the names of the two Council members, the leader of the delegation and the member to be nominated as a Vice-President of the Conference in conformity with Rule 7 (2) of the Rules for Conferences. (c) Finally, Groups consisting of at least 50 per cent of the members of the Lower House of Parliament shall be entitled to one extra vote if that House has less than a hundred members; two extra votes if that House has a hundred members or more.

The Council, when summoning the Conference, shall inform the various Groups of the number of votes to which they are entitled.

If necessary, the members of each Group taking part in the Conference shall nominate those amongst them who are to exercise the right of voting. These nominations shall be made according to a system of proportional representation. No one member may record more than five votes.

I have the honour to inform you that, in conformity with the wish expressed by the General Conference at its eighteenth session (Approved Programme and Budget for 1975-1976, paragraph 2121), the Secretariat has been studying the possibility of convening an intergovernmental conference on strategies and policies in informatics (SPIN) in 1977.

This study having confirmed the need for and opportuneness of such a conference, provision for it has been included in the Draft Programme and Budget for 1977-1978 (document 19 C/5, paragraph 2128). If approved by the General Conference at its nineteenth session (Nairobi, October-November 1976), the conference will be organized jointly with the Intergovernmental Bureau for Informatics and is expected to be held in June 1977. Preparatory work has been started.

The objectives of the SPIN conference are:

- 1. To exchange experiences in strategies and policies in informatics, especially those aimed at ensuring the development of endogenous capacities and the optimal utilization of resources.
- 2. To identify ways and means whereby informatics can contribute to economic, social and cultural development, bearing in mind the particular needs of developing countries.
- 3. To clarify the prerequisites for the elaboration of strategies and policies at the national level.
- 4. To draw up a programme of action for international co-operation and assistance in the field of informatics.

Basic documentation for the conference is now being prepared and will be sent to you for prior study. A detailed programme of activities foreseen for the 1977 conference will also be sent to you as soon as possible.

Seminar on Social and Cultural Impact of Tourism. Case study on Tunisia's tourism region.

Referring to the above, I called today Mr. Bouchaud, foundermanager of Groupe-Huit 1/ in Tunis. I briefed him on the features of the planned seminar and on the preparatory work it requires. I mentionned that we had approached Mr. Smaoui to be a contributor to the seminar, that he had agreed and that he selected "Tourism and Employment in Tunisia" as topic for his paper. I mentionned also that werwere interested in obtaining a paper write-up on a case study that would show the attitudes and behavior of the local population in a region where tourism has steadily developed (e.g., Sousse) compared to the attitudes and behavior of the local population in a region where other activities have had prime responsibility for economic development (e.g., Sfax). Mr. Bouchaud agreed in principle on Groupe-Huit contributing to the seminar but asked to delay his definite decision for three days. I suggested to him that he get in touch with Mr. Smaoui and obtain copy of the letter and the enclosed terms of reference the Bank sent him on May 10, 1976. Mr. Bouchaud promised me to do so and to cable Groupe-Huit's final position by the week's end.

Subject: Consultation on the harmonization of Activities and Assistance
Programmes of the UN System and other International Organizations in Information System Development

I am pleased to inform you that, within the framework of the UNISIST Programme for co-operation in the field of scientific and technological information, Unesco is organizing a consultation with representatives of organizations of the United Nations system and international governmental and non-governmental organizations involved in assisting national and regional development of scientific and technological information infrastructures. It will be held at Unesco Headquarters in Paris from 6 to 8 September 1976.

This consultation comes within the programme approved by the General Conference at its eighteenth session in November 1974 and is in conformity with resolutions of the second session of the UNISIST Steering Committee, which met in Paris from 13 to 15 October 1975.

In preparing the meeting particular attention has been given, especially in regard to the content of the working papers, to the initiatives which are being taken by the United Nations General Assembly on the subject of scientific and technical information. It is felt that the results of this consultation could contribute towards the implementation of Resolution 3362 of the 7th Special Session of the UN General Assembly held in 1975, and could complement the work which is presently being carried out within the UN system on problems relating to the application of science and technology to development.

As you are aware the UNISIST Programme, launched in 1972 following an Intergovernmental Conference convened by Unesco, has among its principal aims the co-ordination of existing trends towards national and international co-operation in scientific and technical information activities with the ultimate goal of the establishment of a flexible and loosely connected network of information services, both national and international, based on voluntary co-operation. A number of international organizations are now involved in the development of information infrastructures in their particular fields of expertise, both at national and at regional levels. Some international organizations, at the same time, are developing specialized international information systems for which inputs are provided by designated national institutions. It is felt that the time is appropriate to explore the possibility of harmonizing the activities of these organizations at the national level and regional level and to identify areas where co-ordination might lead to a conservation of efforts and resources while providing at the same time a more concerted response to information needs, particularly those of developing countries.

- A recent letter from Mr. Amadou-Mahtar M'Bow of Unesco to Mr. McNamara has once more raised the question of whether the Bank would be prepared to consider financing the establishment of a Paper Bank to meet urgent educational, cultural, and communication needs during times of world paper shortage. This proposal has been examined before in the Bank and been found to lack merit for reasons set out below. Nevertheless, the problem of periodic paper shortages is real and does have an economic cost in that it hinders both social and industrial development. For this reason, the Bank should participate in the search for a realistic solution.
- The basic Paper Bank proposal has been worked out by a Swedish 2. consultant (Carl J. Bergendahl & Associates AB) and would involve setting up a fund of some \$160-180 million to finance additional inventories of newsprint and other printing and writing papers in the major producing countries. These stocks would ensure additional production capacity availability to supply developing countries during times of emergency created by cyclical world shortages of paper. The proposal does not envision setting up large physical stockpiles in any one location or that stocks earmarked specifically for developing countries be held. Rather it proposes that individual companies increase their normal inventories of normally-produced grades, that the cost of these incremental inventories be financed through loans from the fund, and that when the need arises, regular customers could be supplied from these augmented inventories while specific orders from developing countries are produced. The fund would be reimbursed at such times as this paper is sold. A board with representatives from various international agencies, from the developing countries and from producing countries would be set up to administer the fund.
- 3. At the request of Mr. Steuber of the Bank's Paris Office, this proposal was discussed within the Bank in October 1975. It was concluded at that time that the proposal had no merit principally because:
 - (a) The proposal would lead to financing of inventories in the producing (generally developed) countries who would therefore be the principal direct beneficiaries under the scheme;

Mrs. Boskey responded to Mr. M'Bow's letter on June 10 to the effect that the Bank was not prepared to support such an undertaking, but that we would give further thought to the question of feasible alternatives.

- (b) The trend towards higher prices is inevitable in view of diminishing available resources in the developed countries, and rapidly increasing capital costs. In the long run this should help developing countries, to a large extent because current prices are too low to justify investment anywhere in the world. Current prices are lower in real terms than they were in 1960.
- These arguments would seem to be valid. Moreover there is little to suggest that the size of additional inventory proposed (300,000 tons for newsprint; 150,000 tons for other printing and writing papers) would provide any material benefit insofar as price stability is concerned. Normal operating inventories are of the order of 6-7 percent of production which amounts to about 1 million tons of newsprint, and 2 million tons of other printing and writing papers. The proposed increases in inventory would be well within the normal range of inventory fluctuations experienced in the normal course of business.
- Bank would be unlikely to achieve its desired objectives, we cannot ignore the very real problems faced by developing countries in times of paper shortage. During 1973, for example, there were many instances of contracts being broken and purchasers being forced into spot markets where prices were as much as double the long-term international price. This is a real problem which can and has inhibited development programs in developing countries at some considerable economic cost.
- 6. The problem is greatly magnified by the distribution of production and consumption which sees approximately 95 percent of the world's paper produced and consumed in the developed countries. Thus, if (as seems to be the case) available supplies are generally allocated first to the larger and more stable developed country market, a 1 percent increase in demand in those countries could lead to as much as a 20 percent shortfall in supply to the developing countries.
- 7. The long-term solution is obviously to expand the production of paper in the developing countries and a good deal of our current project identification and preparation effort is being directed towards this end. In the short term however, we face a recurrence of the shortages which occurred in 1973, perhaps as early as 1977. It would therefore seem worthwhile to consider examining this problem in its broader sense, without limiting this examination to a review of the merits of a bank-financed fund to support expanded inventories of paper in the producing countries. Items to be considered include:

- (a) The paper bank concept; if it is not considered desirable for the bank to support greater inventories because the principal beneficiaries would be the developed country producer, perhaps the producing countries themselves should support such a concept. There are only about six countries which supply some 75 percent of the needs of the developing countries.
- (b) Other bilateral aid concepts; the main reason that paper shortages are so magnified in developing countries is one of allocation. Perhaps the producing countries could be encouraged to support some form of allocation process whereby the developing countries (with little purchasing clout) are not hit disproportionately hard during times of paper shortage.
- (c) Bank financing of imports during emergencies; perhaps the bank should adopt a policy of looking with favour at helping countries to finance paper imports (either separately or in conjunction with other imports) in anticipation of or during periods of paper shortage.
- (d) Involvement with other agencies; Unesco has an interest in this problem because a paper shortage may have an effect on educational and cultural development. FAO has an interest related to its activities in fostering forestry and forest industries in the developing countries. The recently formed FAO Pulp and Paper Industries Development Program is charged with looking at all aspects of the paper industry with a view to fostering development in the non-industrialized countries and this group is also concerned with the problem. After agreement has been reached within the Bank as to what role, if any, the Bank could play in alleviating the problem of cyclical paper shortages in developing countries, it would perhaps be desirable to respond positively to Unesco's request for a meeting on the subject in order that these views be clearly presented to the concerned agencies.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE 1976/77 ADVANCED TRAINING

PROGRAMME IN EDUCATIONAL PLANNING

AND ADMINISTRATION AT THE HEP

- 1. The International Institute for Educational Planning (IIEP) in Paris announces its Twelfth Annual Advanced Training Programme in educational planning and administration, to be held at the Institute from 15 September 1976 to 31 May 1977. It invites qualified candidates to submit their applications by 15 February 1976.
- 2. The Advanced Training Programme covers the design, implementation and evaluation of plans for the development of education. It is addressed to professionals who hold, or anticipate holding, responsible positions in the planning of their countries' educational system and in the training of other educational planning and administration personnel. Every effort is made to accommodate the specific background and training needs of the individual participant and his country. The Programme is integrally related to the Institute's research on major issues of educational planning.

Aims of the HEP Advanced Training Programme

- 3. As a bridge between scholarship and politics, planning requires the translation of knowledge into alternative courses of action. The Programme is therefore designed to enhance the professional competence of participants by dealing with both theoretical and practical aspects of the planning, implementation and evaluation of educational development programmes. In this kind of a training programme, the trainee should be able to develop:
- (a) An understanding of the relationship between economic growth, social change, political decisions and educational development;
- (b) an appreciation of the variety of assumptions about the aims and purposes of education which underlie, implicitly or explicitly, strategies for the development of educational systems;
- the ability to use effectively and critically some of the important methods and techniques of translating educational objectives into educational plans, of designing implementation strategies, and of adjusting educational plans in the light of on-going evaluation;

(d) the ability to identify, through individual study and seminar work, a significant planning problem which is relevant to the participant's country, to locate the body of knowledge that is relevant to its solution, and to utilize that knowledge in arriving at a solution which is both research-based and politically feasible.

Contents and Methods of the Programme

- 4. The Programme consists of a common core in which all participants are exposed to some of the basic concepts and methods in the field of educational planning and administration together with a large variety of optional components which trainees select, with the advice of the Institute's staff, in accordance with their specific training needs and the planning and development problems of their own countries.
- 5. The Programme is based on a broad notion of educational planning and administration and particular attention will be given to both the planning of qualitative aspects of education and the integration of national planning with planning at the sub-national (regional and local) level. In this sense, concerns with the planning of such educational aspects as curriculum and teacher training become important elements, in addition to the study of the more quantitative planning problems.
- 6. Prior to the beginning of the course, a special effort is made to ascertain in great detail the particular background, interest, and training needs of each participant. The final course programme will accommodate these specific needs as much as possible. Every participant will be a member of an on-going seminar headed by a staff member of the Institute. Within this seminar, the participant will be given individualized tutorial assistance and brought in closer contact with the Institute's research programme.
- 7. The interaction between the staff and the trainees, and between the trainees themselves, occurs in a variety of formats and settings. These will range from the more formal lecture, usually followed by an extensive discussion with the lecturer, to very informal small group sessions of the 'brainstorming' kind. In between, there will be round-table discussions, formal seminar work, practical exercises of various kinds, or more structured debates over specific policy propositions.
- 8. The Programme includes study missions both within France and in one or two other countries for the purpose of studying developments in educational planning and administration related to important components of the training programme.

Working arrangements

- 9. The training programme is conducted in English and French, and simultaneous interpretation is provided for lectures and group meetings. Fluency in reading, writing and speaking one of these two languages is an indispensable prerequisite for participation in the course.
- 10. Most of the training programme takes place in the IIEP's new headquarters in Paris, which have been built and equipped for the Institute by the Government of France. These facilities allow not only the accommodation of a larger number of trainees but also a much greater diversification of the Programme in response to individual and country needs.
- 11. Participants are provided with office space and typing facilities for their work. Participants are expected to devote full time to their programme; the intensity of the Programme is such that no part-time arrangement is feasible.
- 12. Participants in the Programme have at their disposal the Institute's library and specialized collections of documents on educational planning and administration. They are asked to contribute to the continued development of these collections by bringing up-to-date documentary and statistical material on their own countries when they arrive. Arrangements can also be made to use other libraries and archives in Paris, at Unesco, OECD and various French institutions.
- 13. The Institute is not in a position to provide living accommodations but tries to assist participants in locating appropriate quarters.

Time Schedule

14. All participants are expected to arrive at the IIEP on or before 15 September 1976 and to remain until the end of the course, on 31 May 1977. There are two vacation periods: Christmas and Easter.

Qualifications for Admission

15. The Institute is committed to provide the best possible training programme and to give each participant all necessary attention and assistance. Given the limited staff resources of the Institute, this requires a strict limitation in the number of participants. The number of places for the 1976/77 Programme is limited to a maximum of 40 participants, and admission is on a competitive basis. The applicant's academic and professional background as well as his career prospects are the major factors in the selection process. Having undergone a prior training course in educational planning and administration at one of the Unesco Regional Education Offices is considered to be a particular asset. Applicants who are involved or are likely to become involved in programmes for the training of personnel in educational planning and administration in their home countries are given special consideration.

- 16. All applicants are required to meet the following conditions:
- A university degree or its equivalent with a strong academic record. Preference is given to candidates with graduate training in a field appropriate to educational planning and administration (such as sociology, economics, public administration, political science, etc.).
- (b) An extended period (i. e. not less than two years) of relevant professional experience in administrative, research or teaching roles related to problems of educational planning and administration.
- Previous training in educational planning and administration. The HEP course is not designed to be a person's first systematic training experience in educational planning and administration. It is therefore desirable that candidates should have participated in previous training at a Unesco Regional Education Office or in comparable training at another institution.
- Language competence. To benefit from the course it is essential that candidates read, write and speak fluently either English or French.

 Language competence is thus a condition for admission and a language certificate is required for candidates whose mother tongue is neither English nor French.
- Career prospects. The Institute requires the applicant's written assurance that he or she intends to pursue a career in educational planning and administration or related fields upon completion of the Programme. A commitment to employ the candidate's services in an appropriate capacity upon completion of his training is also requested of the candidate's government or, where appropriate, another prospective employing institution.
- References. At the time of his application, the candidate must arrange for two letters of reference to be sent to the Director of the IIEP by persons familiar with his professional competence, preferably a national or international official, university professor or senior educational administrator. In addition to these two, the applicant should name at least one other reference in his application. No application is considered unless these letters have been received.
- Statement of interest. In considering applications, a great deal of importance is attached to the candidate's statement of his or her specific interests in the field of educational planning and administration, and on how the candidate sees the course contribute to the specific development tasks which the candidate faces in his or her own country. This statement should be prepared with great care and should be between one and three pages long.
- 17. All applications for the Programme are reviewed by the Institute's Selection Committee which consists of members of the Institute's staff and representatives of the Unesco Secretariat. The Committee advises the Director on admissions with as much regard as possible to the geographic distribution of trainees.

Scholarships

18. The IIEP is not in a position to offer fellowships to cover travel and maintenance of participants in the Programme. Thus, a participant or his sponsor must either meet those costs directly or alternatively secure a fellowship from some appropriate source. For candidates from developing countries who meet the relevant criteria, such a source could be the UNDP Technical Assistance Country Programme provided it includes funds for educational planning fellowships. The Institute's admission decision is independent of a candidate's prospects for funding, but it will make every effort to assist successful applicants in identifying possible sources of fellowship or support.

Application Procedures

- 19. In seeking highly-qualified candidates for its Advanced Training Programme, the Institute invites nominations from all Member States of Unesco. Persons who may be in a position to propose promising candidates are invited to bring their names to the attention of the Institute and of the appropriate national authorities (National Commission for Unesco, Ministry of Education, etc.).
- 20. Completed applications, on forms supplied by the IIEP, must reach the Institute not later than 15 February 1976, accompanied by a statement of what steps are being taken to secure appropriate funding for the applicant in the event of his or her being admitted. It should be noted that, in the interest of fair selection and early notification of applicants, the Institute does not assume any responsibility for reviewing and deciding upon applications received after the February 15 deadline. Such applications may have to be postponed until the 1977/78 academic year.
- 21. Candidates will be notified not later than 1 May 1976 whether they have been accepted, not accepted or placed on the waiting list. Successful candidates must inform the Institute not later than 1 June 1976 of their intention to accept a place in the Programme, of their funding arrangements and their expected date of arrival in Paris. From the month of June onwards, candidates on the waiting list will be considered when an accepted candidate resigns his place.

Dear Mr. M'Bow:

I am replying to your letter of May 11 to Mr. McNamara (DG/4/FCP/143) with which was enclosed a copy of a study by Carl Bergendahl, entitled "A Cultural Paper Reserve Scheme", calling for the establishment of a reserve inventory of cultural paper to be financed out of a central fund. You invited the World Bank to consider the possibility of convening a meeting to explore the feasibility and possible financing of the scheme.

The Bank, on its own initiative, gave careful consideration to the Bergendahl proposal toward the end of 1975. The conclusion reached was that it was not an undertaking which the Bank would be prepared to support. There were three principal reasons for the negative reaction. One is that the proposal would lead to financing of inventories in the producing (generally the developed) countries, which would therefore be the principal direct beneficiaries. A second is that the trend toward higher prices, which is inevitable given the diminishing available resources in the developed countries and rapidly rising capital costs, will in the long run help developing countries. This is largely because it can be expected that additional production capacity will to an increasing extent be installed in those countries. Finally, there is little to suggest that the size of additional inventory proposed would provide any material benefit insofar as concerns price stability; the increases are well within the normal range of inventory fluctuations experienced in the ordinary course of business.

At the same time, we fully appreciate and would not wish to ignore the very real problems faced by developing countries in times of paper shortages, and the fact that such shortages impose a serious economic cost by impeding industrial and social development in those countries. We are also aware that the problem is magnified by current patterns of distribution and consumption, under which approximately 95% of the world's paper is produced and consumed in the developed countries. The long-term solution is, we believe, to expand the production of paper in the developing countries, and the Bank is devoting considerable project identification and preparation effort to this end.

For the shorter term, we would like to give some further thought here to the question whether there may be some feasible alternatives to the approach put forward in the Bergendahl study, and, if so, to the question of what role, if any, the Bank might play in alleviating the problem of cyclical paper shortages in developing countries. Therefore, while we think it would not be useful to convene a meeting for the specific and limited purpose of discussing the implementation of the Bergendahl scheme, we thank you for bringing the problem again to our attention. When our own thinking has crystalized, we shall be in touch with Unesco again.

Unesco Coupons Programme

May I seek your kind assistance in finding a way to help some countries with non-convertible currencies to obtain Unesco Coupons against payment in local currencies.

To explain simply, this operation would mean that the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development would inform us of its capacities to utilize local currencies of some countries, and we would provide the countries concerned with Unesco Coupons equivalent in value to the amounts accepted by you. Subsequently, you would give a credit to Unesco in United States dollars against the amount of local currencies thus received by you.

The Unesco Coupons Programme at present covers approximately 80 countries and over US\$10,000,000.00 worth of Coupons are now issued annually. Since the inception of the Programme over 20 years ago approximately US\$130,000,000.00 worth of Coupons have been issued. The main purpose of the Programme is to facilitate a freer flow of educational, scientific and cultural materials needed by countries. A special consideration is accorded to the requirements of the developing countries to obtain Unesco Coupons by means of payment in local currencies, thereby enabling them to acquire much needed materials relating to the fields of competence of Unesco against their national currencies.

In most of the participating countries the Distributive Body for the administration of the Unesco Coupons Programme is the National Commission for Cooperation with Unesco. However, we leave it to the discretion of a participating country as to what institution should be entrusted with this task. For your further information I am enclosing a booklet which describes the Unesco Coupons Programme operation in brief.
