I wish to invite you to attend the X Inter-American Meeting, at the Ministerial Level, on Foot-and-Mouth Disease and Zoonoses Control, which will be held at the Headquarters of the Pan American Health Organization in Washington, D.C., from 14 to 17 March 1977.

I am sorry I was unable to reply earlier to your letter of 23 November 1976 concerning the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases. Since it was written our December meeting has taken place and Dr James Lee will have informed you of its outcome.

It was good to learn that you are prepared in principle to propose to your Executive Directors that the Bank join UNDP and WHO in sponsoring this Programme and that it agree to serve as fiscal agent for the proposed Tropical Diseases Fund. I would welcome an early opportunity to discuss these two possibilities with you in the light of the recent meeting. I shall accordingly only deal here with the two specific points made in your letter.

In the case of the first, we shall of course provide you with whatever information you will need on the financial implications of the Programme. The general support which the Programme has now received and the substantial contributions pledged at the December meeting for its being launched in 1977 will allow us to work out more refined and meaningful projections.

As to the second point, I understand your concern and I certainly share your anxiety about the feasibility and practical impact of such an ambitious endeavour. Since the beginning of the Programme we have striven to organize research and development in ways which are economic and effective. We have been impressed with the successes of the institutional model in the agricultural field and we focused initially on the establishment of a large multidisciplinary centre at Ndola in Zambia. But it appeared to us very doubtful whether this approach was the most effective way to tackle the complex and multifacetted set of problems

presented by the tropical diseases. We then shifted the emphasis to the present plan involving Scientific Working Groups (in fact "task forces" of the type used in our Human Reproduction programme) and a network of centres. This approach offers the necessary flexibility; it provides for the enlistment of the world's best scientists and, most importantly, for a developmental partnership in research and training between the so-called developing and developed countries. However, we have not abandoned the institutional approach: far from it. The Scientific Working Groups and the network of centres are geared, precisely, to stimulating the emergence and progressive upgrading of institutions where and when they are the most effective means of action. I am attaching to this letter a note, elaborating on the above, which you may find useful.

I entertain no doubt that WHO is being faced, as you say, "with a coordinating and managerial task of extraordinary magnitude"; but I sincerely believe that it can face it and that it must face it if it is to contribute in any significant manner to the creation of a new world order.

As regards the organizational and managerial arrangements proposed and the financing of the Programme, further study has been considered necessary by the December meeting and I have been requested to take the necessary steps to that effect. I particularly count on the close collaboration of the Bank in this effort and I am looking forward to discussing the matter with you personally at an early date.

Thank you for your congratulations for the Award WHO has received for its Smallpox Eradication Programme. I remain hopeful that eradication will soon become a fait accompli.

I am sending a copy of this reply to Brad Morse.

THE STRATEGY FOR PROMOTION OF RESEARCH AND TRAINING IN THE SPECIAL PROGRAMME

The Development of the Strategy

The strategy for promotion of research and training in the Special

Programme has been an evolving one and will continue to evolve as the

Programme develops. The initial strategy was heavily weighted towards a

large multidisciplinary centre or institution as a focal point of the

Programme. Subsequently, there has been less emphasis on individual institutions,
and the concept of Working Groups and networks has been developed.

This paper examines the reasons for the change of emphasis in the Special

Programme. It also shows that the present plans are compatible with the
emergence of broadly based centres of research excellence when and where

these are found to be the most effective means to achieve progress.

It is clear that the organization and effective control of a programme for research and training on the scale of the Special Programme is a complex task. The keynote should be flexibility, the opportunity to experiment, to promote modes of working which are effective and to discard failures. The present plan provides such flexibility and is based on the following evaluation of the nature of the research and training activities which are required in order to improve the control of the selected tropical diseases.

Requirements for Research and Training Related to Disease Control

The problems of control of the six diseases are intimately related to economic, social, cultural and ecological aspects of the populations and

environments in which the diseases occur. There are different requirements for control in different regions, for example measures effective in the control of malaria in the Indian sub-continent proved unable to interrupt transmission in the African savanna. It is not anticipated that research will often yield a universal panacea, such as the smallpox vaccine, effective in the control of diseases under all circumstances. The strategy for research and development lies in a broad front, combining epidemiology and improved diagnostic tests to define disease problems, improved methods to control disease vectors, new vaccines and drugs to prevent or cure disease, and operational research to improve methods of delivery.

Set alongside this diversity of approach to disease control is
the diversity of approaches among biological disciplines which can now
be exploited to develop the necessary new tools. The likelihood of
success is in proportion to the number of relevant disciplines which can
be brought to bear. For example, the Scientific Working Group on the
Immunology of Malaria includes the following activities in its work plan:

- Basic studies in biochemistry, immunology, cell biology and genetics;
- Studies of the <u>in vitro</u> cultivation of the malaria parasite in mammalian and insect tissues;
- Clinical and pathological studies of malaria;
- Studies of substances (adjuvants) to be included in vaccines to boost the recipient's response;
- Epidemiological and operational research to define specifications for vaccines for malaria and methods for their use;
- Safety tests and clinical trials of candidate malaria vaccines.

Complementary to the research is the need to strengthen the capability of the tropical countries themselves to analyze and solve their different specific problems in disease control. Whilst there are no absolute criteria of national self-reliance in this respect, a minimal target for the Programme is to enable countries to identify their disease problems and to work to best advantage with experts from any country on their solution.

The "Institution Approach"

One option for development is the <u>ab initio</u> establishment of specific institutions with goal-oriented programmes to produce new tools to control one or more diseases. This option would be comparable to that taken by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research and has led to the successful development of improved varieties of staple foodstuffs. Such institution development is a clearly defined coherent process and progress towards achieving specific goals can be readily evaluated. Organizational and management aspects are relatively straightforward. There are, however, a number of disadvantages which appear when the institutional approach is considered in relation to requirements for research and training related to tropical diseases:

- 1) Full deployment of the multidisciplinary approach within a single institution may be scientifically and financially uneconomic. A critical mass of scientists must be assembled to tackle specific problems related to each discipline. Success, or abandonment of the research, should result in disbandment of this group.
- 2) The lead time is long. A minimum of four to five years is required to begin scientific productivity (it is notable that the very early technical

successes of the International Laboratory for Research on Animal Diseases have been based on a "network" type of association of research with many other laboratories, including the WHO Immunology Research and Training Centres at Ibadan, Nigeria and Lausanne, Switzerland.)

- 3) As already mentioned, the problems of disease control differ according to geographic region. It would not be realistic to suppose that one institution could deal with all regional problems.
- 4) There is inevitably a degree of rigidity imposed by institutionalization. It will be an essential component of the Special Programme that its research is opportunistic and can rapidly exploit promising new lines. It can be difficult to achieve this within established institutions.
- 5) Institutions for the study of tropical diseases must be located in endemic areas. Rapid progress will only be achieved if highly experienced scientists can be recruited from wherever they may happen to be in the world. A local institution will, however, have important obligations in respect to participation of nationals of the host country which may be difficult to reconcile with the most effective international participation. In the past, this difficulty has sometimes led to the abandonment of research institutions in the tropics.

The Scientific Working Group and Network Approach

This is the option proposed for the Special Programme and is based on the traditional pattern of research in the biomedical sciences, one strength of which is the diversity of approaches to problem solving which is engendered by conducting research on related topics by separate groups

in different places. The Scientific Working Group and network option operates largely within a framework of research which already exists. Scientific Working Groups identify specific tasks to be performed and ensure that they are carried out either as part of existing research programmes or, if not, by specifically promoting them. It has been questioned whether an international organization can manage research in this way or even whether such coordination and management is at all possible. There is evidence from WHO's recent history that this can be done as instanced by the activities of the Human Reproduction Programme and the Scientific Working Group on the Immunology of Leprosy. A member of this Scientific Working Group, Professor Barry Bloom, has written the following:

"There is great skepticism about the ability of international organizations like WHO to carry out complex scientific tasks. But a WHO program currently underway to develop a leprosy vaccine suggests that the task, though difficult, can be exciting and effective. The lepra bacillus cannot yet be grown in a test tube. The armadillo, because of its low body temperature, is one of the few animals which have the potential for growing human lepra bacillus in sufficient quantities to be used for vaccine. The bacilli are innoculated into armadillos in Louisiana. lepromatous tissue are then flown to Atlanta or London where the organisms are isolated and sent to Norway for chemical fractionation. The organism and its products are shipped to Saranac Lake and Bronx, New York, for studies attempting to make a vaccine which will immunize laboratory animals. An investigator in Japan is developing a diagnostic test; a group in Ethiopia is studying the immune response of patients with different forms of the disease; and a group in England is carrying out taxonomic studies on related microorganisms which grow in the test tube and which could be useful for cross-immunizing against the lepra bacillus. At the same time, even in the absence of a vaccine, plans are being made to set up future epidemiological studies so that the groundwork for testing the effectiveness of a vaccine can be worked out."

The Scientific Working Group and network approach provides for a rapid development of activities using existing scientists and facilities. It ensures flexibility by the recruitment of scientists and facilities to the Programme as they are required. There is good evidence that first-rate scientists are willing to be involved in this way, so that the Programme can call upon the best scientific talent wherever it exists. This approach presents major economies since much of the work will be done at substantially less than full cost to the Programme. The institutional infrastructure for research and training will be to a large extent provided by other (national) resources.

Conclusion and Summary

The development of the Special Programme based on the Scientific
Working Group and network concept offers the following advantages over
development based on ad hoc disease-oriented institutions:

- Greater flexibility to exploit new opportunities in research and training;
- Broad geographical spread to encompass the different problems of disease control in different regions;
- 3) A prospect of more rapid progress;
- 4) Substantial economies of operation;
- 5) Involvement of the affected tropical countries is integral to the Programme.

These advantages should be set against a less tidy organizational structure and a more complex task of evaluation. There is evidence that these potential disadvantages can be overcome.

The Scientific Working Group and network concept provides for development of programme activities according to need and performance. It may emerge that certain centres can be most effective if they become large multidisciplinary institutions, comparable to the institutions of the alternate approach. A strength of the Scientific Working Group and network approach is that it can provide for these to develop without prior commitment.

Diarrheal Diseases - Research

From a colleague at the Cornell Medical Center, Dr. Kean, I learned that one of his patients, Lowell Hardin, recently had been discussing with Dave Bell and yourself the research needs and opportunities in the field of diarrheal diseases. Mr. Hardin reported your interest in the subject and indicated you may be considering how the World Bank might lend assistance.

Two recent developments on this same front may be of further interest to you.

We recently concluded a highly successful conference on The Diarrhea of Travelers — New Directions in Research, in collaboration with the UNDP, Fan American Health Organization, and the Cornell Medical Center. At this conference twenty-three of the world's top scientists on traveler's diarrhea discussed the current state of knowledge, including, especially, recent advances in understanding causation, epidemiology and clinical features, prophylaxis and therapy. More importantly, they charted future directions for research and I can report to you that recent limited breakthroughs strongly suggest that prevention and control of this form of diarrheal disease can be achieved in the not too distant future at relatively low cost. Equally important, these anticipated accomplishments can be expected to greatly advance our understanding of several of the other more important enteric diseases; e.g., infant diarrhea and cholera.

Mr. Hardin was of the opinion that the results of this conference and the research protocols which are now in the process of development most certainly should be considered in the undertaking being discussed by him, Bell and yourself. (A copy of the Conference Program is attached.)

Secondly, at the recent meeting in the WHO on the Special Programme for Tropical Disease Research, I repeated my earlier pleas that the diarrheal diseases be included, pointing out that the global morbidity and mortality statistics outdistanced any of the diseases now in the Programme. I found considerable support for this among donor and affected countries. As a result the WHO indicated it would consider at a later date their inclusion in the Programme. This does not, however, satisfy me for I feel major breakthroughs can be achieved in the relatively near future and for relatively little investment in at least one major form of this disease.

I intend to send you a short paper which summarizes the results of our Conference and the recommendations for expediting important breakthroughs.

This will supplement my memos of December 8 and 9 concerning developments at the recent WHO meeting on the Tropical Diseases Research Programme. In a meeting of the Working Group on Management and Structure, which preceded the open meeting of contributing governments and participating countries, the Swedish delegate (a man from SIDA) indicated that he had some reservations concerning the proposed organizational arrangements. Notwithstanding a comment by Jim Lee that any difficulties which delegations had with the proposal should be aired in the Working Group, the Chairman did not permit the Swedish delegate to elaborate. Accordingly, no one, including Jim, had any notion of the points the Swedish delegation would make until the following day in the open meeting.

The substance of the Swedish statement was that because the Programme itself was complex, the organizational structure should be as simple as possible. The delegation questioned the need for a Steering Committee and for a distinction between "contributing governments" and "participating governments". (Both of these concepts were drawn from the riverblindness program.) Of particular relevance to the Bank, however, was the questioning of the need for "sponsors" and for a fiscal agent. You will recall that Mahler and Morse had asked the Bank to co-sponsor the Programme and to serve as fiscal agent. The statement made by the Swedish delegation was couched in terms not so much of opposition to a Bank role as in terms of an expression of confidence in the ability of WHO to manage the Programme and the contributed financial resources itself. Nevertheless, the fact that the statement was made is puzzling since Sweden is a member of the Working Group which last July unanimously recommended that the Bank be asked to serve as fiscal agent. The Swedish delegate added that he understood that the Bank had agreed to serve as co-sponsor and fiscal agent but only on fulfilment of certain conditions.

Mahler assured the meeting that the Bank had not taken the initiative in the matter and had only responded to a request from WHO and UNDP, the two sponsors. Moreover, Mahler said, while your reply had been cordial and essentially affirmative in tone, you had made no specific commitment and had imposed no conditions. You had asked for a more precise indication of the financial implications of the Programme, and had suggested consideration of an alternative approach to some of the Programme's research and training activities. The Swedish delegate then asked that your letter be distributed to the participants in the meeting, and Mahler did so.

A number of other delegations, both potential donors and LDCs, then spoke to the organizational arrangements. The other Scandinavian delegations supported the Swedish delegate in endorsing WHO's ability to handle the Programme although some also expressed hope that the Bank would contribute to the financing. (Norway and Finland later specifically endorsed a fiscal agency role for the Bank.) The U.S., U.K., Canada and France said that they would not participate in a meaningful financial way in the Programme unless the Bank was fiscal agent, and or expressed a preference for the Bank's taking on that function.

A total of \$7.5 million was, however, pledged at the meeting and indications are that further pledges will bring the figure to \$10 million, which should cover the Programme's now estimated needs for at least a year, possibly two years. Mahler therefore announced that the Programme was launched. However, the organizational and management questions are not settled, and there is to be another meeting, probably some time during the winter, to renew discussion of these matters.

Mahler is disappointed and shaken by this turn of events, since it was unexpected. You will be receiving a reply which responds to the points you raised with him in your letter of November 23. In addition, however, Mahler intends to telephone you to urge that you keep an open mind on a possible Bank association as co-sponsor and fiscal agent, notwithstanding the developments reported above. In his closing remarks to the meeting, he reiterated that it was the strong wish of WHO and UNDP that the Bank assume a visible role in connection with the Programme, saying that he felt that it was important for the Programme's success.

In the period preceding the resumed meeting, WHO will be making inquiries to determine the basis for the Swedish intervention, and presumably some of the other governments which strongly support the Programme will do likewise. I would recommend that when Mahler calls you, you say that we will continue to attend and take an active part in the deliberations of the Working Group, that we continue to believe in the importance of the objectives of the Programme and that we are quite prepared to leave in abeyance the question of a role for the Bank, which we did not seek and would be prepared to play only if it is clear that our doing so has the support of all of our member governments involved in the Programme. Meantime, we shall want to examine any revised management structure proposed by the Working Group, and we shall be watching the implementation of the Programme by WHO during its initial year to see how good a job WHO is doing.

Thank you very much for your letter about the Petro Pump. It certainly seems an interesting possibility; the only problem that I can anticipate from reading the description is failure of the anchorage and/or the casing if the pump were installed in a well cased with PVC. In this case one could presumably try a counterweight in place of the anchors, as recommended by the authors for dry wells.

I have not seen any details of the field tests of the pump. I have a dim recollection that Martin Beyer of UNICEF was interested in the pump at one time, and you might contact him. Another person who would certainly be interested (and may, in fact, already know all about the pump and its applications) is Eugene McJunkin — as you know, he did the handbook on pumps for the IRC seminer this year. His current address is: Vice President, Environmental Services Corporation, 1801 East Franklin Street, P.O. Box 2427, Chapel Hill, North Carolina 27514.

I showed your letter to Tim Journey, who is visiting here from IDEC; he is already aware of the pump; but has not seen it in operation. I believe he plans to contact you in any case, to discuss IDEC's work on standardising methods for handpump evaluation, which would be of tremendous benefit in comparing field trials carried out by various agencies in various countries.

Your letter of October 6, concerning the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases, arrived while I was in Manila for the World Bank's Annual Meeting. I left for a visit to a number of Asian countries soon after my return to Washington—just after we met at the ACC. Thus it is only now I am able to reply to you.

You asked, in behalf of UNDP as well as WHO, whether the World Bank would be willing to join the two organizations in co-sponsoring the Special Programme, and whether it would agree to serve as fiscal agent for the proposed Tropical Diseases Fund. I am pleased to say that I am prepared in principle to propose to the Bank's Executive Directors that the Bank agree to play these roles.

I say "in principle" for two reasons.

The first is that I would wish to be in a position to submit to the Executive Directors a more precise description of the financial implications of the Programme than seems possible at the moment. I assume that the financial projections will be refined at the meeting of potential donors which you are convening on December 8.

The second reason relates to the proposed task force and network approach of the Programme. There is a serious question in my mind whether this approach, which contemplates carrying out research and training for all six diseases in a large number of individual centers which vary considerably in their present quality and are widespread geographically, can be expected to provide the critical mass and to create and maintain the momentum necessary to produce optimum and timely results. Moreover, these characteristics, plus those inherent in the complex nature and scope of the Programme, will inevitably

confront the executing agency with a coordinating and managerial task of extraordinary magnitude. In the circumstances, and particularly because the proposed approach is experimental, in the sense that it has not been tried before on the scale contemplated, I would like to suggest that it would be prudent to make provision for approaching research and training activity for at least one of the diseases, in some different, proven manner. This might be, for example, to confide the attack on the particular disease to a single established (or even a new) institution with appropriate outreach activites. I do not believe that such a modification of the plan would or should delay the initiation of the general Programme, and I recommend it only because I am anxious that the Programme be a success. I am asking Dr. James Lee, the Bank's Environmental and Health Adviser, who will represent the Bank at the December 8 meeting, to raise this question with you and the UNDP.

As you know, the Bank staff who have been working closely with staff of WHO and UNDP in the preliminary planning for the Programme have been particularly concerned to ensure that the organizational and managerial arrangements proposed are sound and appropriate. I am glad to learn from them that they are satisfied on this point, and I very much welcome the willingness of WHO to serve as the executing agency. I am also gratified that, on the basis of experience in the riverblindness program, you and Mr. Morse feel that it would be helpful to have the Bank serve as fiscal agent. I am told that this was also the unanimous recommendation of the Working Group which met to consider the organization and financing of the Programme last July.

As to the possibility, which you also raise in your letter, of a financial contribution from the Bank, I cannot now make any commitment in that respect, and I understand that a postponement of this question will not have any negative consequences for the launching of the Programme.

I extend my good wishes for a useful meeting with potential donors next month. I would hope that the Tropical Disease Programme proves as successful, in its way, as WHO's smallpox eradication campaign, and I extend my warm congratulations to WHO as recipient of the Special Albert Lasker Public Health Service Award for its achievement in that respect.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Brad Morse.

in Tropical Diseases

Attached is a letter which we recommend that you send to Dr. Mahler, Director-General of WHO, responding sympathetically to the request he has conveyed to you, speaking for himself and Bradford Morse, that the World Bank join WHO and UNDP as co-sponsor of the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases, and that it also serve as fiscal agent for the Programme.

The Special Programme was developed at the request of the 1974 World Health Assembly. It has as its objectives (a) the development and application of new methods to control six tropical diseases — malaria, schistosomiasis, filariasis (including onchocerciasis), trypanosomiasis, leprosy and leishmaniasis — and (b) the strengthening of research in the countries affected by the diseases through the training of scientists and technicians. The initial major focus of the Programme will be in Africa, although the Programme itself is global in concept and plan.

Parasitic and infectious diseases are a major impediment to the improvement of economic productivity and the quality of life in tropical LDCs. Several of these diseases, notably malaria, and schistosomiasis in association with water development schemes, are showing frightening increases in prevalence and severity. The resurgence of malaria has been alarming, with the mosquito vector showing resistance to the pesticides and the parasite rapidly developing immunity to the few drugs now available. The preventive and therapeutic tools at hand to control these diseases are grossly ineffective, cumbersome and too costly for widespread use. As costs continue to escalate, application of present control technologies will advance even further beyond the means of the poorer countries. Strategies to improve the socio-economic conditions of the many millions of the poor in LDCs must include disease control, and strategies for the latter must include the development of new and more effective tools.

The current level of research to this end is wholly inadequate. For example, no major new drug for the treatment of any of the tropical diseases has appeared within the past three decades, and there are no vaccines. No more than a pittance of money and effort goes toward tropical disease research. Total worldwide annual expenditure for such research is estimated at US\$30 million.

To assure that the tools which are developed will be appropriate to the varied social, economic and environmental circumstances of the tropical

regions, research under the Special Programme is to be based on studies in those countries. These studies will identify needs and specify tools to meet those needs, and will also evaluate the effectiveness of new tools in a variety of tropical environments. Research and development will be carried out wherever it can be most effectively pursued. Integrated with the research program, a training program will be established to increase the self-reliance of tropical countries in research on technological aspects of disease control, given that indigenous scientific and technical capacity to work on disease control problems is in short supply in many of those countries.

The Special Programme thus calls for a major effort in research and training on a global scale. Although technical advances and the creation of new research potential in tropical countries may well be achieved in a few years, the full benefits of disease control cannot be expected to be realized for several decades at least. The Programme is therefore conceived as a long-term endeavor lasting twenty years or more. The indicative budget put forward by WHO/UNDP is US\$5 million for the initial year, 1977-78, gradually increasing to around US\$20 million annually, although we should not place too much confidence in these numbers at this time.

The Special Programme was first presented by WHO to a meeting of potential donor governments in October 1975. Unfortunately, it was not well prepared, and the manner of presentation evoked a negative response. Governments called for a major re-examination, especially with regard to the organizational/administrative elements.

As you know, Jim Lee has been actively working with WHO and UNDP this past year on both the biomedical and organizational/administrative aspects. There is to be a meeting next month in Geneva at which potential donors -governments, other international organizations, foundations -- will have an opportunity to review the revised Programme and to give indications of possible support. They, as well as WHO and UNDP, are expecting some word from the Bank as to its willingness to undertake the role of co-sponsor and fiscal agent. A Working Group convened last summer to consider organizational and financial aspects of the proposed Programme unanimously recommended that the Bank be asked to set up and manage a fund for the Programme. Moreover, a number of potential donors, including Australia, Belgium, Canada, the U.K. and the U.S., have informally made it known that their own participation might (in some cases would) be conditional on the Bank's association. Because we believe that the Programme has the potential for producing results of great benefit to the developing world, we think the Bank should help to mobilize support for it by playing the roles it has been asked to take on.

Having said this, we must also note a reservation concerning the approach which the Programme, as now designed, would take, and must express a concern

that in becoming a co-sponsor the Bank would be taking a risk, the seriousness of which should not be minimized, of embarking on an association with a program which could fall considerably short of its goals, by reason of its design. The Programme would employ a "task force" approach, under which scientists from technologically advanced countries would work with scientists from the developing countries. The work would be carried out through a network of existing laboratories and clinical research centers in tropical and technologically advanced countries. The existing centers vary greatly in quality; some of them are recognized as excellent; others are weak. In any case, their number is large and they are widely scattered. The management and coordination of a global program concerned with six major diseases is a formidable task which would tax the capacities of any executing agency, let alone an organization whose managerial reputation is not the highest. WHO has, however, employed this approach in the case of its Human Reproduction and Immunology of Leprosy Programmes, and we are informed by CIDA, a major donor to both, that these are successful. The Human Reproduction Programme has an annual budget of US\$12-14 million (comparable to the initial estimate for the tropical disease program). However, neither of these programs is a global effort.

The network approach proposed is not the only possible one. An alternative would be along the lines of the CGIAR, where all the activities concerned with a particular research undertaking are housed under one roof. The possibility of taking the CGIAR approach was in fact proposed very early in the planning stage of the Programme, as were a number of others, i.e., contracting out specific research tasks to private industry or to the scientific community, or inviting competition for research grants. However, all alternatives to the task force/network approach were rejected by WHO and its consultants after careful study. It is possible that the approach might work. Our concern is that it has never been tried before on this massive a scale, and we question whether it is prudent to attack all the diseases within the scope of the Programme on the same experimental basis.

who is clearly the appropriate executing agency; indeed, no other body within the U.N. system could carry out this kind of program, whatever approach it embodied. At the same time, unless the Bank associates itself with the Programme, it will necessarily be substantially reduced in scope. As noted above, the support of a number of principal potential donors will not be forthcoming in the absence of a Bank role. And clearly part of the reason those governments want a Bank association is their expectation that the Bank will help to assure the Programme's success. The dilemma with which we are confronted is, therefore, that if we refuse to become a co-sponsor, there will be no Programme, on the scale envisaged, to attack this important problem, and that if we do agree, and the Programme is carried out totally along the lines now planned, the expected results may not be realized. The Bank would be committing its prestige to an uncertain enterprise.

The letter we have drafted for you to send to Dr. Mahler reopens the question of the proposed operational approach of the Programme by suggesting that it would be prudent to place the research and training activity for at least one of the six diseases on a basis which has been successful in other contexts. The letter suggests the example of the CGIAR research institutes (without referring to it by name), but does not rule out another proven approach. It implies that your willingness to submit a proposal to the Executive Directors is dependent on Dr. Mahler's response to your suggestion. We recommend that we consider what our position should be after Dr. Mahler reacts, and after we learn the outcome of the December 8 meeting. It is not impossible that WHO would be willing to pick up the suggestion; we are given to understand that it would find sympathetic support in UNDP, whose staff has reservations similar to ours but which likewise recognizes the practical realities.

Dr. Mahler has also invited a financial contribution by the Bank. We could, of course, confine participation in the Programme to non-financial support. Moreover, even if the Bank were to make no more than a token initial contribution and to state, or to imply, that the contribution was on a once-only basis, it is likely that it would be looked to as a source of further support, if sufficient funds are not forthcoming elsewhere. Nevertheless, we would recommend that you indicate willingness to ask the Executive Directors to authorize a modest contribution as evidence of Bank support. We will have a better idea, after the December meeting of potential donors, of what amount might be appropriate. The "modesty" of the contribution is justified not only because of the uncertain prospects of the Programme but also because, in addition to the on-going CGIAR and onchocerciasis programs, there will soon be submitted to you a proposal for the Bank to co-sponsor (with UNDP and the Rockefeller Foundation) a program for international research and development on cotton.





I am pleased to hear that you will be able to attend the interagency technical workshop on "Monitoring and Ongoing Evaluation of Rural Development Projects or Programs" that will take place in Holte, Denmark from December 6 to 10.

Increasing emphasis is being given by many agencies and governments to monitoring and ongoing evaluation for rural development activities as a means to better understand the conditions which determine success in rural development projects. We in the World Bank are currently undertaking several projects that are of an experimental and innovative nature, particularly those dealing directly with the rural poor. Given that we cannot specify a complete set of necessary and sufficient conditions relevant to a project at the time of preparation and appraisal, the role of monitoring and ongoing evaluation mechanisms becomes increasingly important as the project begins to unfold. Our policy paper on rural development recommends that we "build a degree of flexibility into projects so that modifications can be made as experience is gained", and that we "devise evaluation systems in order to (a) control and monitor the extent of deviations from expectations and (b) learn the lessons of experience".

Poverty-oriented rural development projects or programs are by nature difficult to prepare, to appraise and to implement. Ambiguities and uncertainties increase when important economic and social objectives are expected to cover large numbers of rural poor. Thus, special efforts are required by project management to assess progress being made and to see that any necessary corrective actions are taken promptly with minimum costs. A low-cost and simple approach is required and, therefore, it is necessary to limit the number of variables ("indicators") and focus only on a selected number of relationships ("means/ends linkages").

The major objectives of the workshop in which you will participate are:

- a. to discuss these issues, assess current methodologies; and
- b. to design practical guidelines for establishing and implementing monitoring and ongoing evaluation systems for rural development projects.

The workshop will be attended by about 20 experts representing various international and bilateral agencies (among them FAO, ILO, WHO, OECD, SIDA, DANIDA, USAID and UK-ODM). A few other experts will participate on an individual basis.

I enclose a tentative agenda on which we would welcome any suggestions. Also enclosed is a preliminary list of papers for discussion. We sincerely aim at a full exchange of experiences and views and would therefore strongly encourage you to send us existing papers you consider relevant. If feasible, we would welcome a written account of your experiences on this subject matter (or those of your agency) to be distributed at the workshop. However, this is not a requirement for participation.

Background papers for the workshop will be made available to you upon arrival at the Bakkerne Conference Center. To enable us to prepare for the workshop, it would be useful if you could plan to arrive in Holte on Sunday, December 5, in time for dinner at 6 p.m. The workshop will end after lunch on Friday, December 10. Those wishing to stay over till Saturday may do so.

As mentioned in the attachment, you can reach Holte from the airport by taking the airport bus to the downtown terminal at Hotel Royal. Across the street is Vesterport Station for suburban trains (S-tog) to Holte. From there, it is a five-minute taxi drive to Bakkerne.

Reservations for single room lodging at Bakkerne from December 5-10 have been made for all participants by the workshop's liaison officer, Mr. G.J. Deboeck, who is a member of my staff here in Washington. If you arrive earlier or wish to stay beyond December 10, would you please cable or phone him. His office phone is (202) 477-3042. Any other questions on the workshop should also be addressed directly to Mr. Deboeck.

As the Workshop Coordinator, I am looking forward to welcoming you in Holte in the hope that it will be an interesting and productive interchange of ideas on monitoring and ongoing evaluation of rural development activities.

Steel Industry - Pollution - Visit to Demag AG, Duisburg, Germany.

- 1. My visit to WHO, Copenhagen, was rescheduled between 0730 and 0900 hours on October 12, and my next appointment was at ILO, Geneva, on the morning of October 14.
- 2. To use the free time available, I decided to visit Demag AG in Duisburg. Demag built the steel plant at Frederickvaerk that I had visited the preceding day.
- 3. In Demag, I met first with Mr. E. Szymanski from the Sales Department and then Mr. Quijst, Engineer in the steel engineering department.
- 4. We first discussed particulars about the electric arc furnace and I received a Demag bulletin, annexed, giving additional details on the Frederickvaerk equipment. Mr. Quijst confirmed the investment costs given to me at the Danish steel plant (DDS).
- 5. Mr. Quijst also promised to send me additional technical information on DDS, particularly the design and operational figures for particulate concentration before and after the filter. He also promised to loan to us a Demag film on DDS. This film shows what has been done to eliminate pollution and what the results are.
- 6. The discussion then turned to pollution in normal steel plants. According to Mr. Quijst, the investment costs for controlling pollution would be proportionally higher than for the arc furnace. They depend mainly on the number of points where particulates can escape. To get the same results as on the arc furnaces in DDS, on a basic oxygen furnace (BOF or LD) with five emission points the cost would increase from 10% to 20-25%. Mr. Quijst promised to send us additional details on the question.



Dear Mr McNamara,

I am writing to ask if the World Bank would be prepared to consider becoming a co-sponsor for the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases jointly with the United Nations Development Programme and the World Health Organization. This prospect was warmly endorsed by representatives of a number of governments who attended meetings on the Programme in Geneva in April and July this year. The idea also has the full support of Mr Bradford Morse with whose agreement I am writing to you.

I understand that as a result of discussions that have recently taken place in Washington between Vice-President Baum, Dr James Lee and officials of the United Nations Development Programme, the World Bank would be willing to examine the issue.

This Programme, as you may know, constitutes a critical priority for
the world because of its significant relation to economic and social development.
Parasitic and infectious diseases are a major impediment to the alleviation of
poverty in developing countries of the tropics; several of these diseases
are increasing in prevalence, notably malaria and schistosomiasis.

The tools which are at present available to control these diseases are worfully
inadequate for effective widespread use. For example, few new drugs for
the treatment of the major tropical parasitic diseases have appeared over
the past three decades and there are no vaccines. To remedy this situation
the World Health Organization and the United Nations Development Programme

have therefore joined together to sponsor the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases, which is designed purposely to equip health services in tropical countries with effective and low-cost tools for the control of tropical diseases. Another important component of the Special Programme is the training of manpower and the strengthening of research institutions in the tropical countries in order to increase their capability to identify and solve their own problems.

The cooperation which we have already experienced with the World Bank in connexion with the Onchocerciasis Control Programme is to my mind consluvive as to the advantages of the Bank acting again as a fiscal agent for a programme of this importance and scope. Both the Administrator of UNDP and I should therefore also like to invite you to consider the Bank acting in this capacity for the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases. Further, should the Bank be able to see its way to becoming a contributed to the Programme this would, of course, be more than welcome.

We should be glad to have your reaction to the idea of co-sponsoring the Programme and to the prospect of the Bank managing the fund for the Special Programme, upon which we could then work out together the modalities to govern contributions and disbursements.

We acknowledge with thanks the final version of the Thailand sector study and the latest drafts of the Indonesia and Malaysia sector reports. We understand the Indonesia report will be discussed in early September by Messrs. Becher and Shipman with Mr. Sojeto from BAPPENAS whereas the date for presentation of the Malaysia study is still awaiting the Bank's comments.

With regards to the Malaysia study we will definitely have at least one Bank staff member participate in the presentation, either from the regional water division or from our own shop. Your November timing seems fine to us.

Regarding the Fortugal sector mission, I confirm that I will participate in the full mission and will be arriving in Lisbon on September 27. I suggest that the Colombian consultant, Hr. Lleras, stop by for one day, e.g., on September 20, in the Bank on his way to Geneva so that he might be briefed on any relevant material. Could you please plan for such a stop-over in his mission travel? I would appreciate receiving Hr. Pinto's draft terms of reference for the full mission as soon as possible.

I am also annexing the outline for the Guatemala water sector study, presently being updated by the Bunk, and the corresponding analytical annexes. If possible this kind of logical outline, comprising one descriptive and one analytical part, could profitably serve as a guide on the Portugal report and I would appreciate it if you could pass them on to Messrs. Pinto and Vallet. On the Portugal mission I intend to bring them copies of the final draft of the Guatemala study. The outline might also be of interest to Mr. Becher in the preparation of the NHO staff seminar.

Finally, I would appreciate receiving the PIP six month programming resulting from our June meetings in Washington. We still have not received the usual detailed staff and country scheduling by weeks.

You will recall that the Joint Memorandum on Bank/WHO Health Activities, which was signed by Dr. Mahler and Mr. McNamara last May, provides that staff of the Bank and WHO will meet at least once a year, here or in Geneva, for a review of their organizations' policies and activities in the health sector. Dear Mr. Orihuela:

As requested in your letter of July 23, 1976, I am sending you a table listing the loans and credits the World Bank has made for the construction of water supply and sewerage facilities. The vast majority of these projects have been in the urban sector and the few projects in rural areas consisted of piped water supplies in small towns. I believe you should, therefore, consider these projects as urban supplies.

I am also enclosing a tabulation listing all urban projects containing water supply and sanitation components.

I regret that I am not able to provide you with information on the Bank's investment in rural water supply and sanitation. With few exceptions, the Bank has financed rural water supply and sanitation as part of integrated rural development programs and separate statistics for the water supply and sanitation component have not been kept. The brief list of projects I reviewed show that the value of the water supply component varied from 2 to 10%. If you wish to have a very approximate indication of what the Bank's investment in the rural water supply and sanitation sector has been, I suggest you use the value of 6% of the total value of the integrated development projects in the attached list.

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RESOLUTION XXIX

MALARIA PROGRAM IN THE AMERICAS

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE,

Noting the steady deterioration in the malaria situation in extensive areas of countries of the Americas, largely due to technical, financial and administrative problems;

Recognizing that important changes have been introduced in the malaria program in the Americas with regard to strategy and methodology, aimed at making the criteria applied more practical and flexible, in keeping with the different epidemiologic and socioeconomic situation of the individual countries; and

Bearing in mind that the Director of the Organization has already taken steps to secure improved financing for the malaria programs, in compliance with Resolution XXII of the XXIII Meeting of the Directing Council,

RESOLVES:

- 1. To request the Governments to speed up the change in strategy, with the help of the Organization if and when they deem it necessary.
- 2. To ask the Director to arrange for the Organization to continue promoting and to intensify the support of personnel training in national and international centers, and to ask the Governments to give priority to these activities and award fellowships for attendance at courses and seminars.
- 3. To acknowledge the efforts made by the Director to improve the financing of the malaria programs and to urge him to continue to promote technical, economic, and administrative feasibility studies.
- 4. To ask the international financing agencies, especially the International Development Bank (IDB), to give favorable consideration to requests from the Governments with a view to strengthening the financing of the malaria programs.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Director of the Pan American Sanitary Bureau, Secretary ex officio, sign the present Final Report in the English and the Spanish languages, both texts being equally authentic.

THE FINANCING OF WATER SUPPLIES IN DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

by: Harold Shipman The Senior Sanitary Engineer, World Bank

This paper reviews the activities in urban and rural water supply which requires funding and lists sources, external and internal, which are commonly employed to finance such activities. The channels for soliciting external funds are presented together with approaches commonly used to seek assistance, for planning, project development, and strengthening of management and operations. The project cycle is discussed against the background of criteria employed by many external investment agencies including the World Bank. Some general observations are made on experiences gained from water projects in various areas of the world and some comments are offered concerning the outlook for funding of the facilities needed to meet future requirements.

A STRATEGY TO MEET SHORT AND LONG TERM

WATER SUPPLY NEEDS IN THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

by: Harold Shipman The Senior Sanitary Engineer, World Bank

This paper analyzes the status of water supply, urban and rural, in 1975 based on the WHO survey data and discusses the implication of short and longer term targets on investment and other resource requirements laid down in the resolution adopted by the World Habitat Conference which alls for all people to be given reasonable access to safe water by 1990.

Observations are made on the actions which countries will have to take if the goals are to be achieved. It notes that 1980 is too near to permit many new actions to be initiated which will result in more people being served than now planned for in projects currently in various stages of implementation. For urban water supply, five years ahead is the present. For rural supplies, it can be shorter. The emphasis of the paper in its discussion of strategies is on planning, management, training, financial policies and project development. It stresses the concept that those who benefit should pay to the extent they are able, for the full cost of the water received. It concludes that most governments must not only commit several times the funds alloted for water supply in the past five years, but make major efforts in the training of manpower, in the improvement of management, and in the local engineering of projects. With these efforts, those countries which are not too far behind can succeed. For the others the gap can be substantially narrowed.

I am replying to your letter of July 1 to Mr. McNamara (CWS/W2/445/8) on the subject of rural water supply and sanitation. You suggest that, in the light of developments at the World Health Assembly and the Habitat Conference, consultations should take place within the next few months between the secretariats of WHO and certain other organizations to consider how to generate additional support for and give greater prominence to this sector.

I wish to draw your attention to the fact that the Twenty-ninth World Health Assembly, which concluded its work at end-May, has again given high priority to water supply and sanitation for rural populations. I was pleased to note that this important area was also highlighted by HABITAT in Vancouver and that the subject has been a major topic of discussion in several international forums. The meeting which was held in November 1975 in Geneva under the auspices of the Ad Hoc Working Group on Rural Potable Water Supply and Sanitation clearly demonstrated the great interest which is being taken in this matter by the developing countries and by the major bilateral donor agencies.

In view of the strong emphasis being given to meeting basic human needs in rural communities by the provision of water supply and sanitation facilities, I am taking this opportunity to explore with you how we can bring together our resources and make our efforts more effective in this respect.

I believe we have a clear account of the needs in this sector of activity as a result of the review and appraisal undertaken by WHO at the mid-decade point of the Second United Nations Development Decade. I should add that the report in this connexion, which was before the Twenty-ninth World Health Assembly, contains our analysis of the situation, and I am attaching a copy of this report.

The momentum which has developed for further progress in the field of water supply and sanitation makes it opportune for us to study how our various efforts can be enhanced and can contribute to governmental decisions and policies related to the development of rural communities and the urgent needs at the country level. To accomplish this, a broad exchange of views and experiences, which would include a review

of existing needs in developing countries, is one important step which I foresee we can collectively undertake. However, it seems to me that we need a more definite mechanism than can be provided at present through the Ad Hoc Working Group. We need a mechanism through which greater prominence can be given to the sector and through which additional support can be generated.

Preliminary proposals for furthering cooperation between the developing countries and international and bilateral programmes have been made by the Organization at the meeting of the Ad Hoc Working Group in February 1976, of which I attach a copy. These proposals were submitted for discussion. I believe that they could serve as a basis for considering possible approaches.

Taking into account the recent decisions taken by various intergovernmental bodies of the UN System connected with rural water supply and sanitation and with rural development, I would suggest that consultations between our secretariats on this matter take place on an urgent basis to develop a possible common position for our consideration. However, it is already clear that even with improved mass synthesis Mefloquine would remain a relatively expensive drug.

Thank you for the copy of Dr. McJunkin's draft "Guideline on Hand Pumps" sent under cover of your letter reference 10.178 dated May 11, 1976. I am arranging for this to be reviewed by Mr. Freedman who, as I sentioned to you last week, will be representing the Bank at your seminar in July. I hope it will be possible to let you have written comments by mid-June; if this is not possible, due to operational commitments, Mr. Freedman will be able to make them at the seminar itself.

As you know, we will also be sponsoring Mr. Tim Journey as a participant in the seminar. Based on his emperiences with UNICEF in Bangladesh, Mr. Journey has developed a prototype very simple pump which uses pvc well casing as the pump cylinder, rather along the lines of the Kumasi pump and that developed by Charles Spangler (both of which are described in Dr. Hodunkin's report). Mr. Journey has written a paper describing his pusp, which was presented at a workshop in the Bank last month attended by representatives of a number of international organizations; at the same time demonstration working models of a "Journey pump" and a Verguet pump were set up in the Bank's courtyard and have attracted considerable interest. As soon as he returns from a brief trip to Bangladesh Mr. Journey will be revising his paper to reflect comments made during the workshop, and we hope to finalize it by mid-June. After the paper has been critically reviewed during the seminar, I hope it will be possible to expand the parts of the "Guideline" dealing with pvc pumps substantially, to reflect this application.

When the "Guideline" is finally published, I would be most grateful if you could let us have ten copies.

Thank you for your letter of May 5 about Tim Journey's initial draft paper on hand pumps. I appreciate that it is difficult for you to review it at such short notice; we are new editing the paper and revising it to take account of views expressed at the seminar in the Bank, and I suggest you now wait to comment until you receive the new version, which will be our input to the IRC Conference.

Following the seminar, there were some suggestions that the Journay pump should be tried out in the field in Chana, either through the CIDA handpusp program in the Upper Region or as part of a Hankfinanced agricultural project in the same region. However, Mr. Duky has also drawn my attention to the recent "Ismediate Program Interim Report" prepared by Tahal for your Bural Mater Supply and Environmental Health project in Chana. I see that the consultants recomend the general use of UPVC casing in wells, and this is exactly the situation where it could be very economical to dispense with conventional handpumps and use a "Journey-type" pump with the well casing itself serving as the cylinder. I wanted to write to you right away to suggest that you might consider this on a few trial wells, and that this idea might be explored with Tahal and GMSC. (I understand from Mr. Buky that he has already mentioned this idea to Mr. Vogel when giving his general comments on the report; it might be appropriate for Mr. Vogel to raise the matter with GMSC during his forthcoming mission.) If you think the scheme has merit, we could explore it further after the IRC Conference; for example, I imagine that it would simplify the administrative procedures if we were to fund Journey's involvement as our contribution to the research effort. Please let me have your reactions.

Dr Dieterich has asked me to send you a copy of the second draft of a project document on an "Inter-regional meeting of decision makers for their motivation in promoting development of rural water supply and sanitation." This has been revised from draft one in consideration of comments received from IBRD, UNDP, IDRC and Mr Cohen. A letter referring to the first draft was also received from the Technical Secretary of the United Nations Water Conference.

You will notice that the major change from the first draft has been to confine the scope of the proposal to one workshop. Minor changes have been made to some of the unit costs used for estimation of the budget as well as to some of the other content of the draft.

Two of these commenting on the first draft had referred to the desirability of a tie-in between the proposed workshop and the African Regional Meeting which is to be held in Addis Ababa, 20 - 24 September as part of the preparations for the United Nations Water Conference. You will recall that the February meeting of the Ad Hoc Group proposed this but nevertheless, had stated that the workshop should not be in any way tied to the timetable of the plans for the United Nations Water Conference.

Early consideration was given to the possibility of a tie-in between the two activities. The practical impossibility or such a tie-in was quickly realized. The organization of and preparations for the proposed workshop will require about six months of lead time after funding is assured. SECTION 2 : OBJECTIV_

2.1 Long-term Objectives

- (1) To focus the attention of governments on the role of rural water supply and sanitation in development of a community;
- (2) To emphasize the importance of rural water supply and sanitation as basic and indispensable components of rural development;
- (3) To stimulate governments to increase their appropriation of funds for these services in rural areas:
- (4) To encourage the organization of similar meetings at the national and local levels for motivating responsible and influential governmental officials as well as local leaders and population groups;
- (5) To strengthen and accelerate the provision of rural water supply and sanitation.

The long-term objectives are closely related to the policy of UNEP as set out by its governing Council and expressed as follows:

- in 1 (I) Section II, paragraph 2 (i) and 1 (I) Section III, paragraph 12A (iv): to anticipate and prevent threats to human health and well being posed by contamination of food, air and water;
- in 1 (I) Section II. paragraph 2 (ii): To improve the quality of water for human use in order that all persons may have access to water of a quality comparable with requirements of human health;
- in 8 (II) Section I, paragraph 2 (vii): in the area of water, UNEP's main concern and activities should be in the field of water quality;
- in 8 (II) Section II, Paragraph 3 (i): The importance of all activities in this area (supporting measures: information, education training and technical assistance) which is applicable to all priority areas of the programme calls for action at regional, national and specialised levels:

in 8 (II) Section II, paragraph 3 (iii); technical assistance should be directed towards strengthening national and regional capabilities in environmental protection, education and training through institution building and the development of relevant policies.

2.2 Immediate Objectives

- 1. To organize a meeting in the African Region at which responsible governmental decision makers will consider the role and importance of rural water supply and sanitation in development of a community and will be motivated to promote the provision of these facilities. Consideration of rural water supply and sanitation will include:
 - (a) analysis of the influence on health, well being, social and economic advance;
 - (b) critical review of past experience in providing basic facilities and of present conditions;
 - (e) how the technical, educational, training, social administrative and economic aspects of the problem are now met and how these can be improved;
 - (d) discussion of the possibilities for obtaining increased assistance from outside agencies through bilateral, multilateral and international agreements.
- 2. To evaluate the impact of the meeting and to develop basic documentation which could be used as background material for future meetings of developing countries in other regions.

SECTION 3 : PROJECT DESCRIPTION

3.1 Background Data

About four fifths of the world's rural population or well over one thousand million people do not have safe water within easy access and in adequate quality. The dearth of facilities for the safe disposal of human

waste is even more widespread. Nor, unfortunately, are the prospects for 1980 much better. At the present pace and on the basis of past trends, the second United Nations Development Decade targets for rural water supply and sanitation can barely be met.

Importance in relation to the low level of health and well being among the population of rural areas in developing countries. These areas are characterised by a high prevalence of chronic and debilitating diseases in general and by a high death rate among infants and young children. In the view of many health experts, the provision of a safe and convenient water, supply is the most important single activity that could be undertaken to improve the health of people living in rural areas.

The absence of such a water supply and of sanitation services also contribute to the general failure of rural areas to share fully in the social and economic advances being achieved in developing countries. Less than a quarter of expenditure on these services is for the benefit of the rural areas.

Progress towards a solution of rural water supply and sanitation requires as a priority, among other things, a positive political will of governments. To this effect, the stimulation of the awareness of governments and the development and strengthening of their will would constitute an important and necessary step in the solution of this problem. Governments should be the initiators and first supporters of any programme in rural water supply and sanitation.

Motivation of high level officials of government interested and involved in this field, is expected to promote similar reactions at lower echelons and

ultimately to the people directly concerned. However, this does not preclude direct action at the community level, which is indispensable and should be encouraged.

The proposed project therefore constitutes a supporting action to present efforts being made in the field of rural water supply and sanitation. It was specifically recommended following discussion which took place during the Enlarged Meeting of the Ad Hoc Working Group on Rural Potable Water Supply and Sanitation, 26-28 November 1975, on the absence of the necessary government will in facing this problem. The Ad Hoc Working Group endorsed this project and suggested its submission to UNEP for assistance.

3.2 Description of Project

The project consists of a meeting of decision makers, selected from key officials in the national administration who have responsibility for national planning and policy decisions and for the planning, organization and implementation of rural development programmes as well as of rural water supply and sanitation programmes. The meeting will be held in late 1976 and will include an evaluation of this mechanism for motivating governments. A positive evaluation will lead to the consideration of similar meetings in other regions at a later date. The meeting will last five working days and will be attended by approximately 40 participants representing 12 to 15 developing countries. Thus, each country could be represented by 3 to 4 participants. The meeting will take place in Ouagadougou, Upper Volta and will be held in French. For the selection of the countries which will participate in the meeting the following criteria will be taken into consideration. The final selection of the place where the meeting will be held will be based on the language of the meeting, on the presence and

participation of institutions interested and working in the field of the problem under consideration, on the existence of essential facilities and the interest and participation of the host country.

Through the assistance of experts the following background documents will be prepared for the meeting:

- (1) Rural water supply and sanitation in conjunction with rural development;
- (2) Review and evaluation of past experiences in rural water supply and sanitation;
- (3) Present approaches to rural water supply and sanitation and its possible improvement;
- (1) Financial aspects of rural water supply and sanitation.

An outline of the above documents will be prepared by WHO in order to cover all the points mentioned in the objectives and to avoid duplication. Visits to four characteristic countries will be planned for the experts assigned to prepare the background documents. These visits will provide background for the preparation of case study reports as part of the content of the documents. In addition, it is expected that the experts will have access to a report on an "experience review" study currently being undertaken by the IBRD. The experts will participate at the meeting and act as discussion leaders.

Participating governments will be requested to prepare a short paper describing the problem of rural water supply in their respective countries, the ways and means used to solve it, progress and experience to date and plans for the future. The papers will be based on a questionnaire to be prepared by WHO. A second aim of the questionnaire is to facilitate

comparisons among the data presented in the national papers as well as to provide a basis for future evaluation and follow up.

WHO will negotiate with the potential host country to obtain agreement to joint sponsorship of the meeting. This negotiation will be extended to include discussions with potential host institutes within the country in order to assist with the planning and the preparation of detailed arrangements for the meeting. At the end of the meeting, a report will be prepared and an evaluation of the meeting will be made. The evaluation will be very useful for making improvements to possible future meetings of a similar nature in order to increase their effectiveness.

3.3 Work Plan and Timetable

April - May 1976 Contacts with interested parties, host country and UNEP to finalize project document and signature of project document.

June - July 1976 Detailed study of scope, content and agenda of the meeting and selection of participating countries. Invitation of selected participants together with a request that they prepare a short paper on the rural water supply and sanitation situation and problems in their home countries.

August - November 1976 Recruitment of experts for the preparation of four background papers and for their participation in the meeting scheduled for December. Visit by WHO Staff members to host country for finalizing detailed plans and arrangements for the meeting.

December 1976 Inter-regional meeting of decision makers for their motivation in promoting development of rural water supply and sanitation takes place in Ouagadougou, Upper Volta. Report and evaluation of the meeting.

3.5 Disbursement Schedule

A system of allocations based on WHO cash requirements over a three month period for the implementation of the project will be instituted.

3.6 Counterpart Contribution

For the meeting, it is expected that the host country would provide the required accommodation for the meeting as well as some office equipment and expendable material.

Some local administrative assistance and transportation facilities may also be made available to cover relevant needs of the meeting.

SECTION 4 : REPORTS

4.1 (A) Progress Report

A progress report on the project would be submitted to UNEP by 31 October. WHO would also submit any request for amended project budget, jointly with the above report.

(B) AddItional Reports

Following the meeting, a report will be prepared including an evaluation and recommendations which would also be useful in planning and preparing future meetings. The report will concentrate on the management of the project and will essentially indicate the principal factors which determined the degrees of project success or failure in meeting its objectives. The report will be submitted to UNEP in draft form in three copies for clearance prior to its publication in final form. The report will be circulated in three languages: English, French and Spanish and will be reproduced respectively in 200, 100 and 100 copies. Twenty copies in each language will be provided to UNEP.

4.2 Financial Reporting

WHO shall submit to UNEP a final account on expenditure and obligations incurred and the cash position on the advance received from UNEP in the following manner:

- (i) Total figures for the project showing separately expenditures, and unliquidated obligations at 31 March;
- (ii) Accounts as at 31 December, to be received by UNEP as soon as possible after year end and on the completion of the project shall be certified by the appropriate duly authorized agency official. UNEP project accounts shall be shown in the audited accounts of WHO or as a schedule appended thereto on a project-by-project basis.
 - (iii) The annual audited accounts of WHO;
 - (iv) A final accounting for each project in due course.

SECTION 5 : FOLLOW UP ACTION

This project represents one of the priority actions required for the strengthening and acceleration of the development of rural potable water supply and sanitation. It is expected that future regional meetings of a similar nature would be held in East Africa, the Middle East, South East Asia was the Far East during 1978 and 1979.

A parallel project on Development of Guidelines on Rural Water Supply and Sanitation is also being brought to the attention of UNEP for support.

While the first project deals with the political aspects of the problem, the second is aiming to develop simple and easily applicable criteria, methodology and technology for a national approach in trying to solve the various aspects of the problem.

It is expected that both projects will open new avenues and stimulate national actions in various countries. Similar meetings to the one proposed in this project are expected to take place at national level as well as at regional level. Their participants would then include administrators, technicians and other responsible governmental personnel involved at lower levels than that of decision and policy makers. The regional and national meetings are expected to further contribute to the better and more successful handling of the problem and to the attainment of the long-range objectives.

I have the honour to transmit to you resolution EB57.R20 adopted by the Executive Board at its fifty-seventh session on the intensification of research on tropical parasitic diseases.

The scale of human suffering from tropical parasitic and other communicable diseases demands that every available resource for their control be deployed in the most effective way. However, in developing a strategy for control, we cannot ignore that present methods frequently lie beyond the financial and technical resources of the less developed countries. Research development is needed to obtain new methods. There is widespread conviction that this requires a major, new internationally coordinated effort and that research and development based on new knowledge in biomedical sciences should be an integral part of control strategy. This is the basis for the joint sponsorship by WHO and UNDP of a Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases. In its present planning phase, the Special Programme is probing and testing these assumptions, and developing ways by which research leading to better control can be coordinated.

The Executive Board thanked those governments and voluntary agencies which have already contributed support to test the new strategies being developed for research on tropical diseases and to implement the pilot activities involved in the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases. The Board also expressed the hope that funds and other necessary forms of cooperation will continue to be made available for this purpose.

Dear Mr. Kent:

I would like to suggest that we include in the Cooperative Program workplan compilation of statistics on water-borne and water-related diseases. The objective would be to provide a basis for comparison of the conditions in a particular country or project area with conditions in adjacent (or developed) countries or with other areas in the same country. This would serve both to put the statistics quoted in sector reports into context, and also to ensure that the potential public health benefits of projects are more clearly understood. The classification of diseases might follow that used by Warford and Saunders (RES 2) or by Houarry in his work for IDRC, or something similar. The morbidity/mortality for the whole country would be subdivided, to the extent possible, into urban vs. rural, large cities vs. remaining urban areas, etc. As with most developing country statistics, there would obviously be massive problems with lack or unreliability: for example, when we tried to do a more modest exercise last year we found immmerable gaps, as you will see from the attached sheets. Hevertheless, I think it is worth making an effort at least to summarize what is known; perhaps we can discuss this during my April visit or during our lisison meetings this summer.

We must apologize for the long time it took to answer your letter of 21 January 1976 which contained such interesting and constructive comments. We trust that you will find them reflected in the notes prepared as an attachment to the report of our meeting, as well as in the body of the report itself, which we have altered to take into account the remarks you made. We have also taken into account the observations presented by UNICEF and UNDP and hope that these two texts will now meet with everyone's agreement.

We are distributing this documentation to our Regional Directors and WHO Representatives in the field for their guidance in their discussions with governments on the elaboration of programmes related to primary health care (copy of the memorandum sent to WHO Regional Offices by the Director-General attached); you may wish to do the same for your field representatives.

We anticipate that a growing number of discussions with national staff will take place on this topic for the preparation of regional and international gatherings which will offer opportunities to review actual country situations. The working papers for these meetings and subsequent reports will then form the basis of the background papers for the Conference on Primary Health Care to be convened in 1978 in accordance with WHO resolution EB57/R27 (copy attached for your ease of reference).

We look forward to seeing you, or a representative of the World Bank, in June on the occasion of the coming session of the UNDP Governing Council, and we may use this opportunity to look into the progress made and discuss further joint activities in this field, including joint on-site visits to ongoing primary health care programmes.

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REPORT ON THE WHO/UNICEF/UNDP/WORLD BANK MEETING ON PRIMARY HEALTH CARE

New York, 16 October 1975

1. Introduction

At the suggestion of WHO an informal meeting comprising also representatives from UNDP, UNICEF and the WORLD BANK was held in New York on 16 October to discuss the possible development of a Primary Health Care (PHC) programme. Such a discussion was considered necessary in view of the fact that the machinery for making primary health care effectively available to people went beyond earlier designs of health delivery, involving several areas of development, thus requiring - in WHO's view - multisectoral consideration and approach.

The meeting's main purpose was to (a) deepen the consensus among the participants by looking into the possibility of a plan of inter-agency action within a common policy and (b) start an expansion of the dialogue to include other interested organizations and funding agencies.

An outline on primary health care is attached to this report. PHC as conceived by WHO is a complex of actions having a favourable impact on health, of which health services are only a part and which includes also all other components of development which have an "impact on health" such as water supply, agricultural production, productivity in general, certain aspects of education, etc. In turn, this expanded concept of health qualifies it as a necessary component of general development.

The PHC approach is not new, but it was articulated and refined by WHO over the past three years, following the realizations that (1) inequalities and neglect of wide sections of populations persist despite the efforts to develop already operating health services and that (2) there is no sign that - by pursuing the former approach only - the situation can significantly improve in the years to come.

A search for solutions different from the earlier ones has thus been conducted through a joint WHO/UNICEF study on Alternative Approaches to Meeting Basic Health Needs in Developing Countries, in which actual cases

of apparently satisfactory primary health services had been studied to identify the principles of success.

These appear to be:

- (1) the satisfaction of the community's priorities and felt needs
- (2) the important health role of the "pre-requisites to health" as described above, and
- (3) the involvement of the community in the establishment, staffing and running of their own PHC services.

The principle of new approaches to PHC expounded in the study in question has been endorsed by the 1975 UNICEF Executive Board and recommended by the 1975 World Health Assembly to Member States as well as to WHO as a fundamental policy in developing health services. UNICEF is expected to participate actively and play a leading role in this undertaking in conformity with its Executive Board decisions.

The magnitude of this re-orientation in thinking which can be called a real revolution of the health conscience, the realization that the PHC approach in itself could be not only a component but an agent of change, and, finally, the fact that an expanded concept of health would invest branches of development other than the provision of health services clearly show that the key to success is in a flexible trans-sectoral approach.

The need for a new, flexible policy in health service delivery and the primary health care approach were shared fully by UNDP and UNICEF.

In May 1975, Mr Patel had the WHO/UNICEF study distributed through the UNDP system with his support and his recommendation that its principles should be considered and promoted.

2. General considerations

The situation in the developing world shows that countries could be categorized broadly according to 7 different degrees of interest in primary health care-oriented health services:

- (1) Countries in which primary health care ideas and actions had already developed as part of national processes and which could be both supported in their planned endeavours and used as examples and teaching areas for others.
- (2) Countries which as part of their national health planning activities had already identified the problem and come to a national decision to further a PHC approach. Such countries might require support in the programming processes and in linking their separate sectoral concerns in addition to technical assistance and help in financing a change in their health system.

- (3) Countries with stated interests and where a detailed dialogue at all levels of government and within professional and other organizations could result in informed consent to change. Such countries might need assistance at all stages.
- (4) Countries which have shown an interest in receiving information about PHC as a base for thought and might be prepared to proceed further at a later stage.
- (5) Countries which would be interested to experiment on a small scale while they evolved a national solution.
- (6) Countries which already have commitments in rural development, nutrition improvement, changes in rural water supply or sanitation and which could link such schemes to PHC.
- (7) Countries definitely not interested.

The principles of the PHC approach were endorsed by all those present. It was in fact agreed that a multisectoral approach was necessary (a) in view of the trans-sectoral character of health; (b) to avoid imbalances in the development process; (c) because a socio-economic multisectoral approach would be more attractive to investment; (d) because if health is a component of development, lack of health is indeed an impediment to any development scheme.

The presentation of the PHC approach was found to be very timely by UNDP, whose second IPF cycle covering the period 1977-81 was now beginning, as provision for primary health care should be an important input in country programme planning wherever feasible. A dialogue should be started as soon as possible at country level under the leadership of the Resident Representatives at the appropriate level of government with the participation of WHO, UNICEF, IBRD and others. In this respect it was mentioned that there was need to train UNDP staff in the PHC approach, as well as government officials, so as to familiarise them with the subject.

There was a general feeling among the participants against the promotion of pilot projects with concentration of human and other resources which could not be applied on a wide scale.

It was felt that there was enough knowledge of the PHC approach to tackle it on a national basis, or on a sub-national scale when only certain areas needed it. It might be possible to implement PHC within a regional development plan where the basic health problems of population are particularly neglected or where populations live in particularly difficult environmental conditions.

3. Resources and approach to governments

More study, but above all actual experience, was recognized to be necessary to develop all phases of the implementation of PHC, particularly as concerns its requirements in resources of all types and at all levels. There would certainly be important variations depending on the scope of the specific PHC programme, on the degree of national and community commitments, on the amount of the pre-existing resources, etc. It was clear, however, that in many cases the adoption of PHC (even the least sophisticated) entailed a considerable effort by governments, communities and external assistance alike.

On the side of assisting agencies there should be a pragmatic search for areas of intervention both within the already operational health activities and through those other activities which are "pre-requisites to health".

The meeting realized that in many cases the resources of the UN system would be far from sufficient to help countries in this undertaking. Bilateral as well as non-governmental organizations should also be involved and mobilized, particularly at country level. In this respect UNDP reminded the meeting that it would be difficult to allocate a large share of its IPF to a single - even if trans-sectoral - area of intervention. This fact created a financial limit to the impact which could be ensured by the use of UNDP resources alone and made it even more necessary to define areas and priorities for assistance carefully.

The World Bank stated that the PHC approach was fully in line with the Bank's policies. They also agreed that its implementation might require a large amount of resources.

In this light, feasibility, flexibility and, for limited schemes, replicability were recommended by several participants, together with avoidance of sophistication. It was agreed also that standards should be kept moderate in order to realize the widest possible impact with the resources available.

Against this background, modalities of approach and response to governments as well as methodology for negotiations at country level were discussed. It was noted that, while it would facilitate negotiations to provide assistance by means of "packages - or kits - of minimum health instruments", this was not to be recommended. Each group of communities had its own particular felt needs, its own limit of resources, its own types

of potential health agents. Therefore it was the specific circumstances that would define the approach to be used and the various technical and financial inputs required.

It was better to base type and magnitude of assistance on feasibility planning, on the degree of readiness, and potential of each country to embrace the PHC approach. Also guidelines for the modalities of intersectoral approach were difficult to establish. It was obvious, however, that in a certain number of cases such approach would take place outside the present health intervention, depending on local felt needs. Sectoral parochialism was therefore to be avoided and in the process of project planning community participation should also be ensured.

The countries themselves will have to be convinced to include PHC in their plan for development particularly in view of the important contribution that is expected from them, not only in terms of finance and personnel but specially of the managerial and administrative changes that will be needed to implement PHC at a national or even zonal level.

4. Plans for further inter-agency consultation and action

In summarizing the decisions of the meeting the UNDP spokesman (Mr Patel) asserted that all were fully convinced that the approach presented by WHO was not only sound but the only one applicable, as it was based on a national build-up from the community upwards.

The bulk of action needs to be taken at country levels, and to be as broadly based as possible, tying up with rural and agricultural development. The development of PHC on a zonal basis will probably have to be considered in many instances to meet the needs of particularly neglected populations which suffer from similar difficult environmental conditions. The approach should be both pragmatic and of an interdisciplinary nature. Resident Representatives have already been instructed to participate once action has been defined by WHO, and UNDP is ready to assist in aspects of the overall approach. Although there is enough knowledge on the PHC approach it has to be tried out in practice on a larger scale within a total health programme with very broad financial implications.

Regional funding agencies such as Regional Bank and UN Economic Commission might also be usefully associated with the development of PHC.

The meeting agreed on the following:

- (1) UNDP Resident Representatives should be the focal point at country level in the promotion of CHP approaches by governments, in establishing a mechanism of collaboration and in co-ordinating initiatives.
- (2) Quick action was of the essence as during the next 12 months
 Country Programmes will be completed in a majority of countries for
 the new 1977-81 IPF period, leaving little margin for UNDP contribution
 thereafter.
- (3) At regional level co-ordination would take the form of regional meetings and promotional activities, with WHO providing a suitable input in UNDP regional Resident Representatives' meetings. The country participation in these meetings is important in view of the efforts that they will have to make to change their original plans and implement the new approach to the delivery of all the components of this new comprehensive health care system involving the local communities actively.

In terms of immediate action to be undertaken, it was agreed that:

- (1) The record of the meeting, together with such other documents as may be decided on, should be circulated widely within the participating organizations as part of the promotional and educational effort.
- (2) It was proposed to organize a joint on-site visit to an ongoing PHC programming exercise (Sudan was mentioned) to attempt a clarification in general of the scope, type and broad sharing of external assistance. This visit would provide the basis for further discussions at HQ level.
- (3) It will be necessary to arrive at a clear definition of an agreed and preferably joint programme of action to continue the dialogue between representatives of UNDP, UNICEF, World Bank and WHO in two stages: On-site discussions in several countries to be pre-selected by WHO and agreed upon by all concerned. The group would consider the feasibility of a common programme of action within such countries and the best approaches leading to it. A meeting in New York or Geneva between representatives of the four organizations to draw conclusions from the results of the visits to the countries, and to chart a course for further action.

(4) On the occasion of the meeting of the Governing Council of UNDP in New York in January 1976, representatives of the four organizations would consult informally on the progress of the present plans and recommend any adjustments that might be needed. The Office of the WHO Chief Medical Adviser to UNICEF in New York will take the initiative in consultation with those concerned to convene this meeting.

5. Conclusions

In conclusion the meeting recognized a wide dimension to health which goes beyond the conventional sectoral approach. It emphasized therefore the need for a broad approach to health development and considered that communitybased PHC seemed to contain the principles of success. The meeting thought that the knowledge available was sufficient to proceed to implement PHC on national or sub-national bases without need - in general - for pilot or demonstration projects. While proceeding with the implementation, more knowledge would be gathered on aspects of PHC which were not yet completely However, the meeting recommended to avoid sophistication of refined. methods and to consider country plans only on the basis of feasibility and genuine political commitments of the governments, as well as communities. Such national commitment should be reflected in the adoption of the approach by all bodies granting external assistance. The group finally decided on practical measures of application and of consultations to ensure a joint approach in this area which seems to present major possibilities for development.

NOTES ON PRIMARY HEALTH CARE (PHC)

WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION Geneva, Movember 1975

PROBLE

Health can never be a single quality which can be assessed and stated to be present or absent. So often it must be seen in a "qualitative" sense and must be related to what people want at different times and in different situations. This does not mean that it does not have clear links with the rest of the human condition. On the contrary - ill health is one of the factors which can influence whether development can take place in a society and in what manner. Good health, as well as being one of the benefits of development, can contribute to its rapidity.

In the past two to three years major conferences, such as those on Population in Bucharest and the World Food Conference in Rome plus WrO's executive bodies, have been considering these linkages of health to development and the present national and international steps which have or could be taken to express them in meaningful programmatic terms. It has been shown that, while there have been some clear advances in certain specific health areas, the changes which have been occuring are still not making any significant impact upon the health of what may be the majority of the populations in the developing These unserved or underserved groups occur in pockets in most countries but most of them are clearly situated in the rural areas of the developing world with a second large group being present in the periurban slums. assessments which have been made cast proper doubts upon the availability of sufficient national or international resources to solve these health problems using existing methods, but they also emphasize that even with sufficient resources, the problems may not be solvable unless a reorientation takes place and a different type of proposal and programme is put forward. Existing policies will not do.

The inadequacy of present policies is brought into light by the fact that these policies largely ignore the following:

1. Poverty and health have clearly a two-way relationship. If an individual or family is very poor, no matter in what terms their poverty is

expressed, then they cannot be healthy. People living in such conditions cannot have the resources in food, water, etc., which are the minimum required for health and normal development, whatever else is done to provide them with the more conventional health service needs. Conversely, poor health can be a major factor in preventing or making it difficult for a poverty group to rise above existing economic levels.

- 2. When rural people are asked what are their priorities for change, it is unusual for them to suggest health services high in their ranking order. Instead, they mention land distribution, transport, marketing, etc., or a series of needs such as food, water, housing etc. The ranking of this latter list is not put forward because of any awareness that these needs link with health; these are the needs of people as expressed in their own terms.
- 3. In a number of ways health services have become high-technology services that are not accessible to and often not accepted by the majority of people. The objectives of the services, the problems, the manner of dealing with these problems, and the relationship of the health services to the people themselves, are at present oriented in such a way that the relevance of the services is questioned. This is indicated by the low utilization rates of health services in many countries. A further disturbing feature is that they can rarely be financed by other than indirect means such as central taxation.

For these and other reasons health programmes and policies require reorientation. No single solution is likely to be applicable to all countries in need in spite of the similarity of problems faced by most countries. What is proposed is a series of principles which may have application in a number of countries and which can be the basis for programatic step by step activities aimed at solving priority problems and meeting long-term as well as short term needs.

WHAT IS PRIMARY HEALTH CARE?

In 1975 the Director-General of WHO made a proposal to the World Health Assembly for a new approach to the promotion of national health services with particular reference to the underserved millions of the developing world. This proposal was made with a full awareness of the problems given above, an understanding of the past lack of success and present futility of proposing health service solutions with the existing patterns that are not reaching a group approaching the majority, and in conjunction with the results of a joint WHO/

UNICEF evaluative study which reviewed absolute and potential successes from a number of countries with different geographical, social and political patterns.

The proposal was given the title of Primary Health Care. Primary

Health Care was defined as a health approach which integrates at the community

level the elements necessary to make an impact upon the health status of the

people. An effective Primary Health Care response would be one which would

result in a series of simple and effective measures in terms of cost, technique

and organization, which would be easily accessible to the people in need and

which would assist in improving the living conditions of individuals, families

and communities.

Whereas past policies largely ignore the problems described in the previous section, the primary health care proposal of WHO is aimed directly at their solution. Instead of neglecting the two-way relationship between health and poverty, the policies of PHC are promotive of development which helps to free from the poverty syndrome. All development activities are seen as opportunities for promoting health, as well as it is seen legitimate for health personnel to be promoting development as part of their health related activities.

It follows directly that it is the policy of PHC to respond positively to people's felt needs no matter whether these needs are expressed in health terms or not. By responding positively, health personnel can work towards the conscious linking of health with development on the part of the community itself. As well, the activities developed can be used to forge operational links with available curative, preventive and promotive health services.

Whatever technology is proposed must be visibly effective and implemented in such a manner that it can be seen to be necessary. With this understanding, the technology can be adapted to fit the stringent resource requirements that are likely to be presented and to be compatible with prevailing socio-cultural norms. These adaptations are best done by the consumers of the technology, i.e. by the communities themselves.

Some of the present successes in the Joint WHO/UNICEF study pin-pointed some of the qualities or principles which seem to be essential in making such a proposals work in practice and at a cost within the reach of all.

In order to reach each and every individual and family within a community

setting primary health workers will be required who have particular qualities. These include relevance and acceptance to that community as well as to the other levels of the health services, and other sectorial services with health relevance. It is essential that these workers be trurresidents of the community, who have similar values and codes of behaviour, and come out of the community as an expression of that community's own awareness of the problems, rather than as a foreign implant from outside. The identification, acceptance, and support of such workers implies some organizational structure within each community since many of the workers' actions must relate to community activities as well as to individual behaviour, if health objectives are to be achieved.

The definition of the type of person and his functions deserve great attention because not only will be be expected to be able to deal with something like 70% of the curative, preventive or promotive health and illness needs of his community's families but he must also be an activist for other development activities. His relationship and responsibility to the community organization is his source of support and authority while his relationship to the district health centre, clinic or dispensary is the means of his continuing education, his channel of referral of locally unsolvable illnesses and problems and his source of drugs, equipment and support from national sources.

The apparent simplicity of PHC activities should not in any way obscure the difficulties and complexities of establishing a PHC programme. To be effective in a national context, it must be based upon a national (central) decision to decentralize decision making responsibilities and functions to the periphery. Such a decision is of major political moment and in addition has major implication in national orientation, in resource allocation and in re-education and restructuring of existing health and other sectors. It requires a shifting of the national health objectives the health services are designed to reach, a change in the manner in which these objectives are to be attacked, and a reorientation of health resources towards health related (rather than a health technology) series of actions. It in no way implies a change in quality although it does imply that health related actions will take place at the level of the health, pyramid as close to the primary level as possible.

The content of a Primary Health Care Programme must vary from country to country and area to area because although it should be a response to a national need and decision its expression is partly the result of a dialogue between

the people themselves and representatives of the health services. In many situations it may well have a preventive orientation and frequently have components aimed at nutritional, water and sanitation, fertility and maternal and child care problems. However, in some areas the priorities agreed upon may be increased production and utilization of food, arranging a better land utilization, or the treatment and referral of emergency disease cases or the treatment of minor illness.

Some of these expected actions have rarely in the past been the responsibilit of health workers to be involved in or even to pursue. Yet in Primary Health Care, the concern for the wider social and environment factors which underlie the occurrence of health (and disease) argues for a series of direct actions aimed at these causes. The PHC workers must be oriented in support of such action. They should be trained to develop the needed response, a response based directly upon a village organizational structure, village decisions and other community based workers, with supporting roles for the other levels of the services in health and other sectors.

This is a reversal of the accepted principles and practices which aim at reaching out from central facilities down to the population. The PhC proposal is based upon the people themselves relying upon their own judgement and resources in kind and labour, with the upper levels providing the needed technical support. This needs to be understood within each national context as a national decision for such a change must be made with understanding even if its implementation occurs in graduated steps by area or time.

IMPLICATIONS WITHIN A NATIONAL CONTEXT

As proposed, Primary Health Care has wide implications to national governments, different ministries, most international agencies, and bilateral programmes and to their inter-relationships. They include the following:

1. The Merging of Concerns at Grass-Roots Level

Within the setting of a community, primary health care activities are aimed at meeting priority health needs and promoting development. The needs to be met and the development to be promoted are largely dictated by the specific socio-cultural-economic realities of each community. They cannot be dictated from above; furthermore, to be effective, they must be fully integrated within the day-to-day life of the community. There should be a merging of concerns which precludes a separate organization for health. Community 'development' committees

and community 'health' committees should be one and the same committee.

Community workers, perhaps representing different sectorial interests, should be working together for the community. There should be little or no sectoral boundaries at the grass-roots level.

2. The Necessity of Multisectoral Support of PHC

In order for the merging of concerns to be feasible at grass-roots level, there must be wide support from the many sectors directly concerned with community development in one form or another (e.g. housing, education, water, agriculture). Self-reliance at grass roots level does not imply that self-sufficiency is possible. It is precisely because most communities of the developing world do not have sufficient resources or technical know-how to be self-reliant that full multi-sectoral support is a necessity. From a 'health' point of view, this support is vital because health is intimately related with the degree to which the 'other' sectors succeed in their efforts (to improve housing, to provide water, to strengthen food supplies, to clean the environment, etc.).

3. The Special Role of the Health Sector

Present responsibilities of the health sector include stating the problems in quantitative terms, proposing and agreeing upon the health technologies to be used at different levels of the health services, planning and programming of health related resources, the organization and running of a referral system, a manpower training and supervision system, and a drug and supply logistic system, and the administration of a service. All of these duties are likely to be needed as support to primary health care initiatives from the community, level. The manner in which this support is provided will likely need to be changed. Rather than being a single-sector service delivered from above, the health sector will need to find ways to organize its activities so as to enhance the merging of concerns at the grass-roots level as well as to encourage wider intersectoral support. In particular, it will need to provide training, supervisory, logistic and referral support in a manner which is tailored to meet the special needs of different communities.

4. The Necessity of Multisectoral Planning for PHC

The implications of a merging of concerns at lower levels is that the planning at higher levels cannot be restricted to a simple aggregation of the plans of the separate sectors. The means chosen by communities, sub-districts

and districts to promote health through intersectoral activities will need to be reflected in all sector plans to the degree that these activities require the expenditure of national resources controlled by the individual sectors. Thus, multisectoral planning for health is required to assure the feasibility of these activities and to promote a wider implementation.

5. International Agencies at the Country Level

If the national health responsibilities (and planning) would need to change in response to implications such as these it is likely that the international response would also need a change in emphasis. The Pesident Representative of the UNDP already accepts a co-ordinating role in relation to the WHO representative, the representative of FAO, etc. This function would become of even more crucial importance as health proposals would no longer be restricted to the generally accepted health sector and would need to be ultimately linked with other sectors and other levels of government.

STRATEGIC CONSIDERATIONS

The Director-General of WHO (and WHO's Executive Bodies) presented the proposals upon Primary Health Care to obtain reaction, to indicate a change in priorities of the Organization, to link these ideas with the climate of world opinion upon development, and to receive broad support. Proposals upon Primary Health Care have been discussed in many of the UN Technical Agencies, within the Executive Board of UNICEF, at special meetings with the IBRD, UNDP and with bilateral organizations. Information upon the resolutions of the World Health Assembly has been sent to all member states of WHO and has been a subject of debate at many Regional Committees. Primary Health Care has been a subject in training courses to WHO staff at HQ and Regional levels.

In all of these debates and discussions there has been wide and enthusiastic agreement upon the appropriateness and timeliness of the proposals. Despite this response, the understanding of what is implied by these proposals is limited. It is for this reason that it is suggested to increase the understanding within each Agency by common meetings, and by other means, and to bring the proposals to the attention of other relevant levels of government with especial attention to National Development Foards (or their equivalent). The latter suggestion is in keeping with the broad implications of PHC already outliness.

For such steps to result in effective action it must be accepted that the linkage of the different sectorial roles be made much more intimate than in the past. On the one hand, WHO will have to be prepared to encourage Ministries of Health to think in more intersectorial terms and to put forward health proposals as part of wider national development endeavours. On the other, UNICEF and the IBRD, as well as WHO, must be prepared to respond more positively to the inclusion of a health component consistent with PHC principles within wider development proposals put forward as part of a country programme.

The entry points are multiple:

For example:

- as a result of country (health) programming;
- as a long-term response to a disaster whether it be earthquake, flood, drought, etc.;
 - as an expression of a change in political orientation;
- as an alternative to a major proposal for a central hospital, medical school, etc.;
- as a component part of a control scheme for malaria, schistosomiasis, onchocerciasis, etc.
 - as part of an irrigation or rural development scheme;
 - as a response to a new road or communication network;
- as an alternative to legislation or action to limit emigration of specialized workers or the continued employment of expatriates;
 - as a response to an economic crisis or recession;
 - as a long-term solution to an epidemic;
 - as a move towards provincial equality.

CONCLUSIONS

The WHO initiative in primary health care cannot obtain concrete results without the active cooperation of the other UN agencies engaged in health related activities at community level. The type of cooperation envisaged is the establishment of closer working relations on country projects that relate to the intersectoral concerns of primary health care. The most likely group of projects would be those concerned with socio-economic development of a fixed population group, especially rural populations.

In order to prepare for effective working relations, it is necessary that appropriate staff from the different agencies obtain a common understanding of each others interests and roles in primary health care within the broader context of (rural) development. This would involve developing multi-agency task forces that would be available to work in specific country situations, joint training and learning experiences, and pooling of human resources of the agencies, rather than duplicating each other's capabilities.

Dear Mr. Kent:

One of the items I have been concerned about for some time is collecting data on drinking water standards. We are regularly asked about appropriate standards — most recently for Egypt — but are unable to give a very helpful response other than referring to your International Standards. We have no basis for comparing these standards with those commonly in use — the Survey of 1970 conditions showed that many countries had diverged from the WHO Standards to a greater or lesser degree, and I presume the 1975 update will show the same.

What I have in mind is the compilation of a leaflet tabulating, for comparison, current drinking water standards, together with a short text highlighting any major contrasts between various standards. It would be desirable to include, if possible, an annex setting out the rationale behind the standards (for example, the explanation accompanying the EPA National Interim Primary Drinking Water Regulations). In subsequent editions, I would propose that we include a critique of the various standards, but I think this would be too contentious and time-consuming for the first version.

I am sure that you must have most of this material already in Geneva, in CMS, particularly after the survey of national standards; probably all that is needed is compilation and preparation of a short text. This seems exactly the sort of thing the CP was established to handle — making WHO's intimate sector knowledge more readily available to our member countries — and I would like to propose we include it in the workplan. I believe you had in mind that Mr. Sieber should do a certain amount of analytical work of this nature; perhaps it could be included in his activities. Please let me have your comments.

As you know, we have been re-examining Bank operations in the context of Mr. HcNamara's speech emphasizing the plight of the urban poor. I enclose the Interim Report of a task force set up to study the matter; as you will see it is far from a finished document, and I personally have a number of problems both with the wording and with the numbers quoted, but it does indicate the way in which we are moving. This is of course a document that, having restricted circulation, should be confined to your unit.

I am also enclosing a copy of a memorandum which I have sent to the water supply division chiefs, which may clarify part of the text.

These documents are solely for your information — we are some way off a formal policy statement — but I think the general concepts could safely be gradually introduced into your work, not only in sector studies but also in UNDP project documents. I will of course keep you in touch with future developments; please let me know if you have any comments or queries.

Your letter of March 16 (CWS/W2/445/8 has been received, and Mr. Kalbermatten and I have looked over the draft project proposal on regional workshops which was attached to it and on which you asked for comments.

We have a few comments.

We understand that IDRC is calling your attention to the fact that while the Ad Hoc Group, at the February meeting, in principle supported the concept of a series of regional workshops, it would be only if the Group was satisfied, after evaluating the first such workshop, that the undertaking was worth while that it/agree that subsequent workshops should be held under its aegis. (This qualification is not explicitly recorded in the report of the meeting but Mr. Kalbermatten agrees with Dr. McGarry, and so, I understand, does Mr. Berna, that this was the intention.)

Mr. Kalbermatten notes that the proposed budget, while contemplating that there would be five regional meetings, makes provision for preparation of background papers by experts for only one such meeting. Given that the water supply situation is so different in different parts of the world and indeed in different countries, it is unlikely that one set of background papers would serve for meetings in West Africa, East Africa, the Middle East, South East Asia and the Far East. If there are to be five regional meetings in all, it is likely to be necessary to prepare at least two additional sets of background papers, appropriately tailored to the regional/country situation.

As I shall be in Geneva for the IACB and ACC meetings next week, perhaps there will be an opportunity for us to talk over these points while I am there.

Dear Fred:

I am sending you those pages of the Chile Sector Study incorporating changes made on the basis of my discussions in Chile. Please review them and let me know if you have any problems with the modifications.

The report was very well received by the Chilean officials who are already implementing the institutional reorganization recommended in the report. They did, however, object most strenuously to some of the investment and service level data and conclusions based on that information. For example, the new manager of the National Water Supply and Sewerage Enterprise, Mr. Gutierrez, produced information indicating that many consumers with house connections were not receiving water due to the neglected maintenance of the distribution system. As a consequence, statistics based on the number of house connections present a too optimistic picture of the number of people actually served with water. Another area of concern was the fact that during some recent years funds used for maintenance were supposedly reported as capital investments, giving a wrong impression of the investment made in the sector.

Some of the points made are correct; others could very well reflect personal bias of the new officials. In either case, statistics are hard to come by. I, therefore, made the minimum number of modifications consistent with the information available and reduced comments on past performance to a form more acceptable in Chile. I did this because the principal recommendation of the study to reorganize had not only been accepted but was already being implemented. Obviously, it is more important to have actions taken which will lead to better performance in the future than to argue about controversial facts of the past.

As soon as we receive your comments, we will issue the report in grey. With best regards.

If the short ten day writing assignment which I had in Geneva is any indication, you can assure Mr. McNamara that there will be ample opportunity for "...still closer collaboration with WHO in the years ahead...". I was fortunate in having the opportunity to work on the portion of the TDR proposal which centered on the biological regulation of vectors as a portion of the total program for the interruption of vector borne diseases. Our laboratory in the Ohio State University has had a eight year association with the WHO as a Collaborating Center for the biological control of vectors. One element of our activities which may be of interest to you is the computer assisted data bank which we are developing which makes it possible for individuals to query our data base for information on the biological agents which affect specific vectors. addition to the information from the accessions in the routine inventory of biological agents from vector populations, we are entering other reports from cooperators here and abroad to provide users with the broadest coverage of agents from which to select.

I look forward to the opportunity to visit with you briefly in Washington before mid-year.

HEALTH and POVERTY

(The following article was written for the WHO Journal by Robert S. McNamara.)

Washington: Among our century's most urgent problems is the poverty that blights the lives of 40 percent of the 2,000 million people in the more than 100 countries of the developing world. Of these 2,000 million, nearly 800 million are caught up in what can only be termed absolute poverty — a condition of life so limited as to prevent realization of the potential of the genes with which they were born; a condition of life so degrading as to be an insult to human dignity.

Although there has been encouraging economic growth in most of the developing countries over the past three decades, a very large proportion of their people have not shared in its benefits. Thus, the basic problem of poverty and growth in the developing world can be stated very simply. The growth is not equitably reaching the poor. And the poor are not significantly contributing to growth. Development strategies, therefore, need to be reshaped in order to help the poor to become more productive.

Differences Substantial

Health is one of many important fields where the benefits have been badly distributed. Health conditions in developing countries have improved considerably in recent decades. In general, the improvement has been associated with economic progress. But differences in health levels between nations remain substantial; within nations, differences in the health of the rich and the poor are no less wide.

The evidence suggests, furthermore, that health conditions among the very poor in different countries are basically similar, as the poor suffer from a core of fecally-related and air-borne diseases. Malnutrition increases the susceptibility to many of these diseases, and compounds their severity.

In many developing countries, health policies are inefficient and inequitable. Too large a proportion of public expenditures on health are allocated to impressive, but expensive, modern hospital facilities and sophisticated medical man-The allocations have power. resulted in a bias toward in-patient, curative care - a practice which barely touches health problems in areas beset with serious environmental hazards. Furthermore, the resources are typically concentrated on the needs of urban areas. Rural people are neglected; thus, only a small proportion of the total population is granted effective access to modern health care.

Increase Effectiveness

To increase the effectiveness of health resources and to ensure more equitable access to care, governments need to reduce the proportion of their expenditures devoted to hospitals and highly trained personnel, and allocate a higher percentage of their resources to the staffing of low-level health services in areas with few facilities, or none at all. The services would focus primarily on improving environmental and public health, personal health practices and nutrition. Further savings might be made by analysing the cost-effectiveness of health care activities, and by better administration and more rational pricing policies.

Reforms in the service offered to the poorer people should concentrate on improving health at the community level. The objectives should include changes in living habits and attitudes, as well as household and community activities to improve water supply and sanitation. While the demand for curative care would not be denied, a more economical balance would be struck between measures to treat disease and measures to control its incidence.

Although direct lending for health projects has not been part of the World Bank's activities, its operations have influenced health

conditions and some projects have included health services. The Bank has been increasing its activities in fields that significantly influence health conditions, such as water supply and sewerage, population planning, and the environment.

Health Consequences

In the coming years, we plan to continue to strengthen our awareness of the health consequences of the projects we support, and of opportunities for improving health. More specifically, we propose to:

- Minimize any adverse side effects on health resulting from lending operations in other sectors (such as projects for irrigation, drainage, land settlement, etc.).
- Make a number of key interventions necessary for improving the health of low-income groups (for example, projects involving water supply, sewerage, nutrition, family planning, low-cost housing, and training of health personnel).
- Conduct field experiments to test selected elements of a reformed health-promotion system within rural development, population, and sites and services projects.

The World Health Organization and the Bank have in recent years collaborated closely in many fields of common interest — the project to check riverblindness in Western Africa being one outstanding example. We look forward to still closer collaboration with who in the years ahead in helping the poorest of the world to lead healthier, happier and more productive lives. Robert S. McNamara

Conference on Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa 4 March 1976 ·

Sir,

I have the honour to convey to you herewith a copy of the final report of the above-mentioned conference held in Yaoundé, Cameroon, from 25 to 26 September 1975.

The interest of this conference and the importance of its conclusions and recommendations were acknowledged by all concerned.

The need for a better utilization of each country's resources as well as a better appreciation by the countries of resources which the international community might make available to them was underlined. The conference recommended adopting an integrated approach to the study and solution of development problems. It was recognized that the solution of health problems, despite their specific nature, was most often linked to the solution of development problems, either wholly or in part; a multisectoral or multidisciplinary approach was regarded as essential to the choice of strategies, the formulation of objectives and the implementation and rational project management. This is all the more important inasmuch as community health is both an objective of and a factor in development.

The establishment or the strengthening of appropriate structures such as national health councils was recommended for better planning and coordination of national activity and external assistance agencies (recommendation 6.2.4).

Improvement of the planning processes, of programming, of information systems, of management and training methods, with or without external aid, should lead to maximum efficiency of both national activity and action taken by external assistance agencies both at country level and throughout Africa (recommendations 6.2.5, 6.2.6 and 6.2.7).

The WHO Regional Office for Africa is ready to put recommendations 6.2.8 and 6.2.9 into effect, their object being the exchange of information, which should favour dialogue and efficiency of international cooperation. To do this it is indispensable that the WHO Regional Office for Africa receive pertinent information (recommendation 6.2.9). The WHO Representatives in the countries are available both to the countries and to external assistance agencies to facilitate the collection and dispatch of such information to the Regional Office and they have received instructions accordingly.

I have already made the appropriate arrangements to enable the WHO Regional Office for Africa to act as Secretariat of the Committee for Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa (recommendation 6.2.12); the arrangements in question are such that no additional budgetary spending is predicted apart from existing allocations under the regular budget of the WHO Regional Office for Africa. The machinery for strengthening concerted action and collaboration between WHO Headquarters and the Regional Office, which already exists has been reviewed and improved (recommendation 6.2.14).

To facilitate setting up the structures for cooperation and coordination for health in Africa I would like to take the liberty of making you the following proposals, on behalf of your Secretariat, based on the experience which WHO has gained in this field in Africa.

I propose that the next plenary conference on Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa (recommendation 6.2.13) should be held in 1977 in Brazzaville, at the Headquarters of the WHO Regional Office for Africa and immediately after the twenty-seventh session of the WHO Regional Committee for Africa; this procedure will enable expenses to be kept down to a minimum while enabling thoses concerned to participate to the greatest possible extent.

So far as the Committee for Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa (recommendations 6.2.10 and 6.2.11) is concerned, I propose that it should meet for the first time in Kampala from 16 to 17 September 1976, immediately after the twenty-sixth session of the WHO Regional Committee for Africa.

In the light of experience gained during past years in the framework of a multilateral project involving 20 countries of West and Central Africa, several external assistance agencies as well as the United Nations System, I propose that the Committee for Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa be constituted as follows until the second meeting of the Conference on the Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa which might then modify its composition:

- 1. Representatives of African countries: Central African Republic, Ivory Coast, Mozambique, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Sudan.
- 2. Representatives of external assistance agencies: Denmark, France, USA and USSR.
- 3. Representatives of United Nations System: UNDP and UNICEF.
- 4. Representatives of the OAU and ECA.
- 5. Representatives of the Development Banks: ADB and IBRD.
- 6. Permanent Secretariat: WHO Regional Office for Africa.

In this connexion I would like to point out that the delegates from the Central African Republic, France, Ivory Coast, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, the USA, UNDP and UNICEF already have seats on the Coordination Committee for the abovementioned project involving 20 countries of West and Central Africa.

These proposals are made solely in order to facilitate setting up the structures recommended by the first Conference on Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa. I am prepared, on behalf of your Secretariat, to assemble all your comments and suggestions regarding the implementation of the recommendations of the conference held in Yaoundé and to communicate them to all concerned. As soon as a consensus of opinion emerges I will inform you of this and make all the necessary administrative and technical arrangements for the organization of the first meeting of the Committee for Coordination and Cooperation for Health in Africa.

Page 13, paragraph 7 should read:

Schistosomiasis drugs were very toxic and relatively inefficient, and administration must be supervised by trained personnel.

Page 14, paragraph 1 should read:

Professor Lucas said one approach might be mass chemotherapy, but he would not wish to use the drugs available at present. If a less toxic drug with a simpler regimen were available it could be used in mass treatment, through the basic health services.

Paragraph 2 should read:

Since there was clinical and some laboratory evidence that the host developed immunity to schistosomiasis, it might be possible to produce a vaccine. But work on immunology of the disease was recent, and was being carried out in very few centres. What was required was a simple safe drug and an effective vaccine.

Page 27, paragraph 1, first sentence should read:

Mr Mathieson (United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland) said that his government had been reviewing the pattern of United Kingdom aid for development.

Paragraph 5:

The figure mentioned was in fact referred to in sterling at the meeting (i.e., it should read £250,000 instead of \$500,000).

Page 33, paragraph 3 should read:

Speaking as an African, she did not see why there should be any uneasiness because Africa has been selected for the first phase. Would it have been preferable for it to start elsewhere? If for instance in Latin America, then why not Africa?

Page 41, paragraph 1, first line:

Change Mr to Dr. Correct "East African Medical Council" to read "East African Medical Research Council". The last sentence should read "it hoped that all such possible advisory bodies would be kept in the picture."

Paragraph 3, line 1 should read:

Page 42, paragraph 6:

The general mandate received by USAID from the United States Congress was that its efforts should be devoted to the poor majority throughout the world. ceived specific instructions to ensure that health services reached that poor majority within a reasonably short period of time. Obviously health services in tropical countries were closely concerned with the prevention or control of tropical parasitic diseases, and USAID, having taken part in the discussion on priorities at Yaoundé, fully acknowledged the importance of those diseases. The United States Government was already devoting a total of between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000 annually to research on tropical diseases (at the National Institutes of Health, at the Centre for Disease Control, and in Army and Naval medical research units), and to this must be added the amount spent on animal trypanosomiasis. It involved direct cooperation with countries, e.g. schistosomiasis research in Egypt, malaria research in Pakistan, and research on Chagas' disease in Latin America. Much of it was in cooperation with WHO. Those figures did not include some \$100,000,000 a year spent on basic scientific research - cell biology, immunology and genetics. Much of this research was of the "cooperative association" type, which the meeting had discussed. In addition, USAID is providing assistance to the multilaterally supported Onchocerciasis Control Project in West Africa.

Please correct tobuilding up of a "critical mass" of competent research personnel and appropriate equipment and facilities to carry out research....

Page 43, paragraph 6, first two sentences:

Please correct to read: USAID has always been guided in its programme by the advice of international experts, and would continue to be so guided, whether the experts were called task forces or by some other name. It would continue working in close cooperation with WHO.

Page 46, paragraph 8:

Please correct to read: Professor Lucas (WHO Temporary Adviser), gave the example of the Nigerian Medical Research Council, in its attempt to define priorities for medical research in Nigeria.

The Council had identified four levels:

- (1) Epidemiological research to define the health problems of an area.
- (2) Operational research to find out how best to apply known methods in the local context.
- (3) Development research to provide new tools.
- (4) Fundamental research, for example on the biology of host, parasite and vector to provide information on which the development of new tools could be based.

Mepal We may have a mission (Smith/Saravanspavan) in the field in the latter part of April, in which case they could participate in presentation during the last week of that month. I regret that due to an error in this office we did not let you have the Region's comments on the Mepal report; these are now enclosed. The comments of SEARO and the country sanitary engineers are now being reviewed, and if we have any further comments these will be sent to you as soon as possible. Pakistan Due to other operational commitments we cannot spare regional staff to participate unless presentation were deferred. If the presentation were in early April it would be possible for one of the Bank team to participate en route to Mepal, but we do not consider deferment justified for this reason alone. If Mr. Schultzberg goes in mid-March, as planned, you should therefore assume no Bank involvement. We have cabled you today indicating no objection to the use of the December 1975 version of this report for the presentation to Government. Indonesia Due to staff transfers and other operational commitments we will not be able to spare staff from the regional water supply division

until May at the earliest. However, we think it most important that this study is presented as soon as possible, and that we should be represented. We will therefore arrange for representation by the Bank, probably by Central Projects staff. Please let us know what timing you propose so that we may make appropriate arrangements.

NEPAL - Water Supply and Sanitation Sector Survey Comments on WHO/CP Report (First Draft)

- 1. My Division offers the following comments on the above.
- 2. The report is informative, but clearly needs some revision and editing. In particular, the "telegraphic" style of certain portions seems out of place. The summary would be improved by cross-reference to the appropriate pages or paras in the main text.
- With regard to the recommendation for three institutions in the sector and a project coordinator, it is doubtful if there is enough trained manpower to staff these institutions. Most of the technical work in the sector is now done by foreign consultants and it will be several years before trained Nepali engineers and accountants could take over. Consolidation of the two major institutions, as is the present intention, may yet be preferable. The problems of rural water supply would probably be better served by coordinating the functions of those institutions which are directly or indirectly involved with the rural areas, except where urban and rural water supplies are more advantageously combined (as in Kathmandu Valley) under the institution responsible for urban water supply (Water Supply and Sewerage Board (WSSB)).
- The statement that the sewerage component of the WSSB project has been postponed due to cost increases, is untrue (see page 24). The major contracts are at present out to tender with good responses being received and not until April 1976, when the tenders have been evaluated, will a decision be taken by HMG on what, if any, of the project will be deferred. Under the Credit Agreement, HMG is required to provide all funds needed to complete the project.
- The proposal to redefine the UNDP Project (see page 21) would not arise if WSSB and WSSD were consolidated into one corporation as at present intended. A sum of US\$ 800,000 out of the UNDP Project is already earmarked for consulting services. In any case, to use nearly US\$ 2 million of UNDP money solely to assist WSSD which only plans to spend about this amount a year in capital investment seems excessive (page 32 of report). (Query is US\$ 7,500 per man-month of consulting services realistic for Nepal?)
- 6. "Training" (page 46 onwards) does not cover financial and accounting training.
- 7. On page 26, the statement is made that further rate increases appear difficult to justify publicly while service remains intermittent. While possibly true, is it politic to say this, in view of the problems we have in every project to encourage mobilization of resources through adequate tariffs? In the past of the communication of past of the communication of the problems.

- 8. We suggest a thorough check of figures. For example:-
 - (a) On page 30, para 12, we make the respective percentages to be:

WSSD	47-1/2	50
LDD	9	8
WSSB	43-1/2	42

- (b) On the same page in para 9, it is stated that Rs 20 million to serve 100,000 (? 1,100,000?) new consumers equals Rs 20 per capita. If the unclear figure is 100,000, then the p.c. cost is Rs 200, and the average of Rs 40-80 used at the foot of page 31 is inappropriate. If the unclear figure is however meant to be 1,100,000 then the statement at the top of page 31 would appear to be wrong (that there will be less than a million new persons served).
- (c) The top two paras on page 31 appear inconsistent. Para (i) says total population will outstrip population served, by over 800,000; but para (ii) says the population unserved will rise by only 0.5 million.
- 9. In Annex 6.1 the Manager Engineering and the Manager Administration and Finance should be raised by one level in the organization chart.
