Dear Mr Conable,

I should like to draw your attention once again to the damage caused by the heavy floods in Tunisia during January 1990 and, as indicated in my appeal of 12 April 1990, to the Report of the FAO Mission which evaluated the requirements for the rehabilitation of agriculture in affected areas.

The Mission elaborated a series of project proposals for the recovery of productivity as well as for the implementation of disaster-preparedness measures.

Details of the 42 individual proposals are contained in the enclosed Report. Overall assistance requirements are estimated at US\$ 137.5 million, the largest portion of which is US\$ 119 million for soil and water conservation works. Important external aid requirements have also been identified for the improvement and maintenance of wells (US\$ 13 million), studies on underground water supplies (US\$ 5.1 million), and the purchase of greenhouse sheeting and remote sensing software, equipment and satellite imagery (US\$ 400 000).

While renewing my appeal for the granting of assistance along the lines suggested by the Mission, I should also like to express my sincere appreciation for the contributions you might envisage to aid the population in flood-affected areas.

Dear Mr. Saouma,

Thank you for your telex of July 11 outlining the conclusions and recommendations of the recent FAO multi-donor mission assessing the food supply situation in Ethiopia. Through our Resident Representative in Addis Ababa, Mr. Michael Payson, we had been informed about the mission's results and the anticipated need for additional commodity aid during the remainder of 1987.

As you know, these chronic food deficits are of deep concern to the World Bank. We are endeavoring on a continuing basis through the resources of the International Development Association to support agricultural policies and programs in Ethiopia that will stimulate increased grain production. Simultaneously, we are planning projects to support improvements in grain storage, transport facilities and expansion of the port at Assab.

While we are not in a position to provide direct commodity aid to the Relief and Rehabilitation Commission in Ethiopia, we shall continue to support the government's rehabilitation and development programs, giving the agriculture sector highest priority.

Thank you for your efforts to keep the donor community informed of the continuing needs in Ethiopia.

THE DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF THE FOOD AND AGRICULTURE ORGANIZATION

THE DIRECTOR-GENERAL'S APPEAL IS BASED ON THE ASSESSMENT OF THE FOOD SUPPLY SITUATION OF THE COUNTRY IN 1987 CARRIED OUT BY THE FAO/WFP/MULTIDONOR MISSION DURING JUNE 1987. THE MISSION CONSULTED WITH THE GOVERNMENT AND REPRESENTATIVES OF DONORS AND NON-GOVERNMENT ORGANIZATIONS BOTH IN ADDIS ABABA AND DURING TRAVEL TO SEVERAL REGIONS.

IN GENERAL THE MISSION FOUND THAT ALTHOUGH STAPLE FOOD PRODUCTION AND OVERALL FOOD SUPPLY HAVE IMPROVED SIGNIFICANTLY, THE SITUATION IN ETHIOPIA REMAINS DIFFICULT FOR AN ESTIMATED 3.06 MILLION PERSONS FOLLOWING THE EXTENDED PERIOD OF DROUGHT AND FAMINE IN CERTAIN AREAS. THE MISSION'S CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS ARE SUMMARIZED BELOW.

#### AAA CONCLUSIONS

- 1. HOMESTIC CEREALS AND PULSES PRODUCTION FOR CONSUMPTION IN CALENDAR YEAR 1987 IS COMPRISED OF THE MAIN 1986 (DECEMBER HARVEST) MEHER CROP OF 6.55 MILLION TONS AND THE SECONDARY BELG CROP OF 1987 (JULY 1987 HARVEST) FORECAST AT 280 000 TONS, LEADING TO A GROSS PRODUCTION OF 6.83 MILLION TONS. AVAILABLE NET PRODUCTION OF CEREALS AND PULSES, AFTER DEDUCTION OF SEED, WASTE AND LOSSES IS ESTIMATED AT 5.7 MILLION TONS.
- 2. TAKING INTO ACCOUNT PRODUCTION OF ENSET (FALSE BANANA), ROOTS AND TUBERS, MILK PRODUCTS IN CEREAL EQUIVALENT AND STOCK CHANGES, TOTAL FOOD AVAILABILITY FOR 1987 IS ESTIMATED AT 6.65 MILLION TONS.
- 3. OVERALL CONSUMPTION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ABOVE PRODUCTS FOR 1987 ARE ESTIMATED AT 7.415 MILLION TONS, LEAVING A NET FOOD DEFICIT OF 765 000 TONS TO BE MET BY COMMERCIAL IMPORTS AND FOOD AID.

CERTAIN AREAS OF THE RIFT VALLEY, THE ESTIMATE OF THE RELIEF AND REHABILITATION COMMISSION (RRC) OF THE AFFECTED POPULATION REQUIRING ASSISTANCE WAS INCREASED FROM 2.5 MILLION TO 3.06 MILLION PEOPLE AND THE ESTIMATE OF FOOD AID NEEDS TO 421 917 TONS OF CEREALS (INCLUDING THE GRAIN EQUIVALENT OF SUPPLEMENTARY FOODS AND OIL). ON THE BASIS OF INTER-AGENCY DISCUSSIONS, CONSULTATIONS WITH NGOS, THE LEVELS OF RELIEF DISTRIBUTION ATTAINED IN 1985 AND 1986, ITS OWN ASSESSMENT OF OVERALL FOOD AVAILABILITY AND THE LIKELIHOOD THAT FAMINE VICTIMS HAVE EXHAUSTED THEIR HOUSEHOLD RESERVES THE MISSION CONSIDERS THE ESTIMATE REALISTIC.

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- 5. TOTAL FOOD AID REQUIREMENTS FOR THE WHOLE OF 1987 FOR EMERGENCY RELIEF AND PROJECT DISTRIBUTION ARE ESTIMATED AT 736 000 TONS. DEDUCTING EMERGENCY FOOD AID STOCKS CARRIED FORWARD FROM 1986 THE NET REQUIREMENT FOR 1987 IS 523 000 TONS.
- 6. UNCOVERED FOOD AID FOR EMERGENCY NEEDS FOR THE REMAINDER OF 1987 FOR THE POPULATION AT RISK IS ESTIMATED AT 189 000 TONS. THIS TAKES INTO ACCOUNT EMERGENCY AID PLEDGED IN 1986 AND 1987 RECEIVED OR SCHEDULED FOR ARRIVAL IN 1987 AND COMMODITIES RECEIVED FOR FOOD-FOR-WORK (FFW) PROGRAMMES.
- 7. CONCERNING DISASTER PREPAREDNESS, THE MISSION RECOGNIZES THE NEED TO STRENGTHEN THE RRC'S EARLY WARNING DEPARTMENT AND IMPROVE COORDINATION BETWEEN THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE (MOA) AND THE RRC SO AS TO RELEASE MOA TECHNICIANS TO HELP IN FFW PROJECTS FOR INCREASED AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTIVITY.
- 8. NUTRITION. THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SOUND DATA BASE COMPRISING BOTH ANTHROPOMETRIC AND FOOD CONSUMPTION DATA IS ESSENTIAL, PARTICULARLY IN THE DISASTER-PRONE AREAS. GIVEN THE DIFFICULTIES IN TRANSLATING EARLY WARNING DATA INTO FOOD AID REQUIREMENTS, THE MISSION BELIEVES THAT THE METHODS OF CALCULATING AID NEEDS SHOULD BE EVALUATED BOTH TO INCREASE GENERAL UNDERSTANDING OF THE ISSUE AND TO STANDARDIZE METHODS.
- 9. TRANSPORT, PORT, AND STORAGE FACILITIES HAVE BEEN SIGNIFICANTLY IMPROVED DURING THE PAST TEN YEARS.

   THE COMBINED RRC, WORLD FOOD PROGRAMME TRANSPORT OPERATIONS IN ETHIOPIA (WTOE) AND NGO DISTRIBUTION CAPACITY IS NOW 900 000 TONS PER ANNUM, ADEQUATE TO PRESENT NEEDS BUT INSUFFICIENT FOR THE VOLUME OF GRAIN IMPORTS FORESEEN IN THE NEAR FUTURE. REGULAR MAINTENANCE AND REPLACEMENT OF WORN-OUT VEHICLES AND SPARE PARTS WILL BE ESSENTIAL TO KEEP THE FLEET OPERATIONAL. ALSO, THERE IS NEED TO REVIEW TARIFFS FOR TRANSPORT ON ROUGH ROADS.
- INCREASE IN ASSAB PORT'S CAPACITY FROM 1 TO 2 MILLION TONS PER YEAR, IS EXPECTED BY 1991. MASSAWA PORT OPERATIONS ARE EFFICIENT, BUT THE OFF-TAKE OF FOOD AYD BY RAIL FROM THE PORT OF DJIBOUTI HAS NOT SIGNIFICANTLY CHANGED SINCE THE 1970S.

  THE STORES OF THE AGRICULTURAL MARKETING CORPORATION (AMC), THE MOA AND RRC WERE MOSTLY FULL WITH LOCALLY PROCURED GRAINS, COMMERCIAL AND FOOD AID IMPORTS. IN LINE WITH POPULATION GROWTH, STORAGE CAPACITY WILL HAVE TO INCREASE TO COPE FUTURE REQUIREMENTS.

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- 2. NUTRITION, THE RRC SHOULD UNDERTAKE A FOOD CONSUMPTION SURVEY THEIR METHODS TO ASSESS EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE REQUIREMENTS SHOULD BE SET OUT.
- 3. TRANSPORT, WFP SHOULD EXTEND ITS WIDE FLEET OPERATIONS FOR A MINIMUM OF TWO YEARS DONORS SHOULD CONTINUE TO SUPPORT TRANSPORT AND LOGISTICS, INCLUDING PROVISION OF SPARE PARTS, AND SHIPPING COORDINATION SERVICES, HIGH PRIORITY BE GIVEN BY THE GOVERNMENT TO IMPROVE AND INCREASE ASSAB PORT CAPACITY AND HANDLING ARRANGEMENTS.
- 4.STORAGE. DONORS SHOULD CONSIDER SYMPATHETICALLY PROJECT PROPOSALS DIRECTED TOWARDS IMPROVEMENT AND EXPANSION OF FOOD STORAGE CAPACITY.

AS YOU MAY BE AWARE, THE GOVERNMENT, WORLD BANK, AND IMF HAVE RECENTLY AGREED ON SUCH A PROGRAM, WHICH HAS BEEN OUTLINED IN THE POLICY FRAMEWORK PAPER, 1987-89, FOR MOZAMBIQUE. WE ARE CURRENTLY CONSIDERING THE FINANCING OF A SECOND REHABILITATION CREDIT WHICH WOULD SUPPORT THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ECONOMIC REHABILITATION PROGRAM, WHICH WOULD SUPPLEMENT THE EMERGENCY RELIEF EFFORT MADE BY THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY. IN ADDITION, THE WORLD BANK HAS APPRAISED A PROJECT TO PROVIDE THE NEEDED AGRICULTURAL INPUTS FOR THE FAMILY SECTOR, AT THE REQUEST OF THE INTERNATIONAL FUND FOR AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT (IFAD) THROUGH OUR PROGRAM OF COOPERATION WITH IFAD. WE ARE ALSO UNDERTAKING THE PREPARATION OF AN AGRICULTURAL REHABILITATION AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROJECT WHICH WOULD BE AIMED AT ADDRESSING SOME OF THE KEY CONSTRAINTS TO AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT, BASED ON REVIEWS OF THE CASHEW, COTTON, FORESTRY AND IRRIGATION SUBSECTORS WHICH WERE RECENTLY COMPLETED. Visit of Mr. Declan J. Walton, Deputy Director-General, United Nations Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO).

Mr. Declan Walton, Deputy Director-General of FAO, will make a courtesy call on you at noon on Thursday, November 13. A brief biographical statement is attached. Mr. Edward Schuh, Director of our Agriculture and Rural Development Department, and I will accompany him to your office.

World Bank operational relations with FAO have been guided by a basic agreement on a cooperative program (CP) established in 1964. Such CPs underlined the rationale for close Bank collaboration with agencies whose technical expertise in specific areas complements that of the Bank. The main features of this CP include joint financing (on a Bank 75 percent, FAO 25 percent basis) of a team of technical staff housed in FAO, direct assistance by FAO to governments in the identification and preparation of projects for Bank financing, and joint missions as required. World Bank contribution to this program for FY 87 amounts to \$6.5 million. This provides for 52.4 net staff years of work by FAO for the Bank, accounting on average for about one-third of the Bank's project pipeline for agriculture. In general, this CP has served the Bank well and joint reviews carried out from time to time have improved its effectiveness.

World Bank/FAO cooperation in the agricultural field is extensive, and working relations are good. While there are no outstanding matters, Mr. Walton might raise the following issues:

(i) Since the CP's main purpose is to facilitate the identification and preparation of <a href="projects">projects</a>, FAO is concerned that growing Bank emphasis on SALs and sector loans could reduce the demand for CP services and adversely affect the size of associated FAO staff, unless the CP becomes more closely involved in sector work. We are sensitive to this concern, given the changed conditions since this CP was established, and FAO's limited macroeconomic and multi-sectoral capacity to support our policy-based lending. FAO does have, however, an extensive technical capacity that can be mobilized in this process.

- (ii) Mr. Walton might suggest closer Bank/FAO collaboration on a broader front, including tropical forestry, agricultural research, locust control and conservation. These areas are important to our work and our current dialogue has already resulted in a number of concrete actions.
- (iii) FAO has recently produced a comprehensive action plan for African agriculture, and Mr. Walton may wish to explore how the Bank might cooperate in its implementation. Given our own priority concern with Africa, in particular, the difficult problems facing African agriculture, we would wish to cooperate with FAO as far as is practicable. But we would need to be mindful of possible conflicts between the two institutions; as a single sector (agriculture) agency, FAO's approach differs somewhat from the economy-wide outlook which the Bank brings to bear on its policy advice to borrowing member-countries.
- (iv) Under its action plan for Africa, FAO envisages a greater role in the preparation of country studies and background materials relevant to the aid coordination process such as UNDP roundtables and World Bank Consultative Groups (CGs). In this connection, Mr. Walton might raise the issue of separate FAO representation at Bank CG meetings. Our present policy is that all UN agencies should be represented by UNDP in order to keep the CG process manageable and limited to donors who provide a major financial contribution.

Mr. Walton has already had a round of discussions with Messrs. S. Husain and Schuh, and with senior technical staff concerned with Africa to discuss the Africa situation and FAO's action plan for the region. Outside the Bank, Mr. Walton also held discussions with officials at the State Department and attended a congressional briefing held under the auspices of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.
