In this edition, we invite you to take a closer look at some of the exciting work on examinations and classroom assessment that is being carried out by our READ colleagues in Vietnam. You will also find an update on key activities and achievements across all eight READ countries since June. Of particular note, all eight grant-recipient countries took part in individualized [SABER-Student Assessment](#) benchmarking exercises over the summer and subsequently used this information to identify baseline indicators for tracking the progress of their grant activities. The benchmarking process was highly consultative and involved coordination with national governments and other key development partners. I would also like to update you on some READ 2 management changes that have taken place over the summer. 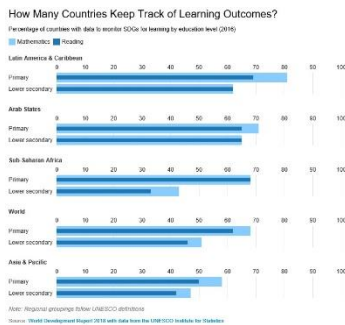

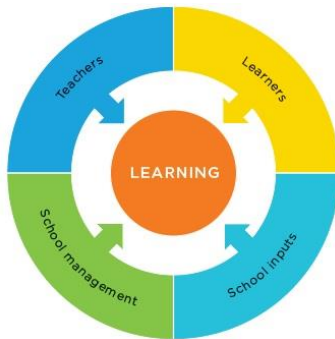
