STAFF ANNOUNCEMENT

Because of the increasing importance and complexity of the World Bank's financial operations, certain changes are being made in the Bank's financial complex to strengthen its organization and management.

The following promotions and organizational changes will become effective August 1, 1980:

- (a) Mr. Massaya Hattori will serve as Vice President and Controller. Mr. Hattori, a Japanese national, joined the Bank in 1972 following many years of service in the international banking field. His first position in the Bank was as a Senior Adviser in the Western Africa Department. In 1974 he moved to the Office of the Vice President, Finance, as a Senior Adviser and in 1977 he was appointed Controller. Mr. Hattori will continue to manage the Controller's Department in his new capacity.
- (b) Mr. K. Georg Gabriel will become Vice President, Programming and Budgeting and Vice President, Pension Fund. Mr. Gabriel, a German national, joined the Bank as a loan officer in 1967 in the Western Hemisphere Department. He was appointed Deputy Controller in 1969, Controller in 1971, and Director, Programming and Budgeting Department in 1976. At that time, he was also made a member of the President's Council. Reporting to Mr. Gabriel will be the restructured Programming and Budgeting Department and the Staff Retirement Plan Administrator with the staff of the Pension Administration and Pension Investment Units. Mr. Gabriel will also assume the Chairmanship of the Pension Finance Committee.
- (c) Mr. Heinz Vergin will be Director, Programming and Budgeting Department. Mr. Vergin, a German national, joined the Bank in 1964 in the Young Professionals Program. He has worked in various economist and Projects division chief positions and became Assistant Director in the East Asia and Pacific Projects Department in 1974. He assumed his present position as Assistant Director, Programming and Budgeting Department in 1977. The Programming and Budgeting Department will comprise the present Country Program Review Division, Programming and Budgeting Division, and Management Systems Division.

(d) Mr. D. Joseph Wood, a U.S. national will be Director, Financial Policy and Analysis Department. Mr. Wood joined the Bank in 1967 in the Young Professionals Program. He served in various economist positions in the Operations organization, became Chief, Financial Analysis Division, Programming and Budgeting Department in 1974, and in 1976 became Assistant Director, Financial Analysis Division, Programming and Budgeting Department. The new Financial Policy and Analysis Department will be comprised of the Financial Analysis and Financial Studies Divisions of the present Programming and Budgeting Department.

Messrs. Hattori and Gabriel will continue to report to Mr. Qureshi, the Vice President, Finance; in addition, Mr. Wood will now report directly to him; Mr. Vergin will report to Mr. Gabriel.

Dear Mr. Dellums:

Thank you for your letter of June 25, 1980, concerning the proposed Chico dam.

At the present time, World Bank involvement in Chico River development is confined to the Chico River Irrigation Project, which is partly financed by our Loan 1227-PH. The irrigation project includes a low diversion dam to divert water from the river to irrigate about 20,000 hectares of rice lands, and does not involve relocation of people.

I suspect that your concern arises from a different proposal for the construction of a large storage dam primarily for electric power generation. Our Sixth Power Loan 1034-PH, made in 1974, originally provided for the services of engineering consultants for the design of such a dam. However, in 1975 it was agreed that the funds intended for Chico hydroelectric dam design be reallocated for other purposes, and this was done. The Bank has had no involvement in Chico hydroelectric studies since that time, nor has the Government, in fact, requested World Bank assistance for such a project.

I trust that this helps to clarify the situation for you.

Dear Mr. Minister:

As you may already have heard, the meeting of IDA Deputies held in Washington on July 24 reached agreement on a program for advance contributions to the Sixth Replenishment of IDA Resources on the basis of a summary statement by the Chairman of the meeting (copy attached for your convenience).

The purpose of this letter is to request your action on a Brazilian advance contribution as soon as possible, taking into account that under the terms of the agreement reached by the IDA Deputies (as explained below), a special importance attaches not only to the amount of advance contributions, but also to the number of countries participating.

As you know, it has now become a matter of great urgency to complete the arrangements for advance contributions to the Sixth Replenishment. IDA has now exhausted its commitment authority; yet there remain pressing needs for new IDA commitments on projects and programs which have already been approved by IDA's Executive Directors but which cannot be launched until fresh funds become available.

As you will see from the Chairman's summary statement, individual donors are free to make their advance contributions available immediately for commitment by IDA, but some of our major prospective donors have asked that their advance contributions not be used in this way until notifications of such contributions have been received in the amount of US\$1.2 billion equivalent and until they have been received from the "majority of Part I donors or a majority of all donors". I believe we may achieve the \$1.2 billion target sooner than one of the "majority of donor" targets. Hence the smaller donor countries, who are large in number, are given a special opportunity to accelerate the release of advance contributions by some of the major donors and to assure that IDA can resume operations.



I should like to express to you my warm appreciation for your country's prompt action in depositing its formal notification of Brazil's willingness to participate in the Sixth Replenishment when it becomes effective. For the reasons stated above, I now express the hope that you will send us as soon as possible the formal notification of your participation in the program for advance contributions, and it would be a most welcome gesture if you would be prepared to advise us at the same time that your advance contribution will be available for immediate commitment by IDA, without regard to the targets mentioned above.

Dear Mr. President:

The Executive Directors, the staff, and all of us here at the World Bank have followed with close attention the deliberations of the recent Venice Economic Summit meeting. We are particularly grateful for its strong support of the Bank's general capital increase and the Sixth Replenishment of the International Development Association.

We are currently examining how we can most effectively assist our oil-importing developing member countries to expand the exploration, development, and production of both their conventional and renewable domestic energy resources, including the possibility -- as the Summit meeting indicated -- of establishing a new affiliate for this purpose.

I want to take this opportunity, Mr. President, to thank you personally for the continuing support your Administration has given the Bank and IDA. Your Secretaries of State and Treasury have worked hard to overcome the deficit on the IDA account, and to strengthen the effectiveness of the entire World Bank Group. I have at times called for stronger official development assistance performance by the United States, but I recognize and admire your strong personal commitment to that same goal.

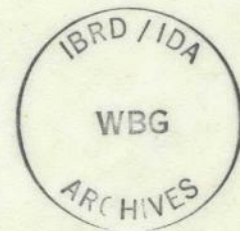



Subject: Economic Development Problems in Sub-Saharan Africa

1. We have given careful consideration to the invitation of the African Governors of the Bank to prepare a special paper on economic development problems of African countries south of the Sahara. We agree with the Governors that it has become urgent to provide for the area an overview of both past experience and prospects for the future so as to design a special program of action, including both recommendations for policy actions as well as resource requirements. The action program would take into account existing plans and proposals such as those mentioned in Paragraph 28 of the Governors' memorandum to me of October 2, 1979, as well as more recent initiatives such as the Action Plan agreed by the OAU Heads of State at their meeting in Lagos, April 23-30, 1980.
2. The Governors have asked that the special paper be prepared in a form suitable for consideration by the Development Committee. In view of recent developments, the strong interest in Africa's development problems in the international community, and the additional resource requirements emerging in the African countries, we would propose to develop a program of action sufficiently comprehensive to permit participation by all those who can contribute to the economic and social development of Africa. To be effective, such a program needs a sound intellectual foundation as well as political support—it must be practical and capable of effective realization. We would propose to draw extensively on existing work and on the experience of the Bank and others in their development work in Africa. Nevertheless, the analysis of experience and insight as well as the synthesis will take time. We will try to have a first draft ready for possible consideration by the Development Committee at their meeting in Africa in May 1981. This is an exceedingly tight timetable considering the magnitude of the task and the many issues on which, despite the Bank's long-standing experience in Africa, our knowledge is limited and the data base is weak.
3. I attach a summary outline of the special paper we propose to prepare. While we intend to start work immediately, we would appreciate any comments and guidance the Governors you represent may wish to provide at your earliest convenience.

PROSPECTUS

THE BACKGROUND

Overall economic growth and development of sub-Saharan Africa has been less than necessary to raise prevailing low incomes, ameliorate the worst effects of poverty, expand the ability to manage the economies effectively, and assure sustained growth for the future. A combination of factors has resulted in low growth and growing financial imbalances. Meanwhile, declining death rates combined with high fertility accelerate population growth, particularly in urban areas. Projections for the 1980s indicate continued poor prospects for growth for sub-Saharan Africa. While there are exceptions, these prospects clearly are not satisfactory - politically, socially, economically - to the countries concerned nor can they be acceptable to the international community.

For oil importing countries sharp deterioration in the terms of trade and high oil import bills are aggravating longer term structural problems. Worsening of the external positions of oil importing countries as a whole is reflected in massive current account deficits, growing external indebtedness and declining foreign assets. Financial pressures are also reflected in large budget deficits. Combined with rapid monetary expansion as well as rising import prices, they fuel inflation at rates previously unknown.

Because of stagnating or sluggish growth of agricultural output, real incomes of the rural population have not, except in very few countries, increased. At the same time "new poor" have emerged in shanty towns. The combined socio-economic features of present sub-Sahara Africa give rise to concern as to the prospects for the coming decades. There is an urgent need to consider development strategies and associated resource requirements which would enable sub-Saharan Africa to improve substantially on these prospects.

The report will review the socio-economic developments which have led to the present situation underlining common features as well as differences among sub-Saharan countries.

PART ONE: DEVELOPMENT POLICIES AND OPTIONS

In the context of the likely international economic environment, which includes higher energy prices, inflation, more slowly growing international trade and slow growth in the industrial countries, policy options open to African countries (individually or collectively) for improving their prospects over the next ten to twenty years will be discussed. Many of the policy issues may not be new in themselves - e.g., reform of the incentive

system - but the development strategies must be reviewed in the context of the structural changes in the international economy which pose new problems and new opportunities.

On the basis of World Bank projections the review will discuss the dimensions of the world economy most relevant for Africa under different "scenarios": OECD growth and inflation, energy prices, commodity prices, capital flows.

PART TWO: THE NEED FOR CHANGE

Part Two of the review will concentrate on selected priority areas:

- demographic prospects;
- human resources: education, training and basic health;
- management of the public sector;
- growth of output with special emphasis on agriculture; industry and non-fuel minerals;
- energy;
- infrastructure, including transportation and communications.

I. Demographic Trends

On the basis of existing studies, the review will focus on the social and economic implications of a rate of population growth that will, roughly, result in a doubling of African population between 1975 and 2000: size of labor force, urbanization, demand for education and health services. The review will also assess population policies.

II. Human Resources: Education, Training and Basic Health

Quality of the labor force, scarcity of specialized skills and managers are recurrent themes in analyses of African problems. Not a single country is near or on the way to solving the broad problem of education and training, although many already devote a large share of resources to education. Three principal issues will be investigated:

1. Priorities for Education and Training

Increasingly, literacy is thought to have a determining role in accelerating growth and poverty alleviation; the study will review education policies, with particular emphasis on the balance between primary and higher education and training, and between formal and informal education.

2. Efficiency and Effectiveness of Education and Training

Costs (unit) are generally high but with great variation. What are the costs and benefits of alternative modes of training? How can an increasing number of people benefit within the limits imposed by budgetary considerations? Utilization of facilities, retention rates, results of tracer studies will be reviewed and conclusions drawn regarding the efficiency and effectiveness of education and training programs and opportunities for improvement.

3. Basic Health

Despite substantial progress, health conditions generally remain very poor. Poor water supply and hygiene, inadequate nutrition, and lack of preventive medicine are major causes. There is still a strong bias in favor of curative/urban medicine. What would be the prospects for expanded basic facilities in rural areas: conditions (literacy, government commitment, managerial requirements, cost) and scope and priorities (target groups) and what institutions and resources would be required?

III. Management of the Public Sector

Government, parastatal organizations and public enterprises have expanded greatly in recent years. But growing dissatisfaction with their performance raises some basic questions, including:

1. Government Administration, Employment and Incomes Policies

There is an enormous expansion in public sector employment. The study will examine the reasons for this trend as well as the cost of employment policies such as guaranteed employment for secondary school graduates. It will also assess whether incentives are adequate to attract appropriate numbers of skilled people at management and operating levels and whether policies support priority allocation of scarce human skills. Requirements for strengthening indigenous capacity to analyze economic development issues and implement development strategies will be reviewed.

2. Role and Objectives of Parastatal Organizations

Different socio-economic systems imply different roles for the public sector. The review will assess the performance of public sector institutions in terms of their economic and social objectives and indicate policies to improve efficiencies within the context of stated objectives. The study also will draw on knowledge of operational problems of the public enterprises to suggest policies to strengthen management and improve financial performance.

IV. Growth of Output

Growth of output is a central objective in sub-Saharan African countries. The study will review experience, potential, existing policies and need for reform in agriculture, industry and the non-fuel minerals.

1. Agriculture

Successful experiences in agricultural development in Africa will be analyzed and lessons drawn from them. The review will focus on alternative systems for extension, input supply, crop marketing and credit; production incentives; the issue of smallholder strategy vs. future role of large-scale agriculture; the adequacy of present national and international institutions for applied research.

The dichotomy - foodcrops vs. export crops - resolves into the broader issue of the quality of agricultural policies, in particular the appropriateness of the incentive system (producer prices/subsidies and exchange rate and supply response) and the management of public institutions. Africa's changing comparative advantage, resulting from world price trends in "food" and "exportable" commodities will be explored.

The review will assess the current state of knowledge on such central issues as water management (in Sudan-Sahel zone): the merits of large irrigation (river basin development) vs. more intensive use and conservation of available water resources; the "modernization" of animal husbandry; the development of fisheries; and recommend actions necessary to formulate appropriate investment programs.

Regarding forestry, the main issues in the forest zone are over-exploitation, concession regimes and the economics of wood processing in situ, while in the Savannah-Sahel zone the question of reforestation to provide firewood and timber for traditional construction, as well as ecological protection, has become urgent.

2. Industry

Industry is emerging as a sizeable sector, in several countries. The review will consider the basic elements of appropriate industrial strategies for African countries, including the scope for further efficient import substitution; the application of technological changes to reduce the critical minimum scale of production; the export potential of manufactured goods; employment potential and training requirements; and obstacles to intra-African trade. Special attention will be given to issues pertaining to the economics of resource-based industry (stage processing of minerals and agricultural raw materials).

3. Non-fuel Minerals

While many issues will be country-specific, the study will address the ones pertaining to market and price prospects for African minerals, the status of exploration, the adequacy of measures for expanding knowledge of exploitable resources, the financing of minerals development, the arrangements between governments and foreign mining companies and the prospects and difficulties for mineral-based industries in African countries and scope of sub-regional arrangements.

V. Energy

The scope for conservation is limited and the central problem is how to accelerate exploration and hasten development of all energy sources: oil, hydro-power, coal, and all sources of renewable energy, especially solar. Many of the countries potentially face a major fuelwood crisis. The study will review the institutional base for energy planning and development and indicate priority areas for energy development and policies which may be appropriate to affect both the growth in energy demand and supply.

VI. Infrastructure, including Transportation and Communications

Transportation and communications remain of vital importance, especially for land-locked countries, for the further development of sub-Saharan Africa's potential. For this review the study will draw on existing work (i.e., African Transport Decade) as well as World Bank experience and analyses. External links and their efficacy, modes of transport and their energy efficiencies will be reviewed and discussed.

PART THREE: DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE: POLICIES AND ACTION PROGRAMS

Part Three would spell out the actions by the international community, including the Bank, to support the development strategies and priorities discussed in Part One and Two.

Clearly the type and level of external support required by each country will vary greatly and the discussion will focus on the general requirements of the region and some of its sub-groups. An effort will be made to discuss resource requirements and other proposals for action for groups of countries: for example, the prospects for the most disadvantaged nations are closely related to those of more developed or more dynamic countries in the same region.

I. Overall Resource Requirements

Resource gaps of the oil importing countries, despite very modest growth rates, have increased enormously. The study will quantify the magnitudes involved under different projection scenarios (for 1985, 1990 and 2000). It will assess the feasibility of mobilizing external capital in the amounts and terms consistent with the needs and countries; credit-worthiness and the implications of the failure to do so.

II. Application and Administration of External Assistance

One basic aid issue to be explored is the effectiveness with which external capital has been used. For many years in Africa per capita aid flows have been large on an international comparative basis with results which seem to be less than might be expected.

Apart from the question of its level and its effectiveness, this section will consider improvements in the delivery of external aid and its application, including selected aspects of aid administration (by donor institutions and recipients), aid coordination, technical assistance and the mix of project and non-project aid. Attention will be given to such questions as financing of local cost and recurrent cost financing.

III. Support to Specific Sectors

The review will also consider the needs of selected sectors and indicate the volume and type of assistance to support the appropriate policies and programs. Technical assistance for project implementation, for preinvestment work and for policy analysis will also be discussed.

IV. Regional Cooperation

Special emphasis will be given to action supporting regional cooperation. The benefits of such arrangements are widely recognized and the political will to move ahead is clearly present. Progress is being made, for example in West Africa, and some regional institutions already have a long history. Support from the international community may help to promote further progress.

Let me apologize for the very long delay in getting back to you regarding our discussion on possible innovative approaches toward the world population problem.

To refresh your memory, I had suggested that I have our people prepare some background material on the subject; and then, assuming you felt it could be useful, we would host a seminar at our Guest House in New Brunswick, New Jersey, in hopes that an interchange of ideas might suggest some new directions.

I, frankly, have been negligent in getting back to you in part because we have been frustrated in our attempt to come up with anything that would be new and useful to the World Bank. As is indicated in the introduction to the summary prepared by our Ortho Pharmaceutical Corporation, much of what has been prepared is already known or accessible to your people. Having said that, perhaps the recommendation on page 11 could prove of value. There is some suggestion that our market research approaches are more sophisticated than those used in the public sector.

Also, we would be more than delighted to host a meeting like the one we discussed. Toward that end, I was anxious to have the input of an organization called JHPIEGO (Johns Hopkins Program for International Education in Gynecology and Obstetrics), since Harry Woolf, who is head of the Institute for Advanced Study, is deeply involved and feels that they are making real progress with their approach. I have attached a brief review and comments from our people with regards to the JHPIEGO approach, as well as some more detailed materials.

After you have had a chance to review the enclosed materials, please advise my office as to what you think might be a useful next step.

I am sure you have had a chance to review the material and please advise my office as to what you wish to do next.

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


Dear Mr. Ganji:

Dear Sarge:

In your letter, dated July 15, you asked whether we believed the feasibility study produced by Tanzania Karatasi Associated Industries pointed to the possibility of a potentially attractive private investment opportunity. I am told it does not.

The proposal provides for the importation of all of the pencil components which would lead to a production cost to Tanzania substantially exceeding the landed cost of pencils. Moreover, two other pencil manufacturing projects are either under construction or in an advanced stage of planning in Tanzania. This third project, when added to the other two, would provide a single shift capacity far in excess of Tanzania's estimated requirements.

It is conceivable the project could be made into an economically justifiable proposal if local components were to be used extensively to reduce production costs to the point where pencils could be exported to neighboring countries. But that would require a totally different production package.

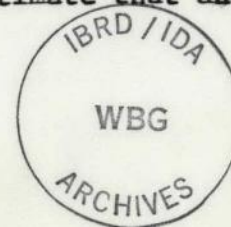

Excellency:

I am deeply concerned, as you must be, by the dramatic change for the worse in the situation of most developing countries during the past year. Rising current account deficits are putting severe pressure on their development programs and that pressure is likely to grow greater in the next two or three years. The outlook for the very poor countries, nearly all of which are heavily dependent on imported energy, is especially grim. But even middle-income countries whose rapid growth has given a lift to the entire world economy, are facing severe economic problems. I share the opinion of most informed observers that the real cost of energy will continue to rise, and that the measures which the developing countries must take to attack their economic problems must include efforts to reduce dependence on imported oil as rapidly as possible. It is in everyone's interest to help them do so, and I know that this is the view of Saudi Arabia and other leading members of OPEC.

We in the World Bank have been assessing the energy needs of the oil-importing developing countries to sustain a reasonable rate of growth during the 1980s. On present projections their expenditure on oil imports, which this year will total about \$50 billion, will amount to over \$110 billion in constant 1980 dollars by the end of the decade. However, a vigorous program to conserve energy and increase domestic supplies could hold oil import expenditures at about \$84 billion in constant 1980 dollars (i.e., at about their present share of export earnings), thus making a critical difference to the capacity of the oil-importing countries to finance imports for development.

The investment requirements of such a program would be large. In 1980, these countries will invest about \$25 billion in energy. We estimate that an



intensive effort to explore for and produce more oil, gas and coal, to generate more hydro-power, and to make a start on developing renewable sources of energy for the longer term would require that the level of investment (in constant 1980 dollars) be raised by at least two and a half times by 1990. Such an investment would yield a high rate of return. Unfortunately, funds to finance such an expanded energy investment program are not likely to be available from existing sources.


In the light of this assessment we have reviewed the World Bank's program for energy, including provision for the poorer oil-exporting member countries. Our current lending program for energy for 1981-85 totals \$13 billion (current dollars), which is the maximum that can be accommodated within our present resources without major reductions in lending for other important developmental purposes. However, we have identified energy projects, including projects for energy conservation, which would call for a lending program of about \$25 billion (current dollars) during the five years. We are considering establishing a new affiliate of the Bank, with capital subscribed by both OPEC and OECD countries, to finance such a program. We would expect partial financing of these projects by the World Bank affiliate would attract a substantial flow of private and official capital from other sources, and together with these funds might contribute 10 - 15 per cent of the total energy investment requirements of the countries during the five-year period.

A paper has recently been prepared for our Board under the title "Energy in the Developing Countries", which explains more fully the points I have touched on in this cable. Copies have been sent to your Government through the Executive Director's office. The paper was discussed by the Board on August 5. It recommends, and the Board agreed, that the Bank should explore the possibility of establishing the new facility or affiliate which I referred to above. Given

the imperative need for the oil-importing countries to increase domestic energy production as a fundamental means of achieving orderly economic adjustment and strengthen their credit-worthiness, I believe that the recommendation will draw much support.

I was very interested to learn about the long-term strategy for OPEC and their relations with other developing countries, proposed by a group of experts earlier this year under the chairmanship of Minister Yamani, which also stressed the need to help oil-importing developing countries to increase production of energy from indigenous sources. Their approach to this question is similar to that of the Bank's paper. I note particularly that the experts see a clear need for a cooperative effort by OPEC and the industrialized countries. As I have said, this is very much my own view. I believe therefore that it would be highly desirable for OPEC and the Bank to work together in fostering this important objective. I would welcome an early opportunity, perhaps in the first half of September, to come to Riyadh to hear your views on the subject and to discuss with you, and with Minister Yamani if you think it appropriate, how this might best be accomplished.

Hence the smaller donor countries, who are large in number, are given a special opportunity to accelerate the release of advance contributions by some of the major donors and to assure that IDA can resume operations.

MEETING OF IDA6 DEPUTIESChairman's Summary Note

On Thursday, July 24, a meeting was convened of the IDA6 Deputies. The Deputies expressed deep concern about the delay in commitments from member countries, which had prevented the agreement from coming into force. They underscored the problems this created for IDA and recipient countries, and appealed to member countries to press on with notification procedures as quickly as they could. The Deputies discussed the appropriate steps which might be taken in connection with an advance contribution prior to the effective date of the IDA6 replenishment. There was strong support amongst the Deputies, as a matter of principle, for making advance contributions in order to avoid a hiatus in IDA's operations. Accordingly, a number of donors have agreed to take those legislative and other steps necessary to implement arrangements for advance contributions of all or part of their IDA6 contribution and to notify IDA of their commitment at the earliest possible time. Other donors were invited to consider taking similar steps. Donors, however, were prepared to do so only on the expectation that IDA6 would become effective in the near future.

A resolution would be submitted for consideration by the Board of Executive Directors of the Association authorizing acceptance of advance contributions by any member donor government. However, it was agreed that only after notifications are received by the Association from member donors making advance contributions aggregating US\$1.2 billion equivalent from a majority of Part I donors or a majority of all donors, would such notifications be used as a basis for the Association making commitments, unless specific instructions are given by individual donors to the contrary in relation to their contribution. Pending obtaining the necessary commitment authority as aforesaid, IDA would be empowered to enter into qualified commitments as described in the Sixth Replenishment Resolution.

The resolution authorizing acceptance of advance contributions would provide that as soon as the IDA6 agreement becomes effective, all of the rights and obligations of such advance contributors would be incorporated into the effective IDA6 agreement.

It was agreed that a further meeting of Deputies would be held before March 31, 1981 to review the situation unless IDA6 had become effective before that time.



I should like to express to you my warm appreciation for your country's prompt action in depositing its formal notification of Korea's willingness to participate in the Sixth Replenishment when it becomes effective. For the reasons stated above, I now express the hope that you will send us as soon as possible the formal notification of your participation in the program for advance contributions, and it would be a most welcome gesture if you would be prepared to advise us at the same time that your advance contribution will be available for immediate commitment by IDA, without regard to the targets mentioned above.

The International Bank for Reconstruction and Development proposes to borrow an aggregate principal amount, not exceeding \$400,000,000 in markets outside the United States of America through an issue of Two Year Bonds of the Bank. The Bonds are to be dated September 15, 1980 and to mature September 15, 1982. The interest rate of the bonds has not yet been determined.

The Government of the United States of America is hereby requested, in accordance with Section 1(b) of Article IV of the Bank's Articles of Agreement, to approve the borrowing by the Bank in markets outside the United States of America of such amounts as may be raised by the issue of not exceeding \$400,000,000 aggregate principal amount of bonds. The Government of the United States of America is further requested to agree, pursuant to the same provisions of the Articles of Agreement, that the proceeds of such borrowing may be exchanged for the currency of any member of the Bank without restriction.

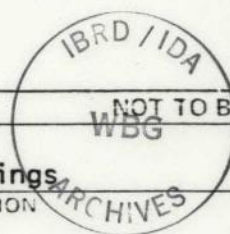

MANAGEMENT OF THE STAFF RETIREMENT PLAN

The operation of the Staff Retirement Plan is becoming an increasingly important part of the Bank's activities. Today, retirement benefits comprise, after salaries, the single most important element of compensation to staff. The Plan's liabilities now stand at \$940 million, and by the middle of the 1980s they are expected to double. Similarly, the Retirement Fund is growing rapidly, with the present portfolio value of over \$400 million expected to reach \$1 billion by the middle of this decade.

With such growth and added importance, the Pension Fund and Staff Retirement Plan have reached the point where a significant increase in direct supervision by senior Bank management is required. Therefore, effective August 1, 1980, responsibility for management of those activities is being assigned to Mr. K. Georg Gabriel, Vice President, Pension Fund. In his new capacity Mr. Gabriel will also assume the Chairmanship of the Pension Finance Committee. The Staff Retirement Plan Administrator, Mr. B. Holland, and the staff of the Pension Administration and Pension Investment Units will report directly to Mr. Gabriel.
