

Priority Area 1 - TVET



Achievements

Targeting 650,000 enrollees – Launched the Nigeria TVET Initiative

Upgraded 38 Federal & State Technical Colleges nationwide for TVET training

Prioritized 35 Trades following Industry Gap Assessment, and Revised Curriculum

Trained 3600 Teachers nationwide in pedagogy and trade specific areas

Repositioned NABTEB as the sole NSQ certificating authority

Priority Area 2 - STEMM

Achievements

Expanded student nursing, doctors, pharmacist intakes to 115,000, by a factor of 4X

Selected 18 Institutions for High Impact interventions and infrastructure upgrades



Launching Diaspora Bridge (Bridging Research, Innovation, Development, and Global Engagement connecting local academic and medical institutions to funding, expertise, knowledge transfer

Priority Area 3 - OOSCE

Achievements

Integrated 25,000 into formal education (FCT), and >400 Tsangaya teachers* trained

Repositioned NCAOOSCE to coordinate implementation of all policies and OOSC programs

Integrated TVET, Digital Education, Entrepreneurship into curriculum

Developing the Policy on Almajiri Education for an inclusive and sustainable future

Priority Area 4 - Data & Digitization

Achievements

Launched the Nigeria Education Digitization Initiative NEDI, a repository of all education data

Revamped Teacher & Student learning platforms

Developing the NEDI infrastructure to hold data across over 202,000 schools and registered students

Priority Area 5 - Girl Child Education

Achievements

Launched LUMINAH targeting 1,000,000 girls completing education by 2030

Inaugurated National Steering, Technical Advisory, M&E, Donor & Private Sector, Advocacy Committees to coordinate implementation

Shortlisted 12 pilot states across six geopolitical zones

Expanded AGILE implementation to a total of 18 states, covering 11 additional States

184,153 girls receiving digital literacy skills, 577,863 girls received scholarships*

Priority Area 6 - Education Quality Assurance

Achievements

Rolled out and expanded digital online learning, launched a Community of Practice with over 3,198 teachers across 23 subjects – and growing

New primary level curriculum developed, being rolled out, Senior Secondary School being developed

Developed National Teacher Training Framework and six transformative Edu Revamp modules to elevate teacher capacity for 21st-century skills

Reactivated National Monitoring of Learning Assessments and revamped FEQAS & SEQAS for enhanced oversight

Launched the Quality Education and Learning Outcomes (QELOC) initiative
