SUBJECT: Mr. Conable's visit to the UK, France and Germany
(October 19-25, 1986)

1. This memorandum summarizes the salient points discussed at the official meetings Mr. Conable had during his visit to Europe. Mr. Qureshi and I attended the meetings.

UNITED KINGDOM

2. Meeting with Minister Patten

- . IIED seminar on environment. Mr. Patten mentioned that "The Observer" article on October 19 would have been more disagreeable to the Bank had he and Mr. Tickell not intervened. Mr. Conable said that things had gone badly but had been straightened out; he would make sure that the Bank would not censor studies on the environmental impact of projects.
- . IDA 8. Status discussed. Mr. Patten was encouraged by the special UN session on Africa which signalled a move from Tanzanian socialism to a more pragmatic philosophy. The scale of adjustment needed by Africa was such that more aid was required. Mr. Conable commented that Africa would need the Bank to finance infrastructure as well as structural adjustment, and to ensure coordination.
- . GCI. Status discussed. Mr. Patten expressed support and said that British politics, initially anti-aid, had changed because public opinion had been influenced by TV and Church pressure. The people did not understand the difference between multilateral and bilateral aid but were impressed by the images of hunger or large dams. He could sell backing of the Bank if bilateral aid went up at the same time. The aid budget was under discussion with the Treasury and faced political constraints because of the claims of Lome 3 and of commercial pressure to use the aid budget as a slush fund.

Mr. Conable said that the UK was doing well with procurement under Bank/IDA projects. The Arabs were not getting contracts in exchange of their contributions and some graduated countries were no longer willing to pay for Bank technical assistance. UAE was reluctant to contribute to IDA 8; Mr. Patten promised to enlist the help of the Foreign Secretary.

- . Bank effectiveness. In response to Mr. Patten's query about his plans, Mr. Conable said that he had no evidence of inefficiency and was anxious not to be disruptive. However, the Bank had not been reorganized since 1972 and there was expectancy as well as a window of opportunity for change. Consultants were looking at the issue; the budget, among others, should be a presidential function although the allocation of resources should be responsive to the Governors.
 - . Senior staff. Mr. Patten expressed the wish that the Bank should consider a British candidate when David Knox retires. Mr. Conable responded that he could not consider slots as assigned to specific countries and would have to fit talents and slots. The UK had also Sir William Ryrie who was doing a good job although IFC had not reached its full potential.
 - . Miscellaneous. Mr. Patten said he was planning to visit Washington before long. He was involved in the Aspen Institute with Senator Bradley and Gary Hart. Mr. Conable commented that the Bradley plan was a problem for the Bank. Debt forgiveness would not encourage new flows to developing countries and the Bank could not be perceived as bailing out commercial banks. The Baker initiative was much preferable.
3. Meeting with Mr. Leigh-Pemberton (Bank of England)
- . Nigeria. Mr. Leigh-Pemberton referred to the bridging loan the Bank of England had arranged in connection with the Bank's economic reform loan to Nigeria. He expressed "indignation" about the obstacles the US Treasury had raised before the package was put together. In contrast, the Germans had been impressed by the "quality of the club" dealing with Nigeria and supported the bridging loan. He mentioned that some Nigerian high officials' lives were at risk when they backed IMF's views on economic reforms.
 - . Yugoslavia. Mr. Conable mentioned the difficulties faced in applying the Baker initiative. There had been too much devolution of power in Yugoslavia which had pulled out from a SAL.
 - . Poland. Doubts expressed about their creditworthiness and government efficiency.

4. Meeting with Sir Shridath Ramphal (Commonwealth Secretariat)

- . Conditionality. Mr. Ramphal mentioned that his staff had prepared a study on conditionality. He was chiefly concerned about cross-conditionality between the Bank and IMF. He stressed the need for the Bank to get close to political leadership in developing countries - not only to Finance Ministers - in order to fully understand the constraints that countries were facing as regards the economic adjustment programs recommended by the Bank.
- . Technical assistance. Mr. Ramphal indicated his desire to cooperate with the Bank in technical assistance programs (e.g. in health, transfer of skills). He underlined the needs of small countries which could be met through sub-contracting with the Commonwealth Secretariat if the cost of direct Bank staff involvement was too high.
- . "South conference". Mr. Ramphal referred to the need for LDCs to review by themselves their development record as recommended in the Brandt report. A "South conference" of some 20 statesmen was planned in the next few months under the chairmanship of Mr. Nyerere and with the help of Mr. Mohathir (Malaysia).

FRANCE

5. Meeting with Prime Minister Chirac

- . GCI. Mr. Chirac expressed support.
- . IDA 8. Mr. Chirac expressed the wish that Africa's share be 50%. Mr. Conable said that it would have to be slightly lower in order to accommodate India and China.
- . Bank/IMF relations. Mr. Chirac said they should be closer. Mr. Conable replied that his relations with Mr. de Larosière were quite close and that there were no current difficulties. The two institutions were complementary and should resist the temptation to compete. The Mexican deal illustrated what they could achieve through cooperation. If the deal had not been concluded (despite resistance in the Mexican administration to Mr. de La Madrid's reforms) the Baker initiative would have failed.
- . Egypt. Mr. Chirac said that France supported a special effort for Egypt, similar to the one made for Mexico. He had spoken to Mrs. Thatcher and Mr. Kohl on the subject. The Egyptian population was poor and the political situation unstable. Mr. Conable replied that Egypt had not yet decided to reform and that bilateral aid undercut

efforts to reform. Coordination was badly needed as it was throughout Africa. He asked Mr. Chirac to encourage Egyptian leaders to start changing basic policies to which Mr. Chirac responded that they could not exceed certain limits. Mr. Qureshi commented that President Mobarak should be advised to raise these limits (e.g. on energy prices which were much lower than world prices) so that his efforts should sound credible. Mr. Chirac, who is a close friend of Mr. Mobarak, said that the decline in standards of living and the rise of Islamic fundamentalism were serious issues as evidenced by the recent riot of policemen. Egypt faced a psycho-political problem ever since the Khedive's debt which made it difficult for its leaders to accept foreign interference or to go to the Paris Club. If agreement was reached with the IMF, there would be a need for a "secret" meeting to deal with the debt problem.

- . Other countries were mentioned. Mr. Chirac had spoken to the King of Morocco where the problems were easier than in Egypt. Zaïre remained difficult. Ivory Coast did not face problems of the same magnitude. Mr. Conable said that the Bank could help in all these countries but needed stabilization and exchange rate adjustments to be effective.
- . Bank efficiency. Mr. Chirac said it could be increased, delays in loan processing were too long. However, he was confident that Mr. Conable would improve the organization and he favored an increase in the Bank's budget to enable it to fully play its role. Mr. Conable outlined his plan for a review of the organization.
- . Senior staff. Mr. Chirac said that, since Mr. Dherse had left the Bank, France would appreciate having one Vice-President. Mr. Conable recognized that France had an inadequate representation but hoped that the French Government would remain flexible until the organization study was completed. He would consult the Government before any decision since its continued support was extremely important.
- . Mr. Conable's trips. He mentioned that he was planning to visit Latin America and Africa. Mr. Chirac advised that, in view of jealousy between countries, Mr. Conable should choose carefully the countries he visited. In francophone Africa, Ivory Coast should come first as Mr. Houphouët-Boigny was the eldest statesman; Congo-Brazzaville (close friend of France) should come next as current head of OAU.
- . IMF. Mr. Chirac mentioned that there had been fair play in the EEC regarding the choice of Mr. de Larosière's successor (7 countries for Mr. Ruding, 5 for Mr. Camdessus). Latin America was likely to back Mr. Camdessus. The US and Japan had not yet taken a position.

LINDA

6. Meeting with Foreign Affairs Minister Raimond

- . Relations with the Bank. Mr. Raimond explained that the Ministry of Cooperation was responsible for French aid to Africa whereas Foreign Affairs dealt with aid in the rest of the world and followed closely global Bank activities. He outlined France's priority objectives in the Bank, namely: - to improve its representation in positions of responsibilities; - more flexibility in procedures; - more non-project financing. IDA and GCI were discussed as well as the Bank's organization.
- . Poland. Mr. Raimond referred to the serious debt crisis in Poland. In his previous capacity as Ambassador to that country, he had ascribed the crisis to the economic policy followed before 1979 and to the fact that reforms had never been implemented rather than to the political events in 1980-81.
- . USSR. As Ambassador to Moscow, he had seen evidence that the USSR was not only seeking cooperation with the West but also questioning its own economic system. When President Mitterrand visited Moscow Mr. Gorbachev had spent half of the time at one of their meetings discussing the IMF which he presented in a "rustic" way (instrument of capitalist countries) while trying to elicit Mr. Mitterrand's views on the institution. He felt that the USSR was genuinely interested in exploring membership.
- . Other countries. Yugoslavia suffered from vacuum of leadership. North Africa and Egypt faced a difficult economic situation; Mr. Conable said that France should encourage economic reforms.

7. Meeting with Minister of Cooperation Aurillac

- . French aid. Mr. Aurillac mentioned that French aid in the 1986 budget would amount to FF 26 billion (0.52% of GNP) and would increase to FF 27 billion in 1987 (0.54% of GNP). 85% would go to Africa, with direct budget aid (and an increase in grants in comparison to loans) to the poorest countries whereas North Africa would receive aid from the Treasury.
- . Coordination. Mr. Aurillac said that the Bank was essential for aid effectiveness and that he sought close coordination with multilateral and bilateral donors, sharing equally with France (one third each) aid to Africa. Consultative groups and round tables were the key to harmonize the various aid programs. The Bank had increased the Africans' awareness of the need for adjustment and helped France make them understand that aid must be conditional.

He was also trying to shift from official aid to private investment; the latter was helped by a bureau in his ministry. He already had a conference with 250 private firms (who had lots of money but were "afraid") and was planning another one of French and African investors in January in Libreville. Mr. Conable pledged to cooperate with France and to help spur investment by the private sector, the seedbed of progress and leadership.

- . Cotton Chad. Mr. Aurillac expressed concern at the Bank's position on this project in which it wanted to dissociate new investments from the large arrears (Francs CFA 40 billion) owed by Cotton Chad to local banks. It was suggested that Cooperation should raise the matter with the Region at HQ.

8. Dinner with Finance Minister Balladur

- . Mr. Conable had a private meeting with Mr. Balladur (attended by Mr. Qureshi).
- . At the dinner, Mr. Trichet (who continues to head the Paris Club in addition to his functions as Director of Cabinet) mentioned that it would be increasingly difficult for the Bank to refuse to consider rescheduling for its loans.

9. Meeting with Director of the Treasury Lebegue

- . Bank organization. In response to questions raised by Mr. Lebegue, Mr. Conable outlined his plans for a study of the Bank's structure and his decision to freeze the total number of staff members in the next three years while allowing for redeployment. He mentioned the problem of salaries on which a decision would need to be taken by December, in keeping with the Kafka system. Both he and Mr. Qureshi stressed the need to maintain parallelism between the Bank and the Fund on salaries; there were already substantial differences on travel policy.
- . Role of EDs. Mr. Conable said that Mrs. Ploix was playing a very constructive role in the Board. He stressed the importance of EDs in preserving the institutional memory of the Bank and in providing him with sound judgment.
- . Maintenance of value of Bank capital. Mr. Lebegue expressed concern at the recent decision on the subject. Mr. Conable said that this was a compromise to put to rest a long-standing issue of principle but that it was not to be implemented.

10. Luncheon hosted by Mr. Camdessus at the Bank of France

- Wide ranging discussion. Mr. Roland-Billecart (Central Fund for Economic Cooperation) expressed concern at the position taken by several Bank missions (and by Mr. Thalwitz) on the negative impact the Franc Zone may have on certain African countries. It was suggested that the issue did not relate to the Franc Zone per se, which was extremely beneficial to its African countries, but to the exchange rate between the French Franc and the Franc CFA. This matter concerned primarily the IMF.

11. Meeting with President Mitterrand

- Bank activities. Mr. Mitterrand said that he would be concerned by any decision tending to reduce the Bank's ability to intervene in developing countries. IDA at \$ 12 billion, as contemplated at the Tokyo Summit, was at the right level. The industrial world was not engaged in a global development policy because of "humanism" but in its own interest. The crisis of developing countries is ours; we need to help them define priorities, select intelligent investments, reach self-sufficiency in food and energy, avoid excessive price variations (e.g. for sugar). Otherwise, the gap between North and South would become more dangerous than the atomic bomb. He viewed Mr. Conable as a sort of Minister of war against poverty. He would make sure that the Bank was protected and expanded.
- Debt. Mr. Mitterrand felt that the principle of debt repayment must be preserved; it would be a moral and financial failure if creditors did not get their money back. However, they should not strangle debtors and would need to adjust maturities and terms and consider substitutions. Brazil was producing more and receiving less; this is how revolutions are made. In Egypt, where he agreed with Mr. Conable that the price of energy should be raised, the same could not be done with food lest this led to riots as had been the case in Morocco; he would speak to President Mobarak.

12. Meeting with Minister of Economic Cooperation Warnke

- . GCI. Mr. Warnke mentioned that German journalists had been strongly critical of his statement in Washington that the sustainable level of lending could be exceeded temporarily as this would affect the Bank's AAA rating. He urged that this be clearly a temporary arrangement.
- . German aid would include a small component for genuine program aid and adjustment in 1987.
- . Role of women. Mr. Warnke followed with interest the Bank's work on women in development and asked to be kept informed of the outcome.
- . Egypt needs drastic reforms and a consultative group meeting.
- . Chile. The Federal Republic is opposed to a postponement of the second SAL.
- . Somalia. Will follow the Bank's advice on the Bardhere dam.
- . El Salvador. Mr. Warnke expressed the wish that the Bank resumes lending for 2 years; he would be prepared to cooperate and lend for reconstruction. Mr. Conable mentioned that the Bank was considering affecting to earthquake reconstruction a \$ 10 million loan for education unused since 1979 and to make an additional loan.
- . Bangladesh. Mr. Warnke expressed concern at the competition between donors and at the lack of disbursement on commodity aid; these issues should be dealt with by the consultative group.

14. Meeting with Finance Minister Stoltenberg
(attended also by Mr. Warnke and State Secretary Tietmayer)

- . German aid. Mr. Stoltenberg confirmed that some German bilateral aid would be used for adjustment lending but would in no way be a source of easy money. The bulk of aid would remain for projects.
- . Cofinancing. Mr. Stoltenberg asked whether cofinancing with risk sharing by the Bank (i.e. with Bank guarantee as in the Mexican package) would be frequently repeated. Mr. Conable said that this would be limited to the special cases where the guarantee would be necessary to nail down deals; it had not been so for Nigeria.
- . Cooperation with Regional banks. Mr. Stoltenberg had the impression that the Bank was facing problems in this field, e.g. with IDB. Mr. Conable replied that regional banks were not conditional enough and undercut the Bank's leverage.
- . IDA. It was recognized that Germany's additional contribution did put pressure on Japan to follow suit but Mr. Qureshi pointed out that Japan did not want to take over the US burden although it had enough in its aid budget. Mr. Stoltenberg mentioned that Japan was very much concerned by the new directions and slower growth in its economy and by its large deficit due to a low tax rate.
- . German tax reform. Mr. Stoltenberg mentioned that his first priority, after the January elections, would be to introduce a comprehensive tax reform with an improved structure and lower tax rates. Mr. Conable urged him not to reduce incentives for foreign investments by German firms which were badly needed for the transfer of technology and skills and for educating domestic investors in developing countries (education, the ultimate social welfare system and the great equalizer). Mr. Stoltenberg pointed out that foreign investment had slowed down, e.g. in Latin America, because of the debt problem and price fixing.

- . Chile. Mr. Stoltenberg had discussed the second SAL with other ministries and agreed that the decision should not be politicized.
 - . Egypt. Mr. Conable asked that Germany be supportive of the adjustment sought by the Bank, which wanted to be able to develop a program in Egypt. Mr. Stoltenberg agreed and pointed out that Germany was taking some risks with its own export credits.



SUBJECT Your meetings in France

Due to Helene Ploix' absence from Washington, I have not been able to sit down with her and discuss what issues specifically interest the French authorities. However, from my discussions with the French officials at the Annual Meetings, here are their principal bugaboos:

1) Africa: The French want the Bank to do much more in Africa -- provide both more money and more support for policy reform. The staunch support for Africa has two practical ingredients. The French are keen to have someone else take up a part of the burden of aid to former French Africa which, in the main, they have shouldered in the past. Second, the French are now convinced that without comprehensive policy change, more aid to AID will merely go down the drain and they agree that the Bank can be a more effective agent for policy change in Africa.

The French are also very interested that these objectives be accomplished without damaging French business, financial, and political interests, which are strongly entrenched in French Africa.

2) Debt: The French strongly support the Baker Plan and would like the Bank to proceed more expeditiously in this area.

The French are very sensitive to the role of the Paris Club which is chaired by a French Treasury official. (The Paris Club is the body that renegotiates "official" as distinct from "private" debt -- i.e. mostly export credits.) This gives the French Government a major voice in debt restructuring exercises for official credits. They do not want to lose this primary position. They have felt that the Bank has a tendency to make suggestions and to prescribe solutions for debt restructuring that could constrain the freedom of action of the Paris Club. They have been wary about World Bank participation in these meetings.

3) Personnel: You are aware of the French desire to have a Frenchman appointed to a senior management position on the Operations side. During the Annual Meetings, I pointed out the impropriety of the manner in which this request was made. I pointed out to the French officials that their desire to have a senior Frenchman appointed in the Bank was understandable, however it is not for them to say who the person should be or where he should be appointed. The French officials drew my attention to the unfortunate case of Jean-Louis Dherse and said that the way in which that matter was handled still rankled, but they promised to speak to the Minister about the issue.

4) GCI: They will ask you what you have in mind. They will also ask how you can help in increasing the French share in IBRD.

SUBJECT Your meetings in London

I have discussed with Tim Lankester your schedule of meetings in London. He and I agree that your meeting with Mrs. Thatcher should be on a "one-on-one" basis. That is the format that she likes best, and both of us believe that the best environment for your meeting would be one in which she can talk to you as one "politician" to another. However, please note that it is customary for her Private Secretary to be present even at "one-on-one" meetings, to take notes. Her Private Secretary is Nigel Wicks, who is an ex-Bank Executive Director and a good friend of ours. About 45 minutes have been slotted for your meeting with the P.M.

I sat down with Tim Lankester to go over some of the points that are likely to be of special interest to the British leaders. Please use these points to seek further explanations from Tim during your meeting with him on Tuesday, October 14.

Meeting with the Prime Minister:

The main points she is likely to be interested in are the following:

1) Agriculture: Mrs. Thatcher has been consistently interested in agricultural issues. The British position in the Common Market also lends a particular significance to this area. The point to be emphasized is our effort to put agriculture on a sound and competitive basis in the developing countries, in part by insisting on the elimination of price distortions, subsidies and the like, that inhibit the functioning of the market system.

2) Support for Policy Reform and Adjustment: You should highlight the increasing emphasis we are giving to support for policy reform and adjustment programs in Latin America and Africa. You should draw the P.M.'s attention to the political difficulties and resistance that many governments are meeting in undertaking necessary policy changes, the sensitivity of advice in that area, and the central role the Bank can play as an interlocutor, adviser, and a catalyst. She should also be told of the important shifts towards privatization, deregulation, and market orientation that most Bank-supported programs help bring about.

3) IFC: You should talk to her about IFC as an organization. (Please remember that Bill Ryrle was not a favorite person of her's. She is aware that he heads IFC.) Therefore it may be advisable to let her bring up Bill's name rather than for you to do so.

4) Africa: In talking about adjustment programs in Africa, it would be useful to mention Nigeria. You should thank her for the contribution that the British have made in putting together the Nigerian program. (The Bank of England made a bridge loan.) Incidentally, she does not think that governments or international institutions should put pressure on the commercial banks to provide "new money". She believes that there is a "moral hazard" involved in such a posture.

Mrs. Thatcher could bring up the issue of South Africa with you and ask your views on sanctions -- in particular, the impact that the imposition of sanctions would have on countries such as Zambia, with which the Bank has an adjustment program. As you know, she has been unalterably opposed to sanctions against South Africa.

5) Internal Administration of the Bank: She, together with some other leaders you will meet, do have an impression that the Bank is a somewhat overblown bureaucracy. You should tell her the steps you are taking to come to grips with this issue.

6) Other points: Please note that one of her very favorite persons is Alan Walters. He works in the Bank. You might say that he is doing well. She is also interested in Bob Geldorf. She believes that Geldorf reflects the altruism of young people -- which should be channelled into constructive endeavours -- and she admires his activities in raising funds for Africa.

Meeting with the Chancellor of the Exchequer:

1) Capital Increase: We have some ground to make up with the Chancellor. I am told that he got the impression that you were being "evasive" on the issue of capital increase and IDA but, in particular, the former. The Chancellor considers himself to be a "friend" and to be strongly in the Bank's camp, and felt that you could have been more candid with him.

I would suggest that you tell him that you would prefer to go with the capital increase in April 1987, but that you have discussed this with Baker and have been unable to convince him to proceed in April, because he is afraid that, in that event, disaster could befall us on both IDA and the GCI. In these circumstances, you are prepared to wait -- but not later than the fall of 1987. You would like the Chancellor to be as helpful as he can in supporting such a strategy with Baker.

2) Support for Adjustment: Please mention Nigeria and thank him for the British support. Also please note the completion of the Mexican deal. The Chancellor does not want the Bank to provide guarantees. Please tell him you share his views on guarantees but that you need a card up your sleeve in very exceptional circumstance to bring a critical debt negotiation to a close.

3) Agriculture: He too is interested in this area. Please note that he insisted on getting a reference to this issue in the Communique of the Development Committee.

4) Bank Administration: Same as for the P.M.

SUBJECT Meetings in Germany

Here is what Gerhard Boehmer and I have been able to put together concerning your meetings in Germany, which you may wish to use as a basis for further discussions with Boehmer.

Meetings with Minister Warnke:

1) Role of the Bank and the strategy with indebted countries: Minister Warnke would like to hear from you on how you envisage the Bank's strategy in meeting the problems of indebted countries, i.e. the implementation of the Baker Plan. He also shares the general reluctance with respect to guarantees. You might make the same points with him, stressing the need for exceptions.

2) IDA: You recall his response in the Development Committee for an "additional contribution". The Germans have not decided on a specific amount. Please do not ask him about the amount, just a brief "thank you" would be in order.

3) Budget: Warnke, too, is seized with the idea that the Bank ought to be a leaner institution. I think the point to be made to him is that you are looking into this area; you do intend to take this function into your own office and he should have confidence that you will sort this matter out in due course.

4) Personnel: While the Germans are very well represented at all levels of the Bank, there are increasing difficulties in recruiting young Europeans, including Germans. Minister Warnke may not mention this subject at all, but if he does, he will likely hint that in case you need some senior people from Germany, he could be of assistance in identifying the right kind of people.

5) Women in development: Warnke was struck by your reference to this particular issue in your Annual Meetings speech. He is likely to ask you what specific actions you have in mind.

6) Role of the Bank in the GATT Round: The main subject is, of course, familiar but he might turn to the question that was raised by Anne Kreuger as to whether the Bank should provide "advisory services" to developing countries to assist them in their negotiations in Geneva. (I personally would hope we do not!)

Meeting with Minister Stoltenberg:

1) Role of the Bank: He, too, would like your ideas regarding the future role of the Bank. In addition to the points mentioned above, Stoltenberg is particularly interested in the issue of Bank/Fund Collaboration (you should confirm that it now works well). Stoltenberg might be interested in some typical areas of possible conflict between the two institutions (e.g. budget deficits, exchange rates). You should confirm that differences in emphasis and approach between the two institutions exist and this is both natural and healthy -- given our emphasis on development and the Fund's emphasis on achieving stability as quickly as possible. In these circumstances there must be, and are, differences of view at the operating level from time to time -- these are now sorted out on a continuing basis.

Stoltenberg might also want to know about Bank conditionality. He had an impression that the Bank sometimes "gives money away". He should be assured that the Bank conditionality in SAL's and other policy-oriented loans, though different from that of the Fund is complementary in nature and is also frequently more comprehensive and detailed than in the case of IMF programs.

2) Other points: Stoltenberg will also have a greater interest in monetary and trade issues than Warnke. He would be interested in hearing about your visit to Punte del Esta. He may seek your views regarding the impact of international monetary and exchange rate developments on the economic situation of developing countries.

Meeting with the Parliamentary Committee

You should know that there are two members of the "Green Party" on the Committee. The more radical elements in the Committee are also usually the most vocal. They are likely to ask you some of the questions which were previously raised by them in the context of hearings on the Bank/Fund which were conducted by the Committee earlier this year. (A copy of these questions will be provided to you). The members of the Committee will want to know about the Bank's strategy regarding adjustment and debt. Their main thrust is likely to be:

(a) is there a development orientation to Bank adjustment programs?

(b) what are the social aspects and implications of adjustment programs?

(c) issues concerning environment and population.

SUBJECT: President's Trip to Europe

1. There are two time periods this fall which would best accommodate the President's desire to visit Europe.
2. First choice would be the week of October 20. If this week was decided upon I would presume that Mr. and Mrs. Conable would leave Washington on a Friday evening or Saturday (October 17 or 18).
