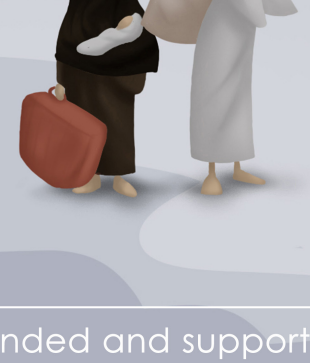


**Yemen: Crisis Overview**

Funded and supported by the World Bank's International Development Association, the **Yemen Emergency Crisis Response Project (YECRP)** is implemented by UNDP Yemen in partnership with the Social Fund for Development (SFD) and the Public Works Project (PWP). The project provides economic stimuli in the form of large cash-for-work projects, support to small businesses, and labour-intensive rehabilitation of socio-economic assets, benefiting vulnerable local households and communities across Yemen.

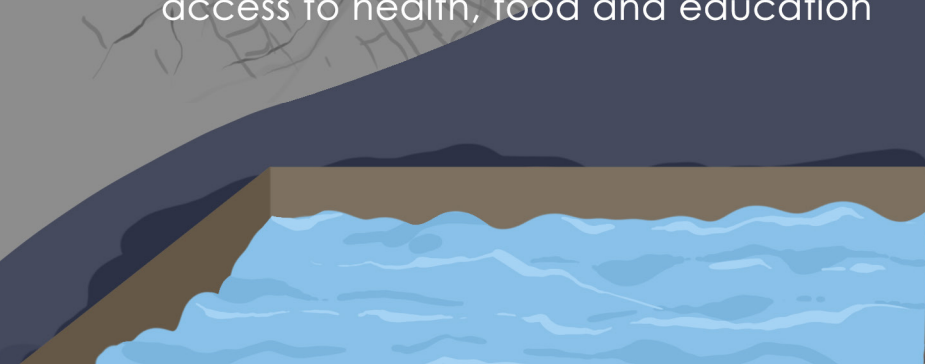

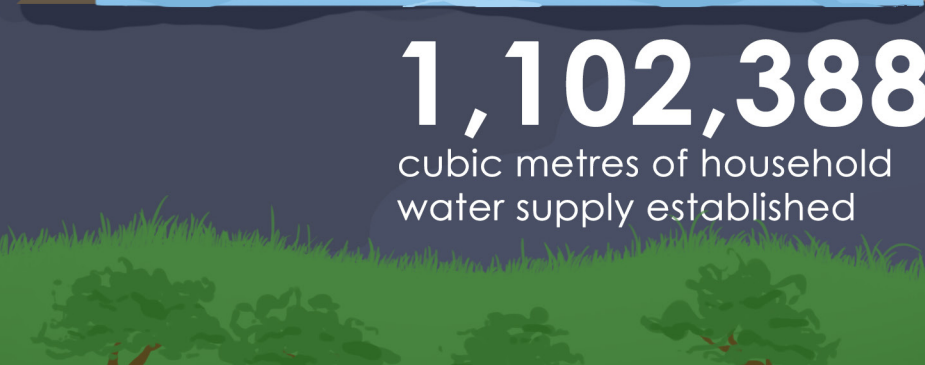

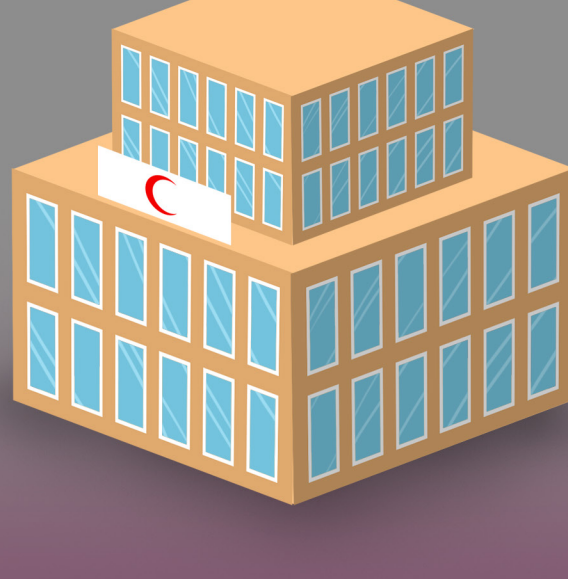
