ICP 2024: Participation

Anticipated participation:

- (!) ICP 2024 is expected to have a wider country coverage than the previous ICP cycles.

ICP 2024: Operational Materials and Solutions

ICP 2024: Risks

- **1. Financial sustainability risks:** The ICP is facing significant funding challenges, which can jeopardize core processes and sustainability of the entire program for 2024 cycle and beyond.
- Mitigation: Potential donors have been approached to fund statistical production; capacity building; research, innovation, and knowledge; strategic planning, program management, and partnerships; and promotion and outreach.
- **2. Operational risks:** Competing priorities in national and regional implementing agencies have redirected necessary resources away from ICP activities.
- Mitigation: The global, regional and national implementing agencies are working to integrate further ICP data collection and validation processes into core statistical work and promote the capacity building advantages of established methods.
- Mitigation: Introduction of streamlined technical (IT) solutions to reduce operational burden on countries.
- **3. Participation risks:** Unstable geopolitical situation can potentially limit ICP activities.
- Mitigation: Global Office and regional agencies continuously monitor the situation and communicate with participating fragile and conflict countries and will prepare mitigation measures where possible.

(!) Accelerated fundraising efforts (1)

- ICP operations at the global, regional, and national levels are facing acute resource constraints, which threaten not only the current production of PPPs but also the continuity and sustainability of the entire Program.
- The **current international financing landscape remains highly constrained**, with many traditional donors scaling back contributions due to fiscal pressures, widening government deficits, and competing priorities linked to global crises and conflict-related spending.
- To mitigate these risks, the Global Implementing Agency (GIA) has accelerated and intensified donor engagement in 2025, exerting best efforts to identify and proactively engage potential funding partners across bilateral, multilateral, foundation, and philanthropic channels.
 - International organizations
 - Multilateral investment banks
 - National organizations for international cooperation
 - World Bank and other funding programs

(!) Accelerated fundraising efforts (2)

Linking Fundraising to ICP Modernization: Building a More Efficient and Sustainable Global Program

To strengthen the timeliness, policy relevance, and sustainability of PPPs, fundraising efforts are directly aligned with the modernization of the ICP—aimed at enabling more frequent, efficient, and country-driven PPP production.

Modernization priorities and benefits:

- More frequent and timely PPP estimates, allowing results to better reflect evolving economic conditions and maintain policy relevance in international comparisons.
- Reduced reporting burden for countries through modern digital data collection and automated PPP production tools, enhancing efficiency at regional and global levels.
- Strengthened national and regional capacity through targeted technical assistance and regional workshops supporting the adoption of digitalized and SDMX-compliant PPP production systems.



United Nations Statistical Commission (UNSC)

- ICP report originally submitted "for discussion" → Changed "for information" → Changed "for decision".
- The report outlined activities undertaken in 2024 at the global, regional, and national levels for the completion of ICP 2021 cycle and the implementation of ICP 2024 cycle, describing governance, capacity-building, research, knowledge, and advocacy activities carried out in this regard.
- The **Commission took note** of the release of 2021 cycle results and progress made in carrying out the ICP 2024 cycle, and related risks and mitigation measures.

UNSC: System of National Accounts (SNA) 2025



- SNA 2025 submitted for <u>adoption</u> at 56th UNSC Session [Agenda item 3(a)]
 - Broader vision of economic reality with improved best practices and an impact on GDP and other macro indicators.
 - Main pillars: globalization, digitalization, well-being and sustainability, financial risks and vulnerabilities
- International price and volume comparisons in the SNA 2025
 - Section G. International price and volume comparisons has been updated to provide a current overview of the concepts and methodology for computing PPPs.
- Note: Report of the Intersecretariat Working Group on Price Statistics includes ICP content

The 57th UNSC Session is scheduled to be held in New York on March 3-6, 2026



- "Report of the World Bank on the International Comparison Programme" is under preparation and to be submitted in mid-November 2025. (!) Input from RIAs on regional progress by October 31 is crucial for the preparation of the report. The report for 56th session has been shared with RIAs. All previous reports are available on the UNSC section of ICP website.
- Brief description on the annotated agenda for 57th session will read:

The Commission will have before it, for information, the report of the World Bank on the International Comparison Programme (ICP). The report summarizes activities undertaken in 2025 at the global, regional, and national levels on the use of the 2021 results and implementation of the 2024 cycle. It highlights progress in governance, capacity building, and methodological development, including digital and AI-enabled tools to improve the quality and timeliness of price data collection and to monitor the use and impact of purchasing power parities (PPPs). The report also notes the establishment of the Task Force on Annual PPP Production, to enhance the policy relevance and responsiveness of PPPs, and the Task Force on the ICP Classification Update, to strengthen alignment and synergies between the ICP and consumer price statistics. The Commission is invited to take note of these developments, and stakeholders are called upon to provide the necessary resources and institutional support to accelerate innovations and ensure the sustainability of the Programme as a permanent element of the global statistical system.

(!) Any questions, comments, or feedback from the IACG at this stage on the ICP report to the 57th Session of the UNSC?

ICP Governing Board (GB)

- 1. Regional Implementing Agencies (RIAs) inform the World Bank of their suggested nominations (including the nominee's name, title, and contact details).
- 2. The **World Bank** shares the nominations across all regions and with the **United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD)**.
- 3. The Director of UNSD issues formal invitation letters to join the ICP Governing Board.
- 4. The **respective nominees** confirm their acceptance to the Director of UNSD.
- 5. UNSD informs the World Bank of the confirmed acceptances.
- 6. The **World Bank** establishes the first communication with the new Board members and arranges the **inaugural meeting**.

- The World Bank's Poverty and Inequality Platform (PIP) integrated the 2021 PPPs and other updates into its global poverty assessments in June 2025, leading to a revision of the international poverty line from \$2.15 per day to \$3.00 per day.




Human Development Index

- The UNDP publication **Human Development** Report 2025 - A matter of choice: People and possibilities in the age of AI, published in May **2025**, uses gross national income per capita in 2021 PPP terms to compare the standard of living across countries in its human development index and gender development index.
- The multidimensional poverty index includes the population living below the PPP-based \$2.15 extreme poverty line.




Energy & Climate

International Energy Agency's latest World Energy Review, published in March 2025, offers a comprehensive view of 2024 energy trends, with faster-thanaverage demand growth led by electricity due to cooling, industry, transport electrification, and data centers/Al. 








The State of Food Security and Nutrition in the World (SOFI)



Research on PPP Income Classification

- Research is ongoing on the use of PPPs for income classification, either as an alternative to or in parallel with the current Atlas-based (i.e., market exchange rate-based) approach.
- A simulation of the FY25 classification using ICP 2021 PPPs has been conducted, and a draft research paper discussing PPP-based income classification has been updated accordingly.
- Next steps include further consultations among stakeholders and planning for the release of the related information.


Research for Key Utilization: World Bank Income Classification







Uses: APO Productivity Databook 2025



Asian Productivity Organization publication APO Productivity Databook 2025, published in October 2025, provides harmonized analyses of Asia's economic growth and productivity from 1970-2023 with projections to 2035 covering 33 Asian economies. It uses PPPs for cross-country comparisons of GDP, capital, and labor productivity measurements.

Uses: Africa's Pulse: Pathways to Job Creation in Africa




World Bank publication Africa's Pulse: Pathways to Job Creation in Africa, published in October 2025, analyzes Sub-Saharan Africa's growth outlook and labor market challenges amid modest per-capita gains and a rapidly expanding workforce, and calls for transformative, private-sector-led job creation. The report utilizes international poverty lines in PPP terms to measure poverty rates and also employs PPP for cross-country economic comparisons within the region.

Uses: Latin America and the Caribbean Economic Review, October 2025




World Bank publication Latin America and the Caribbean Economic Review: Transformational Entrepreneurship for Jobs and Growth, published in October 2025, notes the region faces a challenging economic outlook facing slow growth and tight finances, highlights an entrepreneurship puzzle—many informal micro firms but few scalable ones due to skill gaps and shallow finance—and suggests key priority areas. GDP per capita in PPP terms and the updated international poverty lines based on the ICP 2021 results provide the base for its analyses.

Uses: MENAAP Economic Updated, October 2025



World Bank publication **MENAAP Economic Update**, October 2025: Jobs and Women: Untapped Talent, **Unrealized Growth**, published in October 2025, finds the growth prospects in the Middle East, North Africa, Afghanistan, and Pakistan (MENAAP) are improving, but conflict, fragility, and displacement remain persistent challenges. It argues that job creation and fully leveraging the region's workforce are essential to raising living standards noting the low levels of female labor force participation in the region remain a major obstacle. Labor force participation and its relation to economic development are discussed using PPP based indictors.

Uses: Global Food Systems Transformation 2025




Systems Transformation 2025: Progress Report Based on Inputs from Countries, Coalitions, and the UN System Ahead of UNFSS+4, published in October 2025, takes stock of global food systems transformation since the 2021 UN Summit, indicating many countries have made tangible progress, while underscoring remaining opportunities that require deeper cooperation, smarter finance, and equity. It discusses hidden costs related to food and health around the world in PPP terms.

Uses: Global Innovation Index 2025: Innovation at a Crossroads



The World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) publication <u>Global Innovation Index 2025: Innovation at a Crossroads - Unlocking the Promise of Social Entrepreneurship</u>, published in September 2025, reveals innovation systems at a crossroads, where breakthrough technologies in AI and quantum computing advance rapidly while investment growth slows and collaborative models evolve to address global challenges. PPP-adjusted labor productivity, GDP and R&D expenditures are utilized for cross-country comparisons of innovation.


Uses: Fragile and Conflict-Affected Situations: Intertwined Crises, Multiple Vulnerabilities



World Bank publication <u>Fragile and Conflict-Affected</u> <u>Situations: Intertwined Crises, Multiple</u>

<u>Vulnerabilities</u>, published in September 2025, highlights vulnerabilities in fragile and conflict-affected economies, underscores rising risks, and calls for tailored policies and sustained international support. PPP is used to measure economic conditions and to analyze poverty in fragile and conflict-affected situations.

Uses: Reboot Development: The Economics of a Livable Planet



World Bank publication Reboot Development: The Economics of a Livable Planet, published in September 2025, argues that failing to maintain a livable planet poses immediate economic risks, shows widespread exposure to degraded air, land, and water, and demonstrates that investing in nature and cleaner, more efficient resource use yields high returns, more jobs, and resilient growth. It analyzes green export levels in relation to GDP capita in PPP terms.

Uses: Service Delivery Redesign for Maternal and Newborn Survival in Chad

<u>Research and Participatory Design</u>, published in August 2025, summarizes research and co-design in four regions of Chad on persistently high maternal and newborn mortality, proposing a Service Delivery Redesign with strategically located hospital "hubs" and lower-level birth-center "spokes" to expand midwife-led care, ensure timely access to hospital-level services, and phase implementation.

To ensure a more accurate and contextually relevant cost estimates, PPP adjustments are utilized when comparing costs associated with maternity and newborn.

United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs publication **The Sustainable Development Goals** Report 2025, published in July 2025, delivers a tenth annual stocktake of SDG progress, finding notable gains since 2015 but an insufficient pace to meet all Goals by 2030, highlighting fragile and unequal outcomes amid conflict, climate, inequality, and debt, showcasing national successes, and calling for accelerated action in six areas and stronger international cooperation and investment. PPPs are one of the key and fundamental inputs to measure SDG goals, used in 8 of the 17 SDG indicators.

1990-2023




United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) publication Revenue Statistics in Latin America and the Caribbean 2025, published in May 2025, presents harmonized tax revenue data for 27 LAC countries, enabling consistent crosscountry and global comparisons. It adds two special features on non-tax revenues and on fiscal income from non-renewable natural resources. The publication is a joint effort by OECD (CTPA and Development Centre), CIAT, UN-ECLAC, and IDB. It analyze tax-to-GDP ratios using PPP based GDP figures.




World Bank publication **Global Economic Prospects**, published in June 2025, highlights headwinds to the global economy from trade tensions and policy uncertainty, noting weak prospects and subdued FDI constrain EMDEs' jobs and poverty reduction, and calling for global cooperation to stabilize trade and support FCV countries alongside domestic actions to contain inflation, strengthen fiscal resilience, and advance reforms. 




