It was good of you to ask me, but I am afraid that I am not really the appropriate one to comment on the matter. One reason is that in my present position as an international civil servant, heading a U.N. development agency with 139 member nations, it is just not correct for me to comment on the military policies of any of these countries, including my own.

But even were that not the case, there is another reason why I have personally refrained from commenting on the Vietnam issue. And that is that I do not believe that anyone deeply involved in a matter of that complexity can be wholly objective about his own role. I believe that now, and I believed it then. And it was because of that belief that prior to leaving the Defense Department I directed that the original records be compiled so that historians and others would have the opportunity to study them, and draw their own conclusions.

That collection came later to be called, "The Pentagon Papers," and serves as an important source for forming an independent judgment about the issues.

It is encouraging that you and those you are trying to help, and other concerned individuals everywhere, discuss these questions, and try to arrive at balanced judgments. That is what freedom of inquiry is all about, and it is a very precious and essential freedom for us all.
