EGYPT: Research Proposal to be Undertaken in Coordination with CAPMAS

- Mr. Picciotto telephoned on September 22, 1978 to thank the Department for making Mr. Diaz available to the Research Committee for its discussions on the above proposal. Notwithstanding some lingering reservations, the Committee had decided to approve the proposal. He said, however, that he would like the assistance of this Department in monitoring the proposal over time to provide a link between the results of the research project and possible application of the results in the Egypt population program. I agreed that we would assist in providing this linkage. We were planning in any event, I said, to engage a consultant to help us to define more precisely the details of the research and evaluation and training components of the Second Egypt Population Project. We would explore the possibility of selecting a consultant who could also assist in drawing the operational linkages with the research project. This would require the consultant to be available at periodic intervals over the duration of the research project. In addition, as his operational assignments permit, Mr. Diaz would also monitor the implementation of the research project.
- 2. Dr. Ranganathan and Mr. Diaz will suggest names of possible consultants for this task.

#### R602 - Petroleum and Gas in Non-OPEC Developing Countries

Developing domestic supplies of energy has become a major concern of oil importing countries. The increased oil prices since 1973 have changed the relative economics of domestic versus imported sources. Prior to 1973, only about 10 of the oil importing developing countries (OIDCs) produced commercial quantities of oil. By 1977, ten additional OIDCs have announced commercial discoveries of oil and gas and are entering the stage of production. Furthermore, in about 35 other OIDCs exploration activities are intensifying.

Recognizing the need for an increased Bank role in this sector, the Board in July 1977 approved Report No. 1588 on Minerals and Energy in the Developing Countries. Subsequently, in December 1977, management approved a five-year Oil and Gas Lending Program and Energy Sector Work which forms part of the Regional Lending Program for FY78-82. This Report was prepared in November 1977 as essential background for the justification of the proposed program.

The Report, issued as PUN-35 in February 1978, provides updated projections of petroleum production, consumption and associated investment requirements through 1985. A second part consists of three annexes:

Annex A covers in greater detail recent developments in oil and gas by region and by country, covering 90 non-OPEC countries; Annex B classifies these non-OPEC developing countries into categories by income and status of oil and gas development; and Annex C consists of summary projections of production, consumption and investment requirements to 1985, total and by region.

## R609 A Preliminary Study on Energy Needs and Possibilities for the Poor of the Developing Countries

A central concern of the World Bank is to assist in providing a certain minimum of basic services to the poor of the developing world. Energy is included among these services both as an integral part of everyday living and an essential ingredient in raising living standards. Though this role of energy is widely recognized there is little systematic information available on the level and quality of energy services at present being delivered to the poor.

This study, which is designed to assist in defining those areas in which further research is needed, consists primarily of an extensive literature search on:

- a) The energy consumption patterns of the urban and rural poor;
- b) Supply and conservation options; and
- c) Energy strategies.

A final draft is now being reviewed in the Department.

## R609 - An Approach to Planning and Implementing Rural Energy Projects (Report on a Pilot Exercise in Colombia)

Adequate supply of rural energy is being recognized as a major development problem. Non-commercial fuels such as fuelwood, agricultural waste and animal dung are now often the only energy sources available in rural areas and are becoming increasingly insufficient to meet rising rural energy demand for basic needs as well as production activities. Moreover, large scale rural use of these fuels is causing widespread deforestation and soil erosion.

A Rural Energy Planning Exercise was initiated in Colombia in May 1977. Our objective was to develop a practical approach for identifying, preparing and implementing rural energy projects and programs. The first phase involved qualitative studies in selected rural areas to define the relationship between energy and rural development. The second phase involves the detailed preparation of rural energy plans, development and testing of rural energy equipment, and implementation of pilot projects in selected rural areas to test the institutional and infrastructure requirements for a large-scale rural energy project.

The fundamental aspect of this approach is to rely almost completely on local expertise and institutions for the design and execution of these projects and most of the work here described has in fact been carried out by the Colombians. This report discusses the Bank's role so far, and proposes directions for future work; although it deals with the specific case of Colombia, it provides an approach applicable in most other LDCs. The first part of the report outlines the approach that has been developed. The second part deals in greater detail with the specific activities carried out in Colombia.

Report issued as PUN-34 in January 1978.

## R609 Energy for Development

This study developed methods of forecasting the demand for energy in developing countries. A feature of the study was the emphasis given to describing and forecasting the demand for non-commercial fuels in rural areas. Some idea of the predominant importance of non-commercial energy in overall energy use in developing countries is given, and an examination of basic energy needs is also presented.

Report issued as PUN-43 in August 1978.

#### R610 - Design of Low-Cost Water Distribution Systems

Designers of water distribution systems have not had available simple analysical tools with which to test the effect on system costs of various design assumptions. In consequence, secondary distribution networks have often been designed by rule of thumb without a full appreciation of the effects of the designer's decisions. The effects of the resulting overdesign can be very serious, particularly where service to the urban poor is concerned and levels of affordability are low. This paper presents the results of rigorous analyses of secondary distribution systems for several urban areas in developing countries; from these analyses, simple mathematical models are developed which permit prediction of total pipe length, average diameter and network cost given decisions on variables such as per capita usage and spacing of public standpipes or house connections. Examples are given of the application of these equations to typical design problems.

Report issued as RES-11 in September 1977.

## R-612 - Development of PVC Well Screens for Local Fabrication in Developing Countries

This project is directed to developing a well screen that can be manufactured in developing countries at a lower cost than those presently used. A well screen of PVC pipe with modified cross-section and subsequent manual slotting, suitable for rumal water projects, has been developed. Pilot fabrication of PVC well screens have been carried out in order to develop techniques appropriate to developing countries.

Report issued as RES-14 in April 1978.

#### R621 - Pipeline: State of Artt

This project will yield a state-of-the-art report and specification review on the design and construction of large diameter pipelines. The paper will analyze the Bank's experience in water supply and wewerage projects and will recommend procedures to be followed in future projects, reflecting present technological development in pepeline fabrication and installation. The study will draw upon Bank experience with irrigation and petroleum pipelines as well as municipal water supply and sewerage.

Report is now in the final stages of editing.

### R620 - Reduction of Unaccounted for Water

Research was conducted to develop a manual for the identification of various causes of unaccounted for water, to determine the financial effects and reduce losses. The final report was unsatisfactory and has not been released.

The Research Committee will hold its next meeting on September 22. Following this meeting, it is expected to meet again in early December.

As was indicated by Mr. Balassa's memorandum of July 11 the intention is that henceforth all research proposals be discussed at a workshop prior to their formal review by a panel. Accordingly, proposals to be considered at the December meeting should be submitted to this office in a form suitable for workshop discussion by c.o.b. October 7. Ten copies of the draft proposal should be provided.

On receipt of the draft proposal this office will nominate members of the panel which would review the proposal upon its formal submission. Panel members will be invited to participate at the workshop. Following the workshop, researchers will be required to submit the proposal complete in all respects by c.o.b. November 10. This office should be provided with ten copies and the original of the final proposal.

In informal as well as formal submissions, particular attention should be given to the preparation of a clear and concise summary as described in the attached "Guidelines for Submission of Research Proposals".

I would appreciate it if those planning to submit research proposals for the December meeting could inform me of their intentions by September 14.

### A. Introduction

Projects proposed for consideration by the Research Committee should be submitted to the Secretary to the Research Committee, Development Policy (Room F1233, tel. ext. 6003). The Secretary will forward those that are suitable for review to an ad hoc panel, generally composed of three to six Bank staff members with a member of the Research Committee as Chairman. With whatever modifications to the proposal result from the review panel's deliberations, the proposal and panel recommendations are forwarded to the Research Committee for consideration at its periodic meetings.

Submission dates for proposals are given in announcements of forthcoming Research Committee meetings that are circulated to DPS and CPS Directors and Division Chiefs and Regional Chief Economists. Sponsors of research should be aware that proposals in final form must reach the Secretary to the Research Committee by the submission deadline, to ensure a productive as well as reasonably unhurried review. Particularly when the flow of proposals is expected to be heavy, it is also useful to forward proposals in draft form prior to the deadlines. The Research Committee Secretary and Research Adviser can then provide assistance on particular aspects of project design and, when it appears desirable, arrange for a preliminary meeting with the ad hoc panel.

## B. Preparation of Proposals

A research proposal consists of two sections:

(1) A narrative describing the proposed project, and
(2) Cover sheets (attached), which summarize pertinent project data, indicate approval of the project by the responsible Division Chief and Department Director, and reflect the views of other Bank Departments having an interest in the study.

#### Narrative

A full explanation of the scope and objectives of the proposed research and its technical and organizational feasibility is given in the project narrative. There is no prescribed length, but descriptions should be as brief as possible without sacrificing clarity. The narrative must be accompanied by a summary not exceeding two single spaced pages.

Listed below are the topics to be given special emphasis in preparation of the project narrative. While coverage of these topics, and their order of presentation, will naturally vary among projects, research sponsors are strongly urged to use the major headings (Objectives and Strategy; Design; Organization; Resource Requirements) as the organizing framework for their narratives.

### I. OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGY

- A. Statement of the general problem to which the research is addressed; origin of interest in the problem within the Bank
- B. The goals or objectives of the proposed study
- C. The relationship of the study to other current and planned research, in the Bank and elsewhere, on the same subject
- D. Expected usefulness for Bank operations in projects or sectors, country economic analysis, and policy formulation; or to planning authorities and others in developing countries
- E. The degree to which the study will assist in developing indigenous research capacity in member countries (to the extent not covered under Part III.D)
- F. Expected contributions to knowledge of development processes, if not described elsewhere
- G. How the intended audience(s) will be served by the output of the study
- H. Reasons for the choice of countries to be involved

#### II. DESIGN

- A. The analytical framework on which the study is based
- B. The specific research tasks or components
- C. Methodologies to be applied in testing hypotheses; the extent to which the theoretical approaches differ from or improve upon those of previous studies
- D. Nature and reliability of the data to be used, including, if applicable, the design and coverage of sample surveys
- E. Nature of the final product or products

### III. ORGANIZATION

- A. The work program and sequencing of research tasks; possibilities for review of progress at intermediate stages
- B. Reasons for choice of consultants, consulting firms, or research institutes to be involved.

  Note: A c.v. of the major consultant identified should be attached to the narrative.
- C. Coordination among Bank Departments, including the potential contribution of a Steering or Advisory Group of interested staff. The Regional operating Department(s) whose clearance will be required for execution of the study should be identified. Studies involving operational travel and other contacts with member countries should specify the nature of these contacts and indicate the views of the concerned operating Departments about them.
- D. Nature and extent of collaboration with research institutes in the countries to be involved
- Extent of awareness, support, or participation by governmental agencies in the countries to be involved, and the steps to be taken to crystallize such support. Care should be exercised to specify the individuals or units (not just "the Ministry of...") with views on the proposed study.

#### IV. RESOURCE REQUIREMENTS

- A. Nature of Bank staff contributions and extent of staff involvement in the design, implementation, and supervision of the study. Staff time estimates are summarized in Part IV (2) of the submission cover sheets.
- B. An itemized budget, by fiscal year, consistent with information supplied in Part IV (1) of the cover sheets. The rate per day or per month of consultants' time, per diem and air fare estimates for travel, unit rates for data processing, and other unit cost estimates should be explained for each item. Financial commitments from outside agencies, if any, should be described in detail.

#### Cover Sheets

The following instructions refer to the line items on the form.

## Part I. Project Identification

- 1. <u>Title</u>: Title of research project, to be used for reporting purposes.
- 2. Department(s) Responsible: The Department(s) in which the principal work will be done, and which will be responsible for overall supervision.
- 3. Staff Participation: The principal supervisor (3.a.) manages the disbursement of project funds and, in Status Reports, provides the Research Committee Secretariat with an appraisal of progress achieved. Frequently, substantive responsibilities are also vested in other staff members (3.b.).
- 4. No. of Contracts: Expected arrangements for temporary research assistance, as well as for consultants and consulting firms, should be included.
- 5. Estimated Total Cost: Include the total amount currently requested, for all fiscal years (see Part IV, 1). If the current request is for the first stage of a larger program of research, an outline of the financial requirements of later stages should be provided in the narrative.
- 6. Estimated Total Staff Time Required: The estimated weeks of staff time required to complete the work for which financing is currently requested (see Part IV, 2).

## Part II. Coordination and Approval

1. Interdepartmental Coordination: Other CPS or DPS
Departments which deal with the topics addressed
in the project should be given an opportunity to
review the proposal and arrive at a judgment about
it. Studies involving specific countries or regions
should also be coordinated with the appropriate
Regional Program or Projects Departments. Arrangements made for liaison with Regional operating
Departments are specified in Part III, 5.

The coordinator in each of these Departments indicates whether he or she (henceforth: he) supports the project as proposed, does not support it, or has no objection to using Research Committee funds in this manner. If he does not support the project, he should submit his reasons in a memorandum to be

- attached to the proposal. A statement of reasons for support is also helpful, particularly as reservations may persist about a particular aspect of the research design or organization.
- 2. Departmental Approval: The Division Chief and Director of the sponsoring Department sign the form, indicating that the proposal is approved for consideration by a review panel and by the Research Committee.

### Part III. Implementation

- 1. Date Work to Start: The month and year during which actual work on the project is to begin. This will normally be after preliminary discussions have been completed, government approval obtained, and a final research design agreed upon.
- 2. \*Date First Draft Expected: Estimated date of completion of first draft of final report.
- 3. \*Date Final Report Expected: Estimated date when final report will be available for dissemination.

  \*Note: These dates are also included in Status Reports, which are prepared at intervals during the life of the project. Adjustments in the original work schedule, if any, are explained in the Status Reports.
- 4. Implementation Method: Check the appropriate box or boxes and provide corresponding names when available.
- 5. Proposed Liaison with Operating Departments:
  Indicate the arrangements envisaged (meetings, seminars, other consultation) for regular contact with operational staff during execution of the project.
- 6. Reports Expected in the First Year: List the interim or progress reports, inception reports, and other papers or reports that are expected to be completed during the first year of the project.

## Part IV. Financial and Staff Resources

- 1. <u>Dollar Costs</u>: Estimate the funds which will be expended in all fiscal years on the following:
  - a. Consultant Fees All costs incurred by contracts with individual consultants, consulting firms, and research institutes.
  - b. Travel Include staff and consultant travel, as authorized by Bank Travel Requests. Do not include travel paid through contractual arrangements in (a).
  - c. Data Processing All costs incurred through services provided by the Computing Activities Department, plus arrangements, if any, for outside data processing.
  - d. Other Contractual Services Temporary research assistance, secretarial assistance, editorial and printing costs, and others as applicable. Do not include the cost of these items paid through contractual arrangements in (a).
  - e. Contingencies Though normally not necessary, a reserve against unanticipated expenses and inflation may in some cases be justified.

SUBJECT: Research Committee Approval Process

This memorandum describes changes introduced in the Research Committee approval process. The changes relate to the procedures to be followed before the project proposal is formally submitted to the Research Committee. They do not modify the procedures applied once a formal submission is made.

- 1. Formal submissions to the Research Committee will be preceded by an informal review of the research proposal in the form of a workshop. At the discretion of the Department Director, who bears ultimate responsibility for the research proposal, the informal review may be combined with a Departmental review or be subsequent to it.
- 2. The informal review (workshop) will take place three weeks preceding the planned date of submission of the research proposal to the Research Committee for a formal review. The informal review will require only a draft proposal together with a general indication of the budget; departmental coordination will not be necessary at this stage.
- 3. The draft proposal itself will be sent to the Research Adviser two weeks prior to the workshop. This means that the draft proposal will have to be submitted five weeks prior to the formal submission of the project. Upon receipt of the draft proposal, the Research Adviser will set up the Panel that will review the research proposal in the event that this is subsequently submitted for a formal review. Panel members will be invited to participate at the workshop. Outside experts may also be invited in cases when this appears desirable due to the lack of sufficient expertise in the particular field at the Bank.
- 4. At the time of the formal submission of the research proposal, the Department Director will enclose a short note reporting on the outcome of the informal review. The note will be circulated to the workshop participants for comments, a copy of which should be sent to the Research Adviser.

5. In informal as well as formal submissions, particular attention should be given to the preparation of a clear and concise summary, which is to indicate the place of the project in the context of the particular research area, the approach to be applied, the project's expected contribution to the advancement of knowledge, and its usefulness to the Bank and to the developing countries.

#### TRANSFER OF TECHNOLOGY TO

#### SMALL AND MEDIUM ENTERPRISES

### Research Proposal Summary

It is widely recognized that technical assistance and information about technological alternatives for investment are essential for the development of small and medium enterprises (SMEs). The Research Proposal would concentrate on one country to study intensively the mechanisms and potential benefits of improving the system of technology information — which might serve as a guide for further efforts by other LDCs, the Bank, and UN or Bilateral aid institutions.

The proposed research project would produce basic data needed to analyze the cost and benefits of technical information to SMEs and the most effective manner in which such information can best be provided. It would lay the basis for (a) Testing the appropriate domestic institutional mechanism to identify and service demand for technical information in the context of actual SME investment decisions being made; this might involve collaboration among several institutions (e.g., an industrial extension service, a technical information agency and a financial intermediary); (b) For designing an improved international mechanism to facilitate access by industrial entrepreneurs and managers in LDCs to reliable information about technological alternatives to help guide their investment decisions; The international mechanism envisaged is called, for purposes of identification, a Technological Referral Service (TRS); and (c) Evaluating the benefits which SMEs derive from information on technological alternatives, distinguishing between the impact of information on the one hand and the economic "environment" for SMEs (factor prices, etc.) on the other.

# Survey and Pilot Operation

The research consists of a survey and a pilot experiment. The survey would include detailed interviews with 50 - 70 SMEs which have recently undertaken or are considering new investments. The interviews would assess their needs for technological information and their readiness and willingness to accept and utilize information on alternative technologies. The survey should help define the services to be provided during the subsequent pilot experiment, the organization of the screening mechanism and the modes of collaboration among the various agencies involved, any limits on industrial sectors or the size of firms assisted, the inquiry and response format to be used, financial arrangements, etc.

The principal investigators for the research project would be: (1) a foreign consultant with operational experience in supplying information on technological processes to developing countries and/or experience in assisting LDCs in the development of a technical information service;

(2) a local consultant of similar background; and (3) an economist to provide an independent assessment of the economic benefits realized through the impact on investment decisions. The project will be supervised by Messrs. de Vries and Steinberg of the Bank's IDF Department in collaboration with staff of the Bank's Regional office.

The investigators would work in close collaboration with the promotional, financial, and technical assistance organizations related to SME investment. The investigators would review with them the institutional arrangements for promoting requests for information, screening inquiries, and assisting in the implementation of responses received during the pilot experiment. The units to be visited during the survey would be identified from the client lists of the institutions collaborating in the study.

In addition to the documented case studies of requests for technology information, the report on the survey would assess the in-country information resource capabilities to respond to such requests and to identify the areas of greatest promise for tapping international technological resources, particularly through an outside clearing house. A preliminary work plan would be formulated for the succeeding pilot experiment to be reviewed within the country and by the Bank prior to initiating the pilot experiment.

The pilot experiment is envisaged to be 18 months in duration (roughly February 1979 to July 1980). During this period designated staff of the screening agencies would solicit and process inquiries from their clients. Certain inquiries would be forwarded to the UNIDO Industrial Inquiry Service which would act as an international clearing house for technological requests.

During the pilot experiment the researchers will monitor and review the various elements of the information transferral process, both within and outside the country (pages 16 - 18 of the Proposal describe the nature and purpose of the monitoring). The investigators would seek to identify gaps in the coverage and reach of outside sources and/or the clearing house, deficiencies in processing procedures, etc., and suggest needed improvements. Both the survey and the pilot operation will be carried out in close liaison with institutions concerned with finance and technical assistance for SMEs.

The pilot experiment should be useful to the country studied in improving its assistance to SME in the area of technological choice quite independent of any conclusion with respect to the validity or usefulness of the international mechanism (TRS concept) also to be tested.

#### Country Choice

The choice of country for concentrated study will be a critical matter. From the Bank's point of view it should be a country where there is adequate knowledge about the incentives and the policy environment affecting SMEs and where the World Bank has a substantial prospective lending program for industrial development including SMEs. The country should provide a favorable environment for SMEs and should be actively interested in promoting their development. National institutions should be in close contact with SMEs and be prepared to provide staff support for the research project. Also desirable would be the availability of local technical expertise and research talent interested in the development of SMEs. Besides designating staff to work

closely with the project, the country would also participate in the work shop and one of the consultants on the project would be a national of the country.

The Philippines satisfies well the country criteria discussed earlier. It is expected that the study will be carried out in close liaison with the Bank's survey study on SME (managed by Mr. D. Anderson), in which the Philippines is participating. The existing organization of extension and technical assistance efforts on behalf of SMEs through the MASICAP and SBAC programs offers an important avenue to promote the services to small and medium enterprises and the CSMI offers a coordinating vehicle for the kind of cooperation that will be required from other financial and technical support agencies. The already existing coordination of DBP and IGLF with the extension services is an important aspect of a successful project. Coordination would be sought, perhaps through the National Science Development Board, to enlist the support of the various technology resource agencies such as the Technology Resource Center, National Institute of Science and Technology, and the various specialized agencies to be agreed on (e.g., forest products (FORPRIDECOM), textiles (PTRI), metal industries (MIRDC), etc.).

#### DRAFT TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR THE RESEARCH ADVISORY PANEL\*

A review of the Bank's research program will be conducted by a small Advisory Panel to assist the management of the Bank in determining the size and nature of the program for the next few years.

The primary objective of this review will be to assess the size of the overall research program and its character and balance. This should be done in the light of the Bank's operations in, and advisory services to, its member countries, with consideration given to the role it should play in increasing world-wide understanding of the development process.

The present program has been designed to serve four stated objectives:

- to support all aspects of Bank operations, including the assessment of development progress in member countries,
- to broaden our understanding of the development process,
- to improve the Bank's capacity to give policy advice to its members,
- to assist in developing indigenous research capacity in member countries.

The emphasis given to these different objectives will influence the size and cost of the research program. Hence, the Panel should consider whether these objectives need redefinition or ranking in importance.

In approaching its task, this general Panel will be able to draw on the specialized panels in the following fields: Income Distribution and Employment, Education, Agriculture and Rural Development, Industrial Development and Trade, Commodities, Public Utilities, and Transport. These panels will have addressed such questions as the operational and policy relevance of past and ongoing research. They will also have made recommendations which would influence the size of the program, for instance, the degree to which the Bank should promote or assist in original data collection, and assist in developing indigenous research capacity.

<sup>\*</sup>This draft indicates the type of issues of concern to the Board and management of the Bank. The Panel will draw up its own terms of reference at its first meeting.

The quality and relevance of research programs in individual areas will thus have already been rather comprehensively reviewed. The special panels will not, however, have been able to address the question of the priorities among sectors and areas of research—nor the implications of pursuing original data collection across the board. This should be done by the general Panel, with consideration given to the Bank's comparative advantages in various types of research. Further consideration also needs to be given to the priority to be attached to the building up of research capacity in the Bank and in member countries.

The relevance of Bank research to its operations and policy formulation is a constant cause of concern. The Panel should consider this issue in the light of the discussions by the specialized panels of the process of research dissemination by the producers, and its assimilation by the consumers. Finally, the Panel may wish to consider whether the internal organization of the Bank, and the research decision-making processes, are conducive to the generation of relevant and efficiently conducted research.

You have been so helpful to us in the past in setting up the SMI study that I am taking the liberty of approaching you for your assistance in a related matter.

The World Bank has been aware for some time that technical assistance and availability of information on technological options are of great importance in enabling small and medium enterprises in developing countries to make sound investment decisions. We would therefore like to obtain a better understanding of the needs of the SME sector for access to technological information and the effectiveness of different institutions in responding to this need.

How we might best study the situation and devise suitable approaches to overcome the problems involved, has been under discussion here at the Bank over the past year. It has now been decided that a start should be made with some limited studies in 2-3 different countries, combining a direct survey of a sample of SME to find out directly the extent of the awareness and need for more information on technological options and a review of the activities and capability of the institutions working in this field and of the ability and readiness of entrepreneurs to make use of services offered.

Among the countries that we are considering for this study is the Philippines, where we feel a great deal has been done to assist SME both through loan and credit programs (in part with support from the World Bank) and through technical assistance. We believe that the Philippines has an interesting set of institutions for assisting SME through MASICAP, CSMI, the network of Small Business Advisory Centers and the ISSI. In addition, it would be of interest to look at the role played by the sector-based institutes such as the Metal Industries Development Centre or the Textiles Research Institute in channelling appropriate technology information and advice to smaller enterprises in these sectors.

The Philippines also offers the benefit of the data and information resulting from the ongoing study on small-scale industries which is being assisted by Dennis Anderson.

As a preliminary, we would like to contact some of the institutions engaged in SME field work to become acquainted with the work going on and to hear the views of the persons working closely with SME on how one could best proceed with the sort of study we have in mind.

Mr. Jacob Levitsky, a senior staff member of the Industrial Development and Finance Department who has been working specifically with projects to lated to SME, will be travelling in East Asia and we have suggested that he might visit the Philippines from July 11 to 17 to discuss with all the relevant institutions possible cooperation in a project to study the technology flow to SME. The institutions with which Mr. Levitsky might wish to discuss the subject include MASICAP, DOI, DBP, IGLF, CSMI, SBA's, ISSI and MIDC.

Mr. Levitsky's discussion would concentrate on the following:

- (a) What are the sources of information and the criteria which determine the decision of small-scale entrepreneurs as regards choice of technology, equipment, etc., in making investment decisions?
- (b) To what extent are the existing institutions assisting the SME in giving due consideration to the various technological options available in the choice?
- (c) What arrangement could be made for cooperation between selected institution(s) and the World Bank for carrying through a limited study in the Philippines on the need of SME for more technological information, and more specifically the type of information needed and how it could be supplied?

Mr. Levitsky has been closely involved in all the discussions here in the Bank on the subject. We would be grateful if you could let us know whether his visit to Manila during the period mentioned would be convenient to the Government. If the proposed visit is convenient, it would be most helpful if you could help him in making contact with the institutions concerned.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Dr. Alba, Deputy Director General of NEDA, as he has been closely associated with most aspects of the Bank's economic work program.

Research Panel - "Lau Proposal" - A Study of the Quantitative Responses of Farm Households to External Stimuli

- 1. A research panel met on May 26 to consider the L. Lau proposal originally put forward as a supplementary request for funds to extend RPO 671-49. The panel in its May 3 meeting decided that this proposal was in reality a separate proposition and should be treated as a new request. We requested a more fully spelt out proposal than that originally submitted. This was received and the panel met again, with Mr. Hazell joining our ranks, and Prof. Lau, T. King and S. Cochrane attending. The budget for the proposal is a modest \$30,900; it works on the same data base as RPO 671-49 and would share the same management (D. Jamison and S. Cochrane).
- 2. The panel found the proposal to be very well thought out and presented. We found the proposed research to be of definite interest to the Bank, with high operational relevance. The concerned Regions support the proposal. Prof. Lau is a very competent researcher, who satisfied the panel on all points that came up.
- The main points of discussion were: (a) whether the overall impact of education on productivity was clearly robust enough to allow decomposition of the educational variable (into numeracy, literacy gradients, etc.) and still expect robust results; (b) whether risk aversion may not be such an important factor in farm household behavior that unless it can be accounted for, results will be fragile or unremarkable; (c) whether separating production and consumption functions into independent functions does not rest unrealistically on assumption of a perfect labor market; and (d) questions as to the quality and characteristics of the data base.
- 4. Questions on these points were answered satisfactorily; Prof. Lau did agree that in Nepal, the assumption of a perfect labor market would have to be tested, and the question of risk aversion would have to be looked into. In Thailand, there was evidence that production and consumption functions can be linked by leisure without much danger, and because production is 98% rice without large crop yield variability the question of risk aversion is not a very important one. Prof. Lau promised to look into the risk aversion question, although he had at this time no fully satisfactory methodology for taking account of it.
- 5. The panel unanimously recommends approval by the Research Committee.



# A Preliminary Study for a Research Project on Energy Needs and Possibilities for the Poor of the Developing World

#### Introduction

A central concern of the World Bank is to assist in providing a certain minimum of basic services to the poor of the developing world. Energy is included among these services both as an integral part of everyday living and an essential ingredient in raising living standards.

Though this role of energy is widely recognized there is little systematic information available on the level and quality of energy services at present being delivered to the poor. It is not known whether such services are adequate by any definition. Indeed there is no definition of "adequate."

Furthermore, there has been little systematic study of how rapidly the energy consumption of the poor will rise in future, and to what extent this rise might take the form of commercial fuels, especially imported oil.

A rapid rise in oil imports would aggravate balance-of-payments problems, intensify inflationary pressures and thus retard economic growth. Knowledge of energy consumption patterns is therefore important not only in relation to the provision of basic services but also to development strategy and policy.

### Proposed Project

For these reasons it appears appropriate for the World Bank to consider undertaking a project which would provide information on the energy consumption habits of the poor and possible methods of supplying them with a view to forming the basis for guidance on energy policy options.

Assuming that preliminary investigation revealed an inadequate data base, the project would fall into three main parts:

(1) Investigation of the energy consumption patterns of the urban and rural poor. For maximum effectiveness this investigation would be carried out in cooperation with appropriate research and governmental institutions. The regions surveyed would include rural and urban areas in several countries of the developing world.

The investigation would cover the type of energy service being provided (for example, cooking, lighting) and the means by which the service is provided. This includes not only the fuel used but the way in which it is used (for example, what type of cooker). Emphasis will be put on direct consumption of energy—that is, purchase of fuel and electricity for household operation—bu: an attempt will also be made to assess the energy content of indirect consumption—for example, the energy consumption embodied in purchase of public transportation. The investigation should be set up in such a way as to capture different patterns of consumption associated with the differing levels of income which exist even among the poor. This will indicate the levels of demand likely to arise in the future if present paths continue, and can be used to identify the areas of greatest conservation potential.

It is most important that not only present ratterns of demand be investigated, but that logical future energy needs be estimated. These future needs will be direct consequences of additional high priority goods and services, such as water supplies, provided to the urban and rural poor during the course of development.

(2) Supply and conservation options. The analysis of energy consumption patterns would provide the groundwork for assessing various conservation and

supply options. These would range from relatively simple "fixes" to existing end-uses, to more complex measures including new supply systems, and more fundamental changes in both supply and demand patterns. The existing rudimentary energy using infrastructure offers the opportunity of considering a wide range of supply and conservation options.

Examples of such possibilities, beginning with the simplest, are as follows:

- --simple passive solar heating or cooling design features for new dwellings;
- --simple active solar hot water systems--especially using plastic or wood construction or water-method collectors--for community laundry and bathing facilities;
- --more efficient and safer cooking equipment. High population densities in squatter settlements combined with open cooking facilities lead to substantial accident rate and loss of property by fire;
- --use of waste heat from central generating systems for heating and hot water;
- --small windmills for pumping or heating vater or for electricity supply, possibly supplemented by "bicycle" peaking systems;
- --urban biomass schemes based on animal wastes, municipal refuse, or low-value crops or agricultural wastes from nearby rural areas;
  - --development of energy plantations;
- --means of expanding the electricity supply. Would it be done better by expansion of central or small-scale capacity? What type of fuel input?
- --planning of new urban settlements near jobs to minimize transport. This is much more practicable in developing countries where new urban communities develop rapidly. Some anticipatory planning can obviate energy-inefficient transport patterns.

It should be noted that not all options would necessarily lead to a reduction in total energy consumption, nor is that particularly desirable. The main concern is to improve living standards while moderating the use of imported petroleum products.

(3) Energy strategies. A concluding section would assess the energy strategy implications arising from this study. It would discuss whether energy services are inadequate in the different regions, and if so, why. Opportunities for introduction of new technologies, the conditions under which they might be adopted and obstacles to their introduction will be considered. Though dealing with only a part of the population, some policy conclusions (for example, pricing policies) of wider applications may emerge.

### A Preliminary Study

Such an investigation, in particular the first essential part, would involve the large-scale collection of data which are both difficult to find and frequently difficult to interpret. Furthermore, a large program of analytic research in cooperation with in-country institutions is a formidable task. Consequently, it is proposed here that Joy Dunkerley and William Ramsay of Resources for the Future make a preliminary study of the available data base with a view to assessing its adequacy and identifying gaps. This would include an extensive data search of books, periodicals, and related studies made by governmental and international organizations and others

If the data base proved to be adequate, then this study could lead to a preliminary discussion of whether energy needs are being met, and if not, what can be done to meet them. If, on the other hand, the data base proved to be inadequate, then the study would proceed to (a) the orientation of design and coverage of an investigation completing the data base. For example, what sorts

of questions should be asked? Where will the boundary of the investigation ber drawn both with respect to energy consumption and to related data? (b) Preliminary identification of areas to be investigated. These would be arrived at after extensive discussions with Bank staff and others. The criteria for choice would include geographical location (i.e., at least one region from each continent), availability of local institutions willing to conduct survey.

(c) The role of local participants, and their relationship with the supervisory and coordinating research organization. (d) Elaboration of scope of supply and conservation options.

Informal contact on a weekly basis will be made between Dunkerley or Ramsay and a designated member of Electricity, Water, and Telecommunications.

Panel Report to Research Committee on "Evaluation of Food Distribution Schemes"

- 1. A panel consisting of Messrs. Montek Ahluwalia, Norman Hicks, Lyn Squire, Paul Zuckerman and the writer met on May 15 and May 18 to review a research proposal on "Evaluation of Food Distribution Schemes" submitted by the Economics Division of the Agricultural and Rural Development Department. Messrs. Graham Donaldson, Pasquale Scandizzo and Belai Abbai of AGR participated in the discussions.
- 2. The proposed study (summarized on page 9 of the submission) includes: (a) further theoretical work on developing and cost benefit methodology appropriate for the evaluation of food distribution schemes; (b) analysis of household budget surveys and other data for 10 countries to estimate calorie and protein demand functions and to project food needs and the costs and benefits of food distribution schemes under alternative scenarios; (c) more detailed case studies of programs in Sri Lanka and Chile and (d) an integrated report summarizing the studies. The estimated cost is \$97,000; the work would be done mainly in FY79 but completed in FY80. This research work is part of the on-going program of the sponsoring division; it will be a major input for the Bank Policy Paper on Food Distribution which will be produced subsequently.
- 3. The panel recommends approval of the proposal. However, it believes that a balanced research program on the subject would require complementary inputs on the institutional aspects of food distribution schemes. The operational usefulness of the eventual results is likely to be limited unless this additional work is done. One suggestion made was that the work really should be preceded by an "operations evaluation" type study of various food distribution programs. Mr. Donaldson indicated that such a review was already underway in respect of several programs in India and Bangladesh, and that further reviews were proposed for some other countries, especially Sri Lanka and Chile. While these reviews would not be exhaustive, he thought they should be sufficient to allow sensible interpretation of the case studies and meet the requirements for producing a policy paper.
- 4. The broad objective of the proposed study is clearly important; both the methodology to be used and the results the researchers expect to obtain would be of general interest. There seems to be no need for a preliminary overview of the subject in as much as it builds upon the division's on-going work program. The consultant and research assistant services to be financed are largely by people currently working in the division and there seems to be no question of technical competence. The panel has not suggested phasing of the research work; most of the time will be spent on the econometric work in connection with the case studies and there is no reason to request intermediate outputs.
- 5. The sponsoring division indicates that they are already in contact with the country economists for all of the countries in the study; no

further departmental coordination seems necessary. The choice of countries reflects mainly data availabilities. Collaboration with researchers in the LDCs does not seem to be appropriate in this case. Regarding dissemination, the project is expected to produce at least two journal articles, 12 division working papers (one for each case study) and a final report for use within the Bank; in addition, the Policy Paper on Food Distribution will incorporate much of the findings. A budget is attached to the proposal; if additional work is required in connection with processing the data on country budget studies, it is expected that this can be absorbed in the division's budget.

### Research Proposal for "Evaluation of Food Distribution Schemes"

- This memorandum provides an uncleared summary of the views expressed at yesterday's panel meeting on the subject research proposal. In view of your desire to submit this proposal to the forthcoming meeting of the Research Committee, arrangements have been made for a second panel meeting on Thursday May 18 (assuming we have a modified proposal by c.o.b. May 17). The regular panel report will be prepared after that meeting on the basis of the revised proposal.
- 2. Members of the panel endorse the broad objective indicated by the "Evaluation of Food Distribution Schemes" title of your research proposal. It understands that the project is closely integrated with your division's work program; most of the requested resources would be used to maintain the present staffing of the division. The study is to provide the basis for a Bank Policy Paper on Food Distribution.
- 3. Panel members, however, expressed reservations with respect to the adequacy of the presentation (in the sense of the completeness of the description of the inputs and the outputs) and also of the extent to which the work contemplated will provide an adequate basis for evaluation of food distribution schemes (particularly because it does not seem to take into account the logistical and administrative aspects).
- 4. Regarding the revised presentation, in view of the very limited time available, we suggest that you concentrate on revising and expanding pages 23 to 25 of the present proposal; pages 4 through 22 would be best presented as an annex. It is the understanding of the panel that the work outlined in section 4.01 represents a relatively minor part of the effort, but would probably result in a paper on the methodology of cost-benefit analysis of basic needs projects. We also understand that the work discussed in 4.02 would make up the greater part of the expenditures; if this is so, it should be described -- inputs, analytical techniques and output -- in much more detail. (It now gets only seven lines) The work outlined in section 4.03 -- the case studies based on available data on Chile and Sri Lanka -- also needs to be more completely described. Section 4.04 indicates "the expected results of this research" in terms of methodologies, programs and estimates; however, except for the likely paper on the cost-benefit framework, it is not at all clear what the outputs will be in terms which can be communicated to others; these should be indicated.
- Panel members expressed concern about the extent to which the proposed research would in fact permit one to evaluate food distribution schemes. What is proposed in 4.02 (iii) is playing out alternative scenarios, apparently using income and price elasticities from 4.02 (i) and projections of requirements from 4.02 (ii). Panel members felt this would not provide an adequate basis for the proposed evaluation and thought that the rather

abstract and theoretical approach now proposed should be complemented by OED-type reports on just how some food distribution schemes have worked. There are many problems of logistics and administration that can hardly be ignored; there seemed to be a real danger that the proposed research would be overly theoretical and thus be unable to respond to the Bank's more operational requirements. The extent to which the two proposed case studies would be concerned with such more operational questions is not clear, but it appears to be limited. While all panel members expressed concern on the adequacy of the research proposed as a basis for evaluating food distribution schemes, they did not insist that the additional, more operational research be done necessarily as part of the present research proposal. If the objectives of the present proposal were appropriately limited, and there were adequate assurance that the other necessary work was being undertaken, I believe most panel members felt that the Bank should undertake work along the lines you are proposing.

6. I regret that the time available does not permit a cleared and possibly more helpful summary of the views of panel members. The time available for us to review and you to revise the proposal is clearly less than is really needed; we can but try.

- 1. Attached for your comments is a revised, simplified version of the Status Report required for Research Committee financed research projects. It has been designed with two objectives in mind:
  - (i) to increase the effectiveness of these Status Reports as a management tool for researchers, Department Directors and this office; and
  - (ii) to minimize the cost to the researchers of completing this form.

To this end, with some exceptions, items of information readily available or of marginal benefit to this office have been eliminated.

- 2. The Status Report now has four sections; two of which are required to be completed for all three reporting periods (January, April and June) and the other two are required only once a year, i.e. in June.
- 3. Section I is used to identify the project, to determine its recent output and any time-slippage in the completion date. Section II has three parts; Section IIa identifies the current and anticipated expenditures, as in the old Status Report. Section IIb is used to determine any actual or potential cost overrun/underrun. If there is any cost-overrun, the source of the required supplementary financing is also to be identified by the researcher. Section IIc is to be used by the researchers to explain delays in the completion of the project and the reasons for the cost overruns or underruns and other requests for supplementary funding. These two sections should provide sufficient early warning signals to managers for projects not "on track" and are to be completed for all three periods.
- 4. Section III and IV are more comprehensive in nature and are, therefore, required to be completed only once a year. Section IV is used to summarize the resources expended in the execution of the project.

Transfer of Technology to Small and Medium Industries

At its meeting on April 27, the Research Committee did not approve funding for the above proposal as requested. Several members raised questions of what precisely was being evaluated and researched and how the research was to be conducted. Programming in the Manufacturing Sector: Feedback on January S.R. dated 04/26/78

On reading page 3 of your Status Report I thought I should send you some feedback as so often requested by you. I have, unfortunately, only three comments to make.

- (1) The Status Report does not make clear how the mission to Mexico is going to be financed given that you have only \$36 left for this FY and none for the next. If you plan to use the conditoonally approved supplementary funds for this trip and Mexico "falls through", you may be expected to reimburse the Research Program budget from your department's discretionary budget.
- (2) If Mexico indeed falls through it may be possible for you to change countries, if the country in question and the Research Committee approve. However, I should caution you that given the recent Research Committee ruling, which you should receive shortly, any further supplementary request for a steel manual, as a result of the change in countries, is unlikely to receive favourable consideration.
- (3) I was under the impression that the energy sector manuals (again?) would involve another research project. If not, for our records, could you let me have your latest estimate on when this project will be completed?

In preparing the new edition of the Abstracts of Current Studies booklet, we plan to retain the slightly greater emphasis placed in last year's version on the objectives and methodology of projects and, in appropriate cases, preliminary Thus, the current format is substantially the same as that of last year. On this basis and following the guidelines set out below, I would appreciate it if you would prepare, by c.o.b. Tuesday, May 30 a narrative on the research project(s) that you supervise. Your draft of 3-4 pages (double spaced) should consist of a main narrative section followed by three summary sections on project responsibility, completion, and published reports.

- Though coverage will vary among projects, the Narrative Section should deal with the following:
  - The Project Framework: The nature of the topic (i) being considered; the approaches taken so far and how this research project differs from or improves upon other studies in the same area of concentration, and how the Bank has so far dealt with the problem being considered. For research that evaluates Bank development projects, the project should be described in some detail.
  - Objectives and Strategy: This discussion, with (ii)the one on methodology, forms the major part of the narrative. It should address the issue of the usefulness of this study for Bank policy and operations, for policymaking agencies in developing countries, and more generally, for the development community? It would be helpful if you could make explicit why the Bank and not a university or some other institution has undertaken this research. Include here, or as a separate paragraph, a description of the output(s) expected from the project. If the study is carried out in phases, describe how the current phase builds on earlier ones (enumerating major findings from these earlier phases) and how it lays the groundwork for further analysis.

- (iii) Methodology: Describe, as appropriate, the features of the model structure used; how surveys have been designed and carried out; how different portions of the research relate to each other. Avoid equations, but do not hesitate to elaborate on technical aspects you feel are essential for a clear understanding of the project.
  - (iv) Outputs of the project (if not covered elsewhere), and planned extensions of the work.
- 3. The narrative should end with three <u>Summary Sections</u> giving the following information:
  - (i) Responsibility: The names of the Departments,
    Bank staff members, and consultants involved
    in the project. For research with collaborating
    institutions, list their full names and
    locations and summarize their contributions to
    the research design and execution. In addition,
    this section should also indicate whether
    government ministries or other public agencies
    are involved, through awareness and approval,
    if not active participation.
  - (ii) Completion Date: The month and year in which the project is expected to be completed.

    Please be more specific than "final report is being prepared."
  - (iii) Reports: List the books, Occasional Papers, Staff Working Papers, journal articles, and other reports that have been completed and are available to the public. Articles issued in the World Bank Reprint series should be so indicated. The reports should be listed in a standard professional format, with author, title, publisher, date of publication, and, for a journal article, volume number and date. For publications in languages other than English, special attention should be given to accents and spelling.
- 4. An assistant will be available in early June for a limited time to work with you, as necessary, to revise your drafts. Please, therefore, make sure that the drafts reach me no later than c.o.b. <u>Tuesday</u>, May 30.

SUBJECT: Minutes of the Meeting on April 27

Present at the meeting were Messrs. Chenery (Chairman), Balassa, de Vries, Dubey, Holsen, King, Little, van der Tak, Waide, Lerdau and Choksi.

- 1. This meeting was convened to consider research proposals and supplementary funding requests that were on the agenda for the April 14 meeting, but were not discussed on that day.
- 2. Mr. Choksi drew the attention of the Committee that, as of the beginning of the meeting, the FY78 budget was overprogrammed by 13.46%, and that total expenditures, upto March 31, 1978 amounted to 74.5% of the total FY78 budget. In addition, it was pointed out that if all the proposals and supplementary funding requests before the Research Committee today were to be approved, \$618,000 would be available for commitments to new proposals in FY79. This figure excluded any possible underspending in FY78 which would be carried over to FY79. This amount was considered to be on the low side for this time of the year, but it was pointed out that since authorizations normally exceed expenditures, the Research Committee could, in fact, authorize more than the above figure in FY79.

## International Trade Policy for the Development of Bangladesh

- 3. Mr. Little, as the chairman of the panel that had reviewed this proposals, pointed out that the panel had agreed to support the proposal, but had done so with reservations. He stated that the panel felt that the proposal was over-ambitious and there were far too many people involved in the research. There was, therefore, some concern about the production of coherent results. In addition, there were doubts about the methodology and it was considered imperative that Messrs. G. Pursell and A. Ray keep in close contact with the principal researchers, Messrs. G. Papanek and D. Schydlowsky of Boston University. There were also doubts about the budget which the panel felt was too high.
- 4. One committee member stated that a similar study in Nigeria cost about \$98,000. He pointed out that he had found that, for such studies, the ideal approach was for the actual

researcher to go to each firm to gather data, rather than to send research assistants or associates. He also did not see sufficient understanding of the problems of data collection such as those associated with technical coefficients and world prices. He also expressed concern about the researchers' approach to estimating the value of capital stock. He suggested that social rates of return and effective rates of protection should also be calculated, since the data requirements would be much the same as that for the DRC calculations and would contribute to the policy analysis.

- 5. The sponsor (Mr. Waide) pointed out that the South Asia region considered this to be a high priority project; now, after five years of reconstruction, the policy recommendations from this study would be very useful to the Bangladesh Government.
- Questions were also raised by various members regarding Mr. Schydlowsky's availability and the extent of his commitments to other projects that could lead to delays in the completion of this one. Due to past experience with Mr. Schydlowsky's involvement in other Bank research projects, suggestions were made that in the event the output is not delivered as specified, arrangements should be made to replace him. Another suggestion was that as a condition of employing him on this project, he should be barred from undertaking additional work. Mr. Waide responded that this issue had been taken up previously with Mr. Schydlowsky and that he would have 3 months available in the summer and would subsequently be on a twelve month sabbatical leave from Boston University.
- 7. The Committee expressed considerable concern with respect to the requested budget. While recognizing the benefits of conducting this study in Bangladesh, a much under-researched country, it felt that the costs were on the high side. After some discussion, it was agreed that the proposal should be resubmitted, incorporating proper time-phasing and with a budget between \$100,000 and \$120,000 and stating certain requirements that would need to be fulfilled in carrying out the project.

### Transfer of Technology to Small and Medium Industries

8. Mr. King, as chairman of the panel that reviewed this proposal, discussed its evolution over a period that included two panel meetings. In these meetings the panel became more concerned about UNIDO's capabilities and felt that the national side of the study should be separated from the international side. The reservations of the panel were expressed in paragraph 3 of the panel's recommendation memorandum. Qualified support for the proposal was expressed by the panel subject to the conditions stated in that recommendation memorandum.

Several Research Committee members raised the issues of what precisely was being evaluated and researched and how the research was to be conducted. The issues discussed included the effectiveness of different institutional set-ups, how existing institutions react with one another and the cost-effectiveness of the services that would be provided by the agencies concerned. There was also general concern that the proposal lacked an adequately defined research design.

9. It was, therefore, decided that the proposal, in its present form, would not be approved by the Research Committee. The Committee recommended that a new proposal be submitted with a clearly defined research design, that it specify the precise questions to be investigated and how these questions are to be answered. Additional suggestions were that the focus should be on the national rather than the international TRSs, their current effectiveness and the costs associated with making such agencies more effective.

# Supplementary Funding for "The International Comparison Project" (Ref. No. 670-68)

10. Mr. Dubey, the panel chairman, noted the fact that the project had not been monitored carefully and that the researchers had used Phase III funds to complete Phase II. This resulted in the present request for an additional \$150,000. He reported that the panel recommended approval of this request subject to the conditions stated in paragraph 7 of the panel's recommendation memorandum of March 29, 1978. After some discussions about the alternatives faced by the Bank in rejecting the request, the Research Committee accepted the panel's recommendations and conditions.

# Supplementary Funding for "Small Enterprise Financing: The Role of Informal Credit Markets" (Ref. No. 671-65)

11. In considering this request, the Research Committee expressed some concern that research proposals that have been approved on an initial cost estimate, should not approach the Research Committee a few months later with a request for increasing the original budget. It was strongly felt that the researchers should not underestimate the expected cost of a proposal. A suggestion was made to inform the Bank's research community of this expressed concern. The Research Committee, with one dissenting vote, approved the request for the additional \$25,000.

Community Participation and Urban Projects - Background Paper for a Research Project

- 1. Improvement in the lot of the urban poor has been defined as a major objective of World Bank lending and assistance. This redirection is the Bank's lending pattern means that the final beneficiaries of Bank projects are now directly affected by project design and implementation, especially in the areas of physical improvements to existing settlements, changes in tenure, repayment of loans, credits for small businesses, and self-help house construction and maintenance of improved areas. What does this imply for the approach to project design both by the Bank and by Government agencies?
- 2. There is a slow, but growing awareness among governments in LDCs of the importance of involving communities affected by urban plans, programs and projects in their conception, design and implementation. This parallels a wider concern for government to take account of the immediate needs and priorities of their low-income populations both in urban and rural areas. Motivation for this concern probably arises for several measons:
  - (a) The proportion and size of poor and deprived groups in urban areas has rapidly increased over the past 20 years and represents the majority of the urban population.
  - (b) Better information, education and communication within urban areas has led to a greater awareness among poor people of their needs and deficiencies by contrast to wealthier groups, and an ability to put political pressure on the government to supply basic services and in some cases, land tenure.
  - (c) Communities have resisted government action which directly affect their security and assets.

    Squatter resistance to forcible relocation and resistance of residents threatened by urban renewal and road schemes are the most common examples. The government has, in many cases, been successfully defied, or lost popularity as a result of its police action.

- (d) An awareness that in some situations, programs can be implemented much more efficiently through the co-option of the community. Experience with community involvement with area maintenance, relocation assistance, small-scale credit and basic health and population programs has lent support to this view.
- (e) An increasing feeling among activists in slum areas, thoughtful administrators in government and among other social critics that the "Lady Bountiful" approach of a benign government distributing services to the grateful masses perpetuates dependency and elitism: that genuine development involves not just economic welfare but is a process whereby ordinary people gain greater control over their own lives and the external circumstances which influence In this sense the problem of development is a struggle common to people in rich and poor countries alike and is a fundemental safeguard for justice and Projects which directly affect the human rights. interests of urban dwellers can be a useful vehicle to promote their self-confidence, organisation, responsibility and integration into the fabric of urban life.
- The degree of community interest in development projects and the extent to which governments are willing to bring in community groups will depend not only on the type of project or program but also on the cultural conditions and history of the country concerned and, to a lesser extent, the level of ducome and education in the communitites. Some countries, such as San Salvador, Tanzania, Zambia, the Philippines are more advanced than others, in collaborating with community organisations. In other cases governments (especially the more repressive ones) are reluctant to allow the community any say in the planning of projects. The ability of the Bank to expand community participation will, therefore, be heavily influenced by current political and administrative attitudes.
- 4. Given this gathering momentum towards more direct participation and influence on decision making by urban community groups, what is the position of the Bank and what should its role be? Are the structure and attitudes of the Bank suited to a more direct partnership with the users of the projects it finances? The Bank's relationship with governments, its

administrative procedures and the orientation of its staff were developed to respond to large, technically complex projects which, in their preparation and execution had little direct impact on local communities and the staff could concentrate on purely economic and technical issues and conduct a detached review of the project remote from the scene of action. Is this approach adequate for sectors where the technical issues are simple but involve actions which directly affect the daily life and assets of individual families?

- 5. The Bank's current re-direction of emphasis towards projects directly affecting the poor requires a focus on some basic questions which have hitherto not been adequately addressed:
  - (a) Does the Bank accept that involvement of communities in the process of making decisions which directly affect them is important, and if so how important, if in some cases efficiency must be sacrificed?
  - (b) Is there a conflict between efficient delivery of services and participation of affected communities in decisions on project design and implementation? Has (or could) community participation reduced or eliminated later problems which have been experienced in other projects?
  - (c) What are the implications for the modus operandi of the Bank now that a third actor (the urban residents) has a greater presence on a stage which has hitherto been dominated by government agencies and their financiers?
  - (d) What is the right context to involve community groups? What are the appropriate types of policies, programs and projects which can involve community-level organisations and which are of direct concern to them?
  - (e) The Bank has an elaborate set of policies and procedures which relate to the economic aspects of development and which in encourages and frequently requires member countries to adopt as a condition of lending. Should some principles related to the involvement of the users in project design and implementation process be developed which take account of their legitimate interests and potential power?
  - (f) What should be the role of the government planner in projects which directly affect the community? To design and implement a project as a detached technician, or to act as a professional advisor to the community organisation who would become the client within broad outlines and criteria laid down by government?

- (g) Should the government and the Bank consider funding community organisations to buy their own technical assistance for project preparation and implementation within broad criteria laid down by government? This may also help to overcome the shortage of technical and administrative personnel in government.
- (h) What type of community organisations have been, and would be effective in project implementation, including management of small loans.
- (i) Who is "the community"? How can community organisations develop which are representative of members' interests? How can they avoid becoming dominated by small interest groups? How can that portion of the community who is affected by a program be organised to relate to government?
- (j) What role should existing government administrations and leaders at the community level play in relation to the role of other private and familial organisations?
- 6. Many of the above questions are best viewed in the context of specific projects and programs. Answers will also vary depending on the existing cultural, administrative and political context. But in order to respond to them intelligently and creatively, the Bank needs better information on:
  - (a) The existence, functions, strength and extent of communities and familial organisations in low-income urban areas in specific countries.
  - (b) The existing community level government administrative structure and its relationship to non-government groups.
  - (c) The attitude of governments to active participation of community groups in decision-making which affects them.
  - (d) The experience of community involvement in Bank-financed urban projects and in similar ones not financed by the Bank.
- 7. The subject areas above need to be developed and analysed by an experienced researcher as a basis for further action and discussion by the Department and the Bank. A series of countries which have executed Bankfinanced projects, and which represent major cultural and political types should be selected for further study. In the first stage, the research would provide qualitative descriptions which would (i) provide a basis for policy review and (ii) could guide project officers to improve on-going and future projects. jThis may require about 2-3 months study in each

country selected. j Further in depth study of certain countries whose communities and administration exhibit unexplored potential could be made after the initial review. This second stage would provide a basis to discuss and implement with a selected government an approach to integrate the communities into the fabric of the design and implementation of projects which directly affect them.

Meeting on Research Project - Transfer of Technology to Small and Medium Enterprises

I attended the meeting on April 13 to discuss the operational relevance of the above-proposed research project.

Essentially the project involves conducting a field survey of DFC clients in various countries (Mexico and the Philippines are the prime candidates) to ascertain the interest in a technological referral service (TRS). A next phase would monitor a pilot project to determine how such a system should be organized and how it would function. Finally, the project would analyze the findings as a basis for arriving at more general conclusions on the usefulness and appropriations of financing new systems for improving the flow of technical information for firms and business in all LDC's.

A major issue discussed at the meeting was that the project failed to distinguish between technological transfer of information, relevant mainly to larger firms in the more industrialized LDC's (Korea, Brazil, Mexico, Turkey); and technical assistance to smaller and new enterprises relevant to almost all operations in the least developed economies and to most small-scale enterprises in almost all LDC's. The point was made that the technical assistance needs in most of the industrial LDC's were being generally taken care through existing domestic institutions. After considerable exchange of ideas, it became clear to the research project sponsors that this research proposal would mainly involve assessing the need and function of a TRS system for more advanced companies.

I indicated that the research proposal placed insuffisient stress on institutions, particularly DFC's, as vehicles for promoting technological transfer and monitoring appropriate uses of technology through credit and administrative mechanisms. I also felt that more attention had to be given to sector policies and their influence on technological choices (Example: the effect of cheap credit policies on investor decisions and subsequent impact on employment creation). I further supported a general feeling among participants that regional differences in levels of development were not sufficiently treated in the proposals although they were crucial in designing a technological referral service.

A number of agencies, including UNIDO, currently provide technical enquiry services. These would also be reviewed under the project and the feasibility of strengthening their activities would be considered.

Unfortunately, the research project will have only marginal relevance to most of the DFC's and sub-borrowers in the West Africa Region although certain projects (particularly BHC, under which large amounts of equipment would be purchased in bulk, under Hire Purchase arrangements) could benefit from a technological referral service. I pursued the possibility of broadening the scope of the project to allow for surveying the information needs in the less industrialized countries of Africa and South Asia, but the decision of the research sponsors on the approach to be taken remained firm.

Review Panel for Transport Research

- Attached herewith is a list of the panel members we are proposing to review transportation research. In selecting the panel we have sought to include mainly individuals with broad experience in transportation from developing countries who would be best suited to judge the usefulness of the results of the large amount of applied research now completed, and with some vision to identify priority areas for future research. However, as chairman we are proposing a general economist with broad multi-sectoral perspective, Mr. Jorge Cauas. Although he was not previously involved in transport research, Mr. Cauas is well known to the Bank as former Director of the Development Research Center and we believe he will bring the proper understanding of the appropriate scope and limitations of research and other characteristics that we desire in a chairman.
- We propose the following schedule for the panel:
  - c. July-August: One week meeting in Washington for:
  - a presentation by Bank staff of our role in transportation sector and the relationship of the research program thereto;
