Matters concerning this seemingly never-ending project are coming up again.

A number of cables and a telephone conversation with Mr. Slaghuis, the Financial Director of BMB, have shattered our common understanding that only an estimated F1 15,000 (US\$6,000) remained outstanding to be paid to BMB from the UNDP account for the above project. Instead, he advises us that BMB auditors have uncovered an additional FL 306,579.64 (US\$122,632) which they claim is owed to them. He's sorry for the inconvenience.

Mr. Condé-Rocha from Controller's believes that these claims are quite legitimate. In fact, Controller's have all the referred-to invoices but one. Incidentally, at no time in our recent conversations with them was mention ever made of these outstanding invoices. The understanding was that, on the basis of Mr. Slaghuis' cable of December 17, 1976, the only amount still to be invoiced was for the above-mentioned F1 15,000 (US\$6,000).

Action Required

- Revision of UNDP budget. Fortunately the amount budgeted by UNDP for 1977, which was based on Claudio Hachero's earlier estimates, covers the largest part of what is required to cover the above claims. Some adjustments may be required and I should be in a better position to know how much after I receive the full accounting of claims and disbursements which Controller's have promised me for this project. This revised estimate will be processed through Mr. P. Gisle, from International Relations.
- Revision of disbursement ceilings in contract for consiltants' services. The amount mentioned in the contract, representing the maximum which the Bank may disburse for BMB's services (US\$707,099), will have to be amended upwards. The new amount will be determined on the basis of the accounting reports to be provided by Controller's. A draft letter for the purpose of amending the contract has been prepared and has already been cleared by the Legal Department.
- Statement of final claim. Also in draft form is a letter requesting BMB to provide us with a statement from their part that these are the last and final claims pertaining to the above project. This letter has also been cleared by the Legal Department.

The final report of the consulting firm of Berenschot-Moret-Bosboom (BMB) as managers of the Nigerian Agricultural Bank was distributed towards the end of last year. The consultants were financed by UNDP during the period April 1973 to March 1976, and the World Bank acted as Executing Agency. We understand that the consultants have already sent you the report but a copy is attached for easy reference.

In our capacity as Executing Agency for UNDP, we have reviewed the consultants' report and endorse for the most part their comments and recommendations. It is particularly gratifying that in three years they achieved most of the short-term objectives, including: the creation of a viable agricultural banking institution capable of assisting in the implementation of Nigeria's long-term agricultural policy; and, quite significantly, the selection and training of suitable Nigerian staff who have, except for the general manager's position, taken over the management of the Bark.

There are, however, a number of points contained in the report which we would like to bring to your attention. These include a number of recommendations which pertain to general policy matters and depend, for a large part, on clear directions from the Federal Military Government:

(a) the establishment of definite areas of responsibility so as to develop a smooth working relationship between the Bank and the cooperative movement and, particularly, with the Agricultural Cooperative Division of the Federal Ministry of Cooperatives and Supply;

- (b) the establishment of long-term plans and policies which would allow NAB to assume a larger role as a direct lender to smallholders, individually or in groups, without endangering its financiag position or jeopardizing the objects in the Company's Memorandum of Association:
- (c) to allow NAB to adopt for its staff conditions of service which, by recognizing the important role of the Bank as an instrument of development policy, will enable it to attract and retain qualified and experienced staff; and
- (d) to allow the Board of Directors, in its basic and rotating membership, a broader base of representation to eventually include various sectors of Nigeria's economy such as the State Governments, the farming community, business and the cooperative movement.

We wish this young but already successful institution every success in its hard but challenging task ahead.



Our reply to Wadsworth's letter of 24/2/76 will be to this effect:

- Project Revision E, which we prepared, reflected actual (vis-a-vis (1) budgetted) delivery for 1974. Increase of \$27,319.90 due to dollar devaluation. Figures supplied by IBRD! (see attached sheet) - you must have a new man in that section, as IBRD sends figures of actual delivery for all UNDP projects every year and he should have known this!
- (2) We appear never to have received a delivery report for 1973, and must pressume actual equalled budgetted expenditure.
- (3) We await a delivery report for 1975. IBRD should already be preparing it. If it shows an increase of \$70,760.55 due to dollar devaluation over 1975 budget, we very rapidly do another revision, IBRD and the Res. Rep. sign it, it goes to our HQ and IBRD receives payment (as per standard procedure!) - assuming we are still solvent.
- (4) It seems to me at first glance that Heyndrichz did do his sums correctly, the extension should have cost what it did (\$30,000?), the experts stayed till end of Feb. and all is OK - I think?
- The budget for this extension should be incorporated in the same (5) project revision we will prepare to reflect actual 1975 delivery. Could you let us have a single "official" dollar figure for the extension?

No good at all this rain, I hope you are not actually sttting out to see us!

When the extension of the Nigerian Agricultural Bank Consultants Contract was first proposed we informed our Lagos office that funds under the existing contract were nearly depleted and that expenditures from August, 1975 onwards would have to be met by Government unless additional UNDP funds could be provided. Mr. Rowe's letter of November 14, 1975, also referred to this matter.

On December 17, 1975, you wrote to Mrs. Boskey enclosing Project Revision Form E for the NAB project which increased the UNDP contract contribution from \$765,000 to \$792,320. The signed form was returned to you with Mr. Gisle's letter of January 21, 1976.

Enfortunately we are unable to reconcile the revised budget prepared by your office with actual expenditures to date and estimated disbursements required to complete the original contract. Total disbursements under the contract to date (including consultant's statement of expenditures for the month of July, 1975) amounts to US\$755,711 (see Schedule 1). We have received the August, 1975 statement with a dollar equivalent of US\$13,807, which would brigg total disbursements to US\$769,518, leaving a balance of US\$22,802. We estimate total expenditures covering the period September until the contract termination dates would be approximately US\$9\$,563 (Schedule 2). This will result in an estimated cost overrum of approximately US\$71,000 (Schedule 2) despite the increase in the UNDP contributions from \$765,000 to \$792,320.

The cost overrum is due mainly to exchange rate fluctuations. The original budget of US\$765,000 was based on a foreign exchange rate of FL2.95 to US\$1 and H1 to US\$0.6578. The dollar devaluation resulted in a foreign currency loss of approximately US\$71,000 (for details see Schedule 1).

Mr. Hurt Jansson -2-February 24, 1976 We are now processing the August, 1975 claim under the contract, but we have not yet received the September, 1975 claim from the Federal Ministry of Agriculture. After the September, 1975 payment has been made the remaining contract obligations would have to be met by Government. unless further UNDP funds are available. Your comments would be very much appreciated together with the basis on which the figures in Project Revision Form E were calculated. Should UNDP funding be limited to \$792,320 Government will have to be informed as soon as possible. If this is so would you please confirm whether the Bank as executing agency should do this or whether your office will act. Migerian Agricultural Bank Berenschot Bosboom N.V.'s management contract I enclose a letter which I have written to Dr. Bukar Shalb seeking clarification of FGH's intentions towards MAB and the future of Berenschot's management contract. I should be grateful if you would review the letter and then deliver it to Dr. Bukar Shaib. If you should have any comments and/or emendments to suggest, please hold the letter and advise me urgently. Or basic position is that in MAB's interest we should prefer to see BB complete their centract, as originally planned, in advisory and training role supported by additional outside advisors to promote HAB's expansion. Haturally, the early appointment of Migerians to the posts of general manager and heads of department is vital as is the orderly expansion of the technical and support staff. BB should complete their Interim Report to provide guidance to the Board and the Rigerian executives for future policy and procedures. However, if FGH required early termination of BB contract, then our position would be as contained in the timetable of events attached to our letter to Dr. Bukar Shaib, with the Bank's responsibilities under the Project Document ceasing with the conclusion of BB's services. The Bank's role towards MAB would then be to advise and assist, if and when requested by Fin. Would you please obtain UMDP's informal reactions to a) NON's intentions as presently stated by Dr. Bukar Shaib and b) my letter to Dr. Bukar Shaib. I am also enclosing for UMDP records a copy of Arben's notes of the tripartite meeting held in Kaduna on October 10th and 11th. Metcalfe and Poyck of BB visited Washington on November 26 to report on Metcalfe's recent visit to Nigeria. I understand and am pleased to note that Grosjean and Pearce were able to stop Mackay, following the flurry of letters and cables from Tilburg, from making any precipitate approach to FUN. Mackay has now been instructed by BB Tilburg to maintain close liaison with your office and not to make any direct or independent approach to PGN on matters other than those concerning the routine operation of MAB. Nigerian Agricultural Bank Berenschot Bosboom N.V.'s Management Contract

Mr. Grosjean of our Lagos office has informed me that at the meeting he held with you and Mr. M. Nolte of the UNDP on October 15, you indicated that your Government was considering the early termination of Berenschot Bosboom's services to the Nigerian Agricultural Bank. Mr. Grosjean indicated that the principal reason for this was that you were disatisfied with the progress made by Berenschot in handing over executive responsibility to Nigerian personnel. Clearly, the perogative of requiring the early termination of Berenschot's services is solely that of your Government; however, the contract under which Berenschot are employed is between this Bank and Berenschot. For this reason we are concerned that we should be given detailed and early notice of any intention you have to depart from the existing agreements between us. We need such information so that we may execute our responsibilities under the Project Document and avoid any possibility of a breach of contract between us and Berenschot. Consequently, we would be very grateful if we could have a statement of your Government's intentions.

I would like to take this opportunity to say that it is our hope that the decision you take would not be detrimental to NAB's future. In this respect, I believe there are two important considerations:

First, Berenschot are now preparing the Interim Report. This report will be the only comprehensive document on NAB policies, procedures, and operations and will contain Berenschot's recommendations for the future. In our view, part of Berenschot's past problems have been caused by their being required to set up and run NAB at the same time as being responsible for developing policy. Clearly, it would be in the interest of the new Nigerian management of NAB to have the advantage of comprehensive operational guidelines, as well as Berenschot's views on the directions NAB might take in the future. For the Interim Report to be really useful, time will be required to review the draft and thrash out differences in views. If, on the other hand, Berenschot are given insufficient time to prepare, discuss and review their drafts, then the likelihood is that the Interim Report will be of very limited value.

Second, we agree that Nigerians should take over executive positions as early as possible (as you know the original planning for transfer of executive power agreed upon by all parties, was January 1, 1975). However, we think that it would be desirable for Berenschot staff to remain in an advisory role until such time as the new Nigerian management had worked itself in and was in full command of the situation. In the basic planning for the project, it was assumed that Berenschot's services should be gradually withdrawn during 1975 and the contract allows for this. We feel that while probably it would be possible to speed this up to some degree, it would be dangerous to aim at the final removal of Berenschot's services much before the end of June 1975.

As I have said earlier, the decision in this matter is that of your Government and we do not presume to pre-judge what that might be. Nontheless, given our responsibilities and although we would be happy to see the contract follow its original course, I take the liberty of attaching for your consideration what we believe would be a timetable of events that would lead to the conclusion of Berenschot's services by mid 1975 with the minimum disruption to NAB's activities.

A copy of this letter is being sent to the UNDP Resident representative, Lagos, so that he may consider and discuss with you and IRRD Resident Mission, Lagos, UNDP's position under the Project Document.

At your convenience, I look forward to receiving your views on these matters.

- 1. FNG gives formal notice to UNDP and IBRD as provided for in the Project Document dated November 15, 1972, requesting termination of the Project Document on the grounds that Berenschot's services are not required after June 30, 1975; not less than 60 days' notice would be required.
- 2. NAB Board appoint from existing professional staff acting heads of department pending their final selection and appointment. Berenschot would then assume immediately an advisory role pending the arrival of their replacements.
- 3. FGN/NAB appoint a Nigerian general manager with full executive responsibility with the present general manager remaining in supernumerary capacity to supervise the handover and departure of Berenschot's team.
- 4. As the Interim Report is due January 1975, Berenschot should be encouraged to continue with its preparation as originally planned. After discussions of the report with Berenschot, IBRD will send its comments to you and to NAB Board.
- 5. Following your advice on the role of the replacement advisors, IBRD will suggest possible institutions for their recruitment, assist with the initial approaches, advise generally but would leave the contractual negotiations and arrangements to FGN/NAB (as you know we have directly sent names of individuals and institutions). After the advisors' arrival, which is unlikely to be before May 1975, Berenschot staff would complete their handover within two months but by no later than June 30, 1975.

Introduction

In accordance with the terms of reference dated October 2, 1974 I visited Kaduna (Nigeria) to attend the Tripartite meeting called by UNDP to review the status and progress of Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB), a UNDP-financed project for which the Bank is executing agent. The Bank team consisted of Messrs. Courbois (CRS), Grosjean (Resident Mission, Lagos) and Arben (WAPA1). The participants (see list in the notes of meeting, Annex 1) were representatives of UNDP, Lagos and Kaduna; Bank team; and representatives of Berenschot Bosboom NV (BB), the consultant management team. Despite an earlier commitment made to UNDP, no Government representative was present. Mr. Saleh (Deputy Permanent Secretary of FMANR) had planned to attend as representative for Dr. Bukar Shaib (Permanent Secretary of FMANR) but was unfortunately taken ill at the last minute and was unable to send a substitute. Despite the absence of FGN representative, it was decided to proceed with the meeting. A follow-up meeting was arranged between Dr. Bukar Shaib (FMANR), UNDP, Lagos and Bank mission, Lagos to discuss topics covered by the Tripartite meeting.

Tripartite Meeting

- The tripartite meeting was held on Thursday and Friday, October 10 and 11, 1974. Notes of the meeting are attached as Annex 1. The meeting covered the following items:
 - (a) Brief explanation of the purpose of the Tripartite meeting which is part of the procedure for all UNDP-financed projects.
 - (b) Brief review of NAB operations
 - (c) NAB policy
 - (d) Additional technical assistance requirement
 - (e) Interest rates for lending
 - (f) Staff and Nigerianization
 - (g) Interim report
 - (h) Conclusions and Recommendations

- 3. The meeting agreed that the present constraints of NAB which require resolution are:
- (a) a clear statement from FGN of NAB's future role and policy in stimulating agricultural development generally and rural development in particular. With the present change in FGN policy of providing unencumbered development funds to the State governments, many States are setting up co-operative banks to finance small farm agricultural development. Additionally, FMANR is strengthening and revitalizing its cooperative division with FAO assistance. With the emergence of these various institutions, duplication of effort and in some cases competition seems inevitable and would be a waste of Nigeria's limited management resources. If NAB is to become involved in the rural credit sector then changes will be required to the present Memorandum and Articles of Association (MEMARTS).
- (b) The early appointment of local staff to key positions including that of General Manager is essential; if BB, the consultants, are to relinquish their executive role and adopt an advisory and training role. It is important for two reasons, firstly to lift the morale and experience of local staff and satisfy the political requirements of Government and secondly, permit BB to adhere to the terms of their contract to hand over executive responsibility to Nigerian personnel as part of the successful establishment of NAB by end 1975.
- (c) At present FGN insists on a flat lending rate of 5 percent for NAB. If NAB is to cover its operating costs, credit risks and cost of capital as required by its MEMARTS and the Board, then the flat 5 percent rate will be inadequate. A more flexible approach is suggested by charging interest in the range 5 percent to 12 percent depending on the borrowers' ability to service the debt.
- (d) A need exists for additional expertise to stimulate NAB's expansion in the mass credit field. The number and type of experience required will be dependant on FGN's plans for NAB involvement in agriculture. UNDP have indicated their willingness to consider additional financing if requested by FGN.

It was proposed that these points should be discussed with Dr. Bukar Shaib in Lagos as soon as possible after the tripartite meeting.

Meeting with Dr. Bukar Shaib

- 4. The meeting with Dr. Bukar Shaib took place after Messrs. Courbois and Arben left Nigeria. Cabled advice from IBRD Lagos of October 18 (copy attached as Annex 2) indicates that FGN wishes:
 - (a) to proceed with the appointment of Nigerians to all key positions, including that of general manager, as soon as possible to replace BB staff members;

- 3 - November 5, 1974

- (b) all BB staff to be withdrawn immediately without further period as advisors;
- (c) appoint advisors from any suitable country to assist newly appointed Nigerians;
- (d) no specific dates mentioned but Bukar Shaib indicated that whole process should be completed well before end 1975;
- (e) IBRD should recruit the advisors; and
- (f) Bukar Shaib declined to discuss any of the other outstanding issues

A full report is awaited from IBRD Lagos.

Discussions in Washington

- The opportunity was taken of a visit of Mr. Saleh (Deputy Permanent Secretary, FMANR) to Washington for an informal discussion (October 29) on NAB. Present were Messrs. Saleh, Liman (FMANR, Deputy Director of Agriculture), Povey (WA1DB) and Arben (WAPA1). The discussions were fruitful as Mr. Saleh was present at the meeting with Dr. Bukar Shaib (para 4). It transpires that:
- (a) Basically BB have performed well but FGN feel they could have done more. Comparison has been made with Bank of Industry and Commerce which was formed after NAB but has made more loans. The major problem appears to be that one member of the BB team (Dr. Gall) is not acceptable to Board members and FMANR. The general manager, Mackay, is liked and respected. There appeared to be no special feelings concerning the other two team members as they maintain a low profile.
- (b) FGN regards the appointment of a Nigerian General Manager of prime importance. However they have no specific candidate in mind, have not yet advertised but hope to make a decision by the end of the year.
- (c) The advisors mentioned in Dr. Bukar Shaib discussions (para 4(c)) are not the additional technical assistance originally proposed (para 3(d)). The role of any new advisors appointed would be the same as BB, namely to advise newly appointed Nigerian staff but only when requested.
- (d) FGN wishes to continue with NAB and has earmarked substantial funds which will be made available when the management is changed. FGN has not yet finalized their thinking for NAB's role in agricultural development.
 - (e) The deadline for these changes is end June 1975.
- (f) The early appointment of Nigerian staff to key positions is required. However, Mr. Saleh has instructed that the Board meeting on October 29 not to consider the recent applications as he will not be present.

BB Contract Conditions

- Should FGN make a formal request to UNDP and IBRD for the removal of BB, sixty days notice is required. IBRD then have the right to terminate the BB contract also with sixty days notice. IBRD's liability to BB is to pay for all time spent up to termination and the normal costs of repatriation but BB have an obligation to minimise their expenditure. There appears to be no penalty for early termination of contract. These points require confirmation by the Legal Department.
- 6. BB's contract finishes approximately end 1975 for field services. It was the original intention of BB (agreed with IBRD) to move to an advisory role from January 1975. This has been jeopardised by the delay in appointment of counterpart staff by NAB Board, due, in part, to misunderstanding as to the calibre and purpose of the original recruitment of Nigerian professional staff. BB selected the candidates with the intention of promotion to counterpart if suitable; but NAB Board appointed them as professionals, not as potential counterparts.
- 7. Basically BB have made satisfactory progress in difficult circumstances and, subject to the early removal of Dr. Gall and the changeover to an advisory role, I recommend that BB be strongly supported. If BB's contract was to be terminated early, there will be a considerable check to NAB's progress.

It is doubtful if outside Nigerians could be recruited and in post before March 1975. Assuming BB's contract is terminated and IBRD is prepared to accept responsibility for the selection and recruitment of a new team of advisors, they would probably not be in post before May 1975. Allowing two months for orderly transfer of responsibility, the earliest BB could depart without disruption would be June 1975. This would meet the deadline mentioned by Mr. Saleh. However the problem appears to be one of political acceptability rather than the practicalities of an orderly changeover.

8. IBRD Lagos have been requested to cable any advance notice they may receive that FGN intends to formally request the early termination of BB's contract. Should FGN give formal notice, IBRD will need to review its direct involvement with NAB and to decide whether or not to accept responsibility for selection and recruitment of a new team of advisors.

9. Conclusions and Recommendations

- (a) Copy of tripartite meeting notes to be sent to UNDP Lagos.
- (b) Await full report from Lagos on Dr. Bukar Shaib meeting.
 Meanwhile advise BB that they should consider the prompt
 removal of Dr. Gall from Nigeria without replacement, press
 for the early appointment of existing staff as counterparts on

- a temporary or acting basis pending NAB Board final selection so that the remainder of BB team can hand over in an orderly manner executive responsibility as soon as possible and adopt an advisory role.
- (c) Bank should write to Dr. Bukar Shaib explaining the danger of a hasty transfer of executive responsibility, if the progress of NAB is to be maintained, pointing out that, in its opinion, transfer could not be achieved until June 1975 at the earliest if FGN formally requests to UNDP and IBRD early termination of BB's contract. FGN would need to clarify NAB future role and instruct NAB Board to recruit and appoint (as a matter of urgency) the counterpart staff including the general manager.
- (d) Bank should also write to UNDP Lagos for their official reaction and position on Dr. Bukar Shaib's proposals.
- (e) Draft letters to Dr. Bukar Shaib and UNDP will be prepared, following review of the Lagos meeting full report which is expected to arrive in Washington shortly (para 4).
- (f) BB's contract should be referred to Legal Department for advice on procedure to be followed, should FGN give formal notice for the termination of BB's services as consultants to NAB (para 5).

at UNDP Tripartite Meeting on October 10-11, 1974 held at Kaduna, Nigeria

No representative from FGN was present as Mr. Saleh, Deputy Permanent Secretary (who was to represent Dr. Bukar Shaib, Permanent Secretary, FMANR) was unable to attend through sickness.

1. Purpose of Meeting

Mr. Nolte opened the meeting by explaining the purpose of a UNDP tripartite meeting. It is part of UNDP practice for sponsored projects to hold a yearly tripartite meeting of all parties to review progress, discuss problems and recommend solutions, and to determine whether any changes are necessary. Matters discussed are summarised in a tripartite report which is prepared and circulated by UNDP. Notwithstanding the absence of a Government representative, it was decided to proceed with the meeting. It was agreed that Mr. Nolte of UNDP accompanied by Mr. Grosjean of IBRD Lagos would discuss the draft report of the meeting with FGN to ascertain their views and would then finalise the report for release to all parties.

2. Brief Review of NAB Operations

NAB was set up with IBRD assistance and UNDP finance to meet the long term need of Nigeria for an agricultural development bank. Berenschott Bosboom NV (BB) were appointed IBRD-consultants in November 1972 with, initially, executive responsibility to start operations of the Bank to be followed by an advisory role when Nigerian staff were available and trained to take over. The Bank formally commenced operations on April 1, 1973.

As no feasibility study had been prepared, BB had to start from scratch which included the leasing of offices and housing, procurement of vehicles and equipment and the recruitment of local staff. Most of the present professional staff were recruited August/September 1973. The operating procedures have been developed and implemented during the initial period. NAB role and lending policies are evolving in response to Government plans for agricultural development which in some areas are themselves still in a state of flux.

Initially, lending progress was slow due in part to lack of adequate finance from Government. The position is now much improved and funds are made available as and when loans have been approved by the Board.

NAB board consists of nine members, all of whom are appointed by FGN and, with the exception of the Chairman, are civil servants from various ministries and Government banks. The full board meets quarterly but there is a standing committee of five directors who meet to approve loans between N 20,000 and N 100,000. Loans above N 100,000 must be approved by the full board. Whilst loans up to N 20,000 may be approved by management.

The financial results for the first year's operation to May 31, 1974 was an operating loss of N 130,000. Preliminary results for the current financial year indicate that the bank is covering its operating costs but no provision has been made for credit risks.

Presently FGN makes loan funds available to NAB on an ex gratia grant basis. Continuing discussions with the Federal Ministry of Finance (FMF) seek to regularise the basis for the grants and subsequent loans and funds. Tentative proposals are for loan funds to bear interest at

2 percent after a 6-year grace period with repayment of loan in ten equal annual instalments commencing in Year 7. NAB has yet to calculate the implication of these proposals on its long term cash flow. FGN has allocated (in the Nigeria 5YP 1975 - 1980) N170 million for NAB.

3. Policy of NAB

NAB's original role as conceived was to stimulate agricultural development in Nigeria which should yield a financial return but which would not have the maximisation of profit as its prime purpose. The financial return was to be adequate to cover its operating costs. The original concept was for NAB to act as source of large-scale agricultural credit to substantial borrowers such as State organizations, cooperative unions and companies capable of providing bankable collateral. Small farmers were not directly considered at that time. Since then there has been a change of emphasis on the part of IBRD towards a rural credit policy aimed at the smaller farmer. IBRD has therefore tried to encourage NAB to adopt a more positive approach to rural development by the provision of technical assistance to organisations in the design and engineering of schemes and projects and of finance for the farm credit component.

Whilst FGN appears to be in full agreement with the concept, it does not necessarily agree with the approach at this time. In five recently appraised IBRD financed projects (3 Northern States Rural Integrated Development Projects and 2 Swamp Rice Projects), NAB was to participate in various degrees in the farm credit component. At FGN's request, NAB'S role has been deleted from these projects on the grounds that NAB is not yet sufficiently experienced or adequately staffed to contribute to the successful operation of the projects. BB find themselves in a difficult position as although they are in basic agreement with the IBRD on the need for and the approach to rural credit, they are constrained by the lack of authority and encouragement from the Board and the restrictions of the Memorandum and Articles of Association (MEMARTS).

Additionally, FGN is revitalising the cooperative division of FMANR with FAO assistance and is also establishing a Rural Credit Training Institute with FAO assistance and with Finnish Government finance. It appears that there may be some duplication and/or conflict between the various assistance programs. UNDP is in a delicate position as their various programs are in response to FGN requests. The need for liaison between the various programs to prevent overlap was agreed. UNDP undertook to advise IBRD Resident Mission, Lagos of the scope and purpose of the FAO cooperative assistance programs. FGN's overall strategy for agricultural credit for rural development appears to be under review and has yet to announce the roel of NAB.

4. Additional Technical Assistance

UNDP indicated that they would consider financing additional technical assistance if requested by FGN. Formalities would take approximately three months to final approval.

The additional technical assistance proposed would consist of:

- a) 1 agricultural credit development specialist
- b) 2 loan (credit) officers
- c) 1 system and training specialist

FGN had indicated that parts (a) and (b) should be filled by experienced staff seconded from a similar institution in a developing country. IBRD has submitted the CV's of possible candidates from India and Pakistan to FGN for their reactions, which are awaited. Until FGN defines NAB's role in the development of rural credit, the need for the 2 loan (credit) officers was questioned if it is the intention that their activities would be concentrated in the rural credit sector.

It was agreed that the recruitment of the system and training specialist was timely now that BB are to relinquish their executive role and NAB is to expand its staff to cope with the planned expansion of business. The BB proposal for the provision of the specialist was supported in principle. It is also understood that FGN supported the idea but formal approval from NAB is still awaited.

5. Interest Rates for Lending

FGN present stated interest policy for NAB is a flat rate of 5 percent on all agricultural loans irrespective of size, period, terms or risks. IBRD position which seems to be gaining acceptance in some parts of Government, is that interest rates should be flexible and should be adapted to the overall debt service capacity of the venture concerned. In order to meet the operational costs and risks it is suggested the interest rates should be varied within the 5 - 12 percent range.

6. Staff and Nigerianisation

UNDP met with the professional staff and formed the impression that they were keen and worked in harmony with the BB team.

BB's had proposed to the Board the appointment of Nigerian departmental heads by July 1, 1974 with full executive responsibility to be handed over by January 1, 1975, whereupon BB would adopt an advisory role. Candidates for the positions were proposed from within the existing professional staff. The Board decided however the positions should be advertised to ensure the Bank attracted the best talent available. Closing date for applications is October 15, and it is unlikely that a short-list will be available in time for submission to the next Board meeting scheduled for October 29. The delay in appointing local heads of departments will delay the start of BB's advisory role. No action has yet been taken on the appointment of a Nigerian general manager. The meeting felt early appointment of all Nigerian counterpart staff including the general manager is essential to remove the uncertainties facing the professional staff and to enable BB to hand over executive authority and still leave sufficient time for their

training and advisory role before the expiration of their contract at end 1975.

7. Interim Report

The Interim Report will be prepared in the form proposed in R. E. Rowe's letter of April 16, 1974. The list of topics for inclusion in the unconstrained section as suggested by IBRD was agreed. It was emphasised that BB were at liberty to include other items as the list was not exhaustive. No preliminary work had yet started other than a broad outline. BB undertook to forward two copies of their first draft to IBRD Washington by the end of November for comment. The final version is due in Washington by January 1, 1975.

8. Conclusions and Recommendations

- i) An early meeting should be arranged with FGN to inform them of the content of tripartite meeting, to draw their attention to the following points, and to seek their views and action:
 - a) the need for FGN's definition of the role of NAB in stimulating agricultural development and in particular their function in providing small farmer credit for rural development in the light of the development cooperative movement and the formation of State Cooperative banks;
 - b) the flat interest rate of 5 percent will not be adequate if NAB is to cover its operating costs, credit risks and 2 percent cost of borrowings. There is need for a flexible approach within a suggested spread of 5 to 12 percent;
 - the borrowing conditions for Government funds, both for interest rates and repayment terms needs clarification;
 - d) liaison between the NAB and the FAO Cooperative Program would be advantageous to prevent overlap of their operations and objectives;
 - e) early appointment of counterpart staff, including the general manager, would permit the expansion of NAB's operations and would allow BB to concentrate on their advisory and training role for the remainder of their contract period which finishes end 1975; and
 - f) to permit a firm proposal to be submitted to UNDP for additional technical assistance, the role of NAB should be defined to ensure the additional experts are recruited to cover specific needs. The systems and training specialists would best be engaged through BB to ensure consolidation of BB's initial efforts.
- ii) The planning and preparation for the Interim Report is in progress. Timetable for submission has been agreed with the final version due in Washington January 1, 1975.

I would be grateful if you would let us have a brief summary of the implications and of the procedures to be followed should FGN request the removal of BB from NAB. This will assist our contingency planning.

NIGERIA - Migerian Agricultural Bank Additional Technical Assistance

Mr. M. A. Chidambaram, Managirg Director of Agricultural Refinance Corporation, India, who is on a visit to IERD called con me for a brief discussion on possible secondment of three staff members of his bank to NAB.

I explained the basic setup of NAB, its objectives and the wish to obtain additional technical assistance to stimulate NAB's involvement in the mass credit for the smaller farmers.

Mr. Chidambaram asked if an appraisal report on the formation of NAB was available. I explained that no report had been prepared prior to the incorporation of the Bank, but that an interim report was in preparation which would detail the Bank's current operations, policies and achievements and provide guidelines for future development and expansion.

Mr. Chidembaram confirmed that the Government of India had senctioned the possible secondment of staff. He agreed that such secondment could be to the nutual advantage of both MAB and his own bank. The three-man team he suggested includes one man from Reserve Bank of India who specialises in short-term credit (seasonal loans). The senior of the three would act as team-leader. He did not foresee any major difficulties of his team working with EB as they (BB) would be leaving before his team completed their secondment. The proposed team members have no overseas experience.

I told Mr. Chidambaram that we were still awaiting FGN reaction to our submission of names.

Mr. Chidambaram leaves the Bank tomorrow to return to India. He will however return to Washington early December for lean negotiations.

Terms of Reference

Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB)

- 1. Messrs. A. W. Arben and P. Courbois will arrive in Lagos on or about October 8, 1974 to attend the tripartite meeting called by UNDP Lagos to review the progress of NAB (a UNDP technically assisted project with the Bank as executing agents). Participants at the meeting will be FGN, UNDP, and IBRD supported by its management consultants, Berenschot Bosboom, N.V.
- Whilst in Lagos, Messrs. Arben and Courbois should hold preliminary discussions with Resident Mission, Lagos who liaised with UNDP Lagos on the drafting of the agenda. A member of the Resident Mission will accompany Messrs. Arben and Courbois to the tripartite meeting to be held in Kaduna on October 10 and 11.
- 3. Mr. Arben should, whilst in Lagos, explore with Resident Mission FGN's reaction to names and nationalities of candidates, submitted, through Resident Mission, for additional UNDP-financed technical assistance to NAB.
- 4. Mr. Courbois should visit Kaduna prior to the tripartite meeting to bring himself up-to-date with current status of NAB and to review future plans.
- 5. Mr. Arben will leave Lagos on or about October 12 for Ghana. Mr. Courbois will return to Washington on or about October 16.
- 6. As a member of the Resident Mission and FGN will be present at the tripartite meeting, a debriefing session with the Resident Mission in Lagos will not be necessary prior to the departure of Messrs. Arben and Courbois.
- 7. On his return to Washington Mr. P. Courbois will write a brief report on the current status of NAB. Mr. Arben will prepare a brief resume of the tripartite meeting on his return to Washington on or about October 23.

GHANA - Sugar Rehabilitation Project

- 8. Mr. Arben will arrive in Accra on or about October 12, 1974 to review with the management of Ghasel (HVA International), the financial projections for 1974/75 which were not available at the time of the last supervision mission June/July 1974. Prior to undertaking the review, visits should be paid to both Asutsuare and Komenda to familiarise yourself with progress of the rehabilitation of the estates and factories.
- 9. Particular attention should be paid to a) the progress of the overall rehabilitation program with emphasis on the financial implications, b) the cane price to farmers and collection costs, c) the selling prices of sugar, molasses and alcohol, and d) the cash flow.
- 10. Although it is understood that the five-year plan 1974 through 1978 is not completed, you should (subject to time availability) review the progress of the five-year plan to ensure that it is properly conceived and will be in a form acceptable to the Bank when completed.
- 11. Mr. Arben will leave Accra on or about October 19 for Washington and will visit Amsterdam en route for approx. one/two days for discussions with HVA Amsterdam on the funds required for the remainder of the factory rehabilitation program. On your return you should prepare a brief report on the 1974/75 financial projections and related matters.

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The World Bank is executing agent for a United Nations Development Program (UNDP) project for the establishment and management for a period of three years of a Migerian Agricultural Bank (NAB).

Bank, establish its operating procedures, to train Nigerian personnel and to initiate the Bank's lending operations. Up to now, however, the latter have been largely loans to Government agencies or member States of the Nigerian Federation. The number of loans to individual farmers has been relatively small and so far NAB has not participated in any mass credit programs for small farmers. At this stage, we believe that NAB would benefit through having on its staff for a temporary period loan officers who have had practical experience in the employment of agricultural credit banks and agencies in countries with agricultural development problems with similarities to those that obtain in Nigeria. We believe, through our association with the Refinance Corporation that your organization would fall into this category.

The purpose of this letter is to inquire whether your Bank would be in a position to second for a period, yet to be determined, qualified and experienced personnel to NAB. Currently NAB is seeking, first a person who is experienced in the development of "mass involvement" agricultural programs and who can design the small farmer credit delivery systems needed for, and evaluate the impact of, such programs; and second, two loan officers experienced in direct lending to larger individual farmers.

We should be grateful if you would treat this approach, which we are making on behalf of Federal Government of Nigeria, as exploratory and

confidential at this time. Should you feel that your organization could make available on a seconded basis suitably experienced staff to fill any of the positions suggested above, then we would wish to explore with you the various possibilities before submitting tentative proposals to the Federal Government of Nigeria, which itself, of course, would initiate any formal approach for technical assistance.

Our provisional suggestions concerning such seconded staff are that:

- (a) in addition to them being suitably qualified they should also be reasonably mobile in terms of family commitments; and
- (b) the secondment should be for approximately two years.

It is felt that staff seconded to NAB would benefit substantially in experience and stature from such an assignment, and that MAB itself would benefit from their practical experience and thus become an effective agent in agricultural development that much faster.

I look forward to receiving your views and comments.

In a recent visit to Nigeria Mr. Arben of this Department had the opportunity to discuss the Nigeria Agricultural Bank Project with you and your colleagues, especially Mr. Lock and Mr. Quennel.

I thought that it might be useful to let you know some of our thinking concerning the project before the tripartite meeting which, I understand, is now to be held October 7-10. Mr. Arben, and Mr. Grosjean from our Lagos Office, will attend the meeting and represent the Bank.

Before dealing with detail I must say that with the benefit of hindsight we would have designed the NAB operation in a different way. I attach a letter sent to Dr. Bukar Shaib in April that dwells on the latter matter and which in a way constitutes the minutes of the meetings held between the Federal Government, NAB, and the Bank earlier this year. In short I think we asked the Consultants to do almost the impossible by requiring them to set up, operate, and plan the policies of the Bank all at the same time. Also until recently the last eighteen months or so have been quite a difficult period in Nigeria - Bank relations, and this has been something of a constraint to our leverage over NAB developments. Fortunately this period has passed and although one cannot minimize the problems we feel probably that we are now more able to influence changes than has been possible for some time. In view of this the tripartite meeting you have proposed will be of particular value.

Generally speaking we think that the Consultants have done quite well in getting the Bank established in the physical sense and in beginning to train staff. We believe that Mr. McKay has done a good job in establishing the management procedures of NAB and in setting and maintaining very satisfactory standards of performance and behavior among the staff. One cannot underestimate the importance of these achievements.

Less satisfactory and in our view inadequate is performance concerning first the development of NAB lending policy, and second the nature of NAB's current lending operations. Much of the problem here, we believe, stems from Mr. McKay's conservative commercial bank type approach.

As far as the first is concerned we believe it most important that the Consultants should give priority to developing lending policies for NAB that take cognizance of the needs of the situation. In our opinion the most important of these is to develop systems of credit delivery that can serve Nigeria's several millions of farm families. We do not underestimate this task, and believe it highly unlikely that the Consultants will be able to produce a final solution during their period of tenure, however, we would like to see NAB firmly committed to this task and actively involved in such operations before the Consultants leave. We had hoped that projects proposed and appraised by the Bank - rural development in the north, rice in the east, and oil palms - would have been a means for NAB to begin to participate in the field of small-farmer lending. The projects were designed to accommodate this but unfortunately Mr. McKay has shown very little interest personally and has been either unprepared or unable to enthuse the NAB Board of Directors in this connection. As a consequence, in negotiating loans for the rural development and rice projects in Washington recently the Nigerian delegation expressly required the exclusion of NAB from these projects on the grounds that "NAB would hold up matters."

As far as NAB's current lending operations are concerned these seem to be overly concentrated in operations such as lending to the NE State cooperatives for cash crop marketing that could have been conducted, as in the past, by commercial banks, and lending to State-owned companies, for example the Mid-West State Oil Palm Company, which again could have been handled by a commercial bank or directly by the State or Federal Ministries of Finance. These are good operations in a financial sense, particularly as the loans are guaranteed by the State Governments. However, NAB was not conceived primarily to provide this type of service, although there would be room for such operations were they compensated by an appropriate concentration of effort on the small farmer front. The amount of direct lending to individual, and relatively large farmers is quite small. This part of NAB's business needs expansion, but to us the scope for expansion is limited by the experience of NAB loan appraisal staff.

The need to get to grips with developing a strategy for lending to small farmers (the so-called mass involvement of NAB), and to expanding direct operations with the larger "commercial" farmers has caused us to propose that NAB obtain additional expatriate staff. This is dealt with in the April letter to Dr. Shaib, and was the basis of our inquiries

made of you as to whether UNDP could finance such additional staff. In the course of a visit here last month Dr. Shaib agreed the need for these additional staff and gave us clearance to start looking for suitable people. A qualification was that his Ministry would prefer, if possible, that these staff be recruited from somewhere like Pakistan. We think that if UNDP can provide the funds it will make the employment of additional experienced expatriates by NAB a relatively easy exercise. If it is to be financed by Government we would anticipate substantial delays. As we lend to many agricultural credit agencies we foresee no serious problems in obtaining suitable people. In the interest not least of economy we recommend that these people be recruited directly through secondment from their respective agencies and not through the Consultants. We have already initiated inquiries and by the time of the tripartite meeting would hope to be able to make specific proposals. We are aware that the Consultants consider a Training Specialist is also required. We support the Berenschott and Bosboom position in this case and believe the Training Specialist would be complementary to the inputs made by the credit specialists discussed above. Unlike these, however, it would appear that the Training Specialist would have to be provided by the Consultants.

In the same vein as measures to strengthen NAB we believe that there would be merit in attempting to induce the Government to extend the period of the Consultants' tenure. We think that should, as we hope, the interim report come out with well-defined policies and a specific program for NAB in line with the real needs of the situation there could be benefits in retaining current management for say until the end of 1976 to implement the proposals that they make. I am aware that this is a sensitive matter, but it seems to us that it is one to which appropriate consideration should be given.

Clearly much will depend on the quality of the content of the Consultants' Interim Report and in particular the "unconstrained" section. We have been giving some thought to this and are developing a list of topics that we think should be dealt with. We still have to do some more work but expect to be able to provide you with this in order that it may be considered at the tripartite meeting.

I apologize for the length of this letter but I felt it might be useful to comfirm the principal areas with which we find difficulty in executing the NAB project.

Nigerian Agricultural Dan's (NAB) Additional Tuchnical Assistance Staff

As you know, Mr. A. Arben visited Lagos and Kaduna in early July in connection with NAB. I would like to review with you some of the issues Mr. Arben raises in his report, which were also discussed in Washington with Dr. Buker Shaib, the Permanent Secretary, FMANR, when he visited the World Bank in late July.

The first and most important point is the selection and recruitment of additional expatriate staff. Since lest February, the Bank has been recommending that NAB recruits three additional credit specialists; one agricultural development specialist who would besist in the formulation, appraisal and supervision of projects involving large number of small farmers (mass credit specialists); and enother two less officers experienced in lending to medium and large scale farmers or farm corporations. In addition, Berenschot-Bosboom (BB), the Dutch firm now providing the expatriate management, recommends that a System and Training Specialist be added to assist in the organization of NAB's expansion.

The System and Training Specialist would be directly provided by BB under an expansion of their present management contract. For the other three experts, it has been egreed with Dr. Bukar Sheib that the World Bank itself would select them from existing agricultural credit institutions in Pakistan, or possibly other Asian countries, and arrange for their secondment to MAB either by direct contract with MAB or through a contract with the World Bank.

I am not yet aware of all the details (toyms, length of the contracts, etc.) which would allow precise cost estimates of this additional technical assistance but the proposal is for the Federal Covernment to approach ENDP for the funds required. Your views on the possibility of UNDP financing for this technical assistance would be appreciated.

There are some other points raised in Mr. Arben's report which should be discussed at the tripartite meeting. The main ones would be the involvement of NAB in credit to small farmers; interest rates to be charged by NAB; the content and format of BB interim report due in January 1975; and the possible need to expend the BB contract beyond March 1976.

COMMUNICATIONS

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I would suggest that a working party be set in early September between your office and mine to review these different issues and prepare a tentative agenda for the tripartite meeting. I am pleased to add that the dates of 10 and 11 October which you proposed for the tripartite meeting are suitable to us and to our Washington headquarters.

I look forward to receiving your views on the above proposals at your convenience.

In his remorandum, UNDP/OFM/6, September 17, 1973 to Participating and Executing Agencies of UNDP, Field Offices of UNDP, and UNDP Headquarters' staff, Mr. Patel, Deputy Administrator, advised that the new Project Progress Report Forms would be sent to Resident Representatives for distribution "to heads of those projects subject to progress reporting".

As you know, the Bank implements many of its UNDP-financed projects with consultants (subcontractors). Contracts are agreed to between the Bank and the consultant and the Bank's reporting requirements are outlined. Where Progress Reports are required by the Bank (in many cases bi-monthly Progress Reports), we feel it would be appropriate to submit these together with the UNDP Progress Report Forms in lieu of completion of Form B - General Account. Where relevant, information held here in Washington relating to Fellowships - Form F and Equipment - Form G, expenses will be sent to the consultant to assist him in completing the Progress Report Forms.

MIGHRIA: Nigerian Agricultural Bank Ltd. (NIM/71/016)

As a replacement of its previous reporting requirements, particularly on progress reports and semi-annual statistical supplements, UNDP has developed new reporting procedures. These became effective January 1, 1974, and apply to all UNDP projects both ongoing and newly approved.

The section of UNDP's Operational and Financial Manual dealing with Project Monitoring and Reporting (Chapter VI) has been circulated previously to concerned staff. The instructions below apply and interpret the UNDP procedures for application within the Bank.

This procedure has been reviewed by the Office of the Vice President, Projects Staff, by project staff concerned with transportation projects, and by staff from the International Relations Department.

UNDP's basic requirement is that these Project Progress Reports be prepared semi-annually. Additional information on timing and special arrangements for projects of less than twelve months duration or for projects involving a UNDP contribution of less than \$100,000 are set out in the excerpt from UNDP's manual (see attachment).

The Project Progress Report has several parts, with a form for each. A complete set of forms is attached. You will see that it consists of the following:

A -- Summary

B -- General Account

*C -- Project Activities

D -- Project Inputs

E-l -- Agency Personnel

E-2 -- Government Personnel

F -- Fellowships

G -- Equipment H -- Reports

I-1 -- Long-Term Training Courses

I-2 -- Short-Term Training Courses

*If the information given in Forms A and B adheres to the Work Plan, completion of Form C may be regarded as optional.

General instructions for completing the forms is given on the back of each. Since all projects do not include every input element, forms relating to elements not included in a particular project can be omitted in completing the report on such projects.

The Bank implements many of its UNDP-financed projects with consultants (subcontractors). In these cases the following additional guidelines will apply:

- (i) Form E (Equipment) will be completed by the project's officer in cases where the equipment was purchased by the Bank. Form E will be completed by the consultant where the equipment has been purchased by the consultant under his contract.
- (ii) Form F (Fellowships) will be completed in the Bank by the Training Advisory Division of the Education Projects Department.
- (iii) Forms completed in the Bank will be sent to the consultant by the Projects office. The consultant will receive all the other required forms from the UNDP Resident Representative. The consultant will pass Form D, second part (Government Inputs), and Form E-2 (Government Personnel) to the government counterpart officer for completion and return to the consultant.
- (iv) The consultant will complete all required forms (other than those prepared by the Bank or the Government). In instances where the subcontractor submits bi-monthly progress reports, these can be attached to Form B of the report in lieu of completing Form B in the prescribed manner. After all forms are completed, the full set (Forms A through I-2 but excluding those not required for any particular project), will be assembled by the Consultant and submitted to the Resident Representative, the Government and the Bank.

Projects staff should inform consultants of ongoing, UNDP-financed, Bank-executed projects of these reporting procedures, and appropriate provision should be made for these reports in all new Project Documents (and revisions of existing Project Documents) and in contracts with consultants. The previous requirement for a Semi-Annual Statistical Supplement should be deleted.

ATTACHMENT

Modified Excerpts from UNDP's Operational and Financial Manual - Chapter VI

Regarding Timing of Project Progress Reports

The frequency requirements for preparation of Project Progress Reports is fixed according to the different circumstances outlined below:

- If the duration of the project is twelve months or more, a progress report is prepared every six months;
- If the duration of the project is less than twelve months and the UNDP contribution to the project is \$100,000 or more, a progress report is prepared at mid-point;
- If the duration of the project is less than twelve months and the UNDP contribution to the project is less than \$100,000, the need for progress reporting is determined by the Resident Representative in consultation with the Government and the Executing Agency, taking into account the nature and duration of the particular project.

The formal reporting period normally starts from the date of commencement of field work. The Resident Representative establishes the schedule for the progress report in consultation with the Government and the Agency, and informs UNDP Headquarters accordingly. Where a project is carried out exclusively under subcontract, the progress reporting schedule is established in the executing agency's contract with the consulting firm or organization.

- 1. This report covers the period November 15, 1972 to January 15, 1974.
- The executing agency contract was signed by all parties on November 15,
- Bank Ltd. (NAB) to provide agricultural credit at federal level and to provide assistance in the development of credit policies projects and institutions. IBRD as executing agency was charged with the recruitment and supervision of a team of experts who would organize and manage NAB to achieve its objectives. Article II Section 2.01 (i) (a) through (m) sets out in detail the duties and responsibilities of the experts.
- h. IBRD entered in a contract for consultants services with Berenschot Bosboom NV on November 17, 1972. Due to delay on part of FMG, letters of appointment to the individuals were not finalized until late February 1973. As the letters of appointment were a condition of effectiveness (Section 8.01) of the UNDP contract, the starting date of contract was delayed until March 15, 1973. Most of the experts were on station before the starting date.
- 5. NAB was incorporated as a legal limited liability company November 1972 but not formally inaugurated until March 6, 1973.
- 6. The experts are required to prepare and submit various reports to a timetable which is laid down in Section 2.01 (iv) (a) through (e). For details see Appendix A attached.
- 7. Up to January 15, 1974 the experts have submitted a draft inception report and two quarterly progress reports.
- 8. The draft inception report (IR) dated July 1973 was submitted by the experts to the Board of NAB and FMG with copies to IBRD for review. IBRD had some misgivings on the adequacy of the draft report in the areas of conceptual approach and overall policy guidance and advice. These misgivings were communicated to the experts through correspondence and a mission visit August/September 1973. The Board of NAB decided to withhold their comments until they had an opportunity to consider IBRD's views. No comments had been received from FMG. It was then felt that the review and amendments of the draft report would be best accomplished by a tripartite meeting in Nigeria consisting of representatives of the Board of NAB supported by the experts, FMG and IBRD. A meeting was proposed for December 1973 but delayed until February 197h. At this meeting, it was agreed that in view of the time delay and the complexities involved the draft IR would be accepted as having met the obligations of the

experts. The outstanding conceptual and policy decisions would be resolved over the coming months and would be incorporated in the interim report (INTR) which is due eighteen months after commencement of the project namely September 15, 1974. It has been agreed with the experts that to allow sufficient time and further practical experience, the report availability date would be deferred until January 1, 1975. A copy of the experts' draft inception report with appendices dated July 1973 and IBRD's comments is attached.

9. The experts have also submitted two quarterly reports in accordance with their obligations covering the periods:

SUBJECT: NIGERIA: Review of Nigerian Agricultural Bank Project (UNDP)

Back-to-Office Report

- 1. In accordance with Terms of Reference dated August 6, 1973, the mission visited Nigeria from August 28 to September 12 to review the Nigerian Agricultural Bank Project (NAB) financed by UNDP, and to discuss with the Government and the management team of experts of Berenschot-Bosboom the consultants' draft inception report (IR) on NAB. The mission worked in close contact with the Bank's Resident Mission in Lagos and Paul Grosjean, Agricultural Economist, who attended most of the discussions in Kaduna and Lagos. A list of the persons with whom the mission held discussions is in Annex I.
- 2. The mission had extensive discussions mostly with the NAB management team of experts, the UNDP representatives, and a UNDP team of project evaluators; but, regretfully, had not the opportunity to meet many board members and Government officials, more especially of the Federal and State Ministries of Agriculture and Natural Resources, either because of their absence or difficulty of communications.
- 3. The mission feels that the IR, presented as a draft, has many weaknesses, is confusing, generally reflects hasty drafting, and lacks positive future policy recommendations. The main points of contention between the mission and the consultants team relate to the IR proposals for:
 - (a) Mass lending to small farmers (some 70 percent of the population) and timing of these operations:
 - (b) NAB's structure and future role. These problems are closely related. The management team suggests starting operations with direct lending to largescale agricultural entrepreneurs who are reportedly eager to secure medium- and long-term credit (to date, 76 applications for about № 15 million have been received) followed by large-scale lending to small farmers independently from existing state institutions after the NAB structure and staffing has been consolidated. The mission does not agree that priority should be given to individual lending, and recommends immediate NAB involvement in small farmer credit programs through existing state agencies. Close association with state government services in devising and implementing credit programs is considered essential, despite their weaknesses, and wherever possible NAB should participate in the development of state credit systems; and

- (c) The management team considers that the NAB memorandum and articles of association do not give NAB adequate latitude to operate. In the mission's opinion this is not the case and the memorandum and articles of association enable NAB to operate in a broad field on commercial lines with minimal intervention.
- 4. The NAB is also confronted with problems of resources and profitability.
 - (a) The Federal Military Government (FMG) has paid up the capital of N 1 million which is now being used for meeting NAB's initial expenses, but has failed to release a sum of N 11 million allocated to NAB in the current Five-Year Plan. (N 4 million has been provided in the 1973-74 budget.) NAB's management intends to invest most of the paid-up and allocated funds in Government bonds to generate income to cover operating costs during the early years. The position of the Ministry of Finance is that funds should be disbursed on the basis of an approved lending program. This is sensible, but will not enable NAB to earn any income for a long time. Meanwhile, NAB will incur heavy losses and face liquidity problems. The matter is under discussion between NAB and Government.
 - NAB's profitability may be doubtful because of heavy initial expenses, low lending rates imposed by the Government (6 to 7 percent p.a., likely to be lowered against a current inflation rate of about 3 to 4 percent), and its consultancy guiding and training roles which cannot be self-supporting. Although it would benefit from Government interest-free loans, the suggested lending rates are too low for NAB to break even at present.
- There are doubts that the management team supplied by the consultants is fully qualified to follow their terms of reference particularly for the preparation of agricultural credit programs. Contrary to the contract between Bank and consultants the team does not include an agricultural credit specialist. In addition, the general manager, although an experienced banker, is strictly commercially oriented and apparently not development conscious. The agricultural economist, although not without weaknesses, has a strong personality and overshadows the rest of the team. Both the general manager and the agricultural economist appear reluctant to work closely with Government services which they feel are disorganized and incompetent. This does not augur well for future Government/NAB relationships.

6. Neither the NAB Board of Directors nor the Government has formally commented on the IR. The mission recommends that the views of the Government and the NAB Board on the IR should be sought immediately. Pending receipt of their views, the mission is writing a full report containing detailed recommendations for discussion and agreement within the Bank.

Impact of Devaluation on Project Costs

Section 3.01 of the Contract for Consultants' Services says, "The Bank shall pay consultantsin Guilders or in such other freely convertible currency or currencies as the Bank shall elect from time to time, an amount not to exceed the equivalent of US\$ 695,000.... Section 3.03 (covering local currency payments) also says that the Bank shall pay an amount "not exceeding, however, the sum of US\$ 70,000 equivalent."

2. The contract does not, therefore, seem to require an automatic increase in the dollar amount in the project budget, although the 5% cost overrum is presumably allowable anyway. This 5% would, in fact, cover the increase in the dollar equivalent of the foreign exchange costs at the present rate of exchange of the Dutch guilder.

1. In accordance with terms of reference dated February 2, 1973, I visited Nigeria and Holland between March 18 and 23 to supervise the UNDP Project for the establishment of the Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB). I held discussions with the General Manager and his senior staff at the NAB's head office in Kaduna and spoke briefly in Lagos with Dr. Bukar Shaib, the Permanent Secretary of the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Natural Resources. I also visited the UNDP office in Kaduna. Subsequently, I passed through Amsterdam for discussions with Berenschot-Bosboom N.V., the consultants providing the senior management of NAB; these discussions were principally with Mr. C.E. Metcalfe, the director responsible.

Background

- 2. Since as early as 1963, IBRD has been interested in the creation of a national agricultural credit institution in Nigeria and, by 1966, had carried out a feasibility study in conjunction with USAID. After an interruption caused by the civil war, a mission consisting of Mr. A.H. Stoneham visited Nigeria in June 1969 and, in a report dated September 18 of that year, recommended the establishment of a federal agricultural bank.
- The Federal Government accepted this recommendation and requested the UNDP to assist in financing a project to organize and manage the NAB during its first three years. IBRD is the executing agency for this project. The NAB was incorporated in November last year and shortly afterwards IBRD and Berenschot Bosboom N.V., Tilburg, The Netherlands, signed a Contract for Consultants' Services. The consultants' management team of four men arrived in Nigeria in the early part of this year. NAB was formally inaugurated on March 6, 1973 and the project came into force on March 15. Its success in the future is important to IBRD's agricultural lending program in Nigeria.

Summary and Conclusions

4. The Board of Directors has held its first meeting and issued letters of appointment to the management team. The general manager is beginning the recruitment of senior Nigerian staff and touring the country to obtain information about the needs, resources and institutions of the different states.

NAB is receiving full Government cooperation.

- The general manager raised two questions concerning: (a) the payment of the consulting firm's bills; and (b) the due date of the inception report. The first point has been cleared and the date of the inception report confirmed as July 14, 1973.
- It will be a difficult task to establish, in three years, a sound organization capable of having an impact on agriculture throughout the country. Key problems are likely to be: recruitment of Nigerian staff of the highest quality; achieving the right mix of lending; reaching small farmers; finding suitable intermediate lenders; achieving the scale of operations likely to be required.
- The management team is of reasonable quality, but will be stretched to carry out its terms of reference. Its inception report will be important and there should be a further supervision visit when it is being drafted and again after it has been submitted and reviewed.

Activities of the NAB to Date

- The general manager reported that NAB had: 8.
 - a) following its inauguration by the Head of State, held its first board meeting on March 6, 1973. A copy of the draft minutes is on file:
 - b) prepared a statement of policy; a copy is on file;
 - c) issued formal letters of appointment to the members of the management team supplied by the consultants, as follows:

Baron E.R.A. Mackay : General Manager

Mr. H. Unk

: Chief Accountant

Dr. K.W. Gall

: Chief Agricultural Economist

Mr. F.A. van Baardewijk : Chief Credit Specialist

- d) engaged some clerical and junior staff;
- e) advertised vacancies (a copy of the draft advertisement is on file) for the following positions:
 - (i) Projects offices crops

- livestock

- irrigation

(ii) Operations offices - financial

- co-operative

- technical
- f) prepared draft organization charts copies of which are on file;
- g) rented office accommodation (which would eventually be replaced when its own office buildings are constructed) and arranged housing for its senior management.

9. The general manager said that their main concern at present in addition to the recruitment of senior staff, was to inform themselves of the needs and resources of the different states and of the state institutions with which they would be working. He said that NAB was getting full co-operation from the Federal and State Governments.

Payment of the Consulting Firm's Bills

10. The General Manager asked whether bills submitted to IBRD by Berenschot-Bosboom N.V. in accordance with Section 3.02 of the Contract for Consultants' Services could properly include fees and expenses incurred on the project before the starting of effective dates defined by the contract. I said that the Section appeared to allow this. I have since confirmed with Mr. Krishna (Legal Department) that such costs are chargeable and have also cleared the point with the Controller's Program Departments. We have cabled the consultants accordingly.

Inception Report

- 11. Mr. Wright's cable dated March 15, 1973 informs the parties to the Project Document and Contract for Consultants' Services that "the project enters into force" on that day. In accordance with the terms of the Contract, the starting date would thus be April 14 unless otherwise agreed between IBRD and the consultants, and the inception report would be due on July 14, 1973. I agreed with the General Manager and subsequently with Mr. van Gigch and Mr. Povey that this timetable was realistic in view of the work involved. We have cabled the consultants confirming that July 14, 1973 is the due date for the submission of their inception report.
- 12. I said that, whilst the inception report was not required to be in any particular form, it should cover all the matters referred to under the heading Operations and Responsibilities of the Consultants' Team in Appendix A to the Contract. The report should also contain financial and staffing projections 3-5 years ahead with, where appropriate, alternative projection for different main assumptions.

The Task Facing the Consultants

- Throughout the discussions in Kaduna and Amsterdam, I emphasized the size of the task of establishing in three years a bank capable of making a real impact on agriculture throughout Nigeria. The probable scale of NAB's future operations may be gauged by comparison with the Bank Rakjat Indonesia (Indonesia has roughly double the population of Nigeria). At the end of 1970 BRI had: about 300 regional branch and sub-branch offices, over 500 village units (which increased to over 1,000 in 1971) and 500 mobile units; its staff numbered 10,000; it disbursed some US\$ 200 million in 1969 and nearly US\$ 300 million in 1970 and at the latter year end had loans of over US\$ 120 million outstanding.
- 14. The Federal Government is making available N 12 million for the NAB's first year of operations and will almost certainly make available similar, or larger amounts in subsequent years. Comparable amounts of IBRD loans are likely to be channelled through NAB.

- 15. In establishing NAB on the scale and to the standard required, the critical problems are likely to be:
 - a) recruiting highly qualified and able Nigerian staff. The NAB's policy, which it should make widely known particularly in the universities, should be to provide some of the most attractive employment and career prospects in the country;
 - b) achieving the right balance of lending between:
 - (i) the different states
 - (ii) the different subsectors
 - (iii) lending through other institutions and lending direct to ultimate borrowers;
 - (iv) large, medium and samll borrowers;
 - c) finding sound institutions through which to lend;
 - d) devising effective means of reaching large numbers of small farmers;
 - e) serving as a channel for IBRD loans and developing its own lending.

The Management Team

16. The management team appears to be of reasonable quality, but will be fully stretched to carry out the ambitious terms of reference set out in the Contract for Consultants' Services. The inception report will provide the first test of the team's ability to formulate policies and the plans for achieving them.

Future Supervision Visits

17. The next supervision visit should be in May/June, when the main outline of the inception report will have been drafted. The following visit should be in August/September after consideration of the report received in July.

- Reference UNDEVPRO, Lagos cable of January 24, there are two problems involved, (1) the substitution of van Baardewyk for Scheppers as Credit Specialist and (2) the payment by the Bank to the consultants in Nigeria of local currency costs in accordance with the contract.
- Problem No. 1: We were notified by cable from B&B on December 29, 1972 that Scheppers was no longer available (no reason given) and that van B was being offered as replacement. We were also informed that van B's CV was being mailed and that Mr. Poyck (Managing Director, B&B) would be visiting Washington on January 14, 1973. In meetings with Mr. Poyck on January 16 and 17 he told us that Scheppers had resigned from B&B and that was the only reason for the proposed substitution.
- Under the contract between B&B and the Bank, substitution of personnel is subject to prior approval of the Bank - and only the Bank.
- After the talks with Mr. Poyck we cabled FEDMINAG notifying them of the proposed substitution and telling them that van B was acceptable to the Bank, subject to their confirmation. At the same time we notified B&B of our action and told them, on the basis of our talk with Mr. Poyck that we assumed that Mr. MacKay (GM, NAB) had discussed the matter with and provided a copy of van B's CV to FEDMINAG.
- Apparently our cable to FEDMINAG was not delivered because 5 days later we received a cable from Miss Carson which stated that FEDMINAG had no knowledge of van B or the proposed substitution. Miss Carson's cable to us arose out of the cable she received from R&B notifying that van B would be arriving in Kaduna on January 28, just 4 days later. Miss Carson also spoke to UNDP, Lagos to see if they had made arrangements for van B's arrival but they were not aware of it. This apparently led them to cable us that same day insisting that candidates be submitted to Government through them and voicing misgivings about the way the project was being run. This, of course, is incorrect. The Bark is UNDP's executing agency for the project and the contract, which was approved by UNDP, is between the Bank and B&B and does not provide for approval by UNDP of staff substitutions.

WAS contrast Agricel by UNDPO

We immediately cabled FEDMINAG with a synopsis of van B's CV, told them that we had requested MacKay to provide full details and confirmed that van B was acceptable to the Bank subject to Government confirmation.

- 7. We also cabled B&B, told them of our cable to FEDMINAG and once again asked them to have MacKay provide full CV and discuss matter with Bukar Shaib. Meanwhile, van B was enroute and could not be stopped.
- 8. On January 26 we cabled UNDP, Lagos summarizing all the actions we had taken and asking them to set up a meeting in their office with MacKay and/or Unk (Financial Specialist) present February 1 when Grimshaw would arrive to discuss all the problems.
- 9. Problem No. 2: Insofar as the disbursement of funds is concerned we are not empowered to disburse until the project document becomes effective. There are two conditions of effectiveness: (1) evidence that Government has deposited £N7,000 with standard Bank in Kaduna for initial working capital and (2) letters of appointment have been issued by Government to each of the four consultants.
- 10. UNDP, Lagos informed us by cable dated December 28, 1972 that Government had paid working capital of £N10,000 "just before Christmas" but had decided not to issue letters of appointment before the formal inauguration of NAB "in early February". They also said that the experts were in need of local currency and suggested that we arrange to make payments of local currency under the contract to Barclays Bank for the attention of the GM, NAB.
- 11. Any such disbursement of UNDP funds outside the terms of the contract could not be made without explicit approval of UNDP, New York. We informed UNDP, New York by phone that we would be prepared to act if they would so authorize. They appeared most reluctant but promised to look into it. They have still not authorized us to pay.
- 12. In any event, payment to Barclays, Kaduna for the GM, NAB would have been useless since NAB has no GM until such time as the Government issues its letter of appointment to MacKay.
- 13. In the meantime, Mr. Poyck told us that he was not overly concerned about the financial side, this was a normal problem with most projects, and his people in Kaduna could draw on the funds provided by Government for working capital.
- 14. After his meeting with UNDP and Unk in Lagos on February 1 during which he discussed both problems, Grimshaw cabled Roger Rowe that "there are no problems except for petty housekeeping which Unk can resolve" (copy attached). Grimshaw also gave Bukar Shaib a copy of van B's CV and Bukar Shaib has promised to notify the Bank of his acceptability by about February 8 (today).
- 15. This is clearly a bad case of over reaction on the part of UNDP, Lagos, a continuation of the attitude adopted during my visit in November/December last. I propose that if we do not hear from Government by Monday, February 12 regarding the acceptability of van B, we should cable Bukar Shaib and also enquire as to the date of the proposed inauguration since this is delaying both the payments to consultants and the implementation

Defore the UNDP Resident Representative's office in Nigeria could recommend the present Draft Project Document to its Headquarters for the Administrator's approval, it would appreciate the Government's attention to the following points:

- Association were approved by the Federal Executive Council 26 July 1972, and therefore we would appreciate receiving a copy.
- 2. The draft Project Document as of 5 October does not contain the project Funget covering the Government's contribution in Lind. As it has been learned that some of Directors Designate to the Fourd have already been nominated, it should be possible to have dies of the staffing requirements and the total budget on a yearly basis for running the Bank.
- 3. We would include the names and functions of the designated staff, as soon as they are known, into the draft Project Document.
- 4. During a recent visit to Kaduma, a short attempt was made to locate the site of the H.A.B. Unfortunately this proved without success, however as information was received that a new building is being constructed, we would appreciate receiving confirmation of this and the figure of construction costs to be included under non-expendable equipment of the Covernment's Project Budget.

Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB)

The Government has now agreed to the following team of experts:
General Manager, B. E. Mackay; Accountant, H. Unk; Credit Specialist,
E. Schepers; Agricultural Economist, K. W. Gall. We have also concluded negotiations with Berenschot-Bosboom, but the contract will not become effective until after the Project Document is agreed and signed. A new draft of the Project Document is enclosed and we hope this will be acceptable to UNDP and the Government. It is based on the format which was agreed by UNDP headquarters on March 16 last, but we have re-written Article II, the project description, on the lines of the terms of reference in the consultants' contract. We believe this will bring the document closer to UNDP's new requirements. We have also added two conditions of effectiveness in Article VIII.

We have completed the project budget for the UNDP's contribution. As arranged with Mr. Wahlberg, during my visit to Lagos in August, I have checked with UNDP headquarters on the amount of detail which must be included in this budget. They have confirmed that (1) all services to be provided within the terms of the consultants' contract should be included within the amount shown for sub-contracts, and (2) numbers of man-months are not required for sub-contracts. This means that items of equipment or training which might be provided by the consultants are to be included as part of the cost of the consultants' contract and are not to be shown separately under the equipment and training components. As it happens, the costs included in the present contract relate only to personnel. All equipment, including vehicles, is to be provided by the NAB and thus will be included in the Government's contribution.

One of the initial duties of the four experts is to advise the Board of NAB on the requirements for staffing, accommodation and equipment, and their recommendations will be given in the inception report which is due three months after the commencement of the project. Until that time, it will not be possible to define the Government's contribution in kind. This creates a difficulty in completing the budget for the Government's contribution. I have discussed this matter with the Administrative and Finance Division at UNDP headquarters and have agreed with them that the budget should be left blank at present and completion postponed until after the consultants' recommendations have been accepted by the Government.

We are sending copies of the draft Project Document to the Permanent Secretaries at the Ministries of Finance, Economic Development, and Agriculture, and we have asked that they provide their comments to you and to us.

Transport Survey of Mid-Western Migeria

Michael Payne has informed us that the Federal and State Governments have now agreed the proposed terms of reference for this survey. We are also very pleased to hear that he and Mr. Wahlberg have had a good meeting with various officials in the State Government at Benin. Following these developments, we are now proceeding with the preparation of a list of consulting firms which we think would be suitable to carry out the survey. A list of these firms will shortly be sent to the Government for clearance.

I am enclosing a copy of the draft Project Document which I discussed with Mr. Wahlberg in August and which now includes the changes I agreed with him then. Annex I is not at present attached. I believe I did explain to Mr. Wahlberg that the Bank's Articles of Agreement do not lend themselves to some of the provisions in the standard text of Annex I. We are now negotiating with UNDP headquarters an alternative version which can henceforth be used for all Bank-executed projects. A meeting is to be held with UNDP headquarters later this month to reach final agreement on that version. We shall then send you a copy.

Other Matters

I am enclosing a copy of the report which I prepared when I returned from Lagos, for your information. Besides giving details of my discussions on the above mentioned two projects, you will also find notes on the long-term study of Lagos Port and the seed multiplication project. We are still awaiting news from New York of the consultant mission for the last mentioned project.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank you, Mr. Kar, Mr. Wahlberg and Mr. Rose for your assistance during my stay in Lagos. I felt that our meetings were very useful and I am most appreciative of the help Mr. Wahlberg gave me in reviewing the draft Project Document for the Transport Survey. I do hope you had a successful home leave to England.

Lagos from August 6 to 11 and discussed the above projects with the Federal Government, the IBRD resident mission and the UNDP Resident Representative. I coordinated my work with Messrs. Mirza (Area), Stoneham and Bazo (Agriculture Projects), Howard Jones (Transportation-Ports) and Payne (the Bank's transportation specialist in Nigeria).

Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB)

Background

2. Prior to the mission, the main requirements before this project could be implemented were: (a) the Government's approval of NAB's memorandum and articles of association; (b) the provision of additional data and information to the UNDP Resident Representative; (c) the Government's acceptance of the four experts proposed by Berenschott-Bosboom, the selected consulting firm; and (d) negotiation of the contract with Berenschott-Bosboom.

Present Position

- The Federal Executive Council approved NAB's memorandum and articles of association on July 26, 1972 and the first directors-designate to the Board have been nominated. The head office of NAB will be in Kaduna. Full details of these decisions are contained in the back-to-office report prepared by Messrs. Bazo and Stoneham on August 15, 1972.
- h. The draft of the Project Document prepared in January 1972 was based on the format prevailing prior to 1972. UNDP headquarters in New York, by letter dated March 16, 1972, accepted the draft, subject to whatever comments their Resident Representative might have. The Resident Representative needed certain additional information to comply with UNDP's new regulations, and this information was provided by the mission. A fuller description of the Government's counterpart contribution will be given when negotiations with the consultants have been concluded.

The Government indicated its acceptence of three of the experts proposed by Berenschott-Bosboom: K. W. Gall (agricultural economist), H. Unk (accountant and financial expert), and E. Schepers (credit specialist). The candidate proposed for the position of general manager was not acceptable. (A new candidate was subsequently proposed to the Government on August 23, 1972.)

Further Action

6. Subject to the Government's acceptance of the candidate proposed for general manager, contract negotiations with Berenschott-Boshoom will take place the week commencing September 18. At the conclusion of negotiations, the Project Document can be completed and prepared for signature.

Transport Survey of Mid-western Nigeria

Background

- 7. In June 1966, the Government submitted an application to the UNDP requesting financial assistance for this survey. The project was subsequently approved by the Governing Council of UNDP in June 1967 with an earmarking of \$297,000. The civil war in Nigeria prevented the project from being undertaken. Since the end of the war, most of the expenditure in the State's transport sector has been for rehabilitation purposes. Little has been done to reactivate the project approved by UNDP. To assist in its planning for 1975 and after, the Mid-western State now requires that a transport survey be undertaken so that priorities for road and river transport might be identified and feasibility studies subsequently carried out. The original project, therefore, has to be updated and amended as appropriate to take account of changed conditions and increased costs since the original application was submitted.
- 8. A draft Plan of Operation was prepared in 1968 for the original project. This was never signed. By letter of July 7, 1972, UNDP requested that, for the updated project, a Project Document be prepared in line with their new format according to Chapter IV of their Operational and Financial Manual. This was duly drafted and agreed within the Bank before the mission left for Nigeria.

Current Position

9. The draft Project Document was discussed with the UNDP office in Lagos. Jan Wahlberg, their program officer, reviewed it in detail and suggested a number of modifications. A marked-up version of the draft incorporating these modifications is attached.

- 10. One of the changes agreed with UNDP Læos was that the starting date should be 1 January 1973 instead of 1 November 1972. The latter date was considered unrealistic; the Mid-western State had not yet agreed the terms of reference and we still had to select consultants and negotiate a contract. The selection and negotiation procedures alone would take approximately three months and it would therefore be impossible to have the consultants in the field by November 1, 1972. As a consequence of the change, all dates shown in the Work Plan in Part III of the Project Document have been moved ahead by two months.
- UNDP's new regulations require that the Government's counterpart contribution be itemized in detail. Personnel positions must be described fully, right down to drivers and traffic counters, in that part of the Project Document headed "Description of Government inputs". It was suggested by Mr. Fryer, the Resident Representative, and subsequently agreed to by the Federal Government, that this could only be done by direct discussions with the State Government in Benin. A visit could not be arranged during the short time the mission was there, but it was agreed that Mr. Payne, accompanied by Mr. Wahlberg, would visit Benin as soon as possible. Mr. Payne would inform the State Government what IERD considered the ideal counterpart staffing should be, including a full-time co-project manager. It is essential to determine what counterpart staff might be available before contract negotiations take place.
- 12. A visit to the State Government would also provide an opportunity to see whether they accepted the revised terms of reference sent to them on May 26 last. The Federal Government has already accepted them.
- 13. The draft of the Project Document included the statement "No overseas training is foreseen". The UNDP questioned this, and the matter was also raised when the mission visited the Development Aid Division of the Ministry of Economic Development. It was agreed that this should be further discussed with the State Government. Three fellowships were granted when UNDP originally approved financing for a transport survey in 1967, but it is not known whether the fellows who benefited by the training are still with the State Ministry of Works and Transport.

Further Action

14. The mission agreed with UNDP Lagos that the following prodedures be followed for further clearance and signature of the Project Document:

- After the proposed meeting with the State Government has taken place, Mr. Wahlberg will provide additional data for the Government's counterpart contribution, and for fellowships if applicable, and send it to IBRD;
- (2) IBRD will prepare copies of a new draft Project Document and send them to UNDP headquarters in New York and to the Federal and State Governments (through UNDP Lagos) for clearance;
- (3) At the conclusion of contract negotiations, IBRD will finalize the Project Document, (which will mainly be a question of completing the UNDP and Government inputs and the financial data), and then sign the document and send it to UNDP New York and to the State and Federal Governments, again through UNDP Lagos;
- (h) The Government and the Resident Representative, on behalf of the UNDP, will sign the document after final clearance has been received from UNDP New York;
- (5) The Resident Representative will cable IBRD as soon as he and the Government have signed the document.

Long-Term Study of Lagos Port

The mission discussed with the UNDP Resident Representative the possibility of UNDP financing a long-term study for the port of Lagos. It is expected that the growth in port traffic will be very rapid during the next ten years, and the study would therefore need to be started fairly soon so that construction could commence in the mid-1970s. The mission informed the Resident Representative that a very rough estimate of the cost of the study would be \$1 million. The Resident Representative said that, in principle, he would support the proposal that UNDP finance the study. As UNDP would shortly commence preparation of its country programme for Nigeria, he suggested that IBRD inform the Ministry of Transport that they should place their request to the UNDP through the Federal Ministry of Economic Development as soon as possible. The preparation of the country programme is coordinated through the latter Ministry.

Seed Multiplication Project

In somection with an agricultural project in its proposed 16. lending program for Nigeria, IERD learned from the Federal Government that a request for a seed multiplication study had been submitted to UNDP. UNDP Lagos informed the mission that the request had been received some two months earlier and had been sent to their headquarters in New York and to FAO in Rome for comments. They had since heard that the request was accepted in principle, but their headquarters had suggested a consultant mission be sent to update some of the information contained in the request. The Resident Representative and Mr. Rose, the FAO representative in Lagos, felt strongly that the consultant mission should visit IBRD in Washington before going to Lagos. Since returning to Washington, I have been in touch with UNDP headquarters and they have agreed that their mission should visit Washington. They are waiting for the Government to accept their proposal for a mission before making further plans, and will be in touch with us in due course.

We fully share your desire to establish NAB as an operating entity as early as possible and, assuming Mr. Mackay is acceptable to the Government, we would hope to be able to schedule negotiation of the contract with the consultants for the week commencing September 18. We will be writing to you in the course of the next few days regarding procedures for negotiations and signing of the Project Document.

We would be grateful if you would give this matter your urgent attention.

of the Migerian Agricultural Bank Back-to-Office and Full Report

1. In accordance with Terms of Reference dated July 26, 1972, we visited Lagos from August 6 to 12, 1972, to discuss with the Federal Government, IBRD Resident Mission, and the UNDP Resident Representative the progress in establishing the Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAF). We were assisted by Mr. H. Mirza (Area) and Miss Eileen Powell (Development Services). A list of places visited and persons met is at Annex 1.

Background

After Mr. Bazo's visit to Lagos in February, 1972, the main steps still outstanding over the formation of NAB were: (a) Government approval of NAB's Memorandum and Articles of Association; (b) Government approval of the documents under which UNDP/SF would finance a team of four experts from Messrs. Perenschot and Bosboom (Netherlands) (BEN) to organize and manage NAB during its first three years of operation; (c) Government clearance of the four experts comprising the BBN team; and (d) negotiation by IBRD of the consultants' contract with BEN, after Government clearance.

Present Position

Formation of NAB: The Federal Executive Council approved NAB's Memorandum and Articles of Association on July 26, 1972. The mission was advised that the only change in the draft as previously received by IBRD is in the capital structure. Instead of an equity capital of NL. 4.0 million, as earlier proposed, NL. 0.5 million will now be in equity shares, all held by the Federal Government, while the balance of NL. 3.5 million will be in long-term loan, either interest free, or at a very low interest rate. The precise rate is still under discussion within the Government, but Mr. Alhaji Abubakar of the Ministry of Finance stated he expected the loan would be interest-free. The

change has been made because of the high stamp duty on an equity of NL. 4.0 million. The mission was assured by senior officials of the three Ministries concerned with NAB's formation, that the Government contribution to its share capital and for the long-term loan was available as soon as required.

4. The first Directors-designate to NAB's Board have been nominated. They are:

Dr. S. Bukar Shaib, Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture,

Mr. Ayida, Permanent Secretary, Ministry of

Economic Development and Reconstruction,

Mr. Ajueyitchia, Chairman, Nigeria Produce Marketing Board, Mr. Ijewera, Deputy Director, Central Bank of Nigeria, Mr. Adekunle, Deputy Director, Central Bank of Nigeria.

- Government officials considered that NAB would be registered under the Companies Act, and thus become a corporate body, before September 30, 1972. A copy of the registered Memorandum and Articles of Association will be forwarded to IBRD as soon as registration has been completed.
- 6. Government has decided the Head Office of NAB will be in Kaduna. This is acceptable to all parties, as Kaduna is a convenient center for agricultural activities, with good access by air and road and good telephone linkage to most agricultural centers.
- 7. The mission agreed that the question of office space, furniture and office equipment, selection of initial staff, and similar problems were the responsibility of NAB's Board and Management, and should be dealt with as soon as NAB's management team was in the field.
- 8. Approval of UNDP/SF Project Documents: Government approved these documents in April, 1972. Since then a new format for them has been introduced. The mission supplied additional data and information to the UNDP Resident Representative to enable him to prepare documents under the new format for transmission to New York for consideration by UNDP.

Clearance of NAB Management Team: Government has cleared nominees for three of the four posts. They are: Messrs. H. Unk (Accountant and Financial Expert), E. Schepers (Credit Specialist), and K. W. Gall (Agricultural Economist). It has however procrastinated over clearing the nominee for the post of General Manager. In April 1972 the candidate (Mr. Scott) proposed by BBN and found acceptable to IBRD was rejected. A further candidate (Mr. Abassi), well known to and nominated by IBRD, was rejected in May. In the meantime the Government, in informal discussion with BBN, obtained the name of yet another candidate (Mr. Delhove) who proved unacceptable to IBRD and is, in any event, no longer available. We informed Government of Mr. Delhove's unavailability. Two alternative candidates acceptable to IBRD were put forward (Messrs. Keijzer and Morgan). Just before we left Lagos we were informed that the Government was not prepared to clear either of these two alternatives. On our return to Washington, BBN were informed, and they are now trying to find other candidates. Negotiation and signing of the UNDP Project Document and the Consultant's Contract are thus held up until IBRD and the Government are able to clear a new candidate.

IBRD Livestock Project Appraisal Mission

10. Our mission discussed in the field with the appraisal mission the possible role of NAB in the proposed livestock Project, from which it seems likely that NAB can play a useful part. Further details will be given in the appraisal mission's Back-to-Office Report.

Further Action

11. No immediate action is required pending BBN submission of new candidates for the post of General Manager of MAB, after which IBRD will send the curriculum vitae of approved candidates for Government selection. After Government clearance, negotiations can proceed on the UNDP/SF Project Document and Consultants' Contract.

1. Agricultural Development Bank

You will discuss the draft Project Document with the UNDP Resident Representative and endeavor to provide him with any additional information he might need. To the extent possible, you will obtain the information required to complete the Project Budget for the Government's counterpart contribution to the project. You will coordinate your work with Messrs. Stoneham and Bazo of the Agriculture Projects Department.

2. Transport Survey of Mid-western Nigeria

You will take with you a draft of the Project Document and discuss it first with Mr. Michael Payne, the Bank's transport specialist stationed in Nigeria. You will then accompany Mr. Payne to the UNDP office in Lagos to discuss the document with the Resident Representative and to obtain his clearance to the extent possible. You will leave copies with the Resident Representative so that he may pursue clearance of the document with the appropriate offices of the Federal and State Governments.

3. Long-Term Study of Lagos Port

You will accompany Mr. Howard Jones, who will be leading the Bank's pre-appraisal mission of the second Lagos port project, to the UNDP office in Lagos to discuss with the Resident Representative the possibility of UNDP financing for this study and its inclusion in the UNDP country programme for Nigeria for the period 1972/76.

- 4. If time permits, you will obtain information on the preparation of the UNDP country programme for Nigeria and find out whether there is the possibility that Bank assistance might be required in connection with other projects which the Government is proposing for inclusion in the programme.
- 5. You will return to Washington by August 14 and submit a full report.

Riley Mission to Nigeria Mr. Humayun Mirza of the Western Africa Department has requested that Miss Powell participate in a mission to Nigeria in August to help sort out a number of problems relating to the approval of the Project Document on the UNDP financed assistance to the Agricultural Development Bank. The UNDP Resident Representative in Nigeria is not too good, the Bank's Resident Representative is no longer there, and the other members of the Bank mission are not at all familiar with the UNDP requirements. Miss Powell could, I believe, make an important contribution. In addition, she could help resolve some of the problems that have held up another Bank-executed UNDP project, the Mid-western Nigeria Transport Survey. Dear Mr. Ebong:

Over the past ten months ne have been discussing the various assects of the proposed not ligarian Agricultural Bank has been asked to set as executing offency for a Unit project that comprises the staffing of four key positions for the new bank. As some time has passed and a point is now being reached where minal decisions have to be taken, I thought that I should write to you to ensure that there is a clear understanding on where we stand and what further steps must be taken. Busically, there are two outstanding issues on which action is needed with a certain degree of urgency and I would appreciate your advising up as to whether our understanding of the situation is correct on these issues.

The first relates to the incorporation of MAS. I understand that its Articles of Agreement and by-lass ere ready to be submitted to the FED . and that legislation should be enacted shortly. I would appreciate it if you would confirm this and let me know as to what is your best estimate of when this bank will be formally established.

The second point relates to the initial filling of four key posts in the proposed new bank. The consultants who were salected by us and approved by your Government for this purpose have mide proposels on which we would like to have your advice. It is our understanding that he. H. Unk, Mr. K. Gall and Mr. E. Schepers proposed for the positions of accountent, agricultural economist and credit specialist, respectively, have been accepted. A decision, however, is still needed for the post of general manager. The names of Mr. Reiser and Mr. Morgan have been proposed to you to fill this post. We find both these candidates acceptable and we would therefore be grateful to have your decision as to whom you find proferable so that we can proceed with the recruitment and negotiations of the contract with a view to having the consultant team in Migoria hopefully not later than September 1972. I am sure that you will agree that after the months of negotiations with the consultants the team should be sent to Nigerla as soon as possible in order to ensure that MaB gets started as quickly as possible.

Because of the role it will play in the implementation of an important segment of our inture londing program in the agriculture sector in Migeria we are particularly interested in essisting you in ony way we can to make N'B operational as soon as possible. The immediate impact of NAB would be on the

I also expect to be in Lagos during that time and look forward to the opportunity of discussing this and other notters of mutual interest with you. In the meantime I would be most grateful to have your views on the points raised above in preparation for the discussions early in August. In view of their interest in this matter, I am sending copies of this letter to Mr. Ayida and Mr. Dukar Shaib. Meeting to Discuss Implications of Mr. M. Burney's Letter Regarding Establishment of the Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB)

A brief meeting was held on Monday, April 10, 1972, with the participation of H. Mirza and F. Povey (Area), Miss E. Powell (Development Services), P. C. Goffin and J. Bazo (Projects). The purpose of the meeting was to decide on a course of action regarding the different steps to be taken for the establishment of the Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB), on the light of the issues raised and commented on the attached letter dated March 29, 1972 from Mr. M. A. Burney, Bank Resident Representative in Lagos, Nigeria to H. Mirza.

The main issues raised and discussed were:

- 1. Clearance of candidates and role of UNDP Resident
 Representative In spite of the Permanent Secretary of
 Agriculture's (Shaib) initial acceptance (in February
 during Mr. Bazo's visit) of candidates selected by Bank
 subject to Government clearance, now the Permanent
 Secretary for Economic Development (Ebong), probably
 influenced by comments of the UNDP Resident Representative,
 has unofficially informed Burney that he will not accept
 two of the candidates, (out of 4) Mr. Scott and Mr. Pegler
 (the two British members of the team) and that the selected
 firm (Berenschot and Bosboom) would have to propose new
 candidates.
- 2. There is no assurance as to when, the Federal Executive Council will approve the legislation for the establishment of NAB.
- 3. Mr. Burney's comments regarding the manner in which the Bank should have proceeded for selection of consultants.

Conclusions of the meeting were:

- 1. Mr. Mirza would send a cable to the Permanent Secretary of Economic Development (Ebong) asking official position of Government regarding clearance for candidates proposed by Bank and project documents (cable sent on April 11, 1972).
- 2. Mr. Mirza would also indicate to the Government our concern for the delay in passing necessary legislation for establishment of NAB since it will affect readiness of the new institution to handle livestock and other loans (included in same cable above mentioned).

3. Miss Powell would informally discuss with the UNDP's New York office Mr. Fryer's role in the selection of firm and candidates.

4. As to Mr. Burney's suggestion that information on the candidates submitted by consultants, should have been sent to him prior of having Government reaction. It was felt that the procedure established for the selection of consultants under UNDP/IBRD projects was followed, and that the list of candidates with their CVs was sent to Mr. Burney on January 14, 1972 for its transmital to Government, on which he had no reaction at that time.

NIGERIA--Establishment of the Agricultural Development Bank; UNDP/SF Project

This morning I received a telephone call from Mr. Poyck, General Manager of Berenschot-Bosboom in Holland, the firm selected to provide consultants to manage the above referred to project. Mr. Poyck reported that he had been unofficially informed that two out of the four men presented, Messrs. Pegler and Scott (both British), were not accepted by the Nigerians because they thought that both of those men were professionally not qualified. On his own initiative, Mr. Poyck went to Nigeria last week and was told by the Permanent Secretary of Agriculture that indeed they did not accept the two men and would like to have replacements. The Permanent Secretary of Agriculture asked him if he would look for replacements and to present these unofficially to them. Mr. Poyck added that he could provide replacements and probably a full Dutch team within a few days. I mentioned to Mr. Poyck that we were aware of this problem and that we were sending a cable to the Permanent Secretary of Economic Development in Nigeria asking him to give us the Government official view with regard to the candidates proposed in order to proceed accordingly. Also that the official channel for negotiations had to go through the executing agency which was the World Bank and that he should wait for our communication before taking any steps. He readily accepted the proposal.

Nigerian Agricultural Bank

This is the letter promised in my cable to you of March 22, 1972, No. 84, on the above subject. I waited a few days hoping that I might have something more positive to report, but the picture is still not bright or even clear. I have talked with Bukr Shaib on more than one occasion since my return to Lagos and have seen Obi and Ebong since receiving your cable No. 68.

Legislation:

Bukr Shaib says that it was impossible for him or anyone at his level (civil service) to say when the Federal Ministry of Justice will complete the drafting of legislation and Articles of Association of the NAB, and that April 15 date was unrealistic. I explained the importance of the date or at least some qualified estimate of time, to help in planning various steps leading to the signing of contract and arrival of experts in Nigeria. When I did not get an answer I asked whether it, might take as long as two to three months and his answer was not as long. From this I deduce that it may be May 15 before the pertinent documents are approved by the FEC. Neither Obi, Ayida or Ebong could improve our knowledge and they say, and rightly so, that that is Shaib's baby.

Clearance of Candidates

Here the picture is reverse. Shaib apparently had no objections to the candidates submitted but Ebong and his staff feel, partly as a result of comments of the local UNDP staff, but mainly because they feel that the entire basis of agreeing to get a consulting firm was to get top-notch persons. Ebong feels that he had to fight an uphill battle both within his Government and with UNDP to get away from obtaining people on directline basis. He and his staff feel that if mediocre people like Scott and Peddler are the best the consulting firm can do then the Government might have to give serious consideration to recruiting Nigerians. The fact that

NAB is to be an important institution the Government had agreed to expatriate staff. He prevailed upon the Nigerian officials concerned about accepting the Bank's recommendations that the financial controller's job be filled - for three years or so - by a foreigner, although there were many qualified Nigerian accountants. Peddler who worked for an oil company left Nigeria, Ebong said, when his position was Nigerianized. We did discuss the availability of sufficient qualified Nigerians and his answer was, "if we give half the remuneration proposed for Peddler we can get several very good Nigerians to fill the post." Although no official intimation has come to this office, although promised by Ebong, I fear that Scott and Peddler are out and the firm would have to propose new names, and good ones.

Project Document

Clearance of this document will not pose problems but given the two above issues this is not a pressing problem. Ebong has promised that his staff will soon give us their views and Shaib has said that he will rely on FMED's comments on the matter.

This is a rather busy time for Finance and Economic Development because of the budget.

I plan to talk to the three concerned about NAB next week.

To sum up and on hindsight one can say that perhaps the Bank should have a closer look at the candidates submitted by consultants, especially for executive positions and in the case of Nigeria, if the information on the candidates were sent to us we could have forewarned you on Nigerian reaction and thus save some time, effort and embarrassment in the process.

I am sorry not to be able to give you positive news in this letter. Will write about this by the end of next week.

Back-to-Office and Full Report

In accordance with the terms of reference dated February 9, 1972, the mission visited Lagos, Nigeria from February 12 to 19, to ascertain and discuss with Government authorities, the IBRD Resident Representative and the UNDP Resident Representative, the various points concerning the implementation of the IBRD/UNDP/SF Project for the establishment of the Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB). A list of places visited and persons met is attached as Annex 1.

Background

In June 1969, the Bank, at the request of the Nigerian Government, studied the possibility of establishing a Federal Agricultural Bank. As result of the study (A. H. Stoneham, Nigeria, Agricultural Credit Review - Full Report, September 18, 1969), in April 1971, the Government requested assistance from UNDP/SF to finance a team of experts to organize and manage NAB during its first three years of operation. The Government also requested that IBRD be designated the Executing Agency for the project. In July 1971 the Bank received approval from Government for terms of reference and job descriptions for a team of four consultants, and clearance to invite for this purpose five out of six consulting firms proposed by the Bank. The Bank also received and commented on the draft Memorandum and Articles of Association of NAB, which had been prepared following Mr. Stoneham's recommendations. On November 18, 1971 a Bank Selection Committee headed by Mr. Chadenet agreed to invite the firm of Berenschot and Bosboom (Netherlands) for negotiations, which would take place after settlement of financial arrangements with UNDP and clearance from the Nigerian Government. In the course of the last week of January and the first week of February 1972, our resident representative in Lagos handed the Government the curriculum vitae of the four selected experts and the Project Document (Plan of Operation) as approved by UNDP.

3. The steps still required for the implementation of the project are mainly; a) approval by the Supreme Military Council of the draft Memorandum and Articles of Association, and its registration under the Company Decree and the Banking Decree; b) approval and signing of the Project Document by the Nigerian Government, UNDP/SF and IBRD; c) contract negotiation with the selected firm, after clearance from the Nigerian Government; and d) financing for NAB, physical facilities, and local staff.

Establishment of NAB

- 4. The mission was informed by the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Agriculture, that the draft of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, prepared by the Ministry of Justice and revised by IBRD, the Ministries of Finance, Trade, Industry, Economic Development and the Central Bank, had been discussed by the Supreme Military Council (Federal Ministries and Heads of State Governments) and returned to the Ministry of Justice to introduce modifications and provide additional information to clarify the manner in which NAB would actually operate. Once these modifications and additions are made, the amended new draft would again have to be presented by the Ministry of Justice for the consideration of the Supreme Military Council. The secretary estimated that this action could take place during the month of April.
- So Neither the mission nor the IBRD Resident Representative in Lagos, were able to obtain precise answers in regard to the nature of the amendments suggested by the Executive Council. We were only informed that the proposed draft for the establishment of NAB was too much like the existing Nigerian Industrial Development Bank (NIDB) and that the council members wanted something more flexible that would meet the credit needs of the agricultural sector without major restrictions.
- 6. The Federal Government has already authorized the amount of NL 3 million (US\$9 million) in the actual fiscal budget as equity participation for NAB and has considered an additional NL 1 million (US\$3 million) for the same purpose in the new budget that becomes effective as of April 1, 1972. The first three million are available for use as soon as the bank is legally established.
- 7. The Government's present position in regard to physical facilities, office space, equipment, counterpart staff and other administrative matters, is that they will be taken care of by the Board of Directors and the General Manager as soon as NAB is legally created. The mission suggested the convenience of appointing immediately one full-time officer who, under the guidance of the Permanent Secretary of Agriculture, could start attending

to all these matters in order to avoid unnecessary delays after approval of NAB's establishment.) reviewed

Project Document (Plan of Operation)

The mission, with the assistance of the IBRD Resident Representative, reviewed the draft of the Project Document with the Permanent Secretary of Ministry of Agriculture. His comment was that since it constituted a legal document it would have to be properly revised by other competent branches of the Government and their observations would be communicated through channels as soon as possible. The secretary of Agriculture objected that in Article IV, Obligations of the Government, sections 4.02, 4.04 and 4.06, the word "promptly" is used in connection with acts that the Government has to perform. He also objected to Clause 4.03 regarding obligation of the Government to enable representatives of UNDP, the Bank and the Consultants to visit any part of its territories and to examine any records and provide all information relevant to the Project. He felt that this clause presented problems of security. Our Resident Representative will be informed of their final comments.

Consultants Team

- The Permanent Secretary of Agriculture informed the mission that he had reviewed the curriculum vitae of the experts proposed by Berenschot-Bosboom and selected by the Bank for the organization and management of NAB, and that he was satisfied that they had the necessary qualifications for their respective jobs. The Secretary added that security clearance would be necessary and that this was the task of another government agency. The Bank would be informed in the immediate future. The mission informed the Secretary that the proposed Credit Specialist Mr. Cornelis A. Kwint was no longer available and that he had been substituted by Mr. E. Schepars.
- The mission met Mr. John Scott, head of the Berenschot and Bosboom Consultants Team, selected by the Bank to manage and organize NAB who is presently in Nigeria working as Manager of the Northern Nigerian Development Corporation. We had an extended visit during which most aspects and problems of the new NAB were discussed. The mission was favorably impressed with Mr. Scott. His experience and knowledge of the area and its people, and of the problems involved in working as general manager of a government corporation, will permit him to be very helpful in organizing and launching NAB operations. His weak point might be that he lacks aggressiveness and fighting spirit, but on the other hand, under the

circumstances this weakness might be an asset, provided he has a good chairman for the Board of Directors and an active Nigerian Counterpart. The mission informed Mr. Scott of the status of NAB's Memorandum and Articles of Association and of the fact that until the Government provided the security clearance for the members of the proposed team, the Bank could not negotiate the contract with Berenschot and Bosboom. Mr. Scott informed the mission that he had resigned from his actual jeb effective as of March 20, 1972, and that if by then his services were not yet required, he would take a few weeks leave in England. He would of course need to know something definite fairly soon, in order to plan accordingly.

- 11. The mission met with Mr. Stanley Fryer, UNDP's Resident Representative, with whom the Project Document was discussed. The mission informed him of the observations made by the Permanent Secretary of Agriculture in regard to Article IV of the Project Document, as mentioned in paragraph 7 of this report.
- 12. The mission made all of its contacts throughout the IBRD Resident Representative Mr. Mahmud A. Burney, who was most helpful and cooperative. Mr. Burney participated in the conversations with Mr. Bukr Shaib, Secretary of Agriculture, and also met John Scott.
- 13. The mission also met the members of the Bank's livestock preparation mission headed by Mr. C. Chisholm and participated in their final meeting with the Permanent Secretary of Agriculture. The project outline presented by the livestock mission to the Secretary of Agriculture contemplates a possible loan for livestock development in Nigeria, to be channeled through NAB.

Conclusions

- 14. The Government continues to be interested in establishing NAB as soon as possible. Subject to security clearance by their Defense Ministry, the Government is satisfied with the Consultants Team selected by the Bank. There seems to be no major issue in regard to the Plan of Operation.
- The fact that the Supreme Military Council did not approve the Memorandum and Articles of Association as prepared and approved by the Federal Ministries concerned, has made the Government decide not to take any further steps until the aforementioned documents for the establishment of NAB, are approved by the Supreme Military Council.
- 16. There is no assurance as to when the Executive Council will approve NAB. Meanwhile, it is difficult for Berenschot and Bosboom to hold the selected team indefinitely.

17. The follow up on action to be taken, and the responsibilities, are as follows:



- (g) establish working relationships with the federal and state governments, marketing boards, and all other bodies (national and international) and individuals engaged in agricultural development;
- (h) arrange for the supervision of loans, including a follow-up system to ensure that loans are properly used and to evaluate the economic results of loans;
- (i) undertake studies to determine the technical feasibility and economic return of projects submitted for consideration;
- (j) plan and put into operation a system for the collection, analysis, and publication of statistical data;
- (k) assist in the identification and preparation of investment projects and appropriate for international financing in accordance with federal governmental policy;
- (1) prepare such instruction manuals as are required to guide administrative and technical staff in day-to-day operations.


Since we wrote to you on December 6, we have further discussed Mr. Saunders' letter of November 30 with Mr. Humayun Mirza, our Division Chief for Nigeria, who had the opportunity of discussing this project with you recently in Nigeria and who has just returned from his mission.

Mr. Mirza reports that the matter of the fourth post, that of the accountant, has been clarified with the Ministry of Economic Development and Reconstruction and that the Government has confirmed that the post is to be included in their request to the UNDP.

Mr. Mirza further reports that you would be prepared to recommend financing for "pre-project activities." Primarily the experts will:

- (a) advise and assist NAB's Board of Directors in formulating the policy for the organization, administration and development of NAB; plan and put into operation and accounting system;
- assume the management and executive responsibilities of NAB's operations;

- (d) train Nigerian personnel to assume management of NAB, and train staff at all levels in all aspects of agricultural credit work;
- (d) with the approval of NAB's Board, advise and assist State governments and institutions in formulating credit policies and programs, and in the organization and administration of such policies; plan and implement an effective loan appraisal and evaluation system including drafting loan application forms and instituting farm plans; plan and put into operation an effective collection system for loan repayments;
- (e) assist in the identification and preparation of agricultural credit projects appropriate for external financing in accordance with government policy;
- (f) establish working relationships with the Federal and State

 Governments, marketing boards, and all other bodies (national and international) and individuals engaged in agricultural development;
- (g) arrange for the supervision of loans, including a follow-up system, to ensure that loans are properly used and to evaluate the economic results of loans;
- (h) undertake studies to determine the technical feasibility and economic return of projects submitted for consideration;
- (1) plan and put into operation a system for the collection, analysis, and publication of statistical data;
- appropriate for international financing in accordance with policy;

(k) prepare such instruction manuals as are required to guide administrative and technical staff in day-to-day operations.

If the Bank's Board approves, any of the experts may be sent on visits to other countries for any purpose related to their work in Nigeria and any Nigerian staff of the Agricultural Bank may be sent abroad for periods of academic study or practical training in agricultural credit and banking.

It is anticipated that the organization of the Agricultural Bank, the establishment of sound lending techniques and systems, and the training of staff, will be completed in about three years, when the management of the Agricultural Bank should gradually be taken over by Nigerian personnel.

C. Duties of Team Members

The main duties of the members of the Consultants' team are:

- (a) General Manager: responsible for the overall organizational and managerial policies of NAB and for advising the Board on its lending policies. His duties will be those of a general manager;
- (b) Accountant: responsible for the accounts of NAB, including the accounting system and all accounting operations, the provision of accounting and secretarial staff. He will also act as Company Secretary and Financial Advisor to the Board;
- (c) <u>Credit Specialist</u>: responsible for introducing and operating a suitable project appraisal and evaluation system, all credit aspects of NAB's operations, the provision of credit data to management and the training of credit staff;

(d) Agricultural Economist: responsible for all economic aspects
of NAB's operations, including the provision of economic data to
management and the training of field staff. He will assist
the Credit Specialist in the appraisal and inspection of projects.
He will also evaluate the results of lending operations.

D. Time Schedule and Reports

The consultants' team shall assume their duties in accordance with the dates given in Appendix B.

The consultants shall prepare and submit the following reports on the indicated dates:

- (a) An Inception Report, three months after the Starting Date, summarizing the initial findings of the consultants and outlining any proposals for revisions in the work program, if such revisions are required by conditions found by the consultants in Nigeria (10 copies to the Bank and 12 copies to the Government);
- (b) Progress Reports at three-month intervals (beginning three months after submittal of the Inception Report), summarizing all work performed during the reporting period and outlining the work program for the next two reporting periods (10 copies to the Bank and 12 copies to the Government);
- (c) An Intermim Report, 18 months after the Starting Date, summarizing all work of the consultants and the progress of the project and making recommendations for the remainder of the program (10 copies to the Bank and 12 copies to the Government);

- (d) A Report, 33 months after the Starting Date, containing the Consultants' suggestions and recommendations for work to be performed after the termination of the services (10 copies to the Bank and 12 copies to the Government);
- (e) A Final Report, 40 months after the Starting Date, outlining all work performed by the Consultants and the results obtained 20 copies to the Bank and 20 copies to the Government).

III. Facilities and Services to be the Responsibility of the Government

The Government is to provide the Consultants with the services, facilities, equipment and personnel required for the services as listed below:

- (a) Counterpart Staff: full-time counterparts who will work with each member of the Consultants' team for the duration of the services in Nigeria;
- (b) Office space;
- (c) Office equipment and services, including secretarial service fluent in English;
- (d) Telegraph, telephone and postal services within Nigeria and from Nigeria and to other countries;
- (e) Suitably furnished premises, equipment and supplies for the training courses to be given to the Nigerian personnel;
- (f) Interpreters with adequate knowledge of the relevant technical terminology;
- (g) Adequate transportation within Nigeria, including vehicles until such time as vehicles to be procured under the project become available;

- (h) When such vehicles are operative the Government will be responsible for the provision of drivers;
- (i) The Government is to assist the Consultants in locating appropriate hotels or other living accommodations suitable for their personnel and to assist them in finding appropriate medical and dental services.

2. BACKGROUND

The total population of Nigeria is now estimated at over 60 million. About 80% of the total labour force is employed in agriculture, and there are over 6½ million farming families. The bulk of agricultural production is in foodcrops and livestock for local consumption. The major crops (cocoa, cotton, groundnuts, palm produce and rubber) are only a small part of total production. Agricultural production has probably remained static since 1964, but as a percentage of GDP it is estimated to have declined from 47 in 1964/65 to 43 in 1966/67. Food crops are marketed locally, export crops through the marketing boards. Earning power of agricultures capital is relatively low, which has restricted the demand for new capital and for credit.

Moneylenders remain the chief source of agricultural credit. Credit institutions have not generally been successful and none are operating efficiently at the present time, although plans to reorganize the one in the Western State are under consideration. Some small schemes for short term credit through cooperatives are working in some of the northern states. No data is available on which to estimate the total credit demand.

The 12 states were set up in 1967, replacing the four former regions. While their Governments are keen, they are at present relatively inexperienced. Most have already started work on agricultural development plans, which inc. credit programs. NAB's main benefit will be to help the States develop their credit programs and policies on sound lines, and to help to restructure existing State institutions or start new ones as soon as the credit demand becomes sufficiently large to make them viable. NAB will act as a channel for Federal funds to these institutions, and in the menatime will lend funds direct to State Governments for credit projects. Projects will be administered by the States, but NAB will impose its own terms and conditions for loans, and have the right to inspect progress at field level. For the time being most loans will be made with the State Government guarnateeing repayment.

We agree that the project should be executed by you using a team employed through a consulting firm, and we have informed our Lagos office accordingly.

We have asked our Resident Representative to obtain final clarification from the Government regarding the fourth post, that of the accountant. We have also asked him to ascertain whether the project should be treated as a large-scale Technical Assistance one, or whether it should follow the format of a Special Fund-type project.

In any event, because the total cost exceeds \$100,000, the approval of the Governing Council must be sought under our present procedures. However, as you know, there is a possibility that these may be changed at the January 1972 session, as the question of approving individual projects outside Country Programmes was not resolved at the June 1971 session.

Irrespective of the procedures to be followed, we do require a final detailed budget so that a debit can be made against Nigeria's IPF, and action can be initiated to give you an advance allocation to enable the project to begin. Nigeria: Assistance to the Agricultural Development Bank (ADB)

We refer to your letter of September 17 and would like to respond to the various points you raise.

We are glad to note that the UNDP is prepared, in principle, to assist this project. The establishment of the ADB is a most important first step in the implementation of Nigeria's plans for agricultural development, as set out in the Second National Development Plan. The IBRD is not providing part of its capital and has no immediate plans to lend to the ADB, but it is certainly expected that the Nigerian Government will request financing for the ADB within the next two or three years. Before the IBRD can consider such financing, however, it is necessary that the ADB be soundly launched, and this in turn requires the technical assistance which the Government, with the encouragement of the IBRD, has requested from the UNDP.

In addition to financing for the ADB itself, the IBRD expects to be deeply involved in providing substantial financing during the next five years for agricultural projects which would form p æt of Nigeria's plans for agricultural development. The establishment and smooth operation of the ADB would be an important consideration in the IBRD's financing of these projects.

While we acknowledge that the experts requested for the ADB will hold senior executive positions, thus partly satisfying the criteria for OPAS-type appointments, they will also be required to train Nigerians who can eventually take over. As time goes on, therefore, the experts will gradually fill advisory, rather than executive, positions. We strongly feel that a team employed through a consulting firm, rather than individually recruited experts, will provide the cohesion of action

which is so necessary to provide the executive capacity and to train Nigerian counterparts for subsequent managerial positions. Furthermore, it is essential that the full team be working at the ADB from the beginning of operations, and this is not always possible when experts are recruited on an individual basis.

When the Government first asked for our assistance in setting up the ADB, we made a number of recommendations, including the team versus the individual approach. This was accepted by the Government at the time, and has been endorsed by the Government again during discussions with the Bank's latest mission. Your Resident Representative also supports the Government/IBRD position, and we believe he has informed you accordingly.

We have purposely delayed responding to your letter before now as we wanted to have the above-mentioned further discussions with the Covernment to be quite sure that they still accepted the original recommendation made by the Bank. We hope the confirmation you have received from the field, together with this letter, will enable you to approve the request as submitted and to authorize commencement of the project.

- Reference is made to your memo of September 29, and UNDP letter of September 17, 1971.
- We feel very strongly that the provision of experts together with logistic support should be a Special Fund type project. The establishment of this Bank is a most important first step in the implementation of Nigerian agricultural development plans as set out in the second National Development Plan. The Bank expects to be deeply involved in providing substantial financing for this plan including lending to the Agricultural Development Bank (ADB).
- The Federal Government requested the Bank's assistance in setting up ADB and has accepted our recommendations practically in toto, including the need for outside assistance for top level management. We do not agree that the recruitment of individual experts will (provide the cohesion of action which is so necessary if the team is to provide the executive capacity and train Nigerian counterparts for subsequent management posts.
- The Terms of Reference for the experts were drafted by the Bank and accepted by the Federal Government. The consulting firms who were requested to submit proposals were selected by the Federal Government from a list provided by the Bank. It is clear, therefore, that the Government prefers the sub-contractor approach and has accepted that this approach will absorb more of the funds allocated to Nigeria by UNDP.
- Timing is another important factor. Proposals have already been or are about to be submitted by the invited consultants and there is still a good chance that the experts can be in the field by January 1972 or shortly thereafter. To revert to individual recruitment under the OPAS scheme will clearly result in considerable delay which is highly undesirable.
- 6. I recommend that you request UNDP to proceed on the basis of a Special Fund type project as per the request of the Nigerian Government.

I attach a copy of UNDP's letter of September 17 in response to our letter of August 18. I would like to make some comments in response to points four, five and six listed by UNDP.

- Representative, clearly sets out the request in terms of a Special Fund type of project by asking the UNDF to contribute the full salary and subsistence costs of the experts with supporting vehicles and operating costs. On this basis it would be logical to carry out the eventual project through a consulting firm. If the experts are to be recruited through the OFAS scheme instead, the Government would be required to finance the salaries up to the Rigerian level and the UNDF would "top up" the salaries by financing the balance required to bring them into line with international competitive levels. You will appreciate that such an arrangement would virtually preclude the use of a consulting firm.
- 2. We have a precedent for treating a project of this nature under the Special Fund category which the UNDF might have overlooked. We are executing agency for a project financed by the UNDF to reorganize and manage the Agricultural and Cottage Industries Bank of Afghandstan, and we have subcontracted the work to a German firm which is providing four experts: credit specialist, agricultural economist, supplies manager, and accountant. These experts hold managerial and executive responsibilities in the Afghandstan Bank just as would be required for the Migerian Agricultural Bank. UNDF financing for the Afghandstan project covers the full cost of salaries, allowances and travel for the experts, and vehicle operating costs.
- 3. The cost of a project for the Nigerian Agricultural Bank, whether the UNDP finances it in full or under the OFAS scheme, will have to be charged against the UNDP planning figure of \$20 million for Nigeria for the period 1972-76. Obviously the OFAS arrangement would absorb fewer UNDP funds and would thus release money which would be applied to other projects in Nigeria. The Government's views on the way this project is eventually handled and financed are therefore very important.

An indication of the Government's interest in receiving assistance to establish an Agricultural Development Bank, was first received from our office in Lagos, not as a formal request, but as advance information. On receipt of your letter dated 18th August, which regarded the request as having an official status, we contacted Lagos. On the basis of their explanations and of our own examination, we want to convey to you the following comments and questions.

- 1. Nobody in UNDP, either in Lagos or New York, has any doubt on the paramount importance of an Agricultural Development Bank in Nigeria. IBRD must be praised for dedicating its efforts to such an undertaking, and in principle, UNDP certainly is prepared to help to the limits of its own competence and means.
- 2. We would like to know how and to what extent IBRD may be associated with this new bank. Is IBRD going to provide part of the capital and/or some type of direct assistance, in the manner of that extended to the Nigerian Industrial Development Bank?

- 3. In relation to the preceding point, we wonder to what extent UNDP support is needed or appropriate. It would seem that the arrangement made between the IBRD and the NIDB has some merit, and may be also applicable to the Agricultural Bank.
- 4. According to your letter, annex A, "the experts will hold senior executive positions". In this case, they will fall within the category of OPAS experts, to the effect that part of their salaries should be paid by the institution to which they are attached. We would consider this even more desirable since the Agricultural Bank, like any other, is supposed to make money and pay for its own operating costs. But the intricacies of local payments, combined with a sub-contract passed with IBRD and financed by UNDP, should not be under-estimated, assuming that the Government of Nigeria would be willing to accept this formula, and that an OPAS agreement already exists between IBRD and Nigeria.
- 5. We would similarly be reluctant to finance vehicles, office equipment and operating costs, for the same reason.
- 6. We would like to know if and why you consider it necessary to sub-contract this project. We do not question that implementation through a sub-contractor has some advantages. The cost of it, however, is extremely high, and the side effects are not all positive. Moreover, in this particular case, the team is so small and the relative position and duties of each member so clear, that a careful selection of individual experts can achieve the necessary coherence in their action, with some substantial savings.
- 7. In this decisive stage of negotiations with the Government, we will appreciate that the Resident Representative be fully involved, as it has been the case up to now.

We shall certainly welcome your comments on these propositions.

Following our letter of 8 September, 1971 we have had a further cable from Mr. Mirza, IBRD Washington, requesting our immediate approval for certain changes to the above mentioned project.
Mr. M. Burney, the IBRD Resident Representative in Lagos, had a similar reminder and while this office merely referred to its cable of 20 August, copied to you, the Bank representative replied to his headquarters as per the enclosed copy of his cable.

According to Mr. Burney, it appears that the request initially elaborated mainly in collaboration with the Federal Ministry of Finance now has met with some delaying action caused by the intervention of the FMANR which the Ministry would appear not to have been consulted on the addition of an accountant to the team of experts.

As you will see from the attached copy of our letter of even date to the FMED we have now submitted our suggestion for a revised request to the appropriate authorities in an effort to keep the matter going and pending receipt of your comments particularly with respect to the rather high cost of sub-contracting as well as to the question of OPAS status for the team. As you will see, we have on the other hand completely turned down the inclusion of vehicles and equipment and have requested information as to the local salaries which will presumably be paid to the sub-contracting personnel in their capacity as executive officers of the Bank, if, indeed, this can or should be arranged in a sub-contracting agreement.

In view of IBRD's efforts to appoint a sub-contractor and ensure the implementation of the project by January 1972, we very much hope

2. BACKGROUND

The total population of Rigeria is now estimated at ever 60 million. About 80% of the total labour force is employed in agriculture, and there are over 6% million farming families. The bulk of agricultural production is in feederope and livesteck for local consumption. The major crops (cocea, cotton, groundnuts, palm produce and rubber) are only a small part of total production. Agricultural production has probably remained static since 1964, but as a percentage of GBP it is estimated to have declined from 47 in 1964/65 to 43 in 1966/67. Food crops are marketed locally, expert crops through the marketing boards. Earning power of agricultural capital is relatively low, which has restricted the demands for new capital and for credit.

Moneylenders remain the chief source of agricultural credit.

Credit institutions have not generally been successful, and none are operating efficiently at the present time, although plans to reorganize the one in the Western State are under consideration. Some small schemes for short term credit through cooperatives are working in some of the northern states. No data is available on which to estimate the total credit demand.

The 12 states were set up in 1967, replacing the four former regions. While their Governments are keen, they are at present relatively inexperienced. Most have already started work on agricultural development plans, which include credit programs. NAB's main benefit will be to help the States develop their credit programs and policies ensuad lines, and to help to restructure existing State institutions or start new ones as seen as the credit demand becomes sufficiently large to make them viable. NAB will act as a channel for Federal funds to these institutions, and in the meantime will lend funds direct to State Governments for credit projects. Projects will be administered by the States, but NAB will impose its own terms and conditions for loans, and have the right to inspect progress at field level. MIGERIA: Technical Assistance for the Agricultural Development Bank

We refer to the Government of Nigeria's request to UNDF dated April 29, 1971, for a Special Fund project to provide three experts to help establish the Agricultural Development Bank. When Mr. NoNamara visited Nigeria last May, your Resident Representative, Mr. Fryer, discussed this request with him and suggested that the Bank help recruit the necessary experts. At his suggestion, therefore, and upon the Government's subsequent request to the Bank for such assistance, Mr. HeNamara agreed to help. In order to proceed with the recruitment without delay, we have already prepared appropriate terms of reference and a list of suitable consulting firms from whom we could request the proposals. Both the terms of reference and the list have been approved by the Government. A copy of the terms of reference is attached for yourinformation.

The Bank had originally discussed the need for assistance in establishing the Agricultural Bank with the Nigerian Government as early as 1969 and had at that time prepared cost estimates based on the provision of five experts. In reviewing the eventual request, the Bank agreed that one of the original five experts would no longer be required from expatriate sources but felt that the position of an accountant should be included in the request. The Government has now agreed to this and has also agreed to the employment of a consulting firm rather than the hiring of individual experts.

In addition to the inclusion of the accountant, there are several reasons why the cost estimates in the request would need to be revised: Some of the estimates are based on those originally prepared by the Bank in 1969 and apparently take no account of subsequent price increases; the man-month rate of \$2,500 allows for the employment of individual expatriates but is too low for those hired through a consulting firm; the man-month

rates and travel costs do not allow for the fact that it might eventually be decided to contract with a North American firm. We have therefore prepared a revised estimate of costs for the project and are attaching a copy of this. You will see that the contribution required from UMDP amounts to \$765,000.

Subject to the inclusion of a fourth expert and the necessary revisions to the cost estimates, we should like to express our full support for the Government of Nigeria's request and to indicate that we would be prepared to act as Executing Agency in accordance with the Government's expressed wish. It is hoped that the experts will be able to play an active role in helping the Agricultural Bank to prepare projects for future Bank Group lending.

Your Resident Representative, Mr. Fryer, has indicated to us his support of the Government's request, and we assume that you will have heard similarly from him. We are sending him a copy of this letter. It is planned that operations should start by January 1972, and we would therefore appreciate receiving from you as soon as possible your confirmation of UNDP's agreement to finance this project and your views as to its inclusion in the Governing Council Programme for January 1972.

Technical Assistance for the NIGERIA: Agricultural Development Bank

We refer to the Government of Nigeria's request to UNDP dated April 29, 1971, for a Special Fund project to provide three experts to help establish the Agricultural Development Bank. A copy of this request was forwarded to the Bank and was discussed with Mr. McNamara during his visit to Nigeria last May. At that time the Government requested the Bank's assistance in recruiting the necessary experts and we agreed to help.

The Bank had originally discussed the need for assistance in establishing the Agricultural Bank with the Niggerian Government as early as 1969 and had at that time prepared cost estimates based on the provision of five experts. In reviewing the eventual request, the Bank agreed that one of the original five experts would no longer be required from expatriate sources but felt that the position of an accountant should be included in the request. The Government has now agreed to this and has also agreed to the employment of a consulting firm rather than the hiring of individual experts.

In addition to the inclusion of the accountant, there are several reasons why the cost estimates in the request need to would not/be revised: some of the estimates are based on those originally prepared by the Bank in 1969 and apparently take no account of subsequent price increases; the man-month rate of \$2,500 allows for the employment of individual expatriates but is too low for those hired through a consulting firm; the man-month rates and travel costs do not allow for the fact that it might eventually be decided to contract with a North American firm. We have therefore prepared a revised estimate of costs for the project and are attaching a copy of this. You will see that the contribution required from world amount to \$765,000. Subject to the inclusion of a fourth expert and the necessary revisions to the cost estimates, we should like to express our

full support for the Government of Nigeria's request and to indicate that we would be prepared to act as Executing Agency in accordance with the Government's expressed wish.

MEMORANDUM OF ASSOCIATION

- The Memorandum consists of the three following sections: 1.
 - a) Section I gives the name of the Company
 - b) Section II indicates the location of the Company
 - c) Section III consists of 25 articles which list the objects of the Company.
- Matters of form These 25 articles are in fact various subjects which might be listed as follows:
 - the objects of the Company (the provision of credit for agricultural production purposes and for marketing, the advise and assistance to states on agricultural credit policies and project preparation;
 - the operating policies (interest rates charged on loans shall be sufficiently high to meet the full cost of management and to establish adequate general and bad debt reserves before paying any dividend to shareholders);
 - c) the powers necessary to carry out its functions
 - the capital of the company
 - the liability of the members.
- Matters of substance
 - Beneficiaries of loans

Memorandum Rules, NAB objects are:

- a) to make loans for agricultural production purposes
 - (i) to any state, group of states, or any state institution for on-lending to farmers or body corporate, subject to the state or group of states guaranteeing repayment of the loan

- 2 -

- fa to to Goffin
 - (ii) direct to any farmer, group of farmers or body corporate where adequate security is forthcoming and in appropriate cases without prior approval, by State Government
 - b) to finance the marketing of agricultural products (Section III 1)
 - c) to lend or advance money or give credit upon the security of real or personal property or upon personal security or without security and generally on a project by project basis.

Comments

a) loans under category a (ii):

According to Mr. Stoneham's report, NAB should make loans direct to any farmer or body corporate, where adequate security was forthcoming, but subject to the approval of the appropriate State Government. Since NAB is a Federal institution, it is preferable to stick to this rule.

b) loans under category c:

There is no indication on the purpose of the loan. It is not clear whether such loans will be granted to state institutions or direct to farmers. These matters should be clarified.

B. Non-lending activities

Memorandum: Besides its lending activities, NAB objects are:

- a) to advise State Governments and institutions on agricultural credit policies and helping them to prepare agricultural project (III, i, A, IV)
- b) to investigate and advise or procure advice upon and to and in formulation and carrying into effect of all manner of propositions and schemes connected with agriculture in respect of which the Company's loan is requested
- c) to promote, constitute, form or organize or to concur promoting, constituting forming or organizing companies, syndicates, partnerships, and associations of all kinds for the purpose of acquiring all or any of the property, rights and liabilities of the Company or any other purpose which may seem directly or indirectly calculated to further the objects of the Company (III 8)
- d) to carry on a general financial business, and general financial operations of all kinds and undertake or aid in any enterprise (III 9)
- e) to buy, take on lease, or in exchange or otherwise acquire, sell, turn to account, deal in and dispose of lands, buildings and hereditaments whether free hold or leasehold or any other tenure, easements, concessions, claims, timber rights, water rights or priviledges and real or personal property of every description (III 10)

f) to amalgamate, enter into partnership or into any arrangement for sharing profits, union or interest or cooperation with any person or corporation or company or international organization carrying on or engaged in, or about to carry on or engage in any business or transaction which the Company is authorized to carry on or engage in or which can be carried on in conjunction therewith or which is capable of being conducted as directly or indirectly to benefit the Company (III 19).

Comments: The scope of NAB seems too important. According to Mr. Stoneham's report, assuming three possible alternatives:

- a) a development institution
- b) a finance institution
- c) a credit institution, the Federal Government indicated its preference for a credit institution.

The provisions of the Memorandum go far beyond the scope of a credit institution. I would prefer to limit for the time being non-lending activities to the object indicated in (a) (advice on agricultural credit policies and assistance in preparation of agricultural projects). However, NAB should be involved only in projects including a credit element and not in all agricultural projects.

Capital

Memorandum: The capital is NZ 6 million divided into 6,000 shares of NZ 1 each (III 25.(v)).

Comments: Mr. Stoneham recommended an equity capital of NZ 2 million and medium-/long-term borrowings of E 4 million. I have no basis for ascertaining what would be the best solution (no cash flow has been submitted). However, it is obvious that medium- and long-term borrowings are more easily geared to requirements than equity capital. I would like to mention that this provision of the memorandum is conflicting with the clause 5(a) of the articles of association which indicates that the share capital is divided into shares of NZ 1,000 each.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION

Capital

Article 5(a)(b): The share capital of the Company is NZ 6 million divided into 100 "A" ordinary shares of Z 1,000 each (the preference shares) 1900 "B" ordinary shares of NZ 1,000 each and 400 unclassified shares of Z 1,000 each. The "A" shares carry voting rights while the "B" shares do not carry voting rights.

Article 10: Any unclassified shares in the capital of the Company may be issued by the Directors with such rights and priviledges and subject to

imitation and restrictions as the Directors shall determine and in stricular, such shares may be issued with or have attached thereto preinternational, deferred, or other special rights or restrictions whether in the striction of the share may be issued on the terms that they are not at the option of the company, are to be liable to be redeemed provided however that unclassified shares shall, without the sanction of the Company in General Meeting be issued with any right to participate in dividend or capital in priority to the ordinary shares.

Comments:

- a) Mr. Stoneham proposed two classes of shares: A shares, voting (NE 100,000) B shares, non-voting (NE 1,900,000),
- b) I think that there is a typing mistake and that the number of unclassified shares is 4,000 and not 400.

Distribution of Profits

Article 5(c): The profits of the company, (after meeting any loss in respect of bad debts previously incurred) in respect of each financial year or other period shall be applied in the following order of priority.

- (i) in paying to the holders of the "A" shares a fixed cumulative dividend at the rate of 5% p.a. on the amount paid up in the said shares
- (ii) in selling aside to reserve such sums as the Directors are required by these presents to set aside and in setting aside to reserve or carrying forward such further sums as they shall think proper.

Comments: The operating results should take into account not only the losses but also the reserve for bad and doubtful debts. An adequate general reserve should also be established before paying any dividend to shareholders.

Borrowings

Article 60: Borrowings should not exceed three times the amount of the capital and reserves (other than the Special Reserve Fund required to be set up under Article 121(i).

Comments:

- a) There is a typing mistake. The Special Reserve Fund is dealt with in article 120(i).
- b) The debt equity ratio is usually a relation between the mediumand long-term loans (and not all debts outstanding) and the capital plus the free reserves.
- c) Mr. Stoneham's report recommended that medium-/long-term borrowings should not exceed twice the paid-up capital, until the whole of the capital has been subscribed, thereafter not to exceed four times

General Meeting

Article 67: The Company shall hold an annual general meeting once at least in every calendar year and not more than 15 months after the holding of the last preceding general meeting.

Comments: It seems preferable that the period between each annual meeting does not exceed 12 months.

Directors

Article 98: The Directors shall consist of:

(1) One person nominated as independent chairman

(2) Two persons as independent members

(3) Three persons nominated by the Federal Government

(4) Two persons nominated by the Central Bank

(5) One person nominated by the Nigerian Province, Marketing Company

Comments: Mr. Stoneham's report recommended that Board representation would be on the basis of "A" shares held and might be (1) Federal Government 3 (2) Central Bank 2 (3) State Governments 3 (4) Marketing Boards 1. I would recommend to stick to such recommendations.

Chairman

Article 108: The Chairman of the Board should be appointed by the Board.

Comments: Mr. Stoneham's report recommended that the Chairman be elected by the shareholders in general meetings from among the nominated Board members. I think, however, that the Nigerian position is acceptable.

Powers of Directors

Article 117: The business of the Cy shall be managed by the Directors who may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things as the Company is authorized to exercise and are not required to be exercised by the Cy in General Meeting.

Comments: Board's powers should be classified. Mr. Stoneham's report outlined as follows the Board's duties: to formulate the policy to be followed by NAB, to ensure management follows that policy, to receive from the General Manager, routine progress reports, to ensure that proper books of accounts are kept; to appoint the General Manager; to approve annual budgets, of income and expenditures to approve investment policy (for surplus fund); to approve the borrowing of any funds; to approve the interest rates to be charged on loans; to approve the borrowing of any funds; to approve the interest rates to be charged on loans; to approve all loans made to projects; to approve appointment and discharge of senior officers to be designated.

General Manager

 $\frac{\text{Article }118:}{\text{known as the General Manager}}$ The Directors shall from time to time appoint an officer to be

Comments: There should be provision for ensuring continuity of tenure and independence of action.

Accounts

Article 137: Once at least in every calendar year, the Directors shall lay before the Company in General Meeting a profit and loss account for the period since the preceding account and a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company made up to date not more than 9 months before the meeting.

Comments: The delay of 9 months is too long. According to Mr. Stoneham's report, the annual report should be forwarded to shareholders together with audited statements of accounts for the financial year under review within three months of the end of the financial year.

Audit

Article 142: Auditors shall be appointed and their duties regulated in accordance with Sections 152 and 155 of the Decree.

Comments: The last article of the decree has the number 151. It should be necessary to mention that accounts have to be audited by an independent firm of auditors to be appointed at shareholders' annual general meetings.

Conclusions and Follow-up

- 1. The Act of the NAB should be reviewed by a lawyer.
- 2. I suggest that we discuss with Area the opportunity of sending a mission in Nigeria in order to review with the Government the $D_{\rm r}$ before its finalization.

- During my recent mission to Nigeria I discussed the Nigerian Government's request for technical assistance for the proposed new Agricultural Development Bank. I gave Mr. Ayida, Permanent Secretary, Federal Ministry of Finance for approval, the list of firms that we would contact with a view to finding the three specialists. I also left with the Nigerian Government the draft letter to be sent to these firms and the terms of reference. Mr. Ayida in principle had no objection to our contacting the suggested firms. He further agreed that we should contact firms rather than individuals so as to have a homogeneous team to lead the new Bank. However, before he gives us the final decision of the Government, he wants to discuss this matter with Mr. Bukar Shaib, the Permanent Secretary of the Federal Ministry of Agriculture, who was not in Nigeria during the course of my mission. I have asked Mr. Burney to follow this matter up and we should be hearing from him in the very near future when I expect that the Government's approval of the proposed firms, the draft letter and terms of reference would be given.
- 2. I discussed the issue of only three specialists being requested when in the original proposal five were suggested -- the accountant and an agriculturalist being left out of the Government's request. Mr. Ayida. after talking with the Federal Ministry of Agriculture, informed me that the posts of accountant and agriculturalist will be filled by Nigerians. Hence, the request for expatriates for these positions was not made. At this point I would like to mention that Mr. Stoneham's report was very well received by the Nigerian Government and, in fact, when the Federal Executive Council approved the draft Memorandum and Articles of Association of the proposed Bank, it commended Mr. Stoneham for the help he had given the Nigerian Government.
- Turning to the status of the proposed Agricultural Development Bank, I enclose herewith the draft Memorandum and Articles of Association that was given to me by the Federal Ministry of Finance on a very confidential basis. I would appreciate it if you would treat it as such as this is the first time in our relations with the Nigerian Government that a draft of this type of document has been given to us at this early stage.
- The Memorandum and Articles of Association were prepared by the Ministry of Justice. After obtaining the preliminary approval of the FEC, the Memorandum and Articles of Association were circulated to the Ministries of Finance, Trade, Industry, and Economic Development and Reconstruction, and the Central Bank for comments. The comments of all the ministries

except those of the Federal Ministry of Finance have already been communicated to the Federal Ministry of Justice. The Federal Ministry of Finance has agreed with me that before it gives its comments it would await the Bank's views. After the Federal Ministry of Finance has acted, the Memorandum and Articles of Association would be shown to the Federal Executive Council and then registered under the Company and Banking Decrees. The registration under the Company Decree will be done by the Ministry of Trade, and by the Central Bank under the Banking Decree. I understand that the formation of this Bank would take place soon after our comments are given.

I would appreciate it if you could have someone look at the Memorandum and Articles of Association as quickly as possible and let me have your views. In view of the confidential nature of this document, I have agreed with the Federal Ministry of Finance that I would communicate our comments to the Bank's Resident Representative, who will hand them over to the Federal Ministry of Finance. Since he is going on home leave for a month on July 20, your prompt action on this matter will be appreciated.

In response to Mr. Chaufournier's memorandum to Mr. Evans of May 25, 1971, requesting the Bank's help in recruiting three officers (general manager, credit specialist, and agricultural economist) for the Agricultural Development Bank, a few points need to be clarified before we proceed any further. Maybe Gene Reese has some of the answers, but he is absent today from the Bank, and as you are leading this afternoon for Migeria, it is better that you take these matters up in Lagos.

- Gene Reese has received from Mr. Burney a copy of Government's letter addressed to the UNDP Special Fund, requesting assistance for the three above mentioned specialists. This progrem deviates from our original proposals which included also an accountant and an agriculturalist. Before we proceed, we would like to know the reasons why these two experts and/or functions have been omitted; maybe are they going to be filled by Nigerians. We feel quite strongly that at least the accountant should be included in the team.
- Another point which needs to be clarified is the status of the present agricultural bank. When will it be set up and what are the outstanding points before it will be set up? Could we have a copy of its proposed constitution? This is important in relation to the timing of recruiting the consultants.
- Once we are in agreement on the number of consultants to be recruited and the precise timing of the setting up of the bank, then we can proceed with the recruitment.
- With regard to the experts, I suggest that we contact firms rather than individuals so as to have an homogeneous team to lead this new bank. The following firms could be invited to make offers:

Terms of Reference

A. Objective

Agricultural Bank which has just been set up and to make it an effective lending institution in the field of agriculture. The Nigerian Agricultural Bank is an agricultural credit bank at Federal level. NAB will lend to State governments and institutions for agricultural credit projects within the States and will help to develop viable credit policies, projects and institutions.

A team of experts is required to provide technical expertise for the management of the Bank and for training local personnel in development banking techniques.

B. Operations

- 2. The experts will hold senior executive positions within the Agricultural Bank for an initial period of three years, during which time they will not only be responsible for the organization of the Bank and training of staff but also for the day-to-day operations of their respective departments. The experts will:
 - (a) advise and assist NAB's Board of Directors in formulating the policy for the organization, administration and development of NAB; plan and put into operation an accounting system;
 - (b) assume the management and executive responsibilities of NAB's operations;
 - (c) train Nigerian personnel to assume management of NAB,

- and train staff at all levels in all aspects of agricultural credit work;
- (d) with the approval of NAB's Board, advise and assist State governments and institutions in formulating credit policies and programs, and in the organization and administration of such policies; plan and implement an effective loan appraisal and evaluation system including drafting loan application forms and instituting form plans; plan and put into operation an effective collection system for loan repayments;
- (e) assist in the identification and preparation of agricultural credit projects appropriate for external financing in accordance with government policy;
- (f) establish working relationships with the Federal and State Governments, marketing boards, and all other bodies (national and international) and individuals engaged in agricultural development.

C. Duties of Experts

- (a) General Manager: responsible for the overall management
 of NAB and for advising the Board on its lending policies.
 He should have a record of successful management of a
 similar institution elsewhere;
- (b) Accountant: responsible for the accounts of NAB, including the accounting system and all accounting operations, the provision of statistical data to management, and the training of accounting and secretarial staff. He will also act as Company Secretary and Financial Advisor to the Board. He should have held a responsible accounting position in a similar institution elsewhere;

- (c) <u>Credit Specialist</u>: responsible for introducing and operating a suitable project appraisal and evaluation system, all credit aspects of NAB's operations, the provision of credit data to management and the training of credit staff. He should have had previous wide experience of credit work at farm level;
- (d) Agricultural Economist: responsible for all economic aspects of NAB's operations, including the provision of economic data to management and the training of field staff. He will assist the Credit Specialist in the appraisal and inspection of projects. He will also evaluate the results of lending operations. He should have had previous experience in relevant agricultural development work at farm level.

p. Addendum B. Following the reorganization of the country into 12 States (see 1.1 Map) in 1967, the responsibility for agricultural production and development devolved upon the State Governments, with the Federal Government retaining responsibility for coordination and research. Most of the State Governments, which are keen but inexperienced, are already working on development plans and reviewing their institutional problems. The objective of the present mission was to discuss with the Federal and State Governments and other interested parties the prospects of establishing a Federal agricultural bank; its finance, management, operations and relationship with the States.

- The bulk of Nigerian agricultural production is in food crops and 1.2 livestock for local consumption. The major crops (cocoa, cotton, groundnuts, palm produce and rubber) form only a small part of total production. Earning power of agricultural capital is low, and this has restricted the demand for capital and credit. Little is known of the total credit demand, but the bulk of it is currently met through moneylenders. Institutional credit has been tried in the past in a number of areas, but has not been successful. Some small credit programs are working in some of the States, and most of them are capable of some expansion.
- There is a fair measure of agreement among the States, with which 1.3 the Federal Government and the mission concurs, that the time is opportune to establish a Federal agricultural credit bank. It would lend for credit projects within the States and would exert a significant influence on the States in the formulation of sound credit policies and projects. Existing credit programs would be expanded and new ones introduced. Programs would be administered by the State, with the bank imposing its own terms and conditions and having the right to inspect progress. In most cases the States would guarantee loan repayment. The potential investors are the Federal Government, Central Bank and marketing boards, with the State Governments holding nominal shares. Management for the first three years would be through experienced consultants, who would provide five experts including the General Manager, for which the Federal Government is considering seeking UNDP/SF technical assistance.

- 1.4 The immediate steps to be taken by the Federal Government to set up the bank are to get the agreement of the potential investors to its constitution, capitalization, and operating and management policies. An outline for a draft constitution is at Annex 1, and proposals covering the other points to be agreed are included in this report. As soon as the bank is formed the Government should apply to UNDP/SF for assistance to obtain management consultants, and a draft application is at Annex 2.
- 1.5 It is unlikely that a project suitable for IBRD finance will emerge for a year or two. Meantime the mission recommends IBRD should:
 - (a) advise the Federal Government of the substance of this report;

(b) offer to give further advice and guidance in the establishment of the bank; and

(c) offer to act as executing agency for the UNDP/SF technical assistance program.

II. INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 The mission, consisting of Mr. A. H. Stoneham, visited Nigeria June 6 through 25, 1969. It held discussions with officials of the Federal Government and 11 of the 12 State Governments, and with a number of official and commercial organizations. It visited Lagos, Tbadan, Benin, Jos, Kano and Kaduna. Mr. N. McIvor, of the Western Africa Department, assisted in the final discussions in Lagos.
- 2.2 The mission's terms of reference were to discuss with the Federal and State Governments and other interested parties the possibility of establishing a Federal agricultural bank. Points requiring particular attention were:
 - (a) whether a new institution was required or any existing institution could be used;

(b) its sources of finance and staffing;

(c) the type and scope of its operations; and

(d) its relationship with existing credit arrangements in the States.

III. BACKGROUND

Agriculture

Almost all production comes from about 7 million farming families. The major food crops for local consumption are yam, cassava and cocoyam in the south, and maize, guinea corn, rice, millet and cowpeas in the north. In general, food production meets the needs of the population, and imports are very small. Livestock is of importance; most of the cattle is in the north, most of the swine in the south, and there are substantial numbers of goats, poultry and sheep in all States. Cocoa, groundnuts, palm produce and rubber are the major export crops and cotton the major import saving crop. Total agricultural production has probably remained static since 1964, but as a percentage of GDP it is estimated to have declined from 47 in 1964/65 to 43 in 1966/67.

Major crops (except rubber) are marketed through marketing boards, which have monopoly buying powers for specific crops produced in their State or group of States. The future of the marketing boards vis-a-vis the States and the Federation remains an unresolved constitutional issue. Food crops are distributed through local markets, which are poorly organized and capable of considerable improvement. In these markets, prices vary greatly depending on the extremely localized supply and demand. Responsibility for price stabilization programs (for food as well as major crops) has been with the marketing boards. The use of their funds for non-agricultural purposes (para 3.4) has in the past prevented any effective price stabilization programs. The States are beginning to show interest in such programs, particularly for food crops.

Agricultural Capital and Farm Incomes

- Nigerian agriculture uses relatively very small amounts of medium and long-term capital, despite the importance of its export crops. Use of power equipment and machinery is almost nil. There is little on-farm capital investment in fences, irrigation, wells, roads and buildings. Capital invested in palm, rubber, kola and fruit trees, cocoa bushes and livestock is relatively large, but the stock is often of poor quality.
- 3.4 Part of the earnings of the marketing boards has in the past been used as a source of revenue for the Federal and regional governments. The surpluses have mostly been transferred from agriculture to other sectors, mainly through investment in infrastructure expansion, and only a small part has been plowed back to agriculture via subsidized inputs, agricultural research and university instruction.
- 3.5 The earning power of capital invested in Nigerian agriculture is partly dependent on the taxation and pricing policies for export crops. Past policies have deliberately kept the price paid to the farmer low in relation to the export price and severely restricted the amount of agricultural earnings plowed back into the sector, so the return to the farmer has been very low, both in relation to the comparatively low levels of his capital investment and to returns from alternative sectors of the economy. This has inhibited the demand for capital for agricultural investment, which in its turn has kept down the demand for credit.
- 3.6 Cash incomes on the majority of small food crop farms are probably around NE 20 to 301/ (US\$ 55 to 85) a year, with a few of the more prosperous farms reaching up to ten times as much. An IBRD appraisal of a small-holder cocoa project in 1965 showed the average income for a farmer with $3\frac{1}{2}$ acres of cocoa in the Western State to be about NE 80 (US\$ 255) per year.

Agricultural Credit

3.7 Nigerian farmers have had access to credit for many centuries, particularly from local moneylenders, friends and families, who are still the chief sources. Institutional credit has been available for the past two or three decades, but has not been successful. Institutions have been formed in several regions, operated for a few years with limited or negligible success, then reorganized with much the same personnel and policies for

additional years of unsuccessful operation. Two are currently in operation, one each in the Western and Mid-West States, but neither has active credit programs, being only concerned with collecting old debts. Agricultural credit in the former Eastern Region was nominally provided by the Fund for Agricultural and Industrial Development, which proved ineffective. Since the start of the civil war it has ceased operations.

- 3.8 The agricultural cooperatives at present functioning throughout Nigeria reach less than 5% of the farming population. Most of them provide finance for marketing produce with varying degrees of success, but negligible credit for production purposes. In the north a production credit program has been operating through some of the cooperatives for some years, under which the regional government guaranteed approved loans made to cooperatives by a commercial bank to cover pre-season advances to farmers against crops controlled by the marketing board (mainly groundnuts, cotton and benniseed). In the recent past the program has worked relatively well. Total loans have not exceeded Nf 2.5 million (US\$ 7 million) in any one year, due mainly to the inability of the cooperatives to handle any greater sum with prudence. The program is being continued by the State Governments, but remains restricted. Under a new Federal law the cooperatives will in future have to borrow from the Central Bank instead of commercial banks, with State Government guarantees.
- There are some very small credit programs for the supply of fertilizer in some of the northern States. They are operated by the States, but hampered by lack of adequate funds, being financed from annual revenues. A tobacco manufacturer operates a small but successful credit program with groups of farmers in the Western State, supplying annual farm inputs which are paid for at the tobacco harvest. A small but successful program in the north has for some years provided animal drawn plows to individual farmers. It is administered by the Local Authorities who are responsible for loan collection and act as guarantors. Total capital involved is only NE 0.2 million. It is being continued to a limited extent in the Kano and North-Central States.

Interest Rates

Much of the credit from moneylenders does not bear interest in the accepted sense. Loans are either in cash or kind, the borrower usually giving a receipt for more than he received to cover the interest charge, which is usually somewhere between 24 and 50%. Commercial bank interest rates are at present 7½ per annum prime rate. The Central Bank's rediscount rate is ½%, and it lends to marketing boards at 6%. Rate for savings deposits is from 3½ to 4%, depending on time. Cooperative banks lend at 8 to 10% to the unions, who on-lend at 12 to 15% to societies, who on-lend at 18 to 20% to members.

Credit Demand

3.11 It is not possible to estimate the current agricultural credit demand throughout the country due to lack of data. The demand for capital for investment in agriculture is unlikely to increase until more of the income from the sector is used for agricultural development and for stabilizing

prices, particularly of food crops, and more is passed back to the farmer. Until the return from agricultural production is made more attractive to the farmer, on-farm capital development will remain restricted, and the demand for medium and long term credit will remain relatively small. This in its turn will restrict the demand for short term credit.

- 3.12 More enlightened commodity buying policies are being tried in three States. The production of cotton in North-Central State increased by 40% between 1967 and 1968, and in 1969 is expected to be twice the 1967 production. This has been achieved simply by announcing the buying price before the planting season has started, and has been mainly due to increases in acreage planted. Had fertilizer been available on credit, yields could also have been improved. In the long run production increases of this magnitude will have to come from increased yields and will require short term credit. The recent 50% increase in the buying price for cocoa (from N£ 100 to N£ 150 per ton) has stimulated considerable interest in cocoa replanting in the Western and Mid-Western States. Replanting programs will require medium term credit. These indicate that credit demand can be stimulated by suitable commodity pricing policies.
- 3.13 Given government policies which provide a reasonable return on capital to farmers, a measure of price stability for export and food crops, and a reasonable agricultural infrastructure, the demand for agricultural credit could be greatly increased. Mechanization is in its infancy, and even a change from the ubiquitous hand hoe to simple animal drawn implements would produce a large credit demand. Rehabilitiation schemes for tree crops (which would include improved plants and fertilizer application) and production improvement plans for annual export and food crops (which would include fertilizer and improved seeds) would also generate a large demand.
- 3.14 The extent to which any increased credit demand could be met in future depends on many factors. The former credit institutions had to contend with both external and internal problems. Externally, these included inadequate marketing arrangements, fluctuations in the price of crops, inadequate extension services and poor liaison with them, and the lack of security for loans, which meant a burden of overdue debts. Internally, their main problems were with management and staffing. A lack of efficient top management, trained staff, and training programs at all levels seriously retarded progress. The task of management was made more difficult through: (2) interference by some boards in purely management affairs: (b) the imposition of unsound financial and credit policies for political reasons; (c) cumbersome loan procedures; and (d) the imposition of unsuitable and uncooperative local credit committees between the borrower and the credit institution.
- 3.15 In the immediate future most of the external problems are likely to continue to be met, whatever the credit demand and whatever method of getting credit to farmers is used. Their solution will require careful cooperation and coordination between the Federal and State Governments, the marketing boards and others concerned with agricultural development. Most of the internal problems can be overcome by starting up a Federal credit bank in the first instance, prepared to lend to States for agricultural credit projects, provided: (a) its constitution insulates it from political interference; (b) it is given adequate finance and sound operating policies; and (c) it is provided with experienced management of high quality.
- 3.16 There appears to be a genuine desire at all levels to make the new Federal-State relationship work in the agricultural sector. Steady progress can be expected in marketing, price stabilization, and improvement to the extension services. The creation of a Federal credit bank on the above lines

is thus opportune. While its start will undoubtedly be modest and its progress slow for the first year or two, its establishment is fully justified.

3.17 During 1966, prior to the formation of the States, the Consortium for the Study of Nigerian Rural Development made a credit study 1/2 at the request of the Federal Government, and recommended that a Federal credit bank be formed to provide credit to farmers and institutions. The bank would have been financed mainly from Federal funds and would have operated as a Federal institution in all areas and at all levels. With the formation of the States the proposals became completely unworkable. The proposals which follow take into account the existing Federal-State relationship.

IV. THE NIGERIAN AGRICULTURAL BANK

The Case for a Federal Bank

The responsibility for agriculture and its development belongs to the State Governments, and for coordination and research to the Federal Government. It is important that this division of responsibilities should remain in the agricultural credit sector, otherwise existing political problems would be intensified. Most of the States interviewed by the mission were keen to start their own credit institutions or to improve existing ones. The mission pointed out the almost impossible task of finding competent management for up to twelve State institutions and a Federal institution at one and the same time. There was a fair measure of agreement that if a strong Federal bank with highly competent management could be started in the first instance, it would be able to give help and guidance to the States in starting up their own institutions as their credit demands became big enough to support the costs of management. At the start it would concentrate on improving and expanding the present limited credit programs. The Federal and many or the State Governments were agreed that the role of the Federal bank should be to lend money for credit projects which would be administered by the States of State institutions. Each project would be considered separately on its own merits. The Federal bank would have the right to impose separate terms and conditions for each project and to inspect its progress, and in most cases would require a State Government guarantee for repayment of advances made under it. There was less agreement on ownership and financing of a Federal bank. The States wanted strong State participation in its ownership and direction, but only nominal participation in its financing. The Federal Government wanted direction to remain with them, and finance to come mainly from the Central Bank and marketing boards. A possible compromise is suggested below (para 4.6).

4.2 The fair measure of agreement between the Federal and State Governments on the role of a Federal bank is very encouraging, and augers well for the future. Until the constitutional problem of the financial relationship between the Federal and State Governments has been finally settled, there is bound to be a strong financial dependence on the Federal Government by the State Governments. This should strengthen the role of a Federal bank in the early formative years of its existence. Provided it starts with the best available management it should be able to set high standards of project formulation and execution, and have a favorable influence on the credit

policies of State Governments. While it is impossible at this stage to forecast its volume of lending over the next few years, and no rapid expansion of credit appears likely in the near future, nevertheless, a start should be made as soon as possible. The sooner such a bank is started up, the sooner will it be possible to guide the generally keen but inexperienced State Governments towards sound credit policies.

A New Institution

- there are at present no Federal institutions directly concerned with finance for agriculture. Three alternatives are possible: (a) a development institution, responsible for financing projects (by loan or equity) and for managing some of them; (b) a finance institution responsible for financing projects (by loan or equity) but not their management; or (c) a credit institution, making only loans for projects. These alternatives were discussed, but the Federal Government prefers a credit institution for the time being, able to make loans to small and large farmers, as well as to groups of farmers and companies. Although it would be a Federal agricultural credit bank, the government would prefer the words "Federal" and "Credit" to be excluded from its title. A suitable name has yet to be agreed, but it is referred to as the "Nigerian Agricultural Bank" (NAB) in the rest of this report.
- 4.4 For the past few years, the possibility of the Central Bank opening up an agricultural section has been discussed within Nigeria. The Central Bank has however expressed a strong preference for a separate institution, but is prepared to invest in it and help it in every possible way. In present circumstances a new institution is preferable, provided it receives help and guidance from the Central Bank. Provisions are made below for the Central Bank to be represented on NAB's Board, to subscribe almost half the equity, and to provide rediscount facilities. The Central Bank would receive monthly returns from NAB, as required under the Banking Act from commercial banks, which would give it a fair measure of supervision over NAB's financial affairs.
- The main constitutional requirements are that NAB should be free from political interference, and have efficient management that is able to function with enough flexibility to meet changing circumstances. It should not therefore come into being through a short "enabling" Act, which merely sets it up but empowers a Minister to make whatever regulations he considers necessary for its operation, since this would invite political interference. Nor should comprehensive legislation, which purports to deal with every aspect of policy and management, be enacted, since this would inhibit successful management. The objective must be to set up an institution under which the responsibilities of the Board of Directors and of management are clearly defined, and under which management can act decisively under the Board's direction. Although private capital is unlikely to participate, NAB might be set up under the Companies Act rather than by separate legislation, since this should insulate it from political interference and would contain safeguards for a satisfactory relationship between shareholders, the Board and management. A suggested outline of a draft constitution, which covers these and points made subsequently, is at Annex 1, from which an experienced lawyer should be able to produce suitable Memorandum and Articles of Association. Should NAB be set up by legislation, the main points in the draft would remain valid.

Finance and Board Representation

The problems of finance and Board representation are interrelated. The State Governments want participation in NAB's policies, but their limited budgets preclude anything but nominal financial support. The Federal Government wants direction to remain with itself, with finance coming mainly from the Central Bank and marketing boards (para 4.1). State participation is essential to NAB's success, and without it States may try and undertake credit programs on their own without expert guidance and with little chance of success. The States must feel that NAB is their credit bank. At the same time, wholehearted participation by the marketing boards is essential, not only to obtain their funds and their cooperation where possible in collecting loan repayments, but also because in the past they have been too remote from the production on which their prosperity depends. They must be brought as close as possible to it, and to the problems of the farmers who are responsible for it. Export crops are not produced in all States, so that too dominant a role by the marketing boards in the direction of NAB's affairs would tend to alienate the non-exporting States. The cooperation and expertise of the Central Bank and the Federal Government are also essential to NAB's success.

4.7 A compromise will be required to bring these conflicting requirements together. As to direction of NAB, the Federation (represented by the Government and Central Bank) should hold a small majority of voting shares to retain control, and the State Governments and marketing boards should hold the balance. As to finance, the bulk can be expected to come from the Central Bank (equity plus rediscounting facilities), the Federal Government (equity plus some loan funds) and marketing boards (equity plus loan funds). The following compromise (which has not yet been discussed in detail between the parties concerned) is suggested:

(a) a small number of "A" shares, with voting rights, giving the Federal Government 36% and the Central Bank 15% (making 51% between them), the State Governments 36% between them, and the marketing boards 13% between them, together with;

(b) a large number of "B" shares, non-voting, apportioned as considered appropriate between the Federal Government,

Central Bank and marketing boards.

Board representation would then be on the basis of "A" shares held, and might be Federal Government 3, Central Bank 2, State Governments 3, and marketing boards 1. This would give a Board of 9, which would not be so large as to be unmanageable. State Governments would require an agreement among themselves, and the marketing boards likewise, to arrange for nomination of their representatives.

Capital

4.8 The Federal Government intends to earmark N£ 6 million (US\$ 14 million) for NAB over the next five years (1969/74). This includes contributions to equity and long term loan by the Federal Government, Central Bank and marketing boards, but excludes seasonal funds. A suggested capital structure to meet the first stage of development would be:

Additionally, the Central Bank would provide rediscounting facilities for short term borrowings up to an amount to be agreed, probably NE 4 million on the above structure. The proposals would be subject to the following safeguards:

(a) "A" shares to be subscribed in full on formation;

(b) calls on "B" shares to be made as required to meet financial commitments;

(c) no medium/long term borrowings to be made until NAB's income was equal to its expenditure over a six-month period;

(d) medium/long term borrowings to be made pro-rata among the three lenders up to a total of NE 4 million, and/or until other financial institutions were prepared to lend part of the total;

(e) medium/long term borrowings not to exceed twice the paidup capital until the whole of the NE 2 million has been subscribed, thereafter not to exceed four times the paidup capital; and

(f) short term borrowings not to exceed 75% of the value of paper discounted, until a higher figure had been agreed with the Central Bank.

On this basis, once the total equity had been subscribed, NAB would have access to total funds of NE 16 million, or more if the Central Bank was prepared to increase its rediscount facilities. Of this, NE 10 million would come from the main investors, and the balance would be sought from other sources, including external institutions.

Operating Policies

- 4.9 Main operating policies of NAB should include:
 - (a) making loans for agricultural production purposes to any State, group of States, or any State institution for on-lending to any farmer, group of farmers or body corporate, subject to the State or group of States guaranteeing repayment of the loan;

(b) making loans for agricultural production purposes direct to any farmer, group of farmers or body corporate where adequate security was forthcoming, but subject to the approval of the appropriate State Government; (c) all loans made under (a) and (b) above being on a project-by-project basis, with NAB having the right to impose terms and conditions, to have access to all data, and to inspect the progress in the field, for each loan;

(d) charging interest rates on all loans that were sufficiently high to meet the full costs of management (including debt service), and to allow adequate sums to be set aside for general and bad debts reserves before paying any dividends to shareholders;

(e) advising State Governments and institutions on credit policies and helping them to prepare projects.

The above policies should enable NAB to operate with the minimum of staff in the first instance, and to maximize the use of State Government technical staff at State and farm level (para 4.12). It is not possible at this stage to suggest what the interest rates should be; these must depend on the costs of management, the rates charged on NAB's borrowings, and the dividend policy on NAB's shares. Farmers at present pay high interest rates (para 3.10) so there should be no difficulty in charging realistic rates to States and for them to charge farmers at rates which would cover their operating expenses. Some general agreement to the above policies among the share subscribers would be desirable at the time NAB was formed.

4.10 The tendency of a few States to expect NAB to allocate available funds to individual States (whether on a per capita or any other basis) must be resisted. All parties should agree prior to NAB's formation that available funds would be allocated to viable projects as they were approved by NAB's Board after appraisal, from whatever State they came. All States would be free to put forward projects at any time, and these would rank for appraisal in order as received. Any imbalance in projects from individual States could best be rectified by NAB's management giving more encouragement and aid with project preparation to the less progressive States.

Management

While experienced Nigerians can be found in commercial banking, none is immediately available with experience in successful agricultural credit institutions. All parties were agreed that it would be necessary to recruit experienced management from overseas to start up NAB, and that Nigerian counterparts would be trained to take over management as soon as possible. Suitable counterparts could be recruited for training without difficulty. It was agreed to consider an approach to UNDP for funds to provide technical assistance through consultants who would supply the initial management, consisting of five experts for three years. A draft application is at Annex 2. The provisional estimated cost is NE 340,000 (US\$ 950,000), of which it is proposed NE 250,000 (US\$ 708,000) as a contribution from the UNDP Special Fund, and the balance NE 90,000 (US\$ 242,000) and the executing agency for this technical assistance program. The five experts

would consist of: (a) a General Manager, with experience in successful management of a credit institution elsewhere; (b) an Accountant who would act as Company Secretary and Financial Advisor; (c) a Credit Specialist with experience at farm level; (d) an Agriculturist; and (e) an Agricultural Economist. Full details of the duties and qualifications of the experts are in Annex 2.

- When a request for a project loan was received by NAB, an appraisal 4.12 team consisting of the credit specialist, agriculturist and economist would appraise the project, having previously given assistance in its preparation where necessary. The project would be considered by management which would impose such terms and conditions as considered necessary. The main objective would be to use State personnel to operate the project, including where appropriate, preparation of farm plans, provision of extension and other technical services, provision of farm inputs, and collection of farmers! debts. After negotiation with the State Government (or other borrower) the project would be put up for Board approval. 1/ At this stage it is not possible to estimate the rate at which suitable projects would come forward, but based on available evidence the three-man appraisal team should be adequate for the first year or so of operations, particularly since peak lending seasons vary between the States. During this period, counterparts would be in training, and it should be possible to build up sufficient counterpart teams to deal with future expansion. The appraisal team would also inspect the progress of the project after it got underway.
- u.13 Only a small administrative staff would be required at headquarters, mainly bookkeepers, clerks and secretaries. The major expense apart from salaries would be for travelling, which would be quite high for the senior staff. It is not recommended that a representative of NAB be appointed to each State until the volume of work in that State justifies the expense of a full time executive. It is quite impossible to estimate NAB's profitability for the first few years, and income and expenditure estimates have not been included. However, if UNDP meets the cost of technical assistance, the cost of counterpart staff, clerical staff, office accommodation and administration, etc., should be relatively small.

Operations

4.14 Although it is not possible to forecast the demand for loans, it is likely it will come from the States in the first instance, rather than direct from creditworthy farmers or companies. Under current regulations the Central Bank has to provide the funds for fertilizer to some of the northern States for on-lending to cooperatives under guarantee (para 3.8). It is possible this responsibility could be transferred to NAB under rediscount facilities with the Central Bank. This would be replacement of the source of finance rather than development, but would be useful and suitable work for

It would be for Board to decide whether the smaller loans should be approved by a Loans Committee, consisting of, say, three Board members and the General Manager, and whether the General Manager should be empowered to approve the smallest loans, without prior reference to Board.

- 12 -NAB. There is considerable scope for steady expansion of the programs for supplying fertilizer in some of the northern States (para 3.9), particularly if operated in conjunction with a guaranteed buying price for cotton and groundnuts. The small program for supplying plows to Local Authorities in the northern States (para 3.9) might also be expanded fairly steadily, particularly in Kano and North-Eastern States. The IBRD has under consideration a smallholder cocoa development project in the Western State, whose total cost is likely to be of the order of NE 6 million (US\$ 17 million) of which about one-half would be for medium term credit to farmers. It might be possible to channel any IBRD/IDA finance for this project through MAB. A project to rehabilitate oil palms in the Mid Western State is also under consideration by its government. The USAID is considering giving technical assistance to the agricultural credit corporation in the Western State. If this materializes, and the corporation can be made into an active credit institution, there should be good scope for NAB help in financing some of its projects. NAB should in due course advise the Mid-Western State Government on the future of its credit corporation. The Role of the IBRD The demand for finance from NAB is likely for the first year or so to be mainly short term, which it should be able to meet from its own resources. At a later date when the demand for medium term credit gets to a reasonable size, there should be scope for IBRD to consider lending for medium term credit projects sponsored by NAB. In the meantime, it is recommended below (para 5.2) that IBRD's role be limited to general guidance in getting NAB started, and to acting as the executing agency for the UNDP/SF technical assistance program. V. RECOMMENDATIONS With the exception of Board representation and shareholdings, there is broad agreement between the Federal and State Governments and the Central Bank on the main issues involved in setting up NAB, although they have yet to be discussed in detail with the marketing boards. The Federal Government is anxious to get NAB started early in the new year. It is recommended that as soon as possible the Federal Government starts negotiations with the State Governments, Central Bank and marketing boards to get their agreement on the setting up of NAB. The main points on which detailed agreement will be required are: name of bank (4.3); constitution and whether to be set up under the Companies Act or by legislation (4.5 and Annex 1); capitalization and Board representation (4.7); separate agreements between State Governments and between marketing boards on the method of choosing their Board representatives (4.7); operating policies (4.9 and 4.10); and management policy and application under UNDP/SF technical assistance program (4.11 and Annex 2),

5.2 It is recommended that IBRD should agree to:

 (a) advise the Federal Government as early as possible of the substance of this report;

(b) offer to give further advice and guidance in the

establishment of NAB;

(c) offer to comment on the draft constitution, capitalization, and other major points, once agreement between the parties has been reached; and

(d) act as executing agency for the UNDP/SF technical assistance

program.

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A PROPOSED DRAFT CONSTITUTION FOR THE NIGERIAN AGRICULTURAL BANK

Company would be formed as a private company under the Companies Act (Cap 37), with restrictions on the transfer of its shares. The Articles of Association would include the following points:

- (a) <u>Incorporation</u>: to be a body corporate with perpetual succession and a common seal;
- (b) Board: to be limited to nine members, to be appointed in accordance with para 4.7;
- (c) Chairman: to be elected by the shareholders in general meeting from among the nominated Board members, and to have a casting vote in the event of a tie;
- (d) Board meetings: to be held as required, with a minimum of six per year. Five members to be a quorum, provided at least one each representing the Federal Government the State Governments and the Central Bank is present;
- (e) Members' alternates: each member to be allowed to appoint an alternate (in writing). Such alternate to have the same powers as the member when attending meetings on his behalf:
- (f) Members' remuneration: members not to be paid any fees, but only reasonable travelling and out of pocket expenses when attending Board meetings or performing duties on behalf of NAB;
- (g) Board's duties: to formulate the policy to be followed by NAB; to ensure management follows that policy; to receive from the General Manager routine progress reports; to ensure that proper books of account are kept; to ensure minutes of Board meetings are kept; to appoint and discharge the General Manager; to approve annual budgets of income and expenditure; to approve investment policy (for surplus funds); to approve the borrowing of any funds; to approve the interest rates to be charged on loans; to approve all loans made to projects; to approve appointment and discharge of senior officers (to be designated);

- (h) Powers: NAB to have all the powers necessary to carry out its functions, including:to sue or be sued in its corporate name; to acquire, hold and dispose of property; to borrow money (subject to limitations in (i) below); to enter into contracts; to accept and acquire securities; to make, draw and accept negotiable instruments; to write off bad debts; to purchase plant equipment and stores; and to advance the skills of its employees;
- (i) Capital: initial fixed capital to be £ 2 million, made up of 100 "A" shares of £ 1,000 each carrying voting rights at shareholders' meetings, and 1,900 "B" shares of £ 1,000 each, without voting rights; all to be allocated as agreed among the subscribers (para 4.8). "A" shares to be fully paid up on formation of NAB. Calls on "B" shares, and limitations as to borrowings to be in accordance with para 4.8;
- (j) Share transfers: to be restricted: before selling to outsiders, shares to be offered to existing shareholders pro rata their shareholdings or otherwise as agreed;
- (k) Annual Report: report to be forwarded to shareholders, together with audited statements of accounts for the financial year under review, within three months of the end of the financial year;
- (1) Audit: accounts to be audited by an independent firm of auditors, they to be appointed at shareholders' annual general meetings;
- (m) Management: (i) the General Manager; to be the chief executive officer with ultimate responsibility for carrying out the decisions of the Board; to be entitled to attend all Board Meetings; to have the necessary powers for disciplinary control of staff. (ii) the Accountant to be Secretary of the company with duties as laid down under the Companies Act;
- (n) Employees: NAB to make rules for its employees and to set up a fund for pensions, gratuities and retirement allowances, the benefits to be not less favorable than those of Government employees.

Other points not included above to be in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act.

A DRAFT APPLICATION TO UNDP/SF FOR TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

NIGERIAN AGRICULTURAL BANK

I INTRODUCTION

- The Federal Republic of Nigeria hereby request the 1.1 assistance of the United Nations Development Program Special Fund in financing a technical assistance program designed to provide for the management of the Nigerian Agricultural Bank (NAB), which has just been set up, during its formative years. The program arises from the desire of the Federal Government and the recently formed State governments to establish an agricultural credit bank at Federal level. NAB will lend to State governments and institutions for agricultural credit projects within the States, and will help them to develop viable credit policies, projects and institu-The principal investors in NAB are the Federal and State governments, the Central Bank and marketing boards. They appreciate that if NAB is to become an effective credit institution, management will have to be entrusted to experienced international consultants for the first three years of its existence. No experienced Nigerians are presently available for the senior management positions, although suitable persons for counterpart training can be found.
- 1.2 A provisional estimate of the cost of the program is US\$ 950,000 (NE 340,000), of which about three fifths, US\$ 550,000 (NE 196,000), will be foreign exchange. Cost will cover the consultants' fee, 5 experts in the field, counterparts and their operating expenses. NAB will meet the cost of counterparts and their travel, and provide office accommodation and equipment, estimated to be about US\$ 200,000, plus a contribution of US\$ 42,000 (about 15%) towards local operating costs of foreign staff. UNDP is asked to provide the balance of US\$ 708,000 from the Special Fund.

II BACKGROUND

2.1 The total population of Nigeria is about 55 to 60 million. About 80% of the total labor force is employed in agriculture, and there are over θ_2 million farming families. The bulk of agricultural production is in foodcrops and livestock for local consumption.

The major crops (cocoa, cotton, ground-nuts, palm produce and rubber) are only and a small part of total production. Agricultural production has probably remained static since 1964, but as a percentage of GDP it is estimated to have declined from 47 in 1964/65 to 43 in 1966/67. Food crops are marketed locally, export crops through the marketing boards. Earning power of agricultural capital is relatively low, which has restricted the demand for new capital and for credit.

- 2.2 Moneylenders remain the chief source of agricultural credit. Credit institutions have not generally been successful, and none are operating efficiently at the present time, although plans to reorganize the one in the Western State are under consideration. Some small schemes for short term credit through cooperatives are working in some of the northern states. No data is available on which to estimate the total credit demand.
- 2.3 The 12 States were set up just over 2 years ago, replacing the four former regions. While their Governments are keen, they are at present relatively inexperienced. Most have already started work on agricultural development plans, which include credit programs. NAB's main benefit will be to help the States develop their credit programs and policies on sound lines, and to help to restructure existing State institutions or start new ones as soon as the credit demand becomes sufficiently large to make them viable. NAB will act as a channel for Federal funds to these institutions, and in the meantime will lend funds direct to State Governments for credit projects. Projects will be administered by the States, but NAB will impose its own terms and conditions for loans, and have the right to inspect progress at field level. For the time being most loans will be made with the State Government guaranteeing repayment.
- NAB's capital structure will include NE 2.0 million (US\$ 5.6 million) in equity shares, of which NE 0.1 million in voting shares and NE 1.9 million in non-voting shares. 51% of the voting shares will be jointly held by the Federal Government and the Central Bank, and the balance by the State governments and marketing boards. The Federal Government, Central Bank and marketing boards, will provide

between them NE 1.9 million in non-voting shares and a further NE 4.0 million in medium/long term loans. The Central Bank will provide up to NE 4.0 million in rediscounting facilities. The Board of Directors will be 9 members reflecting the holdings in voting shares, with the Federal Government and Central Bank together having the right to appoint 5 of them.

III PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

- 3.1 The program will provide for the appointment of consultants who will employ a team of five experts for a three year period to occupy the senior management positions in NAB. The objective will be to make NAB an effective lending institution at Federal level in the field of agriculture. To this end the consultant's team will:
 - (a) advise and assist NAB's Board of Directors in formulating the policy for the organisation, administration and development of NAB;
 - (b) assume the management and executive responsibilities of NAB's operations;
 - (c) train Nigerian personnel to assume management of NAB at the end of three years, and train staff at all levels in all aspects of agricultural credit work;
 - (d) with the approval of NAB's Board, advise and assist State governments and institutions in formulating credit policies and programs, and in the organisation and administration of such policies;
 - (e) assist in the identification and preparation of agricultural credit projects appropriate for external financing;
 - (f) establish working relationships with the Federal and State Governments, marketing boards, and all other bodies (national and international) and individuals engaged in agricultural development.
- 3.2 The main duties of the five experts, and their previous background and experience will be:

- (a) General Manager: responsible for the overall management of NAB and for advising the Board on its lending policies. He should have a record of successful management of a similar institution elsewhere;
- (b) Accountant: responsible for the accounts of NAB, including the accounting system and all accounting operations, the provision of statistical data to management, and the training of accounting and secretarial staff. He will also act as Company Secretary and Financial Advisor to the Board. He should have held a responsible accounting position in a similar institution elsewhere;
- (c) Credit Specialist: responsible for introducing and operating a suitable project appraisal and evaluation system, all credit aspects of NAB's operations, the provision of credit data to management and the training of credit staff. He will also lead a team, which will include the Agriculturist and Agricultural Economist, in the appraisal and inspection of projects. He should have had previous wide experience of credit work at farm level;
- (d) Agriculturalist: responsible for all agricultural aspects of NAB's operations, including the provision of agricultural data to management and the training of agricultural staff. He will also assist the Credit Specialist and Agricultural Economist in the appraisal and inspection of projects. He should have previous experience in relevant agricultural development work at farm level;
- (e) Agricultural Economist: responsible for all economic aspects of NAB's operations, including the provision of economic data to management and the training of field staff. He will assist the Credit Specialist and Agriculturalist in the appraisal and inspection of projects. He will also evaluate the results of lending operations. He should have had previous experience in relevant agricultural development work at farm level.

IV PROGRAM TIME SCHEDULE AND REPORTS

4.1 Immediately upon approval of the program suitable firms of consultants will be invited to put forward their proposals, and in due course, a contract will be made with the selected consultants and a plan of operations agreed. The consultants will appoint the five experts as soon as possible thereafter, and the experts will serve in Nigeria for three years.

4.2 The consultants will submit an Inception Report three months after appointment, summarizing their initial findings and outlining any proposals for revision of the work program. Thereafter progress reports will be submitted at three-monthly intervals, an Interim Report after 18 months and a Final Report at the end of the three year period.

V PROGRAM FINANCE

5.1 A provisional estimate of the cost of the program is US\$ 950,000 (NE 340,000), detailed in Addendum B attached. It is proposed be met as follows:



NIGERIA - Agricultural Credit Review -SUBJECT: Back-to-Office Report

- The mission visited Nigeria June 6 through 25. It held discussions with the Federal and 11 of the 12 State Governments, and with a number of official and commercial organisations. It visited Lagos, Ibadan, Benin, Jos and Kaduna. Mr. N McIvor, of the Western Africa Department assisted in the final discussions in Lagos.
- Although most of the States have been in existence for little more than a year, and their governments are relatively inexperienced, the pace of development can be expected to increase significantly in future. There is now a much closer contact between the States and their people, and the chances of successful development appear good. Agriculture is the responsibility of the State Governments, and most of them are working on agricultural development plans (some with technical assistance from USAID).
- The future demand for agricultural credit is difficult to assess, but the Federal and State Governments are keen to start a Federal Agricultural Bank (FAB), and in the mission's view the present time appears opportune. FAB would lend to State Governments for specific projects, which would be appraised and supervised by FAB, but executed by State Governments. FAB would also lend direct to larger farmers and plantations, against adequate security. Much of the initial demand is likely to come from small farmers for short-term credits, mainly for fertilizers and seeds. Funds required cannot be assessed at this stage, but the Federal Government (with Central Bank cooperation) has set aside NE3 million (US\$8.4 million) for the first three years, which should be more than adequate to get FAB started. State Governments have expressed a strong desire to be directly represented on the Board of FAB, but the Federal Government would prefer representation through Marketing Boards. This will require further discussion among the Governments, as will FAB's precise capitalisation and shareholdings.
- The Federal Government is committed to setting up FAB by the end of this year, if possible, and has asked for Bank advice and assistance. It has accepted that technical assistance will be essential for success, and the mission feels it would be appropriate to seek this through UNDP/SF. The most urgent requirement is to outline the immediate and essential steps for the Federal Government to take. These will be included in the full report, and should be passed on to the Government at an early date. At this stage no loan/credit would be required from Bank/IDA, although lending programs suitable for Bank/IDA finance could be expected to be developed within three years.
