







Learning through the Lifecycle in Multi-Topic National Household Surveys: Options for low-income countries

Washington, February 3-4, 2020 World Bank

The agenda for the workshop is structured in three parts. The first two parts will be a stock-taking of the discussions around the learning assessment modules for preschool (ECD), school-age children and adults with a focus on the national, regional and international programs.

Lessons learned from different implementation experiences will guide the discussion into exploring examples of technical issues (e.g. sampling strategies, CAPI versus PAPI tradeoff administration) that need be resolved to facilitate data collection of learning and skills assessment in household surveys. The final session will be dedicated to charting a practical way forward in terms of both content and process.

The concluding roundtable will aim at promoting the harmonization of survey instruments for the assessment of learning across national and international survey programs, including: (i) practical guidance for addressing the technical challenges, (ii) identification of the knowledge gaps that need to be closed, and (iii) development of a network of experts and institutions that can work together to identify and support opportunities for skills and learning data collection in household surveys.
