- (ii) Research Proposals: This section contains the research proposals on which financing decisions should be made at this meeting. The Table of Contents lists the proposals, using the categories established in the Board paper on the External Research Program.

Panel recommendations on one of the proposals has not yet been received. It will be distributed as soon as possible.

I am not aware of any research proposals that are forthcoming for financing in FY75.

(iii) Completion Report: This section contains the Completion Report for the project on "Financing Small-Scale Industries" (RPO 277).

FY74 Results

The aggregate expenditures on external research projects in FY74 were \$1,810,000. A portion of these expenditures are financed out of credits from the previous fiscal year. The amount to be charged against the FY74 budget is \$1,768,800. This exceeds the authorized budget of \$1,745,000 by 1.4%.

The attached tables present the functional and departmental profiles of the expenditures in comparison with previous years.

In comparison with the previous fiscal year, a higher proportion of expenditures in FY74 went to research on income distribution, employment and industry; the share of transportation and general development policy and planning declined correspondingly. In comparison with the last Board paper forecast for FY75-78, the shares of agriculture and rural development, urbanization, population and health were relatively low; those of income distribution, industry, transportation and employment are relatively high. The principal differences between the functional profile of the FY75 authorizations to date and the Board paper forecast are in the areas of agriculture and rural development, urbanization and industry (all much lower); and income distribution and transportation (higher).

D.C. and I have consulted five members of the Research Committee and Wouter Tims, on possible candidates for the five proposed vacancies. There was little variation in opinion, so that the recommendations made here represent a near consensus.

Regional slots

We agreed that there should be three regional members to replace the three retiring. My recommendations are on the attached page under "current choice". The first name on each line is the first choice for each place, with one or two alternates. The letters A, B and C serve only to identify the lines; they have no ulterior significance. There are some observations on the choice I would like to make verbally.

A question arises as to the availability of Thalwitz and perhaps Vergin because of workload. Both are on leave. They will be approached (tentatively) as soon as possible.

Other slots

The two obvious candidates are Waelbroeck and Raj Krishna. A problem, unfortunately, arises in the latter's case because of his illness. My recommendation would be to state, in any general announcement, that Ravi Gulhati will serve until December, when his replacement will be announced.

If it should turn out that Raj Krishna is not well enough to take on the job, consideration might be given to adding one more member from CPS. The choice might be between Jaycox and Baldwin.



SUBJECT: DRC Research Program

Attached are two tables which present the size and composition of DRC research projects on a comparable basis for FY 74 and FY 75. Table 1 classifies the projects by completed (in FY 74), continuing, and new projects. Table 2 classifies projects by Division having major responsibility. The issues which could usefully be discussed at the meeting on Thursday include:

- is the portfolio of projects balanced as between projects relevant to the presently perceived interests of the Bank and the longer term perspective? Does it include sufficient projects designed to increase understanding of the development process as opposed to investigating currently pressing issues?
- is the concept of a balanced portfolio accepted by the Research Committee? (the issue here is that it is not sufficient to have an acceptance only in principle, because the criterion of immediate relevance tends to be applied to each individual project through the panel discussion mechanism);
- is the portfolio too large or too small in relation to the inhouse staff level?
 - are the new departures in the right direction?
- are we meeting the objective of increasing research capability in developing countries through collaborative arrangements?
- and the perennial problem of how to reduce the burden of research administration, which tends to fall most heavily on the best researchers.

Research Committee Members

Hollis B. Chenery, Vice President, Development Policy Evaluation of Research Projects

The following guidelines will apply for the intensive evaluation of selected research projects on completion.

- A. Content. The evaluation will have three elements:
 - Quality of Output: Does the output meet expectations based on the original research proposal?

 Has the research problem been redefined or the methodology changed along the way? If the methodology was not clearly specified in the proposal, is the chosen methodology appropriate? With the benefit of hindsight, does the original research proposal still look like something that should have been financed?
 - (ii) Implementation: What were the contributions of Bank staff, developed country consultants and LDC institutes/consultants to the research? Where there was some collaboration with LDC institutes, what was the scope of collaboration in research design, collection of data, analysis of data and presentation of results? What would have been the costs/benefits of greater LDC collaboration?
 - (iii) Dissemination: Are the results of the research worth disseminating? Who are the potential users in the Bank and elsewhere? What has been done to disseminate the results? What more should be done to make sure that the research results are applied in Bank operations?

B. Procedure

(i) Selection of Projects: This intensive evaluation should be undertaken only for large and interesting projects so as not to over-burden the members of the Research Committee. An initial selection of 12 research projects has been approved by the Committee at the meeting on March 25. If any member wishes to add to the list, he should contact Mr. Rao.

- (ii) Sub-Committees: A sub-committee of two members of the Research Committee will be responsible for the evaluation. At least one of the members of the sub-committee will be from a department that is not supervising the research project. The members of the sub-committee will prepare a (preferably joint) report to me evaluating the project. Mr. Rao will distribute the report to all members of the Research Committee and put it on the agenda for the next meeting of the Committee.
- (iii) Timing: The evaluation should be done when a draft final report is ready for distribution.

 Mr. Rao will keep in touch with the research project supervisors and alert the evaluation subcommittees at the appropriate time. Adequate notice will be given for study of the report by the evaluation sub-committees.
- Form: The form of the evaluation will be decided (iv) by the two sub-committee members in consultation with the project supervisor. In general, there should be a seminar with one or two discussants who will comment on the research report. The project supervisor should invite the Executive Directors to the seminars (through the Secretary's Office). Where necessary, LDC collaborators may also be invited to participate in the seminar. Following the seminar, it may be desirable for the sub-committee to have a small meeting with the project supervisor and relevant department director. Mr. Rao will be available to assist the sub-committee in making the necessary arrangements.
 - (v) Finance: In most cases, the cost of the evaluation will be absorbed within the project's budget. In special cases (e.g., where an LDC collaborator is invited), it may be necessary to apply for supplementary finance. Such requests should be forwarded to Mr. Rao.

Ford Foundation Grant For Research On "The Future of the International Economic Order"

The Ford Foundation has publicized its intention to give \$1 million in support of research on the theme of "The International Economic Order".

The availability of this money from Ford Foundation presents an opportunity for joint financing which we will pursue as and when research proposals are presented to the Research Committee in this area.

The theme of this research effort has been exhaustively surveyed in a recent book */ which has an introduction by Mr. Fred Bergsten of the Brookings Institution and contributions by a number of authors. At Mr. Schulmann's suggestion, I have examined the book looking for ideas about research priorities. My conclusion is basically negative. Let me first highlight what the book is about and then say why I reach a negative conclusion.

As the title suggests, the book is about international economic and political relations: our understanding of the structural factors determining them, recent phenomena that tend to disturb the system, and how countries might adjust to these disturbances. The book identifies twelve priority issues and classifies them as:

(a) <u>new</u>:

- (i) role of labor in international economic relations,
- (ii) impact of international economics on world polities,
- (iii) magnitude of energy flows,
- (iv) effects of environmental management;

(b) to be looked at in new ways:

- (v) basic theoretical precepts underlying international economic policy,
- (vi) role of developing countries in the world economy,
- (vii) East-West economic relations in a world of detente,

- not new but which still pose a variety of critical (c) unanswered questions:
 - international monetary relations,

(x) international trade,(xi) international investment,

(xii) coordination of national economic policies.

The focus of the book is not on LDCs. The above issues primarily concern relations between the developed countries. But they also affect LDCs because:

- LDCs have a direct stake in international trade and investment flows,
- the stability of the international trade and monetary system affect LDC welfare.

Further, the Ford Foundation (which financed this book) has also financed a similar investigation of the issue of unemployment in LDCs. There is, however, a chapter on "The Developing Countries in a Changing International Order: A Survey of Research Needs". The chapter identifies ten components of the international economic order that bear on the development of the poor countries and suggests a number of research topics under each heading:

- (i)trade
- (ii)monetary relations

(iii) investment

- the transfer of science and technology (iv)
- international public or publicly (v) guaranteed debt

(vi) private money markets

- governmental and private aid programs (vii)
- (viii) an international regime for the use of the oceans
- the international protection of the (ix) environment
- migration, including the "brain drain". (x)

The list of research topics could be useful in stimulating researchers looking for fairly well-defined researchable topics. However, I doubt that it is helpful in determining research priorities for two reasons:

> the book is explicitly about only one aspect of LDC problems; while it can stimulate thought about what it claims is a neglected area of research, it cannot help in evaluating this area against other areas of research;

(b) there is no attempt in the book to establish priorities within the subject of "International economic order". The chapter reads rather like a shopping list. Some of the suggested research topics are highly specific (e.g., providing trade data in categories such as shipping, insurance, technology and tourism); and some are highly abstract (e.g., the extent to which Western values, goods and methods have dominated development policies and scholarly work in the developing countries).

Any evaluation of specific research suggestions is bound to be highly subjective, and I see no point in attempting it. I will, however, bring the book to the attention of some interested researchers.

It may be worth mentioning a couple of general points made in this book.

In its "action recommendations" on LDC research, the authors place first priority on "support for scholarly work on the international economic order by developing country scholars" both in individual countries and by groups of countries. Out of 100 institutions that responded to a questionnaire on research, only 25 were in LDCs and only 14 of them were undertaking any research on the international economic order. The authors found that multilateral institutions placed little emphasis on research into the poor countries' access to developed country markets and development education in developed economies.

The book also makes a strong plea for interdisciplinary research (pages 46-53), recommending teams of scholars drawn from different disciplines.

Mr. Segal's Proposal

Mr. Segal has expressed an interest in doing some empirical research on the choice of technology and the process and consequences of technical change in the oilseeds and leather processing industries in India. He proposes to conduct the study while based in an academic institution in the U.K. with field work in India and Europe (to interview importers of Indian products, obtain technical developments, etc.).

The precise focus of the study is still unclear, as is the extent to which institutions in India will collaborate in the research. I would, however, like to have the Committee's views on whether we should encourage Mr. Segal to develop his research proposal for submission to the Committee, and whether any conditions should be specified. If the extent of local collaboration is small (e.g., restricted to data collection without being involved in research design) would the Research Committee consider this sufficient grounds for rejecting the proposal?

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

SUBJECT: External Research Budget - Mid-Year Review

- 1. The second quarter status reports show that project monitors expect to disburse about the entire authorized sum in FY74, including the over-programming component. Table 1 shows that:
 - (a) The authorization figure now stands at \$1,981.5, 13.2% over the budget of \$1,750.0. At the beginning of this fiscal year we had intended to authorize up to \$2,000.0 to compensate for an anticipated increase in slippage.
 - (b) Project monitors expect to disburse \$1,963.7 in FY74. 69% of this has been disbursed or represents signed commitments; 20% is firmly committed and 11% (\$240.4) is tentatively committed.
 - (c) Anticipated disbursements exceed the FY74 budget by \$213.7. This will have to be covered by slippage of expenditures to FY75.
- 2. The extremely tight budget situation is also reflected in the Controller's statements for end-December (which really reflect the situation as of a couple of weeks earlier). At mid-year, disbursed and committed funds represented 74.8% of the budget. This level was reached last year at the end of March.
- 3. We have begun to identify potential savings, but it is clear that no further authorizations, for new projects or cost over-runs, are feasible in FY74. After we complete review of individual project budgets to assess slippage possibilities, we will advise project monitors as to appropriate action. Meanwhile all project monitors will be advised that no cost over-runs will be covered. Two projects have far exceeded the budget, without prior authorization: RP0216, Agricultural Sector in Mexico, and RP0205, Cross-Section Analysis. In both cases we may have to charge the over-runs to the Departmental budgets.
- 4. Project RPO288, Agriculture in Indonesia, has been cancelled, reducing authorizations by \$20,000. No commitments have been made for RPO286, Prototype Models, and it may be possible to postpone part of these expenditures until FY75.

5. The attached Table 2 presents detailed information on each project as provided in the second quarter status reports.

SUBJECT: Activities of the Research Committee in 1974

The following is an attempt to convey what will probably be the main activities of the Committee in the next 12 months, specifying dates where possible. This note is intended to be a basis for discussion at the meeting on February 7.

I. Approval of new projects

There will be a meeting on Thursday, March 21, at 3.30 p.m. The tentative agenda for this meeting is:

- (a) To consider broad outline of research portfolio for FY75, taking account of ongoing projects and advance notice of submissions in FY75.
- (b) To consider first batch of FY75 proposals (if any have been received by that date) and make preliminary judgments.
- (c) To review specific ongoing/completed projects (see below).

The main batch of FY75 proposals will be considered during meetings on Wednesday, June 5, Friday, June 7, and Monday, June 10, at 3.30 p.m. on each occasion. Kindly keep these time slots free, although the third meeting might turn out to be unnecessary.

II. Evaluation of ongoing/completed projects

I have tentatively selected 15 projects, as per the attached list, for review during the next 12 months. Thirteen of these are scheduled to be completed during calendar 1974 or have already been completed. Two others are major ongoing projects for which we anticipate FY75 financing without receiving new proposals.

The timing and the precise mode of review of these projects is as yet undecided, but will include written evaluation of the project's output by a panel of staff members, possibly a seminar and also possibly evaluation by outside academic referees and concerned governments.

Completion reports for other projects will be distributed to committee members on a routine basis. If you wish to discuss any of them at a committee meeting, please let me know.

III. Sector Research Strategies

Research strategies are being prepared for population, education, and urban sector research. They will be scheduled for discussion by the committee when they are ready.

IV. Annual report to Executive Directors

The Board is scheduled to discuss the External Research Program again in December this year. A draft will be sent to the committee by the end of October.

SUBJECT: Evaluation of Completed Research Projects

The Committee ageeed last year to institute a system of evaluation for completed research projects. We have not, however, discussed in any detail the forms that such evaluation might take or the extent to which the Committee would wish to be involved in the process. This memo is intended to provide a basis for discussion of these issues on July 5.

The twenty-seven research projects listed in Table 1 are either expected to result in final drafts shortly or have already done so. The process of post-evaluation has been initiated with the introduction of Completion Report Forms, which provide summary project data, and evaluations by project sponsors (a few copies are attached).

The routine distribution of these Forms to you, together with copies of project output, is a minimal information requirement. The issue is what more should be done to evaluate the quality of projects or to determine the appropriate dissemination of the successful projects.

From this point of view, the factors that would be involved in an evaluation of a project's final draft would be:

- quality of output in terms of its expected pay off to intended users, both inside and outside the Bank, and the appropriate form of its distribution and dissemination.
- ii) the identification of further research problems that the project brings out.
- iii) consistency of the output with the terms of reference to the consultants, and with the approved work program of the study as a whole.
 - iv) implementation factors:
 - supervision time;
 - nature and extent of collaboration with outside research institutes, and problems encountered, if any;
 - quality of consultants;
 - quality of Bank staff participating in the project.

The following steps might be considered for the evaluation process:

- a report to the Committee from the Secretary, (a) based on the Completion Report Forms;
- (b) a background paper by the project sponsor describing the principal results and summarizing issues described in the previous paragraph;
- (c) a review seminar on the results, including the principal intended users in the Bank;
- (d) the use of outside referrees (written evaluation or participation in seminars?).

Whereas the first two steps might be implemented for all projects for the sake of uniformity, the arrangement of special review seminars should be followed more selectively. In any case, Committee members are usually invited to the seminars which project sponsors themselves arrange at the present time. The Committee might, therefore, wish to restrict the use of steps (c) and (d) to projects costing more than, say, \$60,000 as a general but not inflexible rule.

The effect of alternative cut-off levels on the number of necessary review seminars is shown in Table 3. This is based on the lists in Table 1 and 2, allowing a one-quarter lag between expected completion of final drafts and review seminars.

- 1. The vote on the Lilongwe Project was 6 for immediate implementation and 3 for reconsideration. Please let me know how you wish to proceed.
- 2. The vote on Capacity Utilization was 5 for immediate implementation and 4 for reconsideration. (The argument seems to be that a Division Chief can make a commitment in the expectation that the project will be approved or it will constitute a vote of no confidence. Budget constraints, priorities or other minutia are to be ignored.) Please let me know how you wish to proceed.
- 3. If we add these projects, we will have authorized \$700,000. Out of the first cycle all projects will have been approved, except that portions of 4 projects (Ranis, Indonesia, Shadow Prices and Country Prototype) will be reconsidered in July. Assuming that half of the \$75,000 for these projects will be approved, we will not have more than \$75,000 to spend on the July proposals.

SUBJECT: Research Committee Decisions

- 1. The Research Committee's decision to defer the Lilongwe Rural Development research project (follow-up) is most unfortunate. In fact, the circumstances are such that deferral will most likely abort the attempt to obtain supplementary information (most of which is already collected) and undermine the possibility of carrying out a useful evaluation of this rather important project. Two consultants (who are a specialized resource for the research project owing to their past association with Lilongwe) have been holding themselves ready to carry out this work. If we cannot enter into a firm commitment with them now, they will no longer be available. Without them we cannot carry out the project.
- I should mention that Mr. Chaufournier spoke to me after last Friday's seminar on the Africa Rural Development Study and said that he attached high importance to the evaluation of the Lilongwe project. Unless the decision to defer is reversed, we will not be able to meet his need. He is interested in the comparison of this project, which has involved a very substantial infusion of expatriate management, with Upper Volta, where the opposite has been the rule. I do not know whether the Research Committee was aware of the fact that deferral would likely lead to abandonment and in the circumstances I would strongly urge that the matter be reconsidered.
- 3. The deferral of the Capacity Utilization Study on Malaysia is also regrettable. The original scope of this study four case studies had had to be narrowed successively, for reasons which have never been clear to me. The importance of the subject has never been questioned. You will recall that Mr. Knapp specially remarked on the need for studying the capacity utilization question during the President's review of the work program on industry. The Boston University study on the same subject is not making much progress (see attached memo from Mr. Thoumi). I conclude that not to proceed with Mrs. Hughes' study under these circumstances is to make sure that the Bank will not be much wiser on this subject for some time ahead.
- 4. Mrs. Hughes is naturally upset. Her cable from Teheran is attached. The postponement of the Malaysia case study leaves the proposed consultant, David Lim, high and dry. He had cancelled a sabbatical in order to work on this study. I believe that this project should also be reconsidered.

> Please find attached a provisional list of proposals for the September meeting with their total annual costs. new demand for FY 73 is \$622,800, of which new proposals represent \$192,300.

Except number 7 (Poverty '2000'), all new projects and the two revised pending projects are being reviewed. Mr. Avramovic is reviewing numbers 1, 4, and 5; and his report is due September 11. Mr. Baneth is reviewing numbers 3 and 6, and his report too should reach us September 11 or perhaps tomorrow. Review of others have been finished.

We need to decide which ones should be dropped from consideration this time. I am inclined to drop all the pending projects, except the Rosenstein-Rodan Study, which I consider a marginal one.

Among the new projects, only the Ethiopia Feeder Road Study and the Urban Public Finance Study qualify for consideration by the June standards. The Poverty '2000' is an exception and may qualify for funding outside the Committee's Budget, e.g. via a special increase in our budget.

Both projects in Group B have merit and may be seriously considered. In Group D, the situation regarding number 16 is unclear as the promised material has not yet reached us. I am also inclined to reject the funding of the cost overrun on number 17.

Instructions For Submitting Research Project Proposals

General

Projects proposed for inclusion in the Bank Research Program must be submitted to the chairman of the Research Committee on the attached project proposal form. He will forward those requiring detailed review to review panels selected for the purpose. The Research Committee will meet and discuss the projects on the basis of the proposals and review panel recommendations. To facilitate this procedure, research project proposals must be submitted well in advance of the Research Committee's quarterly meetings. Specific deadlines are circulated to all Department Directors every quarter.

A research proposal consists of:

- (a) a completed research proposal form (as attached),
- (b) Division Chief and Department Director's signature of approval and
- (c) a narrative describing the proposed project.

Proposed research projects will not be considered until all three elements are completed and forwarded to the Chairman of the Research Committee. Forward the original copy only.

Research Proposal Form

The attached form is designed to provide a uniform presentation of information required on all projects. The following instructions refer to line items on the form:

Part I Project Identification

- 1. <u>Title</u>: Title of research project to be used for reporting purposes.
- 2. Department Responsible: The Department in which the principal work will be done and which will be responsible for monitoring the research contract, if any.
- 3. Staff Member Responsible: The name of the principal author or the contract monitor if the research is being done by consultants.
- 4. Number of Contracts: Indicate the number of contracts expected to be signed during the life of the project.

- 5. Total Estimated Cost: This figure should cover all dollar costs for all year (see Part IV, 1.).
- 6. Total Estimated Staff Time: This figure should cover estimated manmonths (or years) of staff time required for the life of the project (see Part IV, 2.).

Part II Coordination and Approval

- Interdepartmental Coordination: Bank departments which have an 1. interest in the subject matter of the project should be given an opportunity to review the proposal and comment on it. Functional studies should be coordinated in counterpart units (e.g. education studies should be coordinated in Education Projects Department or Economics Department, Population and Human Resources Division depending upon who initiates the proposal). Studies concerning specific countries or regions should be coordinated in appropriate Area Departments. Studies of functional and area interest should be coordinated in both places. List the Department and coordinator and obtain the signature of the coordinator. If the coordinator supports the project he need only check that column. If he does not support the project he should check that column and submit a statement of explanation which must be attached to the project proposal.
- 2. Responsible Department Approval: The Division Chief and Department Director must sign the form.

Part III Implementation

- 1. Date Work to Start: The month/year on which actual research work is to start. Date should be after preliminary discussions have been completed and research design is agreed upon.
- 2. <u>Date First Draft Expected</u>: Estimated date of completion of first draft of research report.
- 3. Final Report Due: Date when final report expected.
- 4. Implementation Method: Check the appropriate box or boxes.
- 5. Reports Expected in Current Fiscal Year: List inception reports, interm and progress reports etc. that are expected to be completed during this fiscal year. Indicate month expected.

Part IV Financial and Staff Data

Part V Project Summary

- 1. Research Objectives: Check the appropriate block. If more than one applies insert numbers in blocks to show priority.
- 2. Description: The narrative description is the key component used to established the merits of the proposed project. It should be clearly written in as much detail as is necessary to provide proper understanding of the proposal. The following aspects of the project will be of critical importance in the review process and should be included in the description:
 - (a) Problem define the problem in sufficient detail to allow assessment of the likelihood of meaningful results and possible contributions to research in the area

- (b) Method a satisfactory definition of the problem would normally suggest alternative research methods that could be followed. Indicate the preferred method and comment on its feasibility and desirability as compared to alternatives.
- (c) Coordination indicate the extent to which the proposed project is related to current literature or on-going research in the Bank and elsewhere. In particular, indicate the possibilities for involving LDC institutions and show the extent to which such possibilities have been explored.
- (d) Implications for Bank Policy and Operations discuss the relevance of the project to Bank policy and operations.
- (e) Project Organization describe project organization, phasing and planned supervision.

Research Committee Meeting, September 1972

We need to aim for a Research Committee meeting by the middle of September to review ongoing projects and projects postponed at our June session. Since I will be on vacation the latter part of August I thought it useful to outline the material we shall want to circulate so that it can be ready for my review September 4.

- Budget. We need to get an accurate figure on FY 1972
 expenditures on ongoing projects and an estimate
 of the FY1973 costs for these projects. This
 will be a principal determinant of how much we
 can allocate for new projects. The tables should
 show total cost, FY 1972 and FY 1973 expenditures
 by project.
- Review of Ongoing Projects. By August 1 we should identify the ongoing projects we wish to have reviewed. Review committees should be asked to meet in August. Their terms of reference need to be drafted since ongoing projects need to be treated differently than new proposals. Review committees should focus on the substantive progress and only delve into budgetary matters if progress is so unsatisfactory as to warrant a recommendation to cut back or phase-out.
- Status Reports. All status reports should be sent for reproduction. Books, like those for the June meeting, should be compiled.
- New Projects. Two items will be needed. a) A summary of allocations agreed to at the June meeting as amended subsequently. b) A listing of pending projects. (Copies of pending projects carried over from the June meeting should be reproduced again and included in the books for September).
- Projects Funded Outside the Research Budget. We need to develop better information on these research activities. Our present list of "internal projects" is inadequate. During August, with John Bruch's assistance, we should start a Department by Department search to identify research projects funded from loans, operational funds or special allotment (e.g. the IAEA project). Our list might not be complete by September but we will know more than we do now.

Let's meet 10.00 a.m., Monday to discuss this.

Objectives and Procedures of Research Management

OBJECTIVES

- 1. The Research Committee has the following tasks:
 - (a) To recommend an overall research budget and allocate the resources among different subject areas and individual projects.
 - (b) To recommend the total staff resources to be devoted to research and the distribution within the Bank required for the successful implementation of the research program.
 - (c) To monitor the implementation of such other research objectives as involvement of LDC institutions, liaison with academic institutions and coordination of research with other agencies.
 - (d) To encourage the dissemination of research output in the most useful form.
 - (e) To evaluate the Bank research program and individual research projects.
- 2. These responsibilities require a fairly comprehensive information system, regular monitoring of each research project and periodic assessment of the research portfolio in terms of Bank objectives and priorities. The components of the system needed for effective management of the research program are described below.

CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

3. A classification system has been developed for all research projects. This system will enable us to store information on the research program in the computer. The cross-classification of projects will provide current information on the cost and composition of the research portfolio as a basis for resource allocation and the development of projects in priority areas. An inventory of all Bank research projects is now in progress.

STATUS REPORTS

- 4. A quarterly research status reporting system is being instituted to permit a continuous broad review. This will provide:
 - i) a better basis on which to plan financial and staff resources.
 - ii) information on current expenditures.
 - iii) information on the progress of research projects and on implementation problems.

EVALUATION REPORTS

5. In addition an evaluation system will be instituted. A sample of ongoing projects will be reviewed in depth during each year. The sample will be selected on the basis of the status reports. Each completed research project will be evaluated to summarize the important aspects of experience with that project and to draw lessons for the effective dissemination of the research information.

PROJECT PREPARATION AND APPROVAL

- 6. To ensure optimal allocation of funds approval will only be given to projects which have a clearly defined methodology and work schedule. If a research project presentation is unsatisfactory from this point of view, but the subject matter is deemed of importance, the Committee may suggest one of the following two alternatives:
 - a) re-submission after appropriate preparatory work has been done by Bank staff.
 - b) hiring a consultant to do the preparatory work. This may involve some travel and data processing.

This means that we will make increasing use of a two-step approach to projects, with the first phase being a "pre-inception" or preparatory phase. Apart from allowing us to visualize better the form of the final output and the likelihood of meaningful results this procedure will also give us an opportunity to assess the ability of selected consultants to perform the task before committing substantial funds.

PROJECT ORGANIZATION AND APPROVAL

- 7. We should follow a policy of phasing large studies, whenever meaningfully possible. The determination of appropriate phasing should be part of the research design or agreed on during the preparatory phase described above. Specifically,
 - i) a study should be divided into phases whenever we can identify a first phase which has to be successfully completed before the second phase work can be meaningfully started. At the end of each phase the Committee will consider the continuation of the project.
 - ii) a study which consists of several separable components from the point of view of execution and validity of target should be divided if it makes sense for the Committee to approve some of the components and not the others.
 - iii) projects should be designed to yield useful results at the end of each phase whenever feasible.
- 8. In considering projects for approval the Committee should consider, in addition to the research design, the priority of the subject matter, and the relation of the specific project to the sector or the general subject, and the time in which useful results can be expected. The research portfolio should reflect Bank policy priorities, as well as operational needs, and have a mixture of short and longer term research projects.

RESEARCH DIRECTION

9. In order to ensure that our research portfolio develops in accordance with the overall priority needs of the Bank, the Committee may have to initiate the preparation of suitable research proposals in deficient areas. The performance of this task will, for the present, be on an ad hoc basis. However, if it proves necessary we may at a later date consider the institution of permanent sub-committees by functional areas to formally take charge of the identification and initiation of high priority research proposals within such areas.

I attach a summary of the implications of our recommendations, a completed form with details for each proposal, and notes on the individual proposals. I have not cleared the latter in its present version with the other two members of the subcommittee in detail, but I am pretty sure they are in broad agreement.

We have recommended acceptance of some proposals unconditionally and others conditionally; the conditions are explained in the notes. The total for FY72 comes to \$44,000 for the two categories.

There is a separate category which I have called "contingencies". Many of the proposals put to us have not gone through the interdepartmental mill in any real sense and were in pretty raw form. Since we would not like to foreclose the possibility of starting certain proposals in a modified form during the current fiscal year, we would also like to include a contingency item of approximately \$40,000. This is made up of two main items:

Capital-labor substitution (14)	\$10,000
East Africa (2,9)	\$30,000
Total	\$40,000

The allowance for proposal No.14 is explained in the notes. The allowance for "East Africa" deserves a little more explanation.

The two proposals listed above would be in Fast Africa. In addition, one of the countries selected for the study of traditional agriculture under proposal No.1 is Tanzania, also in East Africa. At the same time, Mr. Reutlinger is discussing with the East Africa Department what he calls a "pilot action cum research program". This geographical coincidence appears to merit more than just an observation of the fact. We cannot at this stage say how much interdependence or overlapping there is between proposals, but consider that this needs working out. It should be done in cooperation between the Area Department, the Projects Department and the Economics Department. The Program Review Division of the Economic Program Department might well be interested too. This does not mean that we will not end up with several different and differently listed research projects, but at least there will be some idea of what they look like as a whole

rather than a collection of miscellaneous suggestions. We have allowed \$30,000 for expenditure this year under contingencies, for whatever program may be arrived at. This does not include the separate allowance for proposal No.1.

I should add that in one case (proposal No.4) we have recommended acceptance of a first stage. The total, as given in our listing, does not include anything beyond this first stage. It may be that there are a number of such projects where there are unidentified and uncosted second or third stages looming in the background. This is a general problem.

The conditions under which we had to process these proposals were not exactly ideal. I hope to make some suggestions for changes in procedure in a separate memorandum.

Notes on TOPIC GROUP IV-D (Numbers follow the listing)

1. Transformation of Traditional Agriculture (new title for "Farm Level Analysis of Typical Farming Operations")

This is an important subject. The studies are no doubt suggested because of the overwhelming obstacles facing any consideration of the transformation of traditional agriculture in a sector mission as it is now envisaged. It is thus a sort of pre-investment study for a sector mission. There is a legalistic question as to whether this proposal falls under the heading of research at all or whether it should be construed as part of the Bank's regular sector work. Because of its pioneer nature, we have included it under the heading of Research, recognizing that budgetary reallocation may subsequently be necessary.

The basic idea is to find out what makes traditional agriculture tick. It is impossible to do this on a short sector mission. Instead, it is proposed that the Bank cooperate with research institutions already in the field in member countries. The design for data gathering at a micro level would be agreed upon. The field work over one year would be carried out largely by the research institution. In the following year the data would be analyzed. There would thus be an approximate two-year cycle for each country. A crude estimate of the total cost per country would be about \$150,000, but of course the Bank would not pay all of this. The studies would hopefully identify the base from which one wants to make changes and at least give indications of the obstacles to the introduction of new policies or programs. However, it may, where this is possible, be advisable to add an investigation of relevant past experience in making such changes.

Three countries are envisaged in the first instance: Mexico,
Tanzania and Indonesia. No approach has yet been made to the relevant
institutions in these countries. Therefore we do not have a satisfactory
proposal in our hands. There is here a chicken-and-egg problem. Without
having some authorization from the Committee, it is not going to be
possible to approach these institutions. Our recommendation is that such
an authorization be made, subject to satisfactory proposals being put
forward later. It is unlikely that much will be spent this year. The
total allowance made should be ample for two countries. It may be enough
for three, but in any case a re-submission to the Committee for the third
country is always possible.

2. Case Study on Lilongwe

This study answers the question: What has a particular Bank project accomplished? One may question what this will show unless it is related to agriculture as a whole in Malawi and, preferably, in East Africa. In other words, we have nothing against the case study, but it should be a case study in a context. The development of agriculture without projects such as this or with different kinds of intervention under similar conditions in should be looked at as well, if not necessarily/the same depth. The other "interventions" may or may not be Bank projects. The reasons why this particular project was chosen for the in-depth study have not been fully explained.

The proposal needs to be worked out in context of East African agriculture, as explained in the covering note. While no money has been

recommended for allocation, a substantial contingency item has been made for a study of this kind.

3. Computer Simulation Models

This is a reasonable proposal. An absolutely essential condition of it should be that, if some of the work cannot be done in-house, then there should be an in-house counterpart to any consultant in the Agriculture Projects Department. The recommendation is subject to this condition.

4. Agricultural Marketing Problems in Low-income Countries

In the outline attached, on the third page, there is a paragraph describing the first stage of this project. This seems to be the right way of proceeding and the first stage should be accepted.

5. Agricultural Research and Productivity Changes

This project may produce interesting results, though many people would have their doubts. In any case, it would seem to be beyond the frontiers of the Bank's comparative advantage. No allocation.

6. Mechanization in India

This is a continuation of a research project entrusted to a highly respectable organization, which has nevertheless failed to deliver the goods on time. It illustrates the importance of staging research projects and also devoting a certain amount of staff time to following them up. Moreover, the existence of this research project does not appear to be well-known in the Agriculture Projects Department.

Transferring the PEO data to tape would seem to be well worthwhile. It should be a crystal-clear condition that in doing so the Bank is able to make the information available to any research body it wishes within reason. On this understanding, this part is acceptable.

In addition, a small allowance for doing part of the study which was supposed to have been done before would also appear to be acceptable. It appears to be the only thing which Lockwood would do in the time available to him. The subject is also of considerable interest.

- 7. East Pakistan Farmers' Response to the New Varieties
 No consultants' fees involved.
- 8. Review of Small Farmer Participation in Yugoslav Agriculture
 No consultants' fees involved.
- 9. Evaluation of Alternative Livestock Production Schemes in East Africa

Mr. Husain is apparently at this time in East Africa trying to discover whether there is the basis for a proposal. We recommend waiting until he reports, but have included a contingency item under the general East African heading.

- 10. Reappraisal of Credits for Farm Mechanization in Pakistan
 No consultants' fees appear to be involved at this time.
- 11. Reappraisal of Indian Irrigation Projects

 Consultants' fees appear to have already been paid.

12. Livestock in the Mexican Agricultural Model

This is a modest investment in increasing the capability of a model which has already proved itself operationally. We recommend acceptance.

13. Investment Costs in Relation to Employment

It is doubtful whether this proposal deserves more than a modest in-house investment in the first instance to discover what information exists in the Bank. This is on the supposition that what is required is only a set of rule-of-thumb coefficients.

If one wants to go further, it is a little difficult to see why this proposal does not become a subdivision of the next proposal (No. 14).

No allocation recommended.

14. Study of Intermediate Technology

This proposal envisages a large investment (about \$300,000) in a field of undoubted interest, but it has been put forward in ignorance of a parallel project. This is the "Study of the Substitution of Labor for Equipment in Road Construction", of which the draft report of Phase I has just come out. The proposal in the agricultural field which has been put forward should in fact have a similar title to this one and be considered under the same general umbrella. We have suggested to the Agriculture Projects Department that they study the draft report and come up with new proposals in the next six weeks or so. During this time, consultants used for the report on road construction will be in the Bank and the draft report will be reviewed. They have agreed to do this, although they are very strapped for people.

The proposal envisages investigation into two sorts of fields, public works (irrigation and land clearance) and farm production techniques. It seems quite clear that the first of these overlaps very greatly with the investigation into road construction. It would seem very much better to utilize the experience gained in the study on road construction and to extend it to other public works. One might well feel that agricultural public works deserve the first consideration. We have to consider in the timing of this whether it would not be most profitable to use the same consultants for this purpose. In any event, there seems to be a very strong case for broadening the road construction study, in conception at least, to include all public works. We have not considered at the moment how this should be managed interdepartmentally.

While some of the same conceptual problems and issues would be common to farm production techniques, it may well be that this particular sort of study will require a review of different kinds of literature, visits to different institutions and probably different consultants. It should of course not proceed in ignorance of the public works studies, but the connection can be a good deal looser.

We would hope that by December a more clearly defined proposal will be put forward. It is doubtful whether much money could be spent during the current fiscal year, so that we have allocated a fairly small sum for contingencies under this heading.

15. Research Design for Data Collection

No consultants' fees appear to be involved.

16. Institutional and Management Aspects in Agricultural Projects

This is an interesting idea, but our information on it is somewhat fragmentary. We have just received additional material on it which we hope to study. We are therefore deferring judgment for the moment.

17. Scale Economies in Beef Production

This proposal was on Mr. Lowther's first list, but not on his second list. I have not seen the proposal. It is included for the record.

For the time being, the Committee is only concerned with the allocation of consultants funds for research budgeted for FY72. administrative arrangements for the Research Program are in full operation, the Research Committee will review all major projects undertaken with Bank resources.

Researchers wishing to use FY72 consultants funds for their project should submit a proposal using the instructions and form attached to this memo. The extent of justification required on each project will vary according to the amount of money involved. Proposals should be submitted to Department Directors for consolidation into Departmental lists. We will generally follow the recommendations of Department Directors on small items and respect departmental priorities as far as possible. Departmental lists should, therefore, be arranged in order of priority.

We would like to allocate the FY72 consultants budget before the beginning of the fiscal year on July 1, 1971. To give the Research Committee adequate time to review the proposals, the departmental lists, with proposals attached, should be submitted to Mr. Lowther not later than May 28, 1971. (Incidentally, the instructions and forms being used are still in the development stage and Mr. Lowther will be happy to answer questions regarding their use and receive suggestions for improving them.)

Projects are placed in the program after review and approval by the Research Committee. All projects will be judged on the basis of information submitted in accordance with these instructions, supplemented by a discussion of the larger projects.

THE RESEARCH PROPOSAL FORM:

The attached form is designed to provide certain standard items of information required on all projects. It should be submitted as the top sheet on all proposals. The following comments refer to the items on the form:

- PART I #1. The title should be brief and descriptive.
 - #2. The Sponsoring Department is the one to which all budget charges will be made. It need not be the initiating Department or the Department in which the work is done.
 - #3. The staff member responsible is the Bank "contact man" on the project. He need not be the project director.
 - #4. Research done internally requires no consultants funds and a proposal is not requested at this time. Research done externally is paid for out of the consultants budget associated staff time is for supervision only. Check "Both" if the project requires consultants and more than supervisory involvement of staff members.
- PART II In the space provided, answer queries 1 and 2. Check the appropriate blocks under item 3.
- PART III Estimate the staff time and consultants, travel and data processing costs by fiscal year. Indicate the FY concerned at the top of each column. (A detailed budget work sheet to help you make estimates is available.)
- PART IV When completed, submit the proposal to the director of the sponsoring department and then to the Research Committee.

THE PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Attach to the form a description of the project in whatever detail you think is useful. The description may be presented in any convenient format, but should contain at least the following information:

- a) the title,
- the names of the researchers involved, showing department and division for staff members and affiliation, if any, for consultants,

The Research Committee met on October 21, from 3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. The following decisions were reached:

Foodgrain Production in Asia

It was decided not to increase the previously approved allocation of \$50,000 for this project. If additional resources are required for FY75, the project supervisors should be asked to make a further request.

Simulation of Buffer Stocks

The proposal was rejected on the grounds of not being satisfactorily formulated and not sufficiently responsive to operational needs. The proposal did not account for the response of producers to the effect of buffer stock policies on the movements of producer prices; and did not satisfactorily integrate international trade opportunities into the formulation of buffer stock policies. It was strongly felt that research on this subject was important and relevant to Bank operations. It was felt that research on this subject should start expeditiously and that Mr. Reutlinger should be approached to develop a research proposal that would satisfy these concerns.

Raising the Productivity of Small Farms

Despite considerable reservations about the formulation of this research proposal, it was decided to approve \$30,000 for the Tanzania case study. The project supervisors would be asked to submit a brief statement describing what the research would consist of to Mr. King, which would then be circulated to the Research Committee. Further financing for additional case studies would be conditional on the Committee being satisfied with the results of the Tanzania study.

Capacity Utilization

The Research Committee approved the proposal for \$16,000 in FY75.

Standards of Urban Electricity Distribution

The Research Committee approved \$29,000 for Phase II of this project (RPO 267) for FY75. This amount was arrived at by deducting \$9,400 (for the third case study) from the request of \$38,500.

The Determinants of Schooling in Northeast Brazil

The Research Committee rejected this proposal. Some members felt that although this proposal was rejected, it would be desirable for the Bank to be involved in the ECIEL education research program.

The Committee discussed the need for seminar style discussions of research priorities in selected areas. Three subjects on which such discussions would be fruitful were (a) information requirements for rural development projects; (b) education; (c) urban and regional development. The Secretary would pursue these possibilities with the departments concerned.

The Secretary was directed to distribute Mr. Westphal's memorandum on public enterprise research to the Research Committee members.

The authors of the study, "Multi-Level Planning: Case Studies in Mexico" should be congratulated on their being awarded the Lanchester Prize.

The Research Committee met on July 29, from 3:00 p.m. to 5:15 p.m. The following decisions were reached:

Macro-Model for Bangladesh

This proposal was rejected. The proposers should be asked to inquire about the Ford Foundation which might already be financing a similar study.

Prototype Models for Country Analysis

The proposal was accepted with a reduced financial allocation of \$50,000 for FY75. A steering committee would be established to guide work on this project.

Foodgrain Production in Asia

It was agreed that preliminary work on this proposal should commence this year, along the lines of paragraph 8(a) and (b) of the panel report (memorandum from Messrs. Raj Krishna and Anandarup Ray to Mr. D. C. Rao, dated May 16). During FY75, there should be a survey of the present study of knowledge on the topic, and a new proposal should be submitted for a decision on continued financing of this research. The proposers should also explore the extent to which other research institutions could undertake research in the determinants of the supply of foodgrains in Asia. The financial allocation for FY75 would be up to \$50,000.

Analytics of Change in Rural Communities

The proposal was accepted. The financial allocation for FY75 is \$57,000.

Pricing and Financing of Urban Public Services: Water Supply and Sewage Disposal

The recommendation of the panel was accepted. The study will be confined to two cities, with the field work for the second city being done in FY76. The financial allocation for FY75 would be approximately \$35,000; the precise allocation would be subject to a review of the budget.

Methodology for the Evaluation of Education Attainments: Phase II

The proposal was accepted. The financial allocation for FY75 is \$40,000.

Economic Development and Educational Reform

The revised proposal, submitted in accordance with the panel recommendation, was accepted. The financial allocation for FY75 is \$14,000.

The Research Committee noted that a proposal would be forthcoming for the in-depth study of three or four countries on the productivity and output of small farms. It had previously been stated that detailed proposals would be submitted by FAO in July 1974 (memorandum from Mr. Yudelman to Mr. McNamara, dated May 22, 1974).

Including the amounts allocated at this meeting, the total financial authorizations for FY75 are now \$2,012,000.

- 1. The Committee approved the proposed extension of the research project "Growth and Income Distribution in Brazil" (RPO-269) on the basis of the understandings required by the review panel.
- 2. Mr. Chenery informed the Committee about the highlights of the Conference on Social Science Research on Development, held at Bellagio, Italy, in February 1974. The papers that were presented at the meeting and a summary of the discussions will be issued in the near future and distributed to Committee members. Smaller meetings of sub-groups of the research donors would be held periodically to exchange information on research priorities and projects in areas of mutual interest, explore possibilities and procedures for joint financing and attempt to compile an inventory of externally-financed ongoing research. The meetings would be held initially in Washington and perhaps later in Paris.
- 3. Mr. Stern informed the Committee that P&B had recommended an FY75 External Research Budget of \$2.1 million at FY74 prices. An analysis of expected proposals and the FY75 needs of ongoing projects showed that the aggregate demand for research funds would probably be over \$2.5 million in FY75. The functional profile would approximate what was forecast at the February 7th meeting of the Research Committee, except for a lower share of research in urbanization and public utilities.
- 4. The tentative program and assignments for the evaluation of completed projects was approved. In addition, the Highway Design Study (RPO-227) would also be reviewed at a suitable time, probably late in FY75. Mr. Chenery will issue guidelines for the conduct of these evaluations.

Mr. Stern informed the Committee of a request for finance from the Council For Asian Manpower Studies. the five committees had submitted packages of research proposals. Since the projects were small, tackled a variety of problems, and were not supported by adequate explanatory material, they were not suitable for funding from the External Research Budget. Nor was there any basis for departing from the established policy of not providing program support for research institutions from the External Research Budget. Nevertheless, it was agreed that Mr. Chenery, with the concurrence of the Asia Region, should convey the view of the Committee to Mr. McNamara that some financial support of CAMS during its first two years is warranted. Bank support would supplement contributions from other institutions, such as Ford, Rockefeller, IDRC and USAID. The expectation is that at the end of two years CAMS would have built up its research capacity and its ability to formulate projects suitable for possible financing from the External Research Budget. The request would be for \$50,000 over FY75 and FY76.

- The decisions of the Committee on the proposals are summarized in the attached table. The total amount authorized is \$138,000, which brings the total FY1974 authorizations to date to \$2,006,000. Whereas cost savings on a few projects have already been identified, the Committee should be cautious in making additional authorizations during FY1974, in view of the fact that the first quarter commitments plus disbursements during FY1974 are about twice the rate observed in FY1973.

I. Allocations

The attached table shows the allocations approved today. Today's allocation of \$116,400 leaves \$86,000 for later allocations against:

re-submission of projects # 4 and 7

later submissions. Present indications are that this will definitely amount to about \$150,000.

Notes on the projects follow.

- 1. Employment and Income Distribution in Malaysia The Committee unanimously approved the recommendations of the panel.
- Commodity-Oriented Planning Model Apart from methodological questions, it was noted that this project would be premature at this time both in the context of our overall Malaysia research program and in the context of our work on prototype models. No dissent.
- 3. EEC Trade The Committee rejected it on the grounds that several outside studies on this question have been and are being conducted, and that an internal paper surveying and evaluating the findings of these studies would be a desirable first step prior to sponsoring a research proposal. No dissent.
- 4. Basic Education Models The Committee did not endorse the proposal in view of an unsatisfactory submission, which left unclear the research nature of the project and its suitability for funding by the Committee. In view of the importance of the general topic, however, the Committee agreed to invite a resubmission. Two members recommended approval.
- 5. Vocational Training The Committee unanimously decided to postpone consideration of this project until the output of project RPO 247 can be evaluated, at least in draft.

6. Student Loan Schemes

The project was approved, despite some conceptual queries, in view of its rather limited scope and budget and the useful results obtained in Phase I. No dissent.

7. Urban Systems

Not discussed as Mr. Keare accepted the need for resubmission during the panel review.

8. Brazil

A supplement of \$20,000 was approved. Four members dissented.

9. Ranis

A supplement of \$25,000 for the third country was approved. Five members dissented.

10. Indonesia

With one dissent, the Committee decided not to approve the requested supplement.

11. Capacity Utilization

Option III was approved. It was noted that CAMS have agreed to finance an extension of the study to the Philippines at no extra cost to the Bank. No dissent.

II. Evaluation of Completed Projects

The suggested course of action in Mr. Ray's memo was amended to include confidential evaluation by referees outside the sponsoring department on all projects. The evaluations will then be sent to the Committee members for information, along with the Completion Report Forms.

ITEM I. Proposed Seminar on Trade and Industrialization

The Committee endorsed the proposal to sponsor the Seminar on Trade and Industrialization. There were however queries as to the exact nature of the seminar and the kind of people who should be invited to attend. The Committee felt it should be a small, private conference and not a large, public conference with political implications. The composition of attendees was to be mixed academics and middle level policy makers. Within these guidelines and in accordance with the details outlined in Attachment I, the Committee recommended proceeding with the organization of the seminar.

ITEM 2. Consideration of Research Proposals

(A) Patterns of Demand and Savings in the Development Process.

The report of the sub-committee as contained in Attachment II was accepted by the Committee. The Committee noted that this project qualified for addition to the DRC program of work on multi-sectoral models, but expressed concern about how well this line of research responded to Bank needs. Mr. Chenery pointed out that management steps were being taken to insure that all research carried out in the DRC was of importance to the Bank and relevant to its work.

The Committee noted that the proposed budget was for calendar year 1972 and not for FY72. The amount of funds allocated for FY72 will be one-third of the total.

- (B) Urban Transport and the Automobile.

 The Committee agreed with the sub-committee's recommendation
 (Attachment II) that this project be accepted as phase one of
 a more thorough study on Urban Transport. Later phases will be
 contingent upon a new research proposal being presented at the
 completion of phase one. The budget for the project in FY72
 was scaled down to \$16,000.
- (C) Yemen Arab Republic Feeder Road Study
 The Committee approved the project as submitted subject to
 satisfactory clarification of the research design. This
 clarification was expected during the meeting with Professor Custer
 of the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology scheduled for late
 February.

ITEM 3. Mid-Year Expenditure Review

The Committee reviewed and accepted the table on FY72 Research Consultants Disbursements (Attachment III) noting that the total forecast expenditure of \$1,149,000 was 13% higher than the P&B estimate. Since at least this much slippage is expected in second half disbursements, the difference was not cause for alarm.

ITEM 4. FY73 Research Budget

Mr. Stern proposed the Committee recommend asking for a budget of \$2.1 million to cover the costs of consultants' fees travel and data processing for research in FY73. In arriving at the \$2.1 million figure Mr. Stern pointed out that approximately 45% consisted of funds to carry on projects already in the research program and the remaining 55% represented funds for starting new projects. A departmental survey had indicated the need for approximately 1.8 million for new starts. This was scaled back to \$1.2 million for the budget request.

Mr. Adler indicated that \$2.1 million might be a difficult request on which to get Mr. McNamara and the Baord's approval. It was felt, however, that the Committee should recommend the figure it thought appropriate and it was up to P&B to recommend to Mr. McNamra whatever revisions they felt necessary.

ITEM 5.

At one or two points during the meeting, members voiced concern about the procedure used to approve research proposals. It was felt that too much valuable time was being spent on detailled picking apart of research projects and not enough time was being devoted to consideration of more general issues. Mr. Chenery and Mr. Stern agreed that this was a problem and indicated that in the future, sub-committees would be largely non-Research Committee members and that only the larger projects (costing \$10,000 or more) would be considered by the Committee. This would eliminate review of pilot phases of the larger projects so that when the Committee did consider them they would be better prepared and require less time to evaluate.

Mr. van der Tak reported that the sub-committee's evaluation of the request for additional funds was as stated in a memorandum to Mr. Chenery dated December 10 (copy attached).

Mr. Chenery queried how this study compared with other project operations oriented research. Mr. van der Tak indicated it is the largest single project (costing \$1.5 million) and that together with the study on Labor/Capital Substitution in Road Building it represents a major effort in the transport sector.

The Committee noted that the cost of the Kenya portion of the study would probably escalate to near \$650,000 though the Bank is only committed for \$100,000. The research sponsors are searching for additional funds from other sources and they do not anticipate asking the Committee for more money. They would, however, like to have the Bank's total commitment to the project (\$500,000) fungible between the Ivory Coast and Kenya portions of the study. The Committee agreed.

When queried about the progress to date in Kenya, Mr. Churchill reported that the Road Research Laboratory team had proved to be very effective despite equipment and location problems. Also, he pointed out that the French team which will work on the Ivory Coast appears to be of the same caliber as the Kenyan team.

Mr. Chenery was favorably disposed to grant the request for additional funds for the project because it appeared that there would be a predictably good payoff which the Bank and other Development Agencies could use in future road building projects. Mr. Churchill agreed and indicated that it would also provide useful information for the current studies on capital/labor substitution. There was no disagreement from the Committee and Mr. Chenery granted the request for an additional \$60,000 in FY72 and up to a total of \$500,000 for the life of the project.

Other Business

The Committee considered residual claimants (deferred at earlier sessions) on the funds of the Consultants' Research Budget and decided

that the only serious contenders would be the group of East African agricultural studies. It appeared that disbursements in large amounts for these studies would not occur before FY73. The Committee would, therefore, be favorably disposed to accepting other research proposals that merit consideration. Mr. John Adler indicated that additional funds over and above the original 1.3 million for research could be found if it appeared that the entire 1.3 million would be disbursed and there were still good projects to finance.

In closing, Mr. Chenery pointed out that we are preparing a progress report on the organizing of research in the Bank. It will be circulated to the Research Committee for comment, then distributed to the Economic Committee.

The Committee reviewed and accepted the proposed grouping for research projects as outlined in Attachment I, and approved the format for the research program tables as indicated in Attachment II. It was suggested that projects be coded and numbered according to their subject group, sector, country and any other reasonable category. Mr. Lowther will coordinate with the Computing Activities and Programming and Budgeting Departments to devise such a numbering system.

Mr. Chenery reviewed with the Committee the funds available and those being requested at this point in time as outlined on Attachments III and IV.

The following action was taken on research proposals which had been deferred at the November 2 meeting of the Committee:

- The Scope for Capital-Labor Substitution in the Mechanical Engineering Industry: The budget for this project was approved and the project itself was accepted under the following conditions:
 - The Bank will sponsor a seminar at which Mr. Westphal, the prime consultant, will explain the methodology and,
 - 2. the Bank will appoint a review group which will consider the proposed methodology and review the progress of the project. The review group is to be composed of representatives of the Industrial Projects Department, The East Asia Department and the Central Economic Staff. Specific individuals recommended for participation in the review group were Mr. Churchill from the CES and Mr. Darwich from Industrial Projects. Mr. Goreux will implement the review group and arrange the Westphal Seminar.
- Short-Run and Long-Run Influences Upon Income Distribution: The sub-committee reported that the only issue of concern on this project was whether or not it should study two countries simultaneously or just allow for study in one

country now with the second to be determined based upon the results in the first. Mrs. Adelman, the project director, indicated she intended to start the second country when the first was half finished so that lessons learned in the first country could be applied in the second. Under these conditions, the Committee agreed that the project should cover two countries.

During the discussion, there was some concern that the opportunity cost of the staff for doing a second country report might be too high. The Chairman indicated that we should encourage other projects on the subject but not at the cost of doing a second country study in this project.

The Budget for the project was approved as submitted (administrative note: This project is the same as that listed as II, No. 1 in the research program - the two will be combined under the title of this project on all future research program listings).

- C. Professional Structure in South East Asia: The Committee deferred this project at the last meeting in order to obtain the views of the Education Projects Department and hold further discussions on the research methodology. Education Projects Department did not feel the study would be of value to them in their project operations. Members of the Economic Staff felt that the project, if properly formulated, would have a broader importance and would, therefore, be of value. The budget for the project was approved and the project was accepted on the condition that Mrs. Adelman and Mr. Hawkins work with Mr. Silcock to prepare the terms of reference for the project.
- Poverty "2000": Mr. Holsen presented arguments discussed in the sub-committee regardingthis project. Those for the project were: (1) The Bank should support SODIPAX (the International Church Organization sponsoring the project) and (2) there was a need for this type of work. Arguments against were: the project will be done whether or not the Bank provides financial support (2) the Bank has no comparative advantage for research of this type and (3) the opportunity cost for the staff input required to coordinate and monitor the project was too high - staff could be better used to strengthen our inhouse capacity to work on this problem. Mrs. Adelman pointed out that the people involved from SODIPAX were all very reputable and, also, that the Bank could get useful feedback on the data collection techniques. Furthermore, the project could be the basis for further Bank consideration of the problem. some concern that this project would not uncover any really new information. The data sources were largely already available and it appeared to be a propaganda effort to bring to the world's attention the poverty problem. In the end, the Committee decided to reject Bank participation in the project at this point in time.

They would, however, reconsider if further information indicated that Bank participation would be necessary or desirable.

- E. Economic Models of Internal Migration: \$6,000 for a pilot phase of this study was approved by the Committee last June. The consultant being considered for the project has indicated he would not like to undertake the study without some assurance that it could be carried through to completion. This requires approval for an additional \$8,500 to be spent in FY73. The subcommittee recommended accepting the project on that basis, and the full Research Committee accepted the sub-committee's recommendation.
- F. AGP Project Case Study (Lilongwe Project); Evaluation of Alternative Livestock Production Schemes in East Africa; and, Study of Intermediate Technology: These proposals were again deferred for later consideration. They, plus one or two others, deal with agricultural studies of various types in East Africa. The Agriculture and Rural Development Division of the Economics Department will prepare a consolidated proposal for all studies being done in East Africa and resubmit to the Committee on that basis. Some funds will be held for them.
- G. Development of Computer Simulation Models for Use in Appraisal Work: This proposal was deferred at the last Committee meeting to determine whether or not the Agriculture Projects Department would agree to support it and provide staff to apply the Models in their Department. They have reported in writing that they will support it and the Committee now recommends allocating \$10,000 to the project.
- Research Related to Institutional and Management Aspects in Agricultural Development Projects: This proposal represents a project in two parts. One part was to hire someone to come to the Bank for three to four months to review Bank documents and then develop a research project requiring approximately two years. The person brought to the Bank would be placed on Under these circumstances it was felt that this portion of the project would be outside the terms of reference of the Research Committee. The Committee accepted a subcommittee recommendation to provide two or three months consultants time to see if there is a project which could be carried out by placing someone on the staff for two years. The second part of the project concerned a request from the Reading University for the Bank to pay for core support for their work in LDC institutions. The Committee agreed that the Bank should not finance this kind of research and no funds were allocated.
- Study of Scale Economies in Beef Production: This project was deferred for consideration at a later meeting.

With the addition of the above projects, the Research Committee has now allocated resources for the proposals submitted in October as indicated on the attached tables (Attachment V).

The Committee discussed a proposal made at the last meeting that the Bank contribute financial support to an OECD sponsored meeting of Directors of Research Institutes. Mr. Chenery pointed out that our contribution would be \$30,000 in FY72. The conference is to be held in September 1972. The main concern of the Committee was why funds for a conference should be taken from the research consultants' budget. There were two reasons: (1) no other funds are available and (2) the chairman wished to recognize the sponsoring of converences as a research function of interest to the Bank. The Committee agreed to support the conference for \$20,000 rather than \$30,000 with the stipulation that we explore the Development Services Department and the Economic Development Institute as possible sources of additional money for the conference.

The Committee considered three requests for changes in previously approved projects as follows:

- A. The Kravis International Comparison project had requested an additional \$8,000 to support a conference of experts to discuss the techniques to be used in making the international comparison. Discussion on this centered about whether or not the conference would actually contribute to changes in the project. Some members felt that the conference would be largely cosmetic to show that Mr. Kravis really did consider all possible techniques before deciding on the one to use. Some felt that the results of the study would not be sensitive to the alternative techniques anyway. One suggestion was that the conference would be useful if its scope was widened to include some substantive review of the early results of the experiment. On balance, the Committee decided to reject the request for funds and only reconsider if the conference was changed in nature and held at a time it could evaluate the substantive results of the project.
- B. The project entitled "Putting Installed Capacity to Work", was brought before the Committee because the conditions set for its approval in the June review could not reasonably be met. It had been approved on condition that a co-director from the Bank staff be appointed to work with the consultant, Mr. Schydlowsky. Mr. Schydlowsky felt this arrangement to be unacceptable and had asked the Bank to reconsider continuing the project with him as the sole director. The problem has been considered by Mrs. Hughes and Mr. Henderson in the Economics Department and they felt that the project should not go ahead with Mr. Schydlowsky as the sole director. The Research Committee was asked to confirm this position.

The discussion centered around just how much involvement from the Bank there should be without interfering with the intellectual freedom of outside researchers. In this cae, it was felt that a co-director of the project from the Bank staff would be essential to insure that the project was carried out in a manner satisfactory to the Bank. The Committee, therefore, confirmed the Economics Department position and recommended dropping the project in its present form. Mr. Stevenson and Mrs. Hughes were asked to draft a letter for Mr. Chenery's signature to Mr. Schydlowsky explaining the Committee's decision.

The Economics Department proposed to sponsor a round table discussion (inviting Mr. Schydlowsky) on the subject of capacity utilization and to determine from that suitable avenues for further research.

In connection with the discussion on this project, the Committee raised the general question of the desirability of Bank control of the research projects being carried out by consultants. The Committee's general reaction was that each project should be evaluated on its own merits and that the Bank should insist upon some controlling device, such as the co-directorship, in those cases where it was apparent that the project would not be responsive to the Bank's needs unless this were done.

C. The Agriculture Mechanization Study in India: Was brought before the Committee again because a visit to India had revealed that the original budget allocation would be too small to carry the project through the first phase in FY72. An additional \$10,000 was required to initiate arrangements with the two Indian institutes carrying out the surveys. The Research Committee approved the increase and allocated an additional \$10,000 to the project.

The Committee agreed that its next meeting should be held in early January when it would conduct a semi-annual review of the research consultants' budget; re-allocate funds where necessary; and, consider new research proposals and those deferred during this review cycle.

This group includes project appraisal techniques, project reappraisals, sector policy analysis and studies in direct support of project or sector operations. The group will be sub-divided into the various sectors, such as; transportation, public utilities, agriculture, tourism etc.

Mr. Chenery indicated that it would be reasonable for the Committee to complete the allocation of all research funds by December of this year. Proposals submitted in October would be considered at this meeting, and at a second meeting later this month. Allocation of remaining funds and reallocations, where necessary will be made at a final meeting of the Committee in December. Any changes required after that will be handled through the sub-committees that originally approved the projects.

Mr. Lowther circulated and explained the tables of proposals submitted in October (copy attached).

The Committee then reviewed the proposals submitted and made the following recommendations. The numbers indicate the research projects listed on the tables.

GROUP I, Items 1, 4 & 5 were accepted as submitted.

Was concern about relevance to the Bank's needs. On this point, the sub-committee had been unable to get an informed judgement from the Education Projects Department. There was also some concern regarding the methodology of the project. Mrs. Adelman indicated that she would work with Mr. Silcock to sharpen the design and insure that the project would be more oriented towards Bank operations. In the end, the Committee decided that the Project should be given a temporary go-ahead pending methodological changes suggested by Mrs. Adelman and the approval of the Education Projects Department. Final determination will be made at the meeting in late November.

GROUP III, Item 1: The funds requested were only a small portion of resources required for the project. A considerable amount of staff time had already been invested. On this basis, it appeared that the request for consultants funds was reasonable and should be approved. There was some concern about the scope of the project and it was suggested that it be approved with the stipulation that Mr. Balassa and Mrs. Adelman convey their feelings to Mr. Pursell regarding the scope, especially the exclusion of the ory Coast as a country for study.

GROUP IVD, Agriculture ects: Mr. King reported that his sub-committee felt that, in gereal, the proposals submitted were unfinished. This was due to mis inderstandings about the instructions,

pressure to generate proposals (because of the noted lack of same during the June Committee proceedings) and the lack of staff time available for research activities in the Agriculture Projects Department. Mr. van der Tak indicated that the Committee should consider the proposals as preliminary ideas that needed further discussion between the Projects Department and the Central Economic Staff before carrying them through to good proposals. He indicated that he would assist the initiation of discussions between Economics and Agriculture Projects.

Regarding the specific proposals submitted, the Committee made the following recommendations:

- Item 1. Mr. Reutlinger pointed out that the title was somewhat misleading and that this was a project concerning the transformation of traditional agriculture. It was designed to tie in with sector missions scheduled to go to the countries under study in one or two years. The Committee felt that it was a large project and before going ahead with any firm commitments of large amounts of money, there should be a pilot phase. They accepted the sub-committee's recommendation that \$25,000 be allotted to conduct initial surveys and evaluation of institutions capable of performing the research project. The \$25,000 was considered to be enough to cover surveys in two countries.
- Item 3. This is a proposal to develop a model for operational use in the Agriculture Projects Department. At present, there is no indication that anyone in the Agriculture Projects Department could use the model once it has been developed. The Committee felt that it should not be constructed unless there was some indication it would be used. It was recommended that final consideration of this proposal be held until the meeting in late November and that in the meantime the Agriculture Projects Department should be consulted on whether or not they would want to or could use the model.

At the suggestion of the sub-committee the remaining items listed under IVD were handled as follows:

Nos. 5 & 13 were rejected.

Nos. 7, 8, 10, 11 & 15 were accepted for listing in the Bank Research Program - no consultants funds were required. The remainder were deferred for consideration either at the meeting in late November or at the final meeting in December. A full report of the sub-committee is attached for the record.

The next meeting of the Research Committee is tentatively scheduled for the week of November 22.

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MINUTES OF RESEARCH COMMITTEE MEETING

June 3, 1971

All Members present.

Mr. Chenery noted that the Committee would be responsible for allocating 1.6 million dollars set aside in the FY72 budget for consultants' services supporting research activities. Mr. Chenery asked Mr. Balassa to outline recommended procedure for allocating the money.

Mr. Balassa suggested dividing the research projects into six topic oriented groups, and the research committee into three subcommittees. Each sub-committee would each evaluate two groups of research projects. Sub-committees would be free to appoint technical experts to assist them in evaluating research proposals. As a minimum, they should consult the sponsoring Department and counterpart staff in other Departments. Research proposals were grouped as indicated in the attached memo from Mr. Lowther to Mr. Chenery.

Mr. King stressed that the groups of research proposals should cut across departmental lines. This is especially important in evaluating projects which have importance in more than one department. The committee reviewed the list and suggested one or two changes in group assignments (the attached list shows the corrections).

Mr. Adler noted that there appeared to be some imbalance in the number of research proposals in various topics e.g. the number of proposals for transportation research far outnumber agricultural research. Mr. Chenery agreed and pointed out that one of the functions of the committee would be to note such imbalances and recommend changes where necessary.

The Development Research Center submitted a recommendation that its entire research program be considered as a whole, because it is so closely tied to their whole work program. The Committee agreed to take this into account during their evaluations, but felt that the Development Research Center research proposals should be considered individually.

The Committee agreed on the following time table for evaluating proposals: (i) Sub-committees will make their initial evaluation on each proposal in their assigned groups by Friday, June 11. (ii) The whole research committee will meet again on June 16 at 3.30, in Conference Room B, to consider all evaluations and allocate the consultants' funds to be devoted to each research project. The Committee will also decide how large a reserve to hold for subsequent allocations. (iii) The tentative research program established on June 16, will be circulated to all interested departments on June 21. They will have until June 25 to request changes. (iv) The first installment of the Research Program for FY72 will be established by June 30.

The Committee reviewed a draft checklist to be used in evaluating proposals (copy attached). They recommended placing more emphasis on evaluating the research project's importance to the Bank and to the academic field concerned. Mr. Balassa was asked to do a short redraft of the checklist.

RESEARCH COMMITTEE

Note of First Meeting on April 28, 1971

Present: Committee: Messrs. Chenery (Chairman), Adler, Avramovic, Balassa, Baldwin, Gulhati, King, Weiner

- 1. The Chairman said the establishment of the Research Committee was the next step in the re-evaluation of the Bank's role in development research. Earlier steps had been:
 - a) Mr. Balassa's survey of "Economic Research in the Bank" (EC/0/71-61 dated April 13, 1971);
 - b) the policy paper on "The Role of Development Research in the World Bank" (EC/0/71-55 dated March 25, 1971);
 - c) the preliminary meeting of the informal panel of external advisers 1/2 held in December, 1970, (see the attached draft "Working Relationships Alternatives" by Professor Ranis dated February 8, 1971).

TERMS OF REFERENCE

2. The Committee's draft terms of reference were discussed. It was noted that the Committee's main function was to review all Bank research projects and to advise the Chairman, who had ultimate responsibility for approving projects, on their merit in the light of any policy and budgetary guidelines which might be laid down.

- 3. It was noted, however, that the Committee's responsibility went beyond the review of projects. There would be broad responsibility for developing an overall research program, setting priorities and, where necessary, initiating research proposals.
- 4. Directors would continue to be responsible for departmental research budgets and projects for consideration by the Committee would be submitted through normal Division/Department channels. The Committee would, however, make the final recommendation on the allocation of the uncommitted element of the research budget for consultants. It was important that any controversial recommendation by the Committee should be referred back to Department Directors before action by the Chairman.
- 5. It was agreed that the Committee would consider proposals from other than normal channels. For the present, Mr. Balassa (Acting Adviser on Research) would be the extraordinary channel of communication to the Committee.

CONTACT WITH RESEARCH INSTITUTES

6. The Chairman said that the Committee would formulate guidelines on contact with research organizations in less developed countries, with advice from the external panelists. As a general rule the Bank would not support specific research institutions or individuals. The Bank would design its own projects and enlist the support of local researchers "ad hod' preferably on a co-operative basis. It was not intended to make any press announcement of the Bank's expanded role in research.

PROCEDURE FOR APPROVING PROJECTS

- 7. The Chairman said that each Division was being asked to submit a list of projects for review by the Committee, including ongoing projects which would not automatically have priority. Submissions should not cover every request for consultants' support services and should exclude normal service activities. It would be the Department's responsibility to list proposals in an order of priority.
- 8. The Committee discussed a number of ideas concerning the form of submissions on which Mr. Lowther was working. It was agreed that he would prepare a note giving guidelines on how submissions should be prepared.
- 9. It was suggested that to assist the Committee in its review of research proposals, a check list of points should be compiled. The Chairman said it might be necessary to set up small ad hoc groups to evaluate projects which came before the Committee.

WORKING RELATIONSHIPS - ALTERNATIVES

In all cases a small secretariat under the aegis of the <u>International Research Advisory Board</u> would represent the Bank.

I. Relatively Tight Relationship Between the IBRD and the LDC Institutions (Goreux model)

A. Major Pros

- 1. Bank has more control over design and execution.
- 2. Bank has better chance for internal feedback and education.
- 3. Easier to "sell" internally—a more business—like proposition and smaller step for the Bank.

B. Major Cons

- 1. Capacity of Bank to really design the research needed in any specific sense is likely to be limited.
- Limited willingness of good researchers and institutions to accept more than very general guidance on research methodology and scope. Moreover, frictions bound to arise in course of development with dissipation of some Bank objectives a real threat.
- Greater visibility of Bank staff and Bank responsibility for project will make it more difficult to separate out research activities from other things the Bank's staff involves itself in on a continuous basis.

II. Relatively Loose Relationship between the IBRD and the LDC Institutions

A. Major Pros

- 1. Bank's visibility is limited and relationship to other Bank activities in country sufficiently remote.
- 2. Acceptability to individual researchers enhanced and frictions in course of project development minimized.

B. Major Cons

- Bank gives up considerable control over quality and relevance of research design and execution, and consequently accountability is limited.
- 2. Ability of Bank staff to be involved in learning process, facilitating later feed-back into Bank operations is hampered.

III. Triangular Relationships Between IBRD and DC and LDC Institutions

A. Major Pros

- 1. Bank achieves greater measure of quality control over research design and execution without having to get heavily involved in a direct fashion.
- 2. LDC institutions are likely to find this sort of arrangement among professionals most congenial. DC-LDC mutuality of interest on research and training objectives is likely to be the most viable basis for cooperative partnership arrangement in the future and should be an important objective of IBRD activity in its own right.
- 3. As multilateral capital flows increase relative to bilateral capital flows the need to maintain or expand relevant DC research capacity which has been an important element in bilateral aid programs (e.g., U.S., U.K. and now Canada) should not be disregarded, again in its own right.

B. Major Cons

- Bank may be accused of primarily helping rich country institutions rather than serving the "reconstruction" and "developing" parts of the world.
- 2. Bank's direct control over research design and execution is again limited, or at least delegated in part.
- 3. Ability of Bank staff to be involved in the learning processes, facilitating feedback into Bank operations is hampered.
