Dear George,

As you well know, the UNCTAD dropped a number of specific requests for advisory opinions in your mailbox. At the same time, it proposed expansions in multilateral activity along a number of different lines. These suggestions involved expanding I.D.A., starting the United Nations Capital Development Fund, enlarging the role of the U.N. Special Fund, and placing much more reliance on regional bodies, also called regional development institutions.

I think it fair to say that the members of the Development Assistance Committee have a general feeling that multilateral programs should grow somewhat more rapidly than bilateral, but are not at all clear as to what this means in specific terms. However, as the chief suppliers who are likely to be expected to provide any additional funds, they feel that they should make some effort to peer into the future. Since this is a matter of some interest to you, I am writing to ask your help in trying to make some guesses as to the possibilities, and limitations, of the future expansion of multilateral efforts. Could someone of fairly high level from your shop join us, perhaps some time in June or July, in an off-the-record discussion of these matters?


I do not think this error calls for any immediate amendment but I should be grateful if you would bear this point in mind when the page is re-issued.

You were most kind to have invited me to participate in the OECD September Conference on the Financing of Education. Perhaps you were not aware that I am leaving the Bank in August to resume my activities in Unesco in charge of Educational Planning. Accordingly, my September program is so crowded already that I could not undertake to prepare a paper and participate with the Study Group. You may be sure, however, that having arrived in Paris, I shall want to keep in close touch with OECD for continued exchanges of views and information on problems of educational planning. It is not to be excluded that I may wish to avail myself of the opportunity of chatting privately with some of the participants in your September Seminar while they are in Paris.

NOTE BY THE SECRETARIAT

The attached Progress Report on the work of the Study Group in the Economics of Education is submitted to the Committee for Scientific and Technical Personnel for CONSIDERATION.

PROGRESS REPORT OF THE STUDY GROUP IN THE ECONOMICS OF EDUCATION

- 1. The Study Group in the Economics of Education is a small technical group operating under the auspices of the Committee for Scientific and Technical Personnel. Its Chairman is the Chairman of the STP Committee; its members are economists and educational planners at universities, research institutes and governmental research organisations. The current members of the Study Group are:

- 2. The Study broup was established to bring the resources of free academic thought to bear on the theoretical and practical issues involved in the process by which education contributes to economic growth. Since its inception in 1960, about two meetings have been held each year, and research in universities and institutes in O.E.C.D. countries has been sponsored. Meetings and research have in recent periods been concerned with special aspects of the economics of education. Six projects are currently in varying stages of completion:
- A. The Economic Aspects of Higher Education
- The June 1962 meeting of the Study Group was concerned with the economics of higher education, a subject considered of special importance since higher education is the most rapidly growing sector of the educational system in many countries.

Problems of both theoretical and practical interest were discussed at this meeting, and certain aspects of the subject such as admission practices, trends in inflow, enrolment and graduation of students, costs and financing were found in need of urgent solution.

4. Preparation has recently been completed of a printed volume containing the papers prepared as background to the meeting by experts in this field as well as the results of the discussion as interpreted by the Editor of the volume, Seymour Harris of Harvard University. This book, the first of the Study Group series, will be available for sale after 1st March 1964, and a copy of its Table of Contents is attached (Annex).

B. The Residual Factor and Economic Growth

- A major meeting of distinguished economists was held in May 1963, on the residual factor and economic growth. Discussion centered on education as an investment with emphasis on two questions: first, can the contribution of knowledge to economic growth be isolated and measured; secondly, what is the best way of estimating the educational requirements of the economy?
- 6. Both questions generated considerable debate at the conference, and interest in the subject has remained acute. Many requests for relevant documents have been received from Member governments, international organisations, libraries, universities and research groups. John Vaizey of Oxford University, has prepared a preface and has edited the volume containing the summaries of the proceedings and the background papers of the conference. The table of contents (Annex) of the volume, which will be on sale after May 1964, is attached.

C. The Educational Stock of the Labour Force

- Immediately following the conference on the residual factor, and in part as a direct result of this conference, the Study Group held the preparatory meeting of the comparative study of the educational stock of the labour force. Participation at this meeting included statisticians from educational ministries and research organisations of the O.E.C.D. Member Agreement was reached on alternative procednations (Annex). ures for developing estimates of this stock. The possibility was developed of preparing a Study Group document presenting a country-by-country comparison of the current levels of educational stock of the active population, while presenting information on historical trends and projections. Attention was given to the possibility of extending the estimates, for comparison and forecasting purposes, to include figures by industrial sector.
- 8. Estimates of total stock are now available for Belgium, France, Norway, Turkey, the U. and U.S.A. Data are currently being prepared for Greece, Ireland, Italy, Netherlands, Spain Sweden and Yugoslavia. It is hoped that the study, organised by the Secretary of the Study Group, will have been

sufficiently completed to permit its publication before the end of this year, thus responding to the wide requests for this document.

- 9. The May 1963 meeting incidentally served as an occasion to solicit data from Member countries on student aid measures, such figures to be used in connection with other research of the Study Group.
- D. The Crganisational Implications of the Link Between Education and Economic Growth
- 10. The emphasis in economic theory and government policy on the importance of education and research as factors of economic growth has opened a series of new questions in organisational structure. The Study Group held a meeting on 4th-6th November, 1963 at the Ecole Nationale des Sciences Politiques in Paris to consider these questions, and to evaluate some of the suggested solutions to these problems. The list of participants is attached (Annex).
- 11. As indicated in the opening remarks of the Chairman, Henning Friis, the meeting did not intend to produce a set of simple administrative designs which would be universally applicable. It could and did serve as a unique opportunity for experts in the fields of education, manpower, science and economics to consider the areas where new problems had been produced, where new tools of co-ordinated action were required, and here further studies were justified.
- 12. The role of educational planning in economic programmes was considered, with particular reference to the experiences of the educational planning groups in Turkey and in France. Consideration was given to recent proposals in the U.K. for changes in organisational policy. An investigation was made of the various administrative machineries involved in determining requirements for and in developing skilled manpower. Attention was also devoted to centralised and decentralised educational organisations and their particular relevance to the educational objectives of the different countries. Extensive revision of research papers is currently in progress. It is anticipated that this editing will result in a volume of the Study Group series appearing in the summer of 1964. This will contain the introduction to the conference by the Chairman, the results of the discussion as interpreted by the Rapporteur, hoper Gregoire, as well as the research prepared by experts in the fields of manpower, science programming, educational, social and economic planning. The Table of Contents of this volume appears in the Annex.

E. Demand for Education

13. In response to requests from educational and social planners in Member governments, the Study Group has recently organised research on the question of the Pemand for Education, with particular concern for policies involved in reconciling

possible differences in the demand for educational products, for educational opportunities and for educational facilities. Studies have been commissioned on:

- (a) The various methods of measuring and forecasting the demand of individuals and their families for educational opportunities.
- (b) The effects of rising income, expanding markets for educational products, and changing family aspirations on the demand for education.
- (c) The influence of public policies, such as the location of educational facilities, student aids, teacher training, school organisation, etc. on the demand for education.
- 14. The research on this subject has already involved authorities in O.E.C.D. countries who are directly responsible for estimating requirements for educational resources or for producing the policies needed to adapt to this radically changing demand.
- 15. A preliminary conference, involving a restricted number of experts in the field, will be held in Paris on 29th and 30th June. Results of the studies already initiated in this field will be evaluated and further research may be commissioned. The major conference, resulting in the volume of the Study Group series, is tentatively scheduled for December 1964 at Tegel House near Berlin, Federal Republic of Germany.

F. Financing Education in the Developing and Developed Nations

- 16. A pre-conference session, held in Paris on 17th and 18th June 1963, indicated facets of the questions of financing education which were of prime importance to Lember governments and which would justify extended research. A series of research papers have been commissioned and will be discussed at a meeting of the Study Group scheduled for 21st-25th September, 1964 in Paris.
- 17. The organisation of the meeting has recognised a dichotomy between the financing problems of the more developed and the lesser developed nations.
- 18. For the developed nations, the papers being prepared include an analysis, by country, of the extent of present, past and projected levels of public expenditures for education. Investigation is made of: the different fiscal techniques in use, at both the national and regional levels; the capital markets available for educational finance; the different yardsticks and procedures for establishment of educational budgets; and the different student financing and aid measures. An analysis is being prepared of the affects that the increased national product and revenue will have on the fiscal capacity, of selected developed countries to assume the increased educational expenditure burdens of the 1960s.

- 19. An examination is being made of educational assistance programmes with reference to their implications for international organisations, for the donor and the recipient nations. The interactions between the kinds of educational programmes and the kinds of financing is also considered. Professor Richard Musgrave of Princeton University, U.S.A. and Professor Michel Debeauvais of the Institut d'Etudes du Développement Economique et Social, France, consider the significant question of the targets and priorities in educational planning which would be consistent with the stage of economic development and the immediate economic goals of the developing nations.
- 20. The Study Group is able to draw upon the results of the research and experience of the December 1963 conference in Athens on "Government Finance and Economic Development" organised by the C.E.C.D. Development Department, and the Regional Technical Assistance Seminar on "Investment in Education" organised by UNESCO for April 1964 in Bangkok.

I hope you will forgive me for trespassing upon your time in asking the questions that follow.

We have met with some difficulty in the recent past in getting relevant information which would help us in fixing daily subsistence rates for the members of our staff who are sent on mission in some parts of the world.

Since we believe that it is desirable that the different international and regional Organisations should offer approximately similar conditions of service to staff doing similar work, we have sought guidance in this question from the practice of other Organisations.

We have recently been sending staff to Latin America and East Africa and we find that for these two areas, little data is available.

I understand that officials of the Bank are sometimes sent to these areas and I should be very grateful if you could let me know the approximate daily subsistence rates that you pay them and how the mission expenses in general are met by the Bank.

Discussion with Mr. Clarens, OEEC

I would like to report to you the results of my conversation with Mr. Clarens of OEEC. Mr. Clarens told me that the OEEC mission in Washington, which as you know will be headquartered in a suite of offices near Dupont Circle on 18th Street, will consist of the following:

(1) Head of Mission, salary \$11,000 to \$12,000 (Bank Department Head rank); (2) Two principal administrators, salary \$9,000 to \$10,000 (Bank Division Head level); (3) One private secretary, salary \$3820; (4) Two bilingual stenographers, salary open; (5) One chauffeur/messenger, salary open; (6) One charwoman, salary open.

In addition to the salaries listed above, Mr. Clarens explained that OEEC expects to pay three allowances; an expatriation allowance of \$250 to \$500, a rental allowance of \$250 to \$500, and a representation allowance of \$1500 to \$3,000.

I have told Mr. Clarens that we would be glad to assist OEEC in recruiting for the bilingual stenographers, chauffeur/messenger, and charwoman. The other personnel are being recruited in France and should report for duty in Washington some time within the next month. Miss Wastrom is already at work on the recruiting we have promised to assist with, and I think we should have some candidates to suggest to Mr. Storrs in the near future.

Mr. Clemens also raised two questions to which I had no immediate answer. I told him I would make every effort to get an answer for him and pass it on to Storrs if I were successful. In the first place, he has asked about the possibility of diplomatic status for OEEC representatives in Washington. I told him I doubted seriously that such status would be granted by the United States Government, and that is a problem he might better take up directly through proper channels of OEEC. In the second place, he asked my advice in the matter of obtaining legal counsel. I told him I doubted that it would be a wise move to immediately engage a law firm to represent the staff of the OEEC mission in Washington, but that a wiser course would probably be to wait a month or so, during which time the Bank would undoubtedly be glad to lend whatever legal advice might be required.

Mr. Clamens had several other minor questions which we were able to discuss to his satisfaction. On the matter of Group Health, we have as yet received no answer from Mr. Dollar, but I propose to call him in a day or so if we have still not heard from him.
