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

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MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE EMPIRE OF ETHIOPIA AND INTERNATIONAL BANK FOR RECONSTRUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE CONSULTATIVE GROUP ON INTERNATIONAL AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK CENTER FOR AFRICA (ILCA) G3C:

PREAMBLE

The present level of livestock production in tropical Africa is considered to be well below the potential of the region. On grounds of human nutrition and welfare, of conservation of rangeland resources, and of economic growth, an urgent need exists to accelerate and extend research on livestock production. The tropical zones of Africa are estimated to contain about 124 million head of cattle, 98 million sheep and 80 million goats, producing meat, milk and hides for a rapidly increasing population and playing an essential part in the lives of the people. Commercial cattle production in most of tropical Africa is characterized by low annual offtake, high calf mortality and slow maturity. More efficient production is hampered by inadequate feeding and water supplies and by the prevalence of some animal diseases, notably Trypanosemiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever). Economic and social conditions and limited marketing facilities further limit the output of cattle, sheep and goats.

In some cases, a leading cause of the disappointing growth in animal productivity has been the insufficient integration of biological, economic and sociological components of research and development programs. The need for strengthening livestock research in general and for more detailed study of animal production systems is urgent. Although a considerable fund of knowledge on livestock research has been collected over several decades, the results of much of this work are not widely known, and present research activities are limited by shortages of experienced staff, facilities and funds.

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A particular need exists for the study of Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever), which are especially destructive on the African continent. The success of efforts to increase livestock production in Africa by upgrading present genetic strains of cattle, by improving husbandry and management practices and by developing better rangelands are, in certain regions, largely dependent upon a program to bring about effective control of these two diseases.

The concept of an international research effort to attack these problems has been under study and discussion for some time by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (hereinafter referred to as the CGIAR). The CGIAR is co-sponsored by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (the Bank), and the United Nations Development Programme; the membership of the CGIAR is indicated in Annex A hereto. To act for it in matters concerning research on livestock in Africa, the CGIAR has established a Subcommittee on African Livestock (hereinafter referred to as the Subcommittee), of which the Bank provides the chairman.

From study and discussion by the CGIAR and its Subcommittee has emerged a proposal to establish an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (hereinafter referred to as ILRAD) and an International Livestock Center for Africa (hereinafter referred to as the Center). It is intended that the activities of these two institutions will be closely coordinated. The Center will conduct research and training activities aimed at improving livestock production systems. The staff on ILRAD will concentrate initially on intensive research concerning the immunological and related aspects of controlling Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis, and possibly at a later stage other animal diseases. The headquarters of the Center would be situated in Ethiopia, and ILRAD would be situated in Kenya. The CGIAR has also decided that these two institutions should be established under arrangements which would enable them to be integrated at some future date and that it is desirable that ILRAD and the Center come under a common Board at the earliest appropriate time subject to further discussion and decision by the CGIAR at the time.

Subject to the approval of their respective governing bodies, certain interested members of the CGIAR have indicated a willingness in principle to provide financial support for the establishment of the Center, both during the initial stage of its development and as a continuing matter thereafter. The Subcommittee has asked the Bank to act as Executing Agency to bring the Center into being and to that end to enlist the cooperation of the International Development Research Centre (hereinafter referred to as IDRC) pursuant to arrangements to be made between them.

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Now, therefore, the parties to this Memorandum agree to work together toward the establishment of the Center as an international research and training institution, with suitable governance and legal charter, and appropriate status, authorities, privileges and other conditions necessary to enable it to operate effectively and efficiently toward the attainment of its objectives when provided the requisite financial support. Specifically, the parties to this Memorandum agree:

1. ESTABLISHMENT AND NAME

There is hereby established a Center called International Livestock Center for Africa (hereinafter referred to as the Center). The Center shall operate in accordance with the following provisions.

2. LOCATION

The headquarters of the Center shall be at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. The Center will, in addition, establish such research units as may be needed, at locations to be designated in Africa, with at least one such unit in Ethiopia.

3. PURPOSES

The purpose of the Center shall be to assist national efforts which aim to effect a change in the production and marketing systems in tropical Africa south of the Sahara so as to increase the total yield and output of livestock products and improve the quality of life of the people in this region. The Center will serve:

- (a) as an international center for research to promote the development and demonstration of improved livestock production systems optimizing the use of human and natural resources in Africa,
- (b) as a focal point for training activities which will increase
 - regional competence in a systems approach to livestock production

(c) as a multidisciplinary documentation center, working in both French and English, for the Livestock Industry of Africa.

In carrying forward its program, the Center will develop close linkage with national and regional organizations undertaking research and training activities in the same or closely related fields of interest.

4. ACTIVITIES

The activities of the Center will serve to identify means of increasing the efficiency of the major animal production systems of tropical Africa and to assist the governments and authorities responsible for achieving new levels of productivity. In particular, the Center will engage in the following types of activities:

- (a) retrieve, assemble and make available in both English and French all relevant information on animal production in tropical Africa; .
- (b) engage a multidisciplinary research staff to study existing animal production systems (including breeding, feeding management and related health aspects of husbandry, the improvement of range and pastures, and the social and economic factors affecting the livestock industry including processing and marketing), develop new or amended systems of production, and define priorities for other research;
- (c) support, supplement and cooperate with existing national and regional research stations or programs in developing a fully coordinated program of production and rangeland research which is related appropriately to the urgent needs of livestock development;
- (d) develop the capacity to undertake research programs in specific aspects of livestock production which are appropriate to an international center. Such programs will require careful justification with particular emphasis given to their timing and to their international application;

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- (e) organize, or assist in organizing, seminars, technical conferences and training courses for staff engaged in livestock research, extension, planning and production, in order particularly to increase regional competence in the multidisciplinary "systems" approach to livestock research and development;
- (f) make available statistical support, information or advice to national, regional or international authorities in the various fields relating to animal production in which the Center is actively engaged. In addition, the Center will engage in such other activities as may be found necessary in furtherance of its objectives.

. POWERS

In furtherance of these purposes and activities, the Center shall possess full juridical personality and, in particular, the capacity to:

- (a) acquire or obtain from any governmental authority, national, municipal, or local foreign or domestic, or otherwise, or from any company, corporation, association, person or other entity, such charters, franchises, licenses, rights, privileges, assistance (financial or otherwise) and concessions as are conducive to and necessary for the attainment of the purpose of the Center;
- (b) receive and acquire from any person, firm or entity, by donation, grant, exchange, devise, bequest, purchase or lease, either absolutely or in trust, contributions consisting of such property, real or personal, including funds and valuable effects or things, as may be useful or necessary to carry out the purpose and objectives of the Center and to hold, own, operate, use or dispose of said property or valuable things;

(c) do and perform all acts and things as are necessary, expedient, suitable, or proper for the furtherance or accomplishment of the purposes and the attainment of any or all of the objectives herein stated, or which shall appear, at any time, as conducive to and useful for the activities of the Center, including the capacity to institute legal proceedings.

6. STATUS OF THE CENTER

The Center will operate as an autonomous, non-profit organization, international in character, governed by a Board of Trustees selected as provided in Section 7 of this Memorandum, and directed by a Director selected as provided in Section 9 of this Memorandum.

7. GOVERNANCE

The Center will be governed by a Board of Trustees of twelve members, comprised and selected as follows:

Two members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia; Three members designated by the CGIAR or the Subcommittee; Six members-at-large with interests and qualifications relevant to the work of the Center. Of these members, at least three shall be African nationals (with appropriate representation from different parts of tropical Africa). These six members-at-large shall, in the first instance, be selected and appointed by the Subcommittee. If the Subcommittee shall have selected less than six members-at-large by the time of the first meeting of the Board of Trustees, the vacancies may be filled by the Board of Trustees; and the Director of the Center, ex officio.

The term of office of the members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia shall be determined by that State.

All other members of the Board shall serve for terms fixed by the Board, but not in excess of three years. These members shall be eligible to succeed themselves.

Vacancies among the members-at-large by reason of their retirement, death, incapacity or any other cause shall be filled by the Board of Trustees. Any such vacancies among the three members nominated by the CGIAR shall be filled by the CGIAR. New appointees shall be appointed for the remainder of the term of the member who is being replaced, or for three years in the case of those appointed to fill vacancies occurring as a result of the expiration of the term of a member.

The Board of Trustees of ILRAD shall be invited to send two of its members to attend as observers the meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Center.

8. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees shall:

- (a) frame rules of procedure for its own working;
- (b) elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman;
- (c) determine policy for the operation of the Center;
- (d) select and appoint the Director of the Center for such a period or periods as it deems necessary and appropriate;
- (e) approve the programs developed for the Center by the Director;
- (f) approve the appointment of senior staff members of the Center on the recommendations of the Director;
- (g) scrutinize and approve the budget estimates for the Center;

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(h) take such action as shall be necessary to conclude and realize the purpose of, such formal relationships with ILRAD as may be determined from time to time by the CGIAR, including without limitation, dissolution or reconstitution of the Board or the Center; and

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 do and perform all other acts considered necessary, suitable and proper for the attainment of any or all of the purposes, activities and objectives of the Center as enumerated in this Memorandum.

9. DIRECTOR

The Center will be administered by a Director appointed by the Board of Trustees.

The Director will be responsible to the Board of Trustees. He will implement the policies determined by the Board, follow the guidelines laid down by it for the functioning of the Center, carry out the directions of the Board and abide by its decisions. Under the overall policy guidance of the Board, the Director will be responsible for the operation and management of the Center and for assuring that its programs and objectives are properly developed and carried out.

10. COOPERATION WITH ILRAD

In realizing its purpose and carrying out its activities, the Center shall closely cooperate with ILRAD.

If and when the CGIAR determines that it would be appropriate to modify the cooperation between the Center and ILRAD under a formal relationship, the CGIAR will determine the terms and conditions under which that relationship shall be entered into. The Board of Trustees of the Center shall take all such action as shall be necessary to conclude, and realize the purposes of, such formal relationship in accordance with the directives of the CGIAR.

11. FINANCING

. Financial support for the Center will be provided by members of the CGIAR, which will consider annually the budgetary requirements of the Center as approved by the Center's Board of Trustees. The Center will also be authorized to receive contributions from other sources. Full development of the Center and its program will be dependent upon the extent of the financial support thus provided.

Several members of the CGIAR have indicated that they are prepared to contribute towards the costs of those preliminary activities necessary to establish the Center as an operating entity in a position to proceed with the execution of its research mission. It is contemplated that these contributions will be placed in a Special Account to be established and administered for this purpose by the Bank.

12. PARTICULAR COVENANTS

The Empire of Ethiopia hereby agrees to accord to, or in connection with, the Center and its staff the following rights, privileges and immunities:

- (a) Assurance of authority for the Board of Trustees to establish employment policies and conditions for the Center's staff on an international basis, without discrimination as to nationality or origin or any consideration other than qualifications and experience, as may be necessary to assure availability of wellqualified staff and high quality of performance;
- (b) assurance of procedures for expeditious clearance for entry into Ethiopia of trainees, scholars, and visitors concerned with the Center's program;

- 10. -

(c) Authorization for the unrestricted movement of such biological materials into and out of Ethiopia as may be needed by the Center or for its cooperative programs in any part of the world consistent with the quarantine inspection laws and regulations of the Empire of Ethiopia to avoid the introduction or export of serious pests or diseases. The Empire of Ethiopia agrees to assure prompt and expeditious inspection of all materials;

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- (d) freedom for publication and dissemination by the Center of research results;
- (e) the Center, its property and assets, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall enjoy immunity from every form of legal process except insofar as in any particular case it has expressly waived its immunity. It is, however, understood that no waiver of execution shall extend to any measure of execution;
- (f) the premises of the Center shall be inviolable. The property, assets and archives of the Center, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall be immune from search, requisition, confiscation, expropriation and any other form of interference, whether by executive, administrative, judicial or legislative action;
- (g) to the extent necessary to carry out the operations provided for in this Agreement and subject to the provisions of this Agreement, all property and assets of the Center shall be free from restrictions, regulations, controls and moratoria of any nature;
- (h) the official communications of the Center shall enjoy treatment not less favorable than that accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to the official communications of any other comparable international institution.

- (i) All trustees, officers and employees of the Center;
 - (i) shall be immune from legal process with respect to acts performed by them in the exercise of their official function except when the Center waives this immunity;

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- (ii) shall be exempt from taxation in respect of the salaries or emoluments paid to them by the Center;
- (iii) shall, together with their spouses and relatives dependent on them be accorded the same immunities from immigration restrictions, alien registration requirements and national service obligations, the same treatment in respect of travelling facilities and the same repatriation facilities in time of international crisis as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable rank of international institutions;
- (iv) shall be accorded the same facilities as regards exchange restrictions as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials
 of comparable rank of international institutions;
 - (v) shall have the right to import or re-export free of customs duty and other tax their personal and household furniture and effects at the time of first taking up their post in Ethiopia or within six months thereafter in accordance with the relevant customs regulations, provided, however, that all customs duties and other taxes thereof shall first be paid in accordance with the laws and regulations then in force if sold locally;
- (j) No Ethiopian nationals, permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia or any other person locally hired by the Center shall be accorded any of the exemptions, immunities and facilities stated in subparagraphs (ii) through (v) of the preceding paragraph (i) of this Section.

(k) The Center, its assets and other property shall be:

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- (i) exempt from all direct taxes; it is understood, however, that the Center will not claim examption from taxes which are, in fact, no more than charges for public utility services;
- (ii) exempt from customs duties and all other taxes or duties in respect of scientific and laboratory equipment imported or exported by the Center for its official use, it being understood that all such duties and other taxes shall first be paid in accordance with the relevant laws and regulations then in force if sold locally; however, customs duties and other taxes on vehicles, articles and supplies imported wholly, necessarily, and exclusively for the official use of the Center shall be paid by the Ministry of Agriculture.
- (iii) exempt from duties, other taxes, prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect of its publications.
- 13. (a) The Empire of Ethiopia will make available to the Center on a longterm lease at a nominal rental, a tract of land of approximately eight hectares at or near Addis Ababa which is suitable for the purposes of the Center's headquarters, including land for office and service buildings and for other appropriate facilities.
 - (b) The Empire of Ethiopia also will make available to the Center on a long-term lease at a nominal rental one or more tracts of land of a size and location to be agreed between the parties to this Memorandum and being suitable for the research purposes of the Center.

· (c)

The Bank has agreed, within the limitation of funds donated by members of the CGIAR, to act, with the cooperation of IDRC, in taking steps to establish the Center in accordance with the provisions of this Memorandum, up to the point at which a Director and a Board of Trustees will have taken office and a staff sufficient, in the opinion of the Director and the Board of Trustees, to carry out the administration of the Center will have taken up its duties. At that point the Bank will endorse this Agreement to the Board of Trustees (and the Empire of Ethiopia agrees to such endorsement), turning over to that Board all the rights, obligations and assets it has incurred under this Agreement.

14. TERMINATION

The rights and obligations of the Bank under this Agreement will terminate at such time as the Bank endorses its rights and obligations under this Agreement to the Board of Trustees then responsible for the Center, pursuant to Section 13 of this Memorandum. Should it be necessary to terminate the Agreement for any reason other than by such endorsement, the rights, obligations and physical assets, other than land and capital improvements thereto, accrued up to that time, shall be distributed to an institution or institutions agreed by the Empire of Ethiopia and the Board of Trustees of the Center in consultation with CGIAR and having public purposes similar to those of the Center. Disposition of any land held by or on behalf of the Center shall be governed by the terms of the lease agreement for such land.

15. ENTRY INTO FORCE

This Memorandum of Agreement shall enter into force when it has been signed on behalf of both parties thereto.

I have the pleasure to send you with this letter a copy of the report and recommendations for the establishment in tropical Africa of an International Livestock Centre for Africa (ILCA), together with annexes to the report. The report was prepared by a Task Force headed by Professor Tribe of the University of Melbourne, Australia, and otherwise composed of Professor Barry Nestel of the University of Guelph, Canada, Mr. David Pratt of the Overseas Development Administration of the United Kingdom, and Dr. M. Thomé of the Institut d'elevage et de medecine veterinaire des pays tropicaux (IEMVT), of France. Various other experts, including authorities in Africa, were consulted in the preparation of the report.

The main recommendations of the report have been accepted by an African Livestock Sub-Committee established to act in this matter for the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research. Since you may not recently have had occasion to be informed about the Consultative Group and its activities, I am attaching a note on the Group to this letter. Several of the governments and organizations composing the Livestock Sub-Committee have expressed an interest in making funds available for the establishment and operations of ILCA, and it appears likely that they will be asked to set up an initial fund for this purpose before the end of 1973.

The principal recommendations of the Task Force report are summarized in Chapter One. Annexes to the report include two documents to which I particularly call your attention. Annex III is the text of an oral statement made by Professor Tribe to the experts composing the Consultative Group's Technical Advisory Committee, at a meeting last February when the Committee was considering the Task Force report on behalf of the Consultative Group. Annex IV is an expression of the views of TAC on the Tribe report, given by one of the members of TAC, Mr. J. Pagot, Director General of IEMVT.

I also call your attention to a foreword to the report, indicating that in some important respects the conclusions of the report must be considered tentative rather than final. These include observations in the report which concern the choice of a location for the International Livestock Centre for Africa and the estimates of the costs of establishing and operating the Centre. As you will have noticed, in carrying out its tasks the new Centre is expected to put great stress on cooperation with and assistance to national and regional research institutions, and it is for this reason that I particularly wish to put a copy of the Task Force report into your hands. If you desire to make any comment on the report, I should be glad to have it. Your comment would reach me most promptly if it were addressed to Mr. Harold Graves, the Executive Secretary of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research, and it would be especially helpful if comment were to reach Washington by the end of the first week in May.

ANIMAL PRODUCTION AND HEALTH TASK FORCE

Certain governments and organizations have organized a group entitled the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (The Consultative Group) for the purpose of sponsoring international research programs designed to raise the quantity and quality of agricultural production in developing countries. The Consultative Group considers problems of financing existing international centers, and it considers also needs and opportunities for creating additional international centers.

Discussions leading to the formation of the Consultative Group were initiated in 1970, based on a growing recognition that, despite the important advances achieved by internationally supported research in raising yields of wheat, maize and rice, a much broader international and regional effort is needed to reinforce national efforts in dealing with a wide range of agricultural problems.

The Consultative Group is sponsored by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (World Bank), The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), and The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). It has 29 members. In addition to the sponsoring bodies, there are three private American organizations -- the Ford, Rockefeller and Kellogg Foundations -- and 13 donor governments represented. The latter include Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Japan, The Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom and the United States. Four regional organizations are members -- African Development Bank, Asian Development Bank, the Inter-American Development Bank, and the Commission of European Communities -- as is the International Development Research Centre (IDRC), an autonomous organization financed by the Government of Canada. The Secretariat of the Consultative Group is provided by the World Bank.

In addition, the five major developing regions of the world participate in the Consultative Group through representatives designated by the Council of FAO to serve for a two-year term. Each region has designated two countries whose representatives serve as member or alternate at their discretion. The countries designated are: for Africa -- Morocco and Nigeria; for Asia and the Far East -- the Philippines and Thailand; for Latin America -- Argentina and Brazil; for the Middle East -- Lebanon and Pakistan; and for Southern and Eastern Europe -- Israel and Rumania. Representatives of Brazil, Israel, Lebanon and Morocco participated in the second meeting of the Consultative Group during December 1971.

The inagural meeting of the Consultative Group was held in Washington on May 19, 1971, at the Headquarters of the World Bank. A second meeting of the Consultative Group was also held at the World Bank in December 1971.

A major action taken at the inagural meeting of the Consultative Group was the election of a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) consisting of 12 distinguished scientists with wide experience in the agricultural problems of developing countries. Sir John Crawford, Vice-Chancellor of the Australian National University, has been appointed Chairman of TAC. A full list of TAC members is attached as Annex A. TAC is responsible for advising the Consultative Group on the principal gaps in agricultural research and on the international and regional programs which deserve priority in filling those gaps. FAO is providing the Secretariat of TAC.

At the second meeting of the Consultative Group held in December, member governments and organizations indicated the intention to make approximately US\$ 15 million available in 1972 for research programs designed to raise the quantity and quality of food production in developing countries of Asia, Africa, and Latin America. The funds will support five widely separated international research centers already in existence.

Two of the existing institutes being supported are responsible for the developments that led to the "Green Revolution" in the form of greatly increased food production, especially in Asia and Latin America, from new varieties of wheat and rice. One of these institutes is the Wheat and Maize Improvement Center (CIMMYT), situated in Mexico, and the other is the International Rice Research Institute (IRRI), in the Philippines.

The three other existing programs which will be supported by grants from individual members of the Consultative Group are those of more recently established centers -- the International Potato Center (CIP), in Peru; the International Center for Tropical Agriculture (CIAT), situated in Colombia, which is concerned with farming systems suitable to the humid tropics of South America, with particular attention to the improvement of beef, rice, maize and cassava; and the International Institute for Tropical Agriculture (IITA), in Nigeria, which is concerned with farming systems appropriate to the humid tropics of Africa and is now concentrating on maize, rice, certain legumes and root crops.

Members of the Consultative Group will also provide initial funds during 1972 for the establishment of a new International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT), to be located in India, which will concentrate initially on the improvement of sorghum, millet, chick peas and pigeon peas. The Consultative Group is also sponsoring activities leading to international research aimed at the improvement of animal production and health in Africa, with particular reference to ruminant livestock. These activities include arrangements for the establishment of an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD), to be located in Kenya, focusing on Trypanosomiasis and East Coast Fever, and studies to determine what ought to be done in the matter of a more comprehensive international approach to improvement of animal production and health in Subsahara Africa. Should the latter initiative lead to an international center, it is envisaged that ILRAD would become an integral part of such a center.

This interest in livestock stems partly from the initiative of the Rockefeller Foundation, which presented proposals in these fields to TAC in October 1971. Participants at the December 1971 second Consultative Group meeting, having heard the views of TAC, decided to form a Subcommittee on African Livestock, under the Chairmanship of Mr. L.J.C. Evans of the World Bank, composed of governments and organizations interested in providing financial support for livestock improvement in Africa or having large current investments in African livestock research. The Consultative Group directed the Subcommittee to:

- (a) arrange for a group to take the steps necessary for the establishment in Kenya of an animal disease laboratory to work on Trypanosomiasis and East Coast Fever; and
- (b) arrange for a task force to provide the further information required, including a review of past and current research, to enable TAC to determine what should be done in international research in a comprehensive approach to improvement of animal production and health in Tropical Africa, with specific reference to ruminant livestock. Since research in animal production and research in animal health ought to be closely related, the task force would have to be concerned with animal health as well as with animal husbandry and production and close collaboration would be needed between the group working to establish the animal disease laboratory in Kenya and the Task Force.

The Subcommittee met on January 21, 1972. Members are: Canada, Denmark, FAO, Ford Foundation, France, Germany, IDRC, Rockefeller Foundation, UNDP, the United Kingdom, the United States, and the World Bank. Members of the Subcommittee expressed their desire for the Rockefeller Foundation to act as Executing Agency to carry the TLRAD project forward, and, as Executing Agency, to organize and put an Executive Team into the field for this purpose. The Subcommittee further requested the World Bank to be responsible for mobilizing and organizing the Task Force to study the overall question of animal production and health, and agreed on the terms of reference for that undertaking drafted by TAC. After consultative with members of the Subcommittee, the Rockefeller Foundation has appointed a three-man Executive Team, as follows: Dr. William Pritchard (United States), leader; Dr. Rüdiger Sachs (Germany); and Sir Alexander Robertson (United Kingdom). Following briefing in the United States and Europe, the Executive Team arrived in Kenya on March 23 and is currently still in the field.

With respect to the Task Force, it has been agreed between the World Bank and members of the Subcommittee, that Dr. Derek Tribe, Dean, Faculty of Agriculture, University of Melbourne, Australia, should serve as leader, with additional members as follows: Dr. Maurice Thome (France); Mr. David Pratt (United Kingdom); and Dr. Barry Nestel (IDRC). In addition, the Task Force will obtain the services of specialist consultants as appropriate and hopes to obtain a substantial input from African scientists in this way.

In undertaking its survey and writing its report, it is understood that the Task Force will interpret research in animal production and health in its widest sense, including management, feeding, breeding and related health aspects; the improvement of range and pastures; and social and economic factors affecting the livestock industry, with particular emphasis on marketing.

The Task Force has reviewed the report of the Rockefeller Foundation team which studied the feasibility of establishing an International African Livestock Center, and which visited some 14 countries in Tropical Africa during June/July 1971. It is proposed that some countries visited at that time would again be visited by the current Task Force, but so far as possible the present mission hopes to build on the work of the previous group.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE EMPIRE OF ETHIOPIA AND

INTERNATIONAL BANK FOR RECONSTRUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE CONSULTATIVE GROUP ON INTERNATIONAL AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK CENTER FOR AFRICA (ILCA)

PREAMBLE

The present level of livestock production in tropical Africa is considered to be well below the potential of the region. On grounds of human nutrition and welfare, of conservation of rangeland resources, and of economic growth, an urgent need exists to accelerate and extend research on livestock production. The tropical zones of Africa are estimated to contain about 124 million head of cattle, 98 million sheep and 80 million goats, producing meat, milk and hides for a rapidly increasing population and playing an essential part in the lives of the people. Commercial cattle production in most of tropical Africa is characterized by low annual offtake, high calf mortality and slow maturity. More efficient production is hampered by inadequate feeding and water supplies and by the prevalence of some animal diseases, notably Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever). Economic and social conditions and limited marketing facilities further limit the output of cattle, sheep and goats.

In some cases, a leading cause of the disappointing growth in animal productivity has been the insufficient integration of biological, economic and sociological components of research and development programs.

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The need for strengthening livestock research in general and for more detailed study of animal production systems is urgent. Although a considerable fund of knowledge on livestock research has been collected over several decades, the results of much of this work are not widely known, and present research activities are limited by shortages of experienced staff, facilities and funds.

A particular need exists for the study of Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever), which are especially destructive on the African continent. The success of efforts to increase livestock production in Africa by upgrading present genetic strains of cattle, by improving husbandry and management practices and by developing better rangelands are, in certain regions, largely dependent upon a program to bring about effective control of these two diseases.

The concept of an international research effort to attack these problems has been under study and discussion for some time by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (hereinafter referred to as the CGIAR). The CGIAR is co-sponsored by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (the Bank), and the United Nations Development Programme; the membership of the CGIAR is indicated in Annex A hereto. To act for it in matters concerning research on livestock in Africa, the CGIAR has established a Subcommittee on African Livestock (hereinafter referred to as the Subcommittee), of which the Bank provides the chairman.

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From study and discussion by the CGIAR and its Subcommittee has emerged a proposal to establish an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (hereinafter referred to as ILRAD) and an International Livestock Center for Africa (hereinafter referred to as the Center). It is intended that the activities of these two institutions will be closely coordinated. The Center will conduct research and training activities aimed at improving livestock production systems. The staff on ILRAD will concentrate initially on intensive research concerning the immunological and related aspects of controlling Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis, and possibly at a later stage other animal diseases. The headquarters of the Center would be situated in Ethiopia, and ILRAD would be situated in Kenya. The CGIAR has also decided that these two institutions should be established under arrangements which would enable them to be integrated at some future date and that it is desirable that ILRAD and the Center come under a common Board at the earliest appropriate time subject to further discussion and decision by the CGIAR at the time.

Subject to the approval of their respective governing bodies, certain interested members of the CGIAR have indicated a willingness in principle to provide financial support for the establishment of the Center, both during the initial stage of its development and as a continuing matter thereafter. The Subcommittee has asked the Bank to act as Executing Agency to bring the Center into being and to that end to enlist the cooperation of the International Development Research Center (hereinafter referred to as IDRC) pursuant to arrangements to be made between them.

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Now, therefore, the parties to this Memorandum agree to work together toward the establishment of the Center as an

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international research and training institution, with suitable governance and legal charter, and appropriate status, authorities, privileges and other conditions necessary to enable it to operate effectively and effeciently toward the attainment of its objectives when provided the requisite financial support. Specifically, the parties to this Memorandum agree:

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1. <u>NAME</u>

The name of the Center shall be the International Livestock Center for Africa.

2. LOCATION

The headquarters of the Center shall be at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, the Center will, in addition, establish such research units as may be needed, at locations to be designated in Africa, with at least one such unit in Ethiopia.

3. PURPOSES

The purpose of the Center shall be to assist national efforts which aim to effect a change in the production and marketing systems in tropical Africa south of the Sahara so as to increase the total yield and output of livestock products and improve the quality of life of the people in this region. The Center will serve:

- (a) as an international center for research to promote the development and demonstration of improved livestock production systems optimizing the use of human and natural resources in Africa,
- (b) as a focal point for training activities which will increase regional competence in a systems' approach to livestock production and development, and
- (c) as a multidisciplinary documentation center, working in both French and English, for the Livestock Industry of Africa.

In carrying forward its program, the Center will develop close linkage with national and regional organizations undertaking research and training activities in the same or closely related fields of interest.

4. ACTIVITIES

The activities of the Center will serve to identify means of increasing the efficiency of the major animal production systems of tropical Africa and to assist the governments and authorities responsible for achieving new levels of productivity. In particular, the Center will engage in the following types of activities:

- (a) retrieve, assemble and make available in both English and French all relevant information on animal production in tropical Africa;
- (b) engage a multidisciplinary research staff to study existing animal production systems (including breeding, feeding management and related health aspects of husbandry, the improvement of range and pastures, and the social and economic factors affecting the livestock industry including processing and marketing), develop new or amended systems of production, and define priorities for other research;
- (c) support, supplement and cooperate with existing national and regional research stations or programs in developing a fully coordinated program of production and rangeland research which is related appropriately to the urgent needs of livestock development;

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- (d) develop the capacity to undertake research programs in specific aspects of livestock production which are appropriate to an international center. Such programs will require careful justification with particular emphasis given to their timing and to their international application;
- (e) organize, or assist in organizing, seminars, technical conferences and training courses for staff engaged in livestock research, extension, planning and production, in order particularly to increase regional competence in the multidisciplinary "systems" approach to livestock research and development;
- (f) make available statistical support, information or advice to national, regional or international authorities in the various fields relating to animal production in which the Center is actively engaged. In addition, the Center will engage in such other activities as may be found necessary in furtherance of its objectives.

5. POWERS

In furtherance of these purposes and activities, the Center shall have incidental power to:

(a) acquire or obtain from any governmental authority, national, municipal, or local foreign or domestic, or otherwise, or from any company, corporation, association, person or other entity, such charters, franchises, licenses, rights, privileges, assistance (financial or otherwise) and concessions as are conducive to and necessary for the attainment of the purpose of the Center;

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- (b) receive and acquire from any person, firm or entity, by donation, grant, exchange, devise, bequest, purchase or lease, either absolutely or in trust, contributions consisting of such property, real or personal, including funds and valuable effects or things, as may be useful or necessary to carry out the purpose and objectives of the Center and to hold, own, operate, use or dispose of said property or valuable things;
- (c) do and perform all acts and things as are necessary, expedient, suitable, or proper for the furtherance or accomplishment of the purposes and the attainment of any or all of the objectives herein stated, or which shall appear, at any time, as conducive to and useful for the activities of the Center.

6. STATUS OF THE CENTER

The Center will operate as an autonomous, non-profit organization, international in character, governed by a Board of Trustees selected as provided in Section 7 of this Memorandum, and directed by a Director selected as provided in Section 9 of this Memorandum.

7. GOVERNANCE

The Center will be governed by a Board of Trustees of twelve members, comprised and selected as follows:

Two members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia; Three members designated by the CGIAR or the Subcommittee;

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Six members-at-large with interests and qualifications relevant to the work of the Center. Of these members, at least three shall be African nationals (with appropriate representation from different parts of tropical Africa). These six members-at-large shall, in the first instance, be selected and appointed by the Subcommittee. If the Subcommittee shall have selected less than six members-at-large by the time of the first meeting of the Board of Trustees, the vacancies may be filled by the Board of Trustees; and the Director of the Center, <u>ex officio</u>.

The term of office of the members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia shall be determined by that State.

All other members of the Board shall serve for terms fixed by the Board, but not in excess of three years. These members shall be eligible to succeed themselves.

Vacancies among the members-at-large by reason of their retirement, death, incapacity or any other cause shall be filled by the Board of Trustees. Any such vacancies among the three members nominated by the CGIAR shall be filled by the CGIAR. New appointees shall be appointed for the remainder of the term of the member who is being replaced, or for three years in the case of those appointed to fill vacancies occurring as a result of the expiration of the term of a member.

The Board of Trustees of ILRAD shall be invited to send two of its members to attend as observers the meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Center.

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8. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees shall:

- (a) frame rules of procedure for its own working;
- (b) elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman;
- (c) determine policy for the operation of the Center;
- (d) select and appoint the Director of the Center for such a period or periods as it deems necessary and appropriate;
- (e) approve the programs developed for the Center by the Director;
- (f) approve the appointment of senior staff members of the Center on the recommendations of the Director;
- (g) scrutinize and approve the budget estimates for the Center;
- (h) take such action as shall be necessary to conclude and realize the purpose of, such formal relationships with ILRAD as may be determined from time to time by the CGIAR, including without limitation, dissolution or reconstitution of the Board or the Center; and
- do and perform all other acts considered necessary, suitable and proper for the attainment of any or all of the purposes, activities and objectives of the Center as enumerated in this Memorandum.

9. DIRECTOR

The Center will be administered by a Director appointed by the Board of Trustees.

The Director will be responsible to the Board of Trustees.

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He will implement the policies determined by the Board, follow the guidelines laid down by it for the functioning of the Center, carry out the directions of the Board and abide by its decisions. Under the overall policy guidance of the Board, the Director will be responsible for the operation and management of the Center and for assuring that its programs and objectives are properly developed and carried out.

10. COOPERATION WITH ILRAD

In realizing its purpose and carrying out its activities, the Center shall closely cooperate with ILRAD.

If and when the CGIAR determines that it would be appropriate to modify the cooperation between the Center and ILRAD under a formal relationship, the CGIAR will determine the terms and conditions under which that relationship shall be entered into. The Board of Trustees of the Center shall take all such action as shall be necessary to conclude, and realize the purposes of, such formal relationship in accordance with the directives of the CGIAR.

11. FINANCING

Financial support for the Center will be provided by members of the CGIAR, which will consider annually the budgetary requirements of the Center as approved by the Center's Board of Trustees. The Center will also be authorized to receive contributions from other sources. Full development of the Center and its program will be dependent upon the extent of the financial support thus provided.

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Several members of the CGIAR have indicated that they are prepared to contribute towards the costs of those preliminary activities necessary to establish the Center as an operating entity in a position to proceed with the execution of its research mission. It is contemplated that these contributions will be placed in a Special Account to be established and administered for this purpose by the Bank.

12. PARTICULAR COVENANTS

The Center will be established by international agreement between the Empire of Ethiopia and the Bank. Specifically, the Empire of Ethiopia hereby agrees to accord to, or in connection with, the Center and its staff the following rights, privileges and immunities:

- (a) Assurance of authority for the Board of Trustees to establish employment policies and conditions for the Center's staff on an international basis, without discrimination as to nationality or origin or any consideration other than qualifications and experience, as may be necessary to assure availability of wellqualified staff and high quality of performance;
- (b) assurance of procedures for expeditious clearance for entry into Ethiopia of trainees, scholars, and visitors concerned with the Center's program;
- (c) Authorization for the unrestricted movement of such biological materials into and out of Ethiopia as may be needed by the Center or for its cooperative programs in any part of the world consistent with the quarantine inspection laws and regulations of the Empire of

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Ethiopia to avoid the introduction or export of serious pests or diseases. The Empire of Ethiopia agrees to assure prompt and expeditious inspection of all materials;

(d) freedom for publication and dissemination by the Center of research results;

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- (e) the Center, its property and assets, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall enjoy immunity from every form of legal process except insofar as in any particular case it has expressly waived its immunity. It is, however, understood that no waiver of execution shall extend to any a measure of execution;
- (f) the premises of the Center shall be inviolable. The property, assets and archives of the Center, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall be immune from search, requisition, confiscation, expropriation and any other form of interference, whether by executive, administrative, judicial or legislative action;
- (g) to the extent necessary to carry out the operations provided for in this Agreement and subject to the provisions of this Agreement, all property and assets of the Center shall be free from restrictions, regulations, controls and moratoria of any nature;
- (h) the official communications of the Center shall enjoy treatment not less favorable than that accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to the official communications of any other comparable international institution.

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- (i) All trustees, officers and employees of the Center;
 - (i) shall be immune from legal process with respect to acts performed by them in the exercise of their official function except when the Center waives this immunity;
 - (ii) shall be exempt from taxation in respect of the salaries or emoluments paid to them by the Center;
 - (iii) shall, together with their spouses and relatives dependent on them be accorded the same immunities from immigration restrictions, alien registration requirements and national service obligations, the same treatment in respect of travelling facilities and the same repatriation facilities in time of international crisis as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable rank of international institutions;
 - (iv) shall be accorded the same facilities as regards exchange restrictions as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable rank of international institutions;
 - (v) shall have the right to import or re-export free of customs duty and other tax their personal and household furniture and effects at the time of first taking up their post in Ethiopia or within six months thereafter in accordance with the relevant customs regulations, provided, however, thal all customs duties and other taxes thereof

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shall first be paid in accordance with the laws and regulations then in force if sold locally;

- (j) No Ethiopian nationals, permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia or any other person locally employed by the Center or under the service of the Center shall be accorded any of the exemptions, immunities and facilities stated in Section 12(i).
- (k) The Center, its assets and other property shall be:
 - (i) exempt from all direct taxes; it is understood, however, that the Center will not claim exemption from taxes which are, in fact, no more than charges for public utility services;
 - (ii) exempt from customs duties and all other taxes or duties in respect of scientific and laboratory equipment imported or exported by the Center for its official use, it being understood that all such duties and other taxes shall first be paid in accordance with the relevant laws and regulations then in force if sold locally; however, customs duties and other taxes on vehicles, articles and supplies imported wholly, necessarily, and exclusively for the official use of the Center shall be paid by the Ministry of Agriculture.
 - (iii) exempt from duties other taxes, prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect of its publications.

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- 13. (a) The Empire of Ethiopia will make available to the Center on a long-term lease at a nominal rental, a tract of land of approximately eight hectares at or near Addis Ababa which is suitable for the purposes of the Center's headquarters, including land for office and service buildings and for other appropriate facilities.
 - (b) The Empire of Ethiopia also will make available to the Center on a long-term lease at a nominal rental one or more tracts of land of a size and location to be agreed between the parties to this Memorandum and being suitable for the research purposes of the Center.
 - (c) The Bank has agreed, within the limitation of funds donated by members of the CGIAR, to act, with the cooperation of IDRC, in taking steps to establish the Center in accordance with the provisions of this Memorandum, up to the point at which a Director and a Board of Trustees will have taken office and a staff sufficient, in the opinion of the Director and the Board of Trustees, to carry out the administration of the Center will have taken up its duties. At that point the Bank will endorse this Agreement to the Board of Trustees (and the Empire of Ethiopia agrees to such endorsement), turning over to that Board all the rights, obligations and assets it has incurred under this Agreement.

14. TERMINATION

The rights and obligations of the Bank under this Agreement will terminate at such time as the Bank endorses its

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rights and obligations under this Agreement to the Board of Trustees then responsible for the Center, pursuant to Section 13 of this Memorandum. Should it be necessary to terminate the Agreement for any reason other than by such endorsement, the disposition of the rights, obligations and physical assets, other than land, accrued up to that time shall be determined by the CGIAR in consultation with the Empire of Ethiopia. Disposition of any land held by or on behalf of the Center shall be governed by the terms of the lease agreement for such land.

A particular need exists for the study of Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever), which are especially destructive on the African continent. The success of efforts to increase livestock production in Africa by upgrading present genetic strains of cattle, by improving husbandry and management practices and by developing better rangelands are, in certain regions, largely dependent upon a program to bring about effective control of these two diseases.

The concept of an international research effort to attack these problems has been under study and discussion for some time by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (hereinafter referred to as the CGIAR). The CGIAR is co-spensored by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (the Bank), and the United Nations Development Programme; the membership of the CGIAR is indicated in Annex A hereto. To act for it in matters concerning research on livestock in Africa, the CGIAR has established a Subcommittee on African Livestock (hereinafter referred to as the Subcommittee), of which the Bank provides the chairman.

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From study and discussion by the CGIAR and its Subcommittee has emerged a proposal to establish an International Laboratory for Rescarch on Animal Diseases (hereinafter referred to as ILRAD) and an International Livestock Center for Africa (hereinafter referred to as the Center). It is intended that the activities of these two institutions will be closely coordinated. The Center will conduct research and training activities aimed at-improving livestock production systems. The staff on ILRAD will concentrate initially on intensive research concerning the immunological and related aspects of controlling Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis, and possibly at a later stage other animal diseases. The headquarters of the Center would be situated in Ethiopia, and ILRAD would be situated in Kenya: The CGIAR has also decided that these two institutions should be established under arrangements which would enable them to be integrated at some future date and that it is desirable that ILRAD and the Center come under a common Board at the earliest appropriate time subject to further discussion and decision by the CGIAR at the time.

Subject to the approval of their respective governing bodies, certain interested members of the CGIAR have indicated a willingness in principle to provide financial support for the establishment of the Center, both during the initial stage of its development and as a continuing matter thereafter. The Subcommittee has asked the Bank to act as Executing agency to bring the Center into being and to that end to enlist the cooperation of the International Development Research Center (hereinafter referred to as IDRC) pursuant to arrangements to be made between them.

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Now, therefore, the parties to this Memorandum agree to work together toward the establishment of the Center as an

international research and training institution, with suitable governance and legal charter, and appropriate status, authorities, privileges and other conditions necessary to enable it to operate effectively and effeciently toward the attainment of its objectives when provided the requisite financial support. Specifically, the parties to this Memorandum agree:

1. NAME

The name of the Center shall be the International Livestock Center for Africa.

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2. LOCATION

The headquarters of the Center shall be at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, the Center will, in addition, establish such research units as may be needed, at locations to be designated in Africa, with at least one such unit in Ethiopia.

3. PURPOSES

The purpose of the Center shall be to assist national efforts which aim to effect a change in the production and marketing systems in tropical Africa south of the Sahara so as to increase the total yield and output of livestock products and improve the quality of life of the people in this region. The Center will serve:

- (a) as an international center for research to promote the development and demonstration of improved livestock production systems optimizing the use of human and natural resources in Africa,
 - (b) as a focal point for training activities which will increase regional competence in a systems approach to livestock production and development, and
 - (c) as a multidisciplinary documentation center, working in both French and English, for the Livestock Industry of Africa.

In carrying forward its program, the Center will develop close linkage with national and regional organizations undertaking research and training activities in the same or closely related fields of interest.

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4. ACTIVITIES

The activities of the Center will serve to identify means of increasing the efficiency of the major animal production systems of tropical Africa and to assist the governments and authorities responsible for achieving new levels of productivity. In particular, the Center will engage in the following types of activities:

- (a)retrieve, assemble and make available in both English and French all relevant information on animal production in tropical Africa;
- (b) engage a multidisciplinary research staff to study existing animal production systems (including breeding , feeding management and related health aspects of husbandry, the improvement of range and pastures, and the social and economic factors affecting the livestock industry including processing and marketing), develop new or amended systems of production, and define priorities for other research;
- (c) support, supplement and cooperate with existing national and regional research stations or programs in developing a fully coordinated program of production and rangeland research which is related appropriately to the urgent needs of livestock development;

 (d) develop the capacity to undertake research programs in specific aspects of livestock production which are appropriate to an international center. Such programs will require careful justification with particular emphasis given to their timing and to their international application;

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- (c) organize, or assist in organizing, seminars, technical conferences and training courses for staff engaged in livestock research, extension, planning and production, in order particularly to increase regional competence in the multidisciplinary "systems" approach to livestock research and development;
- (f) make available statistical support, information or advice to national, regional or international authorities in the various fields relating to animal production in which the Center is actively engaged.
 In addition, the Center will engage in such other activities as may be found necessary in furtherance of its objectives.

5. POWERS

In furtherance of these purposes and activities, the Center shall have incidental power to:

(a) acquire or obtain from any governmental authority, national, municipal, or local foreign or domestic, or otherwise, or from any company, corporation, association, person or other entity, such charters, franchises, licenses, rights, privileges, assistance (financial or otherwise) and concessions as are conducive to and necessary for the attainment of the purpose of the Center;

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(b) receive and acquire from any person, firm or entity,
 by donation, grant, exchange, devise, bequest, purchase
 or lease, either absolutely or in trust, contributions
 consisting of such property, real or personal, inclu ding funds and valuable effects or things, as may be
 useful or necessary to carry out the purpose and
 objectives of the Center and to hold, own, operate,
 use or dispose of said property or valuable things;

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(c) do and perform all acts and things as are necessary, expedient, suitable, or proper for the furtherance or accomplishment of the purposes and the attainment of any or all of the objectives herein stated, or which shall appear, at any time, as conducive to and useful for the activities of the Center.

6. STATUS OF THE CENTER

The Center will operate as an autonomous, non-profit organization, international in character, governed by a Board of Trustees selected as provided in Section 7 of this Memorandum, and directed by a Director selected as provided in Section 9 of this Memorandum.

7. GOVERNANCE

The Center will be governed by a Board of Trustees of twelve members, comprised and selected as follows:

Two members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia: Three members designated by the CGIAR or the Subcommittee; Six members-at-large with interests and qualifications relevant to the work of the Center. Of these members, at least three shall be African nationals (with appropriate representation from different parts of tropical Africa). These six members-at-large shall, in the first instance, be selected and appointed by the Subcommittee. If the Subcommittee shall have selected less than six members-at-large by the time of the first meeting of the Board of Trustees, the vacancies may be filled by the Board of Trustees; and the Director of the Center, ex officio.

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: The term of office of the members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia shall be determined by that State.

All other members of the Board shall serve for terms fixed by the Board, but not in excess of three years. These members shall be eligible to succeed themselves.

Vacancies among the members-at-large by reason of their retirement, death, incapacity or any other cause shall be filled by the Board of Trustees. Any such vacancies among the three members nominated by the CGIAR shall be filled by the CGIAR. New appointees shall be appointed for the remainder of the term of the member who is being replaced, or for three years in the case of those appointed to fill vacancies occurring as a result of the expiration of the term of a member.

The Board of Trustees of ILRAD shall be invited to send two of its members to attend as observers the meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Center.

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8. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees shall:

- (a) frame rules of procedure for its own working;
- (b) elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman;
- (c) determine policy for the operation of the Center; .

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- (d) select and appoint the Director of the Center for such a period or periods as it deems necessary and appropriate;
- (e) approve the programs developed for the Center by the Director;
- (f) approve the appointment of senior staff members of the Center on the recommendations of the Director;
- (g) scrutinize and approve the budget estimates for the Center;
- (h) take such action as shall be necessary to conclude and realize the purpose of, such formal relationships with ILRAD as may be determined from time to time by the CGIAR, including without limitation, dissolution or reconstitution of the Board or the Center; and
- (i) do and perform all other acts considered necessary, suitable and proper for the attainment of any or all of the purposes, activities and objectives of the Center as enumerated in this Memorandum.

9. DIRECTOR

The Center will be administered by a Director appointed by the Board of Trustees.

The Director will be responsible to the Board of Trustees.

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He will implement the policies determined by the Board, follow the guidelines laid down by it for the functioning of the Center, carry out the directions of the Board and abide by its decisions. Under the overall policy guidance of the Board, the Director will be responsible for the operation and management of the Center and for assuring that its programs and objectives are properly developed and carried out.

10. COOPERATION WITH ILRAD

In realizing its purpose and carrying out its activities, the Center shall closely cooperate with ILRAD.

If and when the CGIAR determines that it would be appropriate to modify the cooperation between the Center and ILRAD under a formal relationship, the CGIAR will determine the terms and conditions under which that relationship shall be entered into. The Board of Trustees of the Center shall take all such action as shall be necessary to conclude, and realize the purposes of, ch formal relationship in accordance with the directives of the

CGIAR.

11. FINANCING

Financial support for the Center will be provided by members of the CGIAR, which will consider annually the budgetary requirements of the Center as approved by the Center's Board of Trustees. The Center will also be authorized to receive contributions from other sources. Full development of the Center and its program will be dependent upon the extent of the financial support thus provided.

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Several members of the CGIAR have indicated that they are prepared to contribute towards the costs of those preliminary activities necessary to establish the Center as an operating entity in a position to proceed with the execution of its research mission. It is contemplated that these contributions will be placed in a Special Account to be established and administered for this purpose by the Bank.

12. PARTICULAR COVENANTS

The Center will be established by international agreement between the Empire of Ethiopia and the Bank. Specifically, the pire of Ethiopia hereby agrees to accord to, or in connection with, the Center and its staff the following rights, privileges and immunities:

- (a). Assurance of authority for the Board of Trustees to establish employment policies and conditions for the Center's staff on an international basis, without discrimination as to nationality or origin or any consideration other than qualifications and experience, as may be necessary to assure availability of wellqualified staff and high quality of performance;
 - (b) assurance of procedures for expeditious clearance for entry into Ethiopia of trainees, scholars, and visitors concerned with the Center's program;
 - (c) Authorization for the unrestricted movement of such biological materials into and out of Ethiopia as may be needed by the Center or for its cooperative programs in any part of the world consistent with the quarantine inspection laws and regulations of the Enpire of

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Ethiopia to avoid the introduction or export of serious pests or diseases. The Empire of Ethiopia agrees to assure prompt and expeditious inspection of all materials;

(d) freedom for publication and dissemination by the Center .
 of research results;.

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- (c) the Center; its property and assets, wherever located and by whomspever held; shall enjoy immunity from every form of legal process except insofar as in any particular case it has expressly waived its immunity. It is, however, understood that no waiver of execution shall extend to any a measure of execution;
- (f) the premises of the Center shall be inviolable. The property, assets and archives of the Center, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall be immune from search, requisition, confiscation, expropriation and any other form of interference, whether by executive, administrative, judicial or legislative action;
- (g) to the extent necessary to carry out the operations provided for in this Agreement and subject to the provisions of this Agreement, all property and assets of the Center shall be free from restrictions, regulations, controls and moratoria of any nature;
- (h) the official communications of the Center shall enjoy treatment not less favorable than that accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to the official communications of any other comparable international institution.

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(i) All trustees, officers and employees of the Center;

- 13 -

- (i) shall be immune from legal process with respect to acts performed by them in the exercise of their official function except when the Center waives this immunity;
- (11) shall be exempt from taxation in respect of the salaries or emoluments paid to them by the Center;
- shall, together with their spouses and relatives (iii)dependent on them be accorded the same immunities from immigration restrictions, alien registration requirements and national service obligations, the same treatment in respect of travelling facilities and the same repatriation facilities in time of international crisis as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of compare able rank of international institutions;

(iv) shall be accorded the same facilities as regards exchange restrictions as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable ... rank of international institutions;

shall have the right to import or re-export free of customs duty and other tax their personal and household furniture and effects at the time of first taking up their post in Ethiopia or within six months thereafter in accordance with the relevant customs regulations, provided, however, thal all customs duties and other taxes thereof

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shall first be paid in accordance with the laws and regulations then in force if sold locally;

(j) No Ethiopian nationals, permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia or any other person locally employed by the Center or under the service of the Center shall be accorded any of the exemptions, immunities and facilities stated in Section 12(i).

(k) The Center, its assets and other property shall be:

- 14

- (i) exempt from all direct taxes; it is understood, however, that the Center will not claim exemption from taxes which are, in fact, no more than charges for public utility services;
- exempt from customs duties and all other taxes (ii)or duties in respect of scientific and laboratory equipment imported or exported by the Center for its official use, it being understood that all such duties and other taxes shall first be paid in accordance with the relevant laws and regulations then in force if sold locally; however, customs duties and other taxes on vehicles, · articles and supplies imported wholly, necessarily, and exclusively for the official use of the Center shall be paid by the Ministry of Agriculture;

(iii) exempt from duties other taxes, prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect . of its publications.

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13. (a) The Empire of Ethiopia will make available to the Center on a long-term lease at a nominal rental, a tract of land of approximately eight hectares at or near Addis Ababa which is suitable for the purposes of the Center's headquarters, including land for office and service buildings and for other appropriate facilities.

- (b) The Empire of Ethiopia also will make available to the Center on a long-term lease at a nominal rental one or more tracts of land of a size and location to be agreed between the parties to this Memorandum and being suitable for the research purposes of the Center.
- (c) The Bank has agreed, within the limitation of funds donated by members of the CGIAR, to act, with the cooperation of IDRC, in taking steps to establish the Center in accordance with the provisions of this Memorandum, up to the point at which a Director and a Board of Trustees will have taken office and a staff sufficient, in the opinion of the Director and the Board of Trustees, to carry out the administration of the Center will have taken up its duties. At that point the Bank will endorse this Agreement to the Board of Trustees (and the Empire of Ethiopia agrees to such endorsement), turning over to that Board all the rights, obligations and assets it has incurred under this Agreement.

14. TERMINITION

The rights and obligations of the Bank under this Agreement will terminate at such time as the Bank endorses its

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rights and obligations under this Agreement to the Board of Trustees then responsible for the Center, pursuant to Section 13 of this Memorandum. Should it be necessary to terminate the Agreement for any reason other than by such endorsement, the disposition of the rights, obligations and physical assets, other than land, accrued up to that time shall be determined by the CGIAR in consultation with the Empire of Ethiopia. Disposition of any land held by or on behalf of the Center shall be governed by the terms of the lease agreement for such land.

Recommended Amendments to Memorandum of Agreement on ILCA

1. As you know, the Bank accepts, in principle, that the draft Memorandum of Agreement can serve as the charter of the International Livestock Center for Africa. We believe, however, that in order for the Memorandum to serve as the charter, certain pro forma amendments are necessary to the text of the Memorandum. These amendments do not raise issues of substance.

2. The amendments are shown on the attached pages 5, 7, 8 and 12 of the Ethiopian Government text of the Memorandum, and on an extra page appended to these pages.

3. The amendment on page 5 [Section 1] establishes the Center. The amendment on page 7 [Section 5] gives the Center full juridical personality (which in a layman's sense is part of the act of establishment, and helps to characterize) what is being established). The amendment on page 7 [Section 5(c)] specifically enumerates, among the broad endowment of powers mentioned in this section, the power to institute legal proceedings. The amendment on page 12 [Section 12] eliminates language which, under the recommended changes, already would have occurred on page 5 [Section 1]. The amendment on the final, extra page, provides for the coming into force of the Agreement.

4. In addition, the opportunity is taken to suggest changes which correct mechanical errors in the text or incorporate language already agreed to. The change in Section 2 (page 5), the deletion on page 12, and the comma near the bottom of page 15, would rectify mechanical errors. The amendment at the end of the Ethiopian Government text simply theorporates the language which the Minister of Agriculture has kindly provided in his letter of November 24 to me.

5. Finally, changes are recommended in paragraph j on page 15 of the Ethiopian Government text for the purposes of simplifying the language and of rectifying what we believe to have been an unintentional change in the meaning of Section 12, of which this paragraph is a part.

6. The simplifying changes occur in lines 2 and 3 of paragraph (j). Some confusion has been caused in the minds of Bank staff by a possible ambiguity in the word "employed," which might be interpreted very broadly to mean the state of being employed or interpreted moredstrictly to mean the act of being hired. The meaning here is "hired,: and it is recommended that this word be used. So long as that meaning is clear, the phrase Mr. Malone

"or under the service of the Center" is unnecessary. The individuals named in the paragraph would include all persons locally hired, whether they had been hired as regular members of the staff or had been hired casually or on contract for some incidental purpose.

7. The final change recommended is in the final line of paragraph (j). Paragraph (j) constitutes a limitation on the privileges and immunities extended in the previous paragraph, (i). It says that those privileges and immunities do not extend to Ethiopian nationals, permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia, or persons locally hired.

8. The privileges and immunities extended in paragraph (i) concern, first, immunity from legal process with respect to acts performed by employees in their official functions, second, exemption from taxation, third, exemption from certain travel, immigration and national service requirements, fourth, treatment with regard to exchange restrictions, and, fifth, treatment with respect to importation of articles for personal use.

9. In the draft text of the Memorandum of Agreement which preceded the present text, the limitation of these privileges and immunities was attached to the second, third and fourth set of privileges and immunities. The limitation was expressed in each of the three paragraphs setting forth these immunities.

10. In the present draft, the limitation has been expressed only once. It was explained to we that this change was made only in order to simplify the text and to eliminate the repetition that had occurred in the earlier text. As now expressed, however, the limitation applies to all five sets of immunities and privileges instead of the three which were affected in the earlier draft. I believe this was inadvertent; and I do not believe that the change was intended to put a limitation on immunity from legal process with respect to official acts, which is a standard immunity. It is therefore recommended that the new text be amended to restore this standard immunity.

The Legal Department has now given me their recommendations concerning the changes they wish to have made in the ILCA Memorandum of Agreement in order for that Bocument to serve as the charter for ILCA. The changes are important in a formal sense but they do not seem, with one possible exception, to raise any issues of substance.

With this letter, I am sending you individual pages of the TLCA Memorandum showing the recommended changes, together with a memorandum describing the changes and a letter to John Malone in Addis raising some questions to which we seem to need answers. (The possible point of substance in the changes is the last point in my memorandum to Malone.)

For the moment, the situation does not meem to present any issues on which the Livestock Subcommittee needs to be consulted. If you disagree, will you send me a cable? If not, I will (to quote you) take silence to mean assent.

And of course I will keep you informed about what happens next. As for what has happened already, Sadun has been making preparations to get off to Nairobi to take up his duties there, which at last accounts he expected to do in January.

Pagot, on the other hand, will not be ready to move to Addie until March or thereabouts. In the meantime, he and Hodgson are planning to visit Senegal, Mali, Nigeria, Niger and Cameroon late in January and in February. Plans also are being made for a small meeting of experts to discuss the subject of ILCA's documentation program, but I keek do not know when or where that will take place.

Dear John:

The Legal Department has now indicated what changes it believes should be made in the ILCA Memorandum of Agreement in order for that Memorandum to serve as the charter for ILCA. I have written the changes into individual pages of the Memorandum and have described them in a memorandum to you. With this letter, I am sending three copies of my memorandum and three sets of the pages containing changes.

Please retain all the copies until we decide what to do next.

Contrary to what might have been expected, the changes recommended by the Legal Department are not very formidable. With one possible exception (at the last point covered in my memorandum to you), the changes do not seem to raise any points of substance: they are important in a formal sense, but do not present any issues.

That seems to mean that we have the following problems:

Firstly, assuming that the changes present no difficulty on their own account, can we get the Minister to go back to the Cabinet to approve a slightly amended text of the Memorandum of Agreement? This by all odds would be the simplest and most straightforward approach.

The Minister obviously is reluctant (to say the least) to go back. Do you know whether there are any special reasons for this? Or is it just a natural reluctance on the part of the Minister to retract his assurance to the Cabinet that the Council would have to deal with the matter only once?

If it is the latter, could some kind of humble-pie letter from me, for the Consultative Group, overcome the Minister's reluctance?

If we said that the misunderstanding concerning the chartering of ILCA was all our fault, could this persuade him to return to the Gouncil? If the Trustees-designate (who are to meet in Addis on January 14-16) were to join in some kind of request to the Minister, would this help?

Secondly, if we cannot get the Minister to return to the Council, is there some acceptable alternative to the charter problem? For instance, we night sign the Memorandum of Agreement pretty much as it now is; and the Government might then recognize the juridical personality by issuing a decree. Or would this be at least as difficult to arrange as a return to the Council with a new text of the Memorandum?

Thirdly, I have not been able to enlighten the Legal Department, despite the Minister's best efforts and those of his counsel to explain the ratter to me, about the procedures and legal authority involved. Would the Minister's signature, on directions of the Cobinet, constitute a legal means of establishing ILCA, and, if so, what is the low or the the legal authority involved?. As a side issue, does the Minister have the authority to commit the Ministry of Finance to expedite the clearance of TLCA imports, as he promises in paragraph 2 of his side letter to me?

You may then think that it would be useful to have the third set of questions, and probably the second also, explored by local counsel, who would act on behalf of the Consultative Group Secretariat rather than the Bank's Resident Representative in Addis. If this is the case, I'd appreciate a telex from you.

I have been requested to attend the meeting of the ILCA Tructeesdesignate which is to begin in Addis on January 14, and my present intention is to do so. I will be getting into Addis sometime early Sunday morning, January 13. It will be very easy for me to get in from the airport to the Hilton on my cwn, but we might think of meeting sometime during Sunday if you think a meeting would be useful.

The Minister himself, of course, is one of the Trustees-designate of ILCA, but I do not know whether he intends to attend the Trustees' meet-

ing. If you thought it important for him and me to meet again, that could be arranged, as far as I am concerned, at any time on January 14 or until about 2:30 pm on January 15, when I will have to start making tracks for my plane.

Dear Mr. Coulibaly:

As you will remember, the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research since 1972 has been taking steps to establish an International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA). Negotiations with the Ethiopian Government for establishment of the headquarters of the Center in Addis Ababa are nearing a conclusion. In addition, ten donor governments and organizations are joining together to make approximately \$1,000,000 equivalent available to ILCA for its Initial Stage, during which it will plan its program of activities in more detail and begin preparing plans for its physical facilities in Ethiopia.

A Board of Trustees, a Chairman of the Board, and a Director of ILCA have also been designated. The designated Chairman is Dr. Ralph Hodgson, formerly of the United States Department of Agriculture, and the designated Director is M. Jean Pagot, formerly director of the French Institut de l'Elevage near Paris.

Dr. Hodgson and M. Pagot are now planning to visit countries of West Africa. Their purpose is to acquaint themselves with the livestock research now being carried out by these countries, to explain the objectives of ILCA, and to discuss with the appropriate authorities the kinds of cooperation which it might be desirable to arrange between ILCA and national research organizations.

Dr. Hodgson and M. Pagot are intending to visit Mali on Monday, February 4. The World Bank and the other members of the Consultative Group would be most grateful to you if you and M. Bakary Coulibaly

your colleagues could arrange a suitable program for the visit of Dr. Hodgson and M. Pagot to Mali. I would be glad to pass along to Dr. Hodgson and M. Pagot any information concerning this program that you might be able to make available to me in advance of their visit.

First of all there is a garble in the paragraph, caused by a typist inserting the word "a" unnecessarily in the last line of the paragraph. The word "a" should be deleted from the text at this point.

As for the meaning of the text, the meaning of the first sentence seems clear enough. The meaning of the second sentence is that if ILCA does waive its immunity from legal process in a particular matter, it cannot avoid any action resulting from that process by retracting its waiver of immunity.

Dear Jim:

Attached is a long memorandum to the Legal Department, reciting the recent history of ILCA. The purpose of the memorandum, as you can see, was to get the Department to give an opinion on what steps should be taken to resolve the question now pending between the Bank, as Executing Agency, and the Ethiopian Government, as prospective host government to ILCA. The question, you will remember, is whether the Memorandum of Agreement between the two can also be made to serve as the charter of ILCA.

Messrs. Delaume and Asser think it can, but also believe that if it is to do so, certain amendments must be made to it. Amendments would probably require the Minister of Agriculture to return to the Council of Ministers for further approval, and up to now, his attitude has been that he is unwilling to do this.

I have not yet seen the amandments which the Legal Department considers to be necessary, but will send them off to you post-haste when they are available. When you have had time to receive them, we probably should talk by telephone, and you, as Chairman of the Livestock Subcommittee, should tell me whether you think the matter should be pursued along the lines recommended by the Legal Department and whether, before it is, we should consult the members of the Subcommittee.

The news about oil this worning is a little more cheerful than it has been. I hope, in any case, that you have been able to find some seasonal cheer.

SUBJECT:

International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA)

We need to make a decision promptly concerning the establishment in Ethiopia of the International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA). Since the end of October, ILCA has had funds, a designated Board of Trustees, and a designated Director, but has not been able to proceed with its business. One reason is that the Bank has not yet made up its mind whether the procedures stipulated by the host government for legally establishing ILCA are valid and acceptable.

I hope that the Bank can make up its mind on this question without delay. The individuals designated to be the Trustees of ILCA intend to meet in Addis Ababa on January 14, 15 and 16. They should meet on that date as Trustees of a legally established entity; and the Director should be put in a position to move as promptly as possible on hiring initial staff, signing contracts for equipment and services, and the like.

II.

In the matter of ILCA, the Bank is not acting simply for itself. It is acting as Executing Agency for a group of governments and organizations which include most of the principal Part I members of the Bank, in order to set up a research project intended to benefit countries which include more than two-thirds of the population of the continent of Africa. Members of the group have pledged about \$1 million for ILCA's start-up phase; and it is expected that over the next 20 years (to mention the same time span as applies to the River Blindness project), grants to ILCA will amount to \$90 million or more.

The Bank is acting specifically on behalf of the Livestock Subcommittee of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research; the Subcommittee has been directed by the Group to accomplish the ILCA project. The members of the Subcommittee, most of whom also are donors to ILCA, are Belgium, Denmark, FAO, France, The Ford Foundation, Germany, the International Development Research Centre (based in Canada), The Rockefeller Foundation, Sweden, the UNDP, the United Kingdom, the United States and the International Development Association.

In August, the Subcommittee selected individuals to serve on the Board of Trustees of ILCA, in accordance with the provision of the Memorandum on the composition of the Board. In October, the Government of Ethiopia designated the two individuals (including the Minister of Agriculture of Ethiopia) who are to represent it on the Board.

On October 26 and 27, the Trustees-designate (lacking one Ethiopian member) held an informal meeting at Heathrow Airport in London to discuss further steps in the establishment of ILCA. At this time, an individual was selected to be the Chief Executive Officer (Director-General) of ILCA.

III.

As Executing Agency, the Bank has undertaken, among other things, to negotiate the establishment of ILCA with the Government of Ethiopia. With Mr. Asser participating, negotiations were begun in Addis Ababa in the first week of July, 1973. A draft Memorandum of Agreement between the Government of Ethiopia and the Bank as Executing Agency had been prepared, and this Memorandum was revised by Mr. Asser in the course of the July mission.

The draft was then considered by the Ethiopian Cabinet, first in a subcommittee and then in full Cabinet. As a result, further revisions were made in the draft Memorandum of Agreement. These were approved by the Cabinet in October, and the text, so far as the Ethiopian Government is concerned, became final.

The revisions were cabled to Washington by Mr. Malone, the Bank's resident representative in Ethiopia. They raised two points which seemed to need clarification.

One question concerned Section 12, paragraph (i)(v) of the draft text. The Ethiopian revision added the phrase, "in accordance with the relevant customs regulations" to the paragraph, which otherwise was intended to exempt expatriate employes of ILCA from customs duties on articles imported by them.

The other question concerned Section 12, paragraph (k)(ii) of the draft Memorandum. This paragraph concerned the payment of customs taxes on non-scientific articles imported by ILCA for the purposes of its operation. The amendment adopted by the Ethiopian Cabinet provided that such articles, for the most part, would be subject to import taxes, but that the taxes would be paid by the Ethiopian Ministry of Agriculture.

Here the issue concerned the procedure which would be followed in clearing ILCA imports through customs. The question was whether ILCA would be liable to tax in the first instance, subject to reimbursement by the Ministry of Agriculture (which might be forthcoming only after a delay) or whether in some way non-performance by the Ministry of Agriculture could obstruct imports by the Center or otherwise subject the Center to major administrative inconvenience.

I discussed these two matters with the Minister of Agriculture during the meeting at Heathrow Airport. On the first, the Minister said the intent of the amendment was to give ILCA expatriate employes the same import privileges as are enjoyed by the non-Ethiopian staff of U. N. organizations working in Ethiopia.

On the second, the Minister said that he would be glad to provide a side letter confirming a procedure, suggested by me, which would hold ILCA safe against non-performance by the Ministry of Agriculture in the matter of import taxes. 1/

IV.

Following the London meeting, it was my understanding that the next step would be for me to receive the promised side letter or side letters from the Minister of Agriculture concerning the points discussed. Pending the receipt of this letter, I further considered the language of Section 12, paragraph (i)(v) as amended, and in cabled correspondence with Malone, questioned whether the paragraph, in fact, could have the meaning ascribed to it by the Minister. Mr. Selassie of the Bank's legal staff (both Mr. Delaume and Mr. Asser being away) expressed the opinion that it could not (which later proved indeed to be the case).

On November 23, I called on the Minister of Agriculture in Addis Ababa for a further discussion with him. Mr. Malone and the Minister's own legal counsel were present for this meeting. The point emerged that the Minister's interpretation of Section 12, paragraph (i) (v) had not been correct. The amendment, in fact, negated the concession that the original draft of this paragraph had been intended to bestow.

The Minister, however, reiterated his willingness to stipulate that a procedure satisfactory from the standpoint of ILCA would be followed concerning importations by ILCA. A letter containing this stipulation, in fact, was delivered to me in Addis Ababa on November 24. A copy of this letter, together with a telegraphic amendment of it, is attached.

1/ We also discussed a third point, not relevant to any basic issue, which arose during the general discussion at the Heathrow meeting. It arose from the observation of one of the participants that if American foundations were to make grants to ILCA, for such grants to be classified by the American Internal Revenue Service as charitable contributions it would be necessary to amend the provisions of the Memorandum concerning the disposition of ILCA's immovable assets in the event of the dissolution of ILCA.

It has been possible to discuss the Ethiopian amendments to the draft Memorandum of Agreement with the Chairman of the African Livestock Subcommittee of the Consultative Group, with the Chairmandesignate of the ILCA Board of Trustees, and with the Directordesignate of ILCA. In the view of all three, the draft Memorandum of Agreement, taken together with the Minister's side letter, is acceptable, and would constitute a satisfactory framework for the operations of ILCA. The Chairman of the Subcommittee believes, moreover, that the question need not be referred back to the Subcommittee.

As a statement of the understanding between the Government of Ethiopia and the Bank as Executing Agency for the Consultative Group, the Memorandum is ready for signature by the Bank and by the Government of Ethiopia. As you know, the Executive Directors have authorized the Bank's signature in this wise; and the Council of Ministers (i. e., Cabinet) of Ethiopia has authorized signature on behalf of the Government of Ethiopia. The text of the Ethiopian authorization, in Amharic and in English translation, is attached.

V.

Along the way, however, still another issue has arisen concerning the establishment of ILCA. As a result of the July mission, Mr. Asser had understood that ILCA would be legally established by an international agreement between Ethiopia and the Bank; and language to this effect appears as the first sentence of Section 12 of the draft Memorandum of Agreement. Specifically, it had been understood by Mr. Asser that in addition to the Memorandum of Agreement there would be a second document, based largely on the Memorandum, but containing some additional language.

In the course of telex exchanges with Malone about the questions that had arisen concerning the substance of the Memorandum of Agreement, I discovered (early in November) that the Minister of Agriculture. for whatever reason, did not share this understanding concerning the drafting and signature of a document additional to the Memorandum of Agreement. His view was, and is, that the Memorandum of Agreement itself is the international agreement, between the Bank and the Government of Ethiopia, which will give ILCA legal existence.

To make this perfectly clear, the Minister would change the first sentence of Section 12 in the signature copy of the Memorandum to read, "The Center is established by international agreement between the Empire of Ethiopia and the Bank" (my underlining).

In our meeting on November 23, the Minister said that the signature of the Memorandum would constitute a procedure analagous to the procedure whereby private companies are established in Ethiopia. (In the latter,

the agreement is signed by the Ministry of Industry and Commerce.) The Minister's counsel takes the view (according to a telephone conversation I had with Malone on December 7 in Addis Ababa) that the document would, in fact, be an international agreement. It seems to me that the two views do not contradict each other.

In Addis on November 23, I discussed this aspect of the matter with the Minister, on the basis of some very hasty conversations with Mr. Delaume and Mr. Asser. I said that the Bank, in principle, was prepared to accept the Memorandum of Agreement as a means of legally establishing ILCA, subject to certain observations and further discussion of various points which I was unable to enumerate in detail.

The Legal Department, I said, thought it desirable to include in the Memorandum some language concerning the significance of ILCA for economic development in order, as I understood it, to make the document more reflective of the Bank's own purposes and functions. The Minister said that he did not understand what practical purpose would be served by the inclusion of such language; and it became apparent, not for the first time, that the Minister would be unwilling to make this or any other change in the text which would require him to take the matter up with the Council of Ministers once more.

Further discussion, I told the Minister, might concern the language of Section 5, enumerating the powers to be given the Center. The purpose would be to insure that the Center did, in fact, have all the powers it would need to conduct its business, including the power to own property, sign leases and the like.

The Minister replied that the language already seemed quite inclusive, and that it was certainly the intention of his Government to give the Center all necessary powers. If the Bank, as Executing Agency, would like to address to him a letter stipulating all the powers it understood to be embraced by Section 5, he would be glad to consider the letter and, if he agreed, to countersign the letter as an indication of agreement.

That is where the matter rests. I cabled from Ethiopia earlier this month that I believed it was urgent for a member of the Legal Department to visit Addis Ababa to discuss this matter this week. Since then, it has occurred to me that the matter might be decided, one way or another, without a visit to Ethiopia. In any case, an early decision is devoutly to be wished, to meet the desire of ILCA Trustees to meet on January 14 as a legal body. In this connection, it should be remembered that as far as time is concerned, not only do we have our own holidays to contend with here, but also we have to contend with the holidays in Ethiopia around Christmas Day, which in Ethiopia is observed on January 7.

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

On December 3, 1973, the Mamorandum of Understanding providing for the establishment of a fund for the initial stage of the International Livestock Center for Africa was signed by representatives of Denmark, France, Germany, the U. S. A. and IDA. Accordingly, the Memorandum is now effective, and the fund is now open to receive the contribution of your Government. The contribution should be paid, not later than March 1, 1974, to the Denmarks Nationalbank, Holmens Kanal 17, DK-1093, Copenhagen K, for Account B of International Bank for Reconstruction and Development. It would help the Denmarks Nationalbank to report this transaction to the International Bank if your authorities, in making the transfer, would indicate that the funds are being deposited for the purposes of the International Livestock Center for Africa.

The Memorandum of Understanding for the ILCA Project (International Livestock Center for Africa) is now in final form and it will be signed by the first group of initial donors on Monday, December 3. 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MEETING OF THE MEMBERS ELECT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK CENTRE FOR AFRICA

London, England. November 28, 1973

The meeting was opened by Mr. Evans, Chairman of the African Livestock Sub-Committee, who took the chair on a temporary basis (pending the election of a Chairman). He pointed out that the World Bank as Executing Agency and the Livestock Sub-Committee would continue to give help as long as it was necessary and that business of the Board could be kept going on an informal basis until the first official meeting of the Board of Trustees.

1. Election of Chairman of the Board

The first item of business was to elect a Chairman of the Board on a temporary basis, his appointment to be ratified later.

Professor Tribe spoke on the selection of a chairman pointing out that the qualities needed were a man of wide scientific and administrative ability and in addition sufficient free time to carry out the work needed.

Professor Tribe proposed Dr. Ralph Hodgson as Chairman, seconded by Dr. Pagot and this proposal was carried unanimously. On the appointment of the new Chairman, Mr. Evans handed over his duties to Dr. Hodgson. Dr. Pagot offered his congratulations and thanks to Mr. Evans for all his preparatory work in connection with the Board of Trustees which was supported by all the other members. Mr. Evans then withdrew.

Dr. Hodgson expressed his thanks to the Board for their confidence in him, and although he was looking forward to his retirement, he was very interested in the aims and objectives of ILCA, and would be pleased to give his best to the work of the Board.

2. Election of Vice-Chairman of the Board

Dr. Pratt proposed the name of Mr. M. Mensah. This was seconded by H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa and carried with acclamation.

3. Nomination of a Director

Professor Tribe explained how a final list of possible candidates had been reduced from about thirty names to a short list of five. As Dr. Pagot was on the short list of candidates, he asked to withdraw while this subject was under discussion.

Professor Tribe then gave a brief resume of each of the five possible candidates, and at the request of Professor Knutsson, indicated the criteria used in the selection of a Director. It was agreed that there was no need for appointing a sub-committee to consider applicants but that a choice could be made at once. H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa proposed that Dr. J. Pagot should be appointed Director and this was seconded by Mr. Mensah and carried with acclamation. In view of the fact that the Board had not yet acquired official status it was agreed that he should be temporarily appointed as Project Development Officer and his post to be temporarily financed by IDRC.

Dr. Pagot then returned to the meeting and was informed of his election and expressed his thanks in the confidence of the Board in selecting him. The details of his temporary appointment would be worked out with IDRC. H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa moved the following resolution :-

> "The members-elect of the ILCA Board request IDRC to support further their activities by:

(a) engaging temporarily on behalf of the Board, Dr. R. Hodgson as a Consultant and Dr. J. Pagot as Project Development Officer of ILCA (at a fee of Canadian \$120.00 per day);

- (b) providing such secretarial and administrative support as may seem appropriate after discussion between IDRC and Dr. Hodgson and Dr. Pagot;
- (c) financing such meetings of the Executive Committee (elect) as may be convened by Dr. Hodgson before the first formal meeting of the Board in Ethiopia;
- (d) financing the first Board meeting to be held in Ethiopia;
- (e) financing a meeting in Rome of a small panel to advise the Board on the planning of ILCA's documentation activities.

An estimate of these costs will be prepared and submitted to IDRC by Dr. Hodgson.

The above resolution was seconded by Mr. Mensah and approved.

4.

Nomination of Additional Members of the Board

The Chairman suggested that the two additional members of the Board (African representation) shall be considered but it was agreed that this matter should be deferred until the first official meeting of the Board in Addis Ababa (14-16 January, 1974) when the names of African appointees to fill the two places on the Board will be considered. H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa said that on behalf of his Government he would like serious consideration of representation on the Board from West Africa.

Dr. Pratt asked for clarification as to what body was responsible for nomination of members to the Board as some were nominated by the Consultative Group and some by the African Livestock Sub-Committee. Nominations for these vacancies on the Board were to be sent to the Chairman, with as much background information as possible, before the next meeting of the Board. Dr. Knutsson suggested that consideration might be given to electing a woman on to the Board. The Chairman undertook to consult Mr. Graves of IBRD on the question raised by Dr. Pratt.

Appointment of an Executive Committee

After some discussion it was agreed that the Executive Committee of the Board should be made up of :-

Chairman of the Board Vice Chairman Project Development Officer (Director designate) Dr. W. Schaeffer-Kehnert H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa as local representative

Until the Board had official status, this Committee would be known as the Project Development Committee.

6.

Representation at the Next ILRAD Meeting

It was agreed that Dr. Pagot and Dr. Schaeffer-Kehnert should represent the Board at the next meeting of ILRAD, to be held in Nairobi on the 26th November, 1973.

7. Documentation

It was agreed that provision should be made for a small group of the Board to meet as a panel in Rome at an early date to look into the early development of a documentation project. This might take place after the FAO Conference in November. It was anticipated that this panel would consist of Dr. Pagot, Dr. Pratt, Mr. Wolston (IDRC), Mr. Du Bois (FAO) and a French specialist to be named by Dr. Pagot.

8. Next Meeting of the Board

It was agreed that the next meeting of the Board should take place in Addis Ababa between the 14th-16th January, 1974. This date appeared to be most suitable for members of the Board.

9. Visits to Africa

The Board requested that the Chairman and Dr. Pagot should visit a number of African countries in order to discuss with the appropriate authorities, the progress that has been made towards the establishment of ILCA and an outline of the future programme of work in order to solicit their full support.

Introduction

1. The concept of making a concerted international research effort to attack the problems of animal diseases side by side with a major development to effect a change in production and marketing systems in tropical Africa, south of the Sahara, designed to increase total yield and output of livestock products and to improve the quality of life of the people of this region has been under study by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research for nearly two years.

It will be recalled that the Consultative Group for International 2. Agricultural Research (CGIAR) was established in May 1971 and is co-sponsored by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD), and UNDP. Membership includes the following Governments and agencies: Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Federal Republic of Germany, France, Japan, Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom, United States, FAO, IBRD, UNDP, African Development Bank, Asian Development Bank, Commission of the European Communities, Inter-American Development Bank, International Development Research Centre, Ford Foundation, Rockefeller Foundation, and Kellogg Foundation. The five major developing regions of the world participate in the Consultative Group through representatives designated for a two-year term by the membership of FAO. Each region has designated two countries which serve as member or alternate at their discretion. Africa is at present represented by Morocco and Nigeria.

3. The CGIAR established a Sub-Committee on African Livestock to act for it in matters concerning research on livestock in Africa. From study and discussion by this Sub-Committee and the CGIAR itself, a proposal has emerged, based on a feasibility study, to establish an International Livestock Centre for Africa, and an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases, the purposes and objectives of which are described below.

I. International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD) (GLO/73/003)

Background

4. The wild and domesticated animals on the African continent provide the people with one of their most important sources of food and protein. However, diseases which debilitate and kill_livestock seriously constrain animal production. Most of these diseases are common to the animal population in other parts of the world, but Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever) are particularly destructive on the African continent. The success of efforts to increase livestock production in Africa by upgrading present genetic strains of cattle, improving husbandry and management practices and developing better rangelands will, in certain regions, largely depend upon progress in bringing about effective control of these two diseases.

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5. The feasibility study referred to in the paragraph above was carried out by an Executive Team commissioned by the Rockefeller Foundation at the request of CGIAR, and resulted in a proposal for the establishment of an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD). This proposal was based in large part on other substantial preliminary investigations which had also been undertaken or organized by the Rockefeller Foundation. Members of the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine, University of Nairobi, specialists on disease control of the Veterinary Department, Ministry of Agriculture, of the Government of Kenya, and many other persons knowledgeable about disease control and livestock production problems in Kenya and other countries of East and West Africa participated in these studies.

6. This proposal was subsequently considered and approved in principle by the CGIAR, through its Sub-Committee on African Livestock. It was also decided that the Laboratory should be established in Kenya, pursuant to an invitation extended by the Government of Kenya, which has offered a site for the institution. The CGIAR also requested the Rockefeller Foundation to act as its agent in carrying out the Initial Stage of the proposal, comprising the activities necessary to establish HLRAD as an independent entity with the ability (when appropriately financed and fully staffed) to realize its mission of research and training. The Foundation has agreed to this request.

7. The Laboratory will be developed as a companion institution to the International Livestock Centre for Africa, to be established under the sponsorship of CGIAR with headquarters in Ethiopia (see below, paras. 12-18). The activities of the two institutions will be developed in close co-ordination with one another, as a unified effort aimed at integrating the biological, economic and sociological components of livestock research and development. Eventual integration of the two institutions at some time in the future is envisaged. The work of ILRAD will also be closely co-ordinated with that of other UNDP-supported regional and national research institutions dealing with the problem of tick and tick-borne diseases, such as the Research on Tick-Borne Cattle Diseases and Tick Control Projects (RAF/67/077 and KEN/70/522), as well as the International Centre for Insect Physiology and Ecology (GL0/71/007).

8. Negotiation of satisfactory arrangements with the Government of Kenya having been concluded, certain members of CGIAR have indicated their readiness to provide financial support for the establishment and operation of the Laboratory, including an initial fund for start-up operations.

Proposed activities of ILRAD

9. The general purpose of the Laboratory will be to serve as a world centre for research on ways and means of conquering major animal diseases which seriously limit livestock industries in Africa and in many other parts of the world. The Laboratory will concentrate initially on intensive research on the immunological and related aspects of controlling Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever), and possibly at a later stage other animal diseases. To this end the Laboratory will engage in the following types of activities: DP/35 English Page 4

(a) Basic research, applied research, experimentation and field testing of results;

(b) Publication and dissemination of research results;

(c) Strengthening and creating appropriate links with national and regional institutions dealing with the control of animal diseases and related problems of animal production, particularly in Africa;

(d) Organization of discussion groups, seminars, workshops and conferences on topics related to the work of the Laboratory;

(e) In co-operation with universities and other research institutes, provision of opportunities for advanced professional training and experience in animal disease research within the scope of the Laboratory;

(f) Training of scientists who will be involved in research, education and action programmes in co-operating countries in which the Laboratory's programme will be applicable;

(g) Assistance to co-operating countries in using and applying the research results of the Laboratory; and

(h) Such other activities as may be found necessary or desirable to further the objectives of the Laboratory.

UNDP Participation and Financing

10. Having considered the potential which these activities might have on the development of African livestock, nutrition and trade, and having taken into account the considerable efforts which have already been made towards promotion of this effort at national and regional levels, which could benefit from this concerted effort, the Administrator decided that it would be in the interest of the developing countries for UNDP to join with other donors in this co-operative endeavour.

11. In order to enable initial activities to be started at an early date, the Administrator has accordingly agreed to make available a sum of \$50,000 and has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the other participating parties setting forth the basis for the implementation of the preparatory phase of the Laboratory. This assistance has been granted by UNDP on condition that the funds made available by UNDP not be used for capital expenditures, and on the understanding that no commitment is implied regarding support for the main phase of ILRAD's activities. These funds will be in the custody of the IBRD, acting as fiscal agent for the CGIAR and, in the case of UNDP, as its Executing Agency.

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II. International Livestock Centre for Africa (ILCA) (GL0/73/005)

Background

12. The present level of livestock production in tropical Africa is considered to be well below the potential of the region. On grounds of human nutrition and welfare, of conservation of rangeland resources, and of economic growth, an urgent need exists to accelerate and extend research on livestock production. The tropical zones of Africa are estimated to contain about 124 million head of cattle, 98 million sheep and 80 million goats, producing meat, milk and hides for a rapidly increasing population and playing an essential part in the lives of the people. Commercial cattle production in most of tropical Africa is characterized by low annual offtake, high calf mortality and slow maturity. More efficient production is hampered by inadequate feeding and water supplies and by the prevalence of some animal diseases, notably Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever). Economic and social conditions and limited marketing facilities further limit the output of cattle, sheep and goats.

13. In some cases, a leading cause of the disappointing growth in animal productivity has been the insufficient integration of biological, economic and sociological components of research and development programmes. The need for strengthening livestock research in general and for more detailed study of animal production systems is urgent. Although a considerable fund of knowledge on livestock research has been collected over several decades, the results of much of this work are not widely known, and present research activities are limited by shortages of experienced staff, facilities and funds.

14. Consequently, from study and discussions by the CGIAR and its Sub-Committee on African Livestock, a proposal for the establishment of an International Livestock Centre for Africa (ILCA) emerged. The Centre, the headquarters of which will be situated in Ethiopia, will conduct research and training activities aimed at improving livestock production systems. ILCA will be a companion project to the International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD), which has been established in Kenya. The activities of these two institutions will be closely co-ordinated, with a view to their possible integration at some time in the future.

15. Subject to the negotiation of satisfactory arrangements with the Government of Ethiopia, certain members of CGIAR have indicated a willingness to provide financial support for the establishment of the Centre, both during the initial stage of its development and on a continuing basis thereafter. It is estimated that an initial fund of about \$500,000 will become available in the near future as a first step towards the establishment of the Centre.

Proposed activities of ILCA

16. The general purpose if the Centre will be to assist national efforts aimed at improving livestock production and marketing systems in tropical Africa south of the Sahara. To this end the Centre will engage in the following types of activities: DP/35 English

(a) Retrieve, assemble and make available in both English and French all relevant information on animal production in tropical Africa;

(b) Engage a multidisciplinary research staff to study existing animal production systems, develop new or amended systems of production, and define priorities for other research;

(c) Support, supplement and co-operate with existing national and regional research stations or programmes in developing a fully co-ordinated programme of production and rangeland research which is related appropriately to the urgent needs of livestock development;

(d) Develop the capacity to undertake research programmes in specific ects of livestock production which are appropriate to an international centre;

(e) Organize, or assist in organizing, seminars, technical conferences and training courses for staff engaged in livestock research, extension, planning and production;

(f) Make available statistical support, information or advice to national, regional or international authorities in the various fields relating to animal oduction in which the Centre is actively engaged.

UNDP Participation and Financing

17. In the light of the decision reached, in principle, by CGIAR's Sub-Committee on African Livestock at its meeting in August 1973, at which the Administrator of UMDP was represented, and subsequently endorsed by the CGIAR at its November 1973 meetings, the Administrator decided that it would be in the terest of the developing countries for UNDP to join with other donors in this co-operative endeavour, which promises to be of substantial benefit to livestock development in Africa and other parts of the world.

18. In order to enable activities to be started under ILCA at an early date, the Administrator has accordingly agreed to make available a sum of \$50,000, and has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the other participating parties setting forth the basis for the implementation of the preparatory phase of the Centre. This assistance has been granted by UNDP on the understanding that the funds should not be used for capital expenditures, and that no commitment is implied regarding UNDP financial support for the main phase of ILCA's research activities. As in the case of ILRAD, these funds will be in the custody of the IBRD, acting as fiscal agent for the CGIAR, and, in the case of UNDP, as its Executing Agency.

You got my last report on ILCA matters indirectly, through a copy of a note I wrote to Derek Tribe. The purpose of this note is to carry the story through today.

You will remember we were having a problem about the document which would create ILCA. We had said that the Center would be created by means of an agreement between the Bank and the Government of Ethiopia; the Minister of Agriculture had said, on the other hand, that the Memorandum of Agreement itself would serve this purpose, and that he was unwilling to go back to the Council of Ministers with any other document.

If the Memorandum is simultaneously to serve as a charter, however, there will have to be some amendments, mostly of a symbolic character. In order for the document to be more consistent with the purposes of the Bank, so that the Bank can sign in good heart, we will have to add some language indicating that economic development is an objective of ILCA (as it is of the Bank).

I would suppose that the Minister could accept such changes without difficulty. If the changes seem acceptable, you may want to decide, as Chairman of the African Livestock Subcommittee, whether you would accept them on behalf of the Subcommittee or would submit them to the Subcommittee for approval.

There also are some subsidiary questions. You already are familiar with two of them: they concern (a) the exemptions from import tax of staff members taking up stations with ILCA and (b) the manner in which the Ministry of Agriculture is to pay for the import taxes levied on articles imported for use by ILCA. There is, finally, a question about Mr. L. J. C. Evans

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whether, in fact, the Minister could accept some additional smendments to the Manorandum of Agreement which would bring it into closer conformity with the document the Legal Department would have drafted as a charter, had the Department been given the chance. Toby Asser is giving me some suggestions on this later today.

Tomorrow, I am leaving for Nairobi (where there is an ILRAD session somewhat like the Skyway meeting of ILCA). On my way, I will stop in Addis to see what progress can be made there toward the signature of the ILCA Memorandum of Agreement.

It now looks as if, one way or another, the matter will turn out all right. We must nevertheless move quickly in order to get signatures on the initial-fund agreement for ILCA and issue calls for that money before we get too far into December.

I will be away from the Bank until about December 10, but in the meantime, Bruce Check will take the required action and be in touch with you at necessary points.

Many thanks for the photographs, which came today.

We continue to have complications about the ILCA Memorandum of Agreement, to say the least. I had thought the Minister and I had gotten things nicely straightened out at the Skyway Hotel. Since then, little bombs have been going off, one by one. First bemb: a paragraph concerning tax-free importation of household effects by ILCA employees taking up their stations in Ethiopia does not, according to the legal counsel of the Ministry of Agriculture, mean what the Minister understood it to mean; and if counsel is right, the paragraph very possibly gives no exemptions at all (which is why the question was raised about it in the first place). Second bomb: some Ethiopians were surprised to find that there would be another document, in effect constituting the charter of ILCA, to be worked out. If I remember correctly, I ran through this particular requirement at least twice, and possibly three times, at the Skyway Hotel with the Minister present; in any case, the requirement is clearly stated in the Memorandum of Agreement itself; and the point was discussed by Asser and language concerning it was agreed to during the Evans-Tribe mission to Ethiopia in July. They now accept, however, that such a document is needed. The third bomb hasn't gone off yet: I am still hoping to have a satisfactory side letter from the Minister on the question of the payment of customs duties on non-scientific articles imported by ILCA; but bad news about this could arrive at any moment. In the meantime, the Bank's own legal expert (Asser) is in Indonesia. I am still optimistic (heaven knows why) about getting all this straightened out in good time for the ILCA Board meeting of January.

SUBJECT: ILCA Meeting

On October 27 and 28, I attended an informal meeting which brought together the Trustees-designate of the International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA) and other interested persons at the Skyway Hotel at Heathrow Airport, London, The program and a list of persons who attended are attached.

The entire group met all day on October 27. The Trustees-designate met privately on the morning of October 28, and after this session, there was another, short meeting of the whole group.

The stated purpose of the meeting had been to acquaint the designated Trustees with some of the tasks they would face in starting up ILCA, and most of the first day was devoted to this subject. The participation of Ralph Cummings and his account of the starting up of ICRISAT was particularly helpful in this regard.

In view of the progress being made on the agreement between the Bank and the Empire of Ethiopia concerning the establishment of ILRAD, the Trustees-designate decided to deal with a number of matters of business in their closed meeting. They elected Ralph Hodgson, formerly of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, as chairman and Mr. Mensah of FAO as Vice Chairman. (Until the Board of Trustees is formally constituted, Hodgson will be called Project Development Officer.) They decided that when the Board is formally constituted, they will appoint Jean Pagot of IEMVT as Director General of the Center. They chose a project development committee consisting of the chairman, vice chairman, the Director-General and Mr. Schaefer-Kehnert, leaving one vacancy to be filled.

The Trustees-designate decided tentatively to hold their first formal meeting in Addis Ababa on January 14-15-16, 1974. In the meantime, they asked Dr. Sterling Wortman of The Rockefeller Foundation to inform ILRAD that they would appreciate it if Dr. Pagot and Mr. Schaefer-Kehnert could be invited to the first meeting of the ILRAD Board.

Mr. Pagot will resign his IEMVT post in the near future (perhaps as early as November 5) to devote all his time to ILCA, probably starting with a visit to Washington and New York. At an early date, a 4-man team from ILCA (consisting of the Chairman, the Director, Mr. Mensah and Mr. Schaefer-Kehnert) will start a tour of African countries to familiarize themselves with animal production research there. Mr. Hodgson will be working in Washington, and hopes he may receive some back-up services from the Bank; this is for later discussion with him.

At odd moments while the meetings were in recess, I discussed with Dejazmatch Kassa, the Ethiopian Minister of Agriculture, points in the draft Memorandum of Agreement which seemed to need clarification. The Minister was willing to provide the necessary clarifications in two side letters. The content of the discussion and the side letters is described in a cable of October 29 from me to Mr. Malone in Addis Ababa.

The meeting was opened by Mr. Evans, Chairman of the African Livestock Sub-Committee, who took the chair on a temporary basis (pending the election of a Chairman). He pointed out that the World Bank as Executing Agency and the Livestock Sub-Committee would continue to give help as long as it was necessary and that business of the Board could be kept going on an informal basis until the first official meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Election of Chairman of the Board

The first item of business was to elect a Chairman of the Board on a temporary basis, his appointment to be ratified later.

Professor Tribe spoke on the selection of a chairman pointing out that the qualities needed were a man of wide scientific and administrative ability and in addition sufficient free time to carry out the work needed.

Professor Tribe proposed Dr. Ralph Hodgson as Chairman, seconded by Dr. Pagot and this proposal was carried unanimously. On the appointment of the new Chairman, Mr. Evans handed over his duties to Dr. Hodgson. Dr. Pagot offered his congratulations and thanks to Mr. Evans for all his preparatory work in connection with the Board of Trustees which was supported by all the other members. Mr. Evans then withdrew.

Dr. Hodgson expressed his thanks to the Board for their confidence in him, and although he was looking forward to his retirement, he was very interested in the aims and objectives of ILCA, and would be pleased to give his best to the work of the Board.

2. Election of Vice-Chairman of the Board

Dr. Pratt proposed the name of Mr. M. Mensah. This was seconded by H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa and carried with acclamation.

3. Nomination of a Director

Professor Tribe explained how a final list of possible candidates had been reduced from about thirty names to a short list of five. As Dr. Pagot was on the short list of candidates, he asked to withdraw while this subject was under discussion.

Professor Tribe then gave a brief resume of each of the five possible candidates, and at the request of Professor Knutsson, indicated the criteria used in the selection of a Director. It was agreed that there was no need for appointing a sub-committee to consider applicants but that a choice could be made at once. H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa proposed that Dr. J. Pagot should be appointed Director and this was seconded by Mr. Mensah and carried with acclamation. In view of the fact that the Board had not yet acquired official status it was agreed that he should be temporarily appointed as Project Development Officer and his post to be temporarily financed by IDRC.

Dr. Pagot then returned to the meeting and was informed of his election and expressed his thanks in the confidence of the Board in selecting him. The details of his temporary appointment would be worked out with IDRC. H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa moved the following resolution :-

> "The members-elect of the ILCA Board request IDRC to support further their activities by:

(a) engaging temporarily on behalf of the Board, Dr. R. Hodgson as a Consultant and Dr. J. Pagot as Project Development Officer of ILCA (at a fee of Canadian \$120.00 per day);

- (b) providing such secretarial and administrative support as may seem appropriate after discussion between IDRC and Dr. Hodgson and Dr. Pagot;
- (c) financing such meetings of the Executive Committee (elect) as may be convened by Dr. Hodgson before the first formal meeting of the Board in Ethiopia;
- (d) financing the first Board meeting to be held in Ethiopia;
- (e) financing a meeting in Rome of a small panel to advise the Board on the planning of ILCA's documentation activities.

An estimate of these costs will be prepared and submitted to IDRC by Dr. Hodgson.

The above resolution was seconded by Mr. Mensah and approved.

4.

Nomination of Additional Members of the Board

The Chairman suggested that the two additional members of the Board (African representation) shall be considered but it was agreed that this matter should be deferred until the first official meeting of the Board in Addis Ababa (14-16 January, 1974) when the names of African appointees to fill the two places on the Board will be considered. H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa said that on behalf of his Government he would like serious consideration of representation on the Board from West Africa.

Dr. Pratt asked for clarification as to what body was responsible for nomination of members to the Board as some were nominated by the Consultative Group and some by the African Livestock Sub-Committee. Nominations for these vacancies on the Board were to be sent to the Chairman, with as much background information as possible, before the next meeting of the Board. Dr. Knutsson suggested that consideration might be given to electing a woman on to the Board. The Chairman undertook to consult Mr. Graves of IBRD on the question raised by Dr. Pratt.

Appointment of an Executive Committee

After some discussion it was agreed that the Executive Committee of the Board should be made up of :-

> Chairman of the Board Vice Chairman Project Development Officer (Director designate) Dr. W. Schaeffer-Kehnert H.E. Dejazmatch Kassa as local representative

Until the Board had official status, this Committee would be known as the Project Development Committee.

6.

Representation at the Next ILRAD Meeting

It was agreed that Dr. Pagot and Dr. Schaeffer-Kehnert should represent the Board at the next meeting of ILRAD, to be held in Nairobi on the 26th November, 1973.

7. Documentation

It was agreed that provision should be made for a small group of the Board to meet as a panel in Rome at an early date to look into the early development of a documentation project. This might take place after the FAO Conference in November. It was anticipated that this panel would consist of Dr. Pagot, Dr. Pratt, Mr. Wolston (IDRC), Mr. Du Bois (FAO) and a French specialist to be named by Dr. Pagot.

8. Next Meeting of the Board

It was agreed that the next meeting of the Board should take place in Addis Ababa between the 14th-16th January, 1974. This date appeared to be most suitable for members of the Board.

9. Visits to Africa

The Board requested that the Chairman and Dr. Pagot should visit a number of African countries in order to discuss with the appropriate authorities, the progress that has been made towards the establishment of ILCA and an outline of the future programme of work in order to solicit their full support.





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

Dear Jim:

Here is a copy of a letter I have sent today to Tesfa Bushen. I believe that the contents already have been communicated orally to him by John Malone, our man in Addis. As you see, I have had the temerity to suggest that we try to sign the Memorandum of Agreement on ILCA by November 5. If Bushen's reaction to this letter indicates that there is more negotiating to be done, we might start tentatively thinking of the week of November 5 for negotiation. We cannot wait too long after that date and still get our initial fund set up in orderly fashion before the end of the year, as we need to do if we are to have the benefit of the grants that already are authorized for 1973. Whether we actually would ask for your help, or whether we will need legal advice, we can determine when we have Bushen's reply.

After much backing and forthing, I have decided that I can come to the ILCA seminar near London on October 27 and 28, and I look forward to seeing you there.

I'm also trusting that in the following week, after the meeting of the agricultural panel, you will be able to arrange to stay for the meeting of the Consultative Group on November 1 and 2. Among other things, both African livestock and Center review procedures are on the agenda.

Dear Mr. Minister:

Since my last letter of August 27, members of the African Livestock Subcommittee of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research have completed their comments on the draft which I sent you at that time of a Memorandum of Agreement between the Empire of Ethiopia and the World Bank, acting on behalf of the Consultative Group, on the establishment of the International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA). I am glad to inform you that no changes of substance have been recommended or adopted, so that the draft Memorandum is substantially unchanged from the text, dated August 6, which I sent you last month.

I am now sending a copy of the text as revised, with changes marked on pages 3, 4, 8 and 10. The minor amendment on page 10 leaves it to the Board of Trustees to decide which, among the elective members serving on the original Board, shall serve for one year, which for two years and which for three; this is in conformity with the practice adopted by other new centers, and is usually done by lot.

None of the other changes would affect the intent of the language of the draft of August 6. The first change on page 3 does not relate to ILCA, but to the International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD), which is to be established in Kenya. The remaining change on page 3 corrects an error in grammar. The changes on page 4 are drafting changes not affecting the substance of the text; and the same is true of the changes on page 10.

The desirability of an early agreement on a final text is now growing urgent. Once the Empire of Ethiopia and the Bank have signed the Memorandum of Agreement, the Bank will establish the start-up fund into which donors are expected to pay their first contributions in support of ILCA.

This cannot be done, however, until the Memorandum of Agreement is signed. At the present time, moreover, the parliamentary authorizations under which various donors would make these payments are beginning to approach their expiration dates; and if these dates are reached before the payments are made, the funds will be lost.

In the circumstances, let me respectfully suggest that the authorities of the Empire of Ethiopia aim to sign the Memorandum of Agreement by November 5, 1973. In the meantime, I would appreciate hearing from you whether the text, as now forwarded to you, is satisfactory from the point of view of the Ethiopian authorities. If it is not, I would appreciate your indicating to me as quickly as possible what parts of the text it is desired to change, and in what respect. In the latter case, I should like to know whether you wish a representative of the Bank, acting for the Consultative Group, to come to Addis Ababa to discuss the matter further, and if so, on what dates.

The interested members of the Consultative Group continue to be keen to push forward the establishment of ILCA. I look forward to your early reply to this letter.

At the present time, the position on these two initial funds is as follows: (1) With respect to the ILRAD fund, we are booking with The Rockefeller Foundation, which is the executive steary is, the establishment of HLAD, to remove some of the technical difficulties which, from an internal point of view, the Foundation sees in the way in which the initial fund is to be organized. We do not believe these difficulties are verices, and we expect them to be solved in a way that would not street the position of other participants in the fund. I am still hopeful that we will present the enshing document for your signature and that of representatives of other donor exancies by about November 1. (2) With respect to the ILCA fund, we are proceeding toward the signing of a basic agreement between the Covernment of Ethiopia and the World Bank concerning the establishment of ILCA. Once that is done, we will be presenting the initial fund agreement for you, signature and that of representatives of other donors; and I hope that these signatures can be obtained not later than December 1.

We will, of course, keep the Africa Bureau of A.I.D. informed about developments in these matters.

DRAFT MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE EMPIRE OF ETHIOPIA AND INTERNATIONAL BANK FOR RECONSTRUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE CONSULTATIVE GROUP ON INTERNATIONAL AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK CENTER FOR AFRICA (ILCA)

PREAMBLE

The present level of livestock production in tropical Africa is considered to be well below the potential of the region. On grounds of human nutrition and welfare, of conservation of rangeland resources, and of economic growth, an urgent need exists to accelerate and extend research on livestock production. The tropical zones of Africa are estimated to contain about 124 million head of cattle, 98 million sheep and 80 million goats, producing meat, milk and hides for a rapidly increasing population and playing an essential part in the lives of the people. Commercial cattle production in most of tropical Africa is characterized by low annual offtake, high calf mortality and slow maturity. More efficient production is hampered by inadequate feeding and water supplies and by the prevalence of some animal diseases, notably Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever). Economic and social conditions and limited marketing facilities further limit the output of cattle, sheep and goats.

In some cases, a leading cause of the disappointing growth in animal productivity has been the insufficient integration of biological, economic and sociological components of research and development programs. The need for strengthening livestock research in general and for more detailed study of animal production systems is urgent. Although a considerable fund of knowledge on livestock research has been collected over several decades, the results of much of this work are not widely known, and present research activities are limited by shortages of experienced staff, facilities and funds.

A particular need exists for the study of Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever), which are especially destructive on the African continent. The success of efforts to increase livestock production in Africa by upgrading present genetic strains of cattle, by improving husbandry and management practices and by developing better rangelands are, in certain regions, largely dependent upon a program to bring about effective control of these two diseases.

The concept of an international research effort to attack these problems has been under study and discussion for some time by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (hereinafter referred to as the CGIAR). The CGIAR is co-sponsored by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (the Bank), and the United Nations Development Programme; the membership of the CGIAR is indicated in Annex A hereto. To act for it in matters concerning research on livestock in Africa, the CGIAR has established a Subcommittee on African Livestock (hereinafter referred to as the Subcommittee), of which the Bank provides the chairman.

From study and discussion by the CGIAR and its Subcommittee has

emerged a proposal to establish an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (hereinafter referred to as ILRAD) and an International Livestock Center for Africa (hereinafter referred to as the Center). It is intended that the activities of these two institutions will be closely coordinated. The Center will conduct research and training activities aimed at improving livestock production systems. The staff of ILRAD will concentrate initially on intensive research concerning the immunological and related aspects of controlling Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis, and possibly at a later stage other animal diseases. The headquarters of the Center would be situated in Ethiopia, and ILRAD would be situated in Kenya. The CGIAR has also decided that these two institutions should be established under arrangements which would enable them to be integrated at some future date and that it is desirable that ILRAD and the Center come under a common Board at the earliest appropriate time subject to further discussion and decision by the CGIAR at the time.

Subject to the approval of their respective governing budies, certain interested members of the CGIAR have indicated a willingness in principle to provide financial support for the establishment of the Center, both during the initial stage of its development and as a continuing matter thereafter. The Subcommittee has asked the Bank to act as Executing Agency to bring the Center into being and to that end to enlist the cooperation of the International Development Research Center (hereinafter referred to as IDRC) pursuant to arrangements to be made between them.

Now, therefore, the parties to this Memorandum agree to work together toward the establishment of the Center as an international research and training institution, with suitable governance and legal charter, and

appropriate status, authorities, privileges and other conditions necessary to enable it to operate effectively and efficiently toward the attainment of its objectives when provided the requisite financial support. Specifically, the parties to this Memorandum agree:

1. NAME

The name of the Center shall be the International Livestock Center for Africa.

2. LOCATION

The headquarters of the Center shall be at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia; the Center will, in addition, develop such research units as may be needed, at locations to be designated in Africa, with at least one such unit in Ethiopia.

3. PURPOSES

The purpose of the Center shall be to assist national efforts which aim to effect a change in the production and marketing systems in tropical Africa south of the Sahara so as to increase the total yield and output of livestock products and improve the quality of life of the people in this region. The Center will serve (a) as an international center for research to promote the development and demonstration of improved livestock production systems optimizing the use of human and natural resources in Africa, (b) as a focal point for training activities which will increase regional competence in a systems approach to livestock production and development, and (c) as a multidisciplinary documentation center, working in both French and English, for the livestock industry of Africa.

In carrying forward its program, the Center will develop close linkages with national and regional organizations undertaking research and training activities in the same or closely related fields of interest.

4. ACTIVITIES

The activities of the Center will serve to identify means of increasing the efficiency of the major animal production systems of tropical Africa and to assist the governments and authorities responsible for achieving new levels of productivity. In particular, the Center will engage in the following types of activities:

- (a) retrieve, assemble and make available in both English and French all relevant information on animal production in tropical Africa;
- (b) engage a multidisciplinary research staff to study existing animal production systems (including breeding, feeding, management and related health aspects of husbandry, the improvement of range and pastures, and the social and economic factors affecting the livestock industry including processing and marketing), develop new or amended systems of production, and define priorities for other research;
- (c) support, supplement and cooperate with existing national and regional research stations or programs in developing a fully coordinated program of production and rangeland research which is related appropriately to the urgent needs of livestock development;

- (d) develop the capacity to undertake research programs in specific aspects of livestock production which are appropriate to an international center. Such programs will require careful justification with particular emphasis given to their timing and to their international application;
- (e) organize, or assist in organizing, seminars, technical conferences and training courses for staff engaged in livestock research, extension, planning and production, in order particularly to increase regional competence in the multidisciplinary "systems" approach to livestock research and development;
- (f) make available statistical support, information or advice to national, regional or international authorities in the various fields relating to animal production in which the Center is actively engaged.

In addition, the Center will engage in such other activities as may be found necessary in furtherance of its objectives.

5. POWERS

In furtherance of these purposes and activities, the Center shall have incidental power to:

(a) acquire or obtain from any governmental authority, national, municipal, or local foreign or domestic, or otherwise, or from any company, corporation, association, person or other entity, such charters, franchises, licenses, rights, privileges, assistance (financial or otherwise) and concessions as are conducive to and necessary for the attainment of the purpose of the Center;

- (b) receive and acquire from any person, firm or entity, by donation, grant, exchange, devise, bequest, purchase or lease, either absolutely or in trust, contributions consisting of such properties, real or personal, including funds and valuable effects or things, as may be useful or necessary to carry out the purpose and objectives of the Center and to hold, own, operate, use or dispose of said properties or valuable things;
- (c) do and perform all acts and things as are necessary, expedient, suitable or proper for the furtherance or accomplishment of the purposes and the attainment of any or all of the objectives herein stated, or which shall appear, at any time, as conducive to and useful for the activities of the Center.

6. STATUS OF THE CENTER

The Center will operate as an autonomous, non-profit organization, international in character, governed by a Board of Trustees selected as provided in Section 7 of this Memorandum, and directed by a Director selected as provided in Section 9 of this Memorandum.

7. GOVERNANCE

The Center will be governed by a Board of Trustees of twelve members, comprised and selected as follows:

Two members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia;

Three members designated by the CGIAR or the Subcommittee; Six members-at-large with interests and qualifications relevant to the work of the Center. Of these members, at least three shall be African nationals (with appropriate representation from different

parts of tropical Africa). These six members-at-large shall, in the first instance, be selected and appointed by the Subcommittee. If the Subcommittee shall have selected less than six members-at-large by the time of the first meeting of the Board of Trustees, the vacancies may be filled by the Board of Trustees; and the Director of the Center, ex officio.

The term of office of the members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia shall be determined by that State.

All other members of the Board shall serve for terms fixed by the Board, but not in excess of three years. These members shall be eligible to succeed themselves.

Vacancies among the members-at-large by reason of their retirement, death, incapacity or any other cause shall be filled by the Board of Trustees. Any such vacancies among the three members nominated by the CGIAR shall be filled by the CGIAR. New appointees shall be appointed for the remainder of the term of the member who is being replaced, or for three years in the case of those appointed to fill vacancies occurring as a result of the expiration of the term of a member.

The Board of Trustees of ILRAD shall be invited to send two of its members to attend as observers the meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Center.

8. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees shall:

- (a) Frame rules of procedure for its own working;
- (b) Elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman;
- (c) Determine policy for the operation of the Center;
- (d) Select and appoint the Director of the Center for such
 a period or periods as it deems necessary and appropriate;
- (e) Approve the programs developed for the Center by the Director;
- (f) Approve the appointment of senior staff members of the Center on the recommendations of the Director;
- (g) Scrutinize and approve the budget estimates for the Center;
- (h) Take such action as shall be necessary to conclude and realize the purpose of, such formal relationships with ILRAD as may be determined from time to time by the CGIAR, including without limitation, dissolution or reconstitution of the Board or the Center; and
- (i) Do and perform all other acts considered necessary, suitable and proper for the attainment of any or all of the purposes, activities and objectives of the Center as enumerated in this Memorandum.

9. DIRECTOR

The Center will be administered by a Director appointed by the Board of Trustees.

The Director will be responsible to the Board of Trustees. He will

implement the policies determined by the Board, follow the guidelines laid down by it for the functioning of the Center, carry out the directions of the Board and abide by its decisions. Under the overall policy guidance of the Board, the Director will be responsible for the operation and management of the Center and for assuring that its programs and objectives are properly developed and carried out.

10. COOPERATION WITH ILRAD

In realizing its purpose and carrying out its activities, the Center shall closely cooperate with ILRAD.

If and when the CGIAR determines that it would be appropriate to modify the cooperation between the Center and ILRAD under a formal relationship, the CGIAR will determine the terms and conditions under which that relationship shall be entered into. The Board of Trustees of the Center shall take all such action as shall be necessary to conclude, and realize the purposes of, such formal relationship in accordance with the directives of the CGIAR.

11. FINANCING

Financial support for the Center will be provided by members of the CGIAR, which will consider annually the budgetary requirements of the Center as approved by the Center's Board of Trustees. The Center will also be authorized to receive contributions from other sources. Full development of the Center and its program will be dependent upon the extent of the financial support thus provided.

Several members of the CGIAR have indicated that they are prepared to contribute towards the costs of those preliminary activities necessary to establish the Center as an operating entity in a position to proceed with the execution of its research mission. It is contemplated that these contributions will be placed in a Special Account to be established and administered for this purpose by the Bank.

12. PARTICULAR COVENANTS

The Center will be established by international agreement between the Empire of Ethiopia and the Bank. Specifically, the Empire of Ethiopia hereby agrees to accord to, or in connection with, the Center and its staff the following rights, privileges and immunities:

- (a) Assurance of authority for the Board of Trustees to establish employment policies and conditions for the Center's staff on an international basis, without discrimination as to nationality or origin or any consideration other than qualifications and experience, as may be necessary to assure availability of well-qualified staff and high quality of performance;
- (b) Assurance of procedures for expeditious clearance for entry into Ethiopia of trainees, scholars, and visitors concerned with the Center's program;
- (c) Authorization for the unrestricted movement of such biological materials into and out of Ethiopia as may be needed by the Center or for its cooperative programs in any part of the world consistent with the quarantine inspection laws and regulations of the Empire

of Ethiopia to avoid the introduction or export of serious pests or diseases. The Empire of Ethiopia agrees to assure prompt and expeditious inspection of all materials;

- (d) Freedom for publication and dissemination by the Center of research results;
- (e) The Center, its property and assets, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall enjoy immunity from every form of legal process except insofar as in any particular case it has expressly waived its immunity. It is, however, understood that no waiver of execution shall extend to any measure of execution;
- (f) The premises of the Center shall be inviolable. The property, assets and archives of the Center, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall be immune from search, requisition, confiscation, expropriation and any other form of interference, whether by executive, administrative, judicial or legislative action;
- (g) To the extent necessary to carry out the operations provided for in this Agreement and subject to the provisions of this Agreement, all property and assets of the Center shall be free from restrictions, regulations, controls and moratoria of any nature;
- (h) The official communications of the Center shall enjoy treatment not less favorable than that accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to the official communications of any other state;

- (i) All trustees, officers and employees of the Center:
 - (i) shall be immune from legal process with respect to acts performed by them in the exercise of their official function except when the Center waives
 this immunity;
 - (ii) being neither Ethiopian nationals nor permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia, shall be exempt from taxation in respect of the salaries or emoluments paid to them by the Center;
 - (iii) being neither Ethiopian nationals nor permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia, shall, together with their spouses and relatives dependent on them, be accorded the same immunities from immigration restrictions, alien registration requirements and national service obligations, the same treatment in respect of travelling facilities and the same repatriation facilities in time of international crisis as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable rank of international institutions;
 - (iv) being neither Ethiopian nationals nor permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia, shall be accorded the same facilities as regards exchange restrictions as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable rank of international institutions;

- (v) shall have the right to import free of customs duty and other tax their personal and household furniture and effects at the time of first taking up their post in Ethiopia or within six months thereafter, provided, however, that articles imported under such exemption will not be sold in Ethiopia except with the approval of the appropriate authorities of the Empire of Ethiopia, and to export free of customs duty and other tax their personal and household furniture and effects after termination of their employment in Ethiopia;
- (j) The Center, its assets, income and other property shall be:
 - (i) exempt from all direct taxes; it is understood, however, that the Center will not claim exemption from taxes which are, in fact, no more than charges for public utility services;
 - (ii) exempt from customs duties and all other taxes or duties incidental to import or export, and prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect of articles imported or exported by the Center for its official use; it is understood, however, that articles imported under such exemption will not be sold in Ethiopia except under conditions agreed to with the appropriate authorities of the Empire of Ethiopia;
 - (iii) exempt from duties and prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect of its publications.

- 13. (a) The Empire of Ethiopia will make available to the Center on a long-term (e.g. - 50 years) lease at a nominal rental, a tract of land of approximately eight hectares at or near Addis Ababa which is suitable for the purposes of the Center's headquarters, including land for office and service buildings and for other appropriate facilities.
 - (b) The Impire of Ethiopia also will make available to the Center on a long-term lease at a nominal rental one or more tracts of land of a size and location to be agreed between the parties to this Memorandum and being suitable for the research purposes of the Center.
 - (c) The Bank has agreed, within the limitation of funds donated by members of the CGIAR, to act, with the cooperation of IDRC, in taking steps to establish the Center in accordance with the provisions of this Memorandum, up to the point at which a Director and a Board of Trustees will have taken office and a staff sufficient, in the opinion of the Director, and the Board of Trustees, to carry out the administration of the Center will have taken up its duties. At that point the Bank will endorse this Agreement to the Board of Trustees (and the Empire of Ethiopia agrees to such endorsement), turning over to that Board all the rights, obligations and assets it has incurred under this Agreement.

14. TERMINATION

The rights and obligations of the Bank under this Agreement will

terminate at such time as the Bank endorses its rights and obligations under this Agreement to the Board of Trustees then responsible for the Center, pursuant to Section 13 of this Memorandum. Should it be necessary to terminate the Agreement for any reason other than by such endorsement, the disposition of the rights, obligations and physical assets, other than land, accrued up to that time shall be determined by the CGIAR in consultation with the Empire of Ethiopia. Disposition of any land held by or on behalf of the Center shall be governed by the terms of the lease agreement for such land.

Thank you for your various letters and memoranda that were waiting for me this week when I returned from Scotland.

I was particularly sorry to receive your cable and to learn that you cannot manage after all to come to the Marlow Seminar. We shall miss you but fully appreciate that you cannot be in two places at once. Of course, Bruce Cheek would be most welcome if he would care to come, otherwise Joe Hulse or Sterling Wortman will no doubt cover the role and activities of the CGIAR.

Pagot has suggested that the ILRAD Board should also be invited to the Seminar, but I feel that there are several reasons why this would be difficult to arrange and probably undesirable anyway. We have no comments on the minutes and on the draft memoranda of understanding with host governments, which are in accordance with the extensive discussions that took place at the meeting. We also concur with the content and legal terms of the memorandum of understanding for the creation of an initial fund towards the establishment of ILCA. This letter is in reply to your memorandum subject: "Draft Memoranda of Agreement on ILRAD and ILCA", dated August 15, 1973.

The documents enclosed with your memorandum, namely: (a) Draft Memorandum of Agreement between the Empire of Ethiopia and the Bank for Reconstruction and Development acting on behalf of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research for the establishment of an International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA); and (b) Draft Memorandum of Agreement between the Government of Kenya and the Rockefeller Foundation acting on behalf of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research for the establishment of an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD) have been reviewed.

The draft memorandums of agreement for ILCA and ILRAD referred to above are acceptable. These documents appear to accurately reflect the consensus of views reached during the sessions of the CGIAR African Livestock Subcommittee held on August 1, 2 and 3, 1973. While further refinement in the texts would be possible, the current drafts are adequate. Also, negotiations with the host governments involved should be initiated without further delay.

For purposes of the record, we do wish to invite attention to two matters of concern. These are: (a) On page two of the ILCA draft agreement par. 2 - "Location" makes provision for research units to be designated at locations in Africa. It is important that the Board of Trustees, in authorizing such units, should keep the number consistent with the research priorities of the Center, as well as with the efficient use of existing available research facilities; (b) the "Governance" provisions of both the ILCA and ILRAD draft memorandums authorize members of the Board of Trustees, other than those appointed by the host government

or ex-officio members, to succeed themselves. It would seem that when each center's by-laws are drafted consideration might well be given to placing some limitation on the number of terms which elected board members should serve.



Many thanks for your letter of August 20. John Cooper of USAID has indicated informally that the ILCA draft is satisfactory to him. We shall have heard from the others, I trust, by the end of the first week of September, and can then consider what to do next.

Your horizontal analysis, comparing the ILCA and ILRAD drafts, will, I'm sure, be very interesting to Toby Asser. I'm sending it to him and to John Pino, and will let you know about any reaction. In the meantime, we have not heard from the Ethiopians about the view of the Council of Ministers on the question of the taxation of non-Ethiopian nationals and of the Center.

This morning I did a vertical analysis, comparing the July ILCA draft Memorandum of Agreement with the one which emerged from our August meeting. After talking here with John Malone, who is to be the Bank's representative in Addis from September 1, I have sent off by his safe hand an informal letter to Tesfa Bushen, telling him about the election of trustees, the indications of financial interest, and the changes in the draft Memorandum of Agreement. A copy of the letter, without attachments (since you are familiar with them, and may be running out of storage space), is enclosed. As you will see, it leaves open for further consideration whether there should be an additional visit to Ethiopia and, if so, by whom.

On ILRAD, let me report that the present plan is for Dr. Sadun and John McKelvey of Rockefeller to go to Nairobi in the middle of September to carry forward the business there, perhaps including the signing of the Memorandum of Agreement between Rockefeller and the Kenya Government. In the meantime, as I try to get together some

reasonable figures as a basis for accounting for the prospective size of ILRAD's initial fund (it looks as if we have about \$1.56 million), it penetrates my consciousness for the first time that the Pritchard report proposes the expenditure of nearly \$1.25 million (more than a third of the entire capital budget) for staff housing. It strikes me as being very questionable whether staff housing needs to be provided at all; and certainly \$1.25 million is far too much. I know that Rockefeller and John Pino will be very sensitive to this issue, and will call it to their attention.

I shall be away beginning on September 5 for about three weeks, leaving Bruce Cheek to cope.

It has become apparent that research efforts dealing with methods for coping with the disease trypanosomiasis have intensified in recent years. Many new scientific developments and techniques have appeared in consequence of these efforts. Some have been directed toward the methods of control of the vector, especially the tsetse fly, and other research efforts have been oriented toward the prevention or cure of the disease itself. It is likely that all of these avenues of research should and will continue, and it is premature to say which procedure or combination of approaches will provide the most effective and practical method of controlling the disease.

In view of the rapid progress occurring in many research laboratories throughout the world, it would seem desirable to provide an opportunity for leading scientists in each major activity to meet together where they might look comprehensively at all of the various techniques and form a judgment as to the promise of these efforts or their likely relationship to one another.

In the sincere hope that you have accepted this invitation, I am writing to invite you to attend a short seminar on "The Establishment of an International Centre" which is being organized by the International Development Research Centre on behalf of the CGIAR. The enclosed notice provides details of the time, place and proposed program of the seminar.

It is our hope that this seminar will provide a useful opportunity at which the Board of Trustees may become better acquainted with one another and with representatives of the Boards of Trustees of other international centres. I must emphasize that the proposed seminar is in no sense a formal meeting of the Board of Trustees of ILCA. The first Board meeting cannot be held until the legal formalities necessary to the establishment of ILCA have been finalized between the Government of Ethiopia and the executing agency of the CGIAR.

The purpose of the proposed seminar is to provide information about international agricultural research centres in general, how they are financed, to explain the nature and purpose of the CGIAR and its committees, and to outline and discuss the general responsibilities of Board of Trustees. In particular, it is hoped that the seminar will serve to develop an understanding of the particular objectives of ILCA and to provide the members of its Founding Board with an opportunity to discuss these objectives and how they might most effectively be realized. We earnestly hope that you will accept this very warm invitation to attend what we believe will be a most useful meeting. The International Development Research Centre will provide all participants with prepaid return air tickets between their place of residence and London airport. IDRC will also provide each participant on arrival with an allowance to cover the cost of accommodation, meals and other incidental expenses.

I shall be grateful if you will let us know as quickly as possible, preferably by cable, whether you are able to accept this invitation and from which airport you wish to embark. At the same time, will you kindly complete the enclosed questionnaire and return it to Professor D.E. Dear Mr. Minister:

Your telegram of August 6, indicating that continuing and favorable consideration was being given by your Government to the establishment in Ethiopia of an International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA), was most welcome. You will by now have received my telegram in response, indicating that additional forward steps toward the establishment of the Center had been taken in meetings of the African Livestock Subcommittee of the Consultative Group.

The purpose of this letter is to describe these steps in detail. Let me first say in summary that members of the Subcommittee confirmed that the governments or organizations they represented were prepared to give financial support to ILCA during the initial phase of its development. The Subcommittee chose most of the members of the Board of Trustees of ILCA apart from those who are to be chosen by the Empire of Ethiopia or who are to serve <u>ex officio</u>. Certain changes were made in the draft Memorandum of Agreement under which ILCA is expected to be established. These changes have the effect of giving ILCA a more independent and more permanent character from the outset than previously had been proposed. Let me describe each of these matters.

(1) <u>Changes in the Memorandum of Agreement</u>. With this letter, I am sending a text of the draft Memorandum of Agreement in the form it reached as a result of the visit to Addis Ababa of Mr. L. J. C. Evans, the Chairman of the African Livestock Subcommittee, and his colleagues at the beginning of July. This text is dated July 6, 1973. I am also sending a text of the draft Memorandum of Agreement as it was revised in the meeting of the African Livestock Subcommittee in Washington from August 1 to 3. This draft is dated August 6. His Excellency Tesfa Bushen

Let me emphasize that the August 6 draft is being kept open to suggestions for changes by members of the Subcommittee until September 6. It does not seem likely, however, that these changes will involve matters of principle or substance.

For your convenience, both the July 6 and the August 6 drafts have been marked to show where changes have occurred. A caret \wedge in the July 6 draft shows where additional language has been inserted in the August 6 draft; and in the August 6 draft, these additions are shown by underlining. (For instance, the first page of the July 6 draft shows an insertion in the third from the last line of the first paragraph; and an underlining at the corresponding point in the August 6 draft shows that this addition consists simply of the word "some.") Deletions from the July 6 text are shown by crossing out the words being deleted; and the point in the August 6 text where the omission occurs is shown by a square \Box .

The principal change in the two texts is that they no longer make mandatory a merger of ILCA and the International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD), of which the latter, as you know, is to be established in Kenya. This merger may occur at a later time, but if it does, it will happen as a result of a further consideration of the matter and a further decision by the Consultative Group. In the meantime, ILCA will proceed as an independent enterprise, having the functions and the purposes with which you already are familiar.

This change in the draft Memorandum was suggested and supported by a large majority of members in the African Livestock Subcommittee. The Subcommittee had felt all along that ILCA and ILRAD should begin as separate but independent enterprises, looking toward a merger at a later date. In Washington, the view emerged strongly that it would be unwise to provide at the outset that the two Centers should be merged; the Subcommittee felt that the two Centers should be allowed to develop to the stage where each is fully operational and each has fully established its own identity, and that the matter of merger should then be considered again by the Consultative Group.

The chief changes that follow on these suggestions by the African Livestock Subcommittee concern the Board of Trustees and management of ILCA. As you will see, in the August 6 text, the Board and Director-General are no longer spoken of as "provisional." Moreover, the Board (Section 7 of the August 6 draft) is enlarged to 12 members; and two of these members (as was to have been the case when ILCA and ILRAD were merged) are to be designated by the Empire of Ethiopia. A third member is to be the Director-General <u>ex officio</u>. Mine others (including three who are to be nationals of African countries) may be selected initially by the Consultative Group or its Subcommittee; three of the nine are His Excellency Tesfa Bushen

identified as designees of the Consultative Group (which shall designate their successor when their terms expire).

(2) <u>Selection of the Board of Trustees</u>. At its meeting in Washington, the African Livestock Subcommittee chose seven of the nine elective members. These seven are as follows:

> Dr. Ralph Hodgson Professor E. Knutsson Mr. Moise C. Mensah Dr. Jean Pagot Mr. David Pratt Dr. Walter Schaefer-Kehnert Professor Derek Tribe.

Attached to this letter is the biographical material on each of these seven which was presented to the Subcommittee.

(3) Initial Fund for ILCA. Finally, in Washington, eight members of the Subcommittee showed their interest in following the operations of ILCA by indicating that they would be willing to contribute to a start-up fund which might support ILCA during the first phase of its development, which might be expected to last for a year or so, until such time as a more detailed research program could be prepared and a more final budget could be presented to and considered by the Consultative Group. The expressions of interest suggest that a sum on the order of U. S. \$500,000 will be available, from the following seven members of the Consultative Group:

> Belgium Denmark International Development Research Centre (of Canada) Sweden United Kingdom United Nations Development Programme United States.

In addition, a representative of the World Bank indicated that the Bank would be willing to consider making a contribution if such an addition to the initial fund was needed.

* * *

This letter is being brought to Addis Ababa on behalf of the African Livestock Subcommittee of the Consultative Group by Mr. John Malone, the new resident representative of the World Bank in Addis Ababa. When the

deadline of September 6 has passed and the suggestions of the African Livestock Subcommittee for revisions of the Memorandum can be considered complete, I shall write you formally. I would hope that you could then consider what further information, discussions, or amendments would be needed in order for the Memorandum of Agreement to be signed by the Empire of Ethiopia and the World Bank.

Mr. Malone, I may say, would be glad to discuss this matter with you at any time you wish. If you think it desirable, I would also be glad to arrange for Mr. Evans or some other representative of the Subcommittee to come to Addis Ababa for further discussions at any time you specify. We continue to be anxious to press forward with this matter as rapidly as possible.

1. Attached is a draft Memorandum of Understanding under which a start-up fund would be established for the International Livestock Centre for Africa (ILCA).

2. Each member is asked to inform the Secretary not later than September 14, 1973, whether it would be prepared to sign this Memorandum. In addition, members intending to sign the Memorandum are asked to inform the Secretary, not later than September 14, of the date by which they would be prepared to sign.

3. Each member intending to sign the Memorandum is also asked to inform the Secretary not later than September 14 what amount should be listed as the member's contribution in paragraph II (c) on page 2 of the draft Memorandum. The amount may be stated in U.S. dollars or in other currency.

4. Any member intending to sign the Memorandum but wishing to suggest amendment of the text is asked to have its suggestions in the hands of the Secretary not later than September 10, 1973.

5. The Secretary will circulate in a few days a parallel text of a Memorandum of Understanding under which an initial fund would be established for the International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD).

SUBJECT: International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA) Walter Schaefer-Kehnert -- Election to the ILCA Board of Trustees

> 1. This memorandum is in response to several inquiries about the election of Walter Schaefer-Kehnert to the ILCA Board and, in particular, the nomination procedure and in the event that he is able to accept the appointment what membership would mean in respect of functions and time involved. A review of the background to this event might be useful for a fuller understanding.

> 2. The concept of an international research effort to work on problems limiting increased livestock production in tropical Africa has been under study and discussion for some time by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (CGIAR). To act for it in these matters, the CGIAR established the African Livestock Subcommittee, of which the Bank provides the chairman. Two proposals have emerged: one to establish an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD) to be headquartered in Kenya; the other to establish an International Livestock Center for Africa (ILCA) to be headquartered in Ethiopia. It is intended that the activities of the two institutions will be closely coordinated.

> 3. The Subcommittee has asked the Bank to act as Executing Agency to bring ILCA into being and to that end to enlist the cooperation of the International Development Research Centre (IDRC). In actual fact, the Bank (mainly the CGIAR Secretariat) has been mostly concerned with legal matters while backstopping IDRC which has engaged Derek Tribe as a consultant to assist in efforts to continue with the recommendations of the Tribe Task Force Report in respect of the establishment of ILCA.

> 4. At the February 1973 Subcommittee meeting, IDRC agreed to identify a short list of candidates who might be considered by the Subcommittee for the ILCA Board of Trustees. After requesting interested Subcommittee members to submit names of candidates who might be considered for the ILCA Board and following personal visits to members as well as to other organizations and countries, biographical data on thirteen individuals selected by IDRC for consideration in connection with the appointment of the ILCA Board was submitted to the CGIAR Secretariat. The Secretariat sent this biodata, along with other relevant documents, to members of the Subcommittee (including the Bank) on July 20, 1973 for consideration at the Subcommittee meeting scheduled for August 1, 1973.

> 5. At the August 1 Subcommittee meeting, Tribe proposed a special composition for the ILCA Board based on "categories of specialization." He suggested that seven of twelve Board members be elected, composed as follows: animal production -- two; animal health -- one; social sciences -- two; and international experience -- two. The IDRC representative withdrew Nestel's name from the list of thirteen candidates. No additional nominations were accepted. Schaefer-Kehnert was to be considered in the social science category. However, several Subcommittee members suggested that the "package approach" was not appropriate and that members simply elect by balloting the seven best qualified candidates from the remaining list of twelve candidates. This procedure

was followed and Schaefer-Kehnert was elected on the first ballot. He has been notified by letter of his nomination but his response has not yet been received.

6. Should Mr. Schaefer-Kehnert accept the nomination and be appointed to the ILCA Board, the amount of time this would require annually is unclear. Since ILCA is in the start-up phase, it is likely that its Board would need to meet frequently for short periods (say three or four times during the first year for a total of about eight to ten days excluding travel). Once ILCA is established, the Board would not normally meet more than once or twice annually for about two or three days per meeting plus travel time. Those members appointed to the Board's Executive Committee meet more frequently and have greater responsibilities (say up to perhaps twelve to fifteen days annually plus travel). It should be recorded that Board members serve without compensation. It is also an established fact, in the international center network, that among the Board of Trustees are employees of international organizations.

7. For the record, it should be noted that the Agriculture Department was not aware that Schaefer=Kehnert would actually be nominated by IDRC until receipt of the documents along with other Subcommittee members. Barry Nestel of IDRC did, however, mention on June 29, while at the Bank, that IDRC considered him as a possible candidate.

Dear Professor Knutsson:

It is my pleasure to inform you that you have been selected to be a member of the Board of Trustees of the International Livestock Centre for Africa (ILCA) which is expected to be established shortly with headquarters at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. The selection of the members of the Board was made by the African Livestock Subcommittee of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research, acting on behalf of the Group and in conformity with discussions with the Government of Ethiopia concerning the establishment of the Centre.

ILCA is being established as an international, autonomous institution. It will serve as (a) an international centre for research to promote the development and demonstration of improved livestock production systems optimizing the use of human and natural resources in Africa, (b) a focal point for training activities which will increase regional competence in a systems approach to livestock production and development, and (c) a multidisciplinary documentation centre, working in both French and English, for improvement of the livestock industry of Africa.

The steps leading to the establishment of ILCA have been taken under the auspices of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research. The Group, created in 1971, is co-sponsored by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the United Nations Development Programme, and the World Bank. It consists of 29 governments and organizations which have joined together for the purpose of giving support to international agricultural research programs designed to raise the quantity and quality of agricultural production in the developing countries. Several members of the Consultative Group, including Belgium, Denmark, the International Development Research Centre of Canada, The Rockefeller Foundation, the United Kingdom, the United Nations Development Programme, the United States and the World Bank have expressed a willingness to establish an

initial fund for financing the first steps toward setting up ILCA and bringing it into operation. These and other members of the Group will consider ILCA's financial requirements from year to year. A note giving some particulars about the Group is attached to this letter.

The proposal for the establishment of ILCA originated with The Rockefeller Foundation, and has been endorsed by the experts composing the Technical Advisory Committee of the Consultative Group. At the instance of the Group, a team of scientists headed by Professor Derek Tribe of the University of Melbourne, Australia, visited Africa and prepared detailed recommendations for the establishment of the Centre; and it is on the work of this team that the subsequent development of the project has been largely based. By separate mail, I am sending you a copy of the report prepared by Professor Tribe and his colleagues.

Also by separate mail, I am sending you the draft of a Memorandum of Agreement which is expected to be signed between the Empire of Ethiopia and the World Bank acting on behalf of the Consultative Group. In this document, you will see that the Consultative Group foresees that the Centre may in due course be integrated with a proposed International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (ILRAD). Discussions concerning ILRAD, I may say, are well advanced; and the Laboratory seems likely to be established sometime late in 1973 or early in 1974, with headquarters in Kenya.

It is expected that the first meeting of the initial Board of ILCA will take place sometime after October 1st. I attach for your information a full list of the persons so far selected for membership on the Board.

I feel confident that the Centre will become a research institution of great importance in the development of the countries of tropical Africa. The Consultative Group's African Livestock Subcommittee felt that the Centre would benefit greatly from your participation in its affairs, and I therefore hope that at an early date you will indicate your acceptance of membership on the ILCA Board.

1. Thank you for letting me see, again, the July 6 draft of the Memorandum of Understanding under which an initial fund would be organized for ILCA. You will remember that this draft was modeled on the Memorandum of Understanding used in the case of ICRISAT.

2. It seems that it would now be desirable to revise the draft somewhat, to reflect the discussions which have taken place recently in the African Livestock Subcommittee and to amend the draft at points where the ICRISAT model is not applicable.

3. I am returning the draft with some observations and with some suggested revisions.

4. You will remember that we also need a Memorandum of Understanding for ILRAD. While we are proceeding toward the same deadline for the circulation and signature of the two documents, in actual fact, the ILRAD draft is the more urgent of the two.

DRAFT MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE EMPIRE OF ETHIOPIA AND INTERNATIONAL BANK FOR RECONSTRUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE CONSULTATIVE GROUP ON INTERNATIONAL AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK CENTER FOR AFRICA (ILCA)

PREAMBLE

The present level of livestock production in tropical Africa is considered to be well below the potential of the region. On grounds of human nutrition and welfare, of conservation of rangeland resources, and of economic growth, an urgent need exists to accelerate and extend research on livestock production. The tropical zones of Africa are estimated to contain about 124 million head of cattle, 98 million sheep and 80 million goats, producing meat, milk and hides for a rapidly increasing population and playing an essential part in the lives of the people. Commercial cattle production in most of tropical Africa is characterized by low annual offtake, high calf mortality and slow maturity. More efficient production is hampered by inadequate feeding and water supplies and by the prevalence of some animal diseases, notably Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever). Economic and social conditions and limited marketing facilities further limit the output of cattle, sheep and goats.

In some cases, a leading cause of the disappointing growth in animal productivity has been the insufficient integration of biological, economic and sociological components of research and development programs. The need for strengthening livestock research in general and for more detailed study of animal production systems is urgent. Although a considerable fund of knowledge on livestock research has been collected over several decades, the results of much of this work are not widely known, and present research activities are limited by shortages of experienced staff, facilities and funds.

A particular need exists for the study of Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis (mainly East Coast Fever), which are especially destructive on the African continent. The success of efforts to increase livestock production in Africa by upgrading present genetic strains of cattle, by improving husbandry and management practices and by developing better rangelands are, in certain regions, largely dependent upon a program to bring about effective control of these two diseases.

The concept of an international research effort to attack these problems has been under study and discussion for some time by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (hereinafter referred to as the CGIAR). The CGIAR is co-sponsored by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (the Bank), and the United Nations Development Programme; the membership of the CGIAR is indicated in Annex A hereto. To act for it in matters concerning research on livestock in Africa, the CGIAR has established a Subcommittee on African Livestock (hereinafter referred to as the Subcommittee), of which the Bank provides the chairman.

From study and discussion by the CGIAR and its Subcommittee has

emerged a proposal to establish an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases (hereinafter referred to as ILRAD) and an International Livestock Center for Africa (hereinafter referred to as the Center). It is intended that the activities of these two institutions will be closely coordinated. The Center will conduct research and training activities aimed at improving livestock production systems. The staff of ILRAD will study methods of immunization against Trypanosomiasis and Theileriosis, and possibly at a later stage other animal diseases. The headquarters of the Center would be situated in Ethiopia, and ILRAD would be situated in Kenya. The CGIAR has also decided that these two institutions should be established under arrangements which would enable it to be integrated at some future date and that it is desirable that ILRAD and the Center come under a common Board at the earliest appropriate time subject to further discussion and decision by the CGIAR at the time.

Subject to the approval of their respective governing bodies, certain interested members of the CGIAR have indicated a willingness in principle to provide financial support for the establishment of the Center, both during the initial stage of its development and as a continuing matter thereafter. The Subcommittee has asked the Bank to act as Executing Agency to bring the Center into being and to that end to enlist the cooperation of the International Development Research Center (hereinafter referred to as IDRC) pursuant to arrangements to be made between them.

Now, therefore, the parties to this Memorandum agree to work together toward the establishment of the Center as an international research and training institution, with suitable governance and legal charter, and

appropriate status, authorities, privileges and other conditions necessary to enable it to operate effectively and efficiently toward the attainment of its objectives when provided the requisite financial support. Specifically, the parties to this Memorandum agree:

1. NAME

The name of the Center shall be the International Livestock Center for Africa.

2. LOCATION

The principal headquarters of the Center shall be at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia; the Center will, in addition, develop such research units as may be needed, at locations to be designated in Africa, with at least one field station in Ethiopia.

3. PURPOSES

The purpose of the Center shall be to effect a change in the production and marketing systems in tropical Africa south of the Sahara so as to increase the total yield and output of livestock products and improve the quality of life of the people in this region. The Center will serve (a) as an international center for research to promote the development and demonstration of improved livestock production systems optimizing the use of human and natural resources in Africa, (b) as a focal point for training activities which will increase regional competence in a systems approach to livestock production and development, and (c) as a multidisciplinary documentation center, working in both French and English, for the livestock industry of Africa.

In carrying forward its program, the Center will develop close linkages with national and regional organizations undertaking research and training activities in the same or closely related fields of interest.

4. ACTIVITIES

The activities of the Center will serve to identify means of increasing the efficiency of the major animal production systems of tropical Africa and to assist the governments and authorities responsible for achieving new levels of productivity. In particular, the Center will engage in the following types of activities:

- (a) retrieve, assemble and make available in both English and French all relevant information on animal production in tropical Africa;
- (b) engage a multidisciplinary research staff to study existing animal production systems (including breeding, feeding, management and related health aspects of husbandry, the improvement of range and pastures, and the social and economic factors affecting the livestock industry including processing and marketing), develop new or amended systems of production, and define priorities for other research;
- (c) support, supplement and cooperate with existing national and regional research stations or programs in developing a fully coordinated program of production and rangeland research which is related appropriately to the urgent needs of livestock development;

- (d) develop the capacity to undertake research programs in specific aspects of livestock production which are appropriate to an international center. Such programs will require careful justification with particular emphasis given to their timing and to their international application;
- (e) organize, or assist in organizing, seminars, technical conferences and training courses for staff engaged in livestock research, extension, planning and production, in order particularly to increase regional competence in the multidisciplinary "systems" approach to livestock research and development;
- (f) make available statistical support, information or advice to national, regional or international authorities in the various fields relating to animal production in which the Center is actively engaged.

In addition, the Center will engage in such other activities as may be found necessary in furtherance of its objectives.

5. POWERS

In furtherance of these purposes and activities, the Center shall have incidental power to:

(a) acquire or obtain from any governmental authority, national, municipal, or local foreign or domestic, or otherwise, or from any company, corporation, association, person or other entity, such charters, franchises, licenses, rights, privileges, assistance (financial or otherwise) and concessions as are conducive to and necessary for the attainment of the purpose of the Center;

- (b) receive and acquire from any person, firm or entity, by donation, grant, exchange, devise, bequest, purchase or lease, either absolutely or in trust, contributions consisting of such properties, real or personal, including funds and valuable effects or things, as may be useful or necessary to carry out the purpose and objectives of the Center and to hold, own, operate, use or dispose of said properties or valuable things;
- (c) do and perform all acts and things as are necessary, expedient, suitable or proper for the furtherance or accomplishment of the purposes and the attainment of any or all of the objectives herein stated, or which shall appear, at any time, as conducive to and useful for the activities of the Center.

6. STATUS OF THE CENTER

The Center will operate as an autonomous, non-profit organization, international in character, governed by a Board of Trustees selected as provided in Section 7 of this Memorandum, and directed by a Director selected as provided in Section 9 of this Memorandum.

7. GOVERNANCE

The Center will be governed by a Board of Trustees of twelve members, comprised and selected as follows:

Two members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia;

Three members designated by the CGIAR or the Subcommittee;

Six members-at-large with interests and qualifications relevant to the work of the Center. Of these members, at least three shall be African nationals (with appropriate representation from different

parts of tropical Africa). These six members-at-large shall, in the first instance, be selected and appointed by the Subcommittee. If the Subcommittee shall have selected less than six members-at-large by the time of the first meeting of the Board of Trustees, the vacancies may be filled by the Board of Trustees; and the Director of the Center, ex officio.

The term of office of the members designated by the Empire of Ethiopia shall be determined by that State.

All other members of the Board shall serve for terms fixed by the Subcommittee, but not in excess of three years. These members shall be eligible to succeed themselves.

Vacancies among the members-at-large by reason of their retirement, death, incapacity or any other cause shall be filled by the Board of Trustees. Any such vacancies among the three members nominated by the CGIAR shall be filled by the CGIAR. New appointees shall be appointed for the remainder of the term of the member who is being replaced, or for three years in the case of those appointed to fill vacancies occurring as a result of the expiration of the term of a member.

The Board of Trustees of ILRAD shall be invited to send two of its members to attend as observers the meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Center.

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8. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees shall:

(a) Frame rules of procedure for its own working;

(b) Elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman;

- (c) Determine policy for the operation of the Center;
- (d) Select and appoint the Director of the Center for such a period or periods as it deems necessary and appropriate;
- (e) Approve the programs developed for the Center by the Director;
- (f) Approve the appointment of senior staff members of the Center on the recommendations of the Director;
- (g) Scrutinize and approve the budget estimates for the Center;
- (h) Take such action as shall be necessary to conclude and realize the purpose of, such formal relationships with ILRAD as may be determined from time to time by the CGIAR, including without limitation, dissolution or reconstitution of the Board or the Center; and
- (i) Do and perform all other acts considered necessary, suitable and proper for the attainment of any or all of the purposes, activities and objectives of the Center as enumerated in this Memorandum.

9. DIRECTOR

The Center will be administered by a Director appointed by the Board of Trustees.

The Director will be responsible to the Board of Trustees. He will

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implement the policies determined by the Board, follow the guidelines laid down by it for the functioning of the Center, carry out the directions of the Board and abide by its decisions. Under the overall policy guidance of the Board, the Director will be responsible for the operation and management of the Center and for assuring that its programs and objectives are properly developed and carried out.

10. COOPERATION WITH ILRAD

In realizing its purpose and carrying out its activities, the Center shall closely cooperate with ILRAD.

If and when the CGIAR determines that it would be appropriate to continue the cooperation between the Center and ILRAD under a formal relationship, it will determine the terms and conditions under which that relationship shall be entered into. The Board of Trustees of the Center shall take all such action as shall be necessary to conclude, and realize the purposes of, such formal relationship in accordance with the directives of the CGIAR.

11. FINANCING

Financial support for the Center will be provided by members of the CGIAR, which will consider annually the budgetary requirements of the Center as approved by the Center's Board of Trustees. The Center will also be authorized to receive contributions from other sources. Full development of the Center and its program will be dependent upon the extent of the financial support thus provided.

Several members of the CGIAR have indicated that they are prepared to contribute towards the costs of those preliminary activities necessary to establish the Center as an operating entity in a position to proceed with the execution of its research mission. It is contemplated that these contributions will be placed in a Special Account to be established and administered for this purpose by the Bank.

12. PARTICULAR COVENANTS

The Center will be established by international agreement between the Empire of Ethiopia and the Bank. Specifically, the Empire of Ethiopia hereby agrees to accord to, or in connection with, the Center and its staff the following rights, privileges and immunities:

- (a) Assurance of authority for the Board of Trustees to establish employment policies and conditions for the Center's staff on an international basis, without discrimination as to nationality or origin or any consideration other than qualifications and experience, as may be necessary to assure availability of well-qualified staff and high quality of performance;
- (b) Assurance of procedures for expeditious clearance for entry into Ethiopia of trainees, scholars, and visitors concerned with the Center's program;
- (c) Authorization for the unrestricted movement of such biological materials into and out of Ethiopia as may be needed by the Center or for its cooperative programs in any part of the world consistent with the quarantine inspection laws and regulations of the Empire

of Ethiopia to avoid the introduction or export of serious pests or diseases. The Empire of Ethiopia agrees to assure prompt and expeditious inspection of all materials;

- (d) Freedom for publication and dissemination by the Center of research results;
- (e) The Center, its property and assets, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall enjoy immunity from every form of legal process except insofar as in any particular case it has expressly waived its immunity. It is, however, understood that no waiver of execution shall extend to any measure of execution;
- (f) The premises of the Center shall be inviolable. The property, assets and archives of the Center, wherever located and by whomsoever held, shall be immune from search, requisition, confiscation, expropriation and any other form of interference, whether by executive, administrative, judicial or legislative action;
- (g) To the extent necessary to carry out the operations provided for in this Agreement and subject to the provisions of this Agreement, all property and assets of the Center shall be free from restrictions, regulations, controls and moratoria of any nature;
- (h) The official communications of the Center shall enjoy treatment not less favorable than that accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to the official communications of any other state;

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- (i) All trustees, officers and employees of the Center:
 - (i) shall be immune from legal process with respect to acts performed by them in the exercise of their official function except when the Center waives this immunity;
 - (ii) being neither Ethiopian nationals nor permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia, shall be exempt from taxation in respect of the salaries or emoluments paid to them by the Center;
 - (iii) being neither Ethiopian nationals nor permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia, shall, together with their spouses and relatives dependent on them, be accorded the same immunities from immigration restrictions, alien registration requirements and national service obligations, the same treatment in respect of travelling facilities and the same repatriation facilities in time of international crisis as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable rank of international institutions;
 - (iv) being neither Ethiopian nationals nor permanent foreign residents of Ethiopia, shall be accorded the same facilities as regards exchange restrictions as are accorded by the Empire of Ethiopia to officials of comparable rank of international institutions;

- (v) shall have the right to import free of customs duty and other tax their personal and household furniture and effects at the time of first taking up their post in Ethiopia or within six months thereafter, provided, however, that articles imported under such exemption will not be sold in Ethiopia except with the approval of the appropriate authorities of the Empire of Ethiopia, and to export free of customs duty and other tax their personal and household furniture and effects after termination of their employment in Ethiopia;
- (j) The Center, its assets, income and other property shall be:
 - (i) exempt from all direct taxes; it is understood, however, that the Center will not claim exemption from taxes which are, in fact, no more than charges for public utility services;
 - (ii) exempt from customs duties and all other taxes or duties incidental to import or export, and prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect of articles imported or exported by the Center for its official use; it is understood, however, that articles imported under such exemption will not be sold in Ethiopia except under conditions agreed to with the appropriate authorities of the Empire of Ethiopia;
 - (iii) exempt from duties and prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect of its publications.

13.

(a) The Empire of Ethiopia will make available to the Center on a long-term (e.g. - 50 years) lease at a nominal rental, a tract of land of approximately eight hectares at or near Addis Ababa which is suitable for the purposes of the Center's headquarters, including land for office and service buildings and for other appropriate facilities.

- (b) The Empire of Ethiopia also will make available to the Center on a long-term lease at a nominal rental one or more tracts of land of a size and location to be agreed between the parties to this Memorandum and being suitable for the research purposes of the Center.
- (c) The Bank has agreed, within the limitation of funds donated by members of the CGIAR, to act, with the cooperation of IDRC, in taking steps to establish the Center in accordance with the provisions of this Memorandum, up to the point at which a Director and a Board of Trustees will have taken office and a staff sufficient, in the opinion of the Director and the Board of Trustees, to carry out the administration of the Center will have taken up its duties. At that point the Bank will endorse this Agreement to the Board of Trustees (and the Empire of Ethiopia agrees to such endorsement), turning over to that Board all the rights, obligations and assets it has incurred under this Agreement.

14. TERMINATION

The rights and obligations of the Bank under this Agreement will

terminate at such time as the Bank endorses its rights and obligations under this Agreement to the Board of Trustees then responsible for the Center, pursuant to Section 13 of this Memorandum. Should it be necessary to terminate the Agreement for any reason other than by such endorsement, the disposition of the rights, obligations and physical assets, other than land, accrued up to that time shall be determined by the CGIAR in consultation with the Empire of Ethiopia. Disposition of any land held by or on behalf of the Center shall be governed by the terms of the lease agreement for such land.

SEVENTH MEETING

August 1-3, 1973 Washington, D. C.

MINUTES

1. The African Livestock Subcommittee had its seventh meeting in Washington during International Centers Week. The meeting was conducted in three sessions, on the morning of August 1, the evening of August 2 and the afternoon of August 3. Mr. L. J. C. Evans was Chairman.

2. A list of participants is attached as Annex A.

3. The agenda is attached as Annex B.

FIRST SESSION (August 1)

Election of Additional Trustees of ILRAD

4. After discussion, the Subcommittee decided to fill three of the remaining elective seats on the Board of Trustees of ILRAD. Of these seats, one was open for any qualified candidate, one was intended to be filled by a national of Kenya, and one was intended to be filled from a francophone African from western Africa.

5. For the open seat, the Subcommittee selected Dr. John Pino of The Rockefeller Foundation.

For the Kenyan seat, the Subcommittee chose the Director of
 Veterinary Services of Kenya.

7. It was decided that in selecting an individual for the western African seat, the Committee would indicate a first, a second and a third choice, to cover the contingency that the person first chosen might not accept appointment. The Subcommittee selected as its first choice Mr. S. Toure of the Laboratoire National d'Elevage of Senegal. Mr. D. Sylla of Mali was selected as the Committee's second choice and Mr. H. Benbello of Niger as the third.

Draft Memorandum of Agreement on ILRAD

8. The Subcommittee took up consideration of the draft Memorandum of Agreement on ILRAD. It accepted language, prepared by a drafting group at its June 13 meeting in Paris, concerning patents and royalties on any vaccines or other discoveries resulting from the work of the Laboratory, to protect such discoveries from special exploitation and to insure that they would be of universal benefit (draft Memorandum of Agreement, Section XII).

9. Mr. Richard H. Demuth, Chairman of the Consultative Group, assured the Subcommittee that, at the time of The Rockefeller Foundation mission to Kenya in April, 1973, the question had been fully explored, with the legal authorities of the Kenya Government and with private attorneys, of the manner in which ILRAD should be incorporated.

10. At the June 13 meeting of the Subcommittee, several members had urged that ILRAD be established as an international entity, as had been done in the case of the International Crops Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT) in India. This possibility, Mr. Demuth reported, in fact had been investigated in Nairobi.

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11. The Rockefeller mission had been told that to incorporate ILRAD in the same way as ICRISAT would require special legislation. It was customary, on the other hand, for organizations with international Boards of Trustees and with international responsibilities to be organized in Kenya on the basis of charters issued under Kenyan law. According to the advice of the Kenyan legal authorities and of private counsel, this was the best way in which to proceed; and the Rockefeller mission had accepted this advice.

12. In discussion of the draft Memorandum of Agreement with the Government of Kenya on the establishment of ILRAD, several members raised questions concerning the timing and method of integrating ILRAD and ILCA. Objection was made to language in the Memoranda which appeared to indicate (1) that integration of the two Centers was to be both automatic and obligatory and (2) that integration was to be achieved by one center (ILCA) taking over the other (ILRAD), rather than by merger of the two institutions on an equal footing. It was agreed that the documents should be redrafted to meet these objections (see paras. 19, 20, 21 and 27 below).

Progress Report on ILRAD

13. On behalf of The Rockefeller Foundation as Executing Agency for the ILRAD project, Dr. Pino gave a brief progress report. He said that Dr. Sadun had been retained as a consultant by the Foundation pending the formal coming into effect of his appointment. He would be able to devote his full energies to ILRAD after September 1.

14. In the meantime, said Dr. Pino, work was continuing on a charter for ILRAD; the text would be circulated when a satisfactory draft had been

prepared. Work also was going forward on a statement concerning ILRAD's program and staff needs. Dr. Pino said that he hoped the Memorandum of Agreement with the Kenya Government could be signed in the first half of September and that the Board of Trustees could meet in September or early in October.

Progress Report on ILCA

15. Mr. Evans reported on a visit which he, Professor Tribe and others had made to Addis Ababa in the first week of July to discuss the establishment of ILCA with the Ethiopian authorities. The authorities had been cordial, and substantial agreement had been reached on a draft Memorandum under which the necessary steps would be taken for the establishment of ILCA. At least for the time being, however, Ethiopian officials had not agreed to the provisions of the draft Memorandum concerning the tax treatment which would be accorded the Centre and its non-Ethiopian employes.

16. The authorities had proposed a tract of land near the international airport of Addis Ababa as a headquarters location, and, subject to further checking, it seemed well suited to this purpose. Professor Tribe reported to the Subcommittee on possible research sites which he had inspected some distance from Addis Ababa, at Adami Tula and Debre Berhan.

17. Mr. Evans's written report of his visit to Addis Ababa is attached as Annex C.

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Memorandum of Agreement on ILCA

18. The Subcommittee confirmed that it wished the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (World Bank) to act as Executing Agency to bring ILCA into being and to that end to enlist the cooperation of the International Development Research Centre (IDRC).

SECOND SESSION (August 2)

19. The Subcommittee considered revised drafts of the ILCA and ILRAD Memoranda of Agreement prepared by Mr. Asser of the Legal Department of the World Bank.

20. The revised ILCA draft was based on the concept that ILCA and ILRAD would be set up as two independent centers, although their activities would be closely coordinated. The Director and the Board of Trustees therefore would no longer be described as provisional, as had been provided in an earlier draft, pending the merger of ILCA and ILRAD.

21. The two centers would be established, however, in such a way that they could be integrated later. The Subcommittee felt it desirable, subject to further discussion and decision by the Consultative Group, that integration should place them under a common Board of Trustees at the earliest appropriate time.

22. It was agreed that the ILCA Board of Trustees should be composed of 12 members, as follows: two members designated by the host government; three members who are designees of the Consultative Group or its African Livestock Subcommittee; six members at large, with interests and qualifications relevant to the work of the Centre, including at least three African nationals; and the Director of the Centre ex officio.

Selection of Trustees-

23. It was further agreed to proceed with the election of some members of the Board of Trustees, with the understanding, in advance of the preparation of a final text of the Memorandum of Agreement with the host government, that the Board being chosen was not a provisional Board.

24. Balloting was then held for seven of the nine elective members, including one African of the three ultimately to be chosen. The following were elected:

25. Messrs. Knutsson, Pagot and Tribe were selected on the following day (August 3) as the Trustees who are designated by the Consultative Group.

Procedure for the Selection of Director of ILCA

26. The Subcommittee decided not to choose the Director of ILCA. It was agreed that he would be chosen by ILCA's Board of Trustees as soon as practicable. Members of the Subcommittee were invited to send nominations for Director to Professor Tribe.

THIRD SESSION (August 3)

Memorandum of Agreement on ILCA

27. The Subcommittee turned to a still further draft of the Memorandum of Agreement on ILCA, prepared to reflect the discussion of the previous day. The Chairman led a detailed examination of the draft, calling attention to matters of particular interest. Among these were several passages of the text intended to provide for cooperation between ILCA and ILRAD (for instance, a stipulation that the ILCA Board should invite two ILRAD Trustees to attend its meetings). In suggesting the desirability of later placing ILCA and ILRAD under a common Board, however, the Subcommittee did not mean to imply that this method of integration was a settled question; it was a question that the Consultative Group would settle at a later date.

28. The Chairman remarked on the obvious impossibility of reaching final agreement on a draft Memorandum of Agreement for either center in the time remaining for this meeting of the Subcommittee. It was agreed that a clean draft of the ILCA Memorandum should be prepared, that a new draft of the ILRAD Memorandum would be prepared which would closely conform to the ILCA draft, and that both drafts would be circulated to the Subcommittee for comment. The necessity for rapid responses from members of the Subcommittee was stressed.

Memorandum of Agreement on ILRAD

29. On the preceding day, it had been agreed that in so far as possible, the Memorandum of Agreement on ILRAD would run parallel with the revised Memorandum on ILCA; and it had been suggested that the ILRAD Board should be enlarged to be more like the ILCA Board in size and

composition.

30. It was now agreed that the ILRAD Board should be enlarged to 12 members: two appointees of the host government; three who are designated by the Consultative Group or its African Livestock Subcommittee; six members at large, with interests and qualifications relevant to the work of the Laboratory, including three African nationals; and the Director ex officio.

31. At its meeting of June 13 in Paris, the Subcommittee had selected six of the elective members of the ILRAD Board. The Chairman now suggested that the Subcommittee choose a seventh, leaving two others to be chosen by the Board itself; and for the seventh seat he nominated Professor Zwart of the University of Utrecht. The Chairman's suggestion was accepted, and Professor Zwart was elected to be a Trustee of ILRAD.

Initial Funds for ILCA (and ILRAD)

32. On August 2, the representative of the International Development Research Centre said that, pending the organization of an initial fund for ILCA, IDRC would be willing to finance reasonable expenditures to support the activities of working parties or of consultants as might be necessary.

33. The Secretary of the Subcommittee reported that in the meeting of the Consultative Group on the morning of August 3, nine members of the Group had expressed an interest in making funds available for ILCA. They were: Belgium, Denmark, France, IDRC, Netherlands, Sweden, UNDP, the United Kingdom and the United States. If additional support were necessary,

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he Bank would be willing to consider participating in the initial fund. In any case, it would be possible to mobilize at least \$500,000 and perhaps \$600,000 for this fund.

34. The Secretary said that he would circulate drafts of agreements under which subscriptions could be made to initial funds for ILCA and ILRAD. He hoped that comments would be received quickly and that these agreements could be ready for formal signatures by September 15.

Next Subcommittee Meeting

35. The Subcommittee adjourned <u>sine die</u> to wait the call of the Chairman for a next meeting when in his judgment that might be necessary.

AN INTERNATIONAL LABORATORY FOR ANIMAL DISEASE RESEARCH IN AFRICA

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ABSTRACT

It is proposed that an International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases be established in Africa at Kabete, Kenya in the neighborhood of the Faculty of Veterinary Science and the Faculty of Agriculture of the University of Nairobi and the veterinary research facilities of the Kenya Government. The laboratory, autonomous and under management of its own international board of trustees, would house a multi-disciplinary international group of scientists of the highest competence who would apply the most modern techniques of immunology toward the development of effective field vaccines for the control of the two major livestock diseases affecting cattle in Africa today - East Coast Fever and Trypanosomiasis. East Coast Fever occupies one fourth and Trypanosomiasis three fourths of the area of Africa south of the Sahara. East Coast Fever may inflict 15 percent mortality on the calf crop alone and up to 100 percent mortality in adult cattle not previously exposed to the disease; Trypanosomiasis is the single factor which excludes cattle as an exploitable resource from a portion of tropical Africa greater in size than that of the United States.

The Kenya Government would serve as host country, provide land, and extend the usual privileges to the laboratory and staff that other nations grant to international institutes. The laboratory would develop its own intrinsic program which would relate in a cooperative and synergistic way to other programs currently in progress. It would serve to satisfy the needs for animal disease research throughout tropical Africa.

To implement the program, it is recommended that a consortium of donors be formed to fund the costs of the laboratory. Three million three hundred forty-two thousand dollars (\$3,342,000) will be required for capital costs which will include laboratory buildings, staff housing, and administrative units. Recurrent costs will be scaled from five hundred thousand (\$500,000) in the first year to approximately one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) at the end of five years when the laboratory will be in full operation.

INTRODUCTION

The wild and domesticated animals on the African continent provide the people with one of their most important sources of food and protein but diseases which debilitate and kill livestock seriously constrain animal production. Most of these diseases are common to the animal population in other parts of the world; however, two of the most devastating ones - East Coast Fever and Trypanosomiasis - are peculiar to the African continent. Any effort to increase livestock production in Africa by upgrading present genetic strains of cattle, improving husbandry and management practices, developing better rangelands, will depend for its success on achievements to bring about effective control of these two diseases.

The Rockefeller Foundation and the Ford Foundation have been cooperating for years with developing countries, as have other institutions and agencies, in efforts to increase agricultural and livestock production. They have taken an extremely effective approach in establishing a limited number of international institutions which can mobilize interdisciplinary teams of high quality to undertake problem-oriented research of highest priority on food crops and, at the same time, train staff for national institutions working on similar problems. To date, four such institutes have been created: the International Rice Research Institute (IRRI) in the Philippines, the International Maize and Wheat Improvement Center (CIMMYT) in Mexico, the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA) in Nigeria, and the International Center for Tropical Agriculture (CIAT) in colombia. These institutes focus primarily on food crop improvement in developing countries.

Consideration is now being given to the possibility of establishing an international laboratory that would focus on research on animal diseases. Such a laboratory should be located in Africa where control of prevalent animal diseases is crucial to the health and productivity of both domesticated and wild livestock. If mutually satisfactory arrangements can be worked out, Kenya in eastern Africa would be a suitable site. As in the case of the food crop research institutes, the proposed laboratory would put completely interdisciplinary teams to work with equipment, support and freedom to pursue clear-cut goals on the major problems requiring basic and applied research on animal diseases.

Explorations on the possibility of establishing the proposed laboratory have been underway for several years. In October, 1969, The Rockefeller Foundation called a meeting at the Villa Serbelloni, Bellagio at which a group of eminent immunologists and administrative officials of veterinary institutions and of possible donor agencies discussed the need for such an international laboratory and the means by which it could be established. In April, 1970, heads of donor agencies meeting at Bellagio discussed the proposed laboratory, expressed enthusiasm for the idea and recommended proceeding to draft a proposal for their consideration in December, 1970. It was suggested that The Rockefeller Foundation undertake this in-depth exploratory step. Subsequent studies and discussions have confirmed (1) the needs for the laboratory, (2) the mutual interests of the Kenyan government, donor agencies, and immunologists of the scientific community in the proposed laboratory, (3) the suitability of Kenya as a potential site for it and (4) the desirability therefore of attempting to work out an acceptable arrangement for the laboratory.

The increasingly specialized techniques which have to be brought to bear on ECF and Trypanosomiasis place high premiums on sophistication in physical plant and equipment, on highly qualified research personnel and on able research leadership. Mobilization of such equipment, manpower, and leadership for research on these parasitic diseases are not in evidence under existing institutional frameworks in Africa. The proposed laboratory would help to fuse a number of the isolated parts into a strongly-focused program under competent leadership.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES

The general objectives of the laboratory would be:

1. To provide for the tropics a high quality international animal disease research center devoted in the first instance to finding ways as quickly as possible to conquer the major diseases limiting livestock production in Africa. The blood-borne parasites causing East Coast Fever and Trypanosomiasis of cattle would receive primary attention; modern techniques of immunization leading to effective practical vaccination procedures would be pursued. Basic research, applied research, experimentation and field testing of results would be undertaken.

- 2. To strengthen existing national and regional veterinary institutions. Links would be forged between the laboratory and existing livestock improvement institutions and with such institutions as may be founded in the future that would deal with animal diseases in Africa and with related problems of animal production.
- 3. To provide in cooperation with universities and research stations special fellowships and other opportunities for advanced professional experience in animal disease research to carefully selected persons who are or expect to become staff members of institutions and organizations in the tropics concerned with increased livestock production through disease control and thereby with improving its quality and distribution.

SCOPE OF RESEARCH

The research program would be pinpointed to marshal staff and facilities for investigations first on those diseases most devastating to livestock and least adequately controlled - East Coast Fever (ECF) and Trypanosomiasis. Few diseases so decimate their host animal species that their effective control is prerequisite to any other actions taken to improve livestock productivity; East Coast Fever and Trypanosomiasis, however, constitute two such diseases of cattle in Africa and therefore would command highest priority in the research effort.

East Coast Fever caused by <u>Theileria parva</u> is peculiar to the African continent. It is similar to other blood-borne protozoan diseases which occur in Africa and on other continents as well and it presents the same immunological problems as its relatives which have resisted resolution to date. The tick, <u>Rhipicephalus appendiculatus</u>, transmits the disease, primarily one of cattle. ECF occurs in 1/4 of the area of Africa south of the Sahara. Where ECF occurs, adult cattle may suffer mortality up to 100 percent; at times, calf crop alone may suffer 15 percent mortality from ECF. Some estimates place losses to Kenya from ECF at 2,000,000 pounds of sterling. In Sukumaland, Tanzania, which has a cattle population of 4,000,000 head, one investigator cited the loss of 400,000 head over a three-year period. Such losses spell disaster for the small stockholder. The necessity to dip cattle weekly in endemic areas (where tick infestation is present) represents an

annual cost of 17 shillings per head. A suitable vaccine should not cost more than three to four shillings and if it meets modern concepts it would probably not have to be applied annually. Elimination of excessive use of pesticides to control the ticks will reduce the food residue problem an increasingly important element in the diet of the people.

Trypanosomiasis caused by one or more protozoan species, <u>Trypano-</u> <u>soma</u>, is also peculiar to the African continent. In addition to cattle, various species of animals and even man contract Trypanosomiasis. Tsetse flies of the species <u>Glossina</u> transmit Trypanosomiasis. It has a much wider distribution than does ECF; it is prevalent over 3/4 of the area of Africa south of the Sahara. Trypanosomiasis is a debilitating disease but prolonged exposure and infection result in death. Susceptible cattle may die within a few weeks of exposure to tsetse. This disease still excludes cattle as an exploitable resource from an area of Africa greater than that of the United States and which is estimated to be capable of supporting 200,000,000 head of cattle.

Immunologists have labored many years to understand the mechanism of infection and immune response to parasitic disease like ECF and Trypanosomiasis. The life cycles of the parasites in question demonstrate in the case of ECF the overwhelming and lethal effect of massive and rapid multiplication of the parasite on the host, and in the case of the trypanosome an unbelievable capacity to change its constitution weekly if necessary to compensate for the effects of the host's antibody-producing mechanisms.

As has already been stated, the laboratory would maintain a carefully tailored, intrinsic and basic program neither distorted nor diluted beyond the needs as dictated by the seriousness of livestock diseases within the laboratory's broad international parish and as determined by the capabilities of its staff. The immunologists of the laboratory, however, would be alert to new disease problems which may assume vital importance as current diseases come under control. Fascioliasis of cattle, a disease caused by liver flukes (worms) is a third disease, the control of which would lend itself to an attack such as the strong group of immunologists of the laboratory in question could give it. Worms, like protozoa, have been among the most stubborn of those organisms to yield to immunizing techniques. Yet today vaccines are produced for at least six worms, including hookworm; a practical method of vaccinating cattle against lungworm is also in use in many parts of the world.

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LAND REQUIREMEN'TS

The diseases on which experimental work will be done require field experimentation with large animals; 400 acres of land available in one block would be optimal for the operations of the laboratory.

To facilitate and strengthen its training program and to provide ready access to qualified scientists and research facilities in related fields, it is proposed that the laboratory be located among the cluster of institutions comprising the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine and the Faculty of Agriculture of the University of Nairobi, the Kenya Veterinary Department at Kabete, and the East Africa Veterinary Research Organization at Muguga. An area generally east of the Faculty of Agriculture and contiguous with its experimental grounds at Kabete would make an ideal site. Exact site requirements can be established as soon as agreement in principle is reached with the Kenya Government.

It is proposed that the Government of Kenya provide adequate land for the center on long-term lease at token rent. The Kenya Government would be expected to assume legal and financial responsibility for this acquisition and for such other land acquisitions as may be required and mutually agreed upon by the laboratory and the Government in the future. Smaller acreages for experimental work, field tests and demonstrations in other parts of Kenya may be required later on.

PHYSICAL PLANT AND FACILITIES: BUDGET

A modest administrative unit, adequate laboratory and office facilities, animal accommodations and housing for personnel are essential. The administrative centre will form part of the main building housing laboratories as will staff offices. This building will be sound in construction of reinforced concrete but light and airy in design, one storey high. (See architect's preliminary drawings, Appendix B.) Three large laboratories will handle gross investigations; they will contain equipment and apparatus for routine services. Eight smaller laboratories will have special equipment for somewhat more sophisticated research. A number of service laboratories will be available to serve specialized functions such as incubation

or refrigeration. Scientists' offices will generally be located in conjunction with the respective laboratory work area. Plans call for a cattle accommodation unit and units of special design for experimental animals and to house tick and tsetse fly colonies. Details of the physical plant appear in Appendix B. Preliminary estimated costs are as follows:

OPERATIONS: BUDGET

The research effort envisioned will require an interdisciplinary team of six senior scientists, among them parasitologists, epidemiologists, pathologists and immunochemists with appropriate supporting staff, experimental animals, laboratory and field supplies and equipment. These requirements are estimated tentatively as follows for the core program:

FINANCING

Basic financing of the original capital costs of buildings and equipment would be provided by a consortium of donors.

Recurrent costs such as staff salaries and benefits, building and equipment upkeep and replacement, supplies, library, publications, conferences and seminars, etc., would be provided by the consortium. The laboratory would be authorized to receive funds from other sources, both public and private, and once established would actively seek support from other sources for fellowships, special projects and equipment, as well as for general support.

Because assurance of long-term financial support is essential to the efficient operation of a research organization, the consortium of donors would state its intention of supporting the core operations of the laboratory for a minimum period of 7 years, estimated as being adequate to solve the disease problems under investigation, assuming satisfactory operation. If, at the end of 7 years, the laboratory, in the judgment of the Trustees, is continuing to perform a service of great importance to tropical livestock production, consideration should be given to extending support of its core operations for an additional period, fully, in part, or on a declining basis, as initially constituted or reconstructed possibly as a Kenyan institution. In the latter case the physical assets of the laboratory would devolve, subject to approval by the Government of Kenya, to a Kenyan or other appropriate agency.

LEGAL STATUS

The proposed laboratory would be established under Kenyan law as an autonomous, non-profit, tax-free organization, international in character and operating under policies laid down by its Board of Trustees.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

It is proposed that the laboratory have a self-perpetuating Board of Trustees of not less than nine or more than fifteen members. Representation of the Board should reflect its international character. Board members would serve for a period of three years. Terms would be staggered to provide continuity of membership. Members would serve in their individual capacities and not as representatives of the organizations with which they happen to be affiliated.

Though international in scope and impact of its program on livestock production throughout Africa, it is believed essential that 3 distinguished Kenyans serve on the Board.

It is also proposed that the four* initial major donors be authorized to appoint one member each to the Board of Trustees of the laboratory and that the Director of the laboratory also be a member.

It is proposed further that with the exception of the three Kenyan members, and the Director, the Board of Trustees of the laboratory shall be free to appoint such other members, not to exceed eleven in number

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as will in its judgment provide the strongest possible Board, keeping in mind such considerations as geographical representation, scientific knowledge of and experience in tropical diseases of livestock, etc. Additional members should include, for example, eminent specialists in tropical agriculture and livestock production and one or more distinguished public servants from each of the following categories: Tropical African areas other than Kenya, South and Southeast Asia, Latin America, and the Caribbean. The Economic Commission for Africa of OAU might be represented on the Board.

It is contemplated that the numbers in the first three categories would remain constant unless it were mutually agreed to amend the articles of incorporation, by-laws, or other basic documents. Numbers in the fourth category might vary from time to time depending upon the judgment of the Board as to which individuals among those who are available are likely to make the greatest contribution to the work of the laboratory.

TOTAL

MANAGEMENT

The laboratory would be responsible for all matters pertaining to its own staff, operating, of course, within the context of applicable Kenyan law, its charter, mandate, and program as approved by its Board of Trustees. The Director would consult with appropriate Kenyan officials on quarantine matters to eliminate hazards of movement of new and dangerous disease organisms across national borders. All professional and non-professional appointments, including candidates for training, would be made exclusively by the laboratory. While the laboratory would expect to employ Kenyans and other nationals from African countries in both professional and non-professional capacities so far as is consistent with the attainment of its objectives and adequately qualified men are available, it would make every effort not to mine the local manpower resources of existing institutions and programs.

The appointment of the Director of the laboratory and of Trustees other than those from Kenya would be subject to the approval of the consortium of donors that provides a major part of the funds required to finance the laboratory's core operation, and of the Kenya representatives on the Board.

Changes would be made in the basic charter of the laboratory only with the prior approval of those donors during the period of their financial support and in consultation with the Government of Kenya.

RELATION TO KENYAN AND OTHER UNIVERSITIES

The laboratory would be an international, independent, autonomous institution operating under policies laid down by its Board of Trustees. It would not grant degrees and, therefore, would not be competitive with universities in Kenya or elsewhere. It would, however, be prepared to furnish, in addition to facilities for research, advanced training at post-doctoral level for young scientists looking forward to careers in the field of tropical livestock production. Arrangements would be made with interested universities for granting appropriate credit for work done at the laboratory toward requirements for advanced degrees. Arrangements for joint university-laboratory appointments, for exchange of research personnel, and for the use of the laboratory's research facilities by university staff members or of university facilities by laboratory staff members would be a matter for individual negotiation between the laboratory and the individual university concerned.

RELATIONS WITH KENYAN AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS CONDUCTING RESEARCH ON ANIMAL DISEASES

While the laboratory would have its own intrinsic program, its activities would be additive and synergistic to the work of other tropical institutions, national and regional, especially those with on-going research in animal diseases



and their control. The staff of the laboratory would be expected to serve as a source of inspiration and encouragement to other workers at existing research centres with whom the staff would be cooperating. Programs at EAAFRO on East Coast Fever, for example, would be strengthened through joint planning of research so as to make the best use of existing staff and facilities and to eliminate unnecessary duplication of effort.


RELATIONS WITH GOVERNMENT

Customs-free privileges for the laboratory, including furnishings and household equipment purchased by the laboratory for lease or provision to staff members, would be provided. Customs privileges for foreign professional personnel would be extended on a basis similar to other international technical assistance personnel working in Kenya. Foreign professional staff members of the laboratory would not be subject to Kenyan personal income tax.

The Kenya Government would undertake to facilitate entry into Kenya of professional personnel, including the granting of Resident's Visas and Work Permits, except where an individual may be specifically declared unacceptable.

Supplement to the Tribe Report Capital Costs

In this memorandum the estimates for Capital Costs as outlined in the Tribe Report (P.55) have been further refined as a result of more detailed examination of the sizes of buildings and their costs and in consultation with various bodies in Addis Ababa (July, 1973).

As many sources as possible were consulted in the time available, and in particular information was obtained from the Ministry of Agriculture (in relation to their research station at Holletta), the Chief Architect of the Ministry of Public works and four independent firms of architects recommended by Public Works. Each was requested to supply information on the existing cost of housing and building construction in relation to the requirements of the Centre.

Based on the described use of the building and the number of people likely to be affected, it was possible to estimate the approximate cost of each building. Estimates were based on the approximate surface area expressed in square metres (m^2) and the cost per m^2 in Ethiopian dollars * for each type of building complete, but without equipment. By multiplying the two figures together, the approximate cost of each building was obtained.

Based on the mean of the six sources of information, the following results were obtained.

Site Works

To include water supplies, sewerage, roads, parking space, recreation facilities, perimeter fencing and landscaping was not estimated in detail but an allowance of 25% of building costs was made, according to common practice.

Rising Costs

Architects Fees

It is reckoned that building costs have doubled over the last 10 years and that they will continue to rise but probably at a slower rate. An annual allowance of 5% has been included with building assumed to be completed in 3 years.

The general fee is 7-8% of the total cost of buildings including site works. The figure of 8% is used to cover preliminary design, detailed drawings with specifications and quantities and supervision of the contractor. The Ministry of of Public Works can supply the names of Registered Architects and Contractors and are prepared to check designs and costs and to supervise the giving out of tenders and the award of contracts. A site for the Center has been tentatively selected within the city limits at the site of the Shola Dairy and adjacent to the Desert Locust Research Station and the ODA supported veterinary clinic, just off the main Asmaru Road. The Minister of Agriculture has agreed to release the site subject to final approval by the Council of Ministers and the terms and conditions laid down by them. The amount of land to be released has not been finalized but is likely to be 7.5 ha. It is an excellent site with gently sloping land, with access to the main road with electricity, water and telephone services available. Sewerage will have to be provided.

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In the original estimates provision was made for the construction of 24 houses for senior staff on the Center. However, the general consensus of opinion gathered from international and bilateral agencies was that it was better to limit housing on the Center and allow most of the staff to find their own accommodation in the City, according to their preferences and requirements (e.g. proximity to schools, shops, etc.)

Villas and apartments are fairly readily available for rent (unfurnished) though the supply varies from time to time. Large villas are more easily obtainable than inexpensive ones and apartments are in fairly short supply.

Housing

Villas, medium size - ETH \$600-800 per month (US \$300-400)

Apartments - ETH \$200-600 according to size and location. (US \$100-300)

Air-conditioning and heating are not necessary though most villas have fireplaces in some rooms.

Furniture

Furniture of all kinds and quality are readily available in Addis Ababa, both locally made and imported, but it is expensive.

Basic furniture would be very expensive for each staff member to import and it will probably be better to provide basic furniture and allow him to air freight only his personal effects and soft furnishings. Provision for this has been made in the capital costs for this purpose.

It is proposed therefore to build only 6 houses on the Center for the use of Senior Administrative Staff. Houses of this kind can be provided with a surface area of 180 m² at a cost of ETH \$300 for m² or ETH \$54,000 each. The total cost of 6 houses would therefore be ETH \$324,000 (US \$162,000).

Basic furniture purchased locally would cost ETH \$9,000 (US \$4,500) per family for Senior Staff based on the Center and ETH \$8,000 (US \$4,000) per family for other staff housed in the city.

It was not possible to re-assess the original equipment estimate of \$1 million, nor to revise the estimated research station costs of \$0.5 million although visits to the field sites proposed by the Ethiopian Government suggested that the latter figure would not need upward revision. There is a saving of \$700,000 in capital costs over those originally proposed by the Task Force. This is largely accounted for by the proposed reduction in housing units from 24 to 6.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

In view of the encouraging progress which is being made towards the establishment of the International Livestock Centre for Africa (ILCA), the Agency for International Development has given careful study to the guidelines which should be followed in selecting the Provisional Director General for this new Centre.

The responsibilities of ILCA will involve a broad range of activities. These will include research emphasis upon: livestock production by small producers, or by groups of individuals, in several ecological zones of Africa; economic and social impediments to increasing livestock production; storage and transportation difficulties; marketing policies; range management; improved breeding stock; animal health, including nutrition problems; and other obstacles constituting significant constraints to increasing livestock production in tropical and subtropical areas. In carrying out these activities, it is planned that continuing emphasis will be given to the training of Africans.

In recognition of the numerous and difficult problem areas requiring attention in developing Africa's livestock output potential, the Consultative Group, during its November 1972 meeting, reached a firm consensus concerning the importance of adopting a vertically integrated approach covering research needs from the producer through the marketing and processing phases of production to assure necessary coordination at all levels. Also, the International Task Force, headed by Dr. Derek Tribe, recommended a systems analysis approach in developing ILCA's research programs because of the necessity of structuring them in accordance with sound priority policies. Further, the Task Force stressed the importance of conducting research activities at field locations selected in accordance with ecological considerations and available resources needed for research purposes. This will involve continuing liaison and negotiating relationships with cooperating governments and research organizations.

After examining the nature of the responsibilities which must be assumed by the Provisional Director General, the United States position is that the incumbent should have: a) a capacity for analyzing the economic and social aspects of livestock production including marketing programs and preferably have training as a livestock economist; b) a knowledge of the technical problems associated with livestock production; c) a capacity for administering programs; d) an ability to build cooperation and favorable relationships with African governments and research organizations as well as with donor governments and organizations; and e) if possible, have a knowledge of both English and French.

It is believed that the leadership provided by the Provisional Director General will be of critical importance during the period when the Centre's programs are being planned and developed. For this reason, we wish to make the U.S. evaluation known to the other members of the Subcommittee for their study prior to the Subcommittee's next meeting on August 1, 1973. Your cooperation in circulating this letter to the members would be much appreciated.
